cent Tornadoes Remind People How First Cross Helps Those In Trouble; Make Your Contribution Liberal

Mr. J. E. Mathews, Red Cross Disaster Chairman of Ranger, reminded us today that the tornadoes which swept across Texas and two other southwestern states during the week end of March 13, served this week to emphasize in the minds of Lone Star state residents the vital role played by the American National Red Cross and local Red Cross chapters throughout Texas during the past several years.

Since 1945, the Red Cross has expended \$4,900,678.35 in relief in Texas, helping 26,357 families to get back on their feet in the wake of disaster. These funds came from the people of Texas, themselves, as well as from the people of the other 47 states.

The total number of buildings destroyed or badly damaged during this seven-year period totalled 69,595. Persons killed in Texas disasters over the seven-year period totalled 751, and injured 3,524.

These disasters varied in character and included floods, hurricanes, tornadoes, fires, explosions, wind and hailstorms and sudden cold waves. In every instance, Red Cross chapter personnel and national staff representatives were on hand immediately following disaster, providing mass shelter and feeding for stricken communities; supervising the removal of the dead, and often paying the cost of burial, caring for the injured and paying in full the medical bills of many, as well as helping families to reestablish their homes through direct grants of monies for rebuilding and refurnishing.

The assistance given to sufferers in such disasters as these, including the victims of the 13 tornadoes, is NOT a loan. Awards are always based upon need, not loss, when a family is unable to reestablish normal living through its own resources or credit.

Texas, which suffers more natural disasters than any other state in the Union, knows the work of the American Red Cross better than most. Eastland County in particular knows. There is still one case being taken care of as a result of the Desdemona tornado in 1949. In the past Eastland County has shown appreciation of the fine work of the Red Cross by contributing generously to its support. Mr. Mathews urges everyone who has not yet contributed to do so immediately.

Governor Shivers has asked support of the 1953 Red Cross Campaign in this way: "...The presence in our midst of an organization such as this—an organization of people prepared to help other people in time of distress and great need—is heartening and comforting to us all. Through the years, the Red Cross has given invaluable service in the relief and rehabilitation of our people who were victims of calamity of every kind and character. Indeed, in some years, Red Cross has put back into this state more funds for disaster relief alone than the entire contribution in the state to the National Red Cross program."

Late report by Mrs. John Love, Red Cross Fund Chairman, announced that a total of \$5,113.04. The Eastland Division has reported a total of \$1598.70. Rural Division reports \$3,344. Mrs. Gene Baker of Gorman reported \$122.00, but felt sure that their quota of \$650 would be met.

Mrs. Love urges that all workers make reports promptly and finish making their territory so that the campaign can be completed as quickly as possible. She feels sure that when each territory is worked and all reports are in that the quota will be oversubscribed.

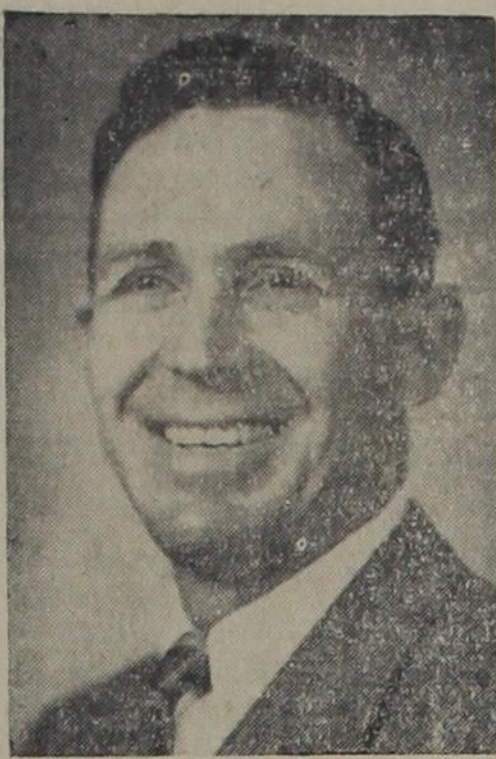

CISCO, March 20 (Spl.)—Funeral for Judge J. J. Callaway, 72, prominent Cisco civic leader and oil man who died Thursday in a hospital here, were held at 2 p.m. Sunday at the First Methodist Church.

Judge Callaway was a member of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce board of directors, the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Bar Association.

Judge Callaway was prominent in Masonic circles and held large holdings in oil properties. He practiced law in Rising Star during the oil boom in 1920.

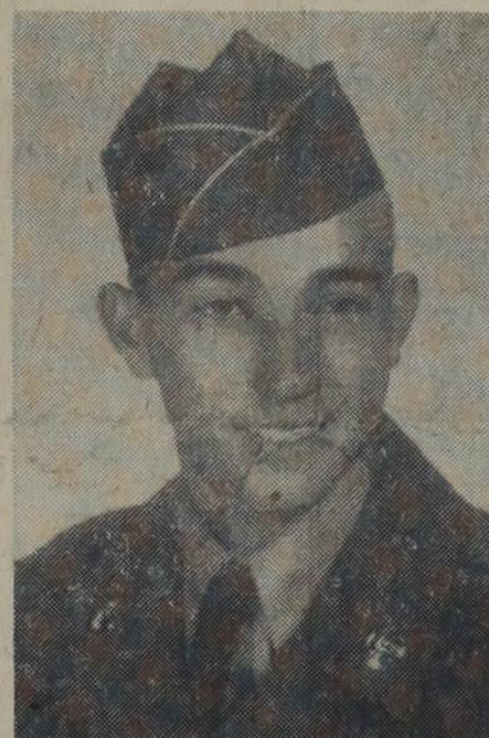
Legion Honors Gold Star Mother And 3 Veterans

EDITOR'S NOTE—This is the first of a series of three articles written by F. D. Hicks explaining the Chamber of Commerce and its functions.

What Does Your Chamber of Commerce Do?

In every community there is or should be some sort of organization that is always working for the best interests of their town and its citizens. It is composed of a group of men who have their every interest tied up in the community and naturally try to sell their services over the area which is known as their trade territory.

Your Chamber of Commerce in Rising Star is doing a good job. During 1952, according to the annual report found elsewhere in this issue, (because of the organization), contributed to many causes—all worth while. There was the Red Cross, March of Dimes, Christmas lights, fires, needy families, boys and girls Scout troops, orphan homes, and cooperated with several farm groups in promoting calf shows, turkey growers association, and a number of other forms of entertainment. Had it not been for this group, these activities would no doubt have been restricted. In short a Chamber of Commerce is a shock absorber that takes the responsibility off others in the community and places it on those who recognize their duty and are trying to do it so the whole community will be known as up and going and can always be counted on to help in every worth while cause and undertaking.

For thirty years your Chamber of Commerce has been organized and functioning as best it could under many restrictions. First, the budget has always been restricted—according to those in the know, has been small. Too small in fact to do what is normally expected of a C of C. So many have contributed a little—probably because there was no idea that more money was needed. But today, with a new board of officers and so many things that needs to be done and can be done, more money is needed to get the job done.

Second, everyone should be interested. This is true of Rising Star. This writer knows that most of our responsible people recognize their duty and will do it when it is brought to their attention. All can find a place in the Chamber of Commerce. Let's give it a try.

Rocks on Hiways Wear Longer in Some Sections

AUSTIN, Texas.—Mineral differences in rocks used in Texas' concrete highways are causing some sections to wear better than others, a University of Texas researcher reported.

Some minerals were found to be unstable when used in concrete, leading to chemical changes which weakened pavement, William E. Barker, who has completed pavement durability studies for the Texas

Highway Department, said.

"Tests are being developed to discover the harmful minerals so paving materials containing them can be rejected or measures adopted to neutralize them," Barker explained. He is a civil engineering faculty member.
