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## Republicans "cook" at July 4th Picnic in Lindsay Park

The usual hot Texas heat did not seem to put a damper on the events of the afternoon at the Cooke County Republican Party's "Old-fashioned Fourth of July on the Third of July Picnic." More than 300 people came to the Lindsay Park on Sunday to enjoy a day of fun, food and the chance to listen to some very noted Republican candidates.

The highlight of the afternoon was a visit from Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison, her first appearance to Cooke County since being elected to the Senate.

Unlike her usual rallies, Hutchison came to Lindsay Park Sunday not to be honored, but to honor William M. "Luke" Lance, the oldest known surviving World War I veteran. Hutchison presented a United States flag to Lance that was flown over the capitol at Hutchison's request especially for him.

After being asked how he felt, the 98-year-old simply replied, "I feel wonderful!" He then went on to add, "I've been a plowboy all my life, but I love the life and people in the army."

Lance then recalled his first day in the army, remembering the fact that many people doubted that his slim, 5'2"-frame would ever survive the army. "The good Lord gets credit for all of it," Lance said.

Hutchison then expressed her concerns and plans for the country to the voters at the picnic.

Hutchison stated that America should not interfere with the problems of other countries unless it involves the interests of our country. She is against sending troops to Bosnia, Somalia and Haiti. Hutchison does believe, however, that the United States must take a stand against Korea on its violation on the non-proliferation treaty and on the nuclear arms issue.

Hutchison also added that family values and patriotism need to be emphasized in the American life.

Pat Peale, organizer of the event, then introduced the emcee for the day, Carole Keeton Rylander, the Republican nominee for the Texas Railroad Commission. Rylander, a former school teacher, was the first woman mayor of Austin, and the only mayor to be elected three times by the people of Austin.

Rylander addressed an issue of great interest to many residents of the Cooke County area, the oil industry. Rylander feels that independent oil and gas producers must be given incentives to expand and continue producing.

Rylander quoted a bumper sticker with a message she strongly believes, "If oil is worth dying for, it's worth drilling for." Rylander plans to encourage oil and gas exploration in Texas "like the good old days."

Appearances were also made by David Bridges, the Republican candidate who is running against U.S. Congressman Ralph Hall, and Bill Wellman, who spoke on behalf

of George W. Bush, candidate for Texas Governor.

Tex Lezar, candidate for Lieutenant Governor, encouraged voters to help take Democrats out of Austin in November. The candidate for State Comptroller, Teresa Doggett, focused on how Republican candidates, including herself, have decreased government spending, beginning with the salaries of government employees.

David Hartman, candidate for State Treasurer, stressed the current tax situation, stating, "We don't need state income taxes; we need property tax relief."

Charles Matthews, the other candidate for the Railroad Commission, focused his speech on his concerns for the trucking reform, which has been an important issue in this race.

Other candidates making appearances were two nominees for the Court of Criminal Appeals, Steve Mansfield and Sharon Keller, and Tom Haywood, candidate for Texas State Senate, District 30. Unable to appear was current State Representative Ric Williamson, due to a family emergency.

Local Republican candidates also got a chance to speak to voters. Paul Hesse, the County Judge nominee, asked voters for their help to reduce taxes and spending by electing Republicans to national, state and local offices, as did the other Republican party nominees, Pat Payne, District Clerk; Richard

## MISD: facing the state finance challenge

This will be the first article explaining MISD's budget, state finances and taxes for the '94-'95 school year.

Once again, our state officials are projecting no new taxes, even in light of a projected \$2 billion shortfall in state revenues. With a pending Supreme Court decision on the status of the current school finance system and a multi-million dollar facilities mandate for public schools (this is regardless of the Supreme Court decision), it becomes apparent that they may not be telling the truth. It is going to be another interesting legislative session. What I'm obviously saying is don't expect any relief from the state and that translates into a continued burden on the local level.

If we briefly chronicle taxes, budgets and revenues the past four years at MISD, we see some interesting developments. In school year '89-'90, the tax rate for MISD was \$.61. In '90-'91, the rate was set at \$.73 (this was the first year the state required a minimum tax rate of all districts - the state requirement

was \$.72). The rate for '91-'92 was \$.98 (remember this was the first year of the County Education Districts and the tax rate was set by the CED Board - the state minimum tax requirement was \$.82). In '92-'93, MISD cut the tax rate from \$.98 to \$.92 (the CED set their rate at \$.83). In the '93-'94 school year, we began to operate under a new finance bill as the County Education Districts were abolished. The new bill required a minimum tax rate of \$.86. However, this bill was designed to radically affect districts that were considered above average wealth and the rich districts. MISD is considered an above-average wealth district. Our tax rate this year was \$1.09. If you look at MISD's local contribution the past four years, you will see that contribution ranges from 52% to a whopping 56% in '93-'94. This percentage is likely to increase as the current finance bill provides less and less state money.

MISD has had the lowest school tax in the county for 3 out of the last 4 years and, in '92-'93, our board even cut taxes \$.06 which gave us, for that year, one of the 8 lowest tax

rates in the state. Even now, we have the second lowest rate in the county excluding the smaller schools. 1993-'94 tax rates for county schools and surrounding schools are as follows:

These comparisons give us an idea of how other communities are impacted and how, comparatively speaking, MISD has been fortunate to pay lower taxes over the years.

Budgets at MISD have increased the past four years, too, due mainly to state mandates. Now everyone blames the state for this or that but, in the case of this ISD, it becomes very obvious of the state mandates and their impact on our budget increases - for instance: MISD has averaged approximately \$30,000 per year in state-mandated teacher raises for each of the past four years

for a total of approximately \$120,000. The 22:1 teacher/pupil ratio, as mandated by the state, has had its impact, too. We have had to split all our classes, K-5 splits will be complete this year. That has meant an additional six teachers at approximately \$20,000 per teacher for a total of \$120,000. Even with these increases, it is interesting to note that we still educate our kids, getting excellent results for approximately \$3700 per pupil, much below the state average and one of the lower costs per pupil in the state when compared to districts our size. As a matter of fact, that expenditure per pupil is better than most large districts can generate.

Revenues have increased also the past four years but you can easily see what the bulk of that increase

has gone for. We are not immune from the state trend toward higher local taxes, as a point of reference; once again, districts like ours are actually the target of state finance laws. MISD has been penalized under the last three finance bills with each one creating a greater tax burden on our local taxpayers. MISD lost over \$100,000 last year in state funding and we are projecting a loss of over \$60,000 this year because of skewed formulas. This happens because we are an above-average wealth district and the state scheme of finance penalizes districts like ours. Basically, there is only one way a district can generate more state revenue today and that is by increasing the number of students in attendance.

Some have asked the past few years how our neighbor Lindsay, down the road, has a lower tax rate and about the same, if not a little lower, expenditure per pupil. Of course, they do a good job of managing and watching costs and there are other variables, too, but basically they have from 60-80 more students than Muenster does. This probably generates anywhere from \$150,000-\$220,000 additional state dollars. If MISD had Lindsay's 60-80 students (let's use 80), those students would generate (under current funding formulas for MISD) approximately \$250,000 in additional state dollars. It would have a double impact on this district. It would lower our wealth per pupil from above-average

# Sister Roberta Hesse offers aid to nuns in Rwanda

With every newscast during the past several weeks, Münster relatives of Sister Roberta Hesse reeled, so preoccupied were they wondering about her safety. Members of her order, the Sisters of St. Mary of Namur, at Our Lady of Victory in Fort Worth, their major motherhouse in Buffalo, New York and the order's home base in Belgium, all made concerted efforts to keep in touch with their mission in Zaire, in Central Africa.

Sister Roberta Hesse, 59, is a native of Münster, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hesse. When she is able to return to her hometown for rare vacations, she is invited to speak to large groups about her 27 years of work for the convent's mission in Zaire, Africa, and her message is eagerly received. Sister Roberta was asked, with a group of others, to go to Rwanda, Africa on June 18 to assist in the rescue of nuns. It is believed they returned, mission accomplished, on June 28.

Within the past two weeks, Münster relatives were tremendously encouraged to hear after 10 weeks of terror in Rwanda. "TV coverage was a godsend," said her sister, Jane Myrick of Lindsay. "When I saw her after the helicopter landed," said a cousin, Virgil Henschel, "I knew there was no doubt. She was so recognizable."

Sisters-in-law Ethel Hesse and Agnes Hesse and many friends also saw the TV coverage on several metropolitan channels, and provided some of this information to **The Münster Enterprise**. Sister Francesca Walterscheid, a cousin at Our Lady of Victory in Fort Worth, was successful in getting a phone call through to Sister Roberta, and other local relatives have made frequent attempts.

On July 4, Sister Roberta called from Kinshasa, Africa to assure family members that she is safe and will soon return to Kingali Mateli, the mission where she served for 27 years before being sent to Rwanda to assist in the rescue. "Please pray for us and the people of Africa," she pleaded.

The nuns were reluctant to discuss their ordeal, but a visitor to the area revealed they had undergone several mock executions, when young machete-wielding militias lined them up against a wall as if to shoot them almost nightly. The nuns were forbidden to attempt to flee.

Since early April, the nuns had taken refuge in a convent in western Rwanda, when bloodletting started between ethnic Hutus and Tutsis. Thousands, mostly ethnic Tutsis, were massacred. "That's what weighed on us the most. You never knew whether you'd see the next

morning. Daybreak was always beautiful."

At the urging of Mother Superior Mary Julianne, head of the Belgian-based order, about 100 French Army commandos were dispatched to the convent in Rwanda. In addition to Sister Roberta, the rescued nuns included six Belgians, one American, an Irish nun and a Burundian nun. The others were Rwandan nuns.

The French special forces team, which the nuns and orphans regard as heroes, made preparation for the helicopter evacuation, told them to be ready at dawn, with only one bag each, at a pre-designated place. French trucks shuttled them to a landing zone a mile away and they then flew 38 miles by helicopter. Upon landing, some wept, most just smiled. One of the nuns said, "These are the people I will call, if ever I'm in trouble again. They were respectful of Rwandans, respectful of us, very efficient."

The American nuns told the media that throughout the ordeal, the Hutu African nuns assisted to protect their Tutsi African sisters-nuns from the murderous Hutu militiamen.

Sister Roberta Hesse said, "We stayed together. We came out together. Someday we'll go back together."

# Münster ISD plans for Pre-K

During their regular June board meeting, Münster school trustees dealt with several agenda items. Münster Superintendent Steve Cooper said it's about "99 percent sure" that the district will open a pre-kindergarten program this fall. The school district has received a federal grant for the program, but Münster school officials are to meet with grant representatives concerning the stipulations of the grant money.

The board approved a proposal from the Münster High School Student Council that a lounge be made available to students. Plans call for the existing teachers' lounge to be converted into a student area with benches and tables to be placed in the entryway to provide seating. The existing teachers' workroom is

expected to be converted into a teachers' lounge area.

Cooper reported that the district's TAAS scores for grades three through eighth and for 10th grade exit were very good. "We're very pleased with them and are hoping the scores will be enough for the district to receive exemplary status," Cooper said.

In other business, trustees:

--Approved incremental pay increases for luncheon staff and secretaries to bring their pay in line and approved a 2 percent pay raise for the remainder of support staff and administrators. The board is expected to discuss teacher salaries at its July board meeting.

--Hired Ann Sorenson as a special education teacher. Leigh Hale, who presently holds that position, will teach fifth grade in the fall.

--Took a look at the district's preliminary tax roll figures for 1994-1995. Cooper said the district's tax base is expected to drop from about \$82 million to about \$79.7 million. The state will short the district about \$65,000, according to early estimates, Cooper said, which may require a small tax increase.

--Approved the district's participation in the Tax Anticipation Note Program. The program allows the district to borrow money at short-term interest rates for the first two months of the school year while anticipating revenue from other sources.

--Approved a teacher maternity leave policy and revised the district's sick leave policy.

## "Civic Outlook"

It is predicted that a third of our future prosperity over the next century will come from our trade with Mexico. Most of the trade will be manufactured goods, particularly high tech products. In 1992, trade with Mexico was \$40.6 billion.

Unskilled and routine jobs are vanishing from the U.S., either moving to countries whose inhabitants are eager to work for low wages, or being replaced by automation. Automation and downsizing remove as many as 10,000 jobs from the U.S. labor force each month.

The I-35 Corridor Coalition is being formed by the 21 counties in Texas that Interstate 35 passes through. The I-35 Coalition wants to expand and improve I-35 to meet the future shipping needs that the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) will create.

At the same time, another group of Texans have begun their application to the Governor to build the new "superhighway" from Del Rio, Texas, through Wichita Falls and bypass I-35 all the way to Canada.

Because of the future trucking traffic and some shipments of hazardous materials coming through Texas to Mexico from all points in the U.S.A., improvements will need to be made to I-35 before it could become the "superhighway."

The I-35 Corridor Coalition represents a tremendous opportunity

for the counties along this vital route. Jobs will be created. We now have 35,000 18-wheelers crossing into the U.S.A. at Laredo each month and the majority of them use I-35.

I-35 already extends from Canada to Mexico and the Coalition wants it to become the new "superhighway" system.

Fiber optics, visual and electrical devices will become part of the system. On-board computers in trucks and automobiles will link up with satellite programs to locate the quickest route through an unfamiliar area. All this and much more will be part of the Intelligent Vehicle Highway System (IVHS) of tomorrow.

The computer will detect accidents and send automated messages to emergency response teams. You will be advised of the speed to set your cruise control on and will be warned when approaching slower moving vehicles. You will no longer become a stranded motorist as this system will guide you when you are lost and send help when you need it. Your vehicle and speed will be recorded.

Construction of the "superhighway" system will begin in 1997. Later, IVHS will be implemented in rural areas also. The plan is to have our roadways safer to travel, commute and enjoy.

## Council meeting is quiet

Vernon Smith of TU Electric, Gainesville presented a new rate case to the Muenster City Council on Monday night. But the new rate case will have no rate increase. Smith explained that it is mostly a move toward more competitive rates and mostly meant for commercial and industrial customers. Similar to tax abatements, TU Electric would offer lower rates to customers who qualify in competitive areas for economic development or environmental protection. "We want to be a competitive energy source to hold existing customers, to attract new customers and to assist those working toward environmental responsibility," he said. "This will help us keep rates low and stable for all our customers."

The council opted to suspend action on the request for 90 days to study the issue and observe Public Utility Commission action. Other council agenda items included: - Complaints of unauthorized dumping in city dumpsters by

people who have not paid for the service received new emphasis. City Ordinance #135-C prohibits this trash disposal described as a theft of service. Conviction for this offense is punishable by a fine of from \$100.00 to \$1,000.00.

- Street lights at the intersections of Cross and Hillcrest and Eddy and Hillcrest streets will remain in place.

- Action to take bids for the sale of farm property owned by the city was tabled until the current lease is concluded.

- A special city council meeting will be held on July 11, 7:30 p.m. at City Hall to meet with Bill Pembroke, engineer for the new water well project.

- Bobby Hess was appointed a new Library Board member.

- A public hearing was held to initiate action on this year's street paving projects.

- Park Board recommendations of non-slip matting for the swimming pool counter area and new slides for the pool were approved. The slide installation is hoped to be finished in about 30 days. A 12-foot curving plastic slide is planned for the deep water area to replace the high diving board. New, more child-safe slides are planned for the shallow water. The new equipment will cost about \$5,300.00. Money will come from the Germanfest gate receipt fund.

- The Park Board was directed to study the condition and position of the metal slide in the park. Complaints have come in about children receiving burns from touching the sun-heated metal surface.

- Marianne Grant accepted planning responsibility for a picnic for city employees and council at the park.

- Bill totaling \$28,090.38 were approved for payment.

Amanda, daughter of Bennie McDaniel of Lake Kiowa and Carl McDaniel of Mesquite, made the trip with approximately 75 other outstanding young people from across Texas and New Mexico. Among them was Robert Taft of Sonora, grandson of Cooke County Electric Cooperative Director Robert Lewis who lives near Moss Lake. Miss McDaniel won the trip with an outstanding performance in a speech and essay contest sponsored by Cooke County Electric Cooperative. First prize was the all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C. Amanda will be a senior at Callisburg High School this fall.

The high school students were accompanied by a dozen adult chaperones, including Marlene Hess

of Muenster. Miss Hess, who made the trip as Cooke County Electric Cooperative's Youth Tour contest winner in 1992, was asked to return as a chaperone after working in the Washington offices of Rep. Hall during the summer of 1993. Miss Hess will start her sophomore year at Texas Tech University this fall.

The two highlights of the trip for Amanda were meeting Rep. Hall and a visit to the Vietnam War Memorial. As the daughter of a Vietnam veteran, Miss McDaniel was touched by tracing names her father asked her to find on the wall.

"My dad was in Vietnam and his name could have been there just as easy as the others," she said. Seeing the names of soldiers, many of whom were not much older than Amanda when they died, created sad and powerful emotions.

Rep. Hall, a Congressman with considerable seniority and position, is keeping a high profile lately because of his pivotal role in health care legislation. However, he took time to visit with Amanda, introduce her to his staff and take her to lunch in the Congressional dining room. "You can only be invited there (by a Congressman)," she explained. "You can't go in there on your own."

Amanda said she is very impressed with Mr. Hall because of his effectiveness and because he "represents who we are, not just what he feels." "It was nice to go with Marlene because she knew the ropes," she added.

The Congressman even took her to a "Whip-it" meeting he chaired where Congressmen get a chance to "whip up on lobbyists." She said the meeting was fascinating because she was able to see people with strong interests in issues fighting for their beliefs - real behind-the-scenes "government in action."

Miss McDaniel said she will encourage other students to enter Cooke County Electric Cooperative's Washington Youth Tour next spring. "Writing an essay is so simple compared to the reward of winning a trip," she said.

Like others before her, Miss McDaniel said while the sites were wonderful, it was the people drawn together for the trip that made the tour a really special experience. "You are meeting the kind of people who will be future congressmen and women," she said. "I know that later on in my career, I will run into people I met on the Youth Tour."

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# Railroad Commission News...

Railroad Commission James E. (Jim) Nugent said recently the agency is readying a second round of oil field incentives to stem Texas'

oil production decline which reached a 50-year low in April.

"Round one of our Texas Incentive Package is bringing some much-needed relief to Texas producers," Nugent said. "But we've got to do more to slow the hemorrhage our economy is suffering from falling oil production."

Preliminary figures for April show Texas oil production fell

100,000 barrels a day over the past year, to 1.47 million barrels a day. That's the first time Texas' oil wells have pumped under 1.5 million barrels a day since 1942, Nugent said. As oil production falls, so does the benefit to the state's economy that comes from crude sales, oil field salaries and equipment purchases.

"At an average price of \$15 a barrel, the loss in wellhead value we

have suffered over the past year is \$547.5 million," Nugent said. "Using the comptroller's economic multiplier of 2.9, the total loss to the Texas economy is almost \$1.59 billion. That's a serious blow to both the economy and the state's oil and gas industry."

Nugent said the Commission is hard at work drafting phase two of the Texas Incentive Package for the state legislature to examine during

its 1995 session. Ideas under consideration include:

- \* excluding non-producing oil and gas fields from direct taxes when the fields are returned to producing status,
- \* allowing producers to offset taxes on marginal well production with negotiable "chits" earned on new well productions,
- \* brightening the industry's future by encouraging more students to

study petroleum engineering.

"We are considering a wide range of concepts for the Texas legislature to consider in 1995," said Nugent. "As with previous incentives, we hope they will prove revenue positive. But taxpayers should note that, at worst, they will be revenue neutral. We are also sowing the seeds for the high-technology future that is so critically important for this industry and Texas."

## Parental involvement in sports must be positive

Youth sports take commitment from both child and parent, but knowing when to sit back and cheer may be a parent's hardest job.

The more emphasis that is placed on fair play, having fun and challenging oneself, the better for the child, said Dr. Frank Pirozzolo, a psychologist for the Houston Astros and a neuropsychologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. Also, parents should let the coaches do their jobs.

Parents may work on the fundamentals of a sport with a child but, once the child joins a team, the instruction should be turned over to the coaches.

"At practice and games, the parent's role is to cheerlead," Pirozzolo said. "Differing sets of instructions from parents and coaches can really put a child in conflict."

He urges parents to watch for coaches who promote rule breaking and winning at all costs.

"Never underestimate the impact your support can have on a child," he said. "Don't pass up the opportunity to praise your child for doing his or her best, especially on bad days."

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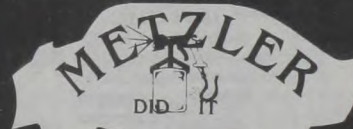

### NFU wants cattle, soybean price drops investigated

Recent plunges in prices of fed cattle and soybeans have led National Farmers Union to call for a Justice Department investigation into possible price manipulation and anti-trust violations by buyers in these two markets.

In a letter to Assistant Attorney General Anne Bingaman, NFU President Leland Swenson said he believes the large price drops are a "direct result of the highly-concentrated, oligopolistic structure of the marketing, transportation, processing, retailing and trading industry."

During the past four weeks, cattle futures prices dropped 13 percent, while soybean prices fell the daily 20-cent limit several days last week. In several Midwest states, farmers were unable to sell soybeans to local elevators. Some farmers believe buyers held out until prices dropped further.

"Agriculture policy makers in the U.S. have been pushing the issue of more market flexibility for farmers," said Swenson. "But, as soybean farmers have once again experienced, many times farmers have no marketing flexibility because of the lack of market competition."

Texas Farmers Union President Joe Rankin pointed out that cattle prices have fallen \$20 per hundredweight since March 1993, which comes at a time when beef exports have reportedly "surged" as a result of the North American Free Trade Agreement. Under NAFTA, traders received a 20-percent tariff reduction on beef exported to Mexico.

Swenson says "inequities" associated with the price drops result in economic hardship for

producers and their families. Today's farmers and ranchers must be competitive business managers, but the unjustifiable market manipulation results in every decision made by producers to be a make-or-buy decision."

Farmers Union has called for the enforcement of anti-trust laws to limit the control over farm product marketing, processing, retailing and trading currently enjoyed by a handful of firms. In cattle, 75 percent of the slaughtering is done by only four firms. According to some estimates, only two firms control more than 55 percent of this nation's soybean crushing market.

### Texas Ranch Roundup set for Aug. 19-20

On Aug. 19 and 20, some 100 cowboys and their families will arrive in Wichita Falls for the annual Texas Ranch Roundup. This 14-year-old event grows in popularity because of the authenticity of those who perform and compete; they are "for real," live cowboys who pen cattle, ride broncs, tame wild horses, brand and rope cattle every day back on the ranch. They simply come "to town" and work before an excited and delighted crowd at 6,000 to 7,000 people each night.

The Texas Ranch Roundup will be held at Wichita Mounted Patrol Arena. A large trade show, cookin' contests and talent contests between the ranches, all offer two days of fun and excitement.

### GATT threatens agriculture... '95 Farm Bill can help

We'll be eating whatever foreign countries send us if the negatives of GATT are not neutralized in the 1995 Farm Bill, Marvin Gregory says.

Gregory, a dairyman for more than 35 years, is the Democratic nominee for Texas agriculture commissioner. He said, "We'll have no control over how our food supply is produced. We'll also lose the thousands of jobs associated with production, processing and marketing if GATT's problems aren't corrected."

"I've been talking about the problems with GATT for more than three years. We've got to realize what the effects will be if we don't bring strong leadership to the table to debate the '95 Farm Bill. Our rural communities, which are already suffering, will dry up," Gregory said. "We've got too few people who are willing to talk straight about what our agriculture producers are experiencing right now. Call it what it is. We've got problems in agriculture, and we need to correct them."

Gregory maintains that his position on the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade has not altered during the last three years. He cited his quotes in newspapers from 1991 detailing the importance of negotiating the treaty and looking out for the agriculture producers. "If we lose our producers, we lose our homegrown food," Gregory said.

GATT has been in some form of negotiation since World War II, Gregory said. "The production industry in the United States has been the bargaining tool all along. With the current GATT provisions, we've had to make a lot of sacrifices to Section 22."

Section 22 is the federal import management provision for dairy, sugar, cotton, peanut and tobacco production.

"If GATT is implemented, the low prices will effectively eliminate American cheese, butter and powder

production in this country," Gregory said. "We will end up with only producing our supply of ready-to-drink milk. This will effectively eliminate 60 percent of the producers in the United States and thousands of jobs in producing cheese, butter and powdered milk."

"We need someone at the table in the 1995 Farm Bill who understands the dairy industry, agriculture in general and the importance of Section 22."

The 1995 Farm Bill is the congressional appropriations measure that funds all agriculture-related programs in the United States. Funds from programs such as the Conservation Reserve Program and food stamps to Women, Infant and Children (WIC) payments.

The 1995 Farm Bill can be a safeguard for American food, Gregory said. "There are always side agreements with any agreement. We just need to insure those side agreements are made. We all have to remember that the large agri-businesses were the ones who had the lobby money to insure their business will be protected with GATT. They're the only ones who will reap a profit from it."

Historically, Gregory said the dairy industry has been one of the hardest hit in negotiations. "In 1968, (Pres. Richard) Nixon sacrificed a fourth of the dairy industry with one swoop of the pen in an effort to ship more grain into the European Common Market countries and allow more imported dairy products."

His concern for the family farmers is that they will be the first to be put out of business if GATT is not altered, Gregory said. "And people need to realize that if that happens, we'll lose more than just family farms. We'll lose the jobs they've created on their farms. Then it'll spread, and we'll lose processing jobs. We have to realize the consequences are far reaching."

## County Agent's Report

### RYEGRASS CONTROL IN WHEAT

With each year it seems that ryegrass is becoming more of a problem in wheat fields throughout the county. Several factors have an effect on this increase of ryegrass in wheat fields. Some of these include:

**Rotation** - Rotation is a good way to eliminate weed and grass problems in fields. Continual cropping to one crop increases the probability of undesirable plants.

Through plowing and crop rotation producers can eliminate some of their weed and grass problems.

**Early planting** - Early plantings also increase ryegrass probability. Producers not planting to graze stocker calves can eliminate some of their ryegrass through fall cultivation and late plantings.

**Cattle** - I have seen information stating cattle do not have an effect on ryegrass distribution through manure in a field. However, cattle can spread ryegrass seed on their hooves from field borders.

**Machinery** - Many producers farm many fields throughout the county. It is easy to move small ryegrass seed from one field to the other on tillage equipment and tractors.

**Field Borders** - Check your field borders and look at the amount of ryegrass that is in road ditches and fence rows. This is very easily washed through rains into fields where it becomes well established.

And finally, **Contaminated Seed** - Seed being stored to plant should be cleaned. A very slight infestation can infect an entire field. Be sure and have your seed wheat cleaned to remove ryegrass and other undesirable weed and grass seeds.

This past year we had a chemical weed control demonstration on the Henry Popp Farm at Gainesville. Purpose of this demonstration was to look at the effect of two products, Amber manufactured by Ciba and Finesse manufactured by

DuPont. Both products did an excellent job in ryegrass control when applied pre-emerge. Many fields throughout the county that were treated in this same fashion showed the same results. To achieve good ryegrass control you must apply these products pre-emerge. The best method is to treat the field as soon as planting is completed and before the weeds and wheat germinate and emerge.

In this demonstration we achieved an average of 10 bushel yield increase over the untreated check. In addition, there was a 5 1/2 percent ryegrass infestation in the untreated check sample. This caused a 1.59 bushel per acre weight dockage when the wheat was sold at a local elevator. Test weight on the untreated check was 56 pounds which also resulted in a .05 cent dockage per bushel on the remaining wheat. Moisture content was 14.8 due to the ryegrass and again there was a .05 cent dockage on moisture per bushel on the untreated check. The treated portions of the field resulted in a net acre difference of \$30.14. This demonstration was on a field of 525 soft wheat.

Producers who have experienced ryegrass problems in the past should look at either cultural or chemical control methods to alleviate this plant pest. Be sure to always read and follow label instructions before applying any pesticide to your croplands. If you have questions about the products mentioned, contact the County Extension Office or your local chemical dealer.

### Supreme Court ruling favors rural landowners

The Supreme Court decision in the Oregon case called Dolan versus Tigard is being celebrated as a victory by landowners in rural Texas.

"This case shows there really is a fifth amendment and it is not some kind of constitutional quirk to be ignored while private property rights are trampled," said Bob Stallman, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

The takings clause of the fifth amendment states that government may not take private property for public use without compensation. In this and other recent decisions, the court seems to have expanded the definition of "taking" to include the diminished value of property due to government mandates and regulations.

In the case, Florence and John

Dolan, a mother and son with a plumbing supply store in Tigard, Oregon, decided to expand their store. The necessary building permits were conditional, requiring the Dolans to give up a strip of their land as a "greenway" and bicycle path. The strip in question amounted to 10 percent of the Dolan's property.

The court ruled that such action constituted a "taking" under the fifth amendment and that the Dolans were entitled to compensation.

Stallman said it will now be more difficult for governments to impose regulations that lower the value of property, or to demand that private property be dedicated to public use without compensation.

"This is an important decision for farmers, ranchers and landowners across the nation," Stallman said. "It will force governments at all levels to look more closely before taking a person's property without compensation."

### Beef Council Board acts to increase beef servings

The Texas Beef Council's board of directors will promote additional beef consumption in coming months through the authorization of \$300,000 worth of programs funded with Texas beef checkoff dollars. The funds will come from other budgeted programs and from higher-than-projected checkoff revenues for 1993-94.

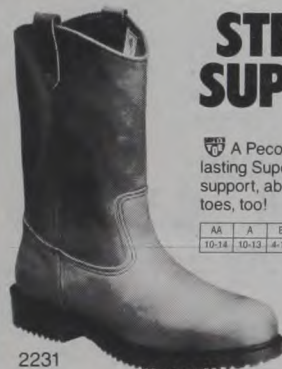
The action was approved June 2 to help move the huge amount of beef in the marketplace that currently is depressing live cattle prices. The board emphasized that the measures complement a number of proactive measures on the national level to help reduce the current oversupply situation.

In approving the additional expenditures, the board funded these actions:

\* Radio advertisements will promote a toll-free number that consumers can call to receive checkoff-developed cookbooks including "30 Meals in 30 Minutes" and "Great Grilled Beef."

\* The radio ads also will provide information about beef and beef specials that the Beef Industry Council (BIC) is coordinating in more than 29,000 supermarkets nationwide from June 12 to Aug. 26. The radio ads will run in Amarillo, Austin, Dallas-Fort Worth, Houston, Lubbock and San Antonio. They will be targeted at women between the ages of 25 and 54 approximately 100 times per week.

\* The summer radio program will be complemented by a supermarket cookbook dissemination program. Members of Texas Cattle Women and Act Media representatives will distribute more than 160,000 cookbooks in 330 Texas supermarkets as well as answer basic questions about beef.

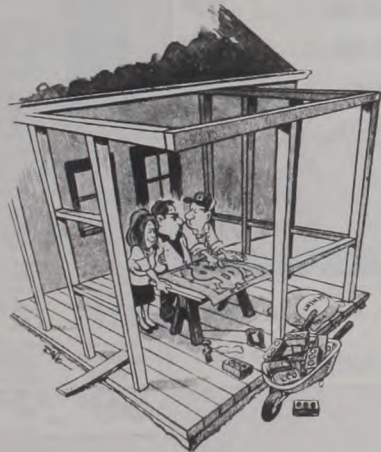

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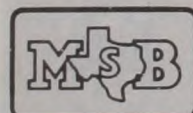

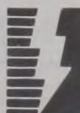
