LOCATION IS PICKED FOR HICKEY OFFSET

Hoffmann and Page company of Eastland this week-end were moving in material and rigging up for a direct west offset to the recently completed Hickey et al No. 1 W. M. Martin which was rated for 100 barrels daily. Both are near Desdemona.

The location is 314 feet west of the Hickey No. 1. Depth of 3,200 feet is contemplated unless production in commercial quantities is encountered at a lesser depth. Surface hole is 15 inches.

Location is 157 feet from the east line and 415 feet from the south line of the 74 1-2 acre W. C. Clayton farm in the D. J. Millard survey. As the discovery well, the No. 1 Clayton is in Erath county.

W. A. Stiles of Eastland stated his drilling company was preparing to make location for a 4,000-foot test in the Tuxedo area 10 miles southeast of Stamford. A total of 7,000 acres have been blocked.

Hightower Oil and Refining corporation made application with the Railroad Commission to drill No. 2 R. M. Low (199 acres) section 52 W. 1. Iron survey, three miles northwest of Brownwood. Location is near a recent 1,600,000 foot gas well completed by the corporation on the same tract. Also it adjoins a 300 acre tract on which the same company completed a gas well for approximately the same amount of gas. Buckner's Orphan Home owns the land on which the recent well was completed and which adjoins the Low land.

The gas production was reached at approximately 1,600 feet.

In Comanche county the Gallagher-Lawson et al No. 1 Terry, the deep test watched by the section, was drilling at 4,398 feet after completing an underreaming job.

There was no other survivor other than the father and mother.

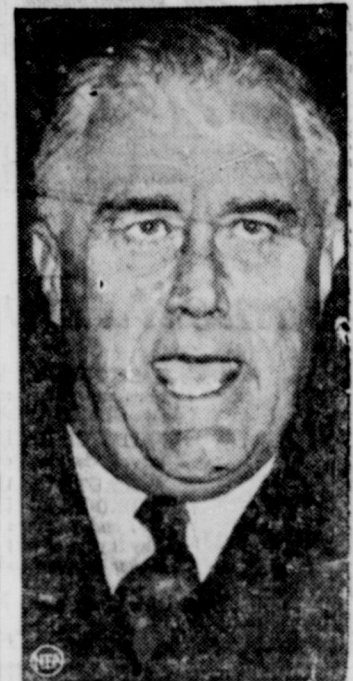

Love has been a club boy three years.

County Agent Elmo V. Cook on Monday afternoon conferred with officials of the Rising Star Free Fall Fair upon agricultural arrangements for the event. The fair is scheduled Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

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Lee Humphreys has assumed the position of Miss Hazel Pafford who has conducted the Eastland adult education classes in the emergency education program sponsored by school officials. Miss Pafford resigned to accept a position in a public school.

Humphreys has had 15 years of administrative and teaching experience in the public schools of Texas. Also he has been connected with a business college and taught and supervised adult education.

Classes will meet from 6 to 9 p. m. under Humphreys' guidance at the city hall. Classes are to be offered in general education, including citizenship, and commercial subjects. If there is sufficient demand other classes may be arranged.

Employment and Payrolls Shows An Increase In August

AUSTIN, Texas.—The number of workers in Texas industry and trade during August was moderately larger than during the like month last year, and the total payroll of these workers was substantially above that of August last year, a report by the Bureau of Business Research of The University of Texas said.

"Reports from over 1,800 Texas establishments show a total of 91,282 workers, an increase of 7.9 per cent over August last year," it was stated. "Total weekly payrolls of these establishments was \$2,333,941, an increase of 23.9 per cent over the corresponding week last year."

Cities in which the gains in both employment and payroll were above the average gain for the state were Amarillo, Denison, El Paso, Houston, Port Arthur and Wichita Falls.

Reports Gas Process Aids Fruit Ripening

ST. PAUL, Minn.—A process for ripening fruits in half the usual time has been announced by Dr. R. B. Harvey, plant physiologist at the University of Minnesota.

The process—using ethylene, a non-poisonous, odorless gas—not only speeds ripening but "imparts a sweeter flavor to the fruit so treated," Harvey said. The process benefits growers in two ways—he said—gives evenly ripened fruit for early marketing at higher prices, insures sounder products.

Some Think Allred Is Serious About Running 3rd Time

AUSTIN, Tex.—Despite the Governor's joking remarks about a third term for himself, several of his closest political friends believe firmly he intends to try it.

Hence, if he expects to run, the coming special session of the state legislature will have added importance. Allred himself gave such a situation cognizance. When he was visibly annoyed by a lobbyist's statement that "we have two strikes on Allred," the Governor retorted: "There is always another game. Sometimes the fellow who fans while trying to knock a homer has a better batting average later."

Whether Allred puts over his program for additional state revenue at the legislature's tax session or finds himself blocked, the session will provide a third term platform.

If defeated in his program in the legislative session, the Governor can point to his effort to supply more revenue and tell the borderline old age cases, the adult blind and the friends of destitute children that his re-election is needed as a mandate to a new legislature to raise the money.

If successful in his legislative program, he will be a "man of the hour." New state agencies will be created. Fillers of the new jobs naturally would be expected to be ardent Allred supporters.

Two terms for Gov. Dan Moody were followed by a term for his appointee and friend, Gov. Ross Sterling. This left the state departments filled almost completely with their friends when Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson was elected for a return term. Job-seekers filled the Governor's office until "Governor Jim" drove them out.

Then the depression and demand for state relief brought about a new state agency, backed with \$20,000,000 in "broad bond" funds. Allred's first term found very little patronage to distribute.

Woman Innkeeper Coined "Cocktail"

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y.—Mrs. Betsy Flannagan Hustler, credited with being the inventor of the cocktail, is believed to have been buried somewhere in the village of Lewiston.

A letter signed "Tom Collins" has been received by the Generators' group of the Chamber of Commerce, which tells of a tavern operated by Betsy Flannagan during Revolutionary days near Yonkers.

It is the plan of the Generators to find the barmaid's grave or the site of a tavern in the Lewiston area, in which Betsy is said to have mixed drinks. If either or both these places are found, fitting plaques will be posted to commemorate the once famous bar maid.

The origin of the cocktail, according to the letter received by the Generators, dates back to the American Revolution. One day some Americans raided a British commissary, and brought to Betsy some fowl, which she roasted. For the feat she decorated all the bottles and jars in the tavern with tall feathers. One guest called for a glass of the cocktail... hence, the name.

After her marriage to Thomas Hustler, Betsy moved to Lewiston, where she operated a tavern in which James Fenimore Cooper wrote "The Spy." In this book he

Black Controversy Recalls How Quick KKK Faded Out

AUSTIN, Texas.—Wide interest aroused in the status of Hugo Black, associate justice of the United States Supreme Court, has turned the Texas political spotlight again on something that apparently had been forgotten—The Ku Klux Klan.

Belief is increasing in Austin that the Klan again will become an issue in the 1938 state political campaign.

A spirited fight against the Klan in the heyday of its success launched a little-known district attorney, Dan Moody, into one of the most spectacular political careers Texas has seen. Moody, one of the first Texas officials to wage a relentless prosecution of mob whippings, became famous almost overnight. He followed an easy victory in a campaign for attorney general by a successful campaign that made him governor.

Porcupine-Lion Battle Ends In the Death of Fighters

NAIROBI, India.—A grim battle between a lion and a porcupine which ended in the death of both is described in the annual report of the game warden at Tanganyika.

While hunting a man-eating lion a game ranger was told by natives that they had found a porcupine which had fought a lion. Nearby was a dead porcupine and 100 yards away a dead lion with five quills in its chest. Two of them had pierced the heart.

The natives said that the lion attacked the porcupine, which shot his quills, but was killed by the lion before the beast succumbed.

The same report records the fate of a lion which attacked a native woman. The woman's mother ran to her daughter's assistance and jumped on the lion's back. While she was being dragged to the jungle her son arrived and struck the lion between the eyes with an axe, killing it. The mother and daughter were so severely injured that both died.

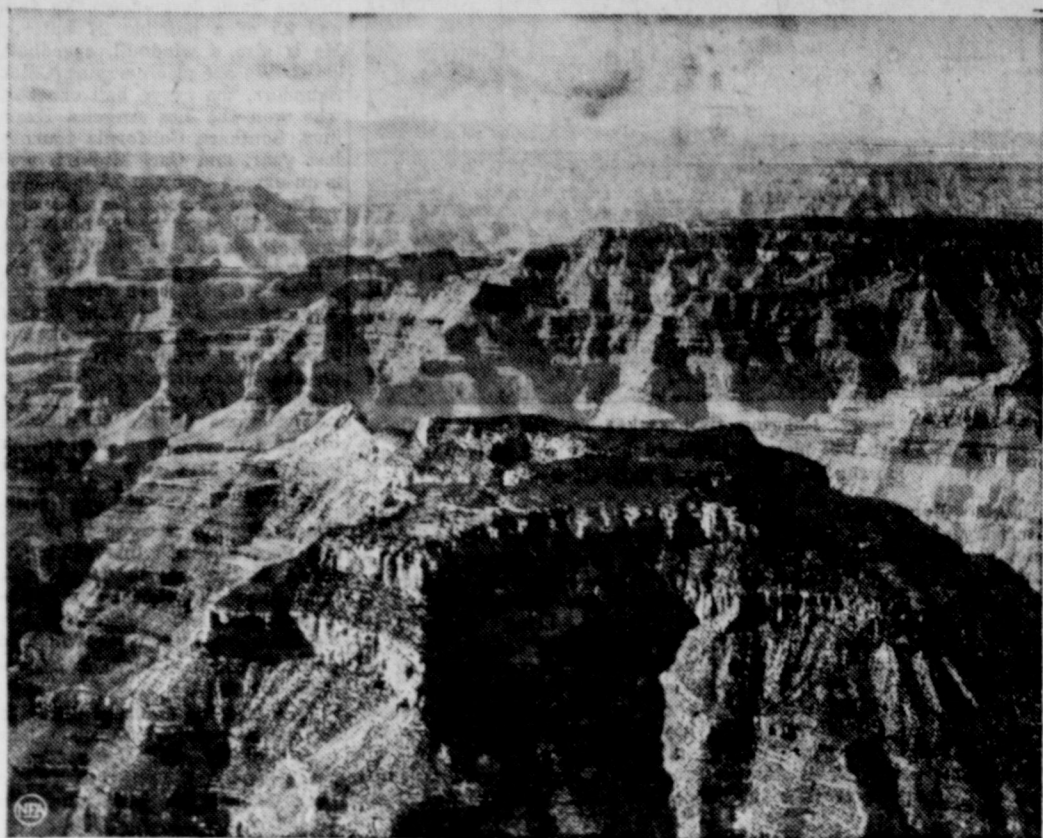

Shiva Temple, Where Scientists Seek 'New World'



On this verdant island in the sky, 4500 feet above the bottom of picturesque Grand Canyon, a party of scientists led by Dr. Harold E. Anthony of the American Museum of Natural History, searched for animal life which might show that the lofty temple was a "new world." This unusual aerial view shows at right the tortuous sandstone cliffs which it took five hours to ascend and seven hours to descend. Across the temple's heavily wooded terrain the scientists located their camp on the edge near the cleared spot in the center foreground. The first animals they trapped or shot all appeared related to specimens common to the vicinity. Pioneering prospectors scoffed at the "new world" theory, contended that animals had gone back and forth from the island to the mainland for centuries. To support their contentions, they cited that coyote tracks, but no coyotes were found, that deer horns, but no deer were discovered.

To avoid echoes and reverberations, tests are made outdoors.

Two cranes are used. One supports the noise maker that is being tested. The other supports equipment that calibrates the sounds in a huge electrical device.

Growth of State Payrolls Is Being Probed by Senate

AUSTIN, Tex.—How extensive have been the additions to the state payroll in various administrations is being computed by a Senate economy committee, as part of its opposition to additional taxation.

Committeemen have found that the Unemployment Compensation Commission will have a staff of 1,100 to 1,200 on Jan. 1, 1938. The number of employees used for enforcement of the state liquor laws also has been scrutinized and criticized by several of the committee members. Department heads have been handed questionnaires on the increase in employees and their duties. The answers have been followed by personal quizzing.

Steady growth of state payrolls is admitted. Gov. Allred repeatedly has said that demands of the people for new functions of government make additional employees necessary. How much of the demand for new state activities is fostered by those who hope to get jobs cannot be determined.

In former years, change of a state administration resulted in prompt turning out of most employees and their replacement with friends of successful candidates.

for office. Governing boards with "staggered" six-year terms were established to check this biennial firing of state workers.

How far the board system has fostered the creation of new state agencies that supply places for supporters of new administrations can only be conjectured. The Senate committee determined readily that the greatest increase in the number of state employees has taken place since the overlapping board plan came into use. How much of the increase would have occurred without the overlapping board plan could only be surmised.
