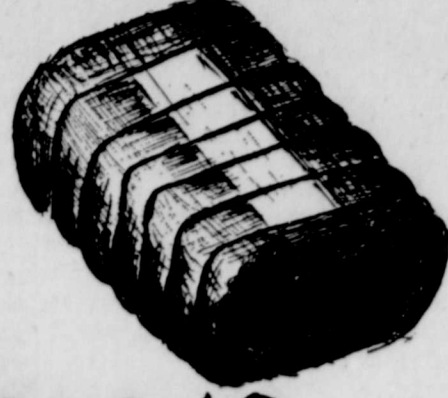
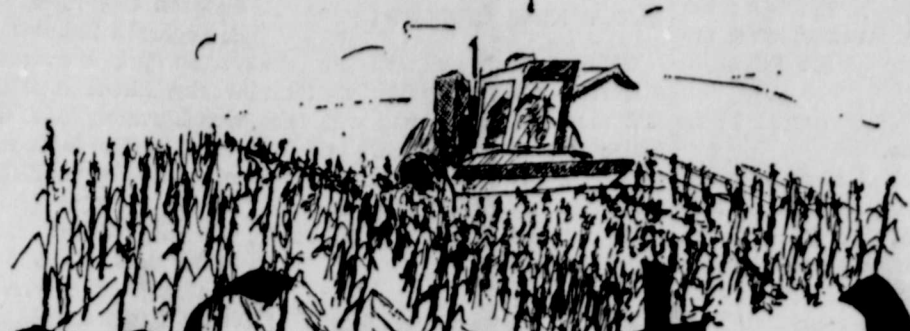
It was voted to order a camera for filming the football games instead of borrowing a camera again this year.

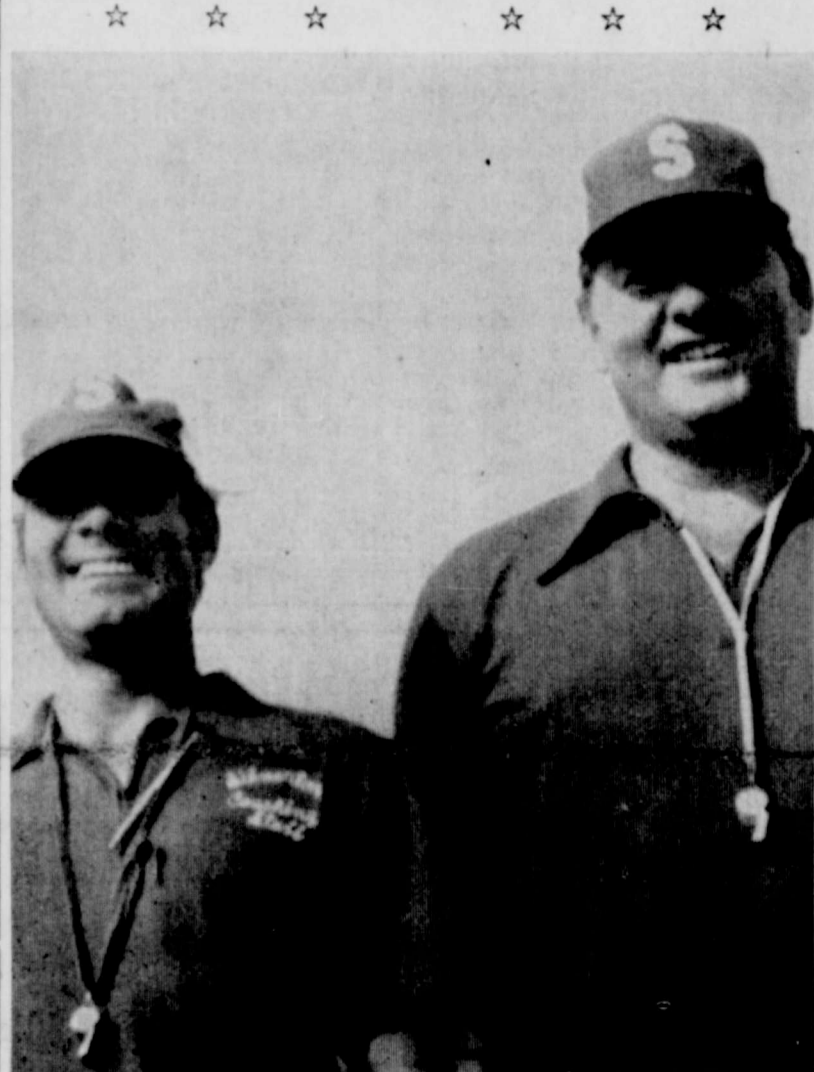

Owls To Scrimmage Springlake-Earth Here

Silverton's Owls will scrimmage Springlake-Earth at 7:30 p.m. Friday on the home field.

Many changes are evident in the lineup this year, with players returning who weren't able to play last year and other players being switched to new positions.

Sophomore Dayne Mayfield, who weighed in at 200 pounds this year to be the heaviest man on the squad, has moved from center to a tackle slot. Senior Zane Mayfield is returning after taking a year off to recover from a back injury and surgery, and is replacing Ken Wood at quarterback. Wood, another senior, has moved to fullback. (Coach Weldon McCord lists Wood as one of the team's toughest players.)

Senior Scott Hutsell has returned after sitting out last season with a broken foot, and Senior Mikel Griffin is back after a bout with hepatitis last school year.

"Last year when we played Littlefield early in the year, we suited up 16 players," Coach McCord said, "and 10 of those were freshmen. We were real young and it showed, especially defensively."

"This season we will have more depth, experience and speed, although we're not tremendously fast," he added. "I believe we will have a pretty good ball club."

Coach McCord is being assisted

this year by Coach Russell McGough, with whom he coached at Liberty High School before coming to Silverton last year. Coach McGough moved here last May after being at Crowell last season.

Misfortune struck in the Owl workout Tuesday afternoon when Junior Randy Clay went down with a broken ankle. This leaves 29 Owls working out for football.

Kindergarten To Enroll November 22

Kindergarten enrollment will be conducted on the morning of November 22, 1974, according to an announcement today by the Silverton Public Schools.

The youngsters will be invited to eat in the school lunchroom, and parents should plan to pick them up right after their 11:00 a.m. lunch.

The new students should bring their birth certificates and 60¢ for their lunch. They will be required to have completed their immunizations before the second semester starts in January. Free immunization clinics are planned before then.

Registration Down In Silverton Schools

Registration figures showed student enrollment to be down from last year even though students were continuing to enroll each day. At the end of last school year, Silverton High School had a student population of 117. On Tuesday of this week, 124 were enrolled in high school.

A total of 244 were enrolled in the first eight grades.

Although the Mackenzie dam is essentially complete, the area will not be ready for utilization by the public before spring, according to Don Bookout, attorney for the Mackenzie Water Authority, who spoke to representatives of the four towns comprising the authority at a meeting held Monday in Tulia.

The meeting was called by Tulia Chamber of Commerce to initiate plans for promotion of the lake which will serve Tulia, Silverton, Lockney and Floydada, and to coordinate these plans.

Fencing of the property has not been completed and the area is presently under lease for cattle grazing. Adequate personnel is not available at this time to police the property. Neither boat ramps nor an office building has yet been constructed. Guard rails have not yet been constructed in potentially dangerous areas and there are many opportunities for sight-seers to be injured.

In short, the area is not yet ready for public use and all vehicular traffic is banned.

Preliminary plans have been made to lay off certain areas for lease to individuals who desire to build cabins for personal use. Tentative locations include two peninsulas on the south side of the lake. Tentative plans are to reserve most of the north side for the public, those not desiring to construct private buildings of a permanent nature.

In answer to numerous inquiries from persons wanting to lease building locations, Bookout said that certain dates would be announced this fall after the building plots have been surveyed and zoned for interested persons to drive through the area and become familiar with the locations and prices of the lots to be leased. Lots nearest to the lake will lease for a higher fee than those more distant from the lake.

All taxpaying residents of the four communities will then be invited to examine maps to be located at all banks in the four communities and sign up for a building site in the section desired, placing the money in escrow. The specific lot will then be determined by lot in a public drawing.

After tax paying residents of the four communities have been given a chance, all other interested persons will be given an opportunity to select building sites.

Bookout noted that there will be plenty of building sites for everyone in all price ranges.

"We have enough locations to satisfy every resident of the four communities should such a demand exist," he said. "Other such lakes have contracted with commercial firms to sell lots through sales promotions."

Bookout said that these two peninsulas alone will have a total of from 300 to 400 building sites. Because no tax funds can be expended on recreational aspects of the lake, many of the improvements needed will have to await funds from other sources.

Inasmuch as the taxpayers have built the dam, directors of the authority are anxious for the people to have access to the project as soon as possible, Bookout said. But until potentially dangerous areas can be enclosed and adequate personnel provided to police not only sightseers but the public property, the area must be considered off limits. Damage occurred recently to the dam when youth on motorcycles attempted to use it as a race track.

Gary Martin has been named assistant manager of the authority, assisting Clayton Keller, manager, whose work must be limited due to a recent heart attack.

The authority is expected to accept the project from the contractor Monday night.

Bookout noted that due to inflation, the present value of the dam is much greater than the contract price. The contractor indicated that his bid on the same project today would be many hundreds of thousands of dollars higher than the figure bid at the time the contract was awarded.
