Plans finalized for big rodeo

Plans for the 1964 combined Stampede and Southwest Championship Junior Rodeo completed Monday night at a meeting of Post Stampede directors.

Stampede directors approved a program for the senior rodeo, which includes bareback riding, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, barrel race, team roping and bull riding.

Entry fees were set at \$15 for bareback bronc, saddle bronc, barrel race, and bull riding events with \$20 for calf roping and \$25 for team roping.

Stampede directors approved plans to give a buckle to the winner of each event. There will be \$100 added in saddle bronc riding. A hand engraved gold and silver belt buckle will be given for the best total average on four head of roping stock.

All entry fees will be added back this year, the directors also decided.

The combined rodeo is scheduled for four nights of action, Aug. 5-8. Junior events were named last week by Junior Rodeo directors and announced in last week's Dispatch.

Floyd Richardson has been named in charge of the rodeo parade at 5 p. m. Wednesday, Aug. 5.

Any individual or organization desiring to enter a float in the parade is asked to contact Richardson. Three cash prizes of \$15, \$10, and \$5 will be awarded the top three floats.

The parade is being moved up an hour this year to 5 p. m. It started at 6 p. m. last year.

Stock producer for the rodeo this year will be the Sand Hills Rodeo Company of Brownfield.

Jimmy Mackey and the All-Stars will play for the rodeo dances which will follow each of the night performances.

Robbie King was named a Stampede director Monday night replacing R. E. Josev, who has become a professional rodeo performer, joined the Rodeo Cowboys Association, and is now competing in professional rodeos in the north.

There is no cause for discouragement or alarm. The situation isn't worse right now than it was summer. It simply isn't any.

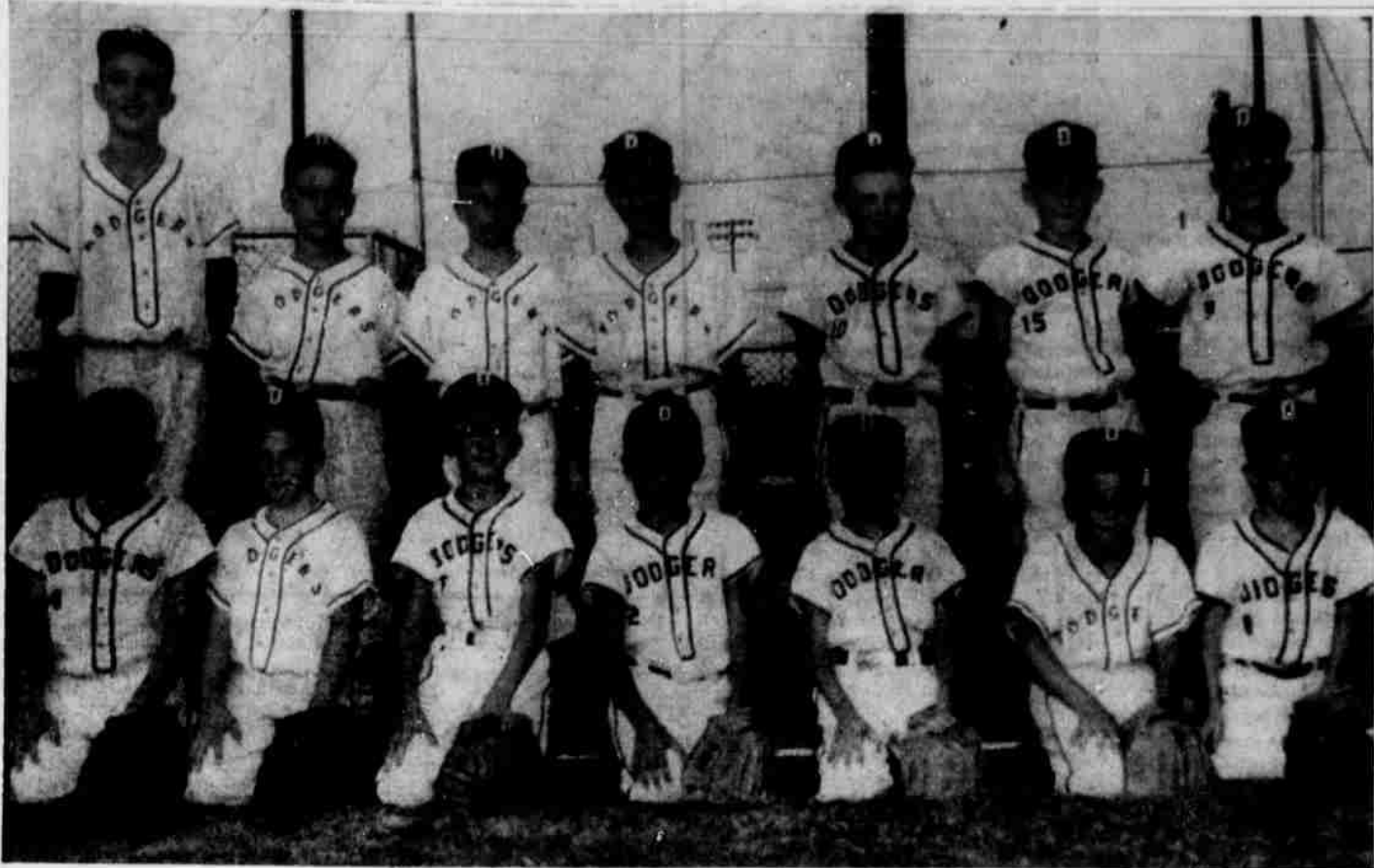

City is working on electric code and fire zone revisions

Discussions at Monday night's regular monthly meeting of the city council brought the City of Post several steps nearer the adoption of an electric code and the revision of what Mayor Harold Lucas described as the city's "antiquated fire zone ordinance."

The council heard George Bunton of the Southwestern Public Service Company discuss the general type of electric ordinance the city should adopt, and was told by Ted R. Hibbs (local manager for Southwestern, that adoption of an electric code would result in safer and more adequate wiring of homes and other structures.

The council authorized revision of the fire zone ordinance after the discussion brought out that there is very little "rhyme or reason" to the ordinance now in effect.

IN OTHER ACTION at its two and one-half hour meeting, the city council:

Accepted "with regret" the resignation of Wynelle Holland as city secretary.

Reappointed three members to two-year terms on the Post Public Housing Authority.

Voted to finance the attendance of three Post firemen at the annual state firemen's and fire marshals' school.

Voted to raise the salary of city office employee Kay Edwards from \$200 to \$225 a month.

Voted to relinquish for a settlement the city's interest in two properties here against which city taxes are delinquent and on which there are paving liens.

Authorized the purchase of five new fire hydrants.

Heard reports on police department activities for June; seal coating project; approval of the sewer system expansion project; efforts to get the highway department to change the time schedule on two

Death apparently was caused by a heart attack. Sheriff L. E. Claiborn Jr., who went to the farm camp late Monday night with Justice of the Peace D. C. Roberts, said he was told the woman had suffered from a heart condition and that she had been to Slaton earlier in the day to see a doctor.

Justice of the Peace Roberts ruled death from natural causes.

The body was brought to Hudman Funeral Home here and picked up Wednesday morning by a funeral home from Sinton.

The farm labor crew with which the woman was traveling had been here about nine days hoeing cotton.

Sprinklers turned off after Mayor's appeal

Post citizens responded within hours yesterday afternoon to the appeal of Mayor Harold Lucas to voluntarily halt all lawn watering and the watering of trees, flowers and shrubs in an all-out effort to solve Post's critical water shortage.

Uniformed Boy Scouts of Troop 316 under the direction of Scoutmaster Jack Kennedy, yesterday afternoon delivered 2,000 copies of a Post Dispatch "extra" on the water crisis door to door throughout the community.

The Dispatch volunteered to print the extra yesterday morning at an emergency meeting of the City Council on the water crisis.

THE MAYOR asked voluntary water conservation be continued indefinitely until the city announces that it can ease restrictions to permit limited watering, or until it rains.

Conceivably the water shortage can continue throughout July and August, Mayor Lucas told the council.

The "water crisis" hit the community suddenly Tuesday.

As Mayor Lucas told councilmen yesterday morning at the emergency session, with the Postex Mills, the city's biggest water user, closed last week for its annual vacation period, the city still used more water than its field of 30 city-owned for city-leased water wells could pump.

Last week, Lucas explained, with the mill down the city water system was unable to fill up its 14-foot, million-gallon main reservoir and its new, but smaller White River water system reservoir to be ready for the opening of the mill again.

THE CITY—with all 30 well available pumping 24 hours at capacity—can produce only 610 gallons of water a minute or 878,400 gallons daily.

Consumption last week with the mill resuming operation zoomed to 1,258,000 gallons.

Tuesday, Mayor Lucas issued his first appeal for voluntary water conservation over Radio Station KPOS. Consumption Tuesday dropped to 923,000 gallons, indicating a good response.

But lots of people were still watering their lawns continually.

"It's difficult to get the word to everybody," Lucas said.

That's when The Dispatch volunteered to print an extra for house to house distribution—to see the appeal for conservation reached every household.

WEDNESDAY MORNING the city had only three feet of water left in its 14-foot deep main reservoir. It had an additional 300,000 gallons—minimum fire protection reserve—in its White River reservoir. Lucas told the councilmen this 300,000 gallons was going to be held for fire protection.

He said that the peak water usage period daily is between 6 and 9 p. m. when the lawn watering hits its peak.

Monday night, the mayor said, the city's water consumption chart showed consumption hit over 1,500 gallons per minute and "ran off the chart."

Tuesday night, the peak water consumption was 1,350 gallons per minute as 7:45 p. m. This compares with 1,258,000 gallons.

Civil Rights implementation ahead

The Civil Rights bill is now the law of the land.

This has been inevitable for a long time. Of course, it is being received with mixed feelings. There are those who contend it takes away the rights of the majority to give rights to the minority.

Here we have a conflict of law—the law of private property against the law of civil liberties. There will be long legal fights through the courts, and very probably both modifications and adjustments. There will be resistance in some areas, too. That also is inevitable.

Americans do not have the feeling for history as do Europeans. But the major problem here is one of history. For example, Texas has two racial minorities—the Negro and the Latin American. The lot of the Latins has not been as difficult as that of the Negro because the Latin American has always had a place in Texas history. The racial barriers have not been erected as high—school segregation being a prime example, although they have existed.

The implementation of the new Civil Rights law is what comes next. This will come at the community levels throughout the land. It will call for understanding on all sides.

Post integrated its schools without incident. It was a leader as a community for this area. Almost all area schools are now integrated. In others the barriers will fall next year.

Civil rights is deep today upon this nation's conscience.

The advance of the Negro in the modern American world has been made possible through his own leadership with a real helping hand from almost all Americans. This Negro leadership, in great part, has been educated and dedicated. It has had to prove itself to its own people

This 'bill' is paid in full!

In the main, it has been overlooked by us and most everyone else, but the 20th anniversary of the GI Bill or Rights was just a few days ago, and it was "time to celebrate," whether any of us did or not.

Officially entitled the "Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944," but known around the world as the "GI Bill of Rights," it was signed 20 years ago by the President of the United States, who thereby enacted into law the most colossal program of consideration and assistance for a nation's defenders ever undertaken since the beginning of recorded history.

Proposed by the American Legion, drafted by the Legion and fought through Congress by the Legion, its inspiration came from the memorable address of National Commander Warren Atherton on Nov. 29, 1943, when he presented to Congress a report on the "Forgotten Battalion"—the sick, the maimed, the destitute, returning from the wars with no recourse but alms!

But the GI Bill went beyond relief measures—adequate hospitalization, prompt settlement of disability claims, vocational and on-the-job training

first—and then to all other Americans.

Ahead must lie the striving for Negroes at every level to follow that leadership. Acceptance in America must come through the individual efforts to measure up to the American way of life. The goals are high. The efforts must be as great. It won't be easy and it won't come to pass overnight.

Immigrants from other lands have successfully accomplished it through hard work and personal sacrifice of one generation for another yet to come. The plight of the American Indians today is the opposite example. Those who did not leave the reservations to work, sacrifice and prove themselves in the American communities across the land have found themselves left behind.

The problem is the same now for the Negroes—and in the Southwest for our Latin Americans too. It can't all be done by legislation and dedicated leadership.

Many Negroes and Latins already have climbed in American life to an economic plane much higher than that of most of their respective races. They accomplished it through personal efforts.

In the implementation period ahead, this is the area in which the greatest striving must be made—by the Negroes and the Latins themselves. They will find help—here and elsewhere—if they seek it. But the choice of economic status in America is always up to the individual himself.

In the troubled area of civil rights one great American ideal shines through. The gains that have come have been brought about in the American way—through due process of law and through the conscience of the majority.

Where else in the world could it have happened this way. As Harry Golden, the Southern Jewish journalist, would answer, and we concur—"only in America."—JC

What are the mating habits in American culture, professor?

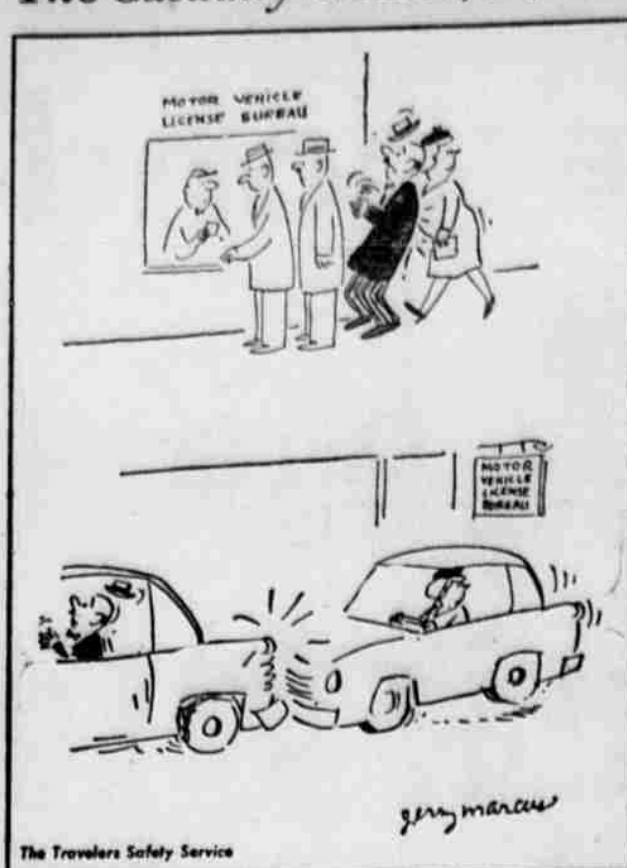

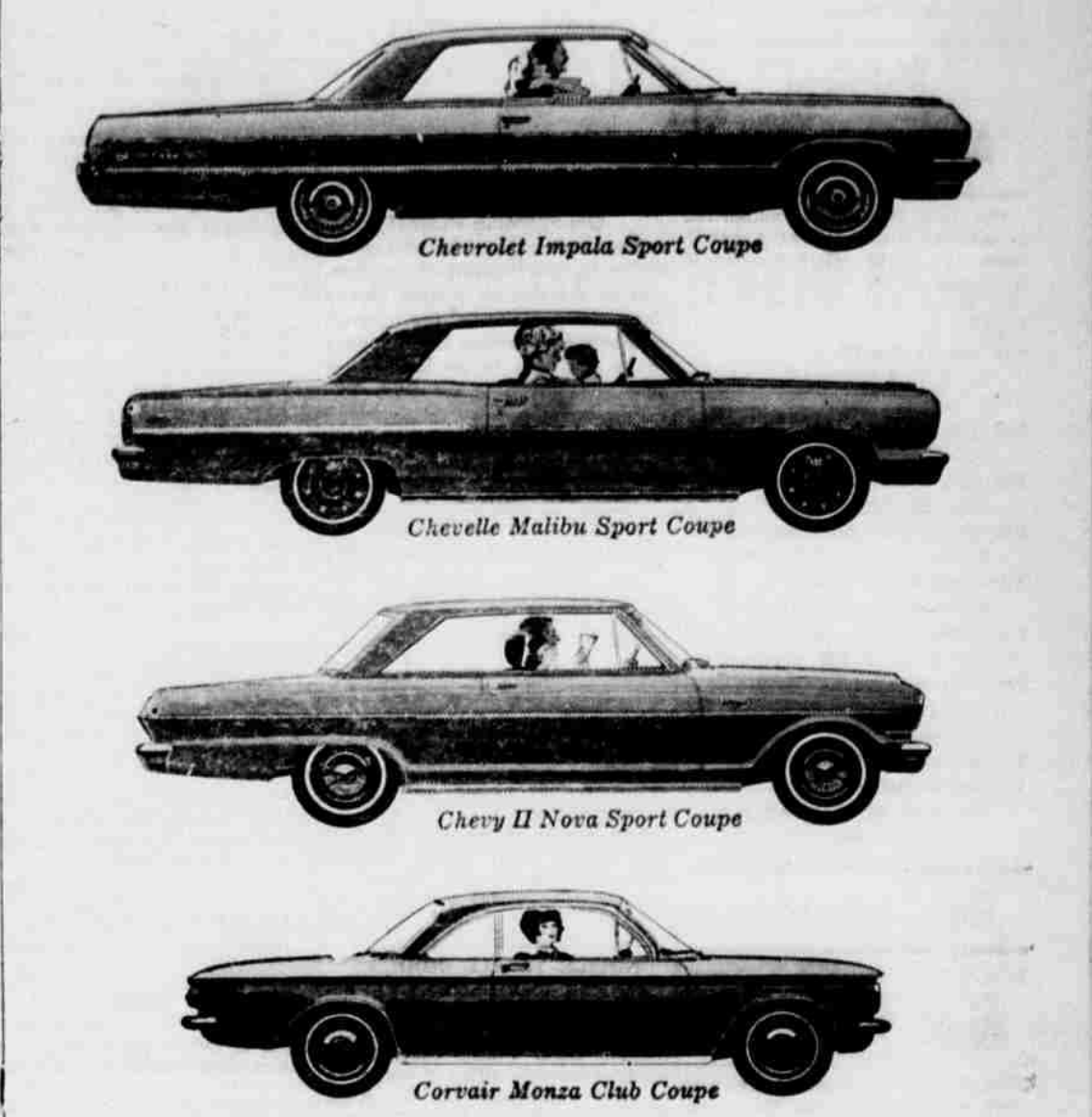

es with 610 gallons per minute the city can pump into the water system.

LOUIE BURKES, head of the Postex Cotton Mills operation here, attended the special council meeting yesterday morning and volunteered to cut back on the mills' water usage which amounts to over 300,000 gallons daily.

Mayor Lucas and other councilmen told Burkess that while they appreciated his offer, they felt that voluntary water conservation by citizens in turning off lawn watering can solve the problem without any mill curtailment at present.

Burkes replied that if it were necessary just to give him a telephone call and the mill would curtail some of its usage operations.

It was pointed out at the emergency council meeting that the mills need a minimum water pressure of 30 pounds to operate. The pressure yesterday was hovering at 35 pounds and Monday night during the peak watering period had actually fallen to 25 pounds.

THE CITY experienced a similar water crisis last July, which brought about a similar Post Dispatch water "extra" on Monday, July 22.

The people of Post responded quickly that time too, and with some late summer rains the city got through the peak water season although many lawns "burned up" in the process.

Last year's water crisis brought a lot of water hauling here to keep lawns alive. Whether that will come again this summer probably will depend upon the weather.

THE COUNCIL at its meeting yesterday morning discussed briefly whether or not to try to develop more new water wells for the duration of the summer.

Mayor Lucas said that an outlay of some \$10,000 would be required for pipe as the wells would have to be a considerable distance from the present ones to be effective. A new well would add at best about 40 gallons per minute to the city's supply rate, he said.

This summer the city has been attempting to hold its water expansion costs down as much as possible with the advent of White River water now awaiting only rains.

The White River water supply system is all ready to go mechanically, but only two half-inch rains have fallen so far this year in the big White River watershed. Larger June rains missed the watershed entirely.

Right now, water in the White River lake is only 18 to 20 feet deep at the dam and is not high enough to reach the intake pipe for the filtration plant.

"But we had five or six more wells in operation then which have since gone dry," Warren said.

22 youngsters in non-English class

Twenty-two students are enrolled in the Post Public Schools' non-English speaking program for pre-first graders of Latin American descent, according to Supt. Barry B. Thompson.

Miss Estela Delgado, first grade teacher and a recent graduate of Sul Ross State College, is introducing the children to the English language. She is teaching English as a foreign language and is placing emphasis on primary English vocabulary.

"The students have responded very well and will be ready for entry into the first grade this fall," Supt. Thompson said.

Miss Delgado is a native of Del Rio and created many of the techniques she is using with the children in her class. The new teacher has been active in Girl Scout and church work.

The school began June 8 and will end July 31.

Judge Truitt Smith revoked the prison sentence probation of Sylvester Collazo in Garza County district court here yesterday afternoon and sentenced Cabbie Alfred Beckner to three years in the penitentiary when he pleaded guilty to forgery.

Collazo received a two-year prison sentence when his probation was revoked on a Dec. 20, 1962, indictment of burglary with intent to commit theft. Evidence was introduced at the hearing involving Collazo of the break-in of the Post elementary school Dec. 22, 1963.

Beckner was recently extradited from Illinois and returned here by Sheriff Fay Claborn on an indictment of forgery in the passing of a \$54.02 grain company check Dec. 25, 1961.

He pleaded guilty to the charge here yesterday.

ed that a code be adopted combining "the best" sections of electric codes now in effect at Amarillo, Plainview and Lubbock. All electric codes, he said, are based on the National Electric Code. "The simpler you can keep yours, the better," Bunton told the council.

He said not all towns the size of Post have electric codes, but that his company encourages their adoption because "It makes our work easier."

The council's discussion on the revision of the fire zone ordinance indicated that the major change will be realignment of the fire zone boundaries. The proposed revision is scheduled for submission at the council's August meeting.

THE CITY secretary, who is in her sixth year as a city employee, informed the council of her resignation by letter, in which she said that she is resigning to devote her time to being a homemaker. The resignation is to become effective Aug. 1.

Reappointed to two-year terms on the Post Public Housing Authority were Powell Shytle, Giles McCrory and Frank Blanton. The reappointments were made by the council on the recommendation of Luther Harner, executive director of the PHA.

The three firemen who will attend the one-week school at Texas A&M University are Jimmy Holleman, Robert Cato and Richard Dudley. The council voted to pay their expenses at the school and their salaries for the week they are away.

The council voted to raise the salary of Kay Edwards on the recommendation of Mayor Lucas. She has been with the city a year and a half and in addition to her work as a city employee she is tax clerk here for the White River Municipal Water District, the mayor explained.

THE PROPERTY on which the council voted to relinquish the city's interest has several hundred dollars against it in paying liens and delinquent taxes, but the city will receive payment for most of this amount by a Lubbock loan firm. The council agreed it seemed the best route to follow after the mayor explained that one of the properties is a homestead and is in an estate.

The five new fire hydrants the council voted to purchase can be bought from \$145 to \$150 each, "depending on the one we decide to buy," City Supt. Eddie Warren told the council. He explained that the city has found it a good practice to keep from three to four hydrants in stock in case of damage to one or more of those now in use. "Right now our fire hydrant reserve is down to one," he said.

COTTON INSECT SITUATION

The first confirmed case of weevils above the Caprock was reported July 1. Several punctured cotton squares were found in a field just over the Crosby County line in Dickens County. The farm is located on top of the Caprock about 14 miles east of Crosbyton.

At this time last year, weevils had been picked up in several different areas on the Plains. Right now, weevil infestations are lighter below the Caprock than at the same time last year. Control measures should begin when the punctured square count reaches 10-15 per cent below the Caprock. Weevil infestations above the Caprock should be controlled promptly — regardless of size.

IRRIGATION AVAILABLE

"Economics of Low-Capacity Irrigation Wells" is the title of a new Texas A&M University publication that applies strictly to limited irrigation water areas of the High Plains. The 27 farms from which data was collected are located in Lynn and Garza counties, but the area of applicability includes these counties as well as Lubbock, Hockley, Cochran, Bailey, Lamb, and Hale.

According to agricultural economists Frank Hughes and A. C. Mazze, co-authors, low-capacity wells in the High Plains irrigate approximately 200,000 acres. "Continued adjustment to declining water levels in some parts of the High Plains suggests a substantial increase in the use of low-capacity wells can be expected, says the economists.

Total irrigation and related specified costs ranged from \$65 to \$74 per cotton allotted acre in 1962, depending on well depth. Practically all cotton in the area where the survey has application was planted in a skip-row pattern — mostly "2 in - 1 out."

Farmers, ranchers urged to use each acre of land within its capability

Today, perhaps more than ever before, every farm and ranch operator realizes the importance of planning wisely in order to make each enterprise pay.

We have already proven the fact that we can produce more on less acres than ever before. This was accomplished by proper planning.

We indeed have made great strides in production, but at what expense, is the big question. Have we done this by taking all from the land and putting nothing back?

"The Man With a Plan" is a recent motto of the successful farmer and rancher. This plan is very basic and simple and has been stressed throughout our nation by and through Soil Conservation dis-

tricts. These districts were created for the sole purpose of helping farmers and ranchers apply money-making soil conservation practices on their land. It works something like the basic concept: using each acre of land by trying to make it produce something which it is capable of producing. An example of this might be trying to raise cotton on steep hill with shallow soils. Many acres which are being farmed today should never have been broken out to cropland.

The Soil Conservation Service, working through the local Garza County Soil Conservation District, has technicians to help you by furnishing you the information so you can plan each of your acres within its capability.

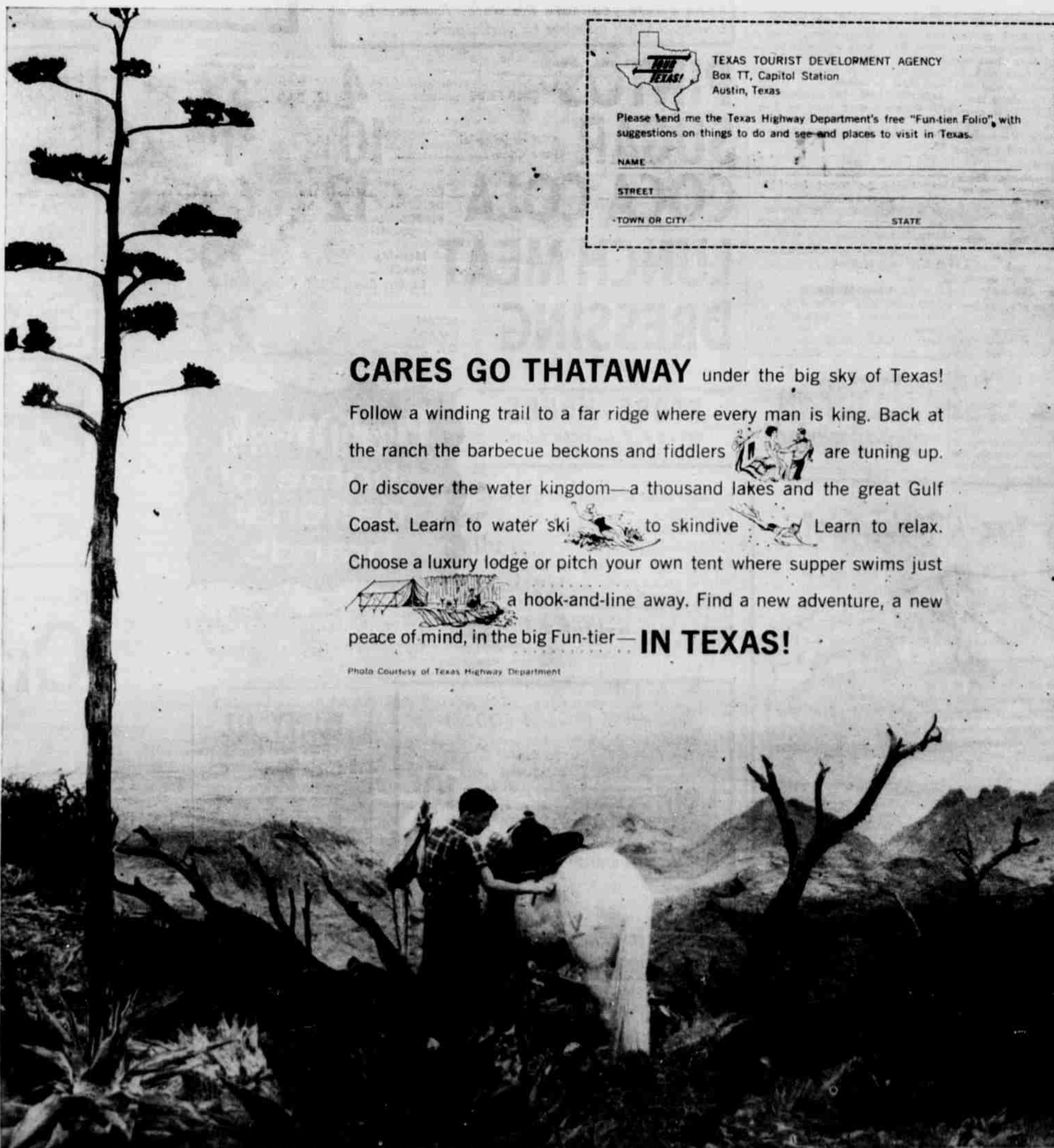

"PKU FOR SHORT"

AUSTIN — Have you ever heard of phenylketonuria?

It's not nearly as well known as, say, mumps — a disease that almost everyone will have at one time or another. Phenylketonuria isn't catching, and only about one in 8,000 to 9,000 is born with it.

What is this disease with the long name? It is an inborn metabolic error, called PKU for short. It occurs because of the body's inability to metabolize a substance called phenylalanine into tyrosine for the body to utilize.

Instead, the phenylalanine floods the body. Large amounts are excreted in the urine — providing a simple way to detect the disease. Still other large amounts are sent to the brain, causing mental retardation.

Skin pigmentation and other growth processes may be interfered with in a phenylketonuric.

A rare combination of genes from ordinarily unsuspecting parents results in a phenylketonuric child. Chances are that not every child of such parents will be affected, but about one out of four will have PKU and two out of four will be carriers.

The gratifying picture today is that PKU can be detected early by simple urine and/or blood tests. And if dietary regulation and control is begun early enough, the effects of the disease — mental re-

tardation for example — can be avoided to a large extent.

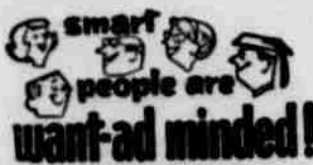
Your local health department and the Texas State Department of Health are working with physicians and hospital staffs across Texas to make PKU tests available in the hospitals where affected babies might be born. To be effective, the test must be administered several days after birth. The metabolic error does not show itself until the infant has been on protein (milk) long enough for excesses to show up.

The Texas State Department of Health recommends that all newborn babies be tested for PKU. True, chances are only one in 8,000 to 9,000 that the infant will have that particular inborn metabolic error. But why take that chance...

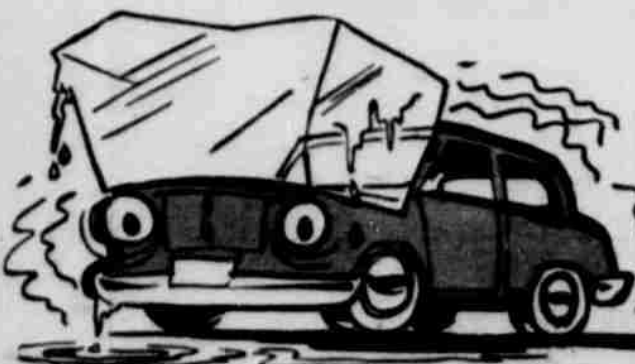
