Cancer Screening Clinic Set

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method know to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are: 1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month; 2. Have a physical examination every year.; 3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age.

Age - 35 to 40 - One baseline mammogram; 40 to 50 - A mammogram every 1 to 2 years; over 50 - Yearly mammogram.

A clinic will be held on Monday, June 17, 1991, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., in Hedley, at the Lioness Club. This clinic will be scheduled at this same time each year. The Shriners Hospital System Is For All Children

Since 1922, Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children have served children in North America. These hospitals provide outstanding care to children who have orthopaedic problems or who have been severely burned. Both inpatient and outpatient care are given to children from infancy to the 18th birthday regardless of race, religion, or relationship to a Shriner.

There is no charge for any of the care or services provided by a Shrine Hospital. Admission is based on medical and financial need. For orthopaedic cases, there should be a reasonable possibility that the patient would benefit from treatment and that treatment at another facility would place an undue financial burden on the patient's family. The Burns Institutes accept children who have been burned and need immediate care, and children needing plastic reconstructive or restorative surgery and rehabilitation, as a result of burn injuries.

All services are paid for by the Shriners. Operating funds are supplied by the Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children Endowment Fund which is supported by the gifts and bequests of Shriners, their families and the general public. Additional revenues come the Shrine fund-raising events and from an annual hospital assessment paid by each Shriner.

The Shrine Hospital network currently includes 22 hospital-19 orthopaedic units and three burns institutes. In addition to patient care, these hospitals are actively engaged in teaching and research programs in order to expand the benefits of the Shriner Hospital system.

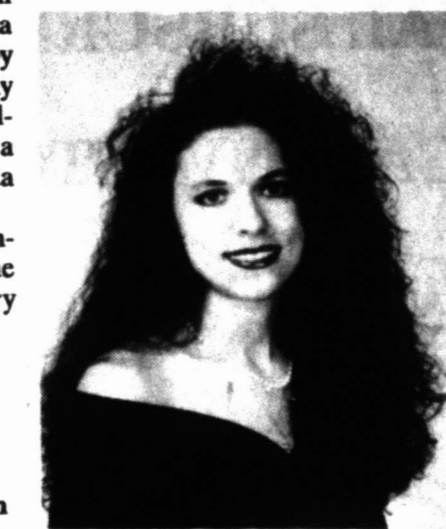

Gopher Control Program

The Donley County Extension Service, Council Executive Committee is sponsoring a Gopher Control program and demonstration for anyone interested on June 20, at the Hancock pecan orchard on Dyer and McClelland street in Clarendon. The program will start at 10:00 a.m. and will feature Ron Smith and Rich Gilliland from the Texas Animal Damage Control Service.

Both Mr. Smith and Mr. Gilliland will discuss gopher control techniques and give demonstrations on properly baiting tunnels and using mechanical control devices.

Gophers have been a problem in Donley County for many years and can cause many problems for farmers, ranchers, and homeowners. Several other mammals are sometimes confused with pocket gophers. One can distinguish pocket gophers from other mammals by their tell tale signs, as well as by the appearance of the animals. Pocket gophers leave soil mounds on the surface of the ground, the mounds are usually fan-shaped and tunnel entrances are plugged, keeping various intruders out of burrows.

Damages caused by gophers includes destruction of under-

Sinusitis: Causes and Cures

The sinuses are air-filled cavities inside the bones of the face and are connected to the nasal passages. The sinus cavities are lined with a membrane that produces a sticky liquid called mucus, or phlegm. Under normal circumstances, the sinuses are kept clear when the mucus that is produced drains into the nasal passages.

If the sinus cavities become blocked for any reason, as from the congestion associated with a cold, they do not drain as they should. Sinusitis (inflammation of the sinus membrane) results from this poor drainage. Sinusitis also may be the result of an allergy. Sinus membranes may be sensitive to dust or other things. Bacteria may accumulate, resulting in sinus infection.

Sinusitis often causes pain and tenderness above the sinus cavities, the pain being felt in the face, forehead, and eyes. Some persons report that the pain is worse in the mornings, easing as the day goes along. The congestion associated with sinusitis usually is not serious and often can be cleared up with a course of antibiotics. It is necessary to take all the antibiotic medicine prescribed. Narcotics or less powerful prescription pain relievers help relieve facial pain. Nose drops (nasal decongestants) may be prescribed to lessen nasal inflammation and congestion.

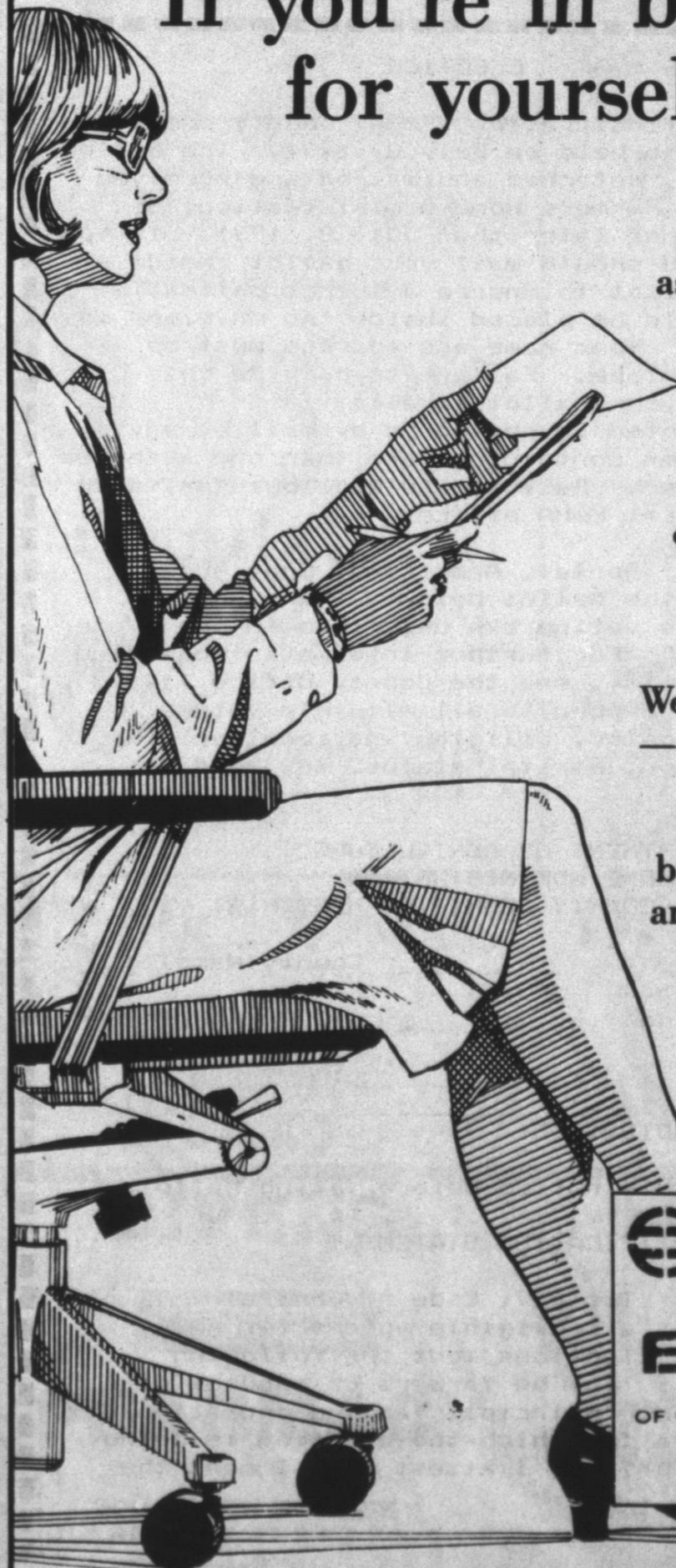

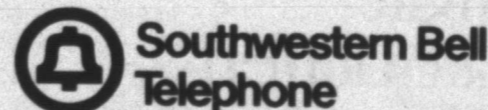
Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers, approximately 155,000 business customers, approximately 500 private pay telephone owners and all customers who make Directory Assistance calls from public pay telephones.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. 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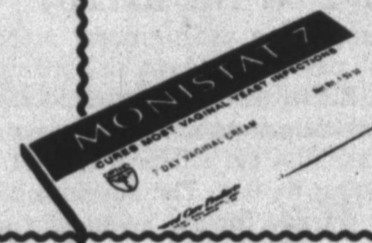
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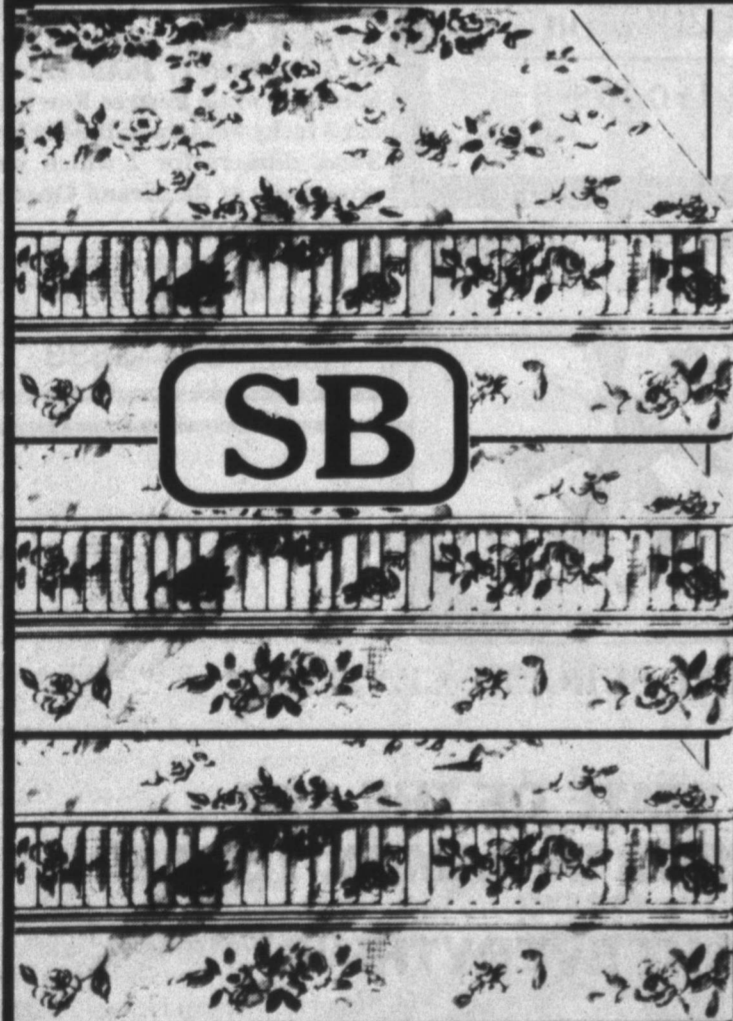

ground utility cables, and irrigation pipe, direct consumption and smothering of forage by earthen

mounds; and change in species composition on rangelands by providing seedbeds (mounds) for invading annual plants. Gophers damage trees by stem girdling and

clipping, root pruning, and possibly root exposure caused by burrowing. Gopher mounds dull and plug sicklebars when harvesting hay or alfalfa. Alfalfa may be killed or the vigor of the plant reduced by pocket gophers feeding on the roots.

Pocket gophers feed on plants in three ways; they may go to the surface, venturing only a body length or so from their tunnel opening to feed on above ground vegetation, they feed on roots that they encounter when digging and they pull vegetables into their tunnel from below. Pocket gophers eat herbs, grasses, shrubs, and trees.

Storm Preparation Should Include 'Defensive' Measures

Spring weather has brought lightning, thunderstorms, hail and tornados have been active across Texas in recent weeks.

Although farmers can't change weather patterns, they can use certain defensive measures to "tame" lightning. Storms destroy many farm buildings, livestock and human lives annually.

Farmers and ranchers can equip their houses and buildings with and approved lightning protection system. However, these systems should be planned and installed only by persons who have the necessary training and equipment. For best results, make certain the system is approved by Underwriters Laboratories and is inspected on a regular basis.

Rural families and farm laborers should be attentive to weather advisories. When a thunderstorm is predicted, they should have a safety plan and follow it.

"Avoid trees, metal buildings, wire fences, telephone poles, tractors and anything else that might serve as a conductor of electricity," said Thomas D. Valco, agricultural safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"If inside an unprotected home, stay away from windows, doors, metal objects and appliances. Don't talk on the telephone during an electrical storm."

The safety expert said if you

are caught outside and begin to feel the hair on your head stand on end or your skin tingle, lightning may be about to strike.

"In this event, crouch down at once, bend forward, and place your hands on your knees. You must not be the tallest object in a field or area," he warned.

If you are in an automobile or truck and trying to reach home during a torrential rain, don't attempt to drive through swift water that may be pouring across your road, he cautioned.

"With poor visibility during a storm, it is difficult to judge how deep the water is -- and your vehicle may stall," he said. "Often, a wall of water hits suddenly and sweeps away any

stalled vehicles. Pull over to the side of the road and remain in your car on high ground until the flood water recedes. But do not touch any metal parts of the car during the storms."

Valco said in an age when we often feel a false sense of security against the forces of nature, we must realize that lightning kills more Americans annually than either hurricanes or tornados.

"It is important to instruct children about the dangers of lightning," he said. "Even a young child should be taught to stay out of water during storms, and if they are playing outside to hurry indoors."

When the turbulent weather subsides, other farm electrical safety measures should be checked.

Most rural homes are served by electrical power that is usually carried by overhead lines, which can be deadly if accidentally touched by people working at ground level.

"Always use extreme care when moving or positioning long ladders," Valco said. "Use great care when installing or taking down a television or radio antenna. Better yet, call your power company for assistance."

During normal weather, correct any sagging farmstead power lines, particularly those over driveways where tall equipment might be moved.

"Installing lines underground is a good safety option, provided the route is mapped and no heavy equipment cuts through the buried lines," Valco said.

Scientists Visit Clarendon

Did Coronado come through Clarendon? Five distinguished scientists, representing the Coronado Trail Association, and financed by the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation and the Amarillo Area Foundation, were in Clarendon last week to investigate that very possibility. The group included Don Blakeslee, Waldo R. and Mildred Wedel and their son Waldo M., and Jack T. Hughes.

The Coronado Trail Association has been formed to further Coronado studies, and specifically to establish a corridor along which Francisco Vasquez de Coronado might have led his expedition 450 years ago. The group hopes that more extensive research may help to counter a report by the National Park Service which has recently recommended against establishing an official Coronado Trail. The main objection of the NPS is that much of the route has not been clearly established, especially through the Texas Panhandle.

As far as Clarendon is concerned, Hughes points out an interesting sidelight. One of the narratives declares that when the expedition left Pecos Pueblo in New Mexico, they traveled 100 leagues east and 50 leagues south. Written after the fact, this is thought to be an as-the-crow-flies description, rather than indicating daily tramping along. Hughes points out that these men were educated aristocrats who had taken long sea voyages and were perfectly accustomed to reckoning in this manner.

Taking a ruler and drawing lines on a map, Hughes found those parameters converging at present-day Floydada, the probable site of the first barranca.

When Coronado reached the second barranca, which many believe to have been the Palo Duro Canyon, he took about 30 men and headed north for Quivira. (The rest of the expedition returned to New Mexico). Another line, from Floydada to the fork where Coronado is believed to have crossed the Arkansas River, goes right through Clarendon.

Although this does not necessarily mean that Coronado rode down the center of present-day Kearney street, it certainly means that he could have. He may well have been following the major north-south Indian trails, one of which was located east of the badlands of Mulberry Creek. It would have crossed the Prairie Dog Town fork of the Red River south of Clarendon, then gone on to the sweet water of Carroll Creek. These are the age-old trails followed by nineteenth-century explorers and military men such as Marcy and McKenzie, and there is every possibility that Coronado took the same route.

Last week's investigators were led by Blakeslee, chairman of the Department of Anthropology at Wichita State University and president of the Coronado Trail Association. He has done extensive work in Indian Trails.

Waldo R. Wedel, Archaeologist Emeritus of the Smithsonian Institution, often called the Dean of Plains Archaeology, is credited with establishing Lyons, Kansas, as the site of Quivira. His wife Mildred is an Ethnohistorian Research Associate in the Department of Anthropology at the Smithsonian, specializing in French explorations.

Waldo M. Wedel is the photographer for the group. He is Technical Director of U.S. West Advanced Technologies in Boulder, Colorado.

Their guide in the area is Jack T. Hughes, retired professor of Anthropology at West Texas State University and long-time curator of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum. A geo-archaeologist, Hughes is the most-widely recognized authority on panhandle geomorphology and culture.

While in Clarendon, the scientists had barbecue at Sam Hill's, and were guests in the home of Beryl Cain Roper, library director of Clarendon

College and vice-president of Clarendon Archeological Society. Roper is the editor and publisher of "In the Light of Past Experience: Papers in Honor of Jack T. Hughes," published by her Aquamarine Press in Clarendon in 1989. She declines to take credit for the thunderstorm which kept the group confined to her basement most of the evening.

AUGUST 10, 1991

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

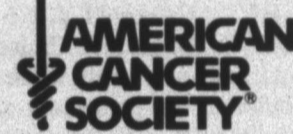



Also, the rates for certain combinations of Custom Calling Features (Call Waiting, Call Forwarding, Three-Way Calling and Speed Calling-8) would increase or decrease depending upon the combination of features. In addition, the company proposes to obsolete the optional Custom Calling Service feature Speed Calling 30 for residence customers except for existing customers at their existing locations. Most of the Company's residence customers in Texas who subscribe to one or more of the Custom Calling Service features will be affected by the proposed rate restructuring. It is expected that the proposed rate restructuring of Custom Calling Services will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.9 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. The restructuring will result in an increase in the Custom Calling Services rates for approximately 2.5 million residence customers and rate decreases for approximately 15,000 residence customers. Also, the obsolescence of the optional feature Speed Calling 30 will affect approximately 156,000 residence customers.
