16 CAPTURED GERMAN GENERALS APPEAL TO OFFICERS STILL IN ACTION TO BREAK WITH HITLER

MOSCOW, July 25.—Russian armor raced westward less than 50 miles from Warsaw and to the south struck within sight of the Wisla (Vistula) river as military sources proclaimed jubilantly that entire group of German armies on the central front had been virtually destroyed.

German military power in the east appeared to be tottering in the balance under Red Army blows opening the way for a whirlpool advance which promised to bring Warsaw under siege by the week-end.

Siedlce, 50 miles due east of Warsaw, was being stormed and had been by-passed. The great fortress cities of Lwow and Brest Litovsk, were under siege far behind the Soviet vanguard. Russian troops were pouring across the San river, 60 miles west of Lwow. The ancient citadels of Jaroslavl and Przemyśl were threatened.

(The Nazi party organ Voelkischer Beobachter said the Russians were striving for a "great decision" in Poland; that time-worn defense measures will not suffice, but "the decision depends on generous measures, namely, to gather new strong forces behind the front which will absorb the withdrawing troops and form strong forces which finally will check the enemy." It added that "where this line will end depends on the time necessary to gather some reserves.")

Sixteen captured German generals issued a joint appeal today to German officers still in action against the Allies to break at once with Adolph Hitler and refuse to carry out Nazi orders and thus bring the war to its end. All veterans of both the present and last world wars, the officers expressed their conviction that further struggle by Germany was hopeless.

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS, AEF.—The Allied First and Second Armies struck south toward the heart of Normandy in co-ordinated offensives along a broad front today and in the first few hours advanced up to a mile against fierce resistance.

The offensive appeared designed to break—or to pave the way for breaking—the stalemate on the western front at a time when German armies in the east were reeling back across Poland under heavy blows from Red armies.

British and Canadian forces of the Second Army opened the new assault at 3:30 a. m. (8:30 p. m. CWT) with a strong attack south southeast of Caen along the highway to Falaise and by mid-morning had smashed into the towns of May-sur-Orne, St. Martin-de-Fontenay, Verrieres and Tilly-la-Campagne, on an arc four to five miles below Caen.

The American First Army "jumped off" in a co-ordinated offensive on the western half of the Normandy front shortly before noon after a heavy aerial bombardment, a front dispatch from James McGlinchey, United Press correspondent, reported.

A special announcement from American army headquarters in France said the 1st Army was "advancing against heavy resistance," but gave no clue as to the scene of the attack.

PEARL HARBOR.—American Marines, plunging more than a mile inland on Tinian Island, today engaged the Japanese in fierce fighting for the Ushi Point airstrip, while Army troops on Guam sought to isolate the Apra Harbor naval anchorage after cutting off Orote Peninsula and its important airfield.

In the first day's fighting on Tinian, the Second and Fourth Marine Divisions—the units which conquered Saipan—spread their beachhead two and one-half miles along the northwest coastline and drove one-third of the way across the Ushi Point airstrip.

(Radio Tokyo claimed in a broadcast heard by the United Press in San Francisco that 1200 Americans were killed in the invasion of Tinian and were "routed in disorder toward Saipan." The broadcast repeated earlier Tokyo claims that Tinian defenders had set one battleship and two destroyers ablaze.)

FORGA COLDWELL HOME FROM ALASKA

Corp. Forga Coldwell has arrived in Cisco after a 4,000-mile journey from Alaska for a short visit with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Coldwell and his many Cisco friends. He traveled 800 miles by airplane and was enroute a full week.

The Ciscoan is a member of the air forces ground crew. He has added some weight and looks as fit as a fiddle. He was employed by the Nance Motor company as a mechanic before he entered the service.

LEACH COMES HOME.

Walter J. Leach of Los Angeles, Calif., is here to visit with his many Cisco friends and also to spend some time with his son, Walter J. Leach, Jr., who is now stationed at Camp Barkeley with the medical detachment of the 36th battalion. Mr. Leach, who is stopping at the Laguna hotel, will go to Dallas the latter part of the week on business and will then return here for a few days. The visitor, a former member of the Cisco city commission, has been invited to attend tonight's regular session of that body.

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GENIUS ABORTED.

Intemperance may take many forms—nearly all lead to disaster. An extremely tragic if vivid example is that of William James Sidis, who entered Harvard at the age of 11 and was graduated, cum laude, at 16.

Sidis died a broken and aged man at 46, a recluse and misanthrope. His father, Boris Sidis, was an eminent psychologist, whose educational experiments resulted in the child's being able to read and write at 2, speak half a dozen languages at 10, complete a post-graduate course at 19. But the son died an obscure clerk, who had reached the point where he demanded a job in which it was not required that he think. He tired of thinking so young!

Nature produces few geniuses, and genius cannot be forced. A little extra attention to his education hurts no normal child, but undue compulsion is dangerous. It is well not to tamper with the ways of Nature.

ROBOT BOMBING.

The "robot bomb" period recently ushered in by the Germans is the most inhuman of all the deviltries they have spawned. War at its best is necessarily hard and cruel, but until lately efforts have been made to preserve certain elements of human decency. There was such a thing as chivalry, toward the enemy and especially toward women and children. And usually armies did not go out of their way to destroy the homes and public buildings of the nations they fought.

It is well to keep such facts in mind, as a background against which the warfare launched and practised by the Nazi Germans can be fairly judged. They have broken nearly all the rules of warfare agreed to by civilized nations, usually refraining only when they feared retribution. The documented evidence presented by the Allied Nations the last war was bad enough, but the recorded crimes of the Hitler regime are far more terrible.

Future civilization will find it hard to understand how any nation could have the heart to bombard whole populations, and especially to introduce this most horrible of all weapons—the mechanical or "robot" bomb. It flies toward its target burning, blasting and killing whatever it meets, as if animated by devils out of hell. And the supreme pity and shame of it is that humane nations are forced to respond in like manner to end the horrors.

OTHER EDITORS

Can This Be True?

Fort Worth Press: Candidate Roosevelt said: "I shall not campaign in the usual sense for the office. In these days of tragic sorrow, I do not consider it fitting. Besides, in these days of global warfare, I shall not be able to find the time." Also, "I do not wish to appear in any way as dictating to the convention." And, "they (the voters) will decide on the record."

He timed a military inspection trip as Commander-in-Chief to coincide with his party convention, which he ran by remote control—through a secret political stopover of his Commander-in-Chief train at Chicago, through secret political phone contact with Chicago from a West Coast Naval Base and a partisan acceptance speech opening his party campaign from that military headquarters.

He "dictated" the platform. This is how he kept his promise to keep hands off the vice presidential nomination and let the "convention do the deciding."

Before the convention he told his loyal friend and Vice President Wallace, to run — Wallace was unwilling to run without his support. At the same time he wrote a letter in advance to the convention damning Wallace with faint praise. When this letter was read to the convention, Wallace's loyal friends called the President a "double-crosser."

Before the convention he told his loyal friend and "deputy" president, Byrnes, to run—Byrnes was unwilling to run without Roosevelt's support. When the delegates, after his cold comfort to Wallace, began to swing to Byrnes, the party Commander-in-Chief from his military train "nodded" for Byrnes' withdrawal. Loyal friends of the obedient but beaten Byrnes then called the president a "double-crosser."

Before the convention he told party leaders that his loyal friend Supreme Court Justice, Douglas, would strengthen the ticket — Douglas was unwilling to run without Roosevelt's support.

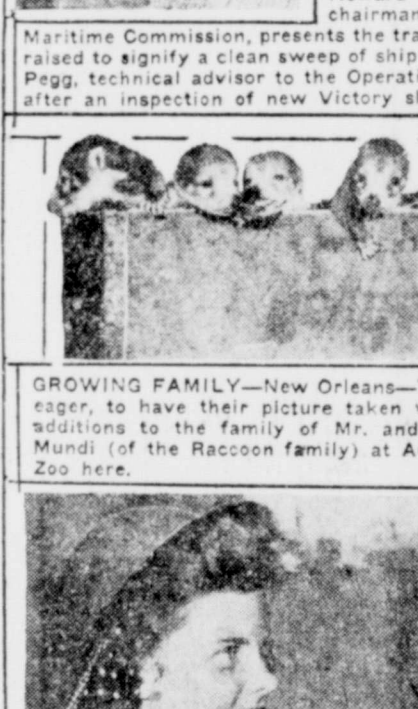

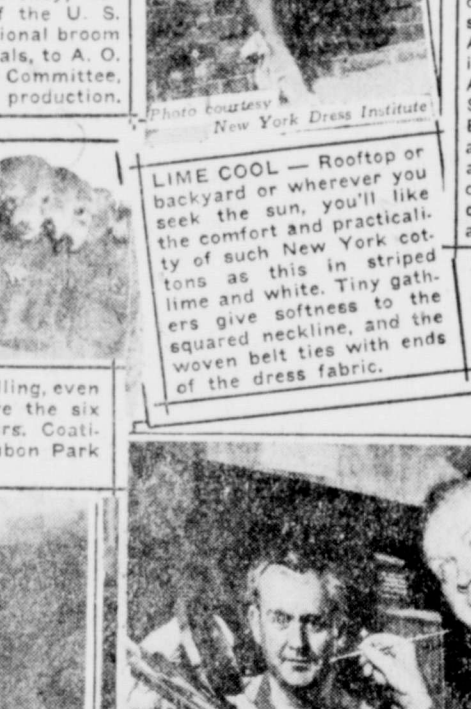
RIPE PEACH JAM—4 cups prepared fruit, 7 1/2 cups sugar, 1 bottle fruit pectin. TO PREPARE FRUIT, peel and pit or core about 3 pounds fully ripe fruit. Grind or chop very fine. If desired, 1 to 3 teaspoons spice may be added. MEASURE SUGAR AND PREPARED FRUIT, solidly packed, into large kettle, and mix well. BRING TO A FULL ROLLING BOIL over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard 1 minute. REMOVE FROM FIRE and stir in bottled fruit pectin. Then stir and skim by turns for just 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Pour quickly. Paraffin hot jam at once. Makes about 11 glasses (6 fluid ounces each).
