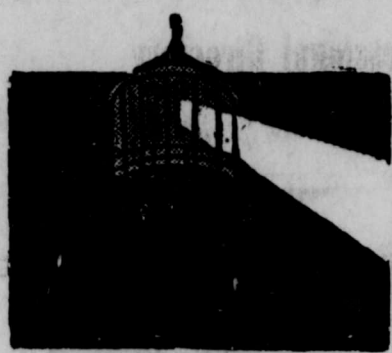




On The BEAM

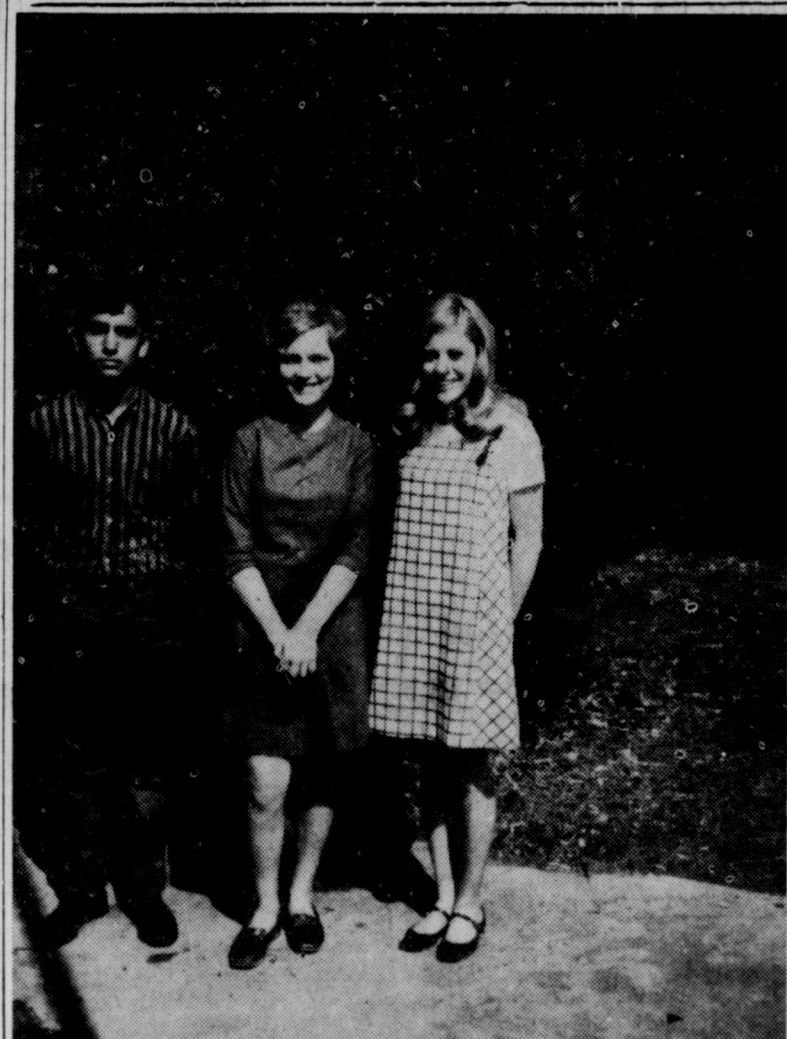

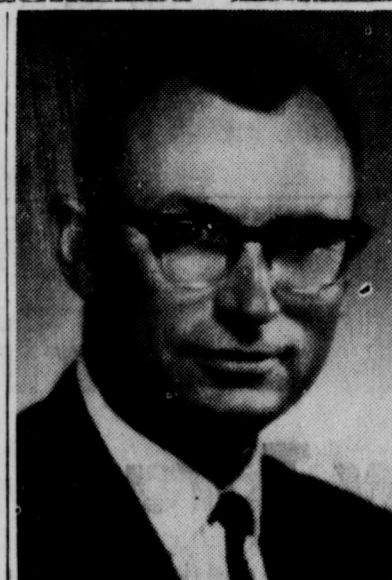

James Lyda, assistant football coach at Abilene Christian College, and high school Coach of the Year selection in 1958, will be speaker for the All-Sports and Band banquet, to be held in the high school cafeteria April 25, at 7:30 p.m.

A native of Marble Falls, Lyda was a three-sport schoolboy letterman. He graduated from Abilene Christian in 1953, after being named to the All-Texas Conference Football team in 1952. At 5'10" and 175 pounds he was one of the smallest linebackers in ACC history.

Lyda posted a brilliant high school coaching record before going to ACC in 1962. He guided Class A Elgin into the state finals in 1958 and earned the Coach of the Year honors for his work.

In 1962 he received the master's degree of education from Southwest Texas State College. In 1967 he entered the construction business and it was he who constructed the HemisFair tower in San Antonio. He returned to the ACC coaching staff in January.

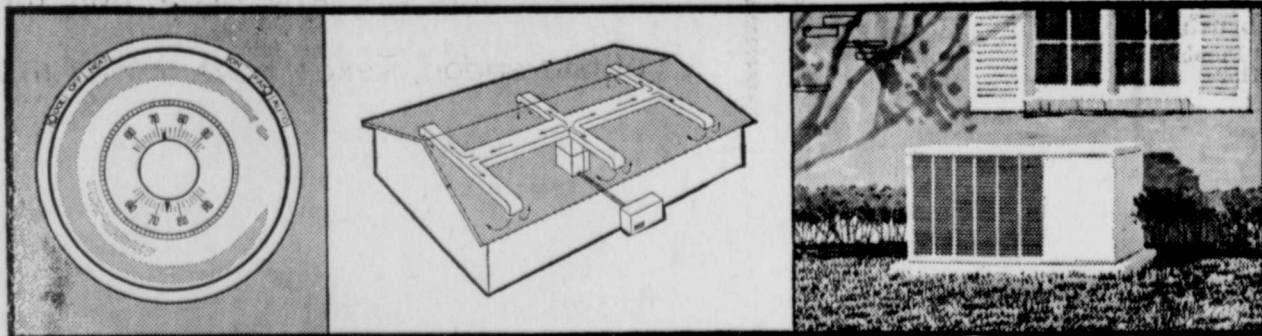

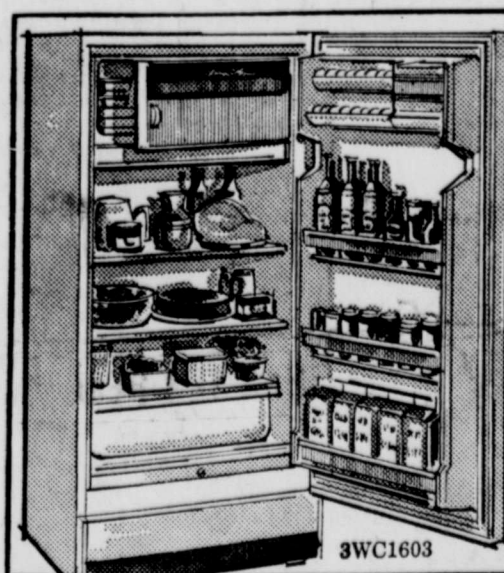

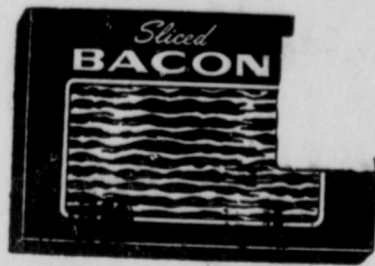
