Ready to close the Retail Merchants association Better Business Institute with an address tonight on 'Team work For Community Development', Pryor Irwin, of Chicago, nationally famous expert on problems of business methods and extension, spent a busy day today. At three o'clock this afternoon Mr. Irwin addressed a large group of South Plains merchants, who came from nearby cities as the guests of Lubbock retailers, and this morning, between the hours of 9 and 10 o'clock, he talked to Lubbock business men on 'What Co-operation Can Do For The Merchants of Lubbock'.

Mr. Irwin, who has been conducting the institute all this week, continued today to hold the interest of the business men of the city and last night, when he addressed the gathering in the 72nd district court room in the court house, 350 men and women were present to hear his remarks. The morning and afternoon lectures today were held in the offices of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce but the night program will be held in the court room on the top floor of the court house.

Has Had Busy Week
At the close of the institute to-night Mr. Irwin will have addressed a total of eleven general meetings, in addition to meeting at other times with various groups of business men. The week's program has been a series of lectures on business conditions and methods in Lubbock and throughout the city's territory and, according to leaders of the Retail Merchants' association, has more than fulfilled the best wishes of the city for success of the move.

Twenty different topics were discussed by Mr. Irwin in this morning's lecture on 'What Co-operation Can Do For The Merchants of Lubbock'. The topics brought out by the speaker included: good fellowship, educational courses, institutes,

Basis Of Petition

Byron Dunn, who is scheduled to be hanged this afternoon sometime between the legal hours of noon and three o'clock, slept soundly last night in his cage in the death cell.

During the forenoon the condemned man was visited by Rev. Ryan, who held a long conversation with him and who has been giving him spiritual advice.

Idle Crowds Gather

Groups of idly curious persons gathered today on the courthouse square. Pedestrians walking down Ryan street, their attention attracted by the grim gallows which towers over the jail wall, would stop a moment, casually look at the scaffold and the continue on their way.

Anticipating a large throng after the noon hour, officers took precautions to see that order was maintained and no demonstration would break out.

U. S. BELIEVED TO BE INVOLVED IN WORLD OIL WAR THROUGH CONTRACT FOR PURCHASE OF RUSSIAN SHIPMENT

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—The New York Times today says that the belief has been expressed in financial and oil circles that the United States government will become involved in the Russian oil controversy between the Standard Oil company of New York and the Royal Dutch Shell group as the result of the purchase by the United States shipping board of 24,000 tons of Russian oil from the Standard company.

An agreement for the purchase of this amount of oil has just been concluded after long deliberations, says the Times, and other contracts might follow. The oil is to be delivered at ports in the Near East. The Times says that "in some quarters the shipping board's order was interpreted to mean that the United States government was giving tacit approval to the Standard of New York's trade relations with the Russian government. TWO TO PAY IN DEATH OF TAXI DRIVER, SLUGGING VICTIM

(By Associated Press)

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 27.

Attorney General Percy Saint and District Attorney Robira of Lake Charles announced early this afternoon that the execution of Joe Genna and Molton Brasseaux had been postponed pending decision of the United States Court of Appeals on a writ of habeas corpus filed in behalf of the two men.

Attorneys for Genna and Brasseaux, under sentence to hang this afternoon at Deridder, filed an application for a suspensive writ with the United States court of appeals at noon today.

The decision was announced at 2:30, forty minutes before the men were to have gone to their death from the gallows at Deridder.

Application for the writ of habeas corpus was filed at Alexandria on January 24 and was denied in the federal court. An appeal from the decision was brought to the United States Court of Appeals here today in the federal court at Lake Charles. After the appeal was filed here, attorneys went into conference with Attorney General Saint to obtain a decision whether the appeal had the effect of holding up the executions pending its disposition.

400 MILE TRIP LEADS OVER MOUNTAINS AND THRU FOG

CARTAGENA, Colombia, Jan. 27.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, off for his 400 mile hop to Bogota, the capital of Colombia, took off from the Boca Grande flying field here shortly before 9 o'clock this morning.

The trail of the Lone Eagle today led inland from the sea over the mountains of Colombia. The mountain and the fogs which rise around their rugged peaks made the journey doubly dangerous.

SLAYER AVERS HE WILL GO ON WITNESS STAND

ATTORNEYS SAY MOVE WILL DAMAGE PLANS IN HIS DEFENSE

(By Associated Press)

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 27.

William Edward Hickman upset the plans of his defense attorneys today, defied them to keep him off the witness stand and declared that in the face of their opposition he would tell to the jury his story of the Marian Parker killing.

Discussing with his lawyers the program for the third day of the hearing on his plea of "not guilty by reason of insanity," the man who has confessed the kidnapping and killing of 12-year-old girl, announced his own plan which his counsel, Jerome Walsh and Richard Cantillon said would seriously hamper his defense.

Walsh said: "We don't want Hickman to take the witness stand in view of his insanity defense, and we have told him so. Of course, if he is determined to talk we cannot stop him, but such a move would seriously injure defense plans."

A woman was the first prospect called in from the jury panel for examination today.

Judge J. J. Trabucco asked her the usual formal court and several general questions and then directed the defense attorneys: "You may question the witness only on such matters as were not covered by the court."

Walsh is Halted
Three minutes later Judge Trabucco halted defense attorney Walsh with the crisp command: "That question already was covered by the court."

Walsh agreed with the court and proceeded to a new question from which Walsh yesterday monotonously repeated to each juror his exhaustive list of queries.

Less curiosity than yesterday was shown in the trial over one third of the seats being vacant at the opening.

State To Present Little Testimony

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 27 (AP).

The burden of the case in the sanity trial of William Edward Hickman will be piled upon the shoulders of the defense attorneys by the prosecution.

GULF BREEZES PLAY PART IN DEMO MEETING

AUDITORIUM WILL BE BUILT FOR COMFORT OF DELEGATES

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—The immense made-to-order auditorium which will house the Democratic national convention at Houston, Texas, next June will be especially designed to take a full advantage of the cool gulf breezes sweeping in from the Gulf of Mexico.

A permanent fire proof, insulated against heat, and a mechanical ventilation system will guarantee the comfort of the delegates. Jesse H. Jones, of Houston, director of finance of the Democratic national committee, said today. All sides of the great hall will be left open to admit the breezes.

Several city blocks are to be razed and cleared for the auditorium which will be of stadium type, with sloping floors surrounded by thousands of seats from which a clear view of the platform will be afforded from all parts of the hall. Its capacity will be 25,000 persons.

Branch Postoffice

It will include a branch postoffice, four dining rooms and special accommodations for officers of the national committee and the press. Special consideration has been given facilities for radio broadcasting and making of motion pictures.

Accommodations for the press on the speakers' platform and in offices nearby have been carefully planned. All the press services will have private and independent facilities for their work and a number of private offices will be provided for the larger newspapers.

Houston plans to build the auditorium in 90 days. G. A. Dowdy, Houston's city architect, will be in charge of construction.

UNION FOREIGN POLICY TAKEN UP IN SESSION

ORGANIZED BASIS FOR REORGANIZATION IS SOUGHT IN LATINS

(By Associated Press)
HAVANA, Jan. 27.—Whether the Pan-American union should continue its present non-political function or should assume the added role of a political union, the Pan-American conference today...
Detailed articles of incorporation as projected by the union itself and widely varying amendments of member nations were up for discussion by the commission charged with preparing an organic basis for reorganization of the union.
Hague Court Mentioned
The amendments included those proposing in one form or another that the union become a conciliator. These came from delegations of Cuba, Salvador and Colombia. The Colombian project envisaged the establishment of a court, some what similar to that of the Hague, for the settlement of disputes in this hemisphere.
Another proposal was that advanced by Argentina that the union concentrate its efforts on a plan of action aimed at the removal of all discriminatory tariff and quarantine barriers to trade between the Americas.
A Mexican proposal for reorganization of the union implied criticism of the present organization.

WALKER HOLDS BIG HONOR IN RADIO'S WORLD

PICTURE SENT OUT ON REGULAR WAVE TO ALL RECEIVERS

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Major James J. Walker has the distinction of being the first person whose photograph was ever broadcast by a radio station over its regular wave length, so that whoever happened to be tuned in could hear it.
Thousands of listeners heard a prolonged squeal lasting for 30 seconds and punctuated by a swift, regular crackling as station WEAF of the National Broadcasting company put the picture of New York's mayor on the air.
Mayor Is Attentive
The mayor listened intently to the squeal, as he sat in the studio.
"That sound indicates you're going over," said Grover Whalen, of the mayor's committee for the reception of distinguished visitors.
"It sounds as if I had a beard, I must need a shave," the mayor answered.
General J. G. Harbord, president of the Radio Corporation of America, took a more serious view of the test. He said that its success forecast the time when any owner of a receiving set, if within range of a National Broadcasting company network station, could receive pictures, printed programs or photographs of the lecturers to whom he is listening, and other studio scenes.
Inventor Explains It
Dr. E. F. W. Alexanderson of the General Electric company, inventor of the broadcasting and receiving outfits used, explained its use. The light from an automobile headlight was focused through a lens into the photograph to be sent, which was revolved. The image, as reflected by a beam of light, was broken by the notched edge of a revolving disc, falling upon a photo-electric cell. By this process the light waves were converted into electrical impulses, amplified and transmitted in the usual manner.
As received by the ordinary set these impulses produced merely a squeal, but special apparatus installed for the test on two ordinary receiving sets reversed the sending process and reproduced the original photograph on ordinary photographic paper. This was immersed in a developer and then in a fixing bath as in ordinary photographic printing.

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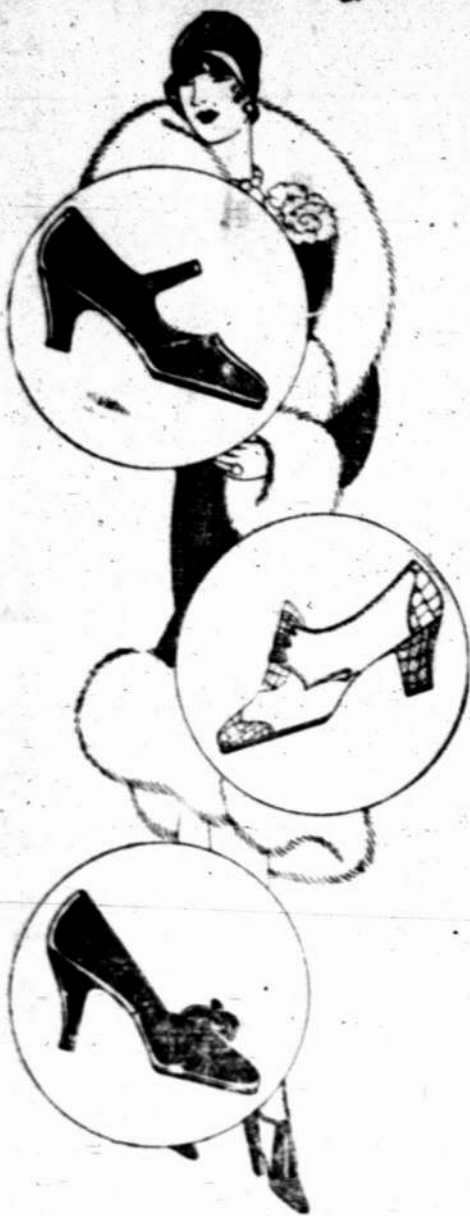

Keys, who examined twelve prospective jurors in a few minutes while the defense had spent the entire day in weeding 19 men and women down to a dozen, predicted that the final jury would be seated before the close of court today. At the close of the first day of

jury quizzing the state had used the first of its allotted twenty challenges. The defense still had its permitted score intact.

Judge J. J. Trabucco's chief spur to a speed in jury selection was the order that prospective jurors be examined in groups of 12 on general questions. Although the defense dropped back into individual examination repeatedly, the judge quickly brought the attorney back to group questioning.

Crisply he overruled the greater part of the objections generously made by the defense and at times he placed a definite period on his decisions with a "there will be no argument."

Long List Of Questions
Walsh's examination of the jurors was from a typewritten list of fifty six questions. They demonstrated the defense objections to any person who had a child attending the same school as Marian Parker attended or who contributed to the reward of Hickman's capture, acquaintances among police officers and members of any church whose pastor had preached about the case or who listened to the details of the case over the radio.

There was no water or gas with the oil, which has not been tested.

TEXARKANA, Ark., Jan. 27 (P)—Charles Prazier, fugitive from the Texas State penitentiary at Huntsville, today was formally charged with the murder of Hence Giles, Texarkana policeman, on July 16, 1926. Examining trial was set for February 2.

GAINESVILLE, Jan. 27 (P)—A tip that officers believed would lead to the arrest of one of the men who robbed the Love County National Bank at Marietta, Okla., when one robber was slain and Sheriff S. C. Long was wounded, today led a posse of 100 armed men into the Red river bottoms near Marietta, Okla., it was reported here.

Accused Pair At Amarillo Arrested

AMARILLO, Jan. 27 (P)—Jack Davis and Clayton Toonts, under indictment for murder, in connection with the slaying of a druggist here, were arrested late last night after they had escaped jail at Stinnett, Wednesday night. They offered no resistance when they were located by officers. Both men, it is said, are wanted at Borger on charges of robbery. Trial on the murder charge has been set for Feb. 6.

POLLARD SAYS RAIL PROPOSAL IS NOT LEGAL

RAIL COMMISSION NOT
EMPOWERED TO MAKE
CHANGE, IS HELD

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Jan. 27—Attorney General Claude Pollard ruled Friday that the State Railroad Commission can not legally approve a proposed contract between the Cotton Belt railroad and a motor bus line to substitute motor bus for a passenger train service between Tyler and Lufkin, and warned that he would attack in court any such contract made.

The commission, which has a hearing set for Jan. 30, on the subject, can consider only the railroad's proposal to discontinue passenger trains, Mr. Pollard ruled in an opinion to Chairman Clarence E. Gilmore.

Only One Question
"Your jurisdiction," he said "is to pass upon the simple question as to whether or not you will permit the railroad to discontinue the operation of certain trains, but, in doing this, the law does not give you authority to go beyond and pass upon the legality of a contract between the railway company and a third party. I have quite serious doubt as to whether the contract is one which the railroad would be authorized to make, and for you to be called upon to assume the responsibility of determining its legality would be, in effect, substituting your judgment for that which ought to be determined by the courts."

"Goodbye," she said, "and thank you. I'll remember you in my prayers. Won't you tell me your name?"

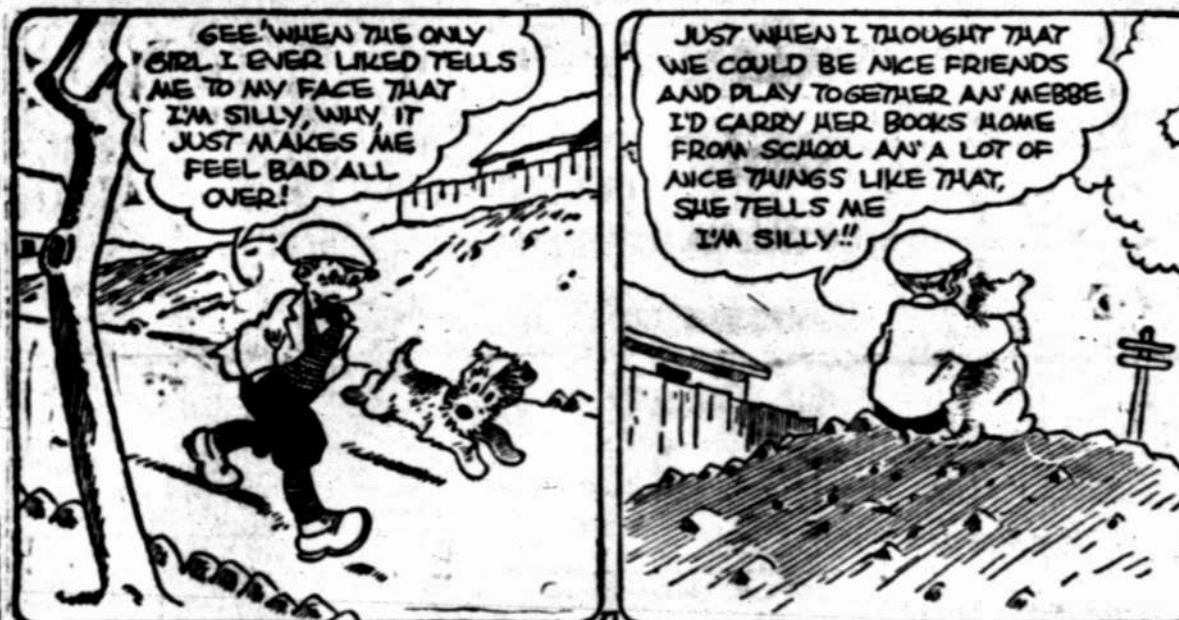

FOUR SCHOOLS ARE CLOSED IN MEXICAN RAID

CATHOLICS CHARGED WITH VIOLATION OF COUNTRY'S LAWS

(By Associated Press)

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 27.—The principal, 16 instructors and eight students of a Catholic school were under arrest today as the result of a police drive to enforce the religious laws.

The entire student body of the Seminario de Regina was arrested, but 190 of the students were released last night on orders from General Roberto Cruz, chief of police of Mexico City. Twenty-one teachers, reputed to be nuns of Colegio Josefine, a Catholic girls' school, who last Wednesday were charged with conducting propaganda against the government were also released by order of the district court.

Four Schools Closed

The Seminario, Colegio Josefine and two smaller Catholic girls' schools were closed in the police campaign.

Father Benigno Esquivel, principal of the Seminario, 12 priests and four other teachers were held by police pending investigation of alleged seditious activities by them against the government.

Eight students for the priesthood arrested at the same time were also held in custody. They were said by police to have been found dressed in cassocks in violation of the religious laws.

The police also closed the headquarters of the Catholic federation. Seventeen members found inside at the time were arrested but later released.

Told of Propaganda

General Cruz said the police had been informed by one of the servants at the Seminario of propaganda there against the government.

The orders for the raids on the schools were issued, he said, because of reports that the religious laws were being violated. In the schools visited by the imparting of religious teaching in violation of the constitution. Drastic measures would be taken in all similar cases, he asserted, because the government was determined to enforce the laws of the country.

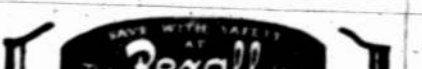
