Lt. Houpt Awarded Purple Heart Medal

SOMEWHERE IN THE PACIFIC

(Delayed)—Marine First Lieut. Walter D. Houpt, Jr., of Abernathy, former All-Southwest Conference Basketball center at University of Texas, recently was awarded the Purple Heart for a wound received during the battle for Guam.

Houpt, commander of a light artillery unit, landed on the island with assault troops. During D-Day, his 37mm. cannon blasted enemy positions on the ridge overlooking the Marine beachhead. Early the second day, when a Marine company suffered heavy casualties as it tried to storm the ridge, Houpt's platoon was ordered in as reinforcements.

The Abernathy officer was proceeding up the ridge when an enemy machine gun opened fire from a nearby coconut tree. Houpt was wounded in the back by a bullet. He covered his wound with battle gauze and continued to advance with his men.

The lieutenant remained on the front lines until his platoon was relieved. Never evacuated, Houpt accompanied his men through the entire campaign.

A graduate of Texas University, Houpt was commissioned a second lieutenant in 1932, and has been overseas 23 months.

He is the son of Mrs. Paul Hunt.

'V-E' Day Service Planned Here

If the word comes on Sunday afternoon, we are to go immediately to the Baptist church."

Suggestion for "V-E" Day thanksgiving meet was made on the morning of June 6, 1944, original D-Day in Europe when the community was in a prayer service at the Baptist church.
