Q. With the price of oil what it is, I know there has to be a big drop in oil production in the state. Just how much of a drop has there been?

A. According to the Railroad Commission, Texas oil production is at its lowest level since 1942. Figures indicate that production dropped from 1,596 million barrels per day in April 1993 to 1,49 million barrels per day for April, 1994 - a 100,000 barrels per day drop!

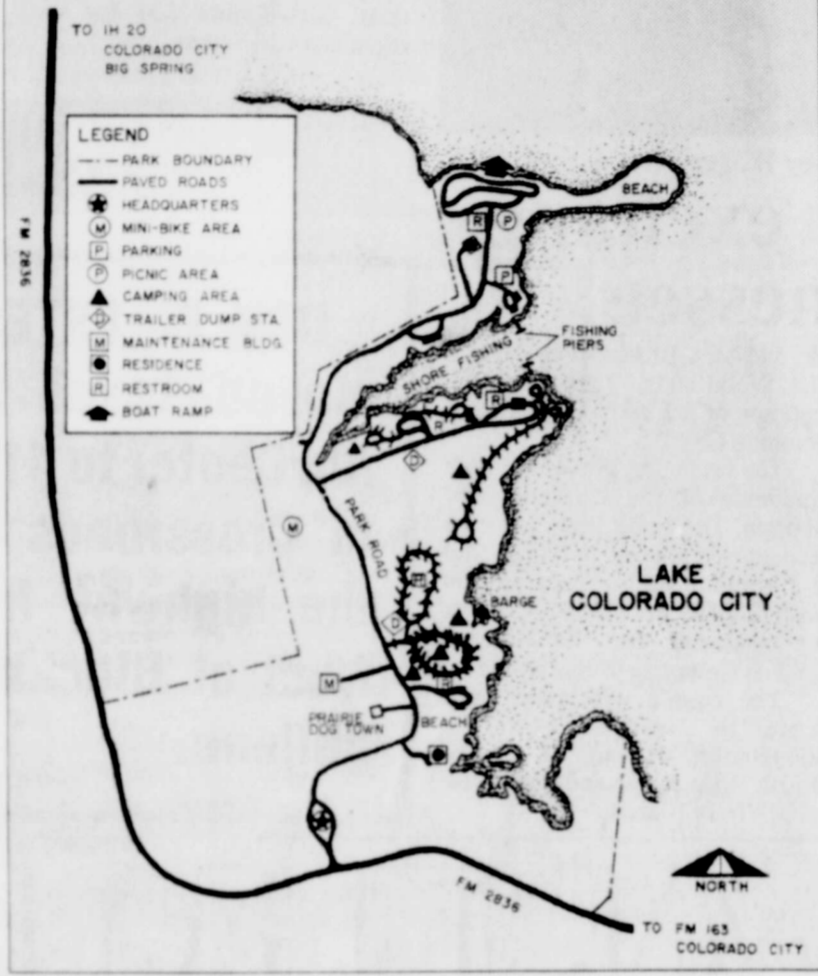

12,000-plus are expected at Lake Colorado City State Park

Over 12,000 people are expected at the Lake Colorado City State Park over the three-day July 4 holiday this coming weekend according to Park Manager, Mark Fambro.

"Attendance will depend greatly on the weather," said Fambro, "I don't know how many will brave the 105+ degree temperatures like we had this past weekend."

Rain, of course, would drop the attendance greatly also but "what we would like to have is about a 15 degree drop in the temperature" added Fambro.

Fambro said attendance at the park this past weekend was good despite the temperature.

"You have to pace yourself in weather like this - it's easy to overdo and not realize it until you're in trouble," he said.

He urges everyone to wear plenty of sunscreen because "we have seen some severe cases of sunburn this summer."

He reminds everyone that public consumption of alcohol in the park is prohibited as is popping fireworks.

"There are going to be lots of people and it is extremely dry and fireworks could cause a big problem," cautioned the park manager.

He stated that all areas of the park are now open following the recent construction program.

"The lake is going to be like rush hour in Dallas without marked road lanes and we urge everyone to use good common sense while

boating," Fambro emphasized. "This is a fun holiday and we don't want to see it ruined by a boating accident."

He added that fishing had been excellent with good catches of bass, redfish and catfish.

Saturday fireworks display highlight of "Fourth-Fest"

Colorado City's annual Independence Day Celebration promises to have "something for everyone" as the event will be celebrated at Ruddick Park on Saturday, July 2.

Over \$8,000 worth of fireworks will highlight the event but there will be plenty of activities leading up to the fireworks display slated for 9:30 p.m. Saturday.

Food booths will open at noon and there will be a good selection for everyone. These will be operated by Poverty Hill Enterprises, Jerrie Espinoza, Christian Fellowship Church, Sally Martinez, Cold Spot on Wheels, A. T. and T. Concessions, First Baptist Church, K.K.'s, H. and M. Productions and Snow Cones.

The various booths will be serving a variety of foods including fajitas, brisket, Mexican foods including burritos, nachos and tacos. Plus there will be iced tea, lemonade, watermelon, snow cones, plus other snacks and soft drinks available.

The Westbrook Lions Club will begin serving their fish fry at 4 p.m. and it will be served with fried

fish, new potatoes, beans and tea or water to drink.

Several fun events will take place beginning at 3 p.m. Saturday and lasting until 6 p.m.

These include the obstacle course, fish grab, water balloon toss, treasure hunt and the golf shot all sponsored by the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce. Prizes will be given in the obstacle course and the fish grab.

The tug-of-war is sponsored by the Colorado High School student council and the volleyball tourney is sponsored by the C.H.S. Atlantabound group. The Colorado City Police Department's D.A.R.E. Program is sponsoring the fast ball pitching contest while the Ladies Auxiliary of V.F.W. Post 9178 is having a cake-walk.

The Mitchell County 4-H Club is sponsoring pony rides for the youth beginning around 9 a.m. and continuing until 11 a.m.

Performances by various groups will start at 4:30 p.m. and will include the Lone Wolf Karate Team, Performers Unlimited and the Hip-Hoppers directed by Kakai Wulfgren.

Extra wardens here for Fourth of July weekend

Game Warden Randy Bullard said the large attendance expected at the Lake Colorado City State Park will warrant bringing in two more game wardens this weekend to handle the crowds.

"We're going to cover both Lake Colorado City and Champion Lake this weekend and we urge everyone to be safety conscious while on the water," said Bullard.

He stressed that he and the other two wardens will be doing some night patrolling as well as

putting heavy emphasis on intoxicated boaters.

"We do not have that many boaters charged with B.W.I. (boating while intoxicated) and we attribute a lot of that to the enforcement at the State Park," said Bullard.

"We want everyone to have a happy Fourth of July weekend but we want people to obey the laws because they are in place to protect your safety," added the game warden.

Suspect sought in Sunday night attempted robbery

A black male, approximately 27 years old, is being sought in the attempted robbery of Skinny's #46 located at 395 E. Second St. The incident took place around 10 p.m. Sunday.

Police Chief David Montgomery said a 9-1-1 call came in from the store's clerk, Elfie Ratliff, at 10:01 p.m. and she reported that she had just been robbed.

Officer Charles Rice responded to the call and the clerk said the assailant picked up a Dr. Pepper and a loaf of bread and as he approached the checkout counter he told her to open the safe and give him all the money.

Rice said the clerk responded that she could not open the safe and at that time, the assailant pushed her down and kicked her twice.

The robber then tried to open the safe himself but could not. He then fled out the door and ran to the rear of the store with the Dr. Pepper and the bread.

Blood hounds from the Wallace Unit were used to track his trail for some time but were unable to keep up with it because of the heavily travelled path he apparently escaped on.

Montgomery said one suspect was picked up later but was released when police determined that he was elsewhere at the time of the crime.

Clerk at Skinny's gives good description of robbery suspect

The clerk in the robbery at Skinny's was able to give police a detailed description of the robbery suspect said Chief of Police David Montgomery.

"Under the circumstances she did an outstanding job in describing him," said the chief.

He was described as a black male, 6' to 6'1" tall of slender

build. He had a small thin mustache and a diamond-like ear stud in his left ear. A tattoo of a cross with snakes entwined was on his right bicep. He was wearing cutoff jeans with a white t-shirt that had green writing on it. The suspect also was wearing a white baseball cap and he had a black plastic watch on his left wrist.

Colorado City joined the rest of Texas this week by sweltering under record high temperatures that saw 111 degrees recorded at radio station KVMC Monday.

The forecast reads the same for the coming Fourth of July weekend with high temperatures forecast at 105 to 110!

Other high temperatures recorded Monday included 117 degrees at Childress, 115 degrees at Midland and Odessa, 114 at Lubbock and 113 in El Paso.

Dryland cotton damage is pretty sporadic right now according to Joe Raff with the Mitchell County Extension Office.

"The younger cotton is going to need moisture pretty quick," said Raff, "but the older cotton is still holding up pretty good."

Raff said the heat is affecting livestock as well as he said that he was aware of at least two tanks that have already dried up because of the heat and accompanying drying winds.

Trustees discuss budget

Colorado ISD trustees accepted one resignation and hired two teachers Monday night but spent most of their time in a budget workshop in a called meeting that ended around 11:00 p.m.

Shona Abergey submitted her resignation from the Middle School while Kim Fields and Vickie Weaver were hired by the district.

In other business, the trustees voted to buy a 20-passenger bus, accepted the bid from Bolin Construction for painting work at the high school and Hutchinson Elementary and adopted the CHS student handbook for the coming school year.

The committee interviewing candidates for the vacant girls' basketball coaching job also interviewed three candidates Tuesday afternoon.

HOSPITAL BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

Hospital staff privileges for Dr. Gus Gross were approved by the Mitchell County Hospital Board of Directors Tuesday night in their regularly scheduled meeting.

Dr. Gross will begin practice here July 7.

Dr. Dan Scott, who has also been employed by the district, is expected to open his practice around Aug. 1.

These two new physicians, plus Dr. Dee Roach, will office in the medical building at 505 Chestnut.

The move by Dr. Roach will take place the week-end of July 7, 8 and 9 said Wendell Alford, hospital administrator.

One other physician, who had expressed a strong interest to relocate in Colorado City, has decided not to said Alford.

"There were no problems with him or us," said Alford. "He is very family oriented and his children wanted to finish out their last two years of high school in their present location."

Alford added that he would certainly keep the lines of communications open between the doctor and the hospital.

Alford, in giving the financial report, stated that the average daily census in May was up considerably over April. May's average was 10.2 as opposed to 5.9 the previous month.

He also reported that May was the first month for the hospital to

have any revenue from the Wallace Unit and it was \$24,151. He also noted that expenses were \$58,016.

"We will recoup most or all of our start-up expenses so those figures will be different as to income," said Alford.

He said the maximum allowed by the TDCJ and Texas Tech Health Services for start-up was \$70,000.

In other business, Dale Geiger was appointed as a representative to a committee comprised of members of other taxing entities to discuss tax abatements.

The board also heard normal monthly reports and met in executive session with their attorney, Tom Rees.

- 2) Rate GC - General Service Competitive Pricing;
- 3) Rate WPC - Wholesale Power Competitive Pricing; and
- 4) Rider ET - Environmental Technology Service.

The only customers that will be affected by the proposed tariffs will be those customers eligible for service under TU Electric's General Service Rates GS, GP, and HV or its Wholesale Power Rate WP that voluntarily request one of the new services and that qualify for the service under the terms of the proposed tariff. This is not a "major change" in rates within the meaning of the PURA since the charges under the proposed tariffs are less than the charges that would otherwise be applicable under TU Electric's pertinent existing tariffs. CHIEF LONE WOLF

It's been almost thirty-five years since the mural was painted which hangs in the Colorado City Civic Center. It depicts the history of Colorado City and Mitchell County with colorful scenes of Indians, cowboys, the famed St. James Hotel, the Col Tex Refinery and other landmark features. (See "Who Saved the Baker Mural," April 14, 1994, Colorado City Record.)

The mural was painted more than three decades ago by an artist named Jack White. He hasn't seen it since the day it was unveiled in the Baker Club. White talked with us recently about how he became involved with the project. He remembers Ed Baker, a prominent developer and owner of the Baker Hotel, contacted the Witherspoon Advertising Agency where White served as art director.

White was asked how much he was paid to paint the 128 square foot mural. "He didn't pay me anything. I was employed by the advertising agency and to us it was just another commercial art job. In my spare time I painted it."

And he painted it without ever seeing Colorado City! "The only time I was ever there was when the mural was installed," White told us.

As for the scenes included on the mural, White says he had some help. "People working with me did some historical research. Frank Burkett was the account executive who worked with Mr. Baker and he probably sat down and listened to some stuff that Baker told him. I think he even went to Colorado City and talked to some people and got a kind of local history."

Painting the large mural presented somewhat of a challenge for White, who says the work was done in the cramped quarters of the advertising agency.

"I just laid it down on the floor, as I recall. It was a little too big for our art tables."

After a sketch of the mural was roughed out, it was approved by Baker. Then the actual painting was done on three masonite panels. That was thirty-five years ago. What does White remember about his work?

"I just remember it had a sort of western flavor with oil wells, a locomotive and cowboys," he said. It took White several weeks to paint the mural. "Probably three or four weeks," he added. Much of the work was done after hours with newspapers spread out on the floor.

"I put on old clothes and got with it," he told us. When the day came to hang the mural, White came to Colorado City to oversee the project. He remembers very little about the occasion.

"I was only there a couple of hours. I think we had a lunch and there were maybe a half dozen people there for Mr. Baker's little ceremony."

White did remember (correctly) that the mural covered parts of two walls in the Baker Club. "Seems like there were two panels on one wall and one panel on a shorter wall," he added.

Ironically, White had never painted a mural before. Nor has he painted one since.

"No, that's my one and only mural."

When told that the mural was "rescued" from the Baker Hotel when it closed in 1968, White said he was "certainly glad to hear it survived."

One final note: the Ft. Worth artist says he is frequently mistaken for another artist named Jack White, who was the Texas State Artist in 1975-'76.

"I get confused with him all the time. He did a large number of western paintings, mainly for McDonald's hamburgers," White related. And White says he used to get about a call a month from people wanting to buy one of the other Jack White's paintings.

"I wish I could locate him," White added. He said he would refer the prospective customers to the artist who shares his name.

"I hope you're not disappointed I'm not the Jack White who was the Texas State Artist," he concluded.

Never worry, Mr. White. You're the artist who painted Colorado City's mural. You're our state artist.

Rick Perry urges safety when operating tractors

Tractors are equipment for any farm or ranch, but unfortunately they account for more than 500 accidental deaths each year and thousands of disabling injuries nationwide, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said.

"Without tractors, we wouldn't be able to produce the high-quality and large quantity of food we raise," Perry said. "However, tractors also present many hazards and require extra caution and care when they are being operated."

Most fatal tractor accidents involve overturns, which can be caused by speeding, hitting rocks or stumps, driving on steep slopes, running into ditches, hitching high for extra traction or operating front-end loaders improperly. Fatal roll-overs can be prevented by driving carefully and by rollover protective systems such as protective frames and crush-resistant cabs with seat belts, Perry said.

Falls from tractors also result in many injuries and sometimes death, especially with cabled tractors. Other deaths and injuries are caused by clothing being caught in rotating power take-off shafts. Most newer equipment has PTO shielding, which should not be removed.

Without such protective equipment on tractors as crush-resistant cabs and PTO shields, the chances for injuries and accidents increase. Mechanical malfunctions also can contribute to accidents. Tractor operators can minimize accidents by keeping equipment properly maintained, Perry said.

Other tips for safety include:
 • Stay away from ditches, embankments and holes to avoid overturns;
 • Do not give rides and keep children away;

- Slow down when turning, crossing slopes or on rough, slick or muddy surfaces;
- Watch where you are going at all times and be on the lookout for obstacles. Make sure everyone is clear before moving;
- Stay off steep hills and slopes when possible;
- Don't overload the tractor. Always engage the clutch slowly;
- Hitch heavy loads only to the drawbar;
- Keep PTO shielding in place. Turn off the PTO and the engine before unclogging, adjusting or servicing equipment;
- Set the wheel tread as wide as is practical for maximum stability;
- Hold road speed to a controllable rate; and
- When stopped, shift to neutral or park and set brakes. Take the key with you when leaving.
