Nicaragua riots leave 13 dead

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — Thirteen persons were reported killed in riots and gun battles following a new refusal by dictator Anastasio Somoza to resign before his term ends in 1981.

About 50 others were wounded. Somoza's National Guard arrested hundreds more.

Three of the dead and two of the wounded were students cut down Monday night by troops firing machine guns and rifles at 1,000 anti-Somoza demonstrators marching out of the University of Nicaragua campus, witnesses said.

The protesters had been driven back into the campus half an hour earlier by the guardsmen shooting over their heads and lobbing tear gas. A second attempt to march from the campus set off the direct attack, the witnesses said.

About half the demonstrators scattered during the shooting, but 500 others fled back to the campus. After several hours of negotiations the guardsmen promised not to shoot them and let them go home.

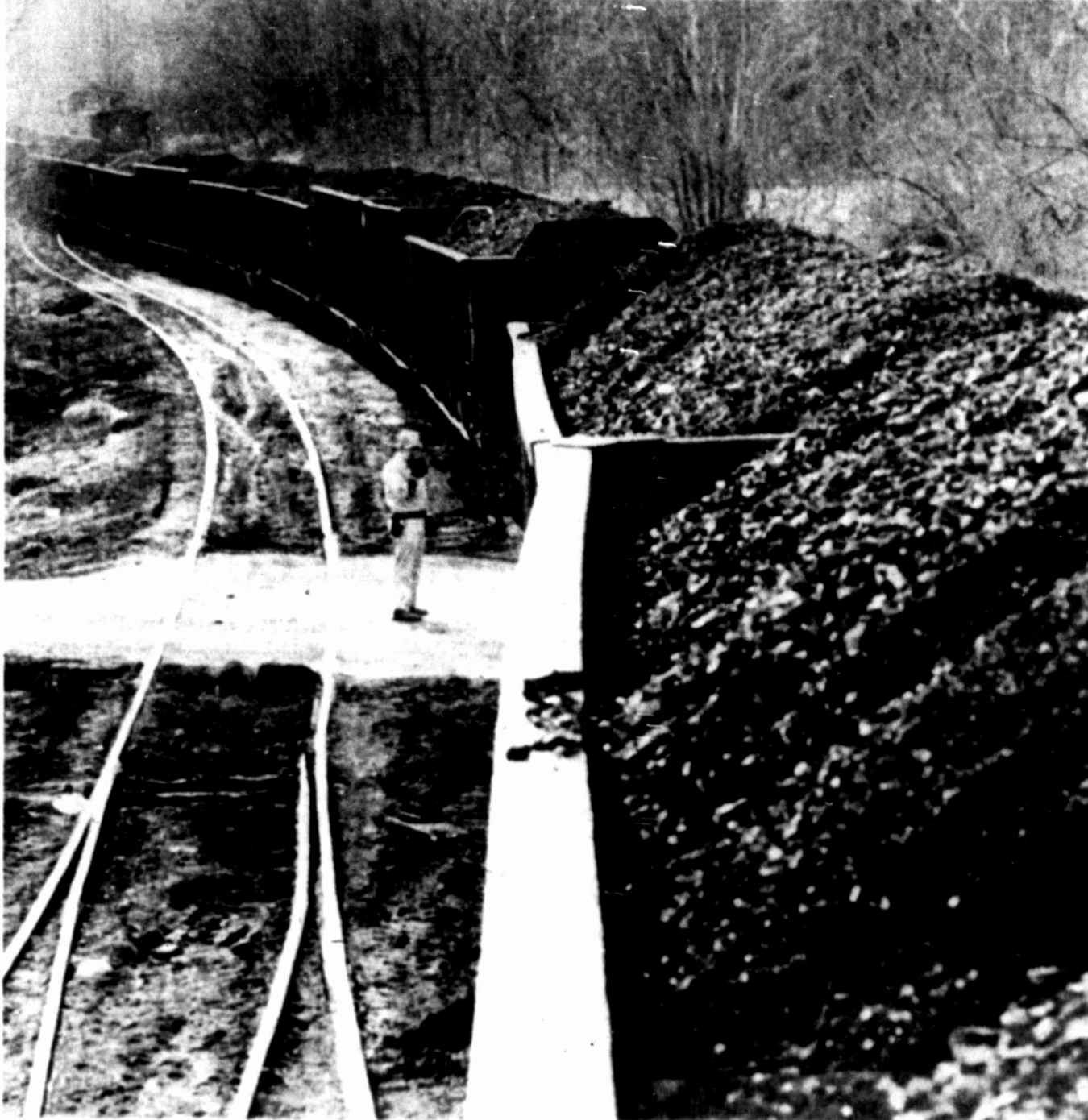
Seven guerrillas were killed and 15 wounded in fighting earlier in the day in the anti-government stronghold of Diriamba, 37 miles south of Managua, police said.

An eighth fatality was identified as a soldier. The two other dead reported were not identified.

Fifteen more persons were reported wounded in a gunfight between government forces and guerrillas in Masaya, 21 miles southeast of here. The National Guard cordoned off both Diriamba and Masaya and cut telephone connections with them.

Anti-Somoza demonstrations were reported in the cities of Rivas, Leon, Boaco, and Chinandega.

Carlota Potosme, a resident of an Indian neighborhood called Monimbo in Masaya, said machine-gun fire and teargas bombardment by the National Guard was almost continuous Monday. The Monimbo Indians raided a weapons warehouse last week and took on guardsmen in an all-night shootout, and Mrs. Potosme said she saw a pickup truck loaded with weapons arrive at Monimbo.

New judge's salary placed at \$22,733

Midland County commissioners Monday set the base salary of newly appointed County Court at Law Judge Willie DuBose at \$22,733 — the same as that now received by County Judge Barbara Culver.

Judge DuBose also will receive \$100 a month for being a member of the county juvenile board. Judge Culver receives \$150 a month for being juvenile board chairman and juvenile judge.

The salary was set in a 3 to 1 vote, with lone Republican County Commissioner Win Brown voting against the motion. Brown said after the meeting he still does not think DuBose should have been appointed, and called the move "cronyism."

The three Democratic commissioners voted to approve the salary with little discussion. A few moments before, the commissioners had adjourned their meeting, but they reconvened after a media representative asked about DuBose's salary.

DuBose was appointed to the court Feb. 13, the same date the commissioners voted to activate the court, which had been authorized by the Legislature.

The appointment sparked political controversy in Midland. Salary for

the post became an issue when DuBose said he did not think the \$22,000 salary written into the budget was enough. And Commissioner Durward Wright predicted the Commissioners Court would meet with DuBose and "negotiate" the salary.

DuBose was not present at the Monday commissioners' meeting.

A scheduled appearance by Sheriff Dallas Smith before the commissioners to discuss variances to be presented to the Texas Commission on Jail Standards was postponed. Smith told the commissioners he had not received all of the material from the jail commission that he needs to put together his report.

At Monday's meeting, the commissioners heard a proposal from the Communications Corporation of America for a new county telephone system.

Charles Sutton, representing the company, told the court the CCA system, with an extra console for the switchboard operator, will save the county \$96,293 during the next 10 years over the present Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. system the county has.

The commissioners asked Sutton to check into the needs of the sheriff's

Carter behind back-to-basics in education

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter is expected to give a new push to the back-to-basics movement in the schools as he unveils his plan for renewing the government's biggest aid to education program.

The president was sending Congress today his proposals for

extending the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

His education message also was expected to contain new details on his promise to create a separate Department of Education.

Joseph A. Califano Jr., secretary of health, education and welfare, said

last month that the president's plan would include "a tremendous focus on the three R's."

The government's renewed emphasis on the "three R's" — reading, writing and arithmetic — is a response to mounting public concern that high school graduates are

demonstrating basic learning deficiencies that make it difficult for them to function as adults.

Alarm has been expressed over evidence that too many students can't balance a checkbook, fill out forms or write coherent letters.

Carter already has revealed in his fiscal 1979 budget proposals that he would seek to increase the Office of Education's budget to \$11.6 billion, up from \$10.4 billion in the current year.

Spending on elementary and secondary education was slated to rise 15 percent to \$6.9 billion, including a \$644 million increase in Title I grants for disadvantaged children.

The Title I budget of nearly \$3.4 billion for fiscal 1979 is aimed at providing compensatory education for disadvantaged children.

The administration has indicated that it wants to change the Title I formula somewhat to help those schools most in need.

Califano has said that more Title I

funds should go to high schools despite declining test scores and high dropout rates among students receiving compensatory education there.

About 6.5 million children currently are aided by the federal programs for the disadvantaged.

U.S. Commissioner of Education Ernest Boyer said \$400 million of the \$644 million Title I increase would go for "new initiatives which could improve educational opportunities for nearly 870,000 additional disadvantaged children."

The administration also has proposed boosting federal educational aid for the handicapped to \$972 million, an increase of \$279 million.

The administration has taken a strong stand against a move in Congress to provide tax credits to offset tuition paid by the parents of private school children.

Horton gets permanent injunction

Midland oil man Ray K. Horton has taken a step toward settling his problems with Texas Attorney General John Hill by agreeing with Hill to a permanent injunction ordering Horton to pay more than \$600,000 restitution and not to engage in deceptive trade practices.

Hill's office announced late Monday afternoon that it had approved the permanent injunction against Horton, doing business as Wallace Oil Co.

The permanent injunction replaces a temporary one agreed to in August, shortly after Hill brought suit against

Horton and others. That suit alleged the defendants had been involved in fraudulent sale of non-existing oil field steam cleaners.

Also involved in the suit were Midlander Frank J. Fuell and M. L. Copenhaver of Houston, as well as several other companies the three were connected with.

One of those companies, Growth Energy Inc., has begun bankruptcy proceedings in federal court in Midland.

Under the terms of the permanent injunction, tentatively entered by

142nd District Court Judge Perry D. Pickett on Feb. 15, Wallace Oil Co. will pay a total of \$604,545 in restitution to three companies with which it contracted for sale or lease of oil well equipment, \$4,000 to the state in civil penalties under the Deceptive Trade Practices Act and \$351 in court costs.

According to the Attorney General's Office, that amount is the total of current balances owed the three leasing companies and includes all credits and offsets, plus 6 percent interest from 1975 when contracts were signed until date of payment.

The three leasing companies are Borg-Warner Acceptance Corp.,

which is to receive \$320,266; Guardian Leasing Inc., which is scheduled to get \$145,962 and Western Lease-Banc, which is to receive \$138,317.

In his original petition filed in August, Hill charged the three defendants had contracted to sell or lease some 60 steam cleaners for a total of more than \$720,000 in contracts. Hill maintained the trans-

No Estes indictment

WICHITA FALLS (AP) — A federal grand jury investigating Billie Sol Estes will reconvene in Abilene in April after returning no indictments Monday against the convicted West Texas swindler.

The grand jury had subpoenaed Estes-related records from the Texas attorney general's office. A spokesman for Attorney General John Hill said Monday the office supplied the necessary documents but that no personnel were to appear.

Hill had said earlier he would supply information obtained in the state's investigation of Estes by his economic crime unit.

The Internal Revenue Service, the FBI and Postal Service are reportedly interested in Estes' alleged business dealings since his parole from federal prison. Estes now lives in Abilene.

Terms of his parole prohibit the one-time West Texas wheeler-dealer, who used phantom fertilizer tanks as collateral for multi-million dollar loans until he was caught in 1962, from engaging in any self-employed or promotional type activities.

He was sentenced in 1963 to 15 years in prison and was paroled in 1971 after serving six years.

The grand jury also investigated records of Ray Horton, a Midland businessman and longtime friend of Estes, and J.R. Patterson, a Houston real estate salesman and former Abilene businessman.

Television commercials for children FTC target

WASHINGTON (AP) — After months of anticipation, the federal government is ready to take on Tony the Tiger, Cap'n Crunch and other heroes of commercials for sugared cereals.

The clash between the Federal Trade Commission and television advertising aimed at children is being joined today as the FTC takes up staff proposals to sharply curtail such ads.

The commission has before it proposals to:

—Ban all television advertising directed at "very young" children.

—End advertisements aimed at children under age 12 for sugared products likely to cause tooth decay.

—Require that television advertising directed at children below that age for other sugared products be balanced by dental and nutritional messages.

Such controls are some time off, however. The staff recommended that the commission hold hearings on its proposals, a procedure that could take months.

And legal appeals from the cereal and broadcasting industries, which have been preparing legal defenses, could further delay the effect of commission action.

Commission Chairman Michael Pertschuk has said he is "convinced some action has to be taken" against

commercials for products with high sugar contents aimed at young children.

The average American child watches 20,000 television commercials a year and sees more ads for sugared foods than for any other product.

The staff, in recommending that all TV ads aimed at very young audiences be banned, said "the 30-second commercial is the most effective device yet invented for implanting any relatively simple idea in a child's mind."

The staff report said many young children can't differentiate between a

Carter plan for cities previewed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House is previewing its long-promised urban policy before the nation's governors and mayors amid signs that one provision already is sparking a city vs. state squabble.

Stuart Eizenstat, President Carter's chief domestic affairs adviser, and Housing and Urban Development Secretary Patricia Harris were presenting the policy to the governors today at their annual winter conference.

A delegation of mayors, led by Lee Alexander of Syracuse, N.Y., president of the mayors' conference, were to take a look at the policy at a White House meeting later in the day.

One key provision that already is provoking disagreement would cut some general revenue sharing funds to states while also giving states grants to encourage them to play a larger role in aiding ailing cities.

"The mayors are going to reject this," predicted an official at the U.S. Conference of Mayors. "They are going to be opposed to any new money for the states."

Officials of the National Governors Association have said the governors like the new grants, but don't like the idea of giving up revenue sharing dollars in exchange.

A draft of the state-urban sharing plan, a copy of which was obtained by

The Associated Press, shows the Carter administration intends to ask Congress for \$400 million in new money for the first year of the incentive program.

In the second year, the grants would rise to \$960 million, with \$460 million of that coming from a 20 percent reduction in revenue sharing payments to states. In the third year, the grant money would reach \$1.5 billion, but revenue sharing funds would be cut 50 percent.

The grant money will be competitive, going to the states that produce the best plans for applying the money to problems targeted in the new Carter urban program.

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Sentiment against Palestinians mounting in Egypt

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Anti-Palestinian feeling is running high in Egypt because of the assassination in Cyprus of one of Egypt's leading newspaper editors.

Sentiment is building up to abandon the Palestinian cause and

make a separate peace with Israel. The government took steps Monday to reduce the special tax and travel privileges of the 150,000 Palestinians living in Egypt.

The two killers of Al Ahram editor Youssef Sebaei were Palestinians, and Egyptian newspapers have played

up reports of Palestinian complicity in the gun battle in which 15 Egyptian commandos lost their lives at the Larnaca Airport.

Palestinian guerrillas are known to have been present at Larnaca. But there has been no proof that they joined the Cypriot National Guard

in firing on the commandos trying to storm the Cypriot plane in which the two assassins were holding 11 Arabs hostage.

However, if emotions continue to rise or there are new terrorist acts aimed at Egypt, observers say President Anwar Sadat could

divorce himself from the Palestine Liberation Organization and might be tempted to make a separate peace with Israel despite his repeated statements that he would not do that.

Ibrahim Saada, a columnist for the newspaper Akhbar el Yom, wrote that if it was proved that Palestinians were firing at the Egyptian commandos, "we would ask our government to immediately enter serious negotiations with the Israeli foe to restore Sinai alone."

A prominent political

science professor agreed, saying, "If Sadat wanted to make a separate agreement, this would be his chance."

The PLO condemned the murder of Sebaei and insisted the killers had no connection with it. But recent Egyptian editorials have been especially critical of the organization's leaders. This indicates that Egypt

may use the Cyprus incident to try to replace Yasser Arafat as PLO chairman or withdraw recognition of the PLO in favor of Palestinians in the West Bank of the Jordan River and the Gaza Strip.

However, Sadat has made no move so far to disassociate himself from the PLO or modify his insistence on the right of

self-determination for Palestinians as part of a peace settlement with Israel.

An undercurrent of anti-Palestinian sentiment has long existed in Egypt, based on the feeling that the PLO is ungrateful for the

sacrifices Egypt has made for their cause.

There was an upsurge of anti-Palestinian feeling when Syria and the PLO attacked Sadat as a traitor following his trip to Israel last November. Egypt closed down the Voice of Palestine radio

Mime troupe trial in limbo

BARCELONA, Spain (AP) — The Spanish army postponed the trial of six members of a leading theatrical troupe today on a technicality and under obvious pressure from the embarrased government of Premier Adolfo Suarez.

The army said it would not go ahead with the trial of the Catalan troupe of mimes called the Jugglers because all of the defendants were not present to answer the charges. But on Monday, after the director of the group escaped from police custody, it had said it would try those who did not show up in absentia.

After a lieutenant colonel announced the postponement, defense lawyer Jose Maria Loperena shouted that four of the six defendants were on hand and ready to stand trial.

A new trial date was not announced.

The director of the troupe, four actors and an actress had been ordered to stand trial under a Franco law authorizing the army to try civilians accused of offenses against the military. They were charged with insulting the armed forces in one of their pantomimes although the play was approved by the civilian minister of culture.

The indictment of the six in December touched off a nationwide theater strike. Political leaders in Barcelona appealed to

national police, who came to arrest him in a saloon. The play depicted him as a nonpolitical criminal put to death by the firing squad because of the Franco regime's anger over the assassination of Premier Luis Carrero Blanco by Basque separatists three months earlier.

Garroting is a medieval method of execution in which an iron collar is tightened on the condemned person until a spike severs the spinal cord.

The other five defendants were free on bail. The military prosecutor had said he would ask for a three-year sentence for each of them and 4½ years for Boadella.

Albert Boadella, the 34-year-old director of the troupe and the only defendant in custody, escaped Monday through a bathroom window at a hospital where he was held under police guard.

The prosecution of the troupe was ordered by Lt. Gen. Francisco Coloma Gallegos, the commander of the Barcelona military region. The play to which he objected, and which he never saw, was based on the army's execution by garroting of a Polish vagrant and a Spanish anarchist in 1974, while the general was Franco's army minister.

A military court sentenced the vagrant to death for killing a member of the Guardia Civil, the paramilitary

PHOENIX, Ariz. — A 30-year-old Kermit man wanted by Midland County Sheriff's Office in connection with the theft of an automobile was found stabbed to death here, Phoenix detectives said Monday.

George Thompson, head of the Midland sheriff's office criminal investigative division, said Monday afternoon that Phoenix police telephoned him earlier in the day.

According to Thompson, William Joseph Yates leased a car from Rogers Ford, 4200 W. Highway 80. Under the lease, the car should have been returned Jan. 28. On Feb. 20, charges were filed by Rogers Ford, Thompson said.

About 2 a.m. Jan. 28, Phoenix police were called to a Phoenix residence. According to a spokesman for the police, Yates had been stabbed following a domestic argument. He was taken to a Phoenix hospital, where he died.

Although Yates died Jan. 28, Phoenix police only recently discovered that the vehicle Yates was driving was stolen, and that Yates was wanted by Midland sheriff's deputies, Thompson said.

Charges of armed voluntary manslaughter were filed Jan. 31 in Phoenix against Pamela Yates.
