REVIEW WATER CASE

I once owned property that was a part of the watershed of the Colorado river; I have no interest in irrigation for myself and have no desire to acquire water privileges from the state; but as a plain citizen, I want to call the attention of the people of Texas to the fact that the laws in regard to irrigation and riparian rights are the object of all the laws affecting property.

Little known facts brought the tablets of stone from Mount Sinai, a system of laws regarding riparian rights were in force in Egypt, and the same had been in operation among the Chaldeans. Later the Romans acquired them, and copied them into the laws they adopted.

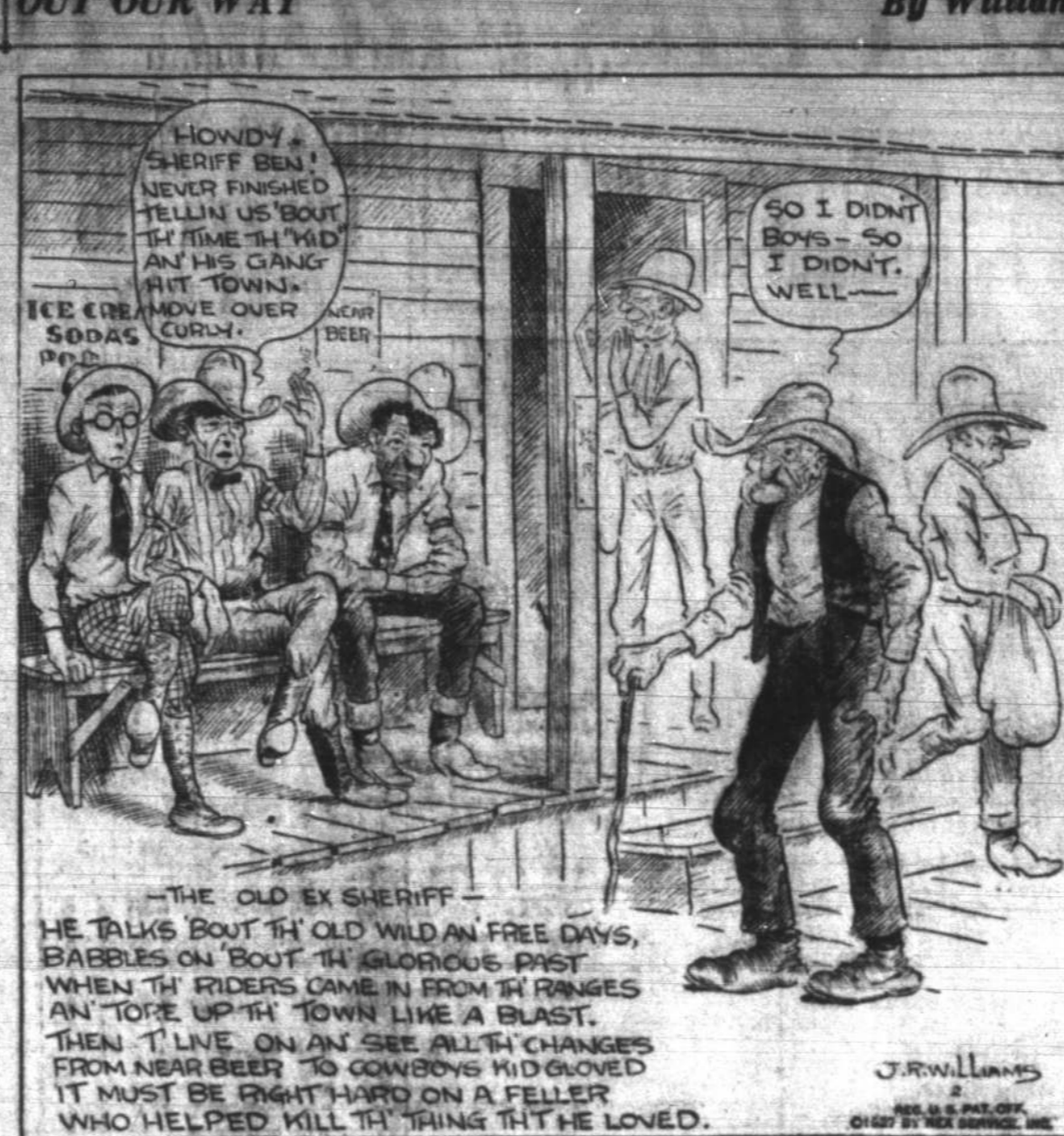
These laws have changed under different governments and at different times, and they differ now in different states in this Union in respect to details.

Typical fundamental principles affecting riparian rights has come down through all the ages; the Chaldeans, had it; the Pharaohs enforced it; the Romans adopted it; and modern nations today universally recognize it. That principle is this: That a person owning land bordering on a stream or through which a stream runs has the inherent right to divert the water of such stream onto his own land for domestic and irrigation purposes, provided only that he will return the surplus of any water so diverted into the stream from which he took it.

Now, I understand that that is all our neighbors, the people of Brownwood, want to do. And I do not think it right for a bunch of young Turks in Texas to attempt to deny to our people this ancient and equitable right in regard to the use of water.

Science Gives Its Final Verdict on Alcohol

SCIENCE GIVES ITS FINAL VERDICT ON ALCOHOL

Alcohol in small doses may or may not be harmful, but in large doses it is positively harmful.

This, in summary, is the conviction of the world's leading medical authorities.

Surveying all that science knows about alcoholic effects on the human system, Dr. Morris Fishbein, editor of the Journal of American Medical Association and special health writer for The Bulletin, and Albert Edward Wigman, one of the country's foremost biologists and author of "The Fruit of the Family Tree," "The New Decalogue of Science," and other works have contributed their findings to the current issue of Collier's magazine.

One of the most elaborate and careful experiments was conducted by Dr. Raymond Dodge and Francis G. Benedict in the nutrition laboratory of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, under a grant by the Carnegie Institution of Washington.

Dr. Walter B. Miles, carried out 160 experiments on several groups of young men to determine the effect of alcohol on human efficiency.

Of these experiments 160 were with alcohol and 160 were with control days when the subject did not know that he did not receive alcohol. His dose ranged from 21 to 32 grams and dose II from 22 to 32 grams. This would be, for example, a 12-ounce bottle of 27% beer for the smaller dose and a full quart for the larger dose.

These doses applied to the main body of his experiment.

These experiments used thirteen young men throughout most of the experiments, and seven college graduates. Most of the young men were moderate users, but three of them were persons under treatment by the Psychopathic Hospital of Boston for excessive alcoholism.

The subjects were given two types of doses on different days. Dose A contained thirty cubic centimeters of pure alcohol and dose B 45 cubic centimeters of pure alcohol.

A dose of 30 cubic centimeters of pure alcohol is about the amount of pure alcohol in a quart of 27% beer. This is about as close as we can come to translating the exact doses into the popular forms of drinking alcohol.

Both on the alcohol and the non-alcohol days, after the subject had taken the dose, the experimenters by very refined devices studied the effect upon the body and mental processes.

Reflexes slowed 7 Per Cent "The reflex effect was delayed on the jerk which was delayed by the alcohol an average of 10 per cent, and the average extent of the muscle thickening was reduced 40 per cent. The second largest effect was on the eye-blink reflex, an eye which was produced in speed 7 per cent and decreased in extent of the muscle movements 19 per cent. The larger dose consistently showed greater effect than the smaller one.

From a scientific standpoint Dr. Benedict and Fishbein emphasize the importance of the effect of alcohol upon the eye movements, and say:

"The effect is much more marked with the larger dose of alcohol. The effects are all in practical agreement and show decreased efficiency.

"The effects are less when taken with food and greatest when taken on an empty stomach.

"The effect is greatest from the first minute to an hour and a half after taking, and tapers off with fair regularity to the end of the fourth hour, beyond which the subjects were not tested.

"The effect upon speed was much less than upon accuracy.

"The decrease in accuracy was very great. While the speed could hit the legs almost as readily, he hit the wrong leg much more frequently than usual. The percentage of error was from 50 to 100 per cent greater in the first two hours of the interval from two to three an half hours following the alcohol than the usual error of the individual."

AIMEE DRAWS IRE OF NAVAL MEN BY WEARING UNIFORM; MAY PROSECUTE

By Associated Press LOS ANGELES, Sept. 1.—Aimee Semple McPherson, evangelist, today was threatened with prosecution by federal authorities in the event she wore her uniform in the presence of naval men. The threat was made by a report upon which the U. S. Navy Attorney General, J. Edgar Hoover, advised McPherson at San Diego to "prevent the woman and her followers from violating already established regulations."

The request was made in an official communication from the naval officer, who is commandant of the closest naval district at the southern city. It enclosed a newspaper photograph of Mrs. McPherson and a group of her followers in which the Angelus Temple leader was shown in her new "admiral's" regalia.

Admiral McPherson's communication ordered the United States attorney to investigate the conditions as depicted in the picture and "take the necessary steps to have this practice stopped immediately, and take whatever steps are necessary to prevent the woman and her followers from violating already established regulations."

The evangelist yesterday denied that she possessed any uniforms which in any way resembled those of naval men, but admitted that she posed in the uniforms as shown in photographs but did so at the request of newspapermen. She said that she would not select the uniforms which will be used in a proposed "religious navy" operating in a chain of evangelistic "light houses" until she had found out what style could be used without any objection being raised.

Democratic Party Formed In Japan

TOKYO, Sept. 1.—The politics of Japan, while somewhat simpler than the Chinese variety, still is as complicated as it interests Westerners but little.

Until recently there were three major parties in the Diet—the Kenmei, Seiyukai and Seiyuhon. The Kenmei government fell with the spring money panic and the Seiyuhon, headed by General Baron Tanaka, succeeded.

A national election, in which universal manhood suffrage will be tried out for the first time, is to be held next May and already a new party—the Minseitō or Democratic party—has been formed with the intent of buying Tanaka and the Seiyuhon under an avalanche of ballots.

The new Minseitō is composed of the majority of the members of the Kenmei and Seiyuhon and is headed by Yukio Hamanouchi, former home minister, with former Premier Watanabe, head of the defunct Kenmei, and Takejiro Tokonami, president of the old Seiyuhon, as his advisors.

The Minseitō claims 230 seats in the Diet against the Seiyuhon's 177. The Seiyuhon, however, hopes to increase its seats at the election.

In addition to the Minseitō, and Seiyuhon, there is the Proletarian party which is yet to be heard from.

LEATHER WORKERS DISAPPEARING DEL RIO, Texas.—Shoemaker and leather workers are gradually getting scarce, ranchmen here declare. A rancher who advertised for a maker of shoes and saddles got no replies and was told that the old leather workers are dying and new ones are not forthcoming.

plement the oral decision given in court today. Trial and argument of the case occupied 11 weeks here this spring. Some 65 corporations and individuals were involved.

Judge Calhoun dissolved the cross action of Higgins seeking establishment of their claims against the state and defendants of the state's suit, for a participation in the accounting of receipts.

Others Get Nothing

The claim of J. L. Helm, rancher, for mineral rights on the whole of the Eastland and G. C. Perkins of Houston, for mineral rights on 24 acres, both under filings for permits, were dissolved because adverse claims to the land were pending at the time of filing. Judge Calhoun held that Perkins filing with the county surveyor on the 24 acre tract as unsurveyed land was made correctly, but that the court in the Blaffer suit, had no power to mandamus the state land commissioner to issue a prospecting permit. Helm had filed in 1925 after the Blaffer suit was instituted but had filed with the county clerk of Harris county under the form for surveyed land.

Suit of the Adolph Goldman heirs perpetrated by Mrs. Gertrude Goldman was dissolved on land commissioner J. T. Blaffer's report in statement, the court finding that the Goldman disputed filing for an award from the state of a 530 acre tract had been adjudicated logically by the land commissioner.

One Company Produces

The Texas company is the only company still producing on the 265 acre tract, which has had more than 20 producing wells on it. Six other companies have holdings there, however, and the production there since real development in about 1912 to 1915, according to figures submitted by the various companies. This does not include the present value of the land and oil underneath. The Texas company yet has to file report on receipts for the last nine months, owing this ceased production about that long ago.

Judge Calhoun is to decide whether the oil companies will be allowed to retain their costs of drilling wells that proved to be dry holes.

Behind the seven-eighths royalties of the seven companies represented by the \$5,000,000 figure, the state, by the judgment, gets a claim on production receipts from what is known as the Stevenson fee surcharge, which with no royalties to be paid. The state will claim about \$136,000 under this phrase of the judgment.

In round figures, the production receipts from the various companies during time covered by the suit are: Texas company \$1,201,000; Producers' Oil company \$1,754,000; Louisiana Oil and Refining company, \$227,000; Gulf Production company, \$321,000; Humble Oil company \$250,000; Blaffer and Farish, \$207,000; Paraffin Oil company \$207,000. This does not include the past nine months receipts yet to be reported by the Texas company, nor the Stevenson fee receipts.

GEOLOGISTS CANCEL MEET

The regular meeting of the West Texas Geological Society scheduled for Saturday in the quarters of the West Texas Petroleum club at the St. Angulus Hotel, has been cancelled by Dr. H. P. Tyson, president of the society. The October meeting will likely be held in Abilene that city having extended an invitation.

THREE STATES PRODUCE MOST OF CRUDE OIL

Eighty per cent of the crude produced in the entire United States comes from three states, Oklahoma, Texas and California, while the great market for gasoline is east of the Mississippi. These three states produce five times as much crude and manufacture three times as much gasoline as they can consume.

Thirty states, including the District of Columbia, do not produce crude oil. Ten other states do not produce sufficient crude oil to supply their own gasoline requirements. This means that the country as a whole is dependent on nine states for the bulk of its crude oil supply.

Twenty-two states, including the District of Columbia, do not have refineries located within their boundaries. Seventeen of the remaining states do not refine enough crude oil to take care of the gasoline consumers within those states. The result of the situation is that the gasoline requirements for 45 states must be transported either partially from plants located in other states.

Wyoming produces 12 times as much crude and almost ten times as much as its entire consumption which could be supplied by a 2,000 bbl. plant. Oklahoma at present is producing 100 bbl. of oil for every gallon of gasoline consumed within the state. This, on the contrary, refines only three times as much gasoline as it makes. Similar conditions exist in other states. This being the case, the greatest problem confronting the manufacturer of the by-products of crude oil is that of transportation costs.

What and Sumas are rigged up ready to start their No. 1 Elwood, in the center of the southwest corner of section 14, block B, Hale county. This is to be one of three rotary core tests to be run by Tolbat and Sumas in this block.

WORLD SETS 30-INCH CASING IN ELWOOD TEST

The World Oil company are running 30 inch casing in their No. 1 Elwood in Hale county about a mile west of Lubbock. The exact location of the World well is 300 feet from the north and west lines of Labor 5, League 7.

GARZA TEST ABANDONED

The Pardon Oil company No. 1 Garza, located 200 feet from the southwest corner of section 12, block 4, R. & G. N. survey, Garza county, is being abandoned at dry 2750 feet.

TUNNELS TEST FLOWING BY HEADS AGAIN

C. E. Sillix et al No. 1, R. L. Miller, in section 12, Domingo survey, Domingo county, continued to hold the interest of operators in the Central-West Texas area, the discovery well which came Saturday was flowing again Monday morning and a check in the afternoon.

As a check Tuesday afternoon the well made a total of 25 barrels more than the production had rated around 8 barrels hourly, an increase over the yield of 100 barrels Sunday and 150 Monday. The cessation of the flow was attributed to savings, these being ninety-five feet of gas hole.

Numerous large deals have been reported at prices ranging from \$25 to \$100 per acre, most of the leases going to Major companies.

WINTER TALK FEATURES WINNERS COMMUNITY

WINTERS, Texas, Aug. 25.—News of farmers who are now busy with their fall plowing, cutting, harvesting, etc. and planning to have their fall crops, supply the family

designs and, in some cases, wondering if enough extra cash might be realized this year to buy a new or better automobile, have changed their subject to oil.

Since the bringing in of the McMillan well eight miles southeast of Winters, leases have jumped to as high as \$750.00 per acre. In some cases outside of the McMillan block leases have been closed at \$50.00. Thousands of people have visited the new well during the past two days. Scores of people entering the field with cash "burning their pockets" and new contracts for lease being let. The steel derricks of Kennedy-Parsons, five miles southeast of Winters is completed and from reliable reports received only short delay in completing arrangements to begin drilling. Other locations are being made to the east of the city. There is a strip of territory extending from the new producer which is eight miles southeast to the Seal well eleven miles northeast of Winters, between which points there is a series of noses, which territory covers about fifteen miles. The Seal well has been seeping oil thru the plug for about three years.

OIL ACTIVITY WITHIN HOWARD CO. INCREASES

BIG SPRING, Sept. 1.—The oil activity in Howard county has been on the increase the past week. The Marland-Texas Well No. 2, on N. W. 1-4, section 15, block 25, Howard county swabbed 88 barrels of oil in 4 1/2 hours. This well is the best well that has been brought in Howard county.

The Vitek drilling on Section 125 block 25, Howard county, passed up a showing of oil at 1220 and is drilling at 1420. At 1450 casing will be set and the well drilled to 1820.

Anderson and McGinley's No. 1 University, in section 2, block 28, Crockett county, has set a 1-4 inch casing on the line at 2,157 feet.

Australian Parson Is Real Sky Pilot

WORKING, Eng. (P)—The dream of Woking's flying parson, Rev. L. Daniels, has come true at last. It is to have an airplane with which to cover his Australian parish which is larger than the state of New York.

The Rev. Mr. Daniels is a missionary of the Colonial and Continental Church Society, with 5,000 parishioners. One of his settlements, Wiltonia, with a population of 60 is nearly 200 miles from a railroad. Some of his parish flights will be from 200 to 200 miles into the heart of the bush country.

Supporters in this country start of a subscription with which to buy him an airplane. During the war Mr. Daniels was a flyer in the Royal Air Force. Afterward he entered missionary work. When he arrived at his headquarters in the Darling river country of Australia and saw the extended territory to be covered, the minister wrote to friends, telling of his desire for an airplane to replace his worn out automobile.

A few weeks ago he returned to England. When he goes back to Australia the airplane will go with him.

Gunplay Ruffles Monte Carlo Quiet

MONTE CARLO (P)—A threat of fire, some pistol shots and a suicide recently spoiled the studiously subdued quiet of the great gambling room that has made Monte Carlo famous.

Kostich Radomil, a Yugoslav apparently angered over play on the roulette table, suddenly poured a bottle of alcohol on the green topped gaming table and made as if to touch off the inflammable liquid with a cigar-lighter. The strong-armed vigilant guards, always hovering near, stopped him but the man drew a pistol and fired wildly about. His shots went wild but he broke through the guards, jumped through the window, and died soon afterwards.

Monte Carlo has many tragedies, but seldom do they become so spectacular. It is often said that every roulette table is well watched, so that there may be as few suicides as possible to dampen the spirits of the gambling crowd or to ruffle the dignity of the place. The depressed are expected to carry their troubles across the Monaco border.

BUDDHISTS TO BUILD EARTHQUAKE MEMORIAL

TOKYO (P)—The West Hangan Buddhists have decided to erect a Gumpo in the Italian district in Tokyo where more than 20,000 persons lost their lives in the 1923 earthquake.

The new temple and the land it will occupy will cost approximately \$20,000. It will be a memorial to those who died in Japan's great earthquake and the movement will be held as a recompense for the names of the earthquake victims.

AIRPLANES ROUT LOCUSTS

MOSCOW (P)—A signal victory on the "locusts front" is reported by the central expedition in charge of fighting these pests of the post. A total area of 254,000 acres are said to have been cleared of locusts by attacking from airplanes.

HAD CAT ATTACKS

WILMINGTON, N. C.—A band of cats, all suffering from rabies, has been hunted down and killed along the waterfront here after five persons had been attacked. There were about a dozen in the group.

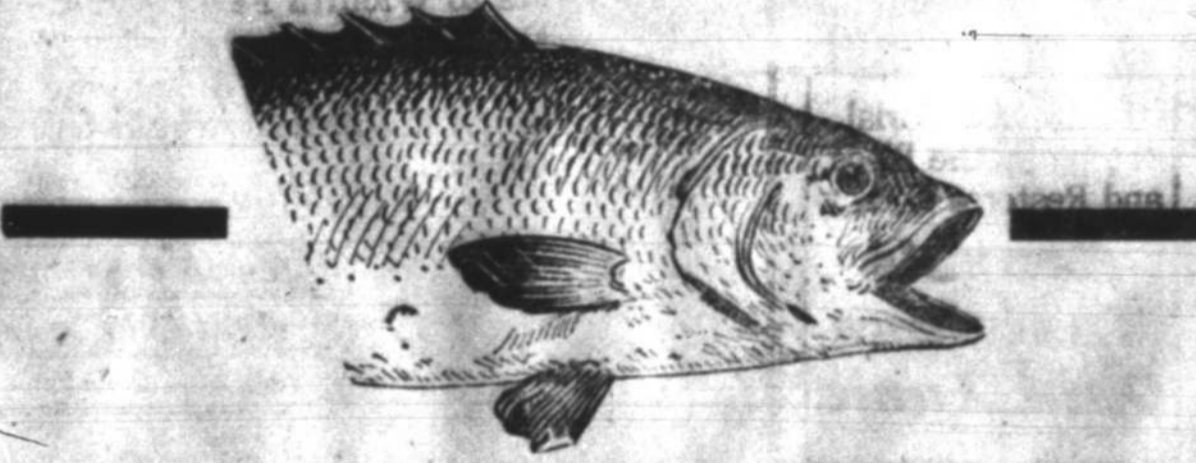
