The Postmaster says that he expects the 1963 Christmas mails will break all records, and that the mail load will undoubtedly hit its peak within the next few days. The flood of outgoing Christmas cards and gifts is being matched by a like torrent of incoming mail that is becoming greater every day.

"Postal employees are digging in harder than ever," the postmaster said. "There's still time for local deliveries, but all Christmas cards should be sent by First Class mail. Be sure to include your return address on all Christmas card envelopes and package labels."

Second Man Injured When Vehicle Overturns

Charles V. Cummings, 48-year-old Dallas man, died today of injuries suffered in a one-truck accident about 2 a. m. on Interstate 20, five miles west of Colorado City.

Cummings, who lived at 3411 McFarlin Blvd. in Dallas, was driving a Diamond T truck and semi-trailer belonging to the American Trucking Co. of Dallas, traveling east.

Texas Highway Patrolman Buddy Hertenberger, who investigated the fatal accident on the scene, at 2:35 a. m., said that Cummings lost control of the truck and that it turned over, partly on the median and partly in the other lane of traffic.

Pavements in this area were partially iced over at the time. Both truck and trailer were a total loss, Hertenberger said.

M. H. Horton, 42, riding with Cummings in the truck "sleeper" was painfully injured and is hospitalized in Root Memorial Hospital here. Attending physician said at noon Thursday that Horton suffered a dislocated shoulder and bruises. Full extent of his injuries were still under study but the doctor reported them as "not believed to be serious."

When Highway Patrolman Hertenberger arrived at the Interstate 20 site of the wreck, Cummings was also still alive. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Root Memorial Hospital and apparently died in a Kiker ambulance which was rushed to the scene after the accident was reported to officers here. Camp Funeral Home of Dallas removed the body of Cummings to Dallas at noon. Funeral will be in Dallas.

Death of Cummings is the second of a truck driver here in recent weeks. The other occurred within Colorado City's city limits when an Abilene driver of a bread company truck driver was burned to death after a collision.

Today's early morning fatality was the third death on highways in Mitchell County for 1963 but it is the fifth death this year including two fatalities within city limits here. A California man whose car struck a speed limit sign in the Lake Colorado City was first traffic death in the county this year.

A Midland woman, wife of an independent oil man, died near Lurline when she lost control of her car and was in collision with a truck. Richard Howell, Mitchell County farmer, died after a collision on the Colorado River bridge within city limits.

Mrs. Crawford told of the creation of this nation from the various tribes who came to the New World following the Declaration of Independence. She spoke of the men who left marks on this land—a new government, a new people, a heritage of freedom, colleges, libraries, inventions, homes, a new culture, a new way of life.

Thomas Jefferson wrote the Declaration of Independence in perfect form, beautiful in language, deep in love of liberty. The phrased his words in a way that has become the most cherished expression of the American dream. Its men and women have served other nations as a foundation for their statements of national purpose. She said Mrs. Crawford told of the only man whose name is signed to each of the four important documents of our country, the Declaration of Independence, the Treaty of Alliance with France, the treaty of peace with England, and the Constitution—Benjamin Franklin. "Leaders of the Revolution were profoundly concerned with the problem of molding a new government—a national character," George Washington voiced the feeling. "We are erected to honor the Great

Emancipator have followed in his wake wherever he went in his brilliant rise from log cabin to White House, to national tragedy." She described the special characteristics of the American race, which although made up of every stock in the world is definitely a separate and distinct race. She said that an American is easily identified as such on the streets of Berlin, Vienna, Paris or any other European City. The speaker said that this race has emerged out of the concept of equality. In Summary, Mrs. Crawford spoke of the dream which belonged to the people who forged this land from the wilderness—dreams which have somehow become obscured, the visions faded. She said that visionaries have been replaced by skeptics—the famous words and stirring speeches of our patriots have been spoken out of school books. The patriotic words of Nathan Hale, Patrick Henry and John Paul Jones are read by only a small portion of school children today. "We have, perhaps unknowingly, denied our children the belief. 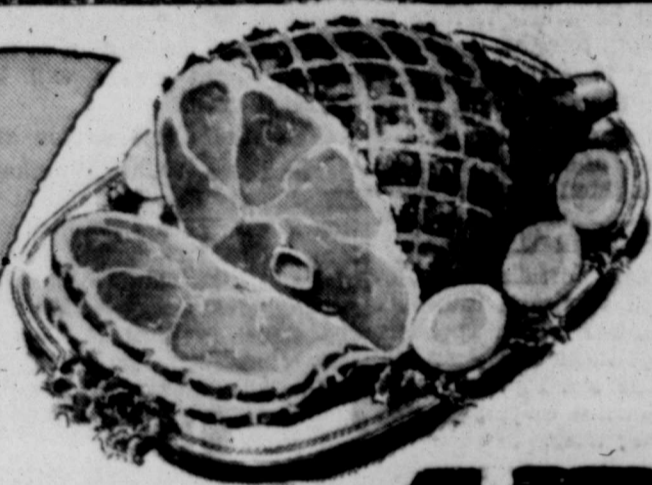

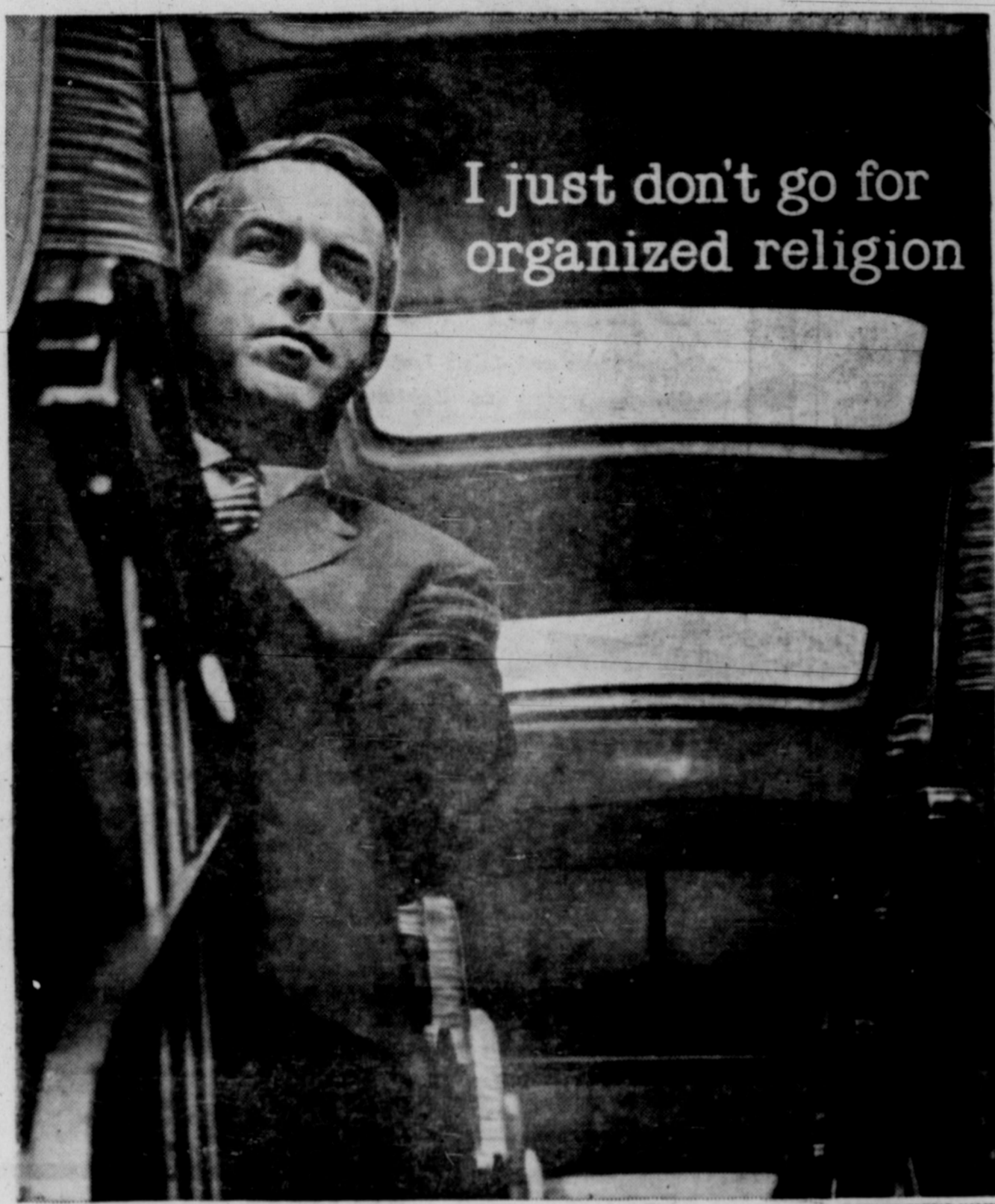

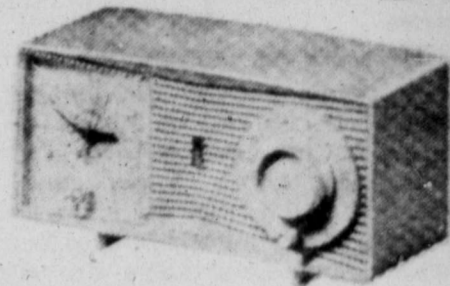

Outlook Improves for '64 Agriculture

Texas farmers and ranchmen with the necessary resources—land, capital, labor and the managerial ability to combine them into an efficiently operating unit—should have a good year in 1964, believes John G. McHaney, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Here are his reasons: Economic activity for the nation is expected to continue at a high level during 1964. Consumer incomes after taxes are running about 5 per cent above 1962 now and further gains are expected in 1964. Too, automobile sales, home building, appliance sales are expected to register further gains as expenditures for new plants and equipment. Expenditures for goods and services by federal, state and local governments will increase in 1964 and they now account for about a fifth of the gross national product, McHaney explains.

He points out, however, that the general economic activity will depend to a great extent upon the timing and extent of the proposed tax cut.

The domestic market for agricultural products looks good, says the economist. The immediate outlook for agricultural exports is about the best ever, he adds. Total exports of farm products for 1963-64 is likely to be near \$6 billion if the proposed grain sales to Soviet bloc countries materialize.

Farm output continues to rise and 1963 is expected to set a record high for the sixth consecutive year. With average growing conditions, farm output in '64 will remain high and could set a new record, says McHaney.

The cost-price squeeze will still be an important factor in farm income, but with so many farmers also doing off-farm work, per capita personal income of all people living on farms from all sources is expected to be near the 1963 record level.

The outlook calls for further increases in farm assets, chiefly due to the continued rise in farm land values. Though farm debts also continue to increase, the equities of farmers and other farm property owners are increasing at a faster rate, says McHaney.

Hungry Russians Tired of Orbiting

Editor's note: The Shinnery Plains philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Bone Hollow Creek expresses some views on Russian farming this week, his letter indicates.

Dear Editor: It has long been my theory that an ordinary Russian citizen finally would get tired of congealing space and looking at the grocery store, that watching satellites on an empty stomach soon loses its excitement, and so item 1, rose last night bears this out.

According to an article from Moscow, "the Soviet masses have displayed open discontent about the shortages of flour and bread."

And Mr. Khrushchev has acknowledged this by announcing he will now spend \$6 billion dollars on the Russian fertilizer industry to improve the food situation.

It may work, but I doubt it. It's easier to order a satellite to orbit than a farmer to plow. And what a farmer does with fertilizer depends on the farmer, not to mention the weather and the slope of his land, and it's possible to spend \$6 billion dollars on fertilizer and produce only 26 billion dollars worth of food.

fool, I've done it, on a fraction of that scale, and the fault wasn't with the fertilizer.

The Soviet may get by, for a time at least, with assuming that all men are exactly alike when they react exactly alike when told what to do, but when they assume all law is alike, they've hit a stump.

Conscientious Driver Makes Xmas Safe

Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety has called upon Texas motorists to "awaken their consciences and do more than just drive safely during the Christmas-New Year holidays" to forestall an expected toll of 96 lives in traffic accidents.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., in announcing that past experience indicates such a toll for the nine-day period from Christmas Eve through New Year's Day, urged motorists to "drive legally on holiday excursions and not only watch out for those who don't, but report them to the nearest police agency."

Garrison announced that the DPS Statistical Services calculates that a total of 180 persons will meet violent deaths

of all kinds during the period of "Operation Deathwatch," which begins at 12:01 a. m. December 24 and ends at 11:59 p. m. January 1.

Of this total, 96 traffic deaths, 40 suicides and homicides, and 44 other accidental deaths are indicated, he said.

The "Deathwatch" is a statewide program coordinated by the DPS in an effort to dramatize the tragedy of violent death during the holidays. Fatalities will be tabulated by the Department during the nine-day period and the totals will be announced officially three times daily, as a means of trying to keep safety uppermost in the minds of the traveling public.

The Department of Public Safety also will strengthen the Highway Patrol with some 150 additional patrolmen from the other uniformed services during the holiday period. But the most effective work in the drive to cut down on deaths, injuries and economic loss can be done by the drivers themselves.

Studies indicate that speed too fast for conditions was a major factor last year, followed by accompanied by driving while intoxicated, and driving on the wrong side of the road. But if this tragedy could be laid to one single factor, Garrison says, it is the combination of general carelessness and inattentiveness, coupled with disregard for the law.

Significant is the fact that during the last holiday season, 62 per cent of the fatal accidents on rural highways involved only one vehicle, indicating that the accidents mostly could not be blamed on "the other guy."

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

Santa Has Back Seat To Senate Race Talk

Although the Christmas Spirit is settling soothingly the State Capital this week, over the political scene in one political topic—the 1964 U. S. Senate race—got a speedy workout.

Big question is: Will Sen. Ralph Yarborough, in spite of his recent pledge to back new Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson all the way, get a tough opponent?

Best guess is: He will, although President Johnson will assume no active role in the campaign.

Leaders of the liberal Texas Democratic Coalition—a combination of labor, Negro groups, the Political Association of Spanish-Speaking Organizations, and independent liberals—recently endorsed President Johnson for election in 1964. But they linked that support to backing of Yarborough also.

These names have been at the center of speculation as possible opponents for Yarborough: former Congressman Lloyd Bentsen Jr. of

Houston; Congressman Jim Wright of Fort Worth; Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr of Lubbock; and former Gov. Allan Shivers of Austin.

Carr has said he won't run against Yarborough but will seek re-election and look toward the governor's race in 1966 instead. However, some think he still might change his mind.

Bentsen, once regarded as the most likely contender, cooled toward the Senate race after early opinion checks. Now, with a new political climate in the making, observers say he has reassessed the situation and decided to run. He won't talk until after the December 22 political moratorium, however.

Wright has kept the door open. Both he and Bentsen conceivably could be candidates.

Only announced Democratic candidate for the U. S. Senate Post is John Van Cronkite of Dallas.

Regardless of who emerges as the Democratic nominee, he will have to meet Republican opposition in November. Republicans who already have announced are George Bush of Houston and Dr. Milton V. Davis of Dallas.

REDISTRICTING

Attorney General Carr asked the U. S. Supreme Court to accept the appeal of the State of Texas against a three-judge Federal court's decision that all 23 Texas Congressmen should be elected statewide.

Carr's appeal says that the high court should recognize the unfairness of such an order. Furthermore, that it should agree to accept briefs and hear oral arguments on the legal questions involved.

Court has under study a similar order from Georgia in which a three-judge Federal court refused to enter the Congressional-districting field.

Still pending is a suit seeking to require redistricting for state legislative purposes. Primarily it is aimed at the Texas constitutional provision under which the 1,200,000 people in Harris County are limited to a single state senator.

Rep. Dick Cherry of Waco has proposed a new approach to this question. He plans to introduce a constitutional amendment which will let the Legislature grow as the state does. This would make possible additional representation for the big-city counties without such a sharp reduction in rural representation.

Cherry's plan would allow the Legislature to determine how many members it shall have, with maximums set for the Senate and House. These would be based on the number of Congressmen Tex-

as is allowed, under automatic Federal law which reallocates seats in the national House of Representatives after each census.

Based on the present census, the Cherry proposal would permit an increase in the State Senate from today's 31 to as many as 46 members, and expand membership in the House from 150 to 172.

TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS

SOME NEW DIAGNOSTIC INSIGHTS

I wonder how many of you have ever heard of the thymus gland?

It's located just below the throat. As we grow older the gland gradually gets smaller and smaller. In an infant, though, you can see it quite plainly if necessary on an x-ray film.

The many years we have assumed that the thymus was one of those vestigial parts of our anatomy which now have no particular function but which remain with us from our remote ancestors. The opposite is another example.

Now, however, as more research and study has been published there is increasing evidence that the long-neglected thymus gland actually plays an important role to play in our general health and that it contributes to certain basic physiological needs.

I know from my own medical experience that the thymus gland in children will sometimes appear larger than normal when leukemia is present. In x-ray examination this appearance is important, because leukemia mimics many other diseases. Until we know precisely what disease pattern is, however doctors can't institute precise therapy.

There is no cure yet for leukemia, but if we can diagnose it with precision earlier then specific treatment can be started sooner.

With new drugs and other supportive measures, the patient with leukemia can then be made more comfortable by the therapy and perhaps helped to a longer life.

So doctors are looking at the thymus gland these days with new understanding and appreciation.
