Local Voters Reminded of Consolidation Election of Duffau School District

Monday, March 22, is the date set for the consolidation election of the Duffau school district. Each and every voter should vote in this election. The subject of consolidation has been a main topic of discussion in Hico for many years. It should be the responsibility of every citizen to make an effort to vote in this election. The qualifications for voting in this election are: 1. Must be a citizen of the United States at least one year preceding the date of election. 2. Must have resided in the school district at least six months prior to the election date. 3. Must have paid his 1958 poll tax prior to January 31, 1958, if he was liable for poll tax. (Persons who are blind or deaf or dumb or are permanently disabled, or have lost one hand or foot. A person who became 21 years of age after Jan. 1, 1958, and before the day of the election is not liable for poll tax. A person who is more than 60 years old is also not liable for poll tax.)

Rodent Control Demonstration Slated By Bosque F. B.

Rodent control demonstrations are scheduled for March 18, 19 and 20 for Bosque County. You will have an opportunity to see on these dates the latest methods of controlling rats on your place. The Farm Bureau, the Fish & Wildlife Service, and the Extension Service through County Agent Wayne Davis and the 4-H Clubs, all have joined together to bring this program to your community.

Mr. Bob Aday of the Fish and Wildlife Service, will demonstrate how to rid your place of rats both by good management program and by the use of the latest poisons. Thursday, March 20: 9:30 a.m., Fred Vickrey farm, Valley Mills; 2:00 p.m., Perney Downey farm, Valley Mills; 4:00 p.m., W. B. Oswald ranch, Clifton.

Third Grade Visits Telephone Office Last Monday

The past two weeks the third grade group has been studying the many ways the telephone helps us. Each student has learned the proper way to answer the telephone. They have observed the following rules when answering the telephone:

1. Give your name.
 2. Keep your lips about an inch or two from the mouthpiece.
 3. Hold the receiver lightly against your ear.
 4. Speak in your natural voice and pronounce your words clearly.
 5. Unless you have a good reason to be in a hurry, let the person you called say "Good-bye" first.
- These students have been using toy telephones at school to practice correct procedures while making telephone calls. They have made a Third Grade Telephone Directory listing each child's name alphabetically, and their telephone number. One child serves as telephone "operator" and puts through calls. Other children pose as "roving reporters" in search of news.

They try to observe these rules in making telephone calls:

1. Get the number of the person whom you wish to call.
2. Ring your telephone once. Lift the receiver to your ear. When the operator asks for the number you want, say it clearly and slowly.
3. When someone answers the telephone, give your name. Do not say, "Who is this?" If you are not already talking to the person you want, ask for him.

Last Monday the entire grade and their teacher visited the local telephone office to observe first hand just what an operator does, how the switchboard is operated, how long distance calls are made, and many other things. One of the things that impressed the students was the Calculagraph, a machine that measures the time of long distance calls. The group was surprised to learn that the Hico community has over 500 telephones in operation. Mrs. Wilena Strepy, chief operator, explained how the monthly bills were made up and mailed out. Miss Ira Cunningham and Miss Journey, who were operating the switchboard explained how calls were received and connected. Some children made phone calls to their homes from the telephone office.

Hale-Aikin Committee Will Distribute Questionnaires Locally

Local residents will receive a questionnaire within the next few days from the local committee heads of the current school study being carried out state-wide. Four phases of school operation will be included on the questionnaires.

Parents and other interested people in the Hico District are urged to fill out the blanks and return to the school as soon as possible. Opinion questions only are included on the fact sheets, with the purpose of the study being to better acquaint patrons with the problems of their school.

Before an operating loan for adjustment purposes is closed, the applicant and the county supervisor agree on the proposed long-time improvement. At the beginning of each farming year while the loan is being repaid, the family, with Mr. Spence's help, makes annual plans for the best use of the farm income and to determine additional credit needs. A year-end review of the past year's successes and mistakes guides the family and the county supervisor when they get together to plan for the year coming up.

Mr. Spence said he can make operating loans only to families who have or can acquire land and labor resources needed to help them improve their farming, and who are presently unable to turn to private or cooperative lenders for adequate financing of the type they require. All borrowers graduate to conventional credit as soon as they can.

The Hico boys will fight it out with Kopperl and Walnut Springs for top honors as it looks at this time.

The Hico boys were coached by Ray Taylor, and the girls coach was A. A. Chandler. Both coaches are looking forward to next season as prospects are very promising.

The majority of schools in this area will be represented at the meeting, which is held annually.

Operating Credit Extended to Farmers in Hamilton County

This is the time of year when Hamilton County farm families plan the steps they need to take to increase the efficiency of their farming operations during the coming season reports A. J. Spence Jr., Farmers Home Administration county supervisor.

The agency advances operating credit primarily to help eligible farm families make improved use of their land and labor resources on family-type farms and make needed changes in their farming systems. Most of the changes call for adopting better farming practices and improving the efficiency of their farming operations. The loans help farmers pay for equipment, livestock, feed, seed, fertilizer and other farm and home operating needs including refinancing chattel debts. Operating loans run from 1 to 7 years at 5 per cent interest. The average operating loan in Hamilton County is \$5000.

Mr. Spence said the bulk of the operating loan money in this area is being used for equipment and livestock. Many of the changes in farming systems are resulting in better dairy herds, more dependable pasture, better grades of livestock and higher livestock production.

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Dates for Hico's Annual FFA Stock Show were set last week by Chapter members and their advisor, Harold Walker. The show will be held this year on Friday, March 28. In the past the show has been held on Thursday, but due to several conflicts the day was moved to Friday. The popular affair will be held at Hico City Park.

Approximately \$375 in cash awards will go to winners in the various divisions, plus ribbons to all winners. Divisions of entry listed by Walker this week are Beef Cattle, Dairy, Sheep, Goats, Swine, Poultry, and the always popular Dog Division.

Judging of the various divisions will begin at 10 a.m., and will be concluded by 4 p.m. An auction sale of local projects will be held immediately following the judging, and several local projects will be offered.

Entries in the show last year fell shy of the record 300 of the year before, but the official list still showed a total of 190, which was considered very good. With fair weather for the next two weeks, the entry list could top the previous record.

Dairy Meeting Set Monday Night, Mar. 17, At Hamilton REA

A dairy meeting on artificial breeding, has been set for Monday night, March 17, at 8 o'clock in the REA Building at Hamilton, according to an announcement received by A. J. Spence Jr. of Farmers Home Administration.

A Technician will be present with slides and other data. There will also be dairymen present who are now engaged in this program, to discuss their experiences.

Each person in this area who is interested in the dairy industry is urged to attend this meeting.

School Census for Area Shows Decline

Local School Lunch Program Is Big Business; Cost to Patrons Small

The Hico school lunch room serves an outstanding need in our local school. An average of two hundred and fifty students and teachers are fed daily. With the aid of surplus commodities the school has been able to stay in the clear by charging 25c for students through the third grade, and 25c for all others for lunches.

In addition to the small charge made to students and teachers the federal government subsidizes each Class A lunch with milk 5 cents, and each Class A lunch without milk 3 cents.

By a Class A lunch we mean a well balanced lunch. Menus are recommended by the government and consists of meat or a meat substitute, vegetables, salad, dessert, and milk. Each student is allowed two one-half pints of milk with the lunch and may, after eating some of everything on the plate, go back for seconds as many

times as he wishes. Foremost Dairies of Fort Worth made the low bid on milk this year and serve the school daily.

Financing the lunch room this year has been a problem due to the ever rising prices of groceries and fewer commodities being made available by the federal government. Groceries are bought from local merchants at near retail prices.

The lunch room is a self-sustaining department of the school. Several years ago students were asked to bring their lunch, eat in the lunch room, or go home for their lunches. This is done for three reasons; first, it enables us to feed more students which means volume. The more volume the cheaper the cost for students. Second, discipline cannot be controlled where students are not supervised. Third, and perhaps the most important reason, students

need the experience and teaching that the lunch room situation offers. We find that students will come nearer eating a balanced meal under lunch room conditions than they will if allowed to choose what they eat. It is sure that the students do not always like all that is served. It is an impossibility to prepare something that two hundred and fifty students would like. We do feel, however, that it will consist of a balanced meal served in a comfortable and attractive dining room.

Students and parents have been very cooperative and this is certainly appreciated by the cooks and administration. Parents are urged to visit the lunch room at any time. By us all working together we can continue to have a very attractive lunch program, and one that we can afford.

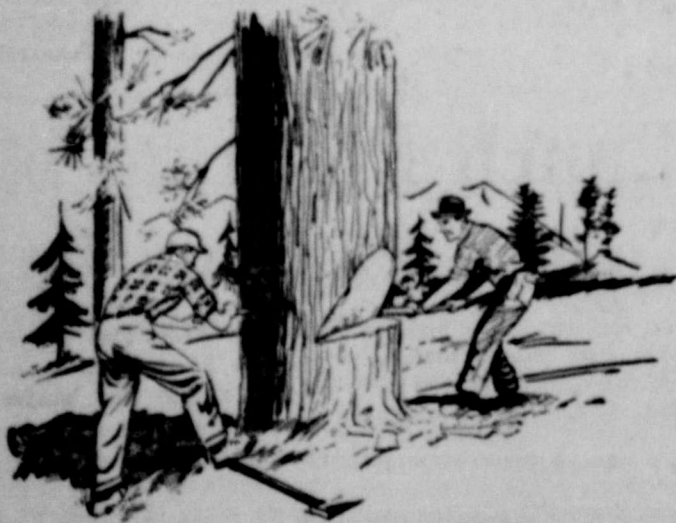

Warden Reports

By C. H. JOHNSON

Well, the weekend fooled us again this week. I thought Friday we were going to have one of those good fishing weekends and got my boat all ready to go Sat-urday and sure was disappointed when I saw how the day turned out. I guess we are all getting the fishing fever too early and are expecting spring to get here before it is supposed to.

In the past I have discussed several of our Texas mammals, and from what I have heard most of you readers seem anxious to learn about them. So this week I think I will tell you a little about the skunk family of Texas.

We have about seven species of this family living in Texas so I won't have enough space to tell about every one of them but will tell you a little about all of them.

1. The Prairie Spotted Skunk—A small, weasel-like skunk about the size of a half grown house cat; weight of adult, one-two pounds. While little is known of their breeding habits, mating is said to take place in late winter, and the young are reported to be 2-6 in number. Economically these skunks have a spotty record. While they consume many in-sects, they may do damage to game and poultry.

2. Gulf Spotted Skunk—Distri-bution: Eastern Texas and Gulf area. The little are far less num-erous in Texas than their big relatives. The popular name for the animal in Texas—civet cat—is wrongly applied, for the true civet is a member of a different family of animals, restricted to the Old World. The habits of the Gulf Spotted Skunk are similar to those of the Prairie Spotted Skunk. Circumstantial evidence on our bobwhite quail experimen-tal areas maintained in Walker County back in 1937 indicated the spotted skunk is a potential depredator on quail. The animal is fond of poultry also.

3. Rio Grande Spotted Skunk—Distribution: Central, western, and southern parts of the State. The spotted skunk feeds mainly on insects, including moths, bugs, ants, wasps, fly larvae, and beetles. Spiders, isopods and centipedes are also taken. In winter a few hackberries are consumed, and one had consumed a cotton-tail rabbit.

4. Long-Tailed or Broad-Striped Skunk—Weight of adults, 6-8 pounds. Distribution, in suitable localities throughout the State. We know of no locality in Texas where the striped skunk is not relatively common. The females, most of which in March and April were carrying young, had nests of grass and leaves. The males, for the most part, had none. Striped skunks are largely insectivorous in habit. We found them espe-cially fond of grasshoppers, with ants, beetles, true bugs, spiders, and some wasps consumed on oc-casion. Birds, small mammals and lizards are rarely taken. In winter when other items are scarce, the skunk takes quantities of hack-berries and even some juniper berries. In late summer it some-times fills up on grass. There is some evidence that the skunk destroys wild turkey nests when these are located in thick vegeta-tion.

5. Hooded Skunk—Distribution: Recorded from Texas on the basis of three specimens from the Da-vis Mountains. The limits of range of the hooded skunk in Texas remain to be determined. Quite possibly it occurs over a consid-erable area in the southern Trans-Pecos region.

6. Texas Hog Nosed Skunk—Description, medium-sized; weight of adult, 5-10 pounds. Distribu-tion, Brownsville area. Its habits are similar to those of other hog-nosed skunks.

7. Mountain Hog-Nosed Skunk —Distribution, South-Central part of the State, also found in Lib-erty, Hardin and Jasper Counties (and vicinity) in the Big Thicket region. The leading items in its diet at all times of the year are insects. This menu is varied oc-casionally with isopods, centi-pedes, scorpions, snails, and liz-ards. Occasionally the skunks feed on cottontails. Plant food is not abundant; items include grassy material, mulberries, cactus fruit, hackberries and Mex-ican persimmon.

Hoping this run-down on the skunks will give you a little broad-er view in what they eat and the good that they do, and that the

next time you see one off in the field looking for insects, you won't be in too big a hurry to kill this animal. Remember, please prac-

tice predator control and not the complete extermination of a spe-cies. Yours truly, SWEDE.

On the Home Range

BASIC CLOTHING WORKSHOP

This is the week that our Basic Clothing Workshops begin. In fact when this goes to press we will have had our first meeting. The enrollment has been almost overwhelming. I could not begin to handle the group who requested to enroll. It is hoped that this school will be repeated in a few months.

Perhaps if you are one of the disappointed ones then you can attend the next one. It is also possible too that you could receive your instruction from one of the women who is attending this school since each of them will be teaching others. Two schools will be going at the same time. One in Hico and one in Hamilton. More about this later.

APPLIANCE DANGER SIGNALS

Save yourself personal injuries, fires and damage by learning to recognize signals household appliances give when they're not performing as they should. Here are some of the warning signals:

1. Dimming of house lights or slowing of heating appliances when motors start may mean that the circuits are overloaded. This could cause a fire.

2. When a fuse blows the circuit may be overloaded or there may be a short in the appliance. Chances are too many appliances are on the circuit at one time. Be sure the fuse is the right one for size of wiring. If the fuse will let more power through than the wiring can safely carry, it is not a

safety device. Overheated wires damages motors and fires can result if the wrong fuse is used.

3. "On-off" blinking periods usually mean there's a loose connection somewhere in the appliance. May not be serious, but it should be repaired before a more serious problem develops.

4. "Tingle" or slight shock when handling an appliance or switch is a sign that trouble is brewing. Inspect for loose wires or damaged insulation.

5. Crumbling of rubber insulation on lamp or appliance cords can eventually expose electric wires. This can cause a short-circuit, or make metal lamp bases a serious shock hazard. Replace worn cords with new ones.

Keep these danger signals in mind, and act when they occur.

HOW ABOUT FRENCH TOAST FOR A CHANGE?

Is that New Year's resolution to serve the family a good breakfast beginning to waver some? If so the difficulty may be due to a lack of menu variety. Perhaps the family insists that breakfast isn't breakfast without toast and eggs, and how does one vary this "order"? The French have had the answer for ages—it's French toast — a thrifty, tasty dish now with myriad versions. Some culinary legends attribute its creation to the skill of German or Spanish cooks, while others have called it Nun's Toast.

Whatever the name, it is basically a dish made by dipping bread into an egg and milk mixture, then frying the slices until they are golden brown. From enriched bread to whole wheat or English muffins, the entire gamut of breads, in fact, they are all ideal for this best-ever breakfast dish. Here are some variations from the simple French toast:

CHEESE FRENCH TOAST
2 eggs beaten slightly
Two-thirds cup milk
One-fourth teaspoon salt
8 slices enriched bread
One-fourth cup shortening
1 cup grated sharp cheese
Combine beaten eggs, milk and salt in a shallow bowl. Melt shortening in a skillet. Dip bread slices into egg mixture, turning them to coat both sides. Brown bread on

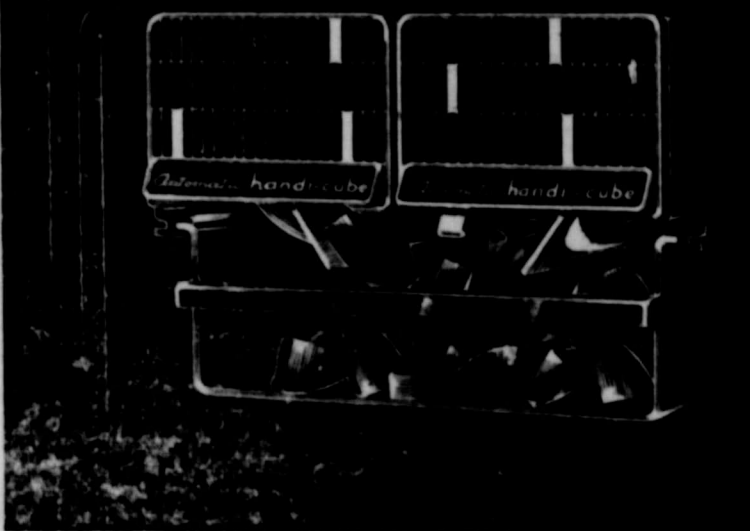

Former Texan Enjoys Easy Going of Brazil

Everyday living is fine in Sao Paulo, reports a visiting Texan who has spent the last six weeks in this fastest growing city in the world.

Mrs. Tom Wolfe, houseguest of Mrs. Fred Horn, 3132 West 10th, Dallas, hands the palm to her home city despite the fact that dinner parties frequently blacked out for lack of electricity.

The visitor, a native of Worth, and her husband who hails from Hico, live in a rather spacious house in the South American with their two children, Ken, 10, and James, 4.

Mrs. Wolfe said in an interview last week. "It's very cosmopolitan, the architecture is quite magnificent. The city lacks picturesque charm of Rio, but everyday living we are grateful to be there."

She is on a shopping spree, which she considers a chore of her vacation to the states each two years.

Mrs. Wolfe says that there are many of North Americans in Brazil, along with many other nationalities. A large number are employees of Anderson-Clayton Company including her husband.

Among her Brazilian friends are those whose ancestors were Confederate during the Civil War. She found post-war life in Brazil impossible and fled to Sao Paulo. "Some of them died here without ever learning Portuguese, clinging on to Southern traditions," she said.

Today's Sao Paulo is a booming city with buildings shooting up almost overnight, reports the visitor. And she speculates that some day come tumbling down, since they use no steel reinforcements in spite of unbelievable progress.

Mrs. Wolfe says that growth in the city has not helped the extreme poverty, rather has intensified the problem with inflation.

It has amazed me to see so many survive on a diet of beans and rice, and even now, rice is going way up in price. Hundreds of people never even think of having meat to eat," she said.

There is hardly a middle class here, explained Mrs. Wolfe. There's a class of elegantly gowned Brazilian women who wear their skirts and blouses and their clothing from the markets where she also buys her groceries. She says that the Brazilian businessmen have often been compared with the "get up and go Texan" but an overall description of the people would be "easy going."

On the other hand, European and Asian refugees usually have a thriving business soon after arrival.

There communism sometimes is mixed with strikes. There is seldom any evidence of anti-North American feeling.

"We live pretty much like you here," said Mrs. Wolfe. "We have our woman's club. We're adding to the church. We have private schools comparable to schools in the states, and we have public schools."

CLEARING UP A FEW POINTS IN THE EGG LAW

The Texas Egg Law has been in effect since February 17th, and already the Texas Department of Agriculture is being flooded with questions concerning its various points.

Greatest concern seems to be whether ungraded eggs can now be sold in the state. Yes! Ungraded eggs can still be sold, but they must be clearly marked "ungraded" on the package or carton.

Just because eggs have not been graded, it does not mean that the eggs are of poor quality. On the contrary, a display of ungraded eggs may contain a mixture of all egg grades. However, the eggs must be of edible quality or they cannot be offered for sale.

Another point causing some confusion is the fact that certain descriptive terms cannot be printed on egg cartons or used in advertising.

Any eggs below the quality of Grade A must not be labeled as "fresh," "selected," "henhery," "newlaid," "infertile," "cage," or other words of similar import. These terms are confusing and sometimes mislead the consumer on eggs of lower quality. Unless some bans were placed on descriptive phrases for eggs under Grade A, then "fancy phrases" might be used to camouflage the true condition or quality of the product.

And finally, retail egg sellers do not have to renew their license from the Texas Department of Agriculture each year. The retailer's license is good indefinitely until it is recalled, cancelled or revoked.

For other segments of the in- dustry however, licenses run only from Sept. 1 through Aug. 31 of the following year. Those required to have a license include: dealers, wholesalers, processors, and brok- ers.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Thursday of last week, Lynn Kirby, member of the Vista Valley 4-H Club, exhibited her Delaine sheep in the San Angelo livestock show. In the ram lamb class she took first and second place and in the yearling ram class her ram placed fourth.

Her first place ram lamb went on to be judged reserve champion ram of the show. In the ewe lamb class she placed second and third and sixth. In the group of three head she showed two rams and one ewe and placed first with the group.

People around the San Angelo country are feeling mighty good now that they have had lots of rain through the winter. Around Rowena and Miles, bedded fields are standing in water just like they are around here.

The annual Cage Clinic will be held again this year at College Station on Wednesday, March 14. This clinic is of special interest to those who are operating cage raising hens. A group will again go from the county.

Quite a number are planning to use commercial fertilizers this year under some of their crops. Before fertilizers are bought, one should look at the analysis on the tag and see if the same amount of plant nutrients can be bought cheaper. A hundred pound bag of 5-10-5 fertilizer contains five lbs. of nitrogen, ten pounds phosphorus and five pounds of potash. A hundred pound bag of 10-20-10 contains twice the amount of plant nutrients. Chances are that the bag of 10-20-10 will cost more per ton, but it is likely to be cheaper when figured on the total amount of plant nutrients. Might be advisable to give this some consideration when making plans to purchase your fertilizer.

On small grains, fertilizers should be applied before the grain joints and on row crops like corn and grain sorghums, good results are obtained when some fertilizer is applied at planting time and then side-dressed at about thirty days after the plants are up.

With the wet weather we are having, rose growers might be on the look-out for black spot and powdery mildew. Black spots in the disease that causes large roundish, black spots with irregular or frayed margins on the soft twigs and leaves. Powdery mildew causes a white powdery coating on the leaves, buds and young stems. A sulphur-copper dust mixture, 90 parts sulphur and 10 parts copper makes a good control for these two for early season use. Use this as a preventative treatment. Dust once a week except during hot dry weather. It might burn if used then.

Leptospirosis, a disease which causes cattle and hogs to lose their unborn calves and pigs, is causing heavy losses. With the spring pig crop coming on, it is advisable to be looking out for this trouble. If the infection hits during mid-pregnancy, it usually causes the loss of pigs or birth of weak ones. If you are suspicious of this check with your veterinarian.

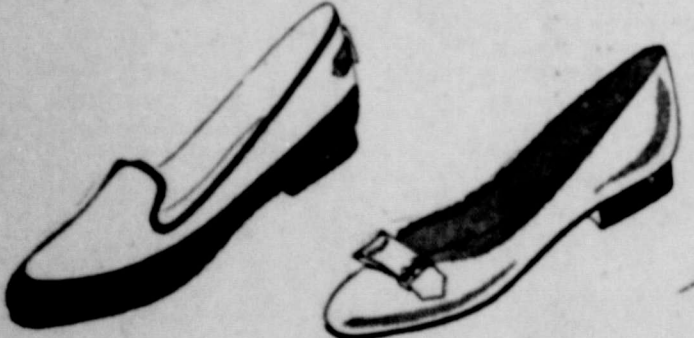
