On Friday night, the Sulphur Springs Eagles came back to Talco for their third trip to play a rained-out game. The Eagles defeated the Oilers by a score of 3-1, although they were out-hit 9-6. Garth (Red) Mann was stingy with the hits when they meant runs, turning in one of the best pitching performances of the season.

Monday the Talco Oilers went down to Winstboro and were defeated by a score of 11-1. Yeager was the loser, although there was only two earned runs of the game. This was not a league game.

On Tuesday night of this week the Sulphur Springs Eagles came to Talco for their last league appearance in Talco this season and the Oilers defeated them by a score of 7-1. Drillers Seek Oil In Numerous Wells Mostly Wildcats

Stratton Drilling Company set pipe Tuesday in the No. 1 Thomas Allen wildcat a mile southwest of Bagwell and in the Backnell survey.

Stratton said pipe will be cemented at 1,810 feet to test a 15-foot sand section.

L. R. Skidmore et. al. expect to have pump trouble cleared up soon to resume drilling below surface pipe at 100 feet in No. 1 Cobb, six miles east of Clarksville in the Gregg survey.

W. W. Bradley No. 1 Adams, John Land survey, southeast of Fulbright, is drilling below 3080 Wednesday noon.

Coats & Herrell are rigging up for a test on the Paul Pruitt place, 10 miles east of Sugar Hill. This location is four miles further east than a test they drilled on the Lizzie Scott place last year, where there was a slight show.

W. B. Hinton, Dallas, has taken a 1,100-acre spread of leases in the area one to two miles east

Why Not Fire Them All?

The Shreveport (La.) Times: The Federal Government starts the new fiscal year with a deficit of approximately \$1,800,000,000 for the past 12 months and estimates of perhaps a five billion dollars additional deficit for the next 12 months. That is a ridiculous situation. If a private corporation had gone nearly two billion dollars in the hole in its operations and the president and board of directors sat down and made out a budget to run it five times as much in the hole in the next 12 months, the stockholders would fire the president and the board pronto.

What's the difference between such operations in a private corporation and in the biggest corporation in the world—the United States Government? Perhaps the chief difference is that the stockholders of the United States Government corporation—the people—can't fire their incompetent officials at will but must wait for elections. However, one-third of the Senate and all of the House members—Senate and House being comparable to the board of directors of a private corporation—must go before the stockholders in elections a year from now.

If the stockholders—the people—would make it clear to these "directors" that each of them who is in part responsible, through voting for wasteful and extravagant appropriations, particularly those involving social experimentation, is going to be fired via the ballot box, the waste and extravagance in appropriations would end very quickly.

Two Liquor Stills Taken by Officers Red River Co.

Officers raided a still near Blanton Creek, 12 miles northeast of Clarksville, found one of the biggest liquor set-ups they had seen in this area. The equipment was set up in production-line fashion, with 60 gallon capacity, and 440 gallons of mash were included.

The two men, recognized but not apprehended by officers at the time, came in and surrendered Saturday morning, according to County Attorney Robert Gooding. They were charged with possessing equipment for manufacturing illegal liquor, which is a misdemeanor, but federal officers were notified, and the charge may be changed. Both men have served penitentiary terms, one of them for a liquor violation, the attorney said.

Making the raid were Sheriff W. A. Beatty; Deputies J. C. Beville and Joe Kelsoe, and H. B. Stanley, Texas Liquor Control Board officer. They spent Thursday night at the site, and waited until the men had fired up the still.

Two men were released on bond in Paris Monday after a hearing held by Mrs. Claire C. Faust, U. S. Commissioner.

Charged with having in their possession an unregistered still, of possessing a quantity of mash and of carrying on a business of distillery without official bond, Coy E. Hastings and Joe Clint Brackett were released on \$1,000 and \$750 bonds, respectively, to await action of the grand jury.

Another raid was made in the vicinity of Silver City, where a smaller still and several gallons of mash were destroyed. No arrests were made.

School Tax Rates Hiked 50 Per Cent

Thirty common and independent school districts in Red River County have voted an increase in the maintenance tax rate to meet requirements for full participation in the minimum foundation fund under the Gilmer-Aikin legislation. In nearly all cases the increase will be from 50 cents to 75 cents on the \$100 valuation, or fifty percent.

Big Cotton Crop Has Been Forecast

The Agriculture Department Monday forecast this year's cotton crop at 14,805,000 bales, as of Aug. 1.

This estimate compared with 14,868,000 bales produced last year, and with a ten-year (1936-47) average of 11,306,000 bales.

Being larger than prospective market requirements, the crop fore-shadowed a return to pre-war production controls for the 1940 crop. Supplementing this year's crop is a carryover surplus of about 5,600,000 bales from previous years' crops, a large part of which is held by the department under price support programs.

The yield of lint cotton per acre was indicated at 274.4 pounds, compared with 313.1 pounds last year and 254 for the ten-year average.

The condition of the crop on August 1 was reported at 80 per cent of normal, compared with 85 a year ago and 75 for the ten-year average.

Cotton Income Will be Large

Farm income from this year's cotton crop may be the second largest of record, despite the prospects for lower prices for both cotton and cottonseed.

Assuming cotton and cottonseed bring no more than government price guarantees, the total income from the 14,805,000-bale crop estimated by the Agriculture Department would be around \$2,440,000,000. Such an income would be second only to last year's record of \$2,641,000,000.

Hinton's Hooten Ordered Plugged

Plugging orders have been issued for W. B. Hinton's wildcat near Birthright in Hopkins County, the No. 1 W. J. Hotten, Aiguir survey. Hole was bottomed near 5,600 after water was found in the Paluxy. The well was geologically low, apparently having failed to cut an expected fault.

Tax Election on Saturday, Aug. 13

An election to equalize the taxes within the school districts of Purley, Hopewell, and Hagansport will be held in each district on August 12.

Under the recently enacted Gilmer-Aikin school law consolidations were required. Where consolidations were made the law also requires that the taxes of the districts consolidated be equalized. In the Purley and Hopewell districts the tax rates will remain at the rate of \$1.00. This is the same as last year but the districts consolidated with these schools must pay the \$1.00 tax rate for the districts to participate in the foundation school program. To maintain a school it will be necessary to qualify under the foundation school program.

None but resident property tax paying citizens are eligible to vote in the election.—J. P. Stanley.

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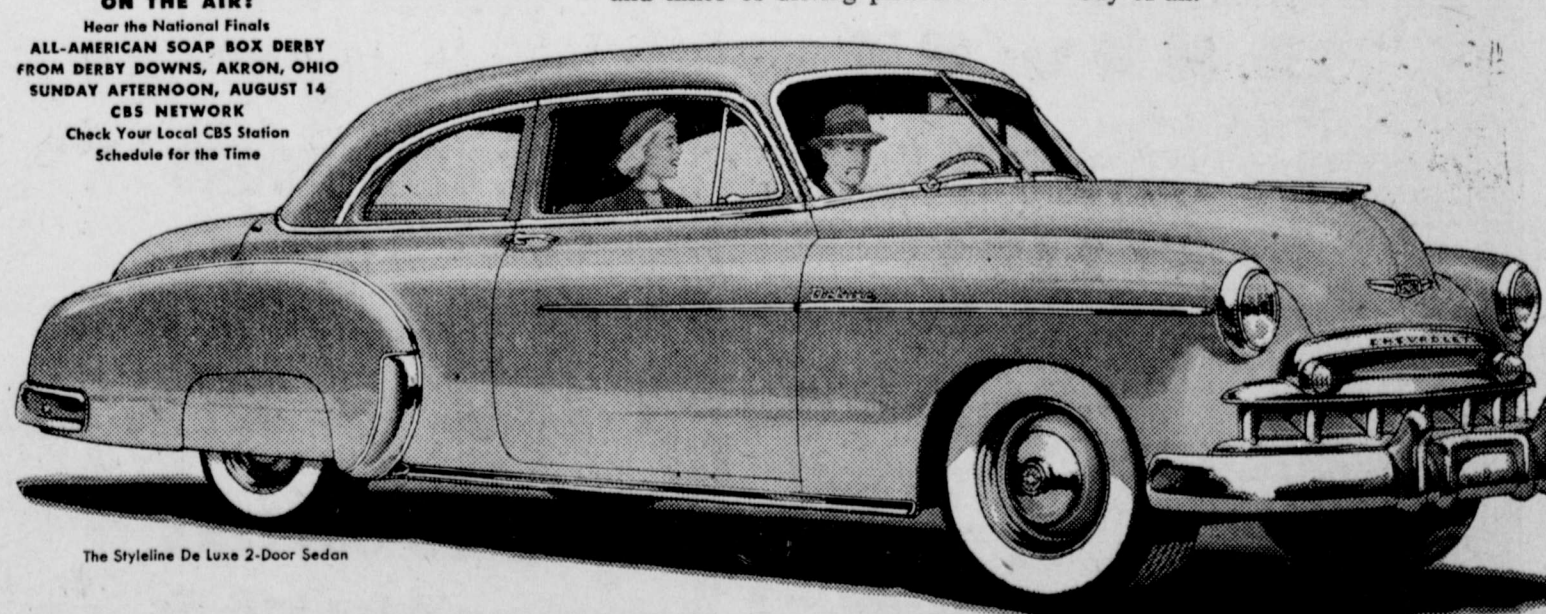

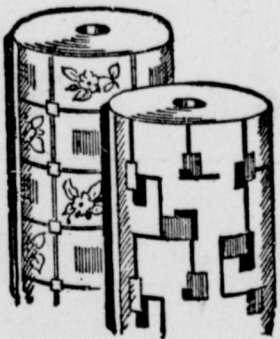

Told him once I was surprised he went along... feeling the way he does about shooting anything. "Well, Joe," he says, "you do what you think is right and I'll stick

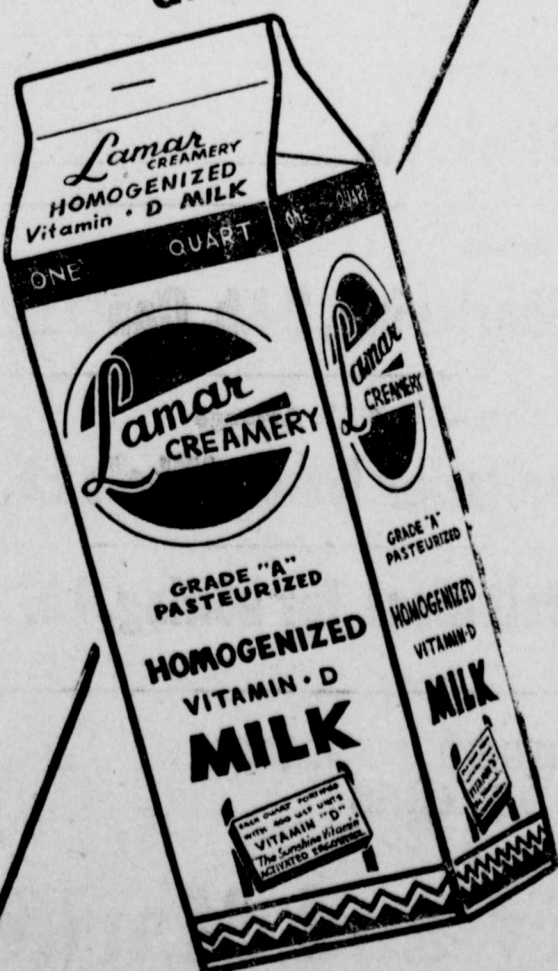
to what I think is right. I've no call to dislike you for not seeing everything the way I see it."
