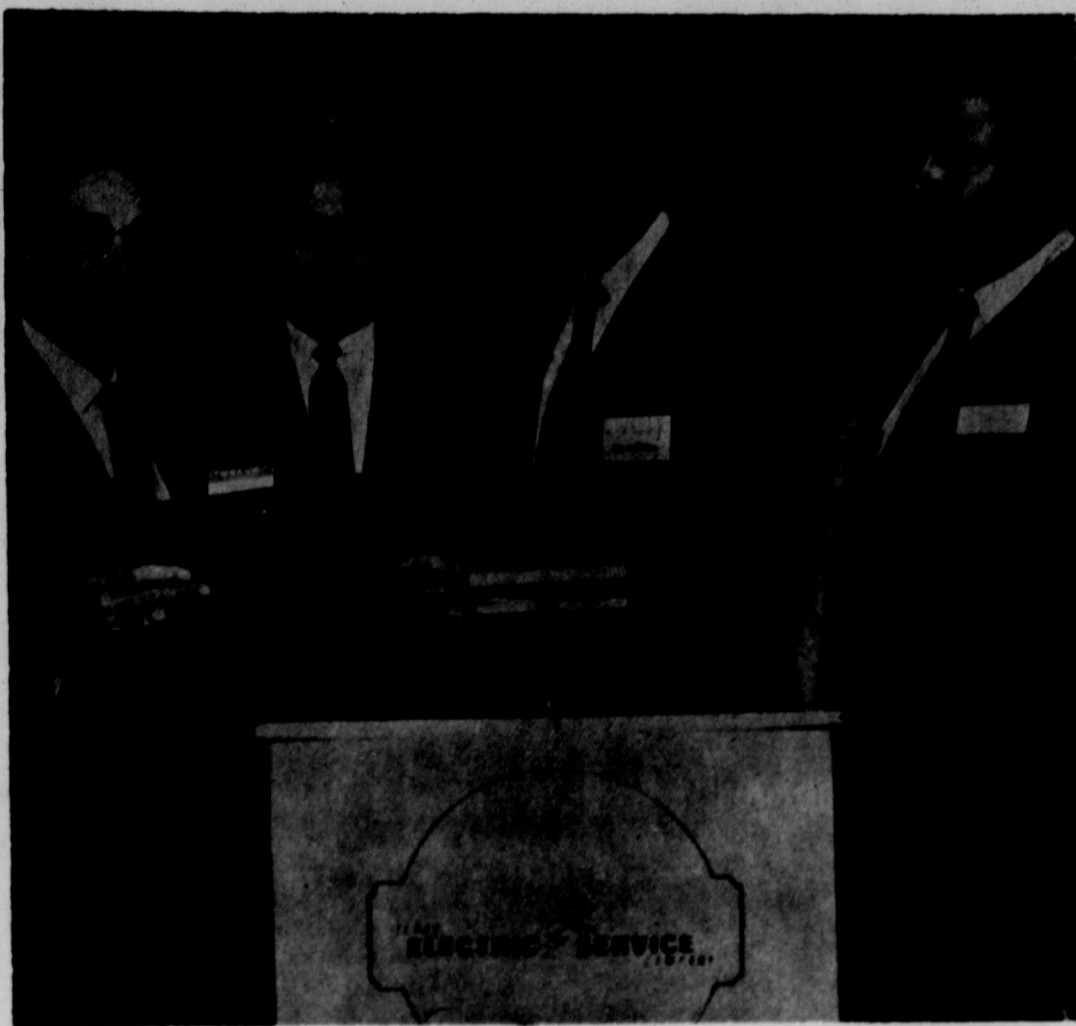

The family will move back to Colorado City as soon as they can find a suitable three-bedroom home.

In Georgetown, Ballard was active in civic affairs. He headed the town's United Fund

organization as president and served as campaign chairman, served as president of the Optimist Club, as member of the board of directors for the Rotary Club, and had been secretary-treasurer of Georgetown Chamber of Commerce for the last three years. He is a member of First Baptist Church.

"I am very happy about coming back to Colorado City," Ballard said, "and very proud of having acquired KVMC. I have great faith in this part of West Texas and its future."

Congressman George H. Mahon is reported to be recovering normally following surgery in the National Naval Hospital, Bethesda, Maryland.

Lubbock Avalanche-Journal reported that Congressman Mahon was slipping tomato juice eight hours after his operation and told the newspaper, "I feel fine."

Cotton Growers Vote Approval of 1969 Quotas

Mitchell County farmers approved marketing quotas on upland cotton by a vote of 690 to 16 - or 97.7 percent, said the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office here Wednesday.

Texas farmers approved the quotas by a vote of 81,761 for, to 4,117 against or 95.2 percent.

Preliminary returns show a total national vote of 288,165. Of this national total, 276,122 voted for the quota, 12,043 cast votes against.

The mail referendum in cotton-producing states, Dec. 2-6, ended with approval of upland

cotton marketing quotas for 1969 by a 95.8 percent margin.

Results of the referendum on quotas for upland cotton compare with results of the last referendum December 4-8, 1967, when 263,405 growers of upland cotton or 95.3 percent voted in favor of quotas, and 12,931 were opposed.

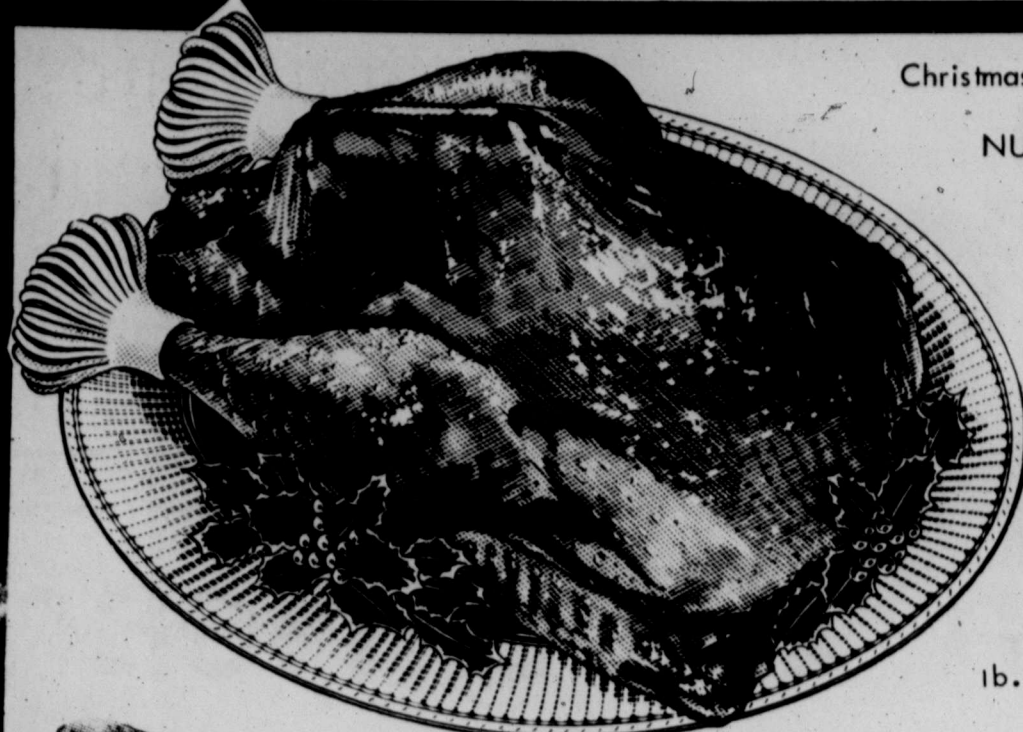
Since more than the necessary two-thirds of the growers voting have approved quotas on both types of cotton, marketing quotas will continue in effect for 1969 crops and growers who exceed farm acreage allotments will be subject to pen-

alties on the farm's excess production.

Price support, including loans and payments, will be available to growers of both kinds of cotton who comply with the farm's effective acreage allotment.

Marketing quotas penalty on "excess" upland cotton is 50 percent of the cotton parity price as of June 15, 1969.

The penalty on extra long staple cotton is either 50 percent of the parity price as of June 15, 1969 or 50 percent of the support price for that kind of cotton, whichever is higher.

WAS SHOCKED, if not downright grieved, to note that a judge in England absolutely refused to grant a divorce to a little woman who deserved one.

Her grounds were valid, any wife in the world could tell the judge. 'Course you've got to realize that the judge, like most judges, is a man, a situation which naturally tends to make him favor another man.

The wife sued for divorce because her heartless husband positively refused to fess back at her.

No matter what she said, how she nagged all day, all night, the husband just sat smoking his pipe, staring at her, and saying nothing.

If that isn't mental cruelty, pray what is?

THE JUDGE took the position that such admirable restraint on part of the husband required great fortitude.

A woman would have advised that husband to argue any time his wife felt like arguing. To blow his top every time she so much as snapped at him.

Such thoughtfulness is greatly appreciated by the average wife who will then wind up the evening purring like a kitten.

Only a coward sits and smokes and stares. And the only thing worse is the heel who puts on his hat and leaves.

That's enough to make a woman want to tell it to the judge.

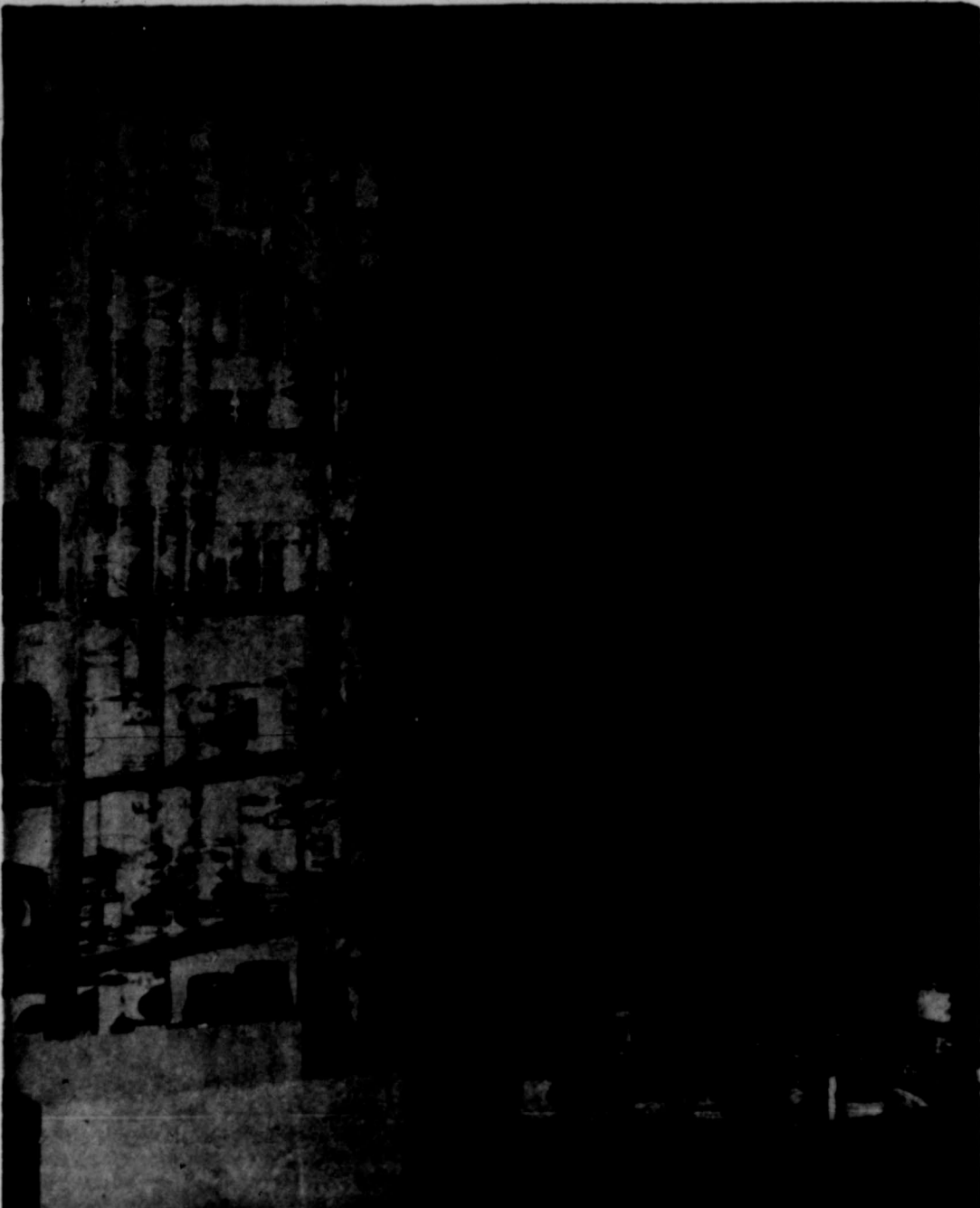

Thinking Spiritually Your Hometown Minister Speaks

Two Ways to Eternity

"Enter ye in at the strait gate; for wide is the gate and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat because strait is the gate and narrow is the way which leadeth into life, and few there be that find it."

These are words you will find in the book of Matthew, 7th chapter, verses 13 and 14.

Eternity has no beginning and no ending. Each individual soul enters into eternity at death. After death they begin to live an eternal life, life without end. There are two ways in this life that lead into eternity. The way one travels determines his destiny. The way of life and the way of death.

We are all traveling one or the other of the two roads. Race, creed, denomination, nor social, political or economical position has any bearing or qualification factor. It is of the utmost importance that we be able to identify the road we are traveling.

Let us examine the scriptures for our position. First we must discover the origin of the two ways. In Genesis 2-9 is our answer. "And out of the ground made the Lord God to grow every tree that is pleasant to the sight and good for food; the tree of life also in the midst of the garden, and the tree of knowledge of good and evil."

In other words the Lord set before Adam and Eve two ways—the way of life and the way of death. If they had eaten only of the tree of life they would have lived forever. God told them that the day they ate of the

other tree they would die. This was the origin of the two ways.

Matthew describes one way as being strait and narrow. Only those who go strait ahead can travel this road. At the end of this road is Heaven. It is the upward way. To travel this road one must continually press his way along. You can not stop without going backward (backsliding.) All who travel this road are good people. Those on this road are declared to be few in number. This way leads to eternal life.

Matthew describes the other way as being broad and the way as leading to destruction. It is said that many travel this road. This road is broad and leads downward. It is easy to travel, requires no resistance, no decision, no pressing along. Follow the line of least resistance and you know you are on the broad way. The crowds are going this way.

The way leads to eternal torment, the way of death. Destruction awaits everyone who comes, to the end of the way.

Every traveler is interested in the place he is going. Death was appointed to man after the sin of Adam. Cain slew his brother Abel. Abel was the first to ever die. He came to the end of the way. His time began in eternity then. He yet has no less time to live. All men will come to the end of life, regard-

less of which way they are traveling.

Man is free to make the choice of the two ways. Jesus made this a possibility with His death, burial and resurrection. Men are not in darkness. Jesus said, "I am the light of the world." Men should know which way they are on.

It is important that we make sure we are on the right road. Men travel on the right highway by consulting the road signs. There are signs all along the way of the two roads to eternity. Look at the signs along your way.

If there are signs of sin and wickedness in your life, if you are associating with the world and worldly crowds there are plenty of signs to tell you which road you are on, the one leading to death and destruction.

Remember the words of David, "He leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me."

Just have faith in His grace and grace will lead you on. Be sure of your way.

"For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten son that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3-16.

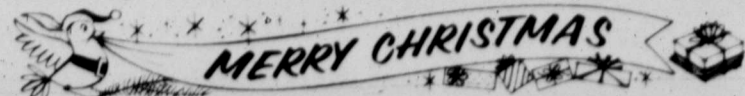

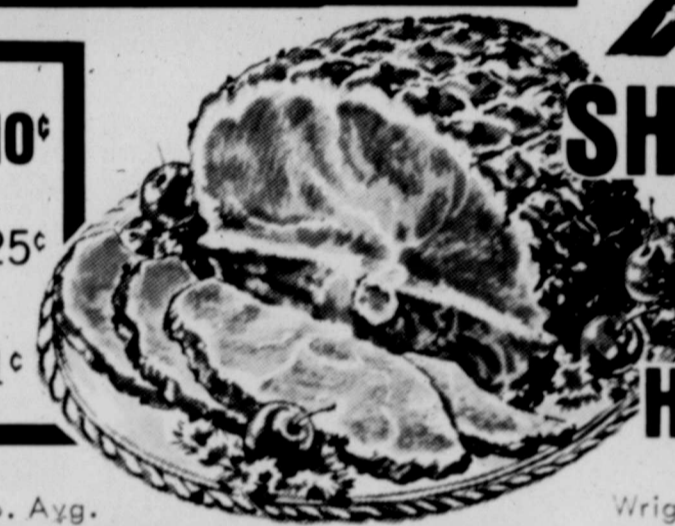

Vowell Rites Held At Church

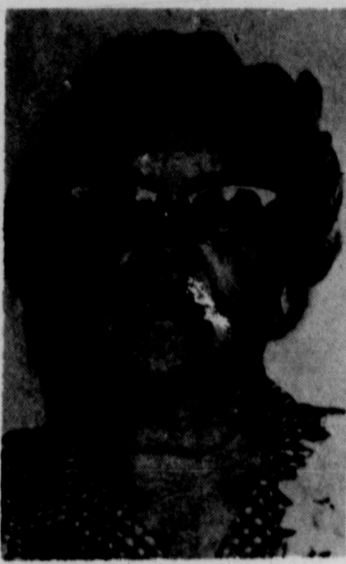
Mrs. Alice Vowell, 90, died in Rabb Nursing Home at San Angelo Monday morning.

Farm-Ranch Gas Credit 4¢

Farmers and ranchers can
deduct 4¢ per gallon gasoline
used in farming or ranching
from their income tax report for
1968, says Mitchell County
Agent Bobby Lemons.

The Federal Gasoline Tax
refund is now claimed as a tax
credit on the annual income
tax report if the report is filed
on time. The gas tax credit
will not be allowed on late re-
ports.

In addition, a tax credit of
6¢ per gallon on lubricating
oils and 2¢ per gallon on die-
sel and special motor fuels not
used in highway vehicles are
deductible, Lemons said.

purchases and IRS Form 4136

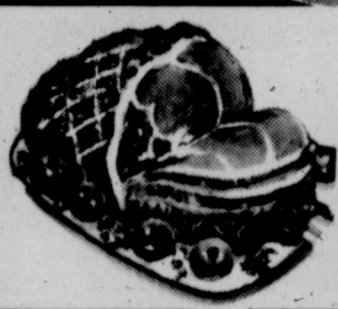

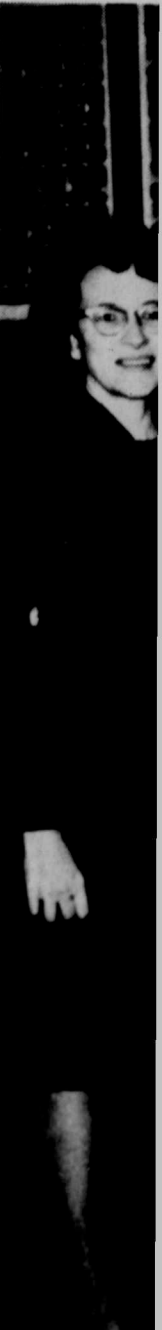
