THE BUG MEN ARE HERE

Two very interesting visitors in town are Mr. F. J. Bolender and Mr. H. M. Blon from El Paso, specialists in farming, especially in cotton, by the inoculation method with Legumes. They are introducing this new method which is old as the Bible.

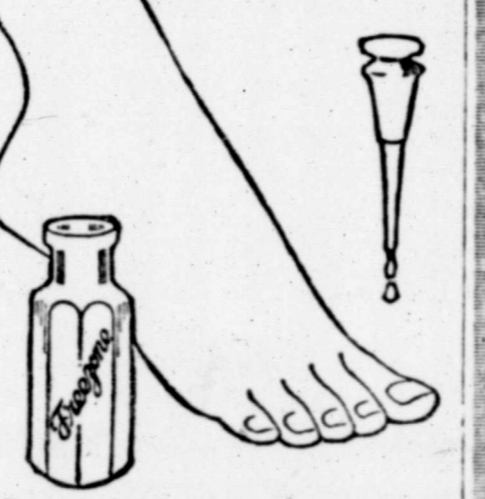

"Now," said Joseph "let us take one-fifth of the corn crop of the seven prosperous years, and keep it as a provision for the seven years in which these shall be no corn crop."

WHAT BELGIUM HAS DONE

By H. H. Windsor

The progress toward the restoration of prewar conditions which Belgium has already accomplished is little less than marvelous. In less than a year, her coal production—the basis of modern industry—reached 90 per cent sugar refineries, 100 per cent; cotton looms, 60 per cent; wool products 75 per cent, and shoes 70 per cent. Even steel production which suffered most, reached 30 per cent.

When Germany seized and carried away the machinery of Belgium factories, the confident expectation was to so crush out industrial production as to leave the Belgians reduced to agriculture. But the tide which ebbed so fiercely has been flowing back until of 9,797 machines of which a record was kept, there had by the end of 1919, been returned 5,069 machines, and the remainder was still coming back at the rate of 30 carloads a day. During the war 1,366 miles of railroad track and 1,419 bridges were destroyed, and already these have been reconstructed.

We are accustomed to think of China and Japan as densely settled countries but in 1913 Belgium was the most densely populated and intensively cultivated country in the world. Its 11,373 square miles make it about the size of Maryland, with one man in every six a land owner. To such perfection had agriculture been developed that three-fifths of the total area was under cultivation, producing an average of \$100 per acre—a record equalled by no other country. A 601 mile pipe line for pumping beet sugar from 14 gathering stations to the sugar refineries, illustrates the advanced development of its agricultural industries. In devastated farm lands Belgium was fortunate in losing only 70,000 acres—less than one per cent of its total area.

Washington, March—"I would not have any office in the world if I could not carry my home county," said former Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey when informed of the challenge made by R. E. Thomason in his opening campaign speech at Gainesville yesterday.

Senator Bailey refused to say what he will do until he gets positive assurance that Thomason made the Cook County challenge.

"I can't believe that Thomason made any such statement as that unless he is trying to find an easy way to get out," he said. "It is ridiculous. I do not believe it possible."

"Before I reply I want to know positively what he said. He should have communicated with me direct. This is the first I had heard of it. If he made the statement, I shall hear of it, very likely, from some of my friends."

"My mind is made up if I find the information is correct. It won't take but an instant for me to make my decision."

Gainesville, Texas, March—The challenge of Robert E. Thomason in opening his Governor's campaign here yesterday, to Joseph Weldon Bailey that he enter into a preferential primary in Cooke County, was the sensation of his speech and will prove to be the choicest bit of political talk developed since Bailey entered the race.

The challenge was made after Thomason had been making witty and sarcastic thrusts at Bailey and after he had declared he believed he would carry Cooke County. Cooke County has been No-Man's-Land in numerous political campaigns in which Bailey was the pivotal figure. If Cooke County should go against Bailey, there would be something new under the political sun.

Thomason's challenge was this:

That there be a preferential primary, called as quickly as possible, Bailey will name one-half of the Judges; Thomason will name the other half. Thomason offers to pay all of the expenses of the race. If Bailey wins, Thomason will quit the race, if Thomason wins Bailey will quit the race.

Speculation is rife here as to whether or not Bailey will accept the challenge. Some of his staunchest

friends say that Bailey likely will ignore it. Others describe Bailey as being confident that his friends in Cooke County, who have stood behind him for a quarter of a century, will back him to the utmost limit now and that he may snatch up the challenge.

Quick Developments Due

Political developments are expected to come thick and fast now Thomason has laid down his plank. B. F. Looney is yet to open his campaign. He, like Thomason is a Bailey man of years standing. Looney, in one speech denounced Bailey's entrance into the present political situation in Texas.

The biggest political events now in prospect however are the conference which will be held in Dallas, Friday and the return of Bailey from Washington, which is expected some time within the next two weeks.

The conference in Dallas Saturday will be a gigantic indignation meeting at Bailey's entrance into the race as well as a ratification meeting for everything that the Wilson administration has done. Undoubtedly the crucial point in the entire political situation will be the May primary conventions and the subsequent county and state conventions. It is toward the capturing of these that Bailey is looking now and everything he is saying and has said have this in view. The Saturday conference at Dallas will be to formulate a plan of action which will hold the Texas Democrat trenches against the onslaught of Bailey.

Realizes Uphill Fight

Bailey himself, and his friends, realize that he has an uphill fight to capture these conventions. He is going up against the party machine—every county chairman and every other machine man, is going to have his fighting clothes on. He is attacking the administration, for which Texas, more than any other state was responsible. Another thing which, it is recognized, will be to Bailey's disadvantage is the fact that he had no objective in view, that is, there is not an avowed candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination which shares his political views unless he, himself should be regarded as an available candidate. Therefore Bailey's enemies are ready now to make the May convention a test. If Bailey is decisively beaten, and unquestionably beaten, they believe it will so discredit him that he will virtually be forced to retire. Bailey's friends know that if he wins in the convention, or that it turns out in such a way that if might appear that Bailey has been counted out and beaten by a party machine with steam roller methods, that his position in the subsequent elections will be stronger. Recognizing that the party machinery is in the control of Wolf and Love, Bailey's backers declare that they know more about this old party machine than anybody else does and that Wolf and Love do not know how to operate the thing.

Bailey will make a speech at Dallas about the middle of March. In it he will make a vigorous attack upon the record of Tom Love and Bailey will set aside the reserve that has characterized his speeches up to now. It will be a regular Bailey speech according to word that he has handed out to his friends.

WHO'S AFRAID

Dallas, March—Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey has refused to accept the challenge thrown down to him by R. E. Thomason to submit the question of their gubernatorial candidacies to a Cooke County primary and let the loser withdraw, according to information received here.

Judge Charles F. Greenwood and John J. Simmons have received a letter from him, but had not announced its contents up to 6 o'clock tonight. However, it is understood that Bailey has declined the challenge upon the ground that he is "the candidate of 5,000,000 people in Texas and not the 30,000 in Cooke County."

Bailey assures his friends in Cooke County that he has every confidence in them, but under the circumstances he does not believe it right to "submit a question of principle in which the entire state is interested" to "any particular group."

IMPROVED GIANT INCUBATOR

Holding 10,500 eggs, and hatching 2,500 each week, in a space 8 1/2 ft. square, is the feat performed by an improved incubator with a growing record of success, according to the March Popular Mechanics Magazine. As there illustrated, the big hatching machine resembles a retailer's refrigerator, and is complete in itself.

Two large oil heaters are installed at the rear, and a partitioned cross chamber is lined with hot-water pipes with electric fans at the top. The air is forced down around the pipes and up through the egg chambers, adjusted ventilator at the top keeping evaporation at a minimum. By a special arrangement, all the eggs can be turned in five minutes. A smaller model of 2,440-egg capacity is also made in similar form.

BAPTISTS LAUNCH BIGGER PROGRAM

\$100,000,000 IN SUBSCRIPTIONS AND \$20,000,000 IN CASH BY MAY 1 IS NEW AIM SET.

WILL SEEK SOULS, ALSO

Evangelistic Campaign Calculated To Reach Thousands of Unsaved Persons is Announced For March and April of This Year.

Now that the subscriptions to the Baptist 75 Million Campaign have passed the \$90,000,000 mark, leaders in all the states composing the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention have resolved to place this sum at \$100,000,000 by the meeting of the Convention at Washington early in May. It is also planned to bring the total of cash offerings by that time to \$20,000,000. The convention at Washington will be the seventy-fifth session of that body and it is deemed appropriate to celebrate the diamond jubilee of the organization with an enlarged subscription and cash sum with which to carry forward the missionary, educational and benevolent work fostered by the convention in all parts of the world.

This additional sum will be sought from churches which did not have a part in the original campaign, from members of churches who did not subscribe then and from other persons who made subscriptions in the fall but who feel disposed to increase their subscriptions now. This effort for increased funds will be made during the last week in April so that everything can be completed before the convention meets in Washington May 12.

Returns By the States.

The reports on the original drive for funds in the 75 Million Campaign to date, as made by the several states, follow: Alabama, \$4,100,000; Arkansas, \$2,265,000; District of Columbia, \$250,000; Florida, \$1,370,392; Georgia, \$10,100,000; Southern Illinois, \$830,704; Kentucky, \$7,167,713; Louisiana, \$2,875,000; Maryland, \$907,760; Mississippi, \$4,144,902; Missouri, \$2,062,506; New Mexico, \$732,260; North Carolina, \$7,250,000; Oklahoma, \$3,200,000; South Carolina, \$7,554,772; Tennessee, \$5,010,000; Texas, \$16,560,000; Virginia, \$8,298,488. Returns from the foreign mission fields and other sources not included in the above bring the total subscriptions beyond \$90,000,000.

This vast sum of money was raised at a total expense of three-quarters of one per cent, making this probably the most economically conducted campaign in the history of the country.

Plan Evangelistic Campaign.

Prior to this effort for additional subscriptions and cash, however, a South-wide campaign of evangelism, stewardship and emphasis upon the fundamental doctrines of religion is planned for the month of March and the first three weeks in April, when the churches will employ their organized forces in seeking to win to Christ many thousands of the 20,000,000 people within the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention who are not affiliated with any church. A day of prayer in behalf of the success of every item on the Baptist program for the spring and summer of 1920 has been set apart. Many of the states have already got their evangelistic campaigns well under way.

In the hope of arousing as large interest as possible, city-wide, county-wide and associational campaigns of soul-winning have been planned in many places. In other places, especially the rural districts, where the summer months are considered more desirable for evangelistic work, the special program will be deferred until July and August. This will make it possible for city pastors to aid the rural pastors and thus double the evangelistic force of the denomination.

The program of evangelism, stewardship and emphasis upon the fundamental doctrines of religion is calculated to conserve the victory achieved in the campaign for funds. Dr. George W. Truett, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Dallas, Tex., is chairman of the campaign commission, while Dr. L. R. Scarborough continues in the capacity of general director.

A TRIBUTE TO MOTHER LOVE

Hon. I. W. Culp, candidate for Lieutenant governor of Texas, in a recent talk had occasion to pay a tribute to Mother Love and he told the following little story:

"She was an old black mammy, boys; her face would have made a wash kettle look as white as a China jar and her hair had all the characteristic kinks of the race she represented. I saw her sitting under a service flag that was decorated with a star of gold; the tears were running down her fat cheeks and she wiped them away with a big apron she wore. 'Washington am dead' she muttered, 'dey done and send me word fore days ago. He war a coming home but the 'fluenza hit got him an' now my pore chile, my soldier, I don't get to

see him no more. I'se got him a pie done cooked with his ole black mammy's hams. But he won't nebbber, nebbber 'joy it. Washington, March—The constitutionality of the prohibition amendment and portions of the enforcement act will be argued tomorrow before the Supreme Court.

The salary on motor routes ranges from \$2,100 to \$2,250 per annum. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory supplied with mail by a post office in the county.

120,000 STAND IN BREAD LINE

More Than 1,000,000 Face Death Is Message Brought by Miss Dakesian.

Imagine a bread line of 120,000 famished people waiting for twenty-four hours a day for the dole of food that is the sole barrier between them and death from starvation. That is the situation in Alexandropol, a city in Russian Armenia, according to Miss Hermine Dakesian, a pretty Armenian girl, one of the survivors of four years

of the horrors of Turkish massacres and deportations. Saved by an American woman, she has come to this country and entered Oberlin College.

With her came fourteen other Armenian girls in charge of Miss Adelaide S. Dwight, a Near East Relief worker, who has been instrumental in helping to save hundreds of thousands of their people from death by starvation. Miss Dwight, who is not given to exaggeration and has seen conditions at first hand, says more than a million people are facing death by starvation in Armenia and will perish unless American aid.

Herself an eyewitness to the slaughter of hundreds of helpless women and children by the Turks and a victim of the deportations, Miss Dakesian, an unusually pretty girl, says there is untold suffering in Armenia and Syria. She praises the efforts of the Near East Relief, formerly the American Committee for Armenian and Syrian Relief, to save as many of these people as possible. At Erivan, the capital of the Armenian republic, one hot meal is given out daily, and by this relief alone the city's death rate has been cut from a thousand daily to an average of twenty. At Alexandropol, where the refugees from Turkish Armenia were driven by thousands, the situation is appalling, Miss Dakesian says. It is to avert these wholesale deaths that Near East Relief is making a nation-wide appeal for funds.

BOY SCOUTS IN YOUNG ARMENIA

Strangest Troop of All in Constantinople Being Made Into Good Citizens.

American Boy Scout training is adding prominently in the rehabilitation of hundreds of little Armenian boy refugees from the Turkish massacres, who have been organized into a scout troop in Constantinople as the solution of one of the most troublesome problems that confronted the Near East Relief workers in that city.

Hounded and driven for four years, having seen their parents and relatives slaughtered or worse by Turks and Kurds and themselves forced to beg, steal or do almost anything to eke out the barest existence, these boys had completely lost their moral sense when they finally found refuge in the Near East Relief orphanages.

The boys had been clad in rags for so long that they had forgotten how to take care of clothes. This was a tragedy when the Near East Relief had need of every pair of shoes and of every suit of clothes for new boys constantly coming in.

Then the boys were organized as Boy Scouts and given their uniforms. They began to be careful of their school clothes as well as of their uniforms.

They had been so often hungry they had come to steal without compunction. When they first entered the orphanages they continued to steal. One boy stole a purse from his American teacher. INCOME TAX RETURNS DUE

Business Men, Farmers and Wage Workers Must File Schedules of Income for 1919.

MARCH 15 LAST FILING DATE.

Net Incomes of \$1,000 or Over, if Single; or \$2,000 or Over if Married, Must Be Reported.

The Income Tax imposed by Act of Congress on earnings of the year 1919 is now being collected.

Returns under oath must be made on or before March 15 by every citizen and resident who had a net income for 1919 amounting to:

\$1,000 or over, if single; or if married and living apart from wife (or husband); or if widowed or divorced.

\$2,000 or over, if married and living with wife (or husband). The status of the person on the last day of the year fixes the status for the year with respect to the above requirements.

Under any of these circumstances a return must be made, even though no tax is due.

Husband and wife must consider the income of both, plus that of dependent minor children, in meeting this requirement; and, if sufficient to require a return, all items must be shown in a joint return or in separate returns of husband and wife.

A single person with minor dependents must include the income of such dependents.

A minor who has a net income of \$1,000 or more is not considered a dependent, and must file a separate return.

Personal returns should be made on Form 1040A, unless the net income exceeded \$5,000, in which case Form 1040 should be used.

Residents of Texas should file their returns with, and make payments of income tax to, Alexander S. Walker, Collector of Internal Revenue, Austin, Tex.

How to Figure Income.

The best way to find out whether one must file a return is to get a Form 1040A and follow the instructions printed on it. That form will serve as a reminder of every item of income, and if a return is due it tells how to prepare and file it.

If in doubt on any point as to income or deductions, a person may secure free advice and aid from the nearest Internal Revenue office.

Guesswork, estimates and other hit-or-miss methods are barred when a person is making out his Income Tax return. Accuracy and completeness must be insisted upon. The return is a sworn statement. As such it must be thorough and accurate.

Salaries and wages earners must ascertain the actual compensation received. Overtime, bonuses, shares in the profits of a business, value of quarters and board furnished by employer and other items which are compensations for services, must be included.

It must be borne in mind that compensation may be paid in other forms than in cash. A bonus paid in Liberty Bonds is taxable at the market value of the bonds. A note received in payment for services is taxable income at its face value, and the interest upon it is also taxable.

Other Returns Due.

Every partnership doing business in the United States must file a return on Form 1065; and every personal service corporation must file a similar return.

Corporations must file annual returns on Form 1120.

Trustees, executors, administrators and others acting in a fiduciary capacity are required to file returns. In some cases, Form 1041 is used; in others, Form 1040; and still others, returns on both forms are required.

Information returns, on Forms 1029 and 1030, must be filed by every organization, firm or person who paid, during 1919, an amount of \$1,000 in salary, wages, interest, rent, or other fixed or determinable income to another person, partnership, personal service corporation or fiduciary. These information returns should be forwarded directly to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue (sorting division), Washington, D. C.

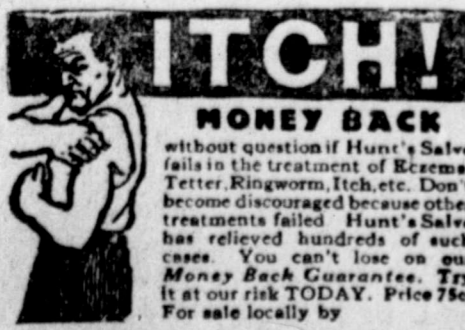

WILSON'S NAME IS LOUDLY CHEERED

Dallas, March—Resolutions endorsing the Wilson administration and its every act, were unanimously adopted at the close of the conference of Wilson Democrats which were held in the city auditorium. The report was presented by Cullen F. Thomas and every paragraph was cheered to the echo.

Pat M. Neff, R. E. Thomason, Dwight Lewelling and B. F. Looney, candidates for Governor, made speeches similar to those made during the campaign.

Dallas, March.—Every mention of the name of Wilson, and of the acts of the National Administration, especially the League of Nations, was cheered at the meeting here of Democrats, called to take action looking forward to a pro-Wilson delegation to the National Democratic convention in San Francisco. It was a representative gathering of Texas Democrats friendly to the National Administration and there were people—men and women—here from every section of Texas. Women sat on the platform and when Gen. M. M. Crane who presided, said that women would go to the convention, there was wild applause.

Hobby Applauded

One of the first men to appear on the platform was M. M. Crane, who called the meeting to order. He was given liberal applause. The appearance of Governor Hobby was the signal for a tremendous outburst of applause. He was accompanied by a number of women.

C. E. Wilcoxson, right-hand man Bailey, was Bailey's scout at the meeting.

R. E. Thomason of El Paso characterized as absurd the statement of Bradley of Fort Worth that Tom Love inspired his challenge to Bailey. He said he had not spoken to Love since the San Antonio convention.

Thomason, Neff and Looney walked on the platform together. There was an ovation. Tom Love was on the platform.

General Crane, in calling the meeting to order, explained that it was not called in interest of any political candidate, although he said, "Any candidate for Governor fit to hold a Democratic nomination ought to be here." Crane reviewed the achievements of the Wilson administration and the mention of the Federal Reserve Bank, the Federal Farm Loan Bank and the passage of national prohibition and suffrage were loudly applauded. Defending vigorously the entrance of the United States into the war, the crowd cheered when Crane said, "We didn't go into it with only 1,000,000 men as Bailey would have it."

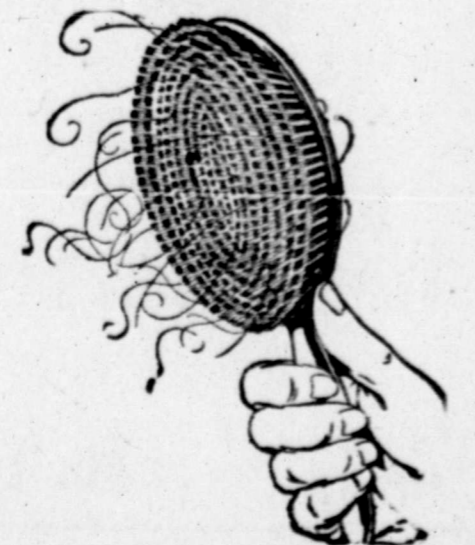
"We will work day and night to see that delegation that will stand for the national administration is sent to San Francisco. Woodrow Wilson is a mere unit as an individual to me," he continued, "but my intelligence tells me that he has made the greatest record of any president in history." The crowd cheered.

Ball's Chairman

When nominated for chairman were asked for Marshall Hicks of San Antonio nominated Thomas H. Ball of Houston. His nomination was seconded by Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald of Fort Worth. The election was unanimous.

son for President in the entire country. "They accept national prohibition," Ball said, "but they are trying to organize everybody against everything to oppose everybody who is for anything. They are for prohibition, but against its enforcement. When they get two and three-quarters beer and 3.25 per cent light wines instead of these Federal spies they have been talking about there will be a chemist to travel with a man so that when he drinks he will know whether he is violating the law or not."

Hobby is Introduced

The reading of a number of telegrams brought big applause. The most important was from Paul D. Page of Bishop, long an anti-prohibitionist which vigorously assailed Bailey and predicted that "booze, boodum and Bailey would not win."

There was also one from T. M. Campbell.

All of them endorsed the administration of Wilson and the purpose for which the meeting was called. Governor Hobby was the first speaker after the organization had been perfected. When his name was called he was given a rousing ovation.

"I am glad to attend a meeting of Democrats and want to see a Democrat instead of a Republican as President," Governor Hobby said, who was introduced as the man who, "as Governor has stood behind the national administration since prohibition and plenty has succeeded whiskey and want."

"Want to Raise the Devil"

"There are those wanting to raise the devil in Texas because they believe if they succeed in raising the devil they believe they themselves can rise again."

"The only thing I know of deader than opposition to constitutional suffrage and prohibition are those leading the opposition."

"There are factions within and without the Democratic party seeking to destroy it, and there is a common understanding between them."

"The movement is a combination of leaders only. It has two things to extinguish and distinguish it. It is distinguished because it has only in it defeated politicians who have left office and who admit that since they

have left it no big men hold office. (Applause.) They are extinguished because they are headed by 'exes' one an ex-governor and the other an ex-Senator.

Incurs Enmity.

"I incurred the enmity of an ex-Governor when I succeeded him in office. I incurred the displeasure of an ex-Senator, attorney for an association of those opposed to national prohibition, when I called the Legislature together to open the doors of the University and close the doors of the saloon in Texas."

"That is the cause of all the trouble. The cause of all the fury. Since I have been Governor of Texas I have not heeded their cause."

"Bailey says it is a long distance from Sul Ross to Will Hobby. I can't measure the distance, but it will be a lot longer from Sul Ross to Joe Bailey (applause) because he will never be Governor at all." (Applause.)

BOX SUPPER

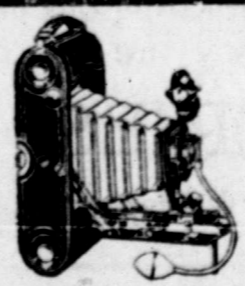

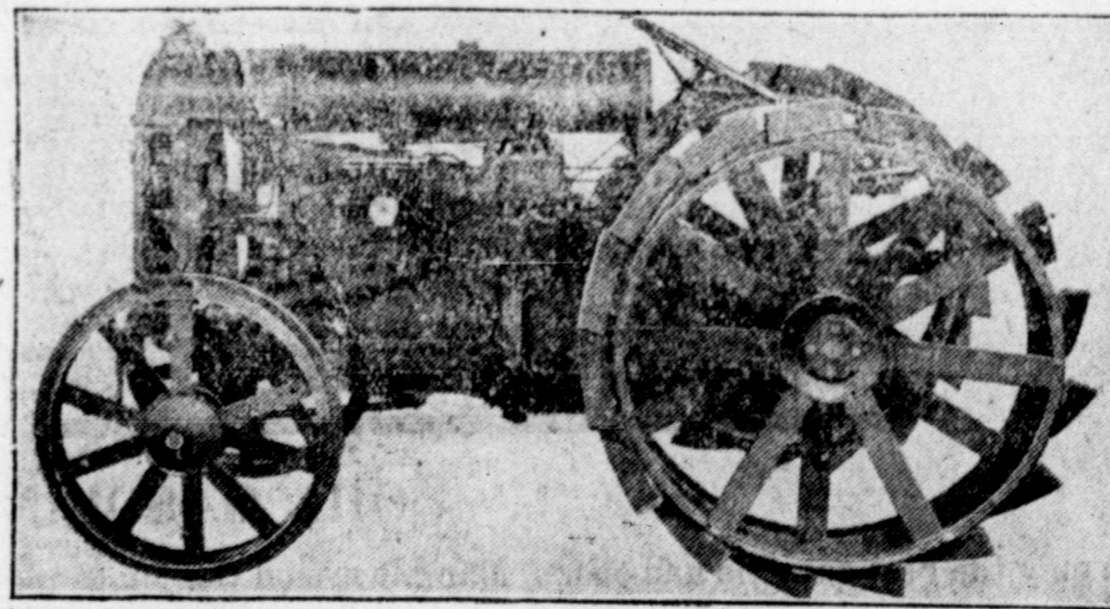

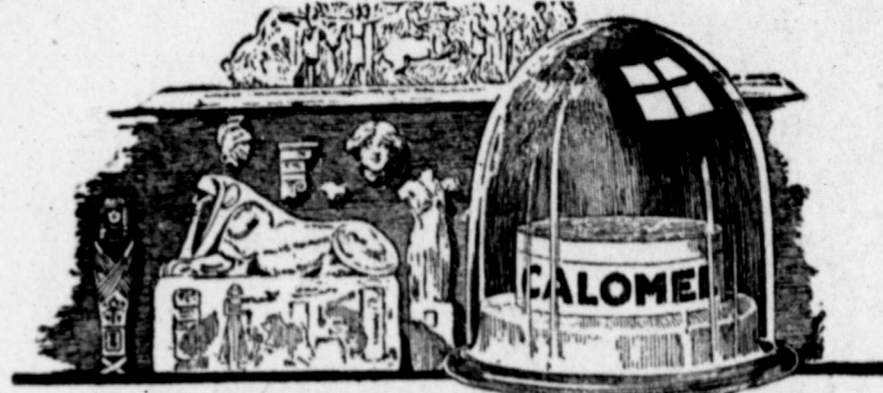
