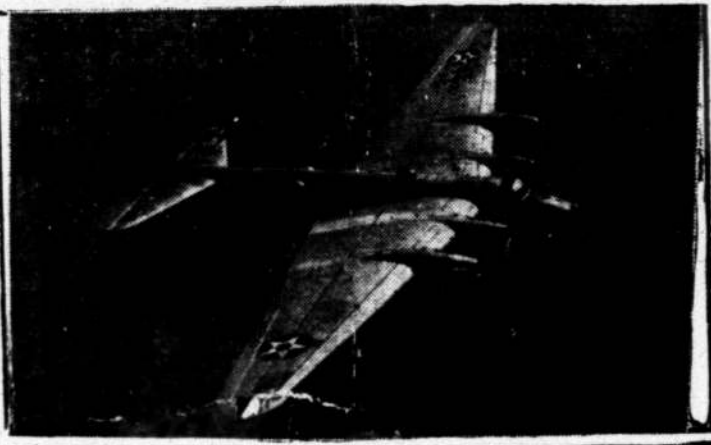
Naval Flyers Body Shipped Home Tuesday

The body of William J. Ferlich, who was killed in a parachute jump from a Naval bomber the 11th last Thursday, was shipped to his home at Friday Harbor, San Juan Island, Washington, Tuesday. The body will arrive there Sunday for burial, according to attendants at Higginbotham Funeral Chapel in Lamesa, who prepared the body. He was born on February 21, 1915 at Friday Harbor, and was a member of the U. S. Naval Air Service at the time of his death. He was a member of the Catholic Church. His survivors are not known in Lamesa.

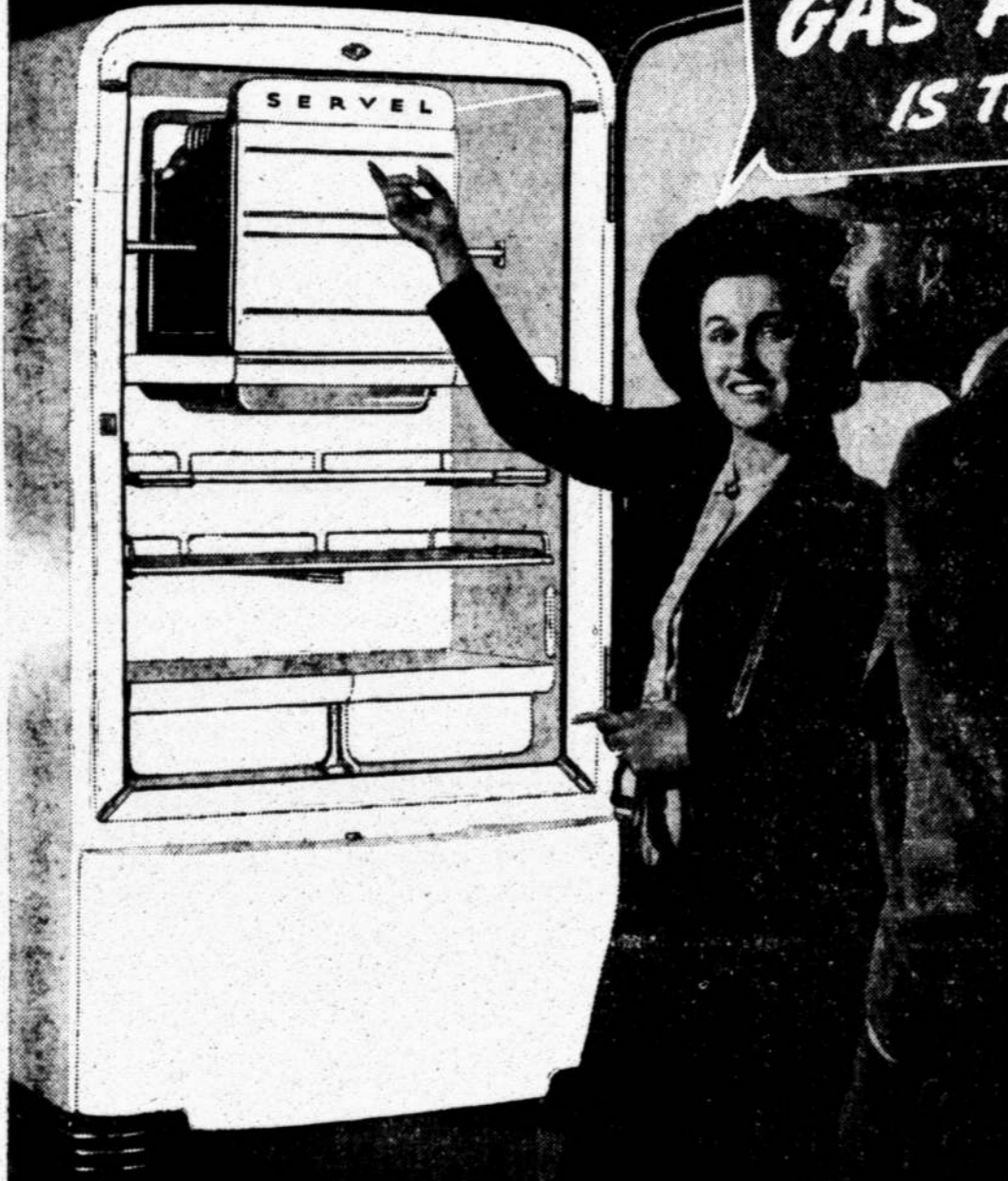

Home Demonstration Clubs Give Summary

During the year 1940, the eleven women's Home Demonstration Clubs and the eleven girls' clubs, and the county home demonstration council cooperated with the home demonstration agent in clothing work; food production; preservation and preparation; interior and exterior home improvement work.

The home demonstration agent gave 176 demonstrations, which were attended by a total of 2,007. Sixteen meetings were held at the homes of demonstrators with a total attendance of 213. One hundred and eleven meetings were held without the agent with a total attendance of 1,716. The agent received 758 office calls; visited 50 different homes; made 93 home visits; wrote 467 individual letters and 13 circular letters; distributed 1,600 bulletins and made 4 radio appearances. Thirty-two training and committee meetings were held with a total attendance of 248.

Demonstrations were given to girls clubs on construction. Six clothes closets have been built, 3 remodeled, 146 garments, valued at \$197, made by the girls.

Home Demonstration clubs gave 4 frame garden demonstrations in unorganized communities. 100 frame gardens were built; 119 earned the AAA garden payment.

Demonstrations were given by the agent on the use of canned meat; preparation of tender and less tender cuts of meat and frozen meat.

The Home Demonstration club members and their families have soddled 6 lawns, put out 118 shrubs, 200 rose bushes, put out 477 trees; planted 2 wind breaks, rooted 78 shrubs from cuttings and planted one out door living room. A total of \$90 having been spent on yard improvement.

The club women having added 6 rooms, improved 22 kitchens, 280

City Warns Rural People About Dropping Cats And Dogs Within City Limits

Is Violation Of City Ordinance, Says Chief Of Police Jack Phinizy, When Complaints Come In

Chief of Police Jack Phinizy this week issued a warning directed to the people of the rural sections of Dawson County, in regard to releasing dogs and cats in the city limits of Lamesa. "We have an ordinance against such practice and we are hesitant in enforcing this law, without first warning the people that they are violating it," Chief Phinizy stated Wednesday. "We have had several complaints from residents of the city that dogs and cats have been brought in-

to the city and released by people living in the rural areas. If you have such animals which you care to dispose of, and have no other way, if you will bring them to the City Hall, we will see that they are done away with, in a humane manner, but we cannot tolerate the loosing of such animals within the city limits." Chief Phinizy stated that several residents of the city had filed complaints along this line and the dogs and cats were becoming a public nuisance.

Urge Farmers To Participate In Soil Conservation

New Year's resolutions may be a lot of nonsense, but there's one resolution that every farmer (and ranchman) in Dawson County would do well to make and keep. "I resolve to go the limit in soil conservation work in 1941, to earn every penny of my soil-building allowance, and even to dig down into my own pocket to carry out additional practices and thus enrich my land as much as possible."

Every member of the Dawson County AAA committee has made this resolution and intends to keep it. W. T. Meeks, committee chairman, points out. He is urging all community committeemen to make every effort to impress on farmers in their communities the importance of taking full advantage of the soil-building practices under the Agricultural Adjustment Administration program.

In 1939 the county fell short of earning the full amount available for soil-building work. Some improvement was made in 1940, but still some farmers failed to go the limit in conservation. In the 1941 AAA program still greater emphasis has been placed on soil conservation, and county committees have been given more authority and latitude to encourage conservation work.

Soil-building practices especially valuable in this county include the following: Terracing: 75c per 100 ft. spacing will vary from 62 to 210 ft. apart, minimum width about 19 ft., minimum height about 15 inches, much of specification depending on slope of land.

Contour listing or furrowing pasture land: 1 1/2c per 100 ft. furrow channels not less than 8 inches in width and 4 inches in depth, or if chiseled not less than 3 inches wide and 6 inches in depth and not less than 3 feet apart. Contour farming intertilled crops: 20c per acre. The rows must be on the contour established with a farm level with guide lines not to exceed twice the terrace interval or must follow established terraces. Contour listing cropland: 20c per acre. Furrows must not be over 4 ft. apart and not less than 20 inches

WPA Lunch Room Feeds 155 Daily

Proves Most Worthwhile Project Ever Undertaken In The Local Schools

All Small Children May Eat At Lunch Room Regardless Of Finances

In the second year of operation the WPA Lunch Room still proves to be the most worthwhile project ever undertaken by officials of the local schools. The project, sponsored by the Parent-Teachers Association, has the backing of the Works Projects Administration.

The lunch room, started only last school year, is for the feeding of all younger children of the schools.

Those who can afford to pay a small sum of 10c for their lunch, do so. Others who are not able to pay are given their noon meal free of charge.

An average of one hundred and fifty-five students eat at the lunch room each noon, with not one-third of this number paying for their lunch, states Mrs. Ruth Wade, assistant project supervisor. The children are fed in two shifts, and are given a well balanced meal, with milk or cocoa each day, and hot bread.

A large part of the food served the children is received each month through the Surplus Commodities Corporation, the remainder being purchased from local firms with funds furnished by the Parent-Teachers Association. All kinds of donations of food stuffs are also gladly accepted.

During the month of December the lunch room received the following list of food stuffs from the Surplus Commodities Corporation: Rice, graham flour, wheat flour, cracked wheat flour, corn meal, potatoes, evaporated milk, lard, dried peaches, prunes, raisins, salt bacon, dry salt bacon, and apples. These same commodities will be received in January. Mrs. Wade stated, with the addition of smoked ham and pinto beans. These foods are received in large quantities, ample for a month's supply.

The lunch room still has a good supply of turnips raised in the WPA garden during last summer. Also a large supply of canned peas, canned by WPA workers last summer. The McCarty Missionary Society furnished the project with a large amount of canned blackeye peas.

Mr. Renner, manager of the Lamesa Creamery, donates thirty gallons of milk each week to the lunch room free of charge. Kline's Bakery has also donated forty loaves of bread since the lunch room opened. Mrs. Wade stated that additional pork is needed at the lunch room, and that any one having a surplus that they would care to donate.

A Kingdom For A Plane!

LONDON — War-weary Britons, satisfied that the RAF has almost completely nullified the threat of daytime air raids, are demanding now an answer to the four-month-old horror of night raids.

And there seems to be no immediate hope in sight.

Some 14 weeks ago, Sir Archibald Sinclair, Minister for Air, declared, "I am able to look forward to a time when the pleasure of night bombing over Britain will cease to be attractive to Reich Marshal Goering and his aerial minions."

Those words were hailed by everyone who had huddled in a shelter or had his sleep broken by the terrorizing whump of bombs and the answering clatter of anti-aircraft guns.

But the two-part job of locating the night-prowling enemy and downing him is not simple as it first appeared.

Anti-aircraft guns, even by day, are none so accurate. The World War average of "30,000 shells per hit" still appears to hold good. By night, the guns are less accurate. They can keep the enemy high and spoil his aim, but they aren't likely to turn back a determined raid. The barrage balloons and the searchlights are helpful — but simply keeping "Jerry" high isn't enough — for obvious mathematical reasons. Sound travels about 1,100 feet a second, that by the time a plane speeding 200 miles an hour at 25,000 feet is heard on the ground, the machine is more than a mile from the point at which the sound originated.

So far the British ack-ack gun-

ners have been credited with bringing down more than 300 enemy aircraft by day and more than 100 by night. But that is not enough.

Competent observers are certain that the night fighter plane is the solution — but present plans for that purpose are falling far short of the results sought.

The night pilot too has his problems. He is deaf to all other sounds and sometimes temporarily blinded by the reflection of searchlights on his propeller. His enemy may be thousands of feet above or below him, miles to the front or on either side.

So the remedy must come in a new type plane.

The air correspondent of the London Evening News says it must have (1) a perfect all-around view, (2) a means of definitely locating the enemy, (3) the ability to cruise all night if necessary and (4) a crew of at least two men.

Until such a plane is perfected, England must rely on RAF attacks on enemy factories and airbases to diminish the scale of Axis operations.

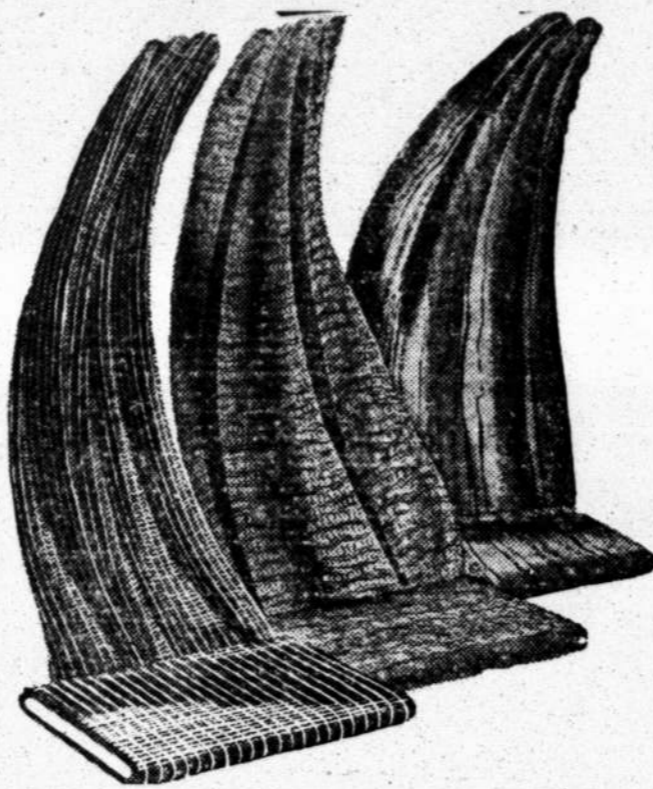
