

His lack of mettle nets Subic no medal

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army is considering possible "administrative actions" against a sergeant denied a medal awarded to 20 of his military colleagues also held hostage in Iran.

While the other 20 Army, Marine, Navy and Air Force men held hostage were named Monday to receive the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Army said Staff Sgt. Joseph Subic Jr. "did not meet the criteria" for the award.

"Suffice it to say that there were certain periods of time during the 444 days of captivity when Sgt. Subic did not behave under stress the way noncommissioned officers are expected to act," the Army said.

The Army refused to detail its reasons for denying a medal to Subic, 24, of Redford Township, Mich., who already holds an Army Commendation Medal awarded previously in his seven-year military career.

While "there are no judicial actions being taken against Sgt. Subic," several administrative actions are being taken, the Army said, refusing to be more specific.

Without saying they necessarily apply to Subic, Army officials said possible administrative actions could include barring re-enlistment, administrative discharge, counseling and revocation of security clearance.

The Defense Meritorious Service medals followed recommendations by special service panels which reviewed the conduct of the 21 military men among the 52 American released in January.

One of them, Army Sgt. 1st Class Donald R. Hohman, a medic from Sacramento, Calif., also was named Monday to receive the Soldier's Medal for saving the life of an ill comrade at the risk of his own.

The final decision in the Subic case was made by Army Secretary John Marsh and by Gen. Edward C. Meyer, Army chief of staff. Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger approved all award actions and Army officials said the White House was checked before the announcement was made.

While in captivity, Subic appeared in a film — which U.S. television networks declined to air — criticizing the U.S. role in

Iran and saying that spies for the CIA were among the hostages.

Subic has said that he never saw the film and believes it probably was doctored. He said he was beaten and threatened by his captors, but told them nothing they did not already know.

Subic, now assigned to the Army Intelligence and Security Command in northern Virginia as an administrative specialist, "won't talk to anybody" in the media, the Army said Monday.

But in a hometown Memorial Day parade, Subic said he hoped his experience would help him become a credible spokesman for those demanding that servicemen missing in action in Southeast Asia be accounted for.

"I think I'm man enough not to go out putting if I don't receive one," he was quoted as saying of the medals.

Subic's lawyer, Owen Cummings, said Monday in Detroit that his client has asked for an early discharge and expects to receive it about July 1.

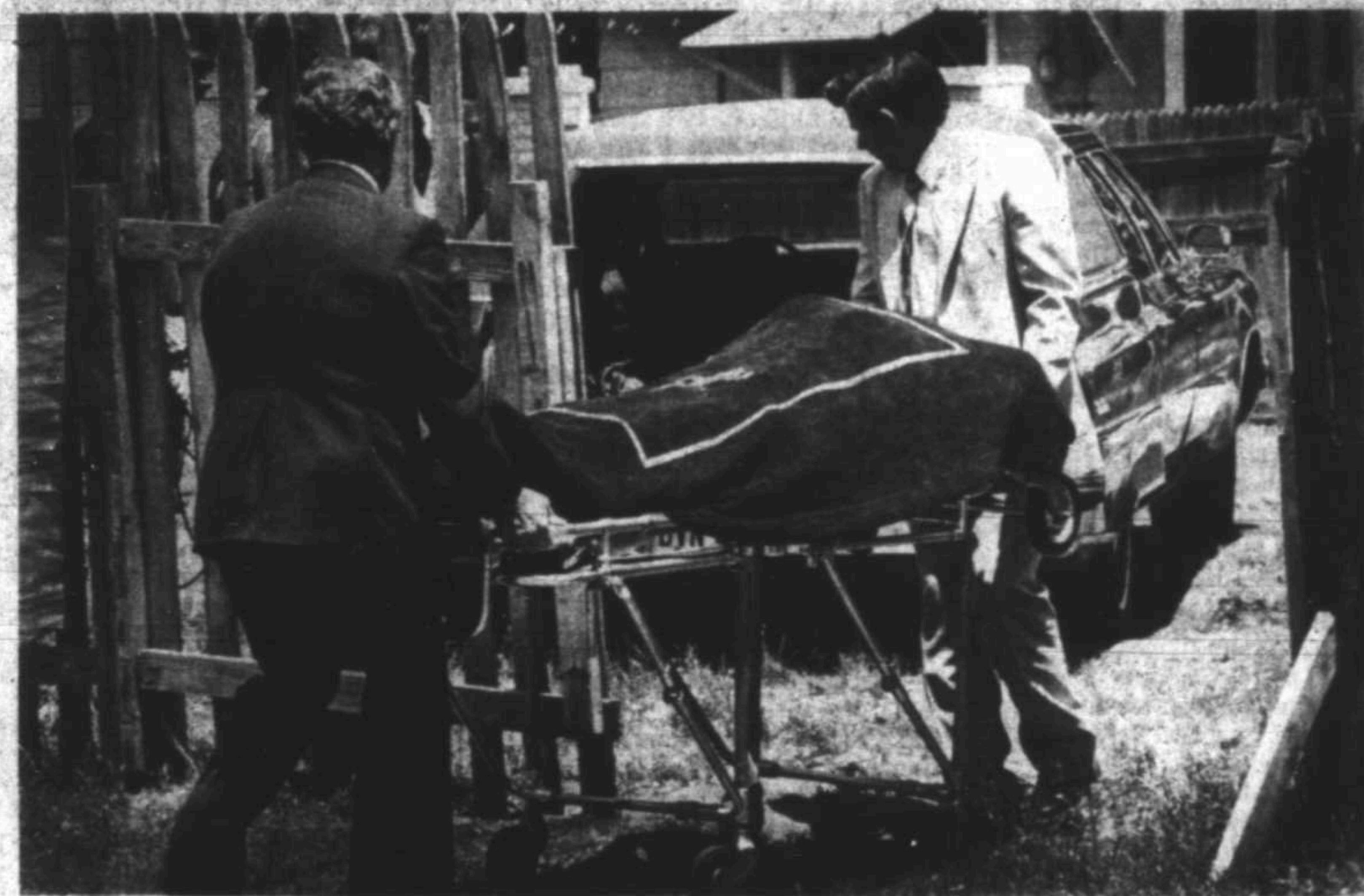

No developments seen in homicides

Police today reported no new developments in a double homicide that occurred in a rundown house at 507 Spraberry Drive sometime Sunday night or early Monday morning.

Officers were called to the scene about 1 p.m. Monday by a neighbor, Larry Murphey of 500 Spraberry, who told police: "There's two people in there with their throats cut, it looks like."

According to detectives, police had to enter the dilapidated wood frame house through a rear door because the front door had been secured so it couldn't be opened.

Inside, the bodies of 26-year-old Charles Cole and 18-year-old Tracy Endres were found in an east bedroom, fully clothed. Cole had been shot under the

right eye. The Endres woman had been shot in the top of the head and was found clutching her hair with both hands. Police speculate they had been dead 12 to 14 hours.

The murder weapon, either a .38 or .357 caliber pistol, had not been recovered as of this morning, and there was no sign of a struggle, according to police. The couple was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Robert Pine. Their bodies were taken to Newnie W. Ellis Funeral Home, where services are pending.

A 1970s model Ford parked in the driveway bore a bumper sticker that read: "When Bongs Are Outlawed, Only Outlaws Will Have Bongs." Bongs are pipe-like devices used to smoke marijuana.

According to law enforcement sources, portions of the neighborhood are suspected outlets for drug trafficking in Midland.

Reagan aides look to Rep. Rostenkowski

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration, chastised as "bubbling, effervescent with smugness" over its insistence on a multiyear, across-the-board tax cut, is trying to convince a key Democrat to break with the leadership and sponsor a bipartisan measure.

President Reagan and Democratic leaders failed Monday to reach a consensus on a tax-cut bill, but Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, chairman of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, said he would try to influence the members of his committee to support a compromise. He indicated, however, that he still would want to see more concessions on Reagan's side.

Administration officials, who asked not to be identified, told The Associated Press that Reagan's strategists have focused their attention on Rostenkowski as a potential leader in a move to draft a consensus tax bill, despite the objections of House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr.

Reagan, meanwhile, was meeting today with key Republicans to assess the prospects for the pared-down tax plan that he has embraced.

After the Oval Office bargaining session with Reagan on Monday, O'Neill said he found the president's position was set "pretty well in cement" and there seemed little purpose in further talks. The Massachusetts Democrat said he found the president and his men "bubbling, effervescent with smugness."

He charged that the president's plan, despite

modifications adopted to make it more palatable, was a "windfall to the rich" and promised to produce a Democratic alternative that would be guided toward those earning between \$20,000 and \$50,000 a year.

But Rostenkowski told reporters, "I didn't recognize any door closing."

One administration aide said privately that there has been an intensive effort in the past two weeks to convince Rostenkowski to break with the party leadership and develop his own compromise.

Treasury Secretary Donald T. Regan has met with the Illinois Democrat at least three times recently, and the source said the two had sought to identify elements of a tax cut that Rostenkowski considers essential and Reagan could accept.

Rostenkowski, a product of the Democratic political machine in Chicago, was noticeably more conciliatory than O'Neill in his public remarks Monday, but he gave no indication he was about to break with the party leadership.

House Majority Leader Jim Wright, D-Texas, who said he had offered his own three-year tax cut plan to "meet the president exactly halfway," said he still saw a remote chance for compromise.

Wright said two White House aides, whom he declined to identify, approached him and Rostenkowski at the conclusion of the meeting and gave the impression there was a possibility the administration "could scale down" its across-the-board personal tax cut.

Legislative session ends, but the work isn't over

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Gov. Bill Clements and the 67th Legislature said goodbye Monday night but only "for a little bit" because the lawmakers left plenty of unfinished business behind them in the Capitol.

The Legislature reached its mandatory midnight adjournment with conference committees hopelessly deadlocked over some of the regular session's most pressing business.

"I'll say goodbye for a little bit," Clements said during a smiling, handshaking visit to the House just before midnight. "...I regret we'll have to be back soon, but there is

unfinished business that must be attended to."

Clements is expected to call a special session this summer, probably — as one representative put it — "after the ink dries on his vetoes," which he has 20 days to sign.

Major tasks left hanging in House-Senate conference committees when the lawmakers adjourned included:

— Rearranging congressional districts, including Texas' three new ones, to reflect the population shifts shown by the 1980 census.

— Continuing state regulation of physicians by the Board of Medical

Examiners, which the Sunset process will put out of business by the end of this year if the Legislature does not act.

— Finding a guaranteed source of construction, repair, equipment and library money for state colleges outside the University of Texas and Texas A&M systems, and spreading the wealth of the UT and A&M systems to all their campuses.

— Correcting flaws found in the Property Tax Code, or "Peveto Bill," since it was passed in 1979.

In addition, Speaker Bill Clayton was mightily disappointed that his

plan to use state treasury surpluses to finance water projects died in the Senate. He said Clements had promised to put it on the special session agenda.

"I assure you if we have a called session of the Legislature, you will see it at the top of the list of his call," Clayton told reporters.

Sen. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, bottled up the water plan constitutional amendment during two critical days, and it failed to make Monday's final calendar.

Doggett and other opponents say the money could be used for better

things, and the surplus is the only thing that has kept Texas from having new taxes for a decade.

A party atmosphere filled the Capitol as legislators wound down the 140-day session.

In the House, representatives donned red and white caps saying "sine die," Latin for "without another day," the official term for final adjournment. Clayton was praised as "the best speaker we ever had" and was given a hunting rifle and a giant gavel to mark the close of his last regular session. He'll still be in

charge, though, when the special session starts.

Reps. Froy Salinas, D-Lubbock, and John Sharp, D-Placedo, offered a mock resolution seeking permission to sue for loss of hearing caused by Clayton's powerful gavel blows, which they likened to "the report of a 12-gauge shotgun."

The legislative black caucus presented the G.J. Sutton Leadership Award, in memory of the group's late chairman, to conservative white Rep. Bob McFarland, R-Arlington.

But, for the most part, the final day was filled with heavy legislating.

Shelling, sniping continue in Beirut area

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Israeli jets raided Palestinian strongholds in southern Lebanon today, and Lebanon's state radio said 15 people were killed or wounded. Artillery batteries also shelled guerrilla rocket-launching sites near the Palestinian bases.

The state radio report did not specify how many had been killed.

Meanwhile, sniping continued across the dividing line separating Christian and Moslem Beirut. In Zahle, some 1,500 artillery and rocket rounds exploded overnight, killing seven people and wounding 13, the Christian Voice of Lebanon radio said.

Yasser Arafat's Palestine Liberation Organization, in its first an-

nouncement of the Israeli air attack, said there were no casualties in the 15-minute air raid, the second against the guerrillas in less than a week. Israel said its jets returned safely to base.

The PLO said naval and inland guerrilla bases were bombed and rocketed in the Abul Aswad area north of Tyre. Provincial Lebanese authorities and Israel's military command said the bases belonged to Al Fatah, Arafat's mainline guerrilla group.

The PLO said the bases were located on the Mediterranean shore west of Lebanon's coastal highway and in an orchard some 500 yards inland to the east of the international highway.

The air raid was followed by an artillery shelling of guerrilla rocket-launching bases in the Crusader-built Beaufort Castle, about 16 miles inland from Abul Aswad, the PLO reported.

It said Israeli border gunners teamed with Israeli-backed Christian militiamen in the "Free Lebanon" border enclave in pounding Beaufort Castle and adjacent hilltop positions from which guerrillas often fire Soviet-made Katyusha rockets into northern Israel.

Israeli jets last struck at the guerrillas in Lebanon Thursday, hitting bases 12-15 miles south of Beirut and killing 33 people, including four Libyan advisers. Israel said the raid Thursday aimed mainly at knocking

out Libyan-manned anti-aircraft missile sites south of Beirut.

Syria, which polices Lebanon's 54-month-old cease-fire armistice between Palestinians and Moslems, moved surface-to-air missiles into eastern Lebanon April 29 after Israeli jets downed a Syrian helicopter gunships attack Zahle, the Christian stronghold 30 miles east of Beirut.

Israel has demanded the Syrian missiles be removed, but Syria refuses. U.S. presidential envoy Philip C. Habib is expected to return to the Mideast this week to resume the shuttle diplomacy he suspended Thursday after three weeks of apparently fruitless mediation.

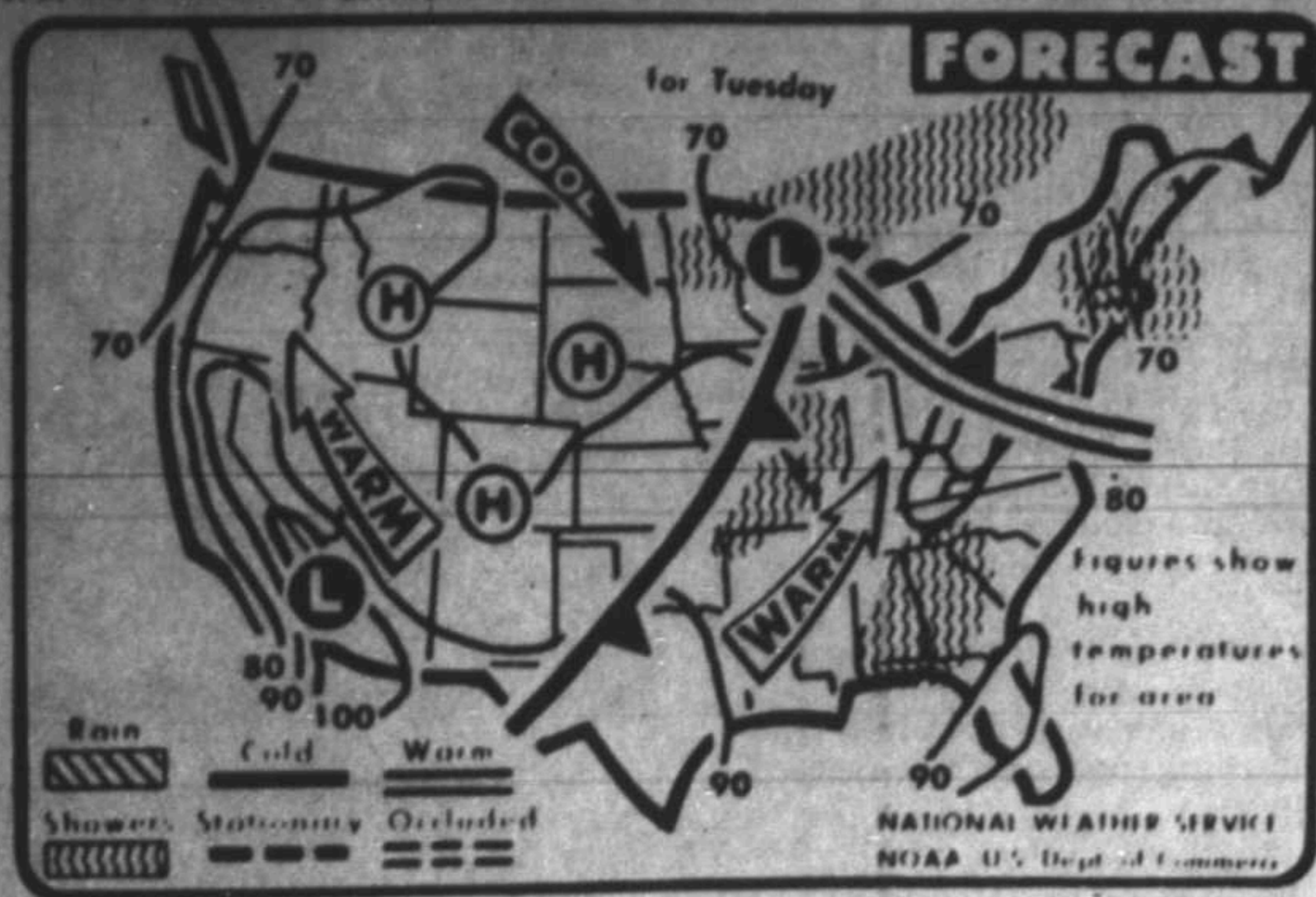

College funding bill defeated

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Senators accused House members of sneaking one past them in 1979, and that pretty much set the tone for Monday's failed negotiations on college construction funding.

When Speaker Bill Clayton told the House late Monday night that conference committee talks were "down the drain," he wasn't kidding. It was total stalemate.

But the issue isn't dead. Gov. Bill Clements has indicated he will submit it a special legislative session.

The problem is there is no guaranteed source of money for construction, building repairs, equipment and library books at schools outside the University of Texas and Texas A&M systems and for some schools within them.

Legislators wiped out the 10-cent property tax dedicated to the schools when they voted in 1979 to assess it on 0.0001 percent of the value of real estate.

But even before then, there was a problem. The property tax, assessed against low county values, was not raising enough money, and the smaller colleges jealously eyed the Permanent University Fund, reserved to the UT and A&M main campuses and some satellites.

Last session, the issue foundered on the rock of predominantly black Prairie View A&M, which the House wanted to guarantee a cut of the PUF. This time, at least on the surface, the issue was the source of money for the non-PUF schools.

The proposed constitutional amendment also would have placed all UT and A&M schools within the PUF.

House members voted this year to give Prairie View one-eighth of the PUF.

A&M opposed any guarantees for Prairie View, but the last argument the conference committee had was over how to fund a guaranteed endowment for non-PUF colleges.

Sen. Pete Snelson, D-Midland, proposed a three-cent state property tax, levied against full market value of real estate—a much steeper tax than the old 10-cent tax levied on county valuations.

Rep. Bob McFarland, R-Arlington, said Gov. Bill Clements felt the Legislature had made a commitment to the people to wipe out the state ad valorem tax and would oppose reimposing it.

Texas redistricting efforts defeated for now

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — In the end, Texas, a strange-shaped giant of a state with diverse political interests, resisted the required efforts to draw new congressional boundaries.

Months of computer-backed efforts by scores of staffers and legislators ended in defeat late Monday, two hours before the 1981 Legislature adjourned.

"We didn't do it," said Jack Ogg, chairman of the Senate delegation to a conference committee. "I'm sorry. We didn't get the job done."

It will be a short break for the lawmakers, however. Gov. Bill Clements said congressional redistricting would be a priority item for a special session.

The House and Senate devised separate plans for congressional boundaries for the 1980s. A 10-member conference committee made no progress during four days of negotiating the differences.

Both plans added the three new districts Texas has earned through its growth. The new congressmen would be from the mid-cities area between Dallas and Fort Worth, the Houston suburbs and South Texas.

On Monday the committee voted down two revised plans. Each contained the major stumbling blocks that loomed for weeks. The senators wanted to split a black-populated area of Dallas between the districts now represented by Democrats Jim Mattox and Martin Frost.

The House plan would have set up one district to include most of the blacks, guaranteeing a black congressman from Dallas and making it tough for Mattox to get re-elected.

Water measure halted

AUSTIN—Texas voters will not get an opportunity to vote on House Speaker Bill Clayton's proposed constitutional amendment to create a \$500 million water trust fund because that measure was struck down Monday in the Senate on a procedural ruling.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby ruled in favor of a point of order raised by Dallas Sen. Oscar Mauzy that stopped senators from debating Clayton's HJR 33, thereby killing the measure for this legislative session.

HJR 33, if approved by the voters, would have created a water trust fund using surplus state revenues. The fund would have been used to guarantee bonds issued by local governments for construction of water treatment, wastewater, flood control and other projects.

The measure passed the House a few weeks ago, but had been bogged down in the Senate Finance Committee. That committee was scheduled to hear the bill last week but Austin Sen. Lloy Dogett "tagged" the measure, a parliamentary procedure by which any senator can request 48-hour, written notice of a hearing on a bill.

Texarkana Sen. Ed Howard, the Senate sponsor of the measure, attempted to bring up HJR 33 on the Senate floor Monday afternoon, but Mauzy blocked consideration of the proposed constitutional amendment with provisions of a Senate resolution

requiring that a bill be placed on the Senate intent calendar by at least 4 p.m. of the day before it is heard on the floor. HJR 33 was passed out of the Finance Committee after 4 p.m. Sunday and did not appear on the intent calendar.

Howard could have suspended that rule by unanimous consent of the Senate, but Mauzy and Port Arthur Sen. Carl Parker objected to that action.

Clayton later said he was disappointed that the measure did not pass,

but added he is confident Gov. Bill Clements will include the issue in any call for a special session.

"I predict it will surface again," Clayton said. "It got caught in a rules maneuver — that's what rules are for."

Howard also expressed his disappointment over the failure of the proposed constitutional amendment. "I feel that it is terribly unfortunate for the citizens of the State of Texas that we could not act on this legislation this session," he said.

Action taken on Snelson bills

AUSTIN — The Senate Monday took final action on two bills by Midland Sen. Pete Snelson and sent them to the governor for his approval.

The Senate voted to concur with House amendments to Snelson's Senate Bill 606, which sets up licensing requirements for counselors.

The House amendments deleted provisions to provide travel expenses for members of the licensing board.

The Senate also approved a House-Senate

conference committee report on S.B. 180, which sets funding levels for certain public education finance components in the appropriations bill.

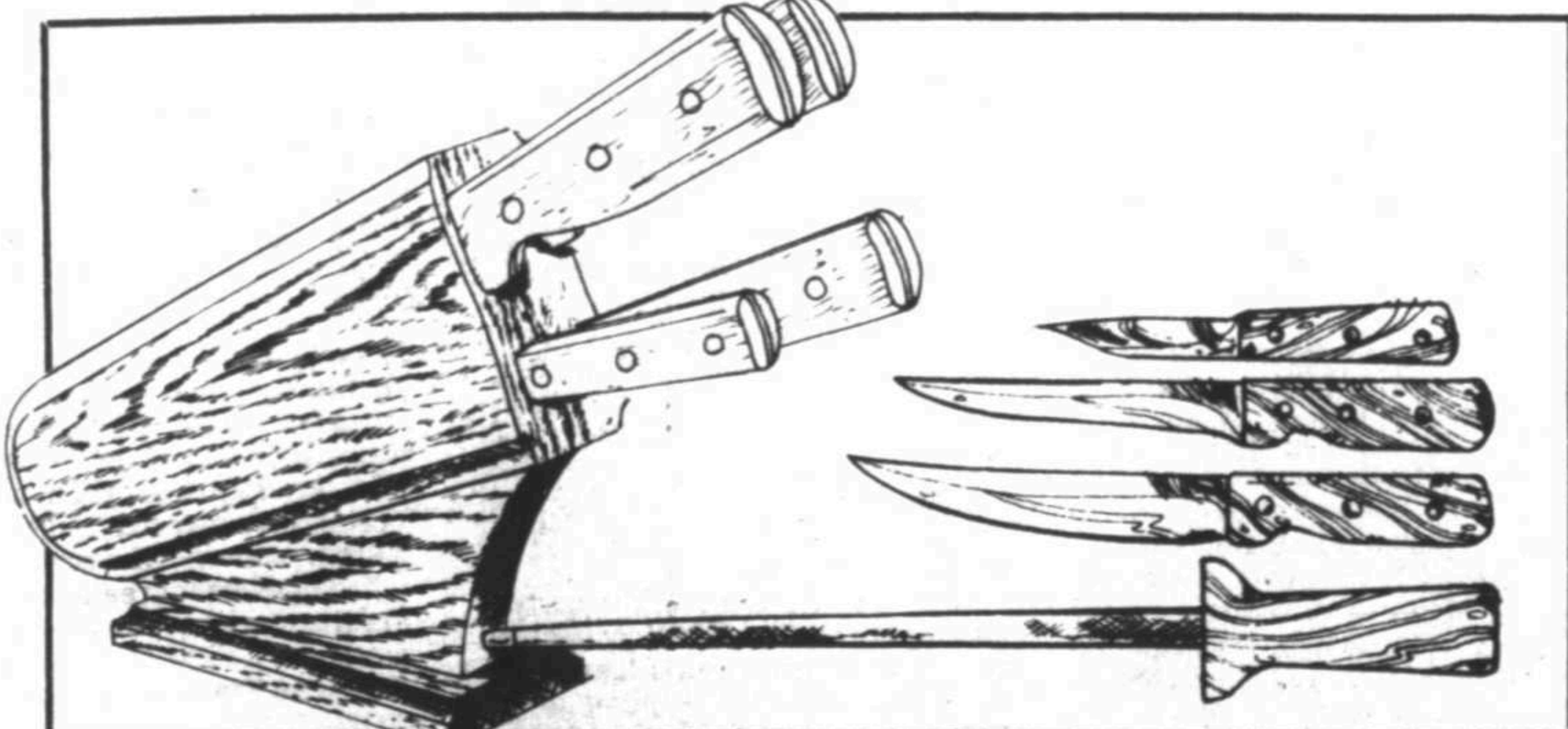

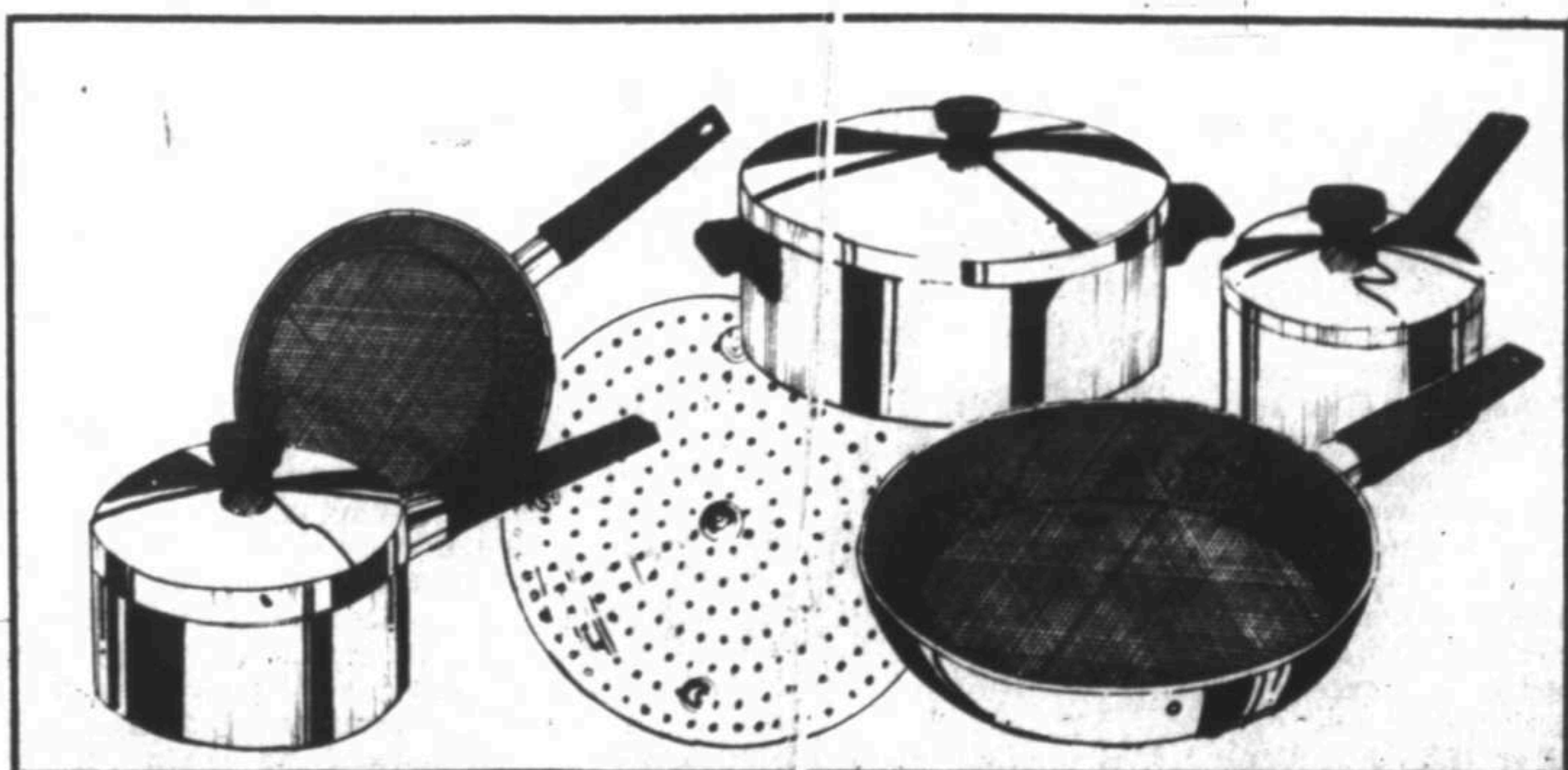

'BUT I LIKE THE WAY HE BANKRUPTED IT'

Putting 'bite' into justice would help control crime

Suppose a man walked up to another man and kicked him in the groin and suppose the victim of this aggression mused, "Gee, I wish you hadn't done that, but maybe you have a reason."

And then a by-stander hurriedly added, "Now, let's be careful not to over-react. After all, if we retaliate, we are no better than he is."

"Besides," a passing jurist commented, "that kick might be interpreted as a form of expression and thus be protected by the First Amendment."

"Whether it's protected or not, it is a legitimate protest against the system," a professor said.

Any rational person would recognize such people as nuts, yet when you mention problems like escalating crime, drug abuse, or pornography, you often get responses similar to those above.

A society has reached its terminal stage, not when it can't protect itself, but when it becomes unsure if it should even try. Such a sick society is masochistic and is looking for a sadist savior to put it out of its misery.

I don't think the American people are at that stage, but many of our intellectuals are and they have just about emasculated the public institutions which are designed to protect us from those two-legged animals who choose to become human predators.

Well, we've wasted a lot of years and a lot of money trying to save the institutions or keep them functioning

on a semi-efficient basis. I believe it is time to try some non-institutional approaches.

Let us lobby our respective state legislatures for laws which would strip any person, and his survivors, from the right to sue if that person is killed or injured while committing or trying to commit a crime. In other words, let us seek laws which would grant blanket immunity from civil penalties to all law enforcement officers and to all citizens who thwart or attempt to thwart a crime, "damaging" the criminal in the process.

Hey, that would mean open season on criminals. Yep, it sure would and wouldn't that be grand! If we can't keep them in jail, or sometimes even get them there, then let's kill or maim them, but let's stop once and for all this insanity of the law-abiding citizens living under siege laid by the lawless. If someone has to live in fear in this country, let it be the criminals!

Rather than diddle around with gun control laws, let us lobby the legislatures to pass laws which require authorities to grant a permit to carry a gun to any citizen with no criminal record and no history of mental illness simply upon application. It is insane for a government which cannot control the criminal element to disarm the victims.

Rather than appropriate more money for more public defenders and social workers, let us lobby for appropriations to build gun ranges and to provide firearms courses for citizens.

Finally, let us add an amendment to the Constitution which says, "The right of a citizen to self-defense is absolute. Self-defense includes the use of whatever force is necessary to preserve life and to protect property. All that is necessary to establish the defense of self-defense in a court of law is the belief that life or property was threatened."

If our institutions have become so ineffective that life in America today is as dangerous as it once was on the frontier, then we might as well restore frontier justice. It is inexcusable that we have allowed our government to allow animals to take possession of our cities and turn them into jungles.

I don't believe a majority of Americans are ready to surrender to the criminal, the pornographer, and the drug pusher. Most of us love this country, love our families, love our cities and love our neighborhoods. If government can no longer protect them, then get out of the way and we'll do it ourselves.

Importance of giving

The drive for austerity in the federal budget is posing a problem for private social agencies and other non-profit organizations which have grown to rely on federal grants to cover part of their expenses. In the future there will be less money from Washington to go around.

This should not mean we are entering an era of neglect of the needy, or the starvation of those endeavors in the arts and humanities which have enjoyed federal subsidies in recent years. What it does mean is a shift back toward local responsibility for many charitable activities, and a renewed reliance on private, voluntary contributions.

The net result could be stronger and more effective programs. A long-standing criticism of the disbursement of federal grants is that too much money was eaten up in bureaucratic overhead, and funds were going into programs that did not justify their cost. A greater reliance on local, private financing can produce social services that are better aimed at true needs, and more accountable to those providing the funds.

The big question, however, is whether private foundations, community fund-raising organizations, and other philanthropies will have the resources to do what should be done. The Independent Sector, an umbrella group of philanthropic organizations, recently warned that it will be caught short unless there is a greater flow of money into its coffers.

Contributions to private charitable organizations, says the Independent Sector, have been growing at the rate of about nine percent a year — well behind the inflationary curve. As a consequence, non-government funding is having trouble meeting present commitments, not to mention the wave of new requests expected in the next few years.

If the slimmed-down federal budget means fewer federal dollars flowing into community agencies, the tax cut now taking shape in Congress promises to leave more dollars in private hands. Taxpayers, we hope, will recognize their obligation to respond more generously to fund appeals from private organizations now relying almost entirely on their voluntary support.

British justice swift, sure

Britain's "Yorkshire Ripper," Peter Sutcliffe, eluded police for five years during his killing spree in northern England.

But after his arrest Jan. 5, the British judicial system required less than five months to put the admitted killer of 13 women behind bars — for life, if the judge has his way.

The contrast between British justice and American justice is stark. In the United States, it is likely that prosecution and defense still would be wrangling over whether the defendant should be granted bail.

The trial would be delayed because of crowded courtrooms and procedural strategies.

And the 10-2 verdict under which Sutcliffe was found guilty by a jury would have forced a new trial in American courts, which don't subscribe to the 10-2 or 11-1 majorities accepted by the British.

The court scorned, significantly, a "plea bargain" bid by Sut-

cliffe under which he would have admitted guilt by reason of — in an American interpretation — temporary insanity.

We envy the British for their businesslike dispatch of the matter.

Big business pressure swayed formula vote

WASHINGTON — Like handgun control and abortion, the marketing of infant formula has become an emotional issue characterized by rhetorical excesses on both sides. Inevitably, the facts surrounding the controversy have become hopelessly obscured.

But confidential memos and State Department cables help to unravel the story of how the United States came to be the only nation to vote against the World Health Organization's code. The nearly unanimous vote puts most nations on record against the aggressive marketing of baby formula in backward countries, where its mixture with impure water can be dangerous.

In late April, Elliott Abrams, the assistant secretary of state for international organizations, was dispatched to Geneva to persuade Halfdan Mahler, director general of the health organization, to accept two concessions: The infant formula code would be defined as strictly voluntary, and it would be made clear that it applied only to formula, not other baby food.

Abrams had been told by Deputy Secretary of State William Clark, who was acting secretary in Alexander Haig's absence, that if these two concessions were granted, the United States would abstain instead of voting against the code.

According to State Department cables seen by my associate Vicki Warren, the Abrams-Mahler meetings went well. "Mahler was visibly relieved to learn that the U.S. now is in a position to avoid voting against the code," Abrams cabled Washington. "We are confident that we will have his cooperation in creating the

conditions necessary to enable the U.S. to abstain."

But there was a hitch. Clark had not cleared the U.S. position with presidential counselor Ed Meese. For some reason, Clark didn't want to report the State Department negotiations by telephone. At the bottom of a confidential memo, he wrote: "Please send a copy of this memo to EM and R(ichard) Allen," the president's national security adviser.

On May 1, Meese, Allen and two other members of Reagan's inner circle, Lyn Nofziger and Martin Anderson, sat down to discuss the developments in Geneva. Foggy Bottom officials learned from a National Security Council staffer that the four White House aides "have met and concluded that the U.S. should cast a negative vote on the WHO infant formula code" and that they "are not prepared to abstain even if the two conditions are met."

What had happened was that American formula makers like Bristol-Myers, Abbott Laboratories and American Home Products Corp. had lobbied the administration against the code. They were joined by the Grocery Manufacturers of America,

which feared the code might be applied to other baby food despite assurances to the contrary.

The pressure from the companies apparently swayed the White House. U.S. officials in Geneva were put on hold.

Lengthy memos went from Foggy Bottom to the White House, warning of the diplomatic black eye the United States would get by voting against the code. Health professionals, members of Congress and several high-level government officials added their pleas against a negative vote.

But the administration evidently bought the arguments put forth by business lobbyists. Essentially, these were (1) that the code's adoption would give ammunition to critics of Big Business, whereas a U.S. rejection would discredit the code, (2) that adoption would set a precedent which might lead to action in other fields like pharmaceuticals, and (3) that the infant formula industry represented a \$2 billion international market that was growing.

The White House also found legal and constitutional arguments, even though the Justice Department's antitrust division at one time saw no objection to a voluntary code.

And when the United States wound up alone in its vote against the code, a White House spokesman insisted: "We did gain by voting 'No.' We gained what you get for standing for a principle."

PRINTING PROBE — The Justice Department has at least three grand juries and as many more U.S. attorneys investigating fraud in the Government Printing Office's \$500-million-a-year procurement program.

So far, only a few thousand dollars' worth of criminal deals have been uncovered, but both Congress and the GPO management have encouraged Justice to "check every cranny."

There are plenty to check. In addition to its own printing and the purchase of paper, ink and other supplies, the GPO farms out government printing work to some 8,000 private firms. Only about 100 contracts have been thoroughly scrutinized so far.

While there is no evidence that top-level GPO officials are guilty of any wrongdoing, there are strong suspicions that they hid their heads in the sand on occasion. The agency's own inspector general's office has been ordered to work on the investigation full time, and has cooperated with the Justice Department in the probe.

There's a sad irony to the current investigation: The GPO was formed as a result of graft and bribery scandals in government printing in the 19th century, and has had one of the cleanest records of any government agency.

Sources close to the investigation said it would "in no wise" turn up the multimillion-dollar frauds found in the General Services Administration in recent years. One source said only a "minuscule" amount of GPO's \$500 million in annual procurement is involved.

INSIDE REPORT:

Republican chairman finding himself in strange position

WASHINGTON — In stubbornly battling against independent right-wing campaigns, Republican National Chairman Richard Richards is finding himself in a posture to be avoided by any leader of the party in power: at odds with the White House.

Under chief political aide Lyn Nofziger, the White House approves of hard-nosed campaigns conducted by the National Conservative Political Action Committee (NCPAC) and other right-wing groups. Their low-road campaigns assailing Democratic candidates are viewed by Reagan aides as a way for Republican candidates to take the high road. Nevertheless, Richards blasted NCPAC and anybody else running campaigns independent of the party apparatus.

Nofziger tried to patch things up in a May 19 breakfast session between Richards and right-wing leaders. That only worsened relations when Richards refused to budge an inch, and an exasperated Nofziger had to adjourn the session with nothing accomplished. "I'm afraid Dick is just a little slow in getting the message," another White House aide told us.

SENATE FEUDING

A feud within the Senate Republican leadership burst into the open when Sen. Ted Stevens of Alaska, the majority whip, chewed out Sen. John Tower of Texas, the chairman of the GOP Policy Committee, in the Republican cloakroom.

Their encounter there was a spil-

lover of bitter debate on the supplemental appropriations bill. Stevens, as chairman of the defense appropriations subcommittee, was three times overridden as the Senate voted funds for nerve gas, for flight pay and for taking the battleship New Jersey out of mothballs. Leading the way in each case was Tower, chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

Stevens, owner of one of Washington's worst tempers, stormed at Tower on the Senate floor and later raised the decibel level inside the cloakroom. Stevens shouted at Tower that since he had taken over defense appropriations, he might as well represent the Senate in the conference with the House. The incident signaled stormy days ahead in the Republican Senate on the defense debate.

WEICKER'S REVENGE

Sen. Lowell Weicker, the liberal Republican maverick from Connecticut, is a pariah to many of his Senate colleagues and a probable primary loser for renomination next year, but he is making Ronald Reagan pay while he is still in the Senate.

Weicker is keeping the Senate labor committee from approval of Reagan's block grant program for social welfare. Even if the administration coaxes support from another liberal Republican, Vermont's Sen. Robert Stafford, Weicker's "no" vote will keep the committee deadlocked at 8 to 8. The committee's Democrats, led by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, are solidly arrayed against block grants.

A footnote: Sen. Orrin Hatch of Utah, the committee's conservative chairman, has been trotting out all kinds of compromises designed to win over Stafford and Weicker. But that has only led to backstage criticism from conservatives that Hatch is undercutting the president.

ANTI-GOLD BUG

"Gold bugs" eagerly awaiting President Reagan's appointment of public members to the congressional-mandated gold study commission will be devastated to learn that he intends to name as its chairman a dedicated enemy of the gold standard: Dr. Anna J. Schwartz. A senior resident at the National Bureau of Economic Research, Schwartz was co-author, with Milton Friedman, of "A Monetary History of the United States." Friedman is considered the most important anti-gold intellectual force affecting the administration, and long has sought to curb Reagan's pro-gold inclinations.

The Schwartz appointment is modified by the fact that another of Reagan's public appointments to the commission will be New York City businessman Lewis Lehrman, a major political and intellectual advocate of a return to the gold standard.

SENATOR VS. GENERAL

Gen. David Jones, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and a formidable Pentagon inflighter, may have exercised those talents a little too vigorously in turning Sen. William Cohen of Maine into an enemy.

Jones, an Air Force officer, used an old Defense Department trick to counter Cohen's opposition to the proposed new CX transport plane: recruiting Maine Air National Guard officers to lobby Cohen. The senator's Washington office was inundated by telephone calls from the Maine airmen, who said they heard Cohen had been taken captive by the Navy.

That did not change Cohen's vote on the CX, but it did infuriate him. This could be bad news for Jones. A rising Republican force on the Senate Armed Services Committee, Cohen is chairman of the rapid deployment force subcommittee and a close adviser of Chairman John Tower.

Lee teacher to speak at Nebraska convention

Lee High School Etymology and Latin instructor Ben Cason will appear as a main speaker at the national American Classical League Institute convention June 15-20 in Omaha, Nebraska.

Cason will tell secondary, college and university teachers how he developed his course on etymology at Lee High School. Etymology is the study of words, with particular attention to the development of words from Latin and Greek roots.

Cason began developing the course in 1975, partially as a result of student desire to score higher on the Scholastic Achievement Test and other college entrance examinations.

"Though there is no valid instrument with which to measure the influence of etymology on the SAT verbal score, many students report significant gains," Cason said. "Kids become more aware of words and the questions begin to flow. When I pique their curiosity, I feel my goal has been reached," Cason noted.

His course is designed around three basic approaches which include analysis of learning prefixes, roots and suffixes; devices like word association and word stories which sometimes include humorous anecdotes about words; and repetition. "Rote is the most dangerous method because it sometimes turns students off," Cason said, but he adds that repetition has its place in any type of learning.

Lee students work mostly from the Lorge-Thorndike Word List which is a list taken from often-used words which appear in print.

Cason said he believes strongly in vocabulary augmentation, particularly the etymological or root word approach. "I hope the district will eventually incorporate the Foreign Language in Elementary Schools program which is taught in Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., and Los Angeles schools," Cason said.

Lee High School offers six classes in etymology each year to over 160 students.

Prison calm after inmate brawl

MUSKEGON, Mich. (AP) — The Muskegon Correctional Facility was calm after a brawl that injured 17 inmates and one guard, but prison officials said they were concerned about future flareups.

Sunday night's fight at Muskegon was the fifth incident of violence at a Michigan state prison in 10 days.

"The vast majority of people here don't want any trouble," H. Gary Wells, the prison superintendent, said Monday. But, he added, "You're always cautious...especially when you have had disturbances at other facilities."

Prisons at Jackson, Marquette and Ionia sustained millions of dollars in damage in May 22 and May 26 inmate riots in about 120 prisoners, 68 guards and 10 police or firefighters were injured.

The chairman of a special task force probing recent prison riots said, meanwhile, that the panel will begin its investigation this week by

touring two riot-torn institutions.

The nine-member panel plans to visit Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson on Thursday and the Michigan Reformatory at Ionia on Friday, said task force chairman Lawrence Lindemer.

He said Marquette Prison, where violence erupted after riots last week at Jackson and Ionia, will be visited later.

The task force, meeting for the first time Monday, interviewed Corrections Department Director Perry Johnson and heard from Gov. William Milliken.

Milliken said he wants a preliminary report in 30 days and a final study in 60 days pinpointing the reasons for the riots and recommending ways to

prevent future violence.

Wells said the inmates at Muskegon stopped fighting and returned to their rooms when officials sounded a siren Sunday night. He added that the prison was back to normal and meals were calm on Monday.

The incident began at 7:25 p.m. Sunday with a fight, and Wells said it eventually involved 34 of the 589 prisoners.

It was the first violent incident involving large numbers of inmates in the seven-year history of the facility, which has no prison industry and concentrates on classroom education and vocational training.

Inmates are housed in rooms instead of cells and have access to recreational facilities such as horseshoe pits and tennis and basketball

courts.

The Muskegon superintendent said he did not think the incident was triggered by recent events at the other state prisons.

"It's hard to tell," he said. "I think you have tensions in all prisons at the moment, based on what has happened at the other institutions. Things are cool now, but tomorrow's another day."

Five tests, finals filed in Dist. 8

Five projects and two completions have been announced in District 8 counties of Reeves, Loving, Winkler, Crane and Howard.

REEVES COUNTY WILDCAT

Natural gas decontrol is not expected in 1981

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Texas independent oil operators were told Monday they cannot expect a congressional move this year to decontrol natural gas prices.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, and Rep. Bill Archer, R-Texas, said opponents have made it clear any move toward decontrol would be counteracted by threats to extend the windfall profit tax on oil to natural gas.

However, Bentsen urged the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association to continue its fight for a 1,000-barrels-a-day exemption from the oil tax for independents and royalty owners.

Such an exemption bill sponsored by Bentsen passed the Senate last year but died in the House, where independents from across the nation are concentrating their current drive.

"I think you have a good chance of winning in the House, and if so, I think we will have an excellent chance to pass it in the Senate this year," Bentsen said.

Archer, a member of the House Ways and Means Committee, said "if we have immediate decontrol of gas prices we can expect a windfall profit tax on natural gas. However, I do think we have a chance to get help from the administration on some gas price adjustments that can be made administratively," Archer said.

Frank Pitts of Dallas, president of the 4,500-member trade group, said many things of interest to the industry are brewing in Washington at present, but the centerpiece of efforts by the independents "will be asking for, working for and hoping to get a \$1,000-barrel exemption from the oil tax."

Gene Wright, the natural gas committee chairman from Gilmer, warned that congressional action will be slow.

"We are in a slow waltz at present,

waiting to see what the administration ultimately will decide to do," Wright said.

Julian Martin, the association's executive vice president from Austin, said the exemption search will have to become involved in the overall tax program now being debated in Washington.

"If budgetary restraints demand that an exemption is not feasible at this time, then we would prefer to talk in terms of a phased exemption," he said.

But Martin said there is need for the exemption fairly quickly in that he fears a strong effort to enact a windfall profit tax on natural gas may develop in two to three years.

"If we don't have an exemption on oil by then it would be very difficult to get one on gas at that time," Martin said.

Rex Fuller, national energy policy committee chairman from Lubbock, said 201 members of the House now have indicated support of the 1,000-barrel exemption.

"We have 201, but we need 17 more," he said.

Fuller distributed telephone numbers for 37 house members he said are "good prospects" for those last 17.

The list includes 29 Republican and eight Democrats.

Pipeline ruptures coating Nueces Bay shore with oil

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — The cleanup of an oil spill that sent more than 20,000 gallons of refined oil from a ruptured underground pipeline into Nueces Bay will take several days to complete, U.S. Coast Guard spokesmen say.

A slick produced by the spill blackened about five miles of shoreline along in the inland bay Monday, the spokesman said.

The ruptured pipeline, located under a marshland on the south shore of the bay, is owned by Coastal States Petrochemical Corp. The leak was discovered Sunday morning after the oil had collected in a surface drainage ditch near the buried pipeline, said Marco Marquez, a spokesman for the Coast Guard's Marine Safety Office

at Corpus Christi.

Cleanup crews had recovered about 360 barrels, or 15,120 gallons of oil from the bay by Monday night and what remained of the slick was surrounded by booms, Marquez said.

A strong north wind blew the slick from the south shore across the bay to the north shore, where it coated four miles of shoreline, he said. One mile of shoreline on the south end of the bay was affected by the spill.

Marquez said Coast Guard investigators had not determined what caused the pipe to burst.

A spill of more than 10,000 gallons is classified as major by the safety office. Another Coast Guard spokesman said bay currents were sweeping the remaining oil toward the west and away from beaches.

Gunman subdued after holding elderly hostage

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—A gunman who police said had been diagnosed as "suicidal" took over two floors of a nursing home and held about 120 elderly patients hostage for 7½ hours before being subdued early this morning, authorities said.

One nurse was injured at 6:40 a.m. EDT, when two shots rang out at the 195-bed New Fairview Hall Convalescent Home.

The gunman, identified by police as Dominic Giordano, 59, of New Haven, was whisked out of the home on a stretcher to a waiting ambulance.

Yale-New Haven Hospital officials said Giordano was treated and released into police custody but not immediately charged. He apparently was struck in the head during the struggle with police.

The head nurse on the shift, Donna Lucas, apparently was injured by a ricocheting pellet when the gunman's 12-gauge single-barrel shotgun discharged as he was subdued, authorities said.

She was in fair condition with a penetrating wound to the shoulder and skin injuries on the head and neck, said Hospital of St. Raphael spokesman Kelly Anthony. Giordano, brandishing

a shotgun and a handgun, had entered the nursing home about 11 p.m. EDT Monday, apparently searching for his daughter, Denise, who works there, said Police Chief Edward Morrone.

Emmy Straup, a nursing aide who left the building, quoted the gunman as saying he came "to shoot (his daughter's) legs off so she can't run anymore."

His daughter was not there at the time. Giordano went to the second floor where he allegedly held at least two nurses gunpoint, Morrone said. Most of the patients were asleep during the night, said police Sgt. Robert Silver.

The daughter went to the home to help police talk her father out of the building, Silver said.

The gunman demanded that the 60 patients on each of the second and third floors remain where they were, and police said no one was eva-

cuated from the rest of the building.

Two policemen talked by telephone with Giordano in an attempt to get him to surrender, the chief said, and a police special tactics team surrounded the building, located in a middle-class residential neighborhood.

Psychologist testifies at trial

DENTON, Texas (AP)—A Wichita Falls woman accused of murdering her 4-year-old daughter by cutting out her heart was suffering from a severe emotional disorder that had rendered her incapable of understanding the consequences of her actions, a psychologist has testified.

Patricia Ann Frazier was suffering from a "bizarre" mental illness and thought her 4-year-old daughter was possessed by the devil when she cut out the child's heart to save herself and the world, Leon Morris testified.

Morris, who performed

a court-ordered evaluation shortly after Frazier was arrested and charged with murder on Feb. 22, 1980, said the 25-year-old woman was a paranoid schizophrenic who exhibited symptoms of persecution and delu-

sions of grandeur.

Frazier believed fellow employees at an industrial plastics manufacturing firm in Wichita Falls were conspiring against her and were talking behind her back, Morris said.

The pleasure of your company

Flowers add much to party atmosphere

"I can't stress the importance of flowers in entertaining," said Lola Igou, in a course on how to plan a party titled "The Pleasure of Your Company."

The one-day seminar was held at the Permian Basin Graduate Center where Ms. Igou is registrar/course coordinator.

She is also a native South African who has lived in Europe and traveled widely. She is known in Midland for her knowledge of different cuisines, successful party giving and gourmet cooking.

"I'm not much on themes for a party," said Ms. Igou. "Elegant flowers are all you really need."

One segment of the workshop was held on flowers, with special advice presented by Mildred Riddle of Mildred's Flowers in Midland.

Ms. Riddle presented several ideas for entertaining.

"For a buffet, you need something tall, big and showy," she said. "The flower arrangement also needs to complement your food."

She said that the vogue for flower arrangements right now is the natural look. "Object is to make your arrangement look as though you've just gone out in the garden and plucked your own flowers," she said.

She explained that the type of flower used can be governed by the choice of china, linens and the color combinations.

"When you've picked your flowers, first trim off any foliage that will be under water in a vase because it will deteriorate. Change the water frequently and make a fresh cut on stem so that will last longer. Cut the stem at an angle."

Ms. Riddle put together an arrangement in minutes consisting of flowers from the lily family in colors of deep blue, orange, red and white. She used ferns to fill out the arrangements. The flowers were arranged in several tall glass containers and were arranged "in the round."

"For a buffet, guests will probably be seeing around the entire table and arrangement, so keep that in mind," she said. She also placed votive candles at the base of the glass containers for added effect.

Ms. Riddle encourages her clients to buy loose flowers rather than formal arrangements if they wish. "It's more economical and you can use your own container to make it more personalized," she said.

Floral arrangement for a seated dinner is a little more complicated, according to Ms. Riddle.

"Do not place candles so that they shine or reflect in the guests' eyes," she said. "Place the arrangement low so that guests can see across the table."

She also gave tips for those who wish to cut flowers from their own gardens:

Mixed foliage is pretty. Wash and dry the foliage, and spray with vegetable oil spray.

So that the flowers will last longer, cut in the evening "when they'll be thirsty." Put them in

tepid water, let them drink overnight and change water often (everyday, if possible).

Cut in tight buds so the flowers will last longer.

Fresh water will give a longer life to the foliage. If you don't want to change water as often, add 7-up as a preservative.

A favorite addition to her flower arrangements is candles. "For old candles that are dirty or dented, polish with nylon hose and they'll be as good as new," she advised.

A variety of containers can be used to personalized arrangements, such as a brass tray with brass candlesticks in various sizes, sea shells, etc.

"Don't forget the guest bathroom," said Ms. Riddle. "Flowers there are a nice touch. While guests may not pay as much attention to your central table floral arrangement with other guests milling around, they are all alone in the bathroom and have a chance to look around. A small arrangement can add much to the atmosphere."

Best flower buy on the market now is a cymbidium orchid, according to Ms. Riddle. She placed a single orchid, along with two or three ferns, in a medium size seashell, to emphasize that arrangements don't always have to be complicated.

A second opinion may be needed

DEAR ABBY: This is in response to your request to hear from women who had been treated with radiation therapy instead of undergoing a mastectomy. On my 35th birthday I learned that a golf ball-sized lump that had been removed from my right breast a few days before was malignant. After discussing the situation with my surgeon and learning that he felt he had removed all of the cancerous tissue (the procedure is called lumpectomy), I could not bring myself to accept the "usual" next step of a modified mastectomy.

My surgeon referred me to a radiologist who, after reviewing my medical record, decided that I was a good candidate for radiation therapy. I then underwent six weeks of radiation therapy. Unlike the side effects experienced when many other parts of the body are treated, those produced by radiation on the breast are minimal — a slight cough, loss of hair under the arm, and the skin that is treated becomes less soft, darkens slightly, peels and becomes itchy.

It has been five years since my lump was removed, and the only visible evidence of my bout with cancer is a barely noticeable 1 1/2-inch scar! Please feel free to use my name. — SUZANNE PHILLIPS, ROCHESTER, N. Y.

DEAR SUZANNE: Thanks to Juliet R. Ristom, who refused to accept her doctor's decision to undergo an immediate mastectomy for breast cancer, California became the second state (Massachusetts was the first) to require every physician to give a written summary of ALL options available to breast cancer patients. I would urge every woman with breast cancer to get several opinions before deciding on therapy. Ask to be referred to a surgeon and a radiation therapist. And please, practice breast self-examination faithfully every month, because the only women who even have a choice are the ones who detect it early.

No Civil War

CEDAR SPRINGS, Ga. (AP) — The Historic Chattahoochee Commission toyed with "That Late Unpleasantness" but voted to go with "the conflict between the states" after members revolted against using the term "Civil War" in a book of letters by Confederate soldiers.

W.W. Bill Nordan, who led the commission's internal civil war, would have preferred the "War of Northern Aggression."

The commission also debated calling it the "War Between the Union and the Confederacy," "The Conflict" or just avoiding the issue altogether by not referring to it at all.

Finally, it voted 10-1 last Thursday to refer to the war "in small letters" as "the conflict between the states" in a book of letters from the ancestors of Chattahoochee Valley residents, to be published by Troy State University Press.

Historian Ray Matthis, who prepared the manuscript, referred to the conflict as the "War for Southern Independence." The commission changed it to "Civil War."

Then, Nordan set out to prevent "such a dastardly unforgivable error as to refer to the War of Northern Aggression as The Civil War."

Simple rules for making clothes with lace

Lace makes a beautiful topper for a fancy dress, camisole or evening gown. A simple little lace jacket can add worlds of dress-up charm to your outfit, and, as pretty as it is, lace does not have to be difficult to work with. Just follow a few easy rules:

Because lace is definitely see-through, a regular seam is not the best. A french seam is nice. Or, a little less trouble,

stitch on the seam line, stitch again one-fourth inch away, trim. Stitch darts in the same way, trimming close to second row of stitching.

Instead of facings, finish edges of front and neckline with flat, scalloped-edge lace trim. Sleeve edges may be turned up one-half inch and topstitched. Hems may be turned up three-fourths inch and stitched. For extra body in hem area, insert horsehair braid. For interfacing, use nylon net in the same color as your

lace. The prongs of the presser foot will sometimes catch in the open weave of the lace. Wrap the prongs in a piece of tape.

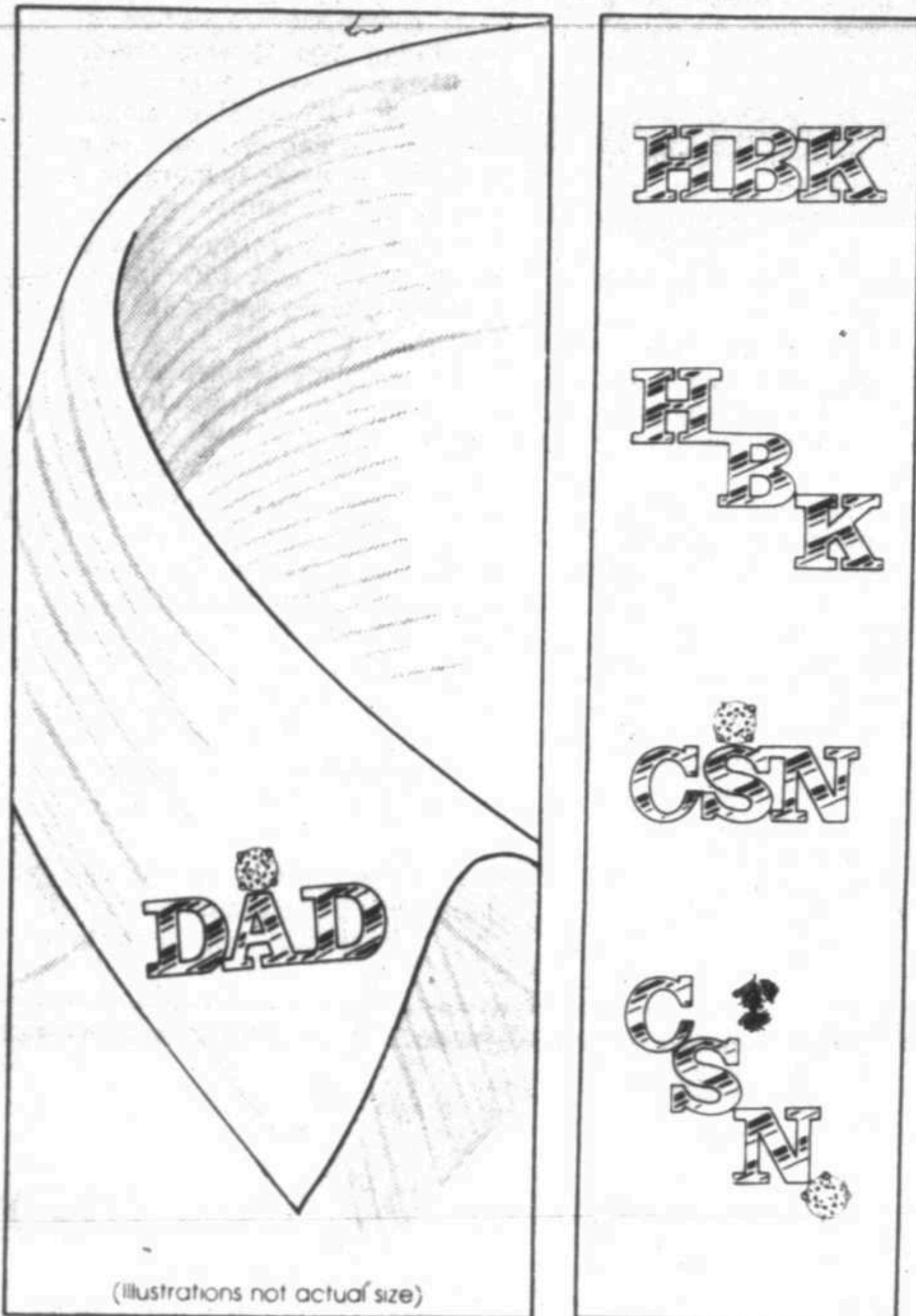
Some laces have scalloped edges along the selvages. These laces can be cut as you would cut a border fabric. Use the scalloped edge for your hem edge, sleeve edge or the front edges of a jacket.

Scalloped edge lace is just the thing for making a stole for throwing over your bare shoulders on a

cool evening. Simply cut the length you need and hem the two cut ends. See, lace isn't difficult. It is just beautiful, and that's nice.

Engagement ring should be returned

Does the law say a woman must return her fiancé's gifts when an engagement is broken?

Q. When we became engaged, my fiancé gave me a diamond ring and later two expensive paintings which were to hang in our home.

Now he says he thinks we are incompatible, and he has broken the engagement. He wants the ring and paintings back. Does the law in California say I must return them?

A. California courts generally have held that such gifts were given in expectation of marriage, and that they should be returned when the basis for the gifts is gone. (106 Calif. 113; 2 BL Comm.)

Q. Our two sons, 12 and 14, are enrolled in a private school in Delaware. We want them to

have some experience in handling money.

Do banks in Delaware (where we live) accept deposits from minors? Can the boys write checks on their accounts?

A. Any Delaware bank may receive deposits from, or in the name of, minors (Del. State. Sc. 5-920). Such deposits are held for the benefit of the minor depositor as

though he were an adult. All states have similar laws.

Q. My doctor gives me only a few more months to live, so I want to transfer my cash to our three children. Will Arkansas impose a gift tax or estate tax on these gifts?

A. Arkansas has a gift tax, but there is a provision in your state (Sec. 63.101-146) which imposes an estate tax on those who receive gifts from a person who makes the gifts in contemplation of death, as in your case.

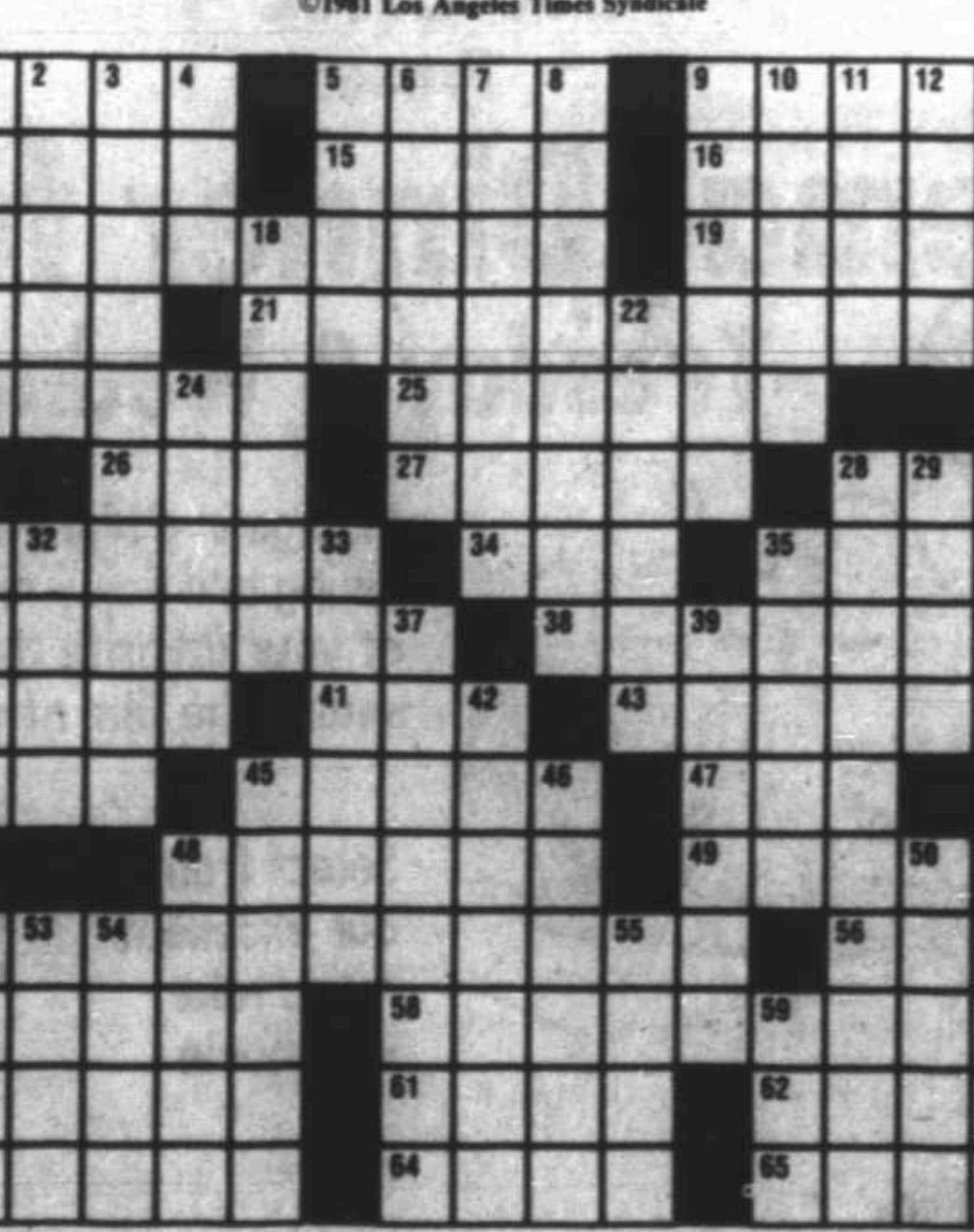

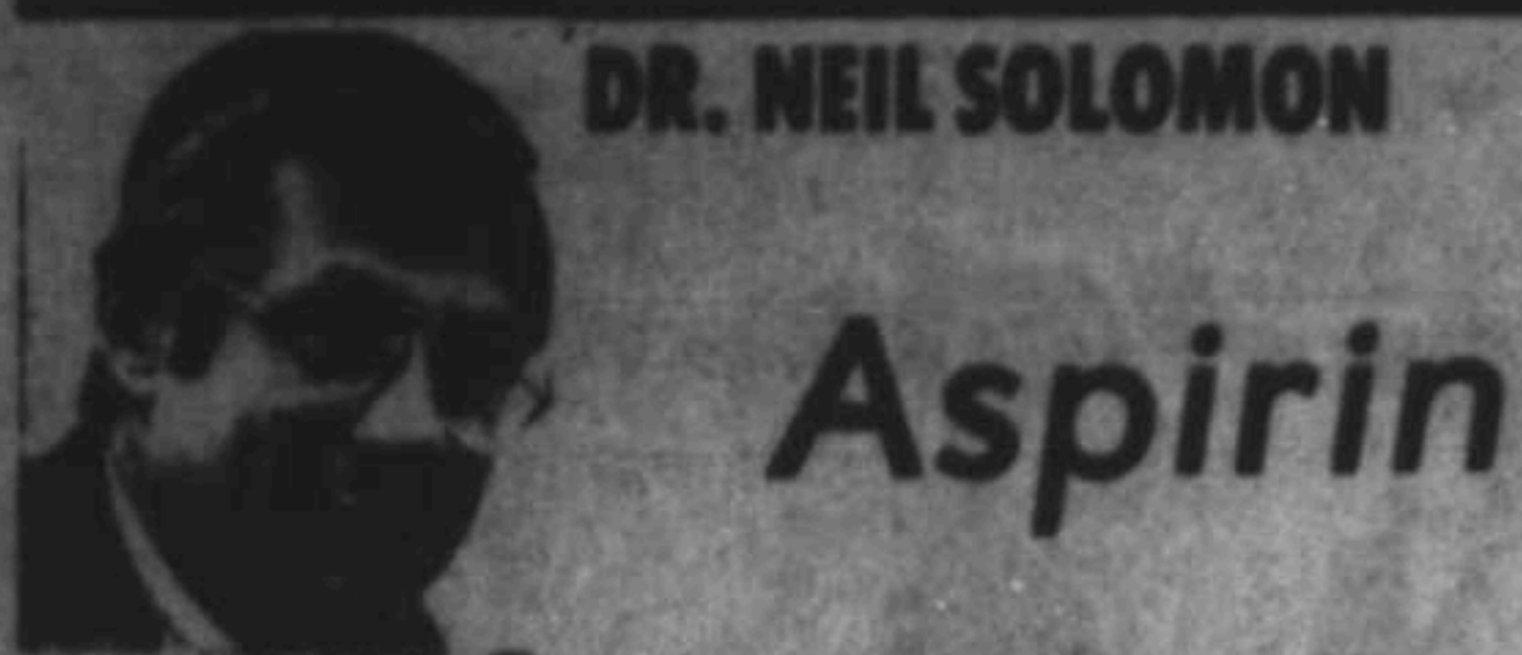

Aspirin widely used

Dear Dr. Solomon: This my come under the heading of trivia, but with aspirin being such a popular drug, I'm wondering how much of it is sold each year. Are there any such statistics? — George Dear George: In the United States alone, more

than 20 billion aspirin tablets are sold each year.

Dear Dr. Solomon: A friend of mine says that his mother-in-law, who lives with him and his wife, is suffering from senile dementia, but she doesn't have hardening of the arteries. Is this possible? I always thought that people became senile because of hardening of the arteries. — Frank

Dear Frank: Your thinking is shared by many people, but actually only a small percentage of people who have pre-senile or senile dementia suffer from arteriosclerosis (hardening of the arteries).

Dear Dr. Solomon: A few weeks ago there was a serious automobile accident near where I live in which three young people were killed. According to the newspaper stories, some marijuana was found in one of the cars involved in the accident, and its use was believed to be a contributing factor. I'm familiar with the breathalyzer test that the police sometimes use to determine if a person was driving under the influence of alcohol. Is there any similar test that can be used to see if a person's driving was impaired by marijuana? — Ralph

Dear Ralph: A recently developed test permits the measurement of low concentrations of marijuana in human blood, but it probably won't come into general use like the breathalyzer, partly because of legal considerations. The test is a form of radioimmunoassay that measures marijuana's major active ingredient, delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol (THC).

One of the preliminary findings of the University of North Carolina scientists who developed the test is that marijuana may contribute far less to automobile fatalities than was believed to be the case. Dr. Arthur J. McBay, professor of pharmacy and pathology, reports that about six percent of the 169 drivers who died in single vehicle accidents in North Carolina over a 12-month period had traces of THC in their blood. However, two-thirds of all drivers who were killed were legally under the influence of alcohol, and two-thirds of the victims who had smoked marijuana also were drunk.

The primary application of the new radioimmunoassay test may be in other areas of research, such as the use of marijuana as an anti-nausea agent for cancer patients receiving chemotherapy, rather than in combating automobile fatalities. Dr. McBay points out that the number of drivers involved in fatal accidents who were under the influence of marijuana is relatively small in relation to the number who were under the influence of alcohol. Therefore, an investment of large sums of money to try to apprehend drivers who have smoked marijuana would probably not be warranted.

LaVera Gehron of Williamsport, a customer, said the former president kissed her after she told him she voted twice for him. "I'm not going to wash my face for a week," Mrs. Gehron said with a laugh.

Alda makes contribution

WASHINGTON (AP) — Actor Alan Alda has contributed \$11,000 to push a foundation over the top in its drive to buy and preserve the home of women's rights leader Elizabeth Cady Stanton, the National Park Service said. Alda's contribution gave the Elizabeth Cady Stanton Foundation the \$43,000 it needed to purchase the home, the park service said Monday. The foundation is acquiring property in the Seneca Falls, N.Y. area for a Women's Rights National Historical Park, which was authorized by Congress last December. The park will include the home; the Wesleyan Chapel, site of the first women's rights convention in 1848, and the home of activist Amelia Bloomer.

OTTAWA (AP) — Margaret Trudeau, estranged wife of Canada's prime minister, says she has no immediate plans to marry the lawyer-businessman who has been living at her Ottawa home "for some time." Mrs. Trudeau, 32, and James Johnson, in his late 30s, made an appearance Saturday night at a party after a performance at the National Arts Center. Mrs. Trudeau confirmed she was living with Johnson, but asked if they planned to marry she said, "We're both still married, each of us with children we're helping to bring up." Mrs. Trudeau and Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau, 61, have been separated since May 1977 and care for their three children on alternate weeks.

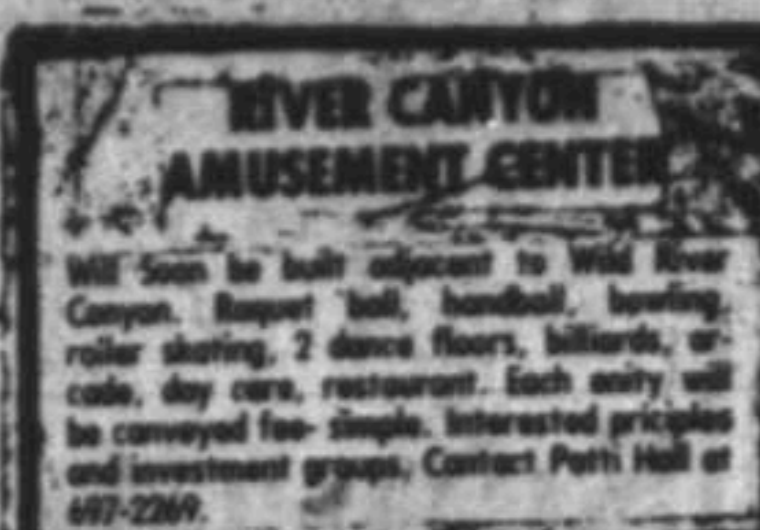



Erving, Bird head NBA All-League team

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Forwards Julius Erving of Philadelphia and Larry Bird of Boston, who finished 1-2 in the race for Most Valuable Player honors, headed the official 1980-81 National Basketball Association all-league team announced Monday.

Joining Erving, the No.1 vote-getter, and Bird on the all-league squad were center Kareem Abdul-Jabbar of Los Angeles and guards George Gervin of San Antonio and Dennis Johnson of Phoenix.

THE ONLY newcomer on this year's team, announced at the NBA's summer meetings, was Johnson, who

replaced Paul Westphal of Seattle. Ironically, Johnson was traded for Westphal a year ago.

Named to the second team were forwards Marques Johnson of Milwaukee and Adrian Dantley of Utah, center Moses Malone of Houston and guards Otis Birdsong of Kansas City and Nate Archibald of Boston.

The all-league teams were chosen in balloting by a panel of 69 media members, three from each league city. Two points were awarded for a first-place vote and one for a second-place mention.

Erving, who was the NBA's seventh leading scorer with a 24.6 average, received 130 points out of a possible

138. Bird, who gained first-team honors for the second time in as many pro seasons after averaging 21.2 points and 10.9 rebounds per game, was close behind with 126 points.

IN THE MVP voting, also done by a panel of media members, Erving edged Bird 454-423. Both polls were completed before the start of the playoffs.

Abdul-Jabbar, who received 118 points, gained the eighth first-team berth in his 12-year career, surpassing Wilt Chamberlain for most times named among centers. The six-time MVP was fourth in the league with 26.2 points per game, seventh in rebounding at 10.3 and third in blocked

shots at 2.85. Gervin was voted to the team for the fourth straight year. He led the league in scoring three years in a row before dropping to third last season with a 27.1 average. He received 99 points, highest among the guards.

DENNIS JOHNSON, who averaged 18.8 points per game and was a unanimous choice for the league's all-defensive team, gained the second guard spot with 60 points. He barely edged Birdsong, who received 58 points.

Meanwhile, the league meetings continued Monday with sessions by the NBA's committees on television, finance, marketing and labor rela-

tions. These were in preparation for Tuesday's meeting of the Board of Governors, which consists of a club owner or representative from each team.

Items on the agenda included approval of Donald T. Sterling as the new owner of the San Diego Clippers, election of a new board chairman to replace former Clippers owner Irv Levin and votes on the rules changes recommended by the Rules and Competition Committee.

THESE CHANGES, all of which are relatively minor, included new guidelines for preventing the use of zone defenses and elimination of the 3-for-2 and 2-for-1 free-throw options.

Martin benched for a week

Umpires don't think punishment is enough

NEW YORK (AP) — Lee MacPhail, handing down his stiffest penalty against a manager since becoming American League president in 1974, imposed a one-week suspension Monday against Oakland A's Manager Billy Martin for bumping umpire Terry Cooney.

But the head of the umpires' association was not satisfied with the punishment and was contemplating legal action against Martin.

MACPFAIL FINED Martin \$1,000 in addition to the suspension, the length of which matched the one-week suspension the AL president assessed last year against Detroit outfielder Al Cowens for attacking Chicago pitcher Ed Farmer on the mound. Cowens was also fined an amount the AL office would only describe as "substantial."

The start of Martin's suspension was made retroactive to last Saturday.

Martin, who was suspended indefinitely — without a hearing — after the Friday night incident in Toronto, will be able to resume his managerial duties Saturday, when the A's host the Boston Red Sox. Third base coach Cleve Boyer is running the club in Martin's absence.

MARTIN WAS contacted in his hotel in Chicago and declined comment.

While it was not immediately known whether Martin was going to appeal the suspension, Richie Phillips, director of the Major League Umpires Association, said the punishment wasn't strong enough.

"I don't think a seven-day suspension and a \$1,000 fine is a sufficient deterrent," Phillips said from his office in Philadelphia. "I don't think it's a sufficient penalty to deter other managers who are of his ilk."

Phillips mentioned Baltimore's Earl Weaver, who has been accused of using arguments with the umpires to fire up his players and the crowd. Last year, MacPhail suspended

Weaver for three days and fined him an undisclosed amount for brushing umpire Rich Garcia's eye with his cap.

Cooney ejected Martin for arguing ball-strike calls during Friday night's game against the Blue Jays. Martin then came barreling from the dugout after Toronto's Ernie Whit questioned the legality of a pitch from Oakland's Matt Keough. Martin struck the 200-pound Cooney with his chest, knocking him backwards. Then he scooped up two handfuls of dirt and hurled them at Cooney's back.

IT WAS the first time this season Martin had been ejected.

Phillips considered the Martin punishment inappropriate in light of National League President Chub Feeney's 15-day suspension and \$5,000 fine lodged against Bill Madlock last year after the Pittsburgh third baseman hit umpire Gerry Crawford in the face with his glove.

Phillips, an attorney, said the umpires' union was considering bringing a civil suit against Martin or asking the Canadian authorities to initiate criminal proceedings against him.

"I'll have to review it carefully with Cooney and (crew chief Bill) Kunkel (Monday) and make a determination whether to carry it further," Phillips said. "If he got a slap on the wrist, then we would definitely move in one of those directions, or both."

"But the penalty falls in between a tap on the wrist and a sufficient action to deter others."

AS A manager, Martin has served two other suspensions.

In 1973, while with the Detroit Tigers, Martin was suspended three days for ordering his pitchers to throw spitballs in protest of the umpires' failure to enforce the rule against the illegal pitch.

A year later, while managing the Texas Rangers, Martin was suspended three days for ordering his pitchers to throw knockdown pitches at Milwaukee batters.

Besides running afoul of league officials, the combative manager has had a career-long feud with several umpires. Last season, Martin had an argument with Dale Ford and claimed the umpire got rough with him.

"HE PUT his hands on me," Martin said. "After he threw me out, he pushed me when we were arguing. Bill Madlock gets a 15-day suspension for putting his glove in an umpire's face. I think an umpire should get 15 days for putting his hands on a manager. There shouldn't be a double standard."

Although the suspension matched the stiffest penalty MacPhail had ever handed down, other players and officials have been punished more severely.

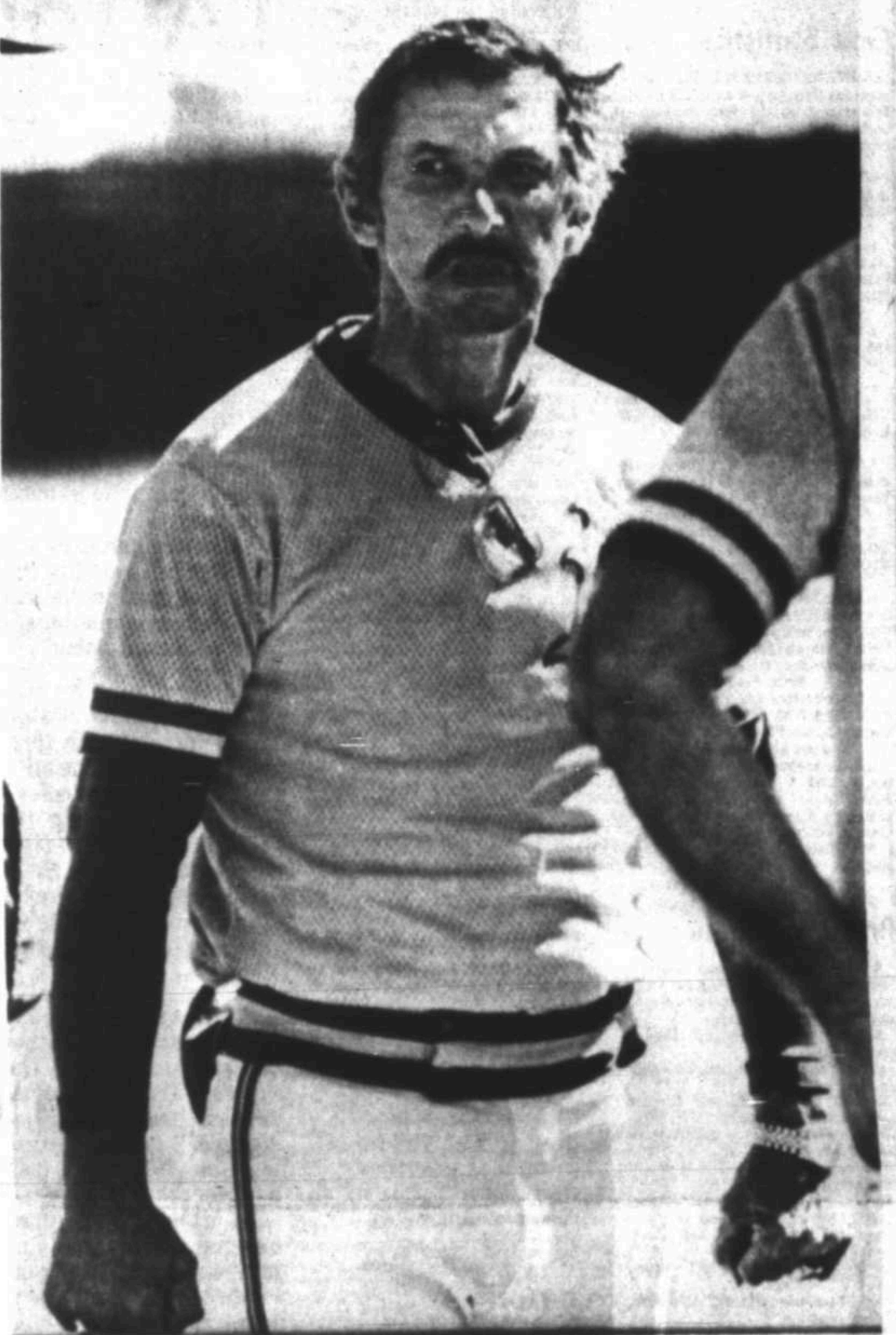
TV to blame says Unser

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Race car driver Bobby Unser says ABC-TV played a major role in the decision by the U.S. Auto Club to strip him of his apparent victory in the Indianapolis 500 auto race May 24.

Unser, in a telephone interview from Phoenix Monday, said the network's commentators for the race acted as "judge and jury."

"What really caused the problem was the TV people — Chris Economaki and Jackie Stewart," said Unser. "They assumed Bobby's guilt of something before millions of people they became judge and jury ... All over a rule that never existed."

It was the television network's video tapes of the race, which showed Unser passing several cars after exiting from the pits under a yellow light, that race officials viewed in deciding to penalize Unser one lap and award first place to Mario Andretti.



Oakland A's manager Billy Martin's conduct had been perfect this year until Friday. Martin, upset over a strike call, bumped umpire Terry Cooney then kicked and threw dirt at him. As a result, American League president Lee MacPhail has suspended Martin for one week and fined him \$1,000. Martin's attorney, Ed Sapir, said he would appeal the suspension and Martin could be back in the Oakland dugout tonight.

Stepien defends big offers

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Ted Stepien, controversial owner of the Cleveland Cavaliers, Monday defended his lucrative bids for free agents Otis Birdsong and James Edwards, saying he was obligated to do "whatever it takes to make the Cavaliers' organization strong."

"This is a touchy thing," said Stepien, who is attending the National Basketball Association Board of Governors meeting here. "You have to make an offer you feel will be enough to get the player."

"I HAD heard Kansas City was willing to go to \$650,000 to keep Birdsong, and I felt it would take \$1 million (a year) to get him to come to Cleveland. And I felt it would take \$800,000 (a year) to get Edwards, who was the best center available."

Both Birdsong, a second-team all-league guard who averaged 24.6 points per game last year, and Edwards, a 7-footer who had 15.6 points and 7.0 rebounds for Indiana, have signed offer sheets to play for Cleveland, moves which have touched off

fears of an impending salary explosion around the league.

UNDER THE right of first refusal system which went into effect this summer, Kansas City and Indiana can keep those players by matching Cleveland's offer.

"Right now it's a players' market," Stepien conceded. "But my obligation to the fans of Northeast Ohio is to make the Cavaliers' organization as strong as possible. I'm going to aggressively go after a winning team within the economic resources I have to work with."

Stepien, who owns an advertising company which he says is worth \$100 million, bought the Cavaliers a year ago.

"WHEN I took over the club it was a financially strapped organization," he said. "It took \$1 million just to clean up the outstanding debts. Last year was a new experience for me, but we weathered the storm."

And a stormy year it was. Stan Albeck was replaced as coach by Bill Musselman, who eventually was moved to personnel director and replaced by Don Delaney, a Stepien associate for 23 years but a man who never had coached basketball beyond the junior high school level.

In midseason, following a series of controversial trades which stripped Cleveland of its first-round draft choices through 1986, the league stepped in and ordered that all future deals be cleared by NBA Director of Operations Joe Axelson. And there was also a messy dispute with WWWE, the Cavs' radio outlet, which ended with Stepien suing the station to regain control of broadcasting rights.

"AFTER ALL we had gone through," said Stepien, "I felt the free agent market was the way we had to go to get the type of product we needed to attract the fans. If anything, I was surprised we were the first ones out of the starting blocks."

"If I had my choice, I think the idea of compensation, where an owner loses a free agent receives some compensation, is fairest. But as (New York Yankees owner George) Steinbrenner says, he didn't invent the free agent market but he's surely going to take advantage of it. That's my policy."

Texas stays alive in CWS

Reynolds' hit caps Horns' comeback victory

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — "I'm a fast-ball hitter and when I saw that pitch come in there my eyes must have looked like silver dollars," said Texas freshman Mark Reynolds.

Reynolds drilled the Steve Ontiveros fastball into left center for a two-run double to give Texas a 6-5 comeback victory in the elimination round of the College World Series baseball tournament Monday night.

THE SECOND game of the evening, 44-14 South Carolina against 32-13 Maine, was postponed to Tuesday at 1:10 p.m. CDT due to a downpour that halted action for one hour and 45 minutes after seven innings of the Texas-Michigan game.

"Before the game was stopped we had a lot of momentum going for us," said Michigan Coach Bud Middaugh, whose team held a 5-2 lead at that point.

The Wolverines had scored twice on two-out rallies in the third and fifth innings and added a single run in the sixth. At the end of the seventh the thunderstorm hit, forcing the ground crew to pull the protective tarp over the infield.

"MAYBE IT took some momentum from them but I felt that we could have come back anyway without the break," said Texas Coach Cliff Gustafson.

Texas picked up one run in the eighth when the game was resumed. Reynolds singled with one out, was forced at second on a Chris Campbell grounder and Tracy Dophied followed with a run-scoring double.

Bryan Burrows walked to start the Texas ninth. He was forced at second on a grounder by Spike Owen. Owen scored on a lined shot that Larry Long turned from a would-be single to a double as Michigan right fielder Jim Paciorek slid across the soaked grass.

MIKE ZATOPEK grounded out for the second out and Michigan elected to walk catcher Burk Goldthorn and

pitch to Reynolds. Goldthorn had homered and singled in four official trips to the plate.

"I was looking for a curve ball since he was getting them over all night," said Reynolds of Ontiveros. "I couldn't believe it when he threw me a

fastball. I hit it real good. I like to hit under pressure situations. If you can do it you're a hero."

Reynolds was the Texas hero Monday as the Longhorns stayed alive in the double-elimination tournament with a 59-10-1 record.

Bill Ellington Announces retirement

Texas AD resigns post without a reason given

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — University of Texas athletic director Bill Ellington has resigned effective August 31 without immediately giving a reason.

Ellington, 60, joined the U.T. staff in 1959 and has been athletic director since January 1980 when Darrell Royal became special assistant to the president. Ellington was named assistant athletic director in 1968.

DURING THE early '60s, he was offensive back coach on Royal's staff and later coached the freshman team.

In eight years, his freshman teams had a record of 33-5-2. Ellington was at a meeting in Arkansas and couldn't be reached for comment.

Dr. Peter Flawn, president of U.T. Austin, in a letter to Ellington, said: "I wish we could persuade you to continue as athletics director, but I understand the reasons which have prompted you to resign. The University of Texas at Austin owes you a great debt for your long service in the athletic department and for your leadership this past year and a half."

FLAWN SAID a search will begin to find a replacement for Ellington.

Ellington, who earned a bachelor's degree from McMurry College in 1943 and a masters in education from East Texas State in 1951, was a successful high school football coach before coming to the University of Texas. In 1956

he coached Garland to a AAA championship, beating Bum Phillips' Nederland team. Ellington and his wife will live at their farm near Quinlan, Texas.

Appropriation could net MC mixed market \$6.78 million

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market was mixed today amid conflicting signals on the course of interest rates.

Stocks falling in price outnumbered gainers by a 4-3 margin in the midday tally of New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

But the Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks, which rose 6.21 points Monday, gained 1.21 points to 990.17 at noon.

The blue-chip average had soared above the 1,000 mark for most of Monday amid rising hopes that interest rates had peaked, but it gave up some of its gains and slid below the 1,000-level in the final hour of trading. That retreat continued today as interest rates continued to rise in the nation's credit markets.

But as trading began today, several banks, including Citibank — the nation's second-largest commercial bank — reduced their prime lending rates to 20 percent from 20.5 percent, joining a move that started last week. Some smaller banks have reduced their prime lending rates to 19.5 percent.

The University of Texas at the Permian Basin will receive funding of \$12.85 million. UTBP will be budgeted \$6.97 million for fiscal 1962 and \$6.58 million for fiscal 1963.

Major components of that budget (in totals for the biennium) include faculty salaries, \$3.53 million; general administration, \$948,311; departmental operating expense, \$754,325; libraries, \$687,074; and purchased utilities, \$2.3 million.

The budget also includes \$20,000 for scholarships and authorizes the expenditure of \$50,000 for library enhancement.

Howard County Junior College would receive \$3.78 million for the biennium. Academics would get \$2.08 million and vocational and technical education \$2.08 million.

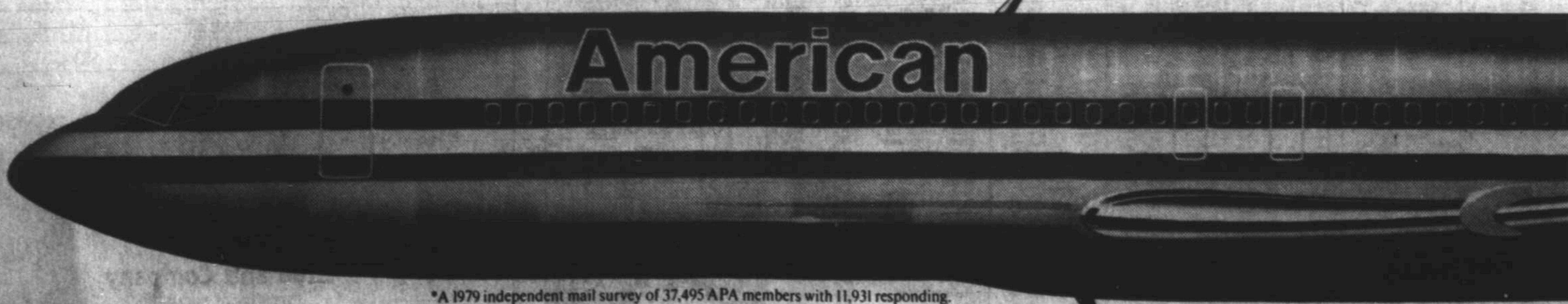
