PROSPERITY SURVEY SHOWS MUCH WEALTH

Three successive successful years in Runnels county have about exterminated calamity howlers and buried the grouchers under an avalanche of prosperity. Deposits in the banks of Runnels county at the present time equal one-third the taxable values of the county, and if divided equally among the 20,000 souls in this county would give each man, woman, and child more than \$156 in cash.

In round numbers the deposits amount to \$3,130,835.00. This condition prevails with less than one-half the 1924 crop converted into cash and with a big per cent of the debts paid.

Again, taking the auto records as an index to the financial condition of the country, and basing the population at 20,000 people, and counting five persons to the family, there is an automobile for every family in the county.

Auto registrations for the present month will total about 200, the sales breaking the record for any previous month in the history of the automobile industry.

These are only a few of the figures reflecting the financial condition of the county. About 40,000 bales of cotton have been ginned from the 1924 crop, and it is conservatively estimated that the final ginner's report will figure around the 50,000 mark. The bulk of it is cotton, or more than fifty per cent of it is still in the hands of the farmers, or in the hands of the Farm Bureau which has only made small cash advances to its members.

"We have more cotton tickets on deposit than we ever had before at this season of the year," said one prominent banker, while another banker remarked that his bank held fewer notes than it ever had on hand at this season of the year—indicating light loans and good collections.

Farmers, or most of them, have long since learned the wisdom of raising their own feed and reserving it. In addition to storing sufficient feed supply for home consumption many farmers have a surplus to place on the market when they desire to do so.

The big poultry crop is yet to be cashed in, and this pin-money item will add \$100,000 to the bank deposits in addition to adding to the home comforts which are generally provided from the pin-money fund, and in making for better living at home.

What threatened during the summer to bring calamity to the stockmen when the range began to parch, in the shape of big feed bills, was overcome by September range-making rains, and the livestock industry is facing an easy winter. Range conditions are good, with livestock entering the winter in good flesh.

Ideal winter has prevailed for harvesting the crop, and farmers will begin early breaking land, with an intensive crop program

for 1925. It is indicated that the small grain acreage will show a big increase over last year. The volunteer oat crop, where the stubble was plowed under during the summer or early fall, is said to be the best ever known in this county.

So much for the agricultural and livestock industries of the county and the conditions have not been overdrawn.

A survey of the general business condition in commercial lines reflects the most optimistic outlook for the closing months of the year. Merchants report good collections with good cash sales. While the weather has been unfavorable for winter buying, stocks of winter goods have been greatly reduced, and in a number of instances it has become necessary to replenish stocks purchased early in the season.

The 1924 building program has brought into existence more new homes than for any half dozen years combined in the last twenty years. The average cost of the residences is also higher than those constructed during the past decades. Demand for homes in Runnels county, both in town and the rural districts at this time cannot be supplied. New citizens are arriving here almost daily seeking homes, and the classified columns of The Daily Ledger are sought after in an effort to locate lodging quarters, both for temporary and permanent use.

The building boom has not been confined to the towns within the county, but improvements have been going on throughout the year in the rural districts. A number of new rural school buildings and new rural churches have been constructed this year.

Morals and health surveys of the county compare favorably with the financial and development record of the county. No crime of any consequence has been committed in the county during the year. No death dealing epidemic has developed in Runnels county and at this time the schools which have opened are maintaining a high percentage of attendance on account of the good health which prevails.

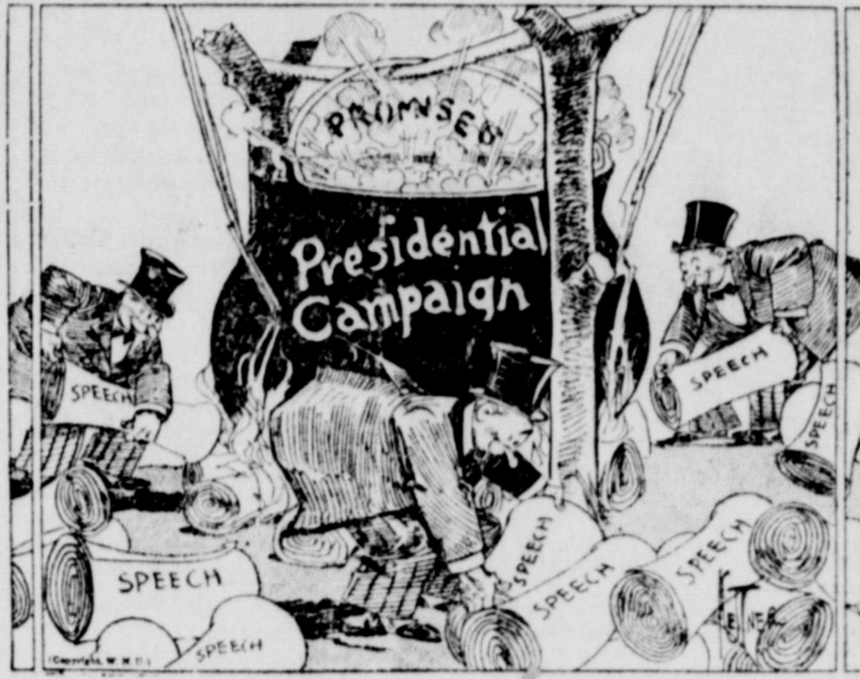
The year will close with all marks of any drought or reverses from any cause erased from the memory of its citizenship.

HELPLESS BOAT WITHOUT FUEL

GALVESTON, October 29.—A United States Shipping Board steamer, the Edgell, en route from Galveston to Baltimore is afloat without fuel and is helpless in the Gulf of Mexico, 178 miles Southeast of Galveston, according to a radio message received here today by the shipping board. The wireless came from the Edgell, giving its location and calling for help.

FOURTH VICTIM OF LOONEY GAS

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—The death toll from "looney gas" poisoning in the research laboratory of the New Jersey plant of the Standard Oil Company, was increased to four today by the death of William Kressge, age 29, of Elizabeth, New Jersey.

Herbert Tason, also of Elizabeth, is in a critical condition, and is not expected to live.

No theory for the mysterious gas has been worked out, and scientists are at a loss to account for its deadly work.

The explosion occurred at West Farron station, British Columbia, according to word received here.

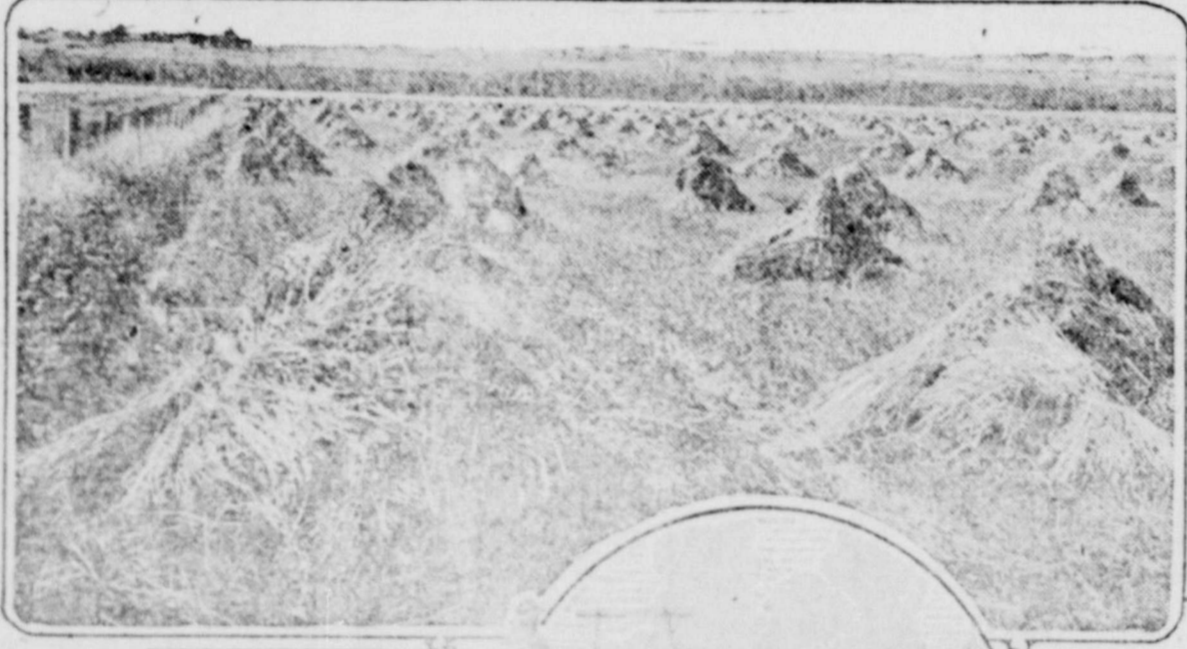

Cooperative Marketing Raises Wheat Farmers' Profits

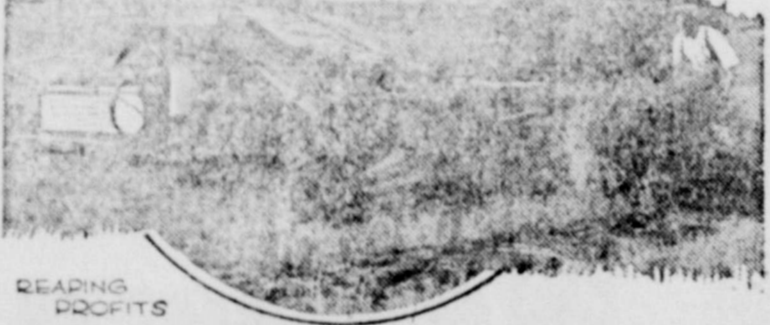


GOLDEN GRAIN

EDMONTON, Alta. — Farmers of Alberta who marketed their wheat through the provincial wheat pool last year received an average of \$1.01 a bushel for their grain, according to the first annual report of the board of directors.

The wheat pool handled 34,000,000 bushels for its members in the twelve months ending July 15. The report shows, returning a net total of \$37,720,776. Less than half a cent a bushel was deducted for administration, handling and selling costs.

"It is interesting to note in connection with the price which Alberta pool wheat brought," says the report, "that of 136,000,000 bushels delivered at country elevator points in the prairie provinces between December 7, 1923 and June 6, 1924, more than 100,000,000 bushels were delivered when the street price for wheat averaged 7 1/2 cents a bushel. The success of the Alberta wheat pool is an important step in the solution of the wheat farmers' marketing problem, both in Canada and the United States."



READING PROFITS

Consolidation of the Alberta wheat pool with similar organizations in Saskatchewan and Manitoba was recently effected. The new pool known as the Canadian Co-operative Wheat Producers Ltd., contemplates marketing within a few years the entire crop of the prairie provinces. The pool will handle grain from 11,000,000 acres this year according to estimates of its officials.

Government aid has been an important factor in the successful development of the cooperative marketing system in Western Canada, where the influx of farm settlers has been heavy in recent years. Practically every product of Canadian farms is now marketed cooperatively. The system enables farmers to realize the highest prices for their products at the minimum marketing cost and is largely responsible for the prosperous state of agriculture in the West.
