The county tax rate for the coming year was set at \$1 per \$100 valuation.

## Shrimp Landings Drop In January

Total landings of headless shrimp for the Coastal Bend area in January amounted to approximately 185,200 pounds, according to preliminary reports received by C. E. Nickerson, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service statistician, who said that this was a decrease of approximately 294,400 pounds from landings in December.

Ex-Vessel prices were steady at 61 cents per pound for 15/20 count shrimp.

Several northers kept boats in during the month, and a number of vessels left for Louisiana.

Red Snappers were plentiful during January, as many shrimpers used this fishery to supplement their income from shrimp. Heavy landings caused a price slump in the local market. Other finfish production is expected to increase as the demand for for Lent is felt.

Due to continued heavy production in oysters, prices and demand continued to drop. Fishermen were receiving from \$3 to \$4 per barrel for unshucked oysters, and wholesale prices ranged from \$4 to \$5 per gallon after shucking.

"Cooned" oysters in lower San Antonio Bay were excellent, and reported to be yielding over 2 gallons of meats per barrel.

## Harold Picton Elected Officer of Coastal Bend Water Planning Ass'n

Harold Picton was elected second vice-president of the Coastal Bend Water Planning Association Friday night at a dinner meeting in Robstown attended by four Rockport men composing a committee appointed by Judge John D. Wendell to represent Aransas County on the water committee. Besides Picton, these are James A. Jarboe, Jack McCreedy and Jack Baughman.

Other officers elected at the same time were David A. Grose, city attorney of Alice, chairman of the committee; O. G. McLain, first vice chairman; W. A. Edwards, of the San Patricio Municipal Water District, treasurer; and Elmo A. Drub, city manager of Alice, chairman.

Featured speaker of the evening was Jor. D. Carter, executive secretary of the Texas Water Development Board of Austin.

He recommended formation of legislature created water districts, rather than those created by commissioners' courts or similar bodies.

He said the legislature-created districts have many advantages over those created by commissioners' courts and similar bodies. This is especially true in cases where many cities and communities are represented, he said at the dinner meeting.

Main advantages, Carter said, are that a water district can be created more quickly and cheaply by legislative act; the district can be tailor-made to fit local needs; the legislature can grant extraordinary powers to conduct district business; it becomes possible to take care of special bond issues or financial arrangements that may be needed and, above all, it can set up a sufficiently large board of directors to give everyone in the district representation.

Disadvantages include overlapping powers and calls on the same source of water; crippling amendments and powers of eminent domain that may be so limited the district can be crippled.

"You can expect all these in your particular case," he said, "because there is going to be competition for the water in your area."

Carter said surveys indicate industry and municipal requirements in the five-county area now embraced by the Planning Board will take all available water in the not too distant future, and irrigation will eventually be necessary to draw water from other watersheds.

Trends are towards multi-city or multi-community districts, Carter said, where finances are pooled to give enough money for conservation of natural resources. He cited Palo Duro River Authority in West Texas as an example.

Steps in forming a water district were outlined by Carter.

First, he said, the backers must be assured of local support all through the area of the proposed district.

After preliminary surveys, legislation should be drafted covering the needs of the district and presented to local legislators and to the governor, to be sure the proposed law meets with their approval before being dropped in the legislative hopper.

Included should be a tax provision allowing the district to levy a small 2 cents to 5 cents tax for preliminary surveys and planning, he said. He explained that further money could be obtained through the FHA or the Texas Water Development Board.

In answer to a query by Mayor C. C. Carlisle of Alice as to the profitable effect of the master plan for the development of the Nueces River which was approved by the State Board of Water Engineers last Wednesday, Carter said that it would undoubtedly bear a great deal of weight in any planning by either Federal or State agencies. He said one of the best ways to assure the success of any such plan in this area was to gain the cooperation of Corpus Christi and Nueces County.

Represented at the meeting were Corpus Christi, Robstown, Kingsville, Alice, Refugio and Ingleside. There were delegations from Nueces, Jim Wells, Kleberg and Aransas Counties.

# Trustees Approve Cafeteria Plans

Expect to Save Approximately \$25,000 By Building It With School Maintenance Personnel Under Engineering Supervision

Trustees of the Aransas County Independent School District, at their regular meeting, decided to build the new cafeteria at Rockport with system labor and supervision, saving some \$25,000 to \$30,000 in the process.

In other action, they extended the contracts of Superintendent J. D. Gray and principals Thomas Dannelly, Chester Barre, Albert Griffith and A. B. LeFevre to run concurrently with other contracts

## Aransas Gasser Has 4.2 Million

A. A. (Bus) Moore No. 1 C. L. Dutton, Aransas County South Lamar Field well in the Lamar Township, has been completed for a daily open flow of 4.2 million cubic feet of gas plus one barrel of 54.7 gravity distillate to 42,000 cubic feet of gas.

Flow was through 8-64 inch choke from perforations at 7,053-55 feet and from 7,058-62 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing at 7,156 feet. Flowing pressure on 8-64-inch choke was 1,582 pounds and shut-in pressure was 1,720 pounds.

Bobby M. Burns No. 1 Bankers Mortgage Co., Mud Flats Field test four miles south of Bayside, was running 5 1/2-inch production string to bottom at 9,856 feet.

## BAROMETER READING HITS ALL-TIME LOW HERE TUESDAY EVENING

Paul Clark Sorenson, local weather observer, says that the barometer here fell to 29.25 on Tuesday, which is one of the lowest readings that he has ever known in this area or throughout the United States. At 7 a.m., Sorenson said, the reading was 29.52; during the morning it dropped to 29.39; in the afternoon it was 29.30, and at 6 p.m. it had reached 29.25. This is a lower reading by far than has ever occurred here in the worst hurricane.

## SMALL CRAFT WARNING HOISTED NORTHER EXPECTED

A ten a.m. Thursday bulletin from the weather bureau at Corpus Christi, phoned to Paul Clark Sorenson, said:

"Hoist small craft warning and expect north to northeasterly winds from 20 to 30 miles an hour with even stronger gusts. Thunder squalls may be expected Thursday night and Friday morning, with the temperature dropping to 36 to 40 degrees Friday."

in the school system; and set the date of a trustee election for April 2.

The board made a careful study of the proposed building and equipment for the new cafeteria, as prepared by Superintendent Gray and Chief Maintenance Superintendent Glen Martin, and after amending them in some particulars, approved construction of the building at an approximate cost of \$28,500.

The construction will be carried out under Martin's supervision, after they have been checked for structural soundness by a registered engineer, by so doing, Gray said, it can be done for approximately \$5 per square foot, saving the architect's and contractor's profits, and cutting the cost in half.

The superintendent told the board this could be accomplished with funds now in the budget, and without any increase in the present tax rate.

"Our current financial position is good," he said. "Tax collections through Feb. 1 amount to \$388,934, which is only \$1356 less than requirements of the budget which includes the cafeteria. There is approximately \$14,000 outstanding against the 1959 tax roll and approximately \$12,000 outstanding on tax rolls prior to 1959."

"With these facts in mind, I believe we should take definite steps toward construction of the cafeteria."

Gray then called to the Board's attention that terms of three members, J. B. Jackson, Shelley Roaten, and Harry Wilson, expire this year, and the trustees set the date for a school election on April 2, to fill these posts.

Voting booths will be in Rockport Elementary School, Fulton Elementary, and at the Concession Hall in Goose Island State park. Election Judge at Rockport will be Mrs. A. L. Brundrett; at Fulton, Mrs. E. G. Cooke, and Mrs. Ludene Wofford at Goose Island.

The school superintendent then brought it to the Board's attention that there were a large number of small children in the Market Street Road and Estes areas that lived within the 2 mile bus limit, and so had to be barred from buses supported with state funds. This, he pointed out, worked a hardship on many students, and he suggested that the school system operate its own bus without state aid, to pick up these students.

This would cost about \$2000 per year, Gray said, and a bus would be available in the 1960-61 school season, when a new 72-passenger bus would be put into operation on one of the other runs, releasing the old vehicle for the "Town Run."

In addition, the superintendent suggested that the board publish a booklet this summer giving a report on the school system to be distributed to citizens of the community.

This booklet, he said, would contain a short history of the district; a summary of the financial condition; information on tax collections and percentages of collections; how the money is spent and other pertinent information.

The trustees instructed Gray to proceed with this booklet.
