GRANBERY ADDRESSES
173 GRADUATES OF
HIGH SCHOOL

FORGET MATERIAL

BUILDING OF WORTHY
CIVILIZATION SAID
PARAMOUNT

A record breaking class in Lubbock high school, 173 in number, was last evening given diplomas of graduation, while several thousand people packed on at the First Methodist church. Dr. J. C. Granbery, of the Technological college, made the address, challenging the graduates to greater accomplishments.

Long before the program opened, a seep in the auditorium was filled and the crowd continued to gather until aisles were filled with chairs and standing room was not available, when groups turned away unable to witness this graduation program.

Challenging them to build up around them the things which make life worth while and to include in their struggle for material gain things which benefit the spirit also, Dr. John Cooper Granbery made an earnest appeal for emphasis on some of the neglected factors of South Plains life in his address.

The building of a worthy civilization on the Plains of West Texas, was Dr. Granbery's subject and he clearly outlined the defects which mark the present construction.

Forget Material Side
"We must forget the material side of this life as the Chamber of Commerce, luncheon clubs and other organizations are taking care of that. What we want now is to see that this material foundation is erected upon a sterner structure of the spirit," Dr. Granbery said in his opening remarks.

"We often hear," he said, "of strangers making the remark, 'Oh, but it is so far away from everything where out here.' That is a challenge for us to take up the work and to give it a great cultural center where strangers from the industrial centers of the north and east may feel at home out here."

Neglecting Deeper Culture
Addressing the graduates, he said, "You are all dressed up and have no place to go. What then will serve to be able to speak from New York to San Francisco when you have nothing to say? What is the advantage of being able to save time if you have nothing to do?" He gave numerous striking illustrations of how the United States has neglected the deeper culture of life in building a new world. He pointed out that the people of the South Plains and West Texas are making the same great mistake.

"The Texas Technological college is a climax of our great cultural life and for us, speaking of a Tech man either, I am speaking of the traditions and dreams of the people of this section. The people of the Plains will never be satisfied until we have out here an institution which will adequately express our cultural life."

There is one element in the civilization of the Plains and more especially in Lubbock which calls for our greatest admiration and that is the development of the medical science, the establishment of great hospitals and the presence of specialists among us who with a number of others are continually perfecting themselves," he said in paying a tribute to Dr. J. T. Hutchinson, president of the board who has worked faithfully for the past 14 years.

Hundreds In Flood Zone Stay With Homes Despite Warnings Of New Break

(By The Associated Press)
NEW ORLEANS, May 25.—Hundreds of persons in the Houma-Coupee parish along to their homes tonight as the flood waters flowing through the broken levee line at McCrea moved upon them after covering one-fifth of their parish. The McCrea crevasse is approximately 120 miles northwest of New Orleans on the opposite side of the Mississippi river.

Cling to Homes
In the face of warnings by the weather bureau at Baton Rouge and other official sources, residents of the doomed area held to their homes as the torrent rushing through the crevasse rapidly ate away the levees, broadening the opening to more than 1,000 feet streaming into a gradually expanding lake.

More rapidly than was expected this lake spread over the swamp lands along the upper end of the parish, wiping out all day land between the levee of the Atchafalaya and those of the Mississippi ten miles to the east.

A hundred and fifty square miles of land already had disappeared beneath the muddy waters tonight and they had spread to ten miles below the break and gradually were moving southward and eastward.

Rescue Boats Assembled
Fear was expressed that many who had refused to leave in the face of warnings broadcast might be cut off and a fleet of boats had been assembled in the vicinity to respond to calls for help. While the waters were draining from the Texas basin into the Atchafalaya basin, a gradual fall was being recorded in the Yazoo delta and it was announced that the first train to be operated into Greenville, Miss., since the flood should arrive there June 1. The date of resumption of service between Vicksburg and Rolling Fork still was indefinite since water remained almost two feet over the tracks in many places. Of 455 miles of tracks on the Greenville division of the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley railroad, 135 miles remained under water.

A flow fall was recorded in the Texas basin, but heavy rains were retarding the decline. At Jacksonville in the middle of the basin, the gauge stood at 62.5 feet, a total fall since May 25 of only 1.1 feet, in water.

PAYNE WHITNEY DIES
Wealthy Sportsman Victim
of Heart Attack at Home

MANHATTAN, N. Y., May 25. (AP)—Payne Whitney, financier, philanthropist, sportsman and one of the richest men in the country, died of heart disease while playing tennis at his country estate, Greentrees, today.

Mr. Whitney was 52 years old. He was the brother of Henry Payne Whitney, son of the late William C. Whitney, secretary of the navy under Cleveland, son-in-law of John Hay, secretary of state under McKinley, and brother-in-law of Senator James W. Wadsworth.

He had been in apparent good health up to the moment when he was stricken, having planned to play tennis at the Belmont park at the time of the accident. He was suddenly overcome and died before he could be given medical aid.

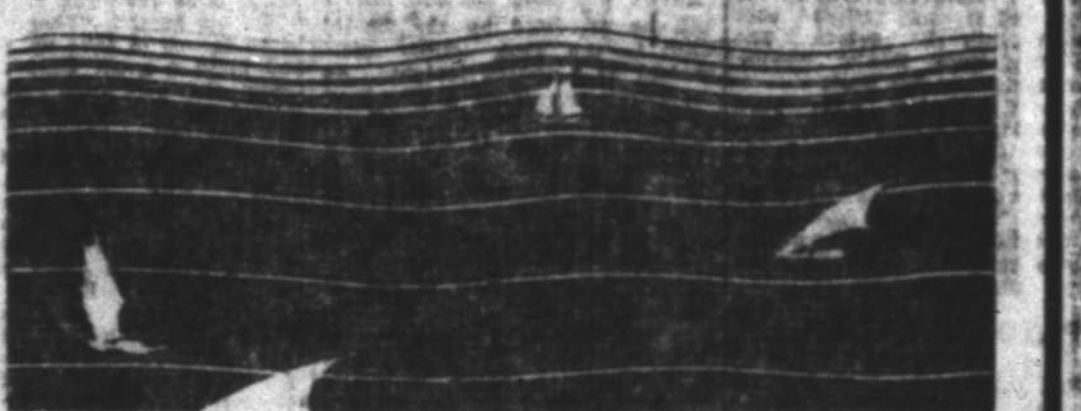

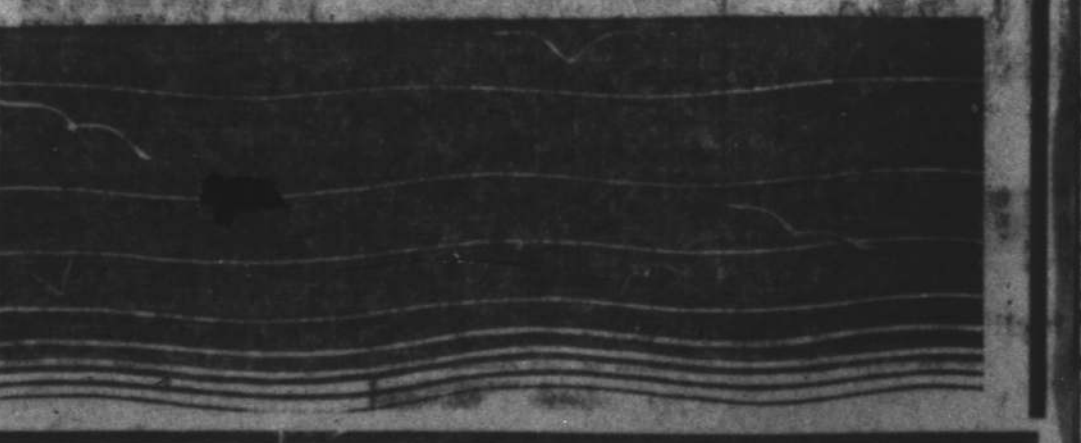

ON TO OSTEND

Six trans-Atlantic liners, loaded to the rails with Rotarians and their families from all over North America, will sail out of New York harbor today and tomorrow morning carrying delegates to the eighteenth annual convention of Rotary International which opens at Ostend, Belgium, next Monday morning. The business and professional men of forty countries will be represented at the gathering. Special trains are being run from all over Europe to the Belgian seaport and the Japanese delegates are coming by the first through train to run between Tokyo and Paris. Three thousand from the British Isles will attend and it is expected the total attendance will be more than eight thousand. The Belgian Director of Public Safety has snipped away the yards of red tape which, since the war, have delayed the progress of international travelers. Passengers on the Rotary fleet will not be required to display passports or submit to baggage examination. A Rotary button in the coat lapel and a membership identification card will be sufficient evidence of good faith to the Director of Public Safety to cause him to waive the customary rigorous inspection. In order to accommodate the great throng, practically every hotel in Ostend has been turned over for the exclusive use of Rotarians during the convention. Americans who will make this trip will have their hotel-room keys handed them before they walk up the gangplank to board their ships in New York harbor. The convention will be bid welcome by King Albert. No hint of what the King will say to the Rotarians has been given out but as the object of the gathering is to spread international good-will and understanding, it is believed by many that he will make some important observations on these subjects. This is the second convention of the organization held in Europe and the first to be held on the European continent and it will also be the first gathering at which Americans and Canadians have not been present in the greater number. This year it is believed those from the British Isles and Continental Europe will be in the majority. As more than a dozen languages and practically every major religion on the globe today will be represented in the gathering, the sessions will be opened by silent prayer instead of the customary invocation from the platform. The delegates, adherents to Protestantism, Catholicism, Judaism, Shintoism, Mohammedanism, Buddhism, etc., will be asked at the opening session to invoke the blessing of the deity they worship during a minute of silence, rather than be led in prayer by a representative of any particular sect. In recent years, Rotary has gone into the four corners of the earth. There are new clubs on every continent and on most of the great islands. As Rotary has extended its influence it has embraced many whose religious faiths are not common in either Europe or the Americas, and the convention-committee this year deemed it the courteous thing to recognize all beliefs by placing emphasis on one. International President Harry H. Rogers, of San Antonio, Texas, and other officers of Rotary, believe the time is appropriate for furthering the Sixth Object of Rotary which is "The advancement of understanding, good-will, and international peace through a world fellowship of business and professional men united in the Rotary ideal of service." In order to further this object, groups of Rotarians from other continents will visit the Rotary clubs of Europe and the British Isles in order to get acquainted with the business and professional men of the countries where Rotary is established. The European clubs are arranging special good-will and acquaintance programs for their visitors. Some of the clubs will hold special meetings to receive their visitors. The Paris club plans to hold a luncheon every day during one week in order that the French Rotarians may become acquainted with their fellows in other countries. After the convention the international officers of Rotary will be entertained at Brussels at a luncheon given by King Albert and his heir-apparent. Later the international officers will be received by King George of England at Buckingham Palace.

THE FEAR OF THE LORD

And unto man he said, Behold; the fear of the Lord, that is wisdom; and to depart from evil is understanding. (Job xxviii, 28).

A little boy, forgetting to say his prayers, wakes up next morning and finds the world still in its place; but frequently during the day he may be troubled less some misfortune come as a punishment for his omission. In a few days this wears off, and as he grows older he may venture, under strong temptation, to go fishing on Sunday or commit some other defiance of rules which he has been taught to believe may not be violated with impunity. Again nothing untoward happens, and the youngster is in a fair way to doubt much that has been told him for the truth.

Such always have been the results of man's attempts to fit spiritual laws to effects which come from physical causes. We still have people who believe that dry weather which burns up crops, and floods which wash them away, are "visitations"—or that sickness, storms, fires or other disasters are "punishments."

Fear is a primary emotion and is common alike to men and animals. The fear motive has been used in all religions of history. Yet the physical effects apparent in an elephant terrified in the presence of a mouse, are not greatly different from those in a human being frightened by some information. In the animal, fear is a physical reaction produced by physical cause; in man, fear may be produced by mental or physical cause, but its physical effects are much the same.

The universal responsiveness to fear has been used by society in framing laws which provide punishment. Fear has been employed as a means of both influencing nations to go to war and to keep from it. Fear is used by physicians when other arguments fail to convince a patient that orders must be obeyed.

Fear is one of the earliest evidences of consciousness in infancy, and it hovers over the death bed of old age. It is not strange that the phrase, "the fear of the Lord," occurring with such frequency in the Bible, has been invoked with more emphasis on the word "fear" than on the larger meaning of the phrase itself.

Jonathan Edwards, one of America's most famous preachers in the early days, is remembered in history largely because of the terrifying pictures he could paint in describing the consequences of sin. He has had numerous followers, but, also, there have been many to whom confusion has come from trying to form a conception of a God of Love and, at the same time, One whose omnipotence inspires terror.

There is an illuminating line in the Twenty-third Psalm, full of comfort and wisdom:

"Yea, though I walk through the valley of death, I will fear no evil."

Here is no picture of fear at the approach of eternity. It is a suggestion that fear should be for that which is evil, not for that which is good. Fear of evil, and of the consequences brought by association with or submission to evil, is wholesome. It is the sensible exercise of the instinct of self-preservation. "To depart from evil is understanding." "To depart from evil is understanding."

Why, then, should the phrase, "the fear of the Lord," be misused so often and be so generally misunderstood? For it means something different from the emotion of fear as we ordinarily understand it. The "fear of the Lord" means the ordering of one's life so that it will be in harmony with Divine will. The only "fear" which should exist is a fear lest that harmony be lost. In this, as Job points out, is the beginning of wisdom—the "principal thing" of Solomon, wisest of men.

The fear of the Lord is not terror, a fear which drives away. No such conception is justifiable by Biblical teaching. "Like as a father pitieth his children, so the Lord pitieth them that fear him," is self-contradictory if one believe fear only that emotion which causes one to be afraid. For the father whose children regard him with terror is not a father actuated by pity.

The fear of the Lord, an eagerness to know God's will, a desire to obey that will, a willingness to subordinate self before it, a watchfulness—test deed or thought cause one to sever the bond which links man to his Divine Father—that is wisdom's beginning. And happy is the man who hath found it.—San Antonio Express.

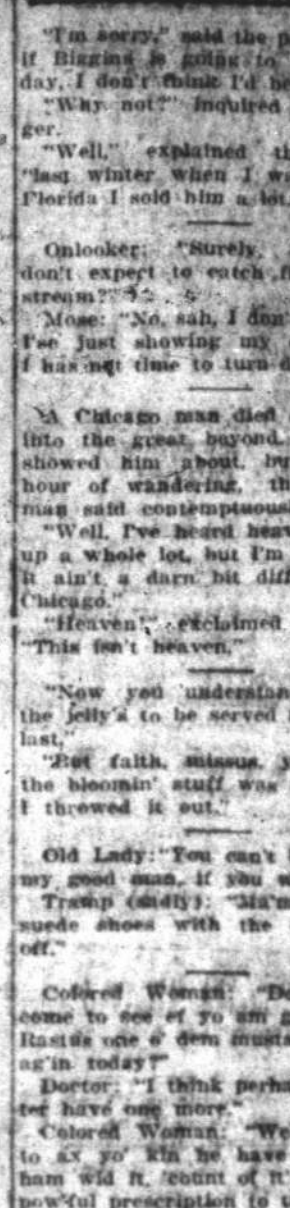

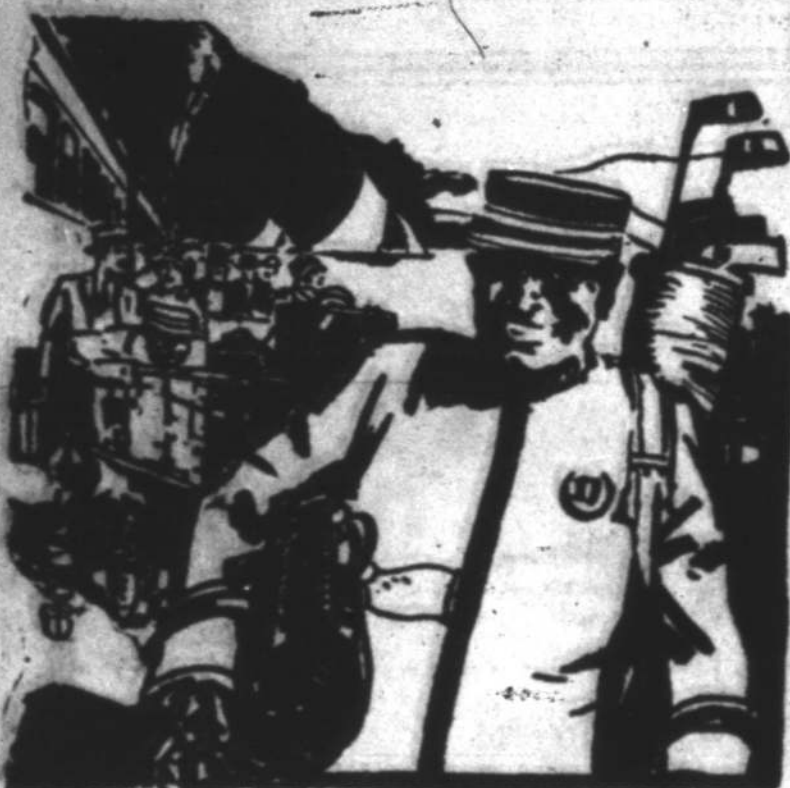

RUMOR RENEWS HUNT FOR FLIERS

PLANE REPORTED HEARD IN
CRASH NEAR ST. JOHNS
NEW FOUNDLAND

(By Associated Press)

ST. JOHNS, N. F., May 25.—Search for the two missing French aviators Captains Nungesser and Galt, was renewed today on the declaration of two men who reported that while working in the woods two miles inland in the vicinity of Burin, Monday, May 2, they had heard a crash that might have been caused by a falling airplane.

G. A. Bartlett arrived from the Burin district today and said that Henry Collins and his son, of Paradise Sound, an inlet of placenta bay, told him that while working in the woods about 10 o'clock Monday morning, May 2, they heard a crash as if some heavy object had struck the ground on the cliff side of Paradise Gulch.

There was a second crash, the men reported, then an explosion. Today the father and son returned to search the vicinity in an effort to learn the cause of the crash they had heard.

The clue furnished by Collins and his son today followed the first definite report of the sighting of an airplane off the Newfoundland coast on the day Nungesser was due, when the Danish schooner Albert arrived at Bellefleur and reported that she had sighted a plane eighty miles off Cape Pine.

Previous reports from persons at various points in Newfoundland that they had heard an airplane on the morning of May 2, were used to direct searching parties in what to date has proved a futile search for the missing fliers.

spite of the fact that more than a million acres of land in the Atchafalaya basin have been submerged since that time as the water drained through Bayou Des Glaives basin, 170 miles northwest of New Orleans.

13 Parishes Under Water
Virtually the whole of the Texas basin, including thirteen parishes, remained under water as the shifting inland sea rolled southward through the new crack in restraining embankments.

The move toward the Gulf of Mexico had carried flood waters into Iberia parish, bordering Grand Lake, the natural outlet of the Atchafalaya river into the gulf. The speed westward over the eastern Atchafalaya basin was moving more slowly as the flow through the Melville crevasse diminished in volume after the McCrea crevasse on the east bank of the same river broke. On the east side of the Atchafalaya, citizens of Iberia and West Baton Rouge parishes followed the example set by many of those in Pointe Coupee as they remained in their homes. A railroad was commandeered by flood relief dictator John M. Parker today to remove 5,000 persons from Iberia parish but they refused to leave after a relief train had been procured.

Many Move to Levees
Hundreds of persons move to the levees as the waters advanced and prepared to remain in the vicinity of their homes, constructing temporary huts of timbers which had been used in revetments during the battle to hold back the raging river of death.

Flood Dictator Parker was informed that 125 persons in the vicinity of the McCrea break, were preparing to live on the levees. The majority of them, the report said, were children and the food supply averaged less than three days for each family.

TENNESSEE WILL HONOR CROCKETT

GRAVES OF FOREBEARS TO BE
MARKED BY STATE ARCHIVES DEPARTMENT

(By Associated Press)

NASHVILLE, Tenn., May 25.—The graves of the forebears and relatives of David Crockett, who left his "happy hunting grounds" in Tennessee, crossed Arkansas and died at the Alamo in defense of Texas independence, are to be marked by the Tennessee state department of archives, State Librarian John Trotwood Moore has announced.

One will be placed near Bear creek, in Franklin county, where lies the body of Mrs. Polly Finley, mother of Crockett's two children. She is one of the characters in "Hearts of Hickory," written by Mr. Moore.

Cites Grand Parents
Another will mark the spot in Rogersville, in Hawkins county, where Crockett's grandparents were killed by Indians.

Still another will mark the grave of Crockett's mother, and one of her grandchildren, near the home of Mrs. Quincy Dodd, Rutherford, Tenn.

It has recently been learned by Mr. Moore that still another unmarked "Crockett" grave has been pointed out—that of his second wife in Texas.

It is a tradition around Rutherford that Crockett spent much of his young manhood about Dodd place, formerly owned by a pioneer, Jesse Needham, who died several years ago. In Needham's quoted language, his "kild barn" there is his heart's content.

It is thought that it was Needham who planted the cedars which now stand as monuments to Crockett's kin—one tree still alive, the other blasted by a lightning stroke.

Graves in Open Field
The graves, long since sunken, are in an open corn field about 200 yards from the nearest public road. Another relic is treasured in an ancient log smoke-house on the Dodd farm, in which Crockett's mother is believed to have once lived.

When the markers will be placed has not been determined, but it is probable the ceremonies will be staged in July on the 15th anniversary of the massacre of Crockett's grandparents.

The massacre story has been borne out by the investigations of Mrs. Zella Armstrong, Chattanooga, and Mrs. John Stewart French, who recently made a tour of Virginia and East Tennessee in search of more historical material in collaboration with Judge Ernest Crockett they are now preparing a Crockett Family History.

Crockett's autobiography mentioned the marriage, but was naïvely lacking in details. Tennessee at that time was part of Virginia and in a search of Virginia records, the two women found evidence of the estate of one David Crockett, advertised in Washington, D. C., in 1774, by his two sons, William and Robert.

The real estate owned by the descendant was described as being the Crockett's Valley, now part of Tennessee, and the land was finally located in Hawkins county as the site of Rogersville. This land was sold to Joseph Rogers who became the founder of that city.

A grandson of Joseph Rogers now lives in a home overlooking the site of the massacre, and he has preserved stories told by his mother, Mrs. Hugh Walker, who was Mary Rogers, a creek in the vicinity is still known as Crockett creek.

appropriate \$1,500,000 each year of the next biennium virtually broke completely today and a substitute bill carrying the same figures passed the senate, 26 to 0.

Moore of Greenville, author of the substitute measure, won his fight on the 12 traveling inspectors formerly employed by the state education department, a section of the bill adopted providing that the "county superintendent shall supply all needed information" on what schools are entitled to receive rural aid but shall not give opinions as to whether aid should be granted.

Provisions of Bill
Under the Moore measure, rural and small town schools with scholastic population not exceeding 300 each may receive not more than \$400 state aid per fiscal year provided all building and equipment requirements of the education department are met and a tax not less than 75 cents on the \$100 valuation is levied annually. No state funds can be used for any other purpose than to increase terms. The sum of \$100,000 is set aside for payment of free tuition in certain cases authorized by act of the fortieth legislature.

Maximum and minimum teachers' salary scales are fixed and \$20,000 a year is appropriated to the state board of education for administration of the act.

A precautionary clause barring any school from aid which might seek to reduce its present tax rate, if the rate should exceed the 75 cent mark as provided, was included.

Five Local Bills Passed
Cleaning up its calendar, the senate passed five local bills and tomorrow will be ready to take up the measure seeking to appropriate about \$1,400,000 to supplement the available school fund.

Bills passed:
Changing jurisdiction of county court in Menard, Stearns and Irion counties (three bills) by Woodward.

Validating an issue of road bonds in Dimmitt county, by Parr.

Changing time of holding court in the fifty first judicial district, by Woodward.

House Appropriations
AUSTIN, May 25. (AP)—Amid sultry scenes of strife and strained tempers, the house late today finally passed its departmental appropriation bill, carrying around \$400,000 less than the original total of \$1,741,000.

Fights over the health department's reduced budget and Representative George Purif's defeated proposal to cut all department traveling expenses 25 per cent figured in the grand finale of a several days' debate on the bill.

CLUB WORK GIVEN STRONG EMPHASIS

MANY BOYS AND GIRLS WITH PARENTS ATTEND MEETING AT HEREFOED

HEREFOED, May 25.—Boys and girls from various parts of Deaf Smith county, nearly a hundred strong, and many of their interested parents, attended the county wide club rally in Hereford Monday afternoon to hear Sterling C. Evans, state club leader from A. M. college, tell of the work that is being done by the club members over the state. He said that club boys and girls of Texas were helping to put into practice the more efficient methods of farming, were actually raising the average yield of crops, and were helping to build a better citizenship in this state.

Proud of Record
"Hereford and Deaf Smith county should be proud of the record that local club boys and girls have set up last year," he said. Five from this county won free trips to the Dallas fair and one club boy, Ralph Wolfe of this county won a free trip to the International Livestock show at Chicago last fall, because of his excellent record.

Mr. Evans preached the cow, the sow, and the laying hen, along with diversified farming, as the only safe method of farming in any section, and he commended the one crop system, and said that such a practice was dangerous for any farmer. "Returns from the sale of products from the cow, sow and hen is the difference between profit and loss on a farm," Mr. Evans said.

Three youngsters from the Jim Chapman home near Adrian, journeyed thirty miles to hear Mr. Evans. Rev. Jas. T. Ross talked on the progressive spirit, and the development of the open country. Rev. T. Morgan, county agent at O. Dunkle, and Miss Ruth Wolfe, president of the Hereford club, made short talks.

Monday morning Mr. Evans and County Agent Dunkle visited a number of club boys and girls near Hereford, and also inspected a number of the diversified farms in Deaf Smith county. Mr. Evans was surprised to see so many folks here actually practicing the system that he is sponsoring.

POULTRY RAISERS IMPROVE FLOCKS

SHIPMENTS RECEIVED DAILY AT POSTOFFICE HERE FROM BIG GROWERS

Efforts toward poultry improvement and "turkeyization" of the industry here is reflected in the amount of chickens being handled daily through the Lubbock postoffice.

Approximately 19,000 baby chicks, most of them of purebred or standard bred varieties and some of them the progeny of fine show stock, have been handled through the postoffice here within the past month.

The shipments come from Kansas, Wellington, Texas, Missouri, from the Johnston farms at Bowie, and other prominent poultry centers. Apparently, they are shipments to local poultrymen who wish to improve the standard of their flocks.

From one to four cases per day or an average of about 250 chicks are handled.

Also in addition to the persons buying better blood lines, many dealers here buy chicks to raise for the produce markets, finding a substantial source of profit in this work.

BEEVES TOP MARKET

Maize-Fed Calves Demonstrate of Home Feed

HEREFOED, May 25.—Maize fed baby calves from the Hereford country recently topped the Fort Worth market at 10:25, which helps to prove that cattle can actually be finished here in the Panhandle on home grown grain, Sherm Williams shipped 92 head of fat Herefords to Fort Worth, which averaged 620 pounds. They had been fed 123 days and were in top-notch shape.

Mr. Williams feeding experiment netted him a fair profit, as he received more for his calves, sold his grain to himself at a handsome price, and fattened 150 head of hogs in the lot on the waste without an extra feed bill.

The Panhandle of Texas has a great future as a feeding center, Mr. Williams believes, and this system will enable farmers to receive a fair price for their grain sorghums each year.

MEMBER TECH FACULTY TO TEACH AT CANYON

CANYON, May 25.—Miss Flora Powell McGee of the English faculty of Texas Tech will teach this summer in the English department of the West Texas State Teachers college substituting for six weeks for Miss M. Moss Richardson who has been granted leave of absence during the last half of the summer session.

Miss McGee was formerly teacher of English in the Amarillo high school.

LITTLEFIELD MAN SHIPS TWO CARS OF HOGS

LITTLEFIELD, May 25.—P. W. Walker reports a shipment of two cars of hogs this week, making six cars he has shipped since February. Mr. Walker is finding the raising of hogs very profitable in this country. He has a farm just east of town heavily stocked, and can either raise or buy feed cheaply enough to make the raising of hogs profitable.

Hail Storm Heavy Near Big Spring

BIG SPRING, May 25.—A heavy hail storm struck Ross City the new oil town twenty miles south of Big Spring and did considerable damage to houses, trees, window lights and about twenty automobiles. The tops of several cars were beaten through, the wind shields and lights were broken and the surfaces noticeably scored with the big stones. Hubert Ruth, owner of Big Spring reported hail stones as big as hen's eggs and stated that his car's fenders were indented in several places. About two inches of rain came with the hail.

With the same cloud about seven miles northeast of Big Spring the Rogers farm house was blown down and Mrs. Rogers painfully injured. The hail that fell in this section of the county did damage to the field crops that were up and the gardens. A number of people reported having lost chickens from the hail and rain.

The range will be greatly improved by the heavy rains that came and the crops will be replanted where they were destroyed.

Ample preparation is being made by the different committees to provide entertainment and refreshment for every old pioneer and former resident of Cleburne and Johnson county that returns for another breath of Cleburne's hospitable atmosphere and to enjoy the reminiscences of the old times.

General Program

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, May 25 (AP)—An unfavorable weekly weather and crop report and a private condition report making the condition of the crop 22.4 and the acreage decrease over 5.3 percent overcame an early gain in the cotton market today and hammered prices down until they showed losses of 7 or 10 points compared with the previous close. In the final trading shorts covering firm prices and the market recovered, closing steady at net declines of 5 to 7 points.

Liverpool was lower than due at the start here, but as the weather and the Atlantic states continued to put first grades were steady, two points up to two down. In the first hour prices advanced to 16.25, while the market gained 10 to 15 points on the day.

The market opened steady at a decline of 2 to 4 points under selling, inspired by relatively easy Liverpool cables, but soon turned firmer on covering and fresh buying which seemed to be based on unfavorable weather reports.

Private advices said yesterday's rains in West Texas had been insufficient, while the early reports showed further rains in central belt sections where dry weather in general had prevailed.

July closed off to 16.18, December 16.77, and January 16.83, or 10 to 14 points net lower. But offerings tapered off somewhat in late trading, and last prices showed a rally of some 5 or 7 points on covering.

Port receipts today 3,892 U. S. bales, 1,704,545. Exports 11,121 making 10,263,131 so far this season.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, May 25 (AP)—An avalanche of selling overtook the grain markets today after a wild new upturn. Much of the selling was to realize profits, but there was also speculative selling by traders who figured their advances of late had been too rapid.

ESCAPED WOMEN CONVICTS HOLD HOUNDS AT BAY

WANDER ALL NIGHT OVER RAIN-SOAKED WOODS

RETURN TO PRISON

WOMEN DECIDE PRISON LIFE IS BETTER THAN SOAKING FREEDOM

(By the Associated Press)

HUNTSVILLE, May 25.—The story of how two women prisoners, who escaped from the state penitentiary here May 22, captured eight blood hounds sent on their trail and then with the dogs and a mounted guard were lost all night in a woods is told at the penitentiary here.

In addition to the feat of the women capturing the dogs, some to capture them, the adventure was unrelieved by several other incidents which included lipsticks, powder puffs, and the inevitable fainting spell.

Escape During Rain.

Lola Chase, a young white woman from Ft. Worth, and Louise Florento, a full blooded Indian girl from Weatherford, seized an opportunity during a heavy rain to get away from the Goree State farm for female prisoners. They left about 7 p. m. and had a good start when time came for counting in the prisoners an hour later.

Eight of the farm's best blood hounds were put on the trail in charge of Gus Grey, dog sergeant, who was mounted on a horse. The rain made the trail difficult for the dogs, but they kept barking after their quarry.

The going was equally hard for Grey's horse. For four hours he attempted to follow the deep baying hounds over slippery roads and across swollen streams. Then he suddenly realized the hounds had got beyond hearing so he drew in his horse.

Horn Has No Effect.

The dogs are controlled by a horn, and Grey set to work blowing his signals on the horn. For 40 minutes he blew himself black in the face, but no bloodhounds were to be heard a noise in the woods, and soon there appeared the eight dogs led by the two women.

The prisoners had made strings of their skirts tying the blood hounds together. The pursued had captured the pursuers.

Grey told the young women to get on the horse but they refused. Roamed for Two Hours.

The girls said that they had been roaming around in the dark for two hours. They had tied a white rag to a stump to guide them, but kept going around in a circle always coming back to the white rag.

Then began Grey's efforts to extricate himself and his charges from the woods. They had not gone far when Lola fainted from the cold. The guard and the other girl worked over her until she was revived. She was placed on the horse and the party proceeded again, trying to find a way out in the black night. The Indian girl refused to ride, but after walking two miles she fell exhausted and fainted.

When she revived she was willing to ride the horse with Lola.

About 4 o'clock in the morning, the lost party heard chickens crowing. This led them to a farm house, three miles from the Goree farm. A fire was built and the women revived. Both prisoners through it all had clung to their powder puffs, lipsticks and eye brow pencils though their clothing was torn to shreds.

Back at the prison farm they received 48 hours in the solitary and had to wear the stripes, but they concluded a dry prison life was better than a black, water soaked woods.

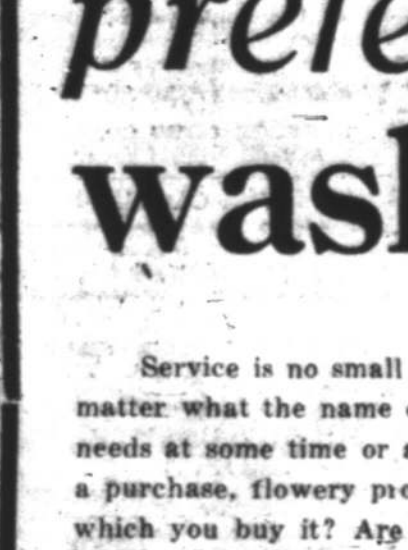
