Four Fire Calls Summon Firemen

Volunteer firemen were kept busy this week with four separate calls within a fourteen-hour period beginning late Tuesday afternoon.

A 1963 Ford was destroyed at the Edwin Huckabee farm northwest of town about 5:30 Tuesday afternoon.

Firemen answered a call about 7:30 p. m. that evening to extinguish a fire on a cotton stripper belonging to Elmer McGill. The machinery was in operation west of town.

A fire was reported about 11 p. m. in the mote bin at Jack Straw Gin. Damage was slight.

Smoke damage, a burned wall and carpet were the results of an early morning fire Wednesday at the Don Bryant home. The fire originated at a butane heater connection.

Jerry Creek Badly Burned In Accident

Jerry Lee Creek, 20, is in Methodist Hospital's Intensive Care Unit suffering from burns received in a near-tragic accident two miles west of Matador about midnight Monday.

A passenger, Dale Wood of Hart, was not burned and only received minor injuries.

Creek was burned when the truck he was driving overturned and skidded 425 feet before bursting into flames. Uninjured, beyond being burned, Creek and Wood managed to get out of the burning cab. A few seconds longer in the burning truck would probably have been fatal for Creek.

Department of Public Safety officers in Matador radioed Regional DPS Headquarters in Lubbock for assistance in transporting Creek to Methodist Hospital.

Lubbock police closed 19th Street for two blocks in each direction from Methodist Hospital so the DPS helicopter could set down as close as possible.

Family members said Wednesday that Creek was not believed to be as badly burned as was thought Monday night. He received third degree burns on his stomach, back and legs and second degree burns on his chest and arms. His face was not burned.

A resident of Olton about eight years, Creek is married to the former Kay Harwood. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Creek, former residents of Olton, now live in Albuquerque, N. M.

Board Approves School Audit Educational Service Okayed

The approval of the school audit was the main item of business for the board of trustees when they met Monday night for a regularly scheduled meeting.

Other than the audit which was presented by Creston Faver of Muleshoe, the board heard reports from the superintendent on the school lunch program and attendance, approved the employment of Jimmy Lawson as substitute teacher and heard a report on an educational service which is available to the reading program in elementary school.

Supt. Joe Turner reported that attendance had dropped 15 students since the last meeting, this being due to the migrant workers moving out of the area.

The lunchroom report showed a loss for the present time, but the board was reminded that the inventory is not counted in the profits and that the state aid funds of \$5,096

Murder Charges Filed Sunday Against Youth

Paul Luevano, 20-year-old Hale Center youth, was arraigned on a charge of murder with malice and bond was set at \$7500 Sunday afternoon before Lamb County Judge G. T. Sides.

Accused in the Saturday night shooting death of Eliaz Leyja Valenzuela, 30, a Dumas resident, Luevano surrendered at the Hale County Sheriff's department about 8:40 a. m. Sunday. He was accompanied by his attorney Joe Cox, Plainview.

The shooting occurred outside the Merry-Go-Round Saturday night about 11. The victim and a friend had just driven up to the skating rink, when the shots rang out. They reportedly had driven down from the Catholic Church to listen to the young man who was entertaining at the Merry-Go-Round when the possibility of acquiring his services for dances at Dumas, Valenzuela was reported to have been shot nine times with a .22 caliber pistol. He was dead on arrival at Olton Community Clinic.

A second person, Lucio Arbano, was wounded in the shooting and was treated and released at the Clinic.

Lamb County Sheriff E. D. Mc Neese said the shooting stemmed apparently from a long-standing feud between two families.

Telephone Service Given OK, Gas Rate Increase Granted

Representatives of Pioneer Gas Co. and General Telephone met with council members Tuesday night as did several residents of Olton when the regular session of the council convened.

Attending were Eldon Franks, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Spruiell, Elmer Moore, Leon Noack, J. A. Johnson, Charlie Duval and assistant, and Jerry Kehoe, along with regular council members, Walter Struve, K. Y. Givens, Jimmie Jenkins, Joe Hall and Vernon Nixon. Others in attendance were Orlean Hackler, David Maxey, Andy Stroebel, Berniece Smith, Awa Roberson and Mayor Parley Myers.

First order of business was presented to the council by David Maxey, who stated that he had received a letter from the state insurance board saying that a "key rate would no longer be given to a city for an engine which is over 30 years old."

Maxey stated that since the old fire engine, a 1939 Ford, would no longer be recognized by the insurance board, that he thought the council might be interested in selling it.

The council agreed to give authority to the fire department to accept bids on it and sell to the highest bidder.

Mayor Myers told the council that city marshal Ped Hunt had asked him to approach the council on the possible passing

of a city ordinance which would make it illegal to park on the opposite side of the street on which you are driving.

"People in Olton have a habit of deciding to whip across to the other side of the street to park, rather than going to an intersection and making a U turn and coming back down the same street to park," Hunt reported to the mayor.

"This is especially true at the post office and on eighth street. Cars will be headed east and drivers will decide to stop and get their mail and they pull across the oncoming lane of traffic to park on the north side of the street at the Post Office."

The council instructed City Attorney Andy Stroebel to draw up an ordinance and designate the areas in the city in which this would become unlawful.

Meeting on behalf of the General Telephone, Jerry Kehoe heard the council discuss the rate increase which would become valid in the event that they passed an ordinance making it possible for the telephone company to install a direct dialing system to Springlake.

Eldon Franks, speaking for the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce, said that the board was in favor of the added service, even though it would mean an increase in rates.

Others speaking in favor of the proposal were Earl Spruiell,

Leon Noack and Elmer Moore. Moore said that he had heard a number of people say that they were in favor of it but that they felt the telephone company should make this service available at no extra charge.

However, council approved the ordinance, even though it means a rate increase of 25¢ on residential phones and 50¢ on business phones, because they felt it would benefit the town.

Kehoe told the council in an earlier meeting that it would be approximately two years before the service could be installed.

Speaking to the council next was Joe Johnson, who is a property owner along Avenue A.

Johnson told the council that he signed a paper stating that he would pay for the curb and gutter on the land, when he received a clear title for what is called "no man's land" next to his property, which in reality is the land on which the curb and gutter was installed. He said that he had not received a title, therefore, he hadn't paid the account, but that he received a statement for interest on the account.

After a lengthy discussion, the council instructed City Attorney Stroebel to draw up an agreement with Johnson to the effect that if a clear title was not delivered that he would be refunded his money, which he agreed to pay if the contract was drawn up.

Council instructed Stroebel to have an engineer to survey all the land that is known as "no man's land" and clear this up "once and for all" and get the town section straight.

Pioneer Gas Company representative Charlie Duval of Littlefield met with the council to ask for an increase in rates which would become effective after the rendering of the bills Nov. 15. December bills will be on the new gas rate.

The council was told that they could deny the 13 per cent increase but that the gas company would appear before the railroad commission and then ask for a 19 per cent rate increase.

Council agreed to grant the 13 per cent increase. Duval said that the average domestic service would increase about 80 to 85¢ per month.

In final action, the council approved the budget for the year 1971.

Mustangs Meet Dimmitt In Last District Battle

Olton's Mustangs will travel to Dimmitt this Friday night to take on the Dimmitt Bobcats in the final game of the year for both teams.

Dimmitt will be coming off of the upset of the year in this district as they defeated the Abernathy Antelopes 20-6 last Friday night in Abernathy.

Dimmitt will also probably be out to avenge a costly loss to the Mustangs, last year. Homecoming in Olton last year found the Bobcats of Dimmitt coming to Olton with four vic-

tories under their belts and ranked as the number seven team in the state.

But Steve Stockdale and the Olton Mustangs had other ideas as Stockdale completed 23 of 40 passes and Olton downed the Bobcats 28 to 26 for a comeback victory in the fourth quarter of play.

This year also finds the Bobcats with an explosive team. They are capable of breaking the long run or the pass for a score from anywhere on the field. Mark Wohlgemuth is quar-

terbacking the Cats this year and he has been doing a real good job so far, according to Scout reports, he is an excellent passer and good ball handler.

The Cats have a good fullback in Natividad Anes who is a junior. Daniel Frierson is the fastest in the Dimmitt back field and is a junior also.

Favorite pass receiver of the Dimmitt team is Max Newman. He plays split end to the weak side on offense.

Game time is 7:30 at Dimmitt.

Taylor-Evans Seed Co. Opens Oklahoma Plant

Taylor-Evans Seed Company, an Amarillo-based subsidiary of Diamond Shamrock Corporation, has announced it will open a new plant in Oklahoma City this month to manufacture liquid feed supplement for cattle and sheep.
 Van B. Rich, Vice President of Taylor-Evans and Manager of its Agri Supply Division, said the company will manufacture a patented formulation of PMS Liquid Supplement which will be marketed as T-E Liquid Feed Supplement.
 The new, fully-automated plant will be located at 5039 West Reno, Oklahoma City, expanding the company's present facilities at that address, Rich said. He noted that it will be the first liquid feed supplement plant in Oklahoma.
 According to Rich, the liquid feed supplement operations will be conducted under the direction of Taylor-Evans' Oklahoma Branch Manager, J. W. Thrasher and Branch Sales Manager Jim Meggs.
 Executives from both Diamond Shamrock and Taylor-Evans will be in Oklahoma City for an open house and dedication ceremonies to be held at the plant Nov. 17.
 Commenting on the develop-

ment of liquid feed supplement, Rich noted that within recent years it has become an important element in cattle and sheep feeding programs. Its growing use by livestock producers, he said, has coincided with the growing dependence on such feed additives as urea and phosphoric acid. According to Rich, T-E Liquid Feed Supplement uses molasses as a carrier for these additives as well as vitamins and trace minerals.
 Taylor-Evans Seed Company began business in Amarillo, Texas in 1951 and established its Agri Supply Division the following year. The Oklahoma Branch was opened in 1959. Besides the Amarillo headquarters and Oklahoma branch, the company has sales offices in Grand Prairie and Tulsa, Texas and Clovis, N. M.

New State Law Now In Effect

Enforcement of a new state law regulating the dispensing of flammable liquids at service stations has begun by Olton fire marshal's office.
 Fire Marshal David Maxey said provisions of the law include:
 -No smoking will be permitted in the driveway area of any conventional or self-service service station.
 -Vehicles must have their engines turned off before servicing can take place in the driveway area. Both the service station attendant and the operator of the vehicle are liable for prosecution under either of these violations.
 -Flammable liquids such as gasoline, naphtha, kerosene and diesel fuel may be dispensed into portable containers which must be metal containers, with a screw-on or spring loaded cap, that are clearly marked with the name of the contents and that have a spout so designed as to allow pouring without spilling.
 The only other type container approved is a fiberglass motor boat fuel tank.
 Persons convicted of violating any of these provisions are subject to a fine up to \$1,000 or 60 days in jail or both.

CVAE Girls Study Nutrition, Aid Kindergarten Students

The C. V. A. E. girls class, as part of their unit of study on child care, selected to make banana-oatmeal cookies as a project to get more whole-grain cereal and fruit in a child's diet, especially at snack time. Each student made about one dozen cookies. This project was also useful in giving the students more experience in food preparation.

About fourteen dozen cookies were sent to the High Plains Children's Training Center in Plainview, which operates in a large part on donated services of individuals and organizations. This training center is set up to train handicapped children and prepare them for entering the public schools.

C.V.A.E. students work with the H. P. Webb Elementary School's kindergarten three days a week to learn more about the needs of children and to help with the orientation of these children for entering the first grade next year.

Their recipe for the Banana-Oatmeal Cookies is:

Blend and cream until fluffy:
1 c. shortening
1 c. sugar,
2 medium size ripe bananas
Sift and add:
1 1/2 c. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. soda

Now add to above mixture:
1/2 c. chopped nuts
1 tsp. vanilla
1 slightly beaten egg
1 3/4 c. rolled oats
Drop by teaspoonsful on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees F. for about 10

Christmas Mailing Tips Outlined By Postmaster

Postmaster D. M. Holt today listed six tips on how residents of Olton can help meet tight Christmas budgets this year by careful mailing of cards and parcels.

For the most efficient mailing, Holt suggested the following steps:

1. For servicemen overseas - "SAM" (Space Available Mail) Christmas parcels can be sent until Nov. 20 for only the small domestic parcel post charge involved from Olton to East and West Coast points of embarkation for military mail. Parcels up to 5 pounds and 60 inches in combined length and girth are accepted at this low rate.

2. Larger parcels (up to 30 pounds with the same length and girth limitations) can be sent as "PAL" (Parcel Airlift) mail, provided they are mailed by Nov. 27. The charge is only \$1 per parcel, plus the regular domestic parcel post postage - much less than charges that would apply later if straight airmail service must be provided.

3. For all packaging, invest in good quality, sturdy wrapping materials. This small investment can help insure undamaged delivery of valuable gifts and prevent delays which might result if rewrapping were required in transit.

4. Insure parcels realistically to cover full value but do not overinsure. A \$10 gift, for example, can bring only \$10 compensation, if lost, even if "insured" for \$100.

5. Get plenty of stamps on your first trip to the post office to avoid the time and expense of additional trips.

6. Use ZIP Code as a tool for economy in mailing. When it is used consistently on parcels and cards, ZIP Code helps prevent errors in delivery and expedites handling. If only a few Christmas cards go astray, an investment of several dollars may be lost, for example.

"The key to efficient Christmas mailing," Holt commented, "is to mail early and carefully. Clear addressing, with the ZIP Codes, proper packaging and early depositing can prevent most problems and provide the greatest value for money spent for postage."

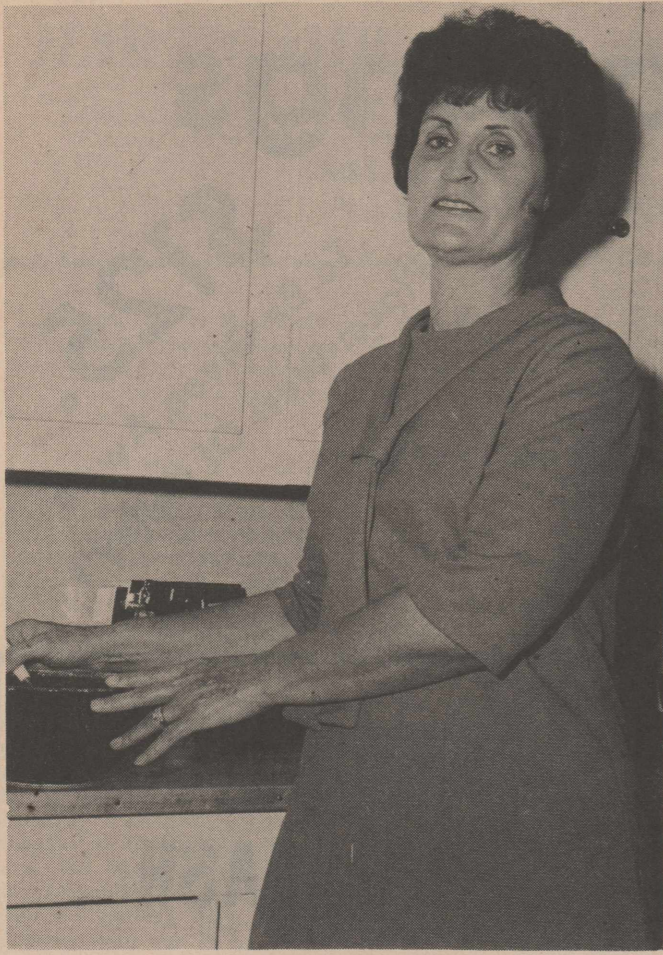

CRANBERRY SALAD

2 c. cranberries, ground
1 c. sugar
3/4 lb. marshmallows
1/2 pt. whipping cream
1 c. drained crushed pineapple
1/2 c. nuts

Grind cranberries and add sugar and let stand for 2 hours. Mix the chopped or small marshmallows in the whipped cream and let it stand 2 hours. Then combine the two mixtures and add the pineapple and nuts. Let stand several hours or overnight.

UNBAKED FRUIT CAKE

Put into a bowl and let stand until needed -
1/2 c. evaporated milk
16 marshmallows, finely cut.
3 T. Brandy flavoring

Put into a large bowl -
4 doz. graham crackers, rolled into fine crumbs
1/4 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. nutmeg
1/8 tsp. cloves
1/2 c. dates, finely cut
1 c. pecans, chopped,
3/4 c. ready-mixed candied fruit

Add milk mixture. Mix with spoon, then with hands until crumbs are well moistened. Press firmly into a loaf pan that has been lined with wax paper. Decorate with nuts and fruit. Cover tightly and chill at least 2 days before slicing.

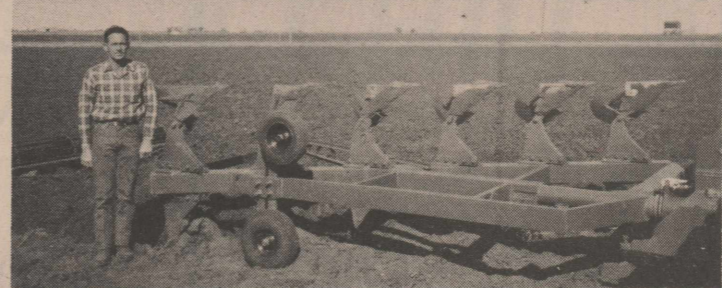

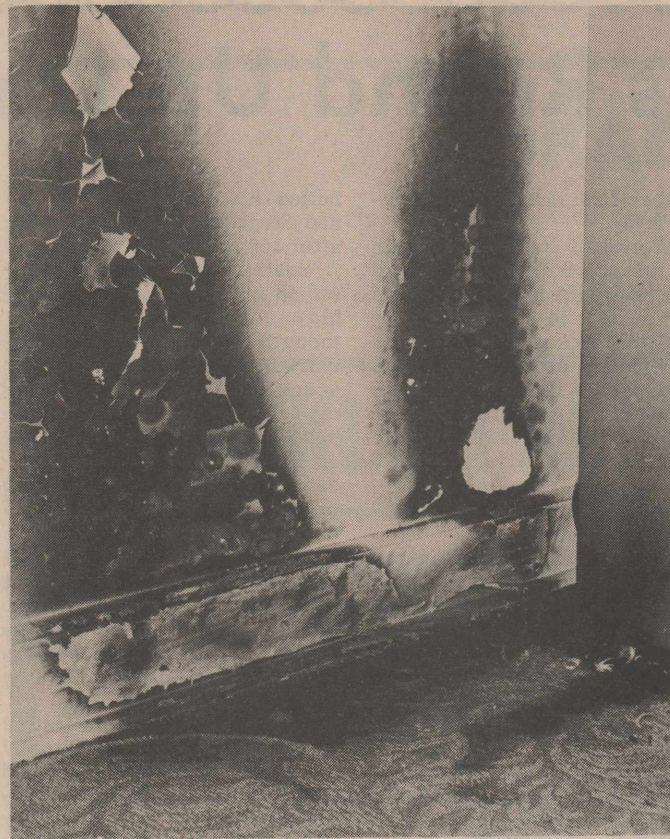

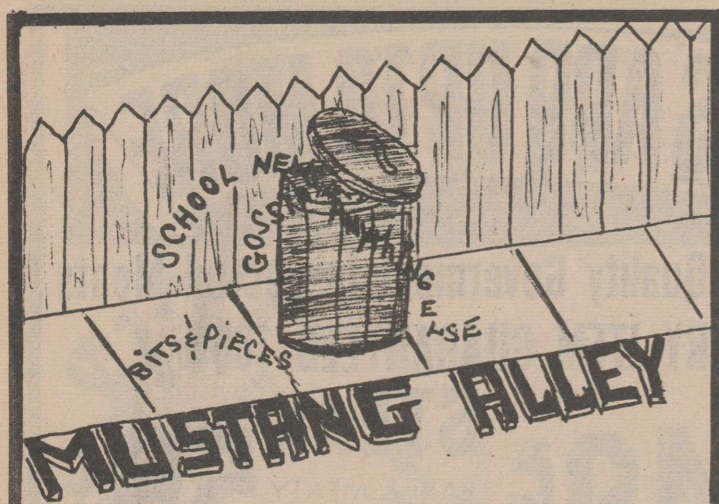

Mustangs Round Up Longhorns

Olton romped over Lockney last Friday night to the tune of 49 to 24. The Mustangs enjoyed one of their better nights of the year.

Steve Stockdale completed 15 passes for 257 yards and two touchdowns.

Big gun for Olton in the rushing department was Keith Workman. Keith gained 161 yards rushing and caught one pass to push his total to five touchdowns and 30 points for the night's work.

Coach Blakely said that he felt that the team really wanted to win the game and that they all gave a tremendous team effort for the victory.

Lockney received the kickoff and steadily moved down field with their big ground gaining play being the quarterback option play. They gained four first downs in moving to the Mustang 15.

From there on they found it tough sledding as the Mustangs had just about figured out all of the Longhorns tricks by then. Charlie Mathis managed to get two more yards in two carries for the Longhorns. Then the hard-rushing Olton defense broke up two pass attempts to take over the ball on downs at the Olton 11.

Olton's offense used up 14 plays and 6 first downs in moving to the Lockney 4. Marlos May, Luis Rey and Keith Workman were the work horses in that drive to get the ball deep into the Longhorn territory.

From the four, Marlos May bulled his way into the end zone behind good blocking from several teammates for the score. Stockdale kicked the extra point, his first of seven for the night with 2:19 remaining in the first quarter of play.

Olton kicked off with Mathis returning it out to the Lockney 15. From there the Longhorns moved out to the 22 to bring up third down and three needed for the first down. On the big third down play Olton's Jimmy McCurry, Johnny Arroyos and Luis Jimenez teamed up to stop Lockney for a three yard loss back to the 19.

Lockney punted to the Olton 31. Stockdale tried to pass on first down but found no one open so he just tucked it under and carried 14 yards to the 45 for a first down.

But on the next series of plays the Longhorn defense stiffened forcing the Mustangs to punt on fourth down from the Lockney 48. The fourth down punt was downed on the Longhorn six by the alert Olton defenders.

On first down Olton's Mike Parsons intercepted his first of two Lockney passes for the night. Parsons litterly took the ball away from the Lockney receiver as he jumped high into the air and just lifted it out of the fellow's hands as it came down with Parsons falling on the Lockney 40.

May picked up two yards to the 38 before Stockdale passed to Luis Rey at the 31. Stockdale kept the ball on the keeper play for the necessary yardage for the first down at the Horn 28.

Rey moved it to the 17 for another first down. A second down pass to Rey gave Olton

another first down at the Lockney five.

Workman bulled his way in for the score from there with 7:55 left in the half. Stockdale's kick made it 14-0.

Olton kicked off and again the Mustang defense denied the Longhorns a first down as they forced them to punt from their own 39 on fourth down.

Olton went to work following the punt from their own 19. Workman moved it out to the 30 for a first down.

On second down Workman carried it up the middle and it looked as though he was in for the TD, but a Lockney lad had other ideas as he took the ball away from Workman and came blazing back up the field. A great tackle by "Bull" Durham at the Lockney 28 saved the Mustangs a touchdown for sure, as there was no one else to stop the thief.

Once more the Mustangs defense held the Longhorns forcing them to punt from their 34 this time.

Olton returned the ball to the 35 but a penalty moved it back to the Olton 20. Olton used eight plays in moving to the Lockney 12 with time in the second half rapidly disappearing.

Stockdale passed to Workman in the left flat and took it in for the score with 0:19 seconds left in the half. Extra point kick made it 21-0 at half-time.

Workman received the opening kickoff of the second half and returned it 16 yards to the 29. On second down Luis Rey busted through the Longhorn line and rambled to the Lockney 35 before being brought down from behind.

Stockdale got one to the 34 and Workman busted loose to the 17 for another first down. Workman got 7 more on first down to the 10 and one more on his second try to the 9. Olton picked up a five yard penalty to move the ball back to the 14. With third and seven needed for the first down Stockdale passed to Luis Rey for the TD and the kick after was good to boost Olton's lead to 28-0.

Olton kicked off and from there both teams swapped punts with neither being able to get a drive going. After Olton's punt Lockney moved to the Mustang 32 before losing the ball on downs.

One pass fell incomplete and Olton faced third down and long yardage in its own end of the field. But Rey was to the rescue as he grabbed a Stockdale pass and scampered to the Lockney 40 before being plowed under by three or four of the Longhorn speedsters. Luis injured his leg in this play and left the game for the remainder of the night to avoid possible further injury to the leg.

Next Stockdale connected with Favian Minjarez at the Horn four yard line with it taking three of the defenders to get the smallest Mustang of them all down.

Three plays later Workman

bullied his way in for the TD and Stockdale kicked the point after for a 35 to 0 lead.

Mathis took the Olton kickoff on about his own 13 and behind good blocking broke through the Olton defense and outran the Mustangs for the score. This kickoff return covered 87 yards for the Longhorns.

Quarterback Tony Ford passed to Randy Duckworth for the extra two points to make it 35 to 8.

Olton received the kickoff and was unable to make a first down this time with Stockdale punting on fourth down. Collin Johnson made a good tackle on the Longhorn ball carrier at the Horn 44.

A pass from Ford to Mathis moved the ball to the Olton 17 against Olton reserves who had been playing for Olton for several minutes.

Mathis moved it to the Olton 7 for another first down. Ford was dropped back on the Olton 14 on first down trying to pass. On second down Olton's Johnny Arroyos and Curt Gregory put the rush on Ford again this time with him passing to Mathis in the end zone.

But once more Parsons intercepted for Olton as he went high into the air to grab off the Longhorn pass intended for Mathis.

After intercepting the pass in the end zone, Parsons dropped to one knee for a safety, but that was just too tempting for one Lockney lad as he just

bowled him over. Then instead of just getting the ball on the 20 Olton received 15 more yards to the 35.

May picked up a first down for Olton at the Olton 46. Next Workman got another at the Lockney 44. On first down Stockdale passed to Mike Parsons at the 34.

He threw to Parsons again this time at the 15. On first down Workman bulled his way the 15 yards for the TD and Steve kicked the point after for a 42-8 lead.

Lockney moved to the Olton five in 10 plays after the kickoff. Ford went around the right end for the score with 30 seconds remaining in the game. Ford also passed to Bill Hill for the two extra points to make it 42 to 16.

Workman took the Lockney kickoff on his own 12 and raced right through the defenders like a freight train on his way to his fifth touchdown of the night. Stockdale kicked his seventh extra point of the night to make it 49-16 for Olton.

Two long passes moved the ball to the Olton 24 with 08 seconds remaining on the clock. Lockney hadn't quit yet. Ford passed to Hill for the last Lockney score and to McGee for the points after to end the scoring with the final being Olton 49 and Lockney 24.

Steve Lewis was named as outstanding offensive player of the game and Curt Gregory as defensive player of the game. Lewis is a sophomore offensive

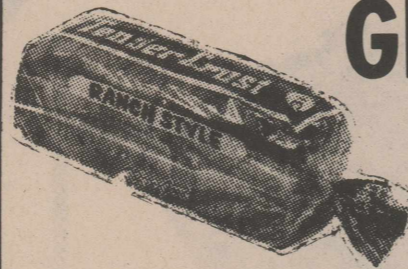

The HARVEST BREAD recipe is easily prepared and freezes well.

1 1/2 c. finely chopped dried apples
1/2 c. margarine
2/3 c. sugar
2 eggs
2 c. sifted flour
1 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
3/4 c. shredded natural cheddar cheese
1/2 c. nuts

Place apples in sauce pan; add water to come 1/2 inch above the apples. Cover and cook from 20 to 25 minutes. Drain off any excess liquid.

Cream together margarine and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. Sift together flour, soda and salt and add to creamed mixture. Stir in the apples, cheese and nuts. Bake in a greased 9x5x3 inch loaf pan in 350 degree oven 50 to 55 minutes.

Cool ten minutes in pan and remove from pan and cool on rack.

APPLE DROPS

2 c. all purpose flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. nutmeg
1/2 c. sugar
1 tsp. salt
1/4 c. cooking oil
1 egg
3/4 c. apple sauce
1/2 tsp. soda

Sift together all dry ingredients into mixing bowl except the soda. Add the soda to the applesauce and mix well. Add applesauce, oil, and the slightly beaten egg to the dry ingredients. Stir with fork or blending spoon until thoroughly mixed. Drop by scant teaspoon into deep fat (350) Fry until golden brown, about 3 minutes. Drain on absorbent paper. Sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar. Makes approximately 4 dozen.
