Iowa Park will meet Denver City at 2 p.m. Saturday on Snyder's Moffett Field for the Area title.

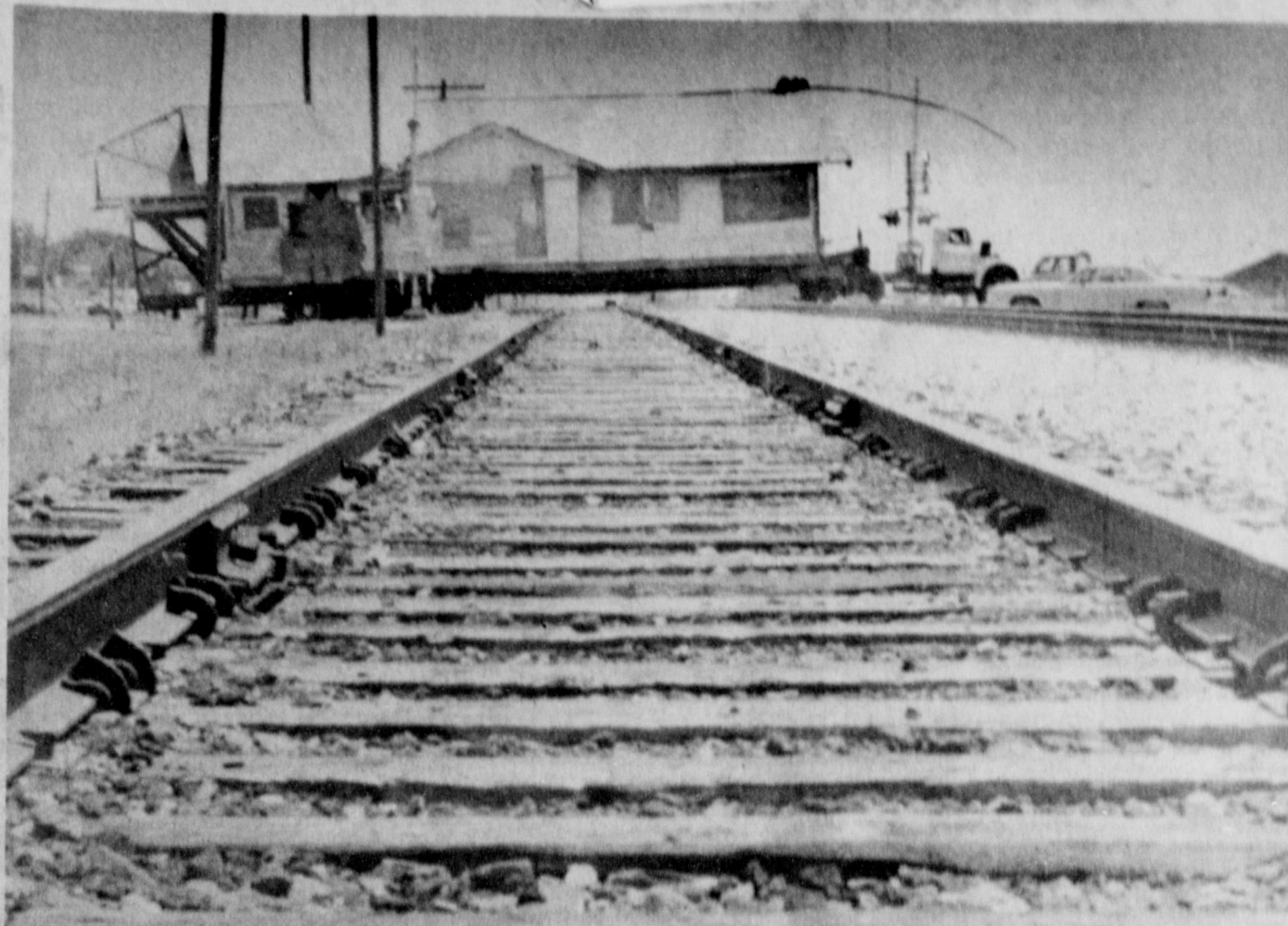
It will be a one-game playoff. The two clubs advanced to the Area level via Bi-district wins, with Iowa Park defeating Clyde 6-1 Mon-

Overnight lock-in for graduates

Approximately 140 persons will be locked up all night Friday. But it's all voluntary.

"Project Graduation," a program learned by Iowa Park High School students attending an anti-drug sem-

inar last fall, will go into effect at 11 p.m., following graduation exercises.

The idea is to provide a setting free of any substance abuse during a time when it is most frequent: the celebration following completion of

high school, according to Carol Venhaus, who is coordinating the event.

Ninety seniors along with 20 of their guests will be assisted through the night by 30 adults.

The door will open at 10 p.m., and be locked at 11 until the next morning. No one will be allowed to enter the building after 11 p.m., and anyone leaving during the night will not be allowed to re-enter.

The only cost to the seniors is \$5, and that basically pays for t-shirts with "Black and White Night

1988" on the front, and a roster of the class on the back, Mrs. Venhaus said.

There will be plenty of activities throughout the night, with six carnival games (courtesy Optimist Club and Evening Lions Club), nine video movies, three casino games, picture taking, bingo every hour on the hour, volleyball games and dance contests from 11 p.m. to 3 a.m., with music provided by a professional disc jockey.

And should anyone get hungry, there'll be 40 pizzas, hamburgers, nachos, all kinds of desserts, cotton candy, popcorn and Cokes.

Mrs. Venhaus said she has at least one prize for everyone to win at drawings held every 10 minutes, not including prizes for bingo and the casino games.

The night will climax with a complete breakfast at 6 a.m., cooked by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners.

During breakfast, a video tape made by Shirley Cravens of activities starting with Baccalaureate right through Project Graduation will be shown.

And as an added incentive to "stick it out" the entire night, drawings will be held for four major gifts, including two television sets, a VCR and a radio, Mrs. Venhaus said.

Car runs over girl

A 16-year-old girl was sent to a hospital Saturday afternoon after falling off a car's hood and the vehicle passing over her.

Rebecca Mitchell, along with a 17-year-old male, was riding on the front of a car driven by a 15-year-old unlicensed female in the 400 block of East Washington.

Jeff Spruiell gets experience in new type drilling

Ocean Drilling Program Leg 120, a nine-week-long research cruise in the southern Indian Ocean investigating the world's largest submarine plateau, ended April 30, 1988, as the drillship JOIDES Resolution docked in Fremantle, Australia.

That was the first sentence in the lead paragraph of a press release telling the story about where Iowa Park-an Jeff Spruiell has been working.

As the son of the late Bill Spruiell, a co-owner of Spruiell Drilling, Jeff has worked all his life around rigs, but he readily admits this new job is a totally different experience.

His drilling platform has been a 439-foot long, 70-foot wide ship, and unlike the oil rigs on which he was raised, he can now say he became sea sick while drilling a hole in the ground.

At times, the ship was working on 40-foot waves. Drilling continued uninterrupted, however, because the rig had "a heck of a compensator to handle it," Spruiell commented.

The exploration beneath the ocean floor is under direction of Texas A&M Univ., where Spruiell sent his resume with a job application in 1987.

After being accepted, he left here Feb. 19, spent four days traveling, five days in port readying for the trip, and 65 days on the ocean, where it was "rough, windy and cold."

The project was interrupted briefly when the drilling superintendent suffered a heart attack and died. The ship returned to its Australian port to

deliver the body and pick up a replacement, and went back to work.

Spruiell worked as a roustabout, mechanic and sometimes writing reports, he explained.

The project basically is a study to determine continental drift and climatic changes, among other subjects, but is not an exploration for oil or

gas.

Life aboard the ship is long work hours, interrupted by relaxation in a movie room where VHS tapes are viewed, a small gymnasium with weights, stationary bicycle and other equipment, and a small library.

Spruiell will leave here June 24 to catch his ship in the Singapore

area. He did not know exactly where their next drill site would be, but he is sure it won't be as cold as the southern Indian Ocean project.

The balance of the prepared press release, after identifying the area where the ship had been as "The Kerguelen Plateau: Ancient Forests Beneath the Waves of the Remote Sub-

antarctic Indian Ocean," reads:

Five sites were drilled on the Kerguelen Plateau, which lies in the remote subantarctic region of the Indian Ocean. Although only tiny Kerguelen, Heard and McDonald Islands exist as above-sea-level expressions of the Kerguelen Plateau, this complex submarine structure (-2500 km in length, average water depth -1500 m) has long attracted scientific interest. However, despite over a decade of geophysical research and deep-sea dredges, no scientific consensus has been reached regarding the origin of the Kerguelen Plateau and its evolution through geologic time.

In order to address this problem, Leg 120 had two objectives: first, to obtain drill cores of the sediments on the Kerguelen Plateau for scientists to use in interpreting past environmental conditions in the region; second, to recover cores of the crustal rocks in order to learn what processes had formed the plateau.

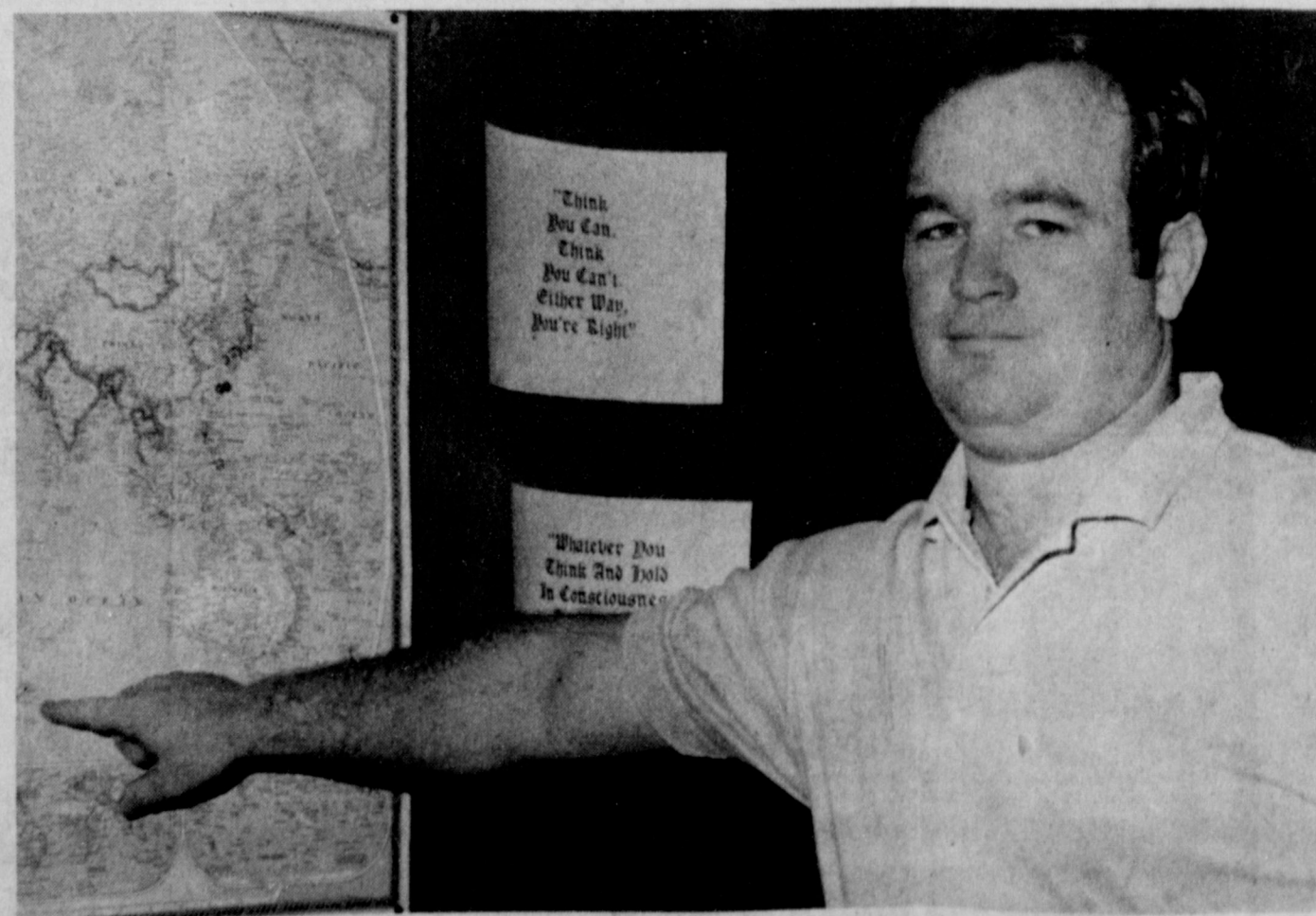
Drilling results revealed over 97-million years of Kerguelen Plateau history. The oldest materials recovered were the "basement" rocks of the Kerguelen Plateau -- the basaltic crustal rocks which were erupted as the plateau began to form in the mid-Cretaceous Period (over 97-million years ago). These were found to have a unique composition unlike either the basalts generated at the earth's mid-oceanic ridges (in the process of sea-floor spreading) or those that form oceanic islands (such as Hawaii). Another significant feature

of the basalts was evidence that they had formed either above or very near to sea level -- proof that the now-submerged Kerguelen Plateau was a land mass during the earliest phases of its history.

The first sediments to accumulate on the "basement" were likewise deposited on land or in very shallow water, such as in a marsh or flood-plain setting. Additional evidence of terrestrial conditions were fingernail-sized fragments of fossil wood found in the reddish brown, soil-like silts and clays; these sediments apparently formed in a warm (temperate to subtropical), moist climate. Further work is planned to identify the species of plants which inhabited the mid-Cretaceous "Kerguelen National Forest," as it was dubbed by the scientists.

After these non-marine sediments were deposited, the Kerguelen Plateau began to subside beneath the sea. This sinking is revealed by layers of shallow-marine limestones (laid down in waters "knee-deep" to several hundred meters water depth) which contain fragments of fossilized bryozoans, clams, sponges, sea urchins and other sea creatures, including a tooth from a marine vertebrate (possibly a mososaur, or giant swimming lizard). These limestones accumulated throughout the Late Cretaceous Period (about 66-97-million years ago).

As time passed, the Kerguelen

Seventh grader to be recognized for SAT score

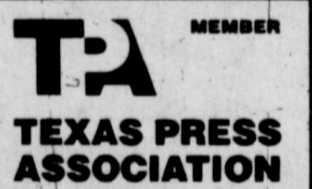
Kenneth Stevenson, Iowa Park Junior High School seventh grader, has been invited to attend a special recognition ceremony at Waco.

As I See It...

I hate to make this announcement, especially to those of you who live in the city of Iowa Park, but we will cease printing the tv schedule effective next week.

Normally, I would have done a front-page story on this sort of thing,

May has been a dry month

Ordinarily Iowa Park receives four or five inches of rainfall during May, but thus far this month, only .42 of an inch has been measured.

The observation was made by Virgil Woodfin, who pointed out the average could easily be reached in one thunderstorm.

But if it's going to reach the May average, the bottom's got to fall out by midnight Tuesday.

The area experienced unusually chilled temperatures over the weekend, accompanied by persistent winds.

The high Saturday, which came at 6 p.m., was 76, and only 71 Sunday, according to the Weather Bureau.

but there are explanations and opinions necessary that would not be fitting in a news story.

Blundly-put, this newspaper is not big enough to do what a multi-million-dollar corporation should be doing for itself. We just can no longer afford it.

While recognizing the printing of the tv schedule is a service to our readers, especially those on cable, we must exercise good business judgment in terminating the expense.

A lot of things have changed over the years, since the cable came to town and we started running the schedule.

We had a business office here known as TV Cable of Iowa Park, complete with staff and building. The company ran advertisements from time to time, and was an actual part of our business community.

Its ownership was a small corporation, primarily owned by an out-of-town family.

A few years ago, it was sold to TCI, which reportedly is one of the largest three cable outfits in the world, with offices in Colorado.

Well, the local office was closed and consolidated with TV Cable of Burkburnett, which the corporation also owns. They've got a service man who works part time in Iowa Park,

and bills can be paid at Jim's Conoco.

But try to find TV Cable of Iowa Park in your Iowa Park Leader, or even your telephone book. If you want to talk with management, and are lucky enough to find a number, it's a long-distance call.

The corporation, through last year, would run an advertisement in the paper from time to time, and we looked at it as partial recovery of the costs we incurred for running the schedule.

Now, however, the corporation has consolidated all its "local" advertising to the newspaper in Burkburnett, leaving out Iowa Park, Electra and all other communities served by the firm.

So lost is the identity of the local cable company, we now see on the Weather Channel, "Cable TV of Burkburnett."

With no change in policy indicated by TCI management, coupled with increasing costs of printing and the schedule information, we have no choice but to discontinue the service.

Like you, we'll miss the information about our favorite tv programs.

Maybe sometime in the future a more community-minded owner will take over the local cable tv, and we will be able to resume the service.

Plateau subsided still further. Beds of fine-grained chalk (composed of the microscopic skeletons of single-celled marine plants and animals) accumulated throughout the Tertiary Period (from 66 to 1.6-million years ago) as the waters deepened to present-day depths of over a kilometer. Starting about 36-million years ago, the climate began to cool significantly.

Throughout the Quaternary Period (from 1.6-million years ago to the present) blooms of diatoms (microscopic marine algae whose glassy skeletons form a distinctive type of marine sediments) and layers of dropstones (rocks carried from Antarctica by icebergs and dropped as the ice melts) recorded climatic changes which occurred during the Ice Ages.

The Leg 120 scientists and the ship's crew braved high winds, stormy seas and freezing temperatures while drilling in one of the most remote regions of the ocean. Their efforts have resulted in a new level of knowledge regarding the origin and geologic history of the Kerguelen Plateau, one of the earth's most remarkable and little-understood features.

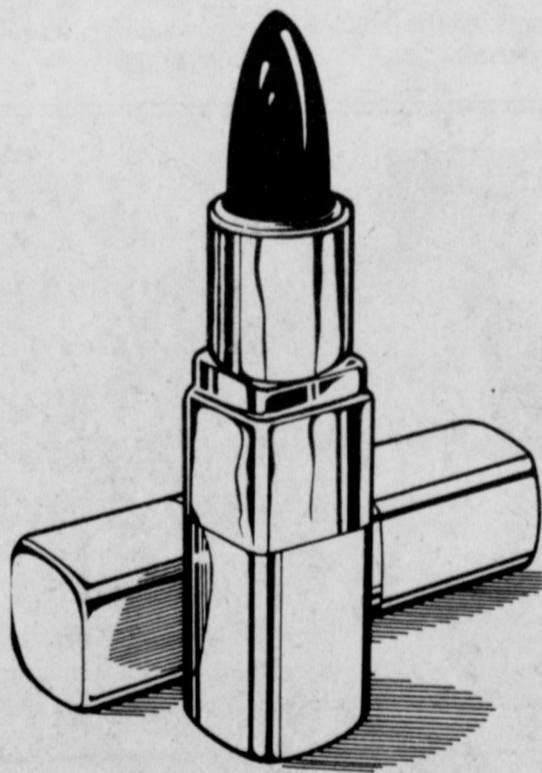

A solid performance by the Iowa Park Hawk baseball team Monday, featuring strong pitching, hitting and defensive play, provided a 6-1 Bi-District victory over Clyde's Bulldogs.

to steal second, retiring the side.

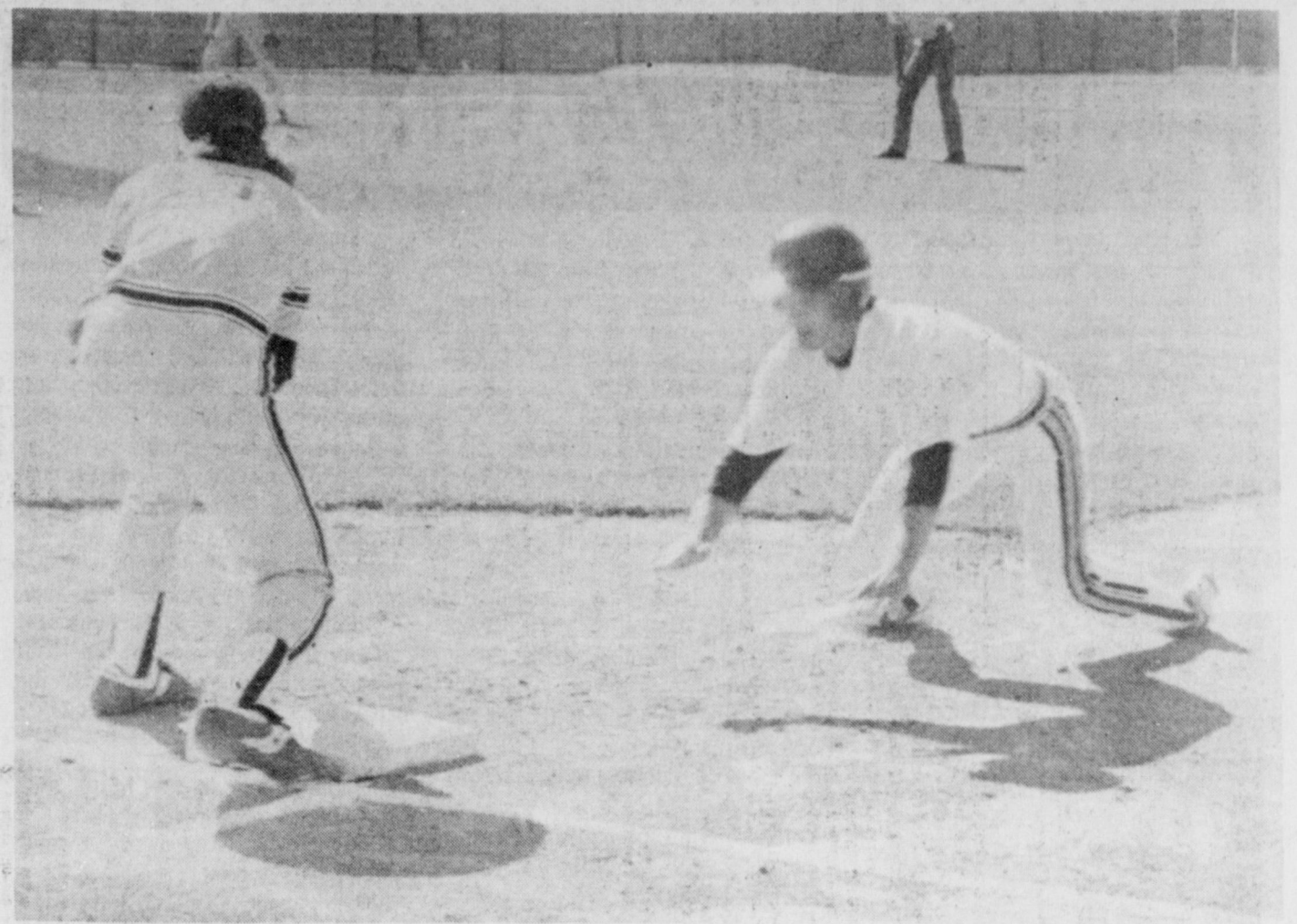

Three Hawks commit to MSU

It's been almost 32 years since Midwestern State Univ. fielded a football team, but this year, the air will once again be filled with the sounds of helmets crashing and whistles blowing.

For the better part of a year, MSU head football coach Mike Calcote and assistant coaches Ron Steele, David Scott, Stewart Krisch, Morris Stone, Roy Boutwell, Tim Cornelius and Lonnie Wilkerson have been busy putting together a team.

Recruiting has been a 24-hour-a-day job.

The coaches have made almost 4,000 telephone calls, sent out over 1,700 letters and have made contact with between 1,500 and 1,700 high school athletes.

Over 300 potential MSU prospects have visited the campus, not to mention the 65 or more already enrolled and just finishing spring drills.

Between 150 and 200 football players are expected to report for two-a-days beginning Aug. 15.

When the MSU Indians line up against Howard Payne Univ. on Sept. 3, they will possess some talented freshmen and upperclassmen.

Some of the freshmen include three all-staters: Iowa Park's Jim Cummings, 5-11, 195-pound runningback with 4.5 speed; Michael McKnight, 6-0, 180-pound runningback from Chillicothe (as a junior, he led the nation in all-purpose yards and scoring), and Anastacio Romero, 6-0, 230-pound defensive end from Big Lake.

Coach Calcote will also have the services of two area players who will play in the Oil Bowl in August. They are Michael Garcia, 6-0, 210-

pound lineman from Wichita Falls Hirschi and Jimmy Kirkhart, 6-1, 230-pound lineman from Iowa Park.

Jeff Huff confirmed last week that he had committed to play next year for the Indians. Although he missed over half the 1987 season with a broken arm, Huff started both offensively and defensively, at quarterback and safety.

Two upperclassmen who should deserve a watchful eye are juniors Blanford Paul from Olney and Charlie Eipper from Hirschi.

Paul, 6-2, 185-pound runningback with 4.4 speed, started as a freshman for Coach Jim Wacker at Texas Christian Univ. before transferring to Ranger Junior College.

Eipper, 6-1, 195-pound quarterback, formerly called signals for the University of Texas at Arlington which no longer has a football program.

Before spring practice began, Coach Calcote didn't know what to expect from a team with such diverse athletic abilities.

On the one hand, he had players like Paul and Eipper who had played NCAA Division I football; on the other, he had guys who had never played a down of high school football.

However, now that spring practice has ended, Calcote has a better idea of what he has and doesn't have.

"I feel strongly that if we had to put a team on the field right now, and we had four quality linemen, we could be competitive," Calcote said. "There's no doubt in my mind that with the assistant coaches and graduate assistants we have at MSU, we can do well."

Calcote said the Indians have quality players at the skilled positions, but they will need to improve elsewhere.

"Charlie Nipper is throwing the ball well, and split ends Charles Evans from Seagraves and Robert Hunter from Wichita Falls have also done well. Runningbacks Blanford Paul and Reggie Mitchell have had a good spring," he said.

Of needing improvement, he added, "We don't have enough speed in the secondary, and we need to pick up some people with speed. We also need to pick up another defensive end, some tackles and a whole new set of backups."

Coaches are confident they can fill those voids before the recruiting season ends in June.

The MSU football program will compete in NAIA Division II and the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association (TIAA), a non-scholarship conference consisting of Austin College, Howard Payne, McMurry College, MSU, Sul Ross and Tarleton State.

MSU will play five games at home and five on the road. They will play each team with the TIAA twice on a home-and-home basis.

Coincidentally, when the Indians take the field against Howard Payne, they will try to break the 1-1 series

record and avenge their previous loss to the Yellow Jackets, a 19-7 defeat in 1948.

All home games will be played at Memorial Stadium, and the cost of admission has been set at \$5 for reserved seats, \$4 for adult general admission and \$3 for students and military with I.D. Season tickets will go on sale to the general public about the middle of June.

MSU students, with I.D.s, will be allowed at no charge.

Athletic Director Steve Holland said seating priority will first be given to members of the M Club, MSU's booster organization, and to others who helped get the program started.

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Pool to open this weekend

The pool, located on the west side of the high school campus, will open at 12-noon and close at 6 p.m.

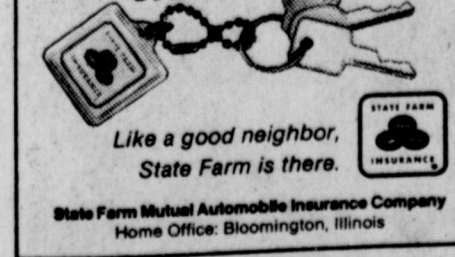

The No. 7-A Jackson "A" has a permit for 1,350 feet and is located 450 feet from the north line and 750 feet from the west line.

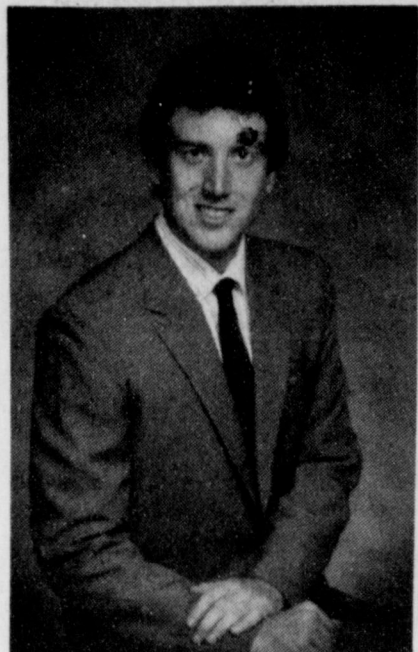

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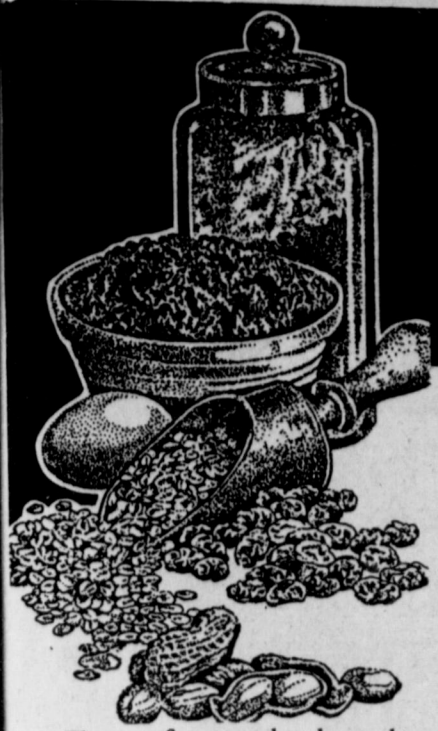
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Cook of the Week

- 1 basil leaf
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
- 2 Tbsp. cider vinegar

Place potatoes in crock pot. Arrange chicken on top. Combine orange juice, brown sugar, basil, nutmeg and vinegar. Pour over chicken. Sprinkle with parsley. Cook on low

SWISS STEAK (4 servings)

- 2 lb. round steak (1" thick)
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 stalk celery, chopped
- 2 carrots, pared and chopped
- 1/4 cup diced onion
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 can (16 1/2 oz.) whole tomatoes
- 1/2 cup grated American cheese

Cut steak in four serving pieces. Coat in flour mixed with salt; place in crock pot. Add chopped vegetables and Worcestershire sauce. Pour tomatoes over meat and vegetables. Cover and cook on low setting seven to 10 hours. Just before serving, sprinkle with cheese.

7-LAYER BARS

- 1/4 cup margarine, melted
- 1/2 cup graham cracker crumbs
- 1/2 cup chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup sweetened condensed milk (cover with)
- 1/2 cup butterscotch chips
- 1/2 cup coconut
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Layer ingredients in bread and cake bake pan in order listed. Cover and place in crock pot. Cook on high setting two to three hours or until firm. Remove pan and uncover. Let stand five minutes. Unmold on plate and cool. Make six to eight serving for 3 1/2 quart crock pot; double recipe for five quart pot.

BURGER 'N BEAN HOT DISH (6 servings)

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 can (16 oz.) barbecue beans
- 1 can bean with bacon soup
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 tsp. chili powder
- 1/2 tsp. garlic salt
- Onion to taste
- 1/4 cup grated American cheese

In skillet, brown beef and drain. Combine all ingredients except cheese in crock pot. Cover and cook on low six to nine hours. Just before serving sprinkle with grated cheese. Serve over corn bread.

HAM AND NOODLE CASSEROLE

- 1 cup uncooked noodles
- 1 cup cubed cooked ham
- 2 cans cream of chicken soup
- 1-8 oz. can corn, drained
- Vegetable oil
- 1 Tbsp. chopped pimento
- 1/2 cup grated cheese
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper

Cook noodles according to package directions until barely tender; drain and toss with just enough oil to coat. Add noodles and remaining ingredients to greased crock pot, stir to mix. Cover and cook on low four to six hours. Makes two servings.

Scott Davis selected for Wayland team

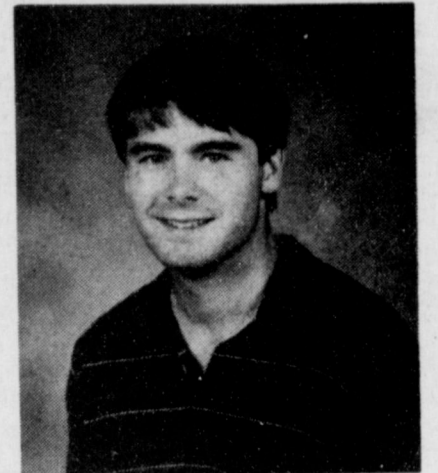
Iowa Park sophomore Scott Davis has been selected as a member of the new recreational team at Wayland Baptist Univ. at Plainview.

Mrs. Coker's fourth, fifth and sixth grade Gifted and Talented students visited Scarborough Faire in Waxahachie Saturday.

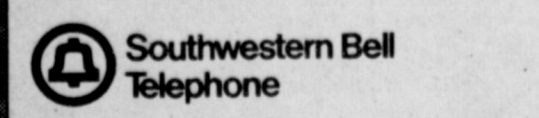
