OZARK TRAIL MEETING WAS HELD LAST THURSDAY NIGHT

Col. W. H. Harvey Marking Trail.— Meeting was Held to Organize Panhandle Division

Last Thursday night a mass meeting was held at the court house for the purpose of organizing the Texas Panhandle Division of the Ozark Trail. Col. W. H. Harvey and R. H. Everts with their wives were passing through from Mexico to St. Louis marking the trail so that the traveling public can find their way from one end to the other without asking. Mr. Everts was logging the route preparatory to getting out the Blue Book.

Quite a number of delegates were here from all towns along the Trail in Texas and after a fine talk by Col. Harvey and others the organization of the Texas Division was gone into. Each town along the route elected a vice-president. This county elected one man for both Wellington and Quail—W. I. Atkinson. After the meeting the vice-presidents went into business session and selected Judge C. C. Small as president. He is also vice-president of the national organization.

This division is planning to employ a man to do nothing else but work along the route appointing good men as Mile Captains whose duty will be to see that their mile of road is kept in good shape. The man they will employ will see to it that Texas has as good Ozark Trail as any of the other states. The meeting will be held Sunday at Amarillo to be held soon.

The movement is a good one and Collingsworth county is coming up with its part of the work. Col. Harvey was delighted with part of the road through the Panhandle, but said that a lot more work is needed to be done before it is as it should be.

NO GROUND GLASS FOUND IN FOOD AT CAMP TRAVIS

There has been no ground glass found in the food served to Camp Travis soldiers. And no Mennonite preachers are under arrest at Camp Travis on charge of disloyalty. This is the statement of Major General Henry T. Allen, Commanding the Ninetieth Division at Camp Travis.

General Allen emphatically denies the rumors to the effect that many soldiers and their families have become ill as a result of eating food in which ground glass has been added presumably by alien enemies. Rumors had been current of the action of aliens in placing ground glass in food in all sections of the United States, but direct charges alleging detection of such work at Camp Travis had never been made until recently when an officer, formerly connected with the camp military police was given authority.

Every instance reported to the Ninetieth Division Headquarters has been thoroughly investigated. Every report was carefully traced down, but absolutely no grounds were found to warrant belief that ground glass had been placed in foods, nor has there been any case of illness that could be attributed to such a cause.

Parents of the thousands of soldiers at Camp Travis have been misled in believing that the soldiers were being fed food that contained ground glass. As a result numerous letters and telegrams have been received asking confirmation of rumors. In order to put to ease the minds of all persons interested in me nat Camp Travis, General Allen has issued a flat denial of any of the statements made either as to ground glass or the detention of Mennonite preachers within the camp on the grounds of disloyalty.

The officer responsible for the rumors is now in the hospital. He is suffering with a nervous breakdown.

THE WAR DEPARTMENT PLANS FURLOUGHS TO HELP FARMERS

For the purpose of augmenting agricultural production it is the intention of the War Department to grant furloughs to enlisted men to enable them to engage in farming during the present season. Commanding officers may grant such furloughs within the prescribed rules whenever it appears they will contribute to increased farm production.

Furloughs may be given by commanding officers of posts, camps, cantonments, divisions, and departments. They will be for short periods, largely for seeding and harvesting time. They will not be granted to enlisted men of or above the grade of first sergeant, nor in an organization that has been ordered to move or is in transit from points of mobilization or training to a port of embarkation. All furloughs granted will be recalled and the men ordered to their organizations when they have received preparatory orders for duty overseas.

Furloughs granted for farm work will be without pay and allowances, except that enough pay will be retained in each case to meet allotments in force on the day of the order, war risk insurance, and pledges on Liberty bonds.

For especially qualified experts in agriculture furloughs may be granted by the Secretary of War upon application by the Secretary of Agriculture, providing such furloughs are voluntarily accepted by the persons for whom application is made.

Individual applications for furloughs submitted by relatives will be on a form to be furnished by local draft boards. Two sections are to be made out and presented to the local board, which will complete the form.

If the furlough is granted the application will be filed by the commanding officer and certificate furnished the soldier. If not granted, the application will be returned with reasons for disapproval.

If the soldier initiated the application he will give the name of the person for whom he desires to work, from whom will be ascertained the need for farm service.

Furlough may be granted en bloc to men who are willing to accept them upon requests of farmers, when time consumed in traveling from the post to the place of labor will not exceed 24 hours. In making these applications farmers will use a form of the Provost Marshal General's office, also going to the local board.

British are Regaining Some Territory Taken by Germans, and Grimly Holding Other Places

According to the press dispatches received Thursday the British had recaptured Wythchaete. And thought to have retaken some two or three more towns. They had been counter attacking successfully at Meteren and driven back the Germans toward Bailleul, and advanced and improved their lines in the direction of Neuve Eglise.

It is thought that Generals Foch and Haig are waiting for the Germans to spend their strength, then launch a crushing blow.

In the meantime help to swell the Liberty Loan here in Collingsworth county. Only about half the quota has been subscribed to date.

GODFREY RESIDENCE WAS DESTROYED BY FIRE TUESDAY

The house and contents were destroyed. Nothing was saved. We understand there was \$2,000 insurance on the building and contents—not near enough to replace but will help considerably.

Bill Godfrey and sister, Miss Juno, were living in the house, and at the time of the fire no one was at home but Bill who was working about the place when the fire started, it is thought from the cook stove or flue, and was in flames before it was discovered.

JUDGE R. H. COCKE MAKES AN ADDRESS AT VERNON

The United Daughters of Confederacy held a monument unveiling at Vernon on Saturday, April 6th. Twenty-three Confederates carried

old muskets to salute memorial presented to the public. Judge R. H. Cocke of this city made the address of the afternoon. The Vernon Record had the following to say concerning the address:

"And not a parole has been broken."

declared Judge R. H. Cocke of Wellington, in an address delivered Saturday afternoon when the United Daughters of the Confederacy of Vernon unveiled the monument of a Confederate soldier to the memory of Confederate veterans living and dead.

Judge Cocke's subject was "Southern Soldiers and the South." "The Southern soldiers, overwhelmed by the greater resources of the North, were granted paroles, and with courage unbroken returned to their ruined homes, and through the trying time that followed and in all subsequent times, have never failed to support their country with all their might," said Judge Cocke. The speaker urged the people of the South always cherish the memory of the old soldier in gray, and to heed the lessons they have taught us by their valor.

IMPORTANT THAT FEED AND FOOD SHOULD BE RAISED

It is of the utmost importance that Texans in particular and to the country in general that an intensified effort be made to increase the food and feed production of this state. Farmers are receiving greatly enhanced prices for their products; the soil of Texas is most prolific; the planting area is large; the seasons are long; the demand great and growing; encouragement is offered by state and government. Therefore it is necessary, and crying so, that Texans till their fields, their vacant lots and back yards with an intensiveness and vigor such as will assure bountiful crops of food for man and feed for beast.
