17 Killed And 156 Hurt In New York Subway Crash

Tragedy Happens At Hour When Train Is Loaded

One Hundred Fifty-Six Are Injured In Accident That Ties Up Metropolitan Transportation System.

CRASH BRINGS EVERY AMBULANCE IN CITY

Defective Switch Blamed by Experts for Accident, After Survey of Scene; Thousands Stranded.

(By Associated Press.)
NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—At the height of New York's busiest hour, when underground arteries of the city carry hundreds of thousands of people homeward, a ten-car express train in the West Side subway split a switch shortly after 5 o'clock this afternoon, killing 17 persons and injuring 156.

The identified dead included: Herbert Zips, 11, of New York; Mrs. Mary Hayes, 32, of West New Brighton, Staten Island; Vincent Menges, 31, of Clinton N. J.

Trying Rabinowitz, 25, of Brooklyn, medical student, who died in Bellevue hospital after both legs had been amputated.

Joseph Cane, 23, no address; James Burke, 19, of Inwood, N. Y.; Mrs. Alice M. Weatherford, 64, of Brooklyn.

Mrs. Marion Zips, 28, New York. Happened in Heart of Traffic.

Leaving Times Square, heart of New York's underground traffic, the train had just gained momentum.

Planes Ready For Flight to America

Three French Expeditions Ready At Le Bourget Field For Start of Race For United States.

LE BOURGET, France, Aug. 24.—The flying fleet here will furnish a three ring circus tomorrow when mechanics trot out three big airplanes as possible contenders in a Transatlantic race to the United States.

Of the three expeditions ready to take the field one has announced it will hop off between five and six o'clock, one is ready for a long distance straight line record flight with rumor the course may lie across the ocean and the third is all set to take off, exact time being withheld.

"France's Powerful Plane"
The plane scheduled to depart between five and six o'clock is the monoplane "France", named by Captain Louis Coudreau, Count Louis de Mailly-Nesle, war-time pilot, and Captain Mailleux. It is capable of remaining in the air approximately 40 hours with a flying range of nearly 5,000 miles.

Captain Arrachart, noted French long distance flier, and Major Rigout make up the crew of the second expedition. They planned to take off about the same time as the "France" in an effort to break the world record long distance straight line flight.

Captain Arrachart has made many long distance flights across Europe, but it is rumored this time his attempt will be in the direction of the United States.

The third expedition is directed by Sergeants Assolant and Lefebvre, military pilots.

Hoover Considers Visit to Texas On Tour of The South

Every Energy For Victory Needed to Win, He Tells Pittsburgh Republicans; To Visit Love in Dallas.

HOOVER TRAIN ENROUTE TO WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—Herbert Hoover moved into the east today to the sector that may be the scene of most earnest efforts of the campaign for the presidency, completing an eight thousand mile "swing around the circle."

In a rear train platform talk he told party stalwarts at Pittsburgh republicans must exercise every energy for victory in November. While his plans for the remainder of the campaign still are indefinite, it is learned he has under consideration a visit to Texas, where Thomas B. Love, former national committeeman, is leading a movement for organization of Texas democrats to support the republican presidential ticket. If he goes to Texas he probably will speak at Dallas. He also is considering a visit to North Carolina, to speak either at Raleigh or Charlotte.

Southern trip to be extended. Scene advisers are suggesting he extend his Southern trip tour to take in Virginia and Georgia, if not Alabama, either at the time he goes to Memphis for his speech there or upon some other occasion. The republican candidate will meet Al Smith, who is going to New York state and in one or two places in New England.

For the next few days Hoover will seek rest. However, he will confer with Chairman Work of the Republican National committee, and others and will devote attention to establishment of his personal headquarters near his own home in Washington.

Stowaways Trapped In Hold of Ship Die Like Rats As Poisonous Gases Used for Fumigation

BALTIMORE, Aug. 24.—Sixteen Brazilians, stowaways in the hold of the American steamship Steel Inventor, were trapped under heated hatches in deadly fumes of Hydro-Cyanic acid used to fumigate the ship at quarantine here today.

Seven died, two more were in serious condition tonight and seven others were in custody of immigration officials investigating the effort to smuggle the men to this country.

Two climbed a rope hanging from a ventilator, and broke through the ventilator covering to tumble on the deck, giving quarantine authorities

Interpretations Of Party Pledge Left with Voter

County Democratic Executive Committee Rescinds Its Action In Ruling Newer Interpretation.

"HOOVER-DEMOCRATS" STRONGLY ASSAILED

Wheelock Fails To Attend Committee Session But Later Issues Statement to Avalanche Journal.

Voters in the second Democratic primary today will continue the meaning of the party pledge according to their individual interpretation. Whether or not the pledge to support his nominees of "this primary" include the national candidates will be settled at the polls with no iron clad rule as a guide.

This was the decision of the Lubbock county Democratic executive committee yesterday afternoon in rescinding the resolution passed last week demanding voters to pledge support of all party nominees.

Although the party pledge question, considered the main basis in ousting Frank E. Wheelock as county Democratic chairman, was repudiated, the resolution declaring vacant his office, was repudiated, the resolution declaring vacant his office was repudiated.

James H. Goodman's resolution to force the support of voters for the national party nominees was replaced by a substitute resolution introduced by Mr. Powell. The resolution ordered the pledge to be considered on the same basis as in the first primary.

Mr. Wheelock, who was asked to come to the meeting and make a statement, failed to make his appearance.

Starting out calmly the meeting reached a high pitch of excitement with the speech of J. K. Wester.

B. F. ALEXANDER DIES

Aged Local Man Succumbs To Heart Attack

BEN F. Alexander, 76 years of age, died yesterday afternoon at about 6:30 o'clock at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Myrtle Strawn, about one and a half miles east of town.

Alexander, Prague, Oklahoma; Clarence, Earlboro, Oklahoma; Joe, Madalia, California; and Wood, Prague, Oklahoma. In addition he has two nephews in Lubbock, C. W. and Ed Alexander.

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SILVER PARDON

Expect Report Next Week On Application

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Senatorial Race Holds Major Interest for Voters Of State At Large But Contests For County Offices Are Expected To Bring Out Good Percentage To Polls Here

Ballots of Voters, Divided Many Ways In First Voting, Will Be Split Only In Twain Today.

VOTE OF HALF MILLION EXPECTED IN ELECTION

Lack of Contested Offices Will Cut Number Casting Ballots, Is Belief Held by Political Experts.

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 24.—(P)—Votes of the Texas Democratic electorate—split three four and five ways in the first primary election—will be split only in twain tomorrow.

The fate of six state candidates and numerous local leaders for public favor, is enfolded in the mystery of how the large blocks of votes cast for eliminated first primary candidates will be divided among the two surviving contestants for each office involved in the run-off primary.

Campaign Closed
U. S. Senator Earle B. Mayfield, who got 199,923 votes for re-election in the July 28 primary, closed his campaign tonight at Port Worth. His opponent, Congressman Tom Connally, who got 177,462 in the preliminary test, wound up at Corsicana.

A total of 294,295 votes were cast in the first primary for their four eliminated opponents.

Half Million Votes
Despite interest in the senatorial race, however, the vote in the run-off is not expected to go much more than half a million, as compared to 671,020 for senator in the first primary.

State School Superintendent S. M. N. Mills, is opposed to re-election by W. F. Garner of Nacogdoches. The only other state race to be decided is between state land Commissioner J. T. Robinson and Otis Terrell of Austin.

Mills got 318,536 votes in the first primary, and Garner, his next highest opponent, got 132,473.

Robinson lacked only a small margin.

Rain Sends The Mercury Low Here

Fall Is General Over South Plains Ranging From .25 to 1 Inch; May Prove Detrimental to Crops.

A touch of the cool autumn weather which is to come soon was felt here yesterday when a drizzling rain sent the mercury in Lubbock thermometers to 52 degrees, an unusually low mark for the month of August.

43 Inches In Lubbock
The rain measured 43 inches, according to measurement made by the agricultural experiment station. The precipitation began yesterday morning, and continued through most of the day, though late in the afternoon the clouds were dissipated somewhat, and the air became slightly warmer.

May Increase Worms
According to Don L. Jones of the experiment station, the cool weather and the wet ground is likely to prove detrimental to crops, in that it is likely to increase worms and bugs. County Agent D. F. Eaton, pointed out that the maturity of the cotton would be postponed.

Reports said that the rain was general over the South Plains. Eaton reported an unwelcome precipitation over the territory surrounding that city, and other points.

Byrd Expedition Leaves New York For South Today

Departure To Be Marked By Gathering of Notables Including Mrs. Byrd; Ice Breaker To Lead Fleet.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24. (AP)—What probably will be one of the most distinguished gatherings that ever sailed on a barkentine will be aboard the City of New York when it starts down the harbor today towards the open sea and the Antarctic.

Headed by Commander Richard E. Byrd and the passengers will include many of the leading financial backers of the polar expedition of which the ship is the first unit to get underway. Byrd and his guests will be taken off the ship in the lower bay and return to Manhattan aboard the municipal bus Macom.

The Party
Among those invited are Mayor Walker, Mrs. Floyd Bennett, widow of Byrd's pilot who died on the expedition to bring the Bremen fliers out from Greenland, Mrs. Frederick E. Guest, backer of the Friendship's flight to England, Amelia Earhart, George Palmer Putnam, Lincoln Ellsworth, Paul Black, James I. Bush, Otto H. Kahn, Clarence MacKay, Charles V. Boo, Bernard F. Gimbel, Admiral De Steiguer and Grover Whalen. Mrs. Byrd also will be in the party.

When Commander Byrd steps off the ship in the lower bay it will probably be the last time he sees the City of New York until he arrives at his base on the edge of the Ross Sea late this year. He is to sail on one of his other ships, the Chelsea or the Larsen, and may not overtake the ice breaker until the base is reached.

OIL CARS AFLAME

GREEN VALLEY, Minn., Aug. 24. (AP)—Firemen of Green Valley and Marshall late today were battling the flames from approximately 150,000 gallons of gas and oil which became ignited when 28 cars on the northbound Great Northern train were wrecked at the edge of this village.

Seventeen oil cars were included in the train. The derailment occurred, it is believed, when a draw bar on one of the cars became loose. The flames resulted in such intense heat that fire fighters were forced to fight the fire from a safe distance. Introduction

"The gospel in Europe started at a woman's prayer meeting, propagated through a prison, and was cheered on by a song."

For us the lessons that righteousness and "flowery beds of ease" are not natural comrades and that a radiant religion can transform a prison into a palace.

Paul wrote to the Church of Philippi one of the shadiest letters ever written. It contains the words joy and rejoice thirteen times in four short chapters. He was in a Roman prison now, but still singing. Did he recall that midnight song?

A Slave Girl Cured

Paul and Silas, Timothy and Luke seem to have visited habitually the "place of prayer" in Philippi where Lydia, the first Christian convert in Europe, was won to the Saviour. One day, as they were on their way thither, they encountered a poor, demented slave girl, whose strange, half-coherent utterances were used by her owners as a species of fortune-telling. She followed after them, and shouted that they were servants of the Most High God, proclaiming the way of salvation. But Paul would not receive tribute and aid from demons; so the name of Jesus Christ he bade the evil spirit come out of her, and in that very hour the slave girl was restored to her true self.

The Heathen Masters Enraged

Instead of rejoicing over the in-

estimable blessing that had come to the girl these selfish men were enraged because they could no more make money out of her misfortune.

"They laid hold on Paul and Silas, and dragged them into the market place before the rulers."

Nothing is said of Timothy and Luke, for Paul and Silas were the active heads of the party, the spokesmen, and they alone were held responsible. The market place or forum of an ancient town was the heart of its life.

Paul and Silas Cruelly Beaten

And the multitude rose up together against them. It was a mob, with all of a mob's unreasoning passion and determined prejudices. "And the magistrates rent their garments of them." The Greek implies that they were stripped naked. "And commanded to beat them with rods."

Paul suffered this form of punishment three times (2 Cor. 11:25). It was a cruel infliction, cutting deep into the bleeding flesh, and often leaving the victim permanently maimed.

And when they had laid many stripes upon them, they cast them into prison, charging the jailer to keep them safely.

"And they said, Believe on the Lord Jesus, and thou shalt be saved, thou and thy house." Here is the essence of Christianity. Here is all we need to know for our eternal happiness and safety. Peter at Pentecost made a very comprehensive answer to virtually the same question (Acts 2:28), but though his was a wonderful summary, Paul's simpler reply has the essentials. Every one can understand what believing on the Lord Jesus means simply accepting what Christ says about himself and what he bids us do. All who do this will be saved from their sins.

pointed to many reasons for doubting its authenticity. It was on a different wave band than that assigned the Greater Rockford, the message was transmitted as if by an expert, while Hassell and Cramer are inexperienced senders and the point where the message said they were down was hundreds of miles from the two villages in southwestern Greenland over which villagers said the plane passed Sunday morning headed east.

A heavy penalty is provided for a radio operator attempting to perjure such a hoax but radio experts said it would be almost impossible to detect such a person if the message are fictitious.

Last night's messages said the senders would be back on the air tonight and the government is keeping air channels clear to allow an opportunity to listeners to try to solve the riddle. Hundreds of amateurs, it was estimated, are sitting nightly with ears glued to head-phones trying to pick up messages from the lost aviators.

Ships which have been patrolling the North Atlantic have been ordered to make a search of islands of the coast of Labrador and Newfoundland, while Eskimo hunters are searching the terrain between the west coast of Greenland where the plane was sighted by villagers, and Mount Evans, its objective, 300 miles to the north.

The Rockford Chamber of Commerce, sponsor of the flight, received an offer today from friends of the fliers in Detroit to help finance an expedition to search for the air-men.

CHICAGO, Aug. 24. (P)—Chicago radio amateurs, listening on a wave length of 42.8 and 23.9 meters, failed tonight in efforts to hear messages signed "Hassell" and "The Rockford Fliers," broadcast on preceding nights. A message last night said the fliers' station "KHAR" would be on the air tonight at 9 or 10 p. m. Central Standard Time. Dr. Charles Scofield, first amateur to hear the signals on the mysterious wave band, was tuned in all evening. "I didn't hear a thing," he declared.

on its journey to Brooklyn when the crash occurred that threw the thousands pouring into the station into an uproar, brought every available policeman and fireman in the section to emergency duty, and called out every ambulance in the city.

An early survey of the scene revealed the express train, heading out of the station, passed almost three quarters beyond a switch in the maze of tracks 200 feet below the passenger platform. It appeared the first pair of trucks of the eighth car in the string passed the switch safely.

Then, the rear trucks split the switch, left the express tracks, and headed down a parallel track used by local trains.

The eighth car, crowded with homegoers and carrying at least eighty persons, buckled in half like a bent pin, hurtled through the air, and was cut lengthwise by the cement wall and steel stanchions that separate the two tracks. One half splintered down the rail at least 200 feet before crumpling into a heap of torn steel and twisted sheeting against one side wall.

The other half of the car crumpled beside the smashed wall, its massive trucks leaning against the structure. Between the two smashed portions of the car lay other bits of wreckage, parts of clothing, battered straw hats, and here and there bits of human wreckage yet to be cleared away. No other parts of the train were badly battered.

Many Seriously Injured.
First report of the fire department to the transit commission set number of dead at 20 with no estimate of injured. Hospitals probably held upwards of 100 persons, some gravely injured, others merely bruised and battered by the shock.

Although power along the entire West Side subway line was shut off as soon as possible, sparks from the shattered high voltage lines apparently set fire to bits of wood-work and filled the black cavern below the passenger platform with dense smoke. Out of the smoke, coughing and reeling, came the first of the injured, many of whom had smashed their way through windows and crawled from under twisted wreckage.

Stations all along the line quickly thronged with passengers unable to board trains. Policemen were sta-

tioned at the turnstiles within less than fifteen minutes after the crash to prevent other passengers from entering the stations.

Many persons, near suffocation from the heat underground, left the stalled trains and started walking the tracks, intent only on getting to the nearest station and reaching the street as quickly as possible.

Defective Switch Is Cause.

After inspecting the wreckage, Police Commissioner Warren said the accident was caused by a defective switch. He explained the wrecked train had been held up in Times Square station five minutes for repairs to the switch which later caused the accident.

After the repairs thought to have put the switch in working condition, the motorman was signalled to proceed and the train was picking up full speed when the eighth car reached the switch. The front trucks passed safely over, Warren said, but the switch opened before the rear trucks reached it.

The rear trucks following the other track, swung the car sidewise and hurled it against the end of the concrete wall which separates the express and local tracks. The heavy steel car jammed with passengers was cut in two. The last car of the ten-car train, the police commissioner's investigation showed, had telescoped the rear of the ninth car.

Prohibition Head Raps Smith Views

Says Changes Favored By Nominee Would, In Effect Nullify the Prohibition Amendment.

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 24. (AP)—Eugene Lowman, assistant secretary of the treasury, in charge of prohibition, said today the changes in the prohibition law advocated by Governor Smith would serve in effect to nullify prohibition.

"As I see it," said Mr. Lowman, "Governor Smith's plan on liquor has two points.

"One he wants to have Congress immediately increase the alcoholic content from one-half of one percent to some higher point which would give us old-time beer. He tried to do that in New York state by passing the Walker beer bill, but the United States supreme court held the act unconstitutional.

"Two—he wants to modify the Eighteenth amendment so as to permit each state to determine whether liquor can be manufactured, imported and sold within such states. That plan would throw us back into the old chaos that existed before adoption of the Eighteenth amendment.

"Governor Smith's position is the same he has advocated for years in New York state. Such a policy would end prohibition and all benefits that have accrued thereunder."
