The Daily Life of A. J. During the Impeachment Trial.

He rises as early as seven o'clock; takes a drop of corn whisky and lemon pool; and has a subordinate present him with the papers of Baltimore and Washington, where all matter referring to himself is marked. While his hair and beard are being dressed, such portions of these are read to him as he has indicated, and also selects part of the Globe containing admired passages of his counsel's remarks of the day before, or the more personal parts of speeches for the prosecution. Afterwards a friend drops in and one or more members of his counsel, and breakfast is a grand council, where they sum up the actions of the day before they do them. After breakfast the counsel go to their hotels, where the state carriage is sent for them at seven o'clock. Mr. Johnson then begins to receive people, most of whom console with him and get his blessing. He takes to scrap-book collections of his own speeches between times, till the mail comes at one o'clock with the Western newspapers, when the Secretary picks out the editorial and correspondence pertaining to Mr. Johnson and reads it. Meantime, half hourly messengers arrive from the Senate with the news as to how the proceedings stand. The President questions them less upon the situation, than upon the argument; for he is one of those sublime self-abnegations that would rather get a syllogism in his favor than a new friend. As to the newspapers, he is an extraordinary interpreter of them. He will calmly listen to a whole column of scathe, and observing one fraction of consideration, somewhere in the column will pick it out and appropriate it to feed his ipoditable conceit.

"There," he says, "that writer comprehends me; the rest of his article is immaterial."

People come in at intervals up to the time of the arrival of the New York papers at half-past five or six o'clock, which is the era of the day in Wash- ington. Mr. Johnson dislikes the World more than any daily paper in New York. He has a queer hankering for the good opinion of the Tribune—probably supposing that a concern which could be merciful to Mr. Davis might consistently relent towards him. Dinner at six o'clock; generally has one or more of the counsel at it; but Mr. Johnson has not the power to retain even the regard of his counsel. Mr. Nelson is with him more than other one. Stanbery seems to have most faith in the President. The more "shines," surprises and ingratiates Johnson out of, the more Stanbery looks upon him as an errant son, to be forgiven and fondled. Nelson, on the contrary, regards Mr. Johnson somewhat as Las Casas or Montholon regarded Napoleon, or rather as David Copperfield regarded, in his early youth, the distinguished Mr. Peggotty. To Mr. Nelson, Johnson is all history, all art, all example and all deportment. It is well for our human nature that a Nelson exists for every man, who, when the signal for retreat is hoisted, will shut every eye but his blind one, and say: "I don't see it!" Nelson sees nothing but Johnson, the Tennessee archetype! Johnson picking his teeth is to him a spectacle in story. To him consecrates bad English and makes it imitable. Delightful old mushroom! Johnson's whole heart and history is not worth one tear like thine!

The evening at the White House is generally free of genteel company; for the President's nature requires a good deal of the hail-fellow-well-met sort of company. With Kershaw and some of the Washington boys he sits up till late, exchanging interjections upon the schemes of his enemies, and three drinks count the three watches between dinner and bed-time. During the late half of the night the Globe is often brought in in proofs and the speeches of the day read and remarked upon.

Andrew Johnson is wonderfully like General John Charles Fremont in this: he believes that all his ill-successes is attributable to other causes than himself; that all success came out of his own resources. Defections and failures come to him philosophically, therefore. He sits down awhile after each of them, indulging in a blind hate of somebody, and then with his treacherous pertinacity makes another push in the same direction. He is a man without method, and yet with some desultoriness of will, so that nobody knows when to trust him or when to respect him. He has lived in the city of Washington for twenty years, more or less, but his personal friends here are of a sort that, leaving the President, their best friend in point of rank is a bookkeeper or a gambler. It is this medley of men that is said to turn the constitution like a pilot to his compass. Full of snatterings of character, he has bungled his way to eminence chiefly by the power of words over ignorance, and he believes now that he is the closest

constitutional lawyer, the greatest stump speaker, the author of the best policy, and the most popular public man in the United States.

while the Chicago Convention will have
completed the work of President-making;
the republican ticket will be made up and the
political issue for the next campaign fairly
inaugurated. Senators will take their places
again as sworn jurors in the case of the U. S. vs. A. J.,
and we believe the verdict will be guilty on
some one or more of the indictments presented.
If the Senatorial jurors do not find a verdict of
guilt, it will be the first time in the history of
criminal trials that some corrupt or head-
ed juror has thwarted the ends of justice.

The greatest indignation is in store for a
verdict of "not guilty," and a joyful welcome
for a verdict of "guilty," from every loyal heart
from Maine to Texas.

Impatient people who have watched the
progress of the trial, feel provoked that the
Court adjourned until all the articles had been
voted on. We cannot see that the cause of justice
has suffered by such postponement, and it is prob-
able that the men who have managed this great
trial, have a good reason for postponing the final
vote upon the remaining articles. The great likelihood
of bribery is sufficient reason for going slow in the
final steps of a trial which has cost the country
so much money and so much anxiety. The prospect
of lively times ahead are very promising. There is
little doubt but several of the remaining articles
will be voted down, but the 2nd is likely to go
through.

The eleventh article was introduced by
Mr. Stevens.

The managers first reported ten articles,
of which the fifth and seventh were almost
identical, varying only in a single detail. The
seventh was dropped, and to the nine remaining
there was added a new tenth article, on motion of
General Butler, and afterwards the eleventh article
prepared by Mr. Stevens.

The first article of the series as it now
stands, charges the removal of Mr. Stanton in
violation of the tenure-of-office act and of the
constitution.

The second charges the appointment of
General Thomas, there being no vacancy in the
office, a violation of the tenure-of-office act and
of the constitution.

The third charges the same appointment,
without consent of the Senate then in session, as a
violation of the constitution.

The fourth charges conspiracy to prevent
Mr. Stanton from holding office, in violation of the
act of July 31, 1861.

The fifth charges conspiracy in the same
act to prevent the execution of the tenure-of-office
act.

The sixth charges conspiracy to seize and
possess the property of the United States in the War
Department, in violation of the laws of 1861 and
1867.

The seventh charges the same conspiracy as a
violation of the act of 1867 only—tenure of office.

The eighth charges the appointment of
Thomas, in violation of the law of 1867, for the
purpose of unlawfully controlling the disbursements
of money for the military service.

The ninth charges the attempt to induce
Gen. Emory to treat the appropriation act of March
2, 1867, as unconstitutional, with intent to defeat the
enforcement of the tenure-of-office act.

The tenth charges the language used by the
President in his speeches as intended to excite the
odium and resentment of the people against Congress
and the laws by it duly and constitutionally enacted.

And the eleventh charges the determination
and endeavor, after suspending Mr. Stanton, under
the tenure-of-office act, to prevent him from resuming
his office as that act requires, when such suspension
was not approved by the Senate.

The second and third articles are considered
the strongest of the remaining ten; as the conspiracy
was not fully proved.

The acquittal of Johnson by the same vote on the
2nd or third article, as occurred on the 11th, will
only leave him in office as a convicted criminal. The
moral effect of his acquittal by the vote of one man,
will tend to his complete condemnation by the
loyal people of this nation, and will warrant no
successor to the Presidential chair in trying Johnson's
policy over again, the accident which keeps Johnson
in power, we believe never can happen again, and if
the Southern States were represented, would not
happen now.

This is the first time we have attempted
to impeach a President, and if we fail, it will argue
no more to our disadvantage.

White House a few months longer, with a strong
guard about the place. The fact is, the American
Republic is the most elastic government that ever
existed. Neither rebels or weak-backed Union men

The Ship Island Horror.

A rebel paper in Handsborrow, Miss., originated an
infamous account, detailing an outrage committed
by a negro soldier, upon Miss Mower, daughter of
Gen. Mower. This account was republished in the
New Orleans Bulletin, and copied generally by the
rebel press, with the most brutal remarks. The
following card, signed by all the officers, including
the Chaplain, on duty on Ship Island, appears in
the Handsborrow paper originating the infamous
falsehood:

We, the undersigned, officers at the post of Ship
Island, Miss., have read the article published in your
paper, and republished in the Commercial Bulletin,
of New Orleans, concerning a soldier's entering the
house of Gen. Mower, one night during the early
part of this month.

We desire to inform you that the statement as
published by you is essentially false. A man did
enter the house of Gen. Mower, but his designs are
not positively known, neither did he succeed in
doing anything more than to alarm the whole family.
His conduct was sufficiently suspicious to warrant
his arrest and punishment, while undergoing the
latter he escaped from the guard.

The editor of the Houston Telegraph, is not
satisfied, he adds editorial remarks, insinuating
that those officers told a lie willingly. Oh, no,
this dirty Confederate preacher thinks it too good
a thing to give up, even if proved false by the most
conclusive evidence. And the young lady, because
she is the daughter of a Union General, must be
