## Police busy in '86

1986 proved to be a busy and productive year for the Colorado City Police Department, reports Chief Bobby Sparks.

Sparks said his department received over 16,000 calls in 1986, up over 1,000 from 1985.

There were 171 motor vehicle accidents investigated and 700 traffic citations were issued for the year, more than 100 from the previous year.

The police department investigated one murder, four robberies, two attempted murders, 78 burglaries, 148 thefts, 15 aggravated assaults, 19 vehicle thefts, 30 drug violation arrests, 105 DWI arrests, and 286 disorderly conduct cases.

Sparks said that burglaries and thefts were down in 1986 compared to the previous year and aggravated assaults were down by nearly a third from 1985.

The 30 drug violation arrests were nearly all felony arrests, said Sparks, noting that the drug-related arrests were nearly twice as many as ever recorded before in Colorado City.

Sparks said a total of 1,332 crimes were investigated in 1986 and there were a total of 486 arrests, compared to 397 in 1985.

Clearance rate on major crimes was up by 80 percent in 1986, compared to previous administrations, said Sparks who cited criminal investigator Lt. Pat Taylor for his diligence and to the professionalism of the department's officers who average 5 1/2 years law enforcement experience. He said the average age of Colorado City Police Department officer is now 32-33 years.

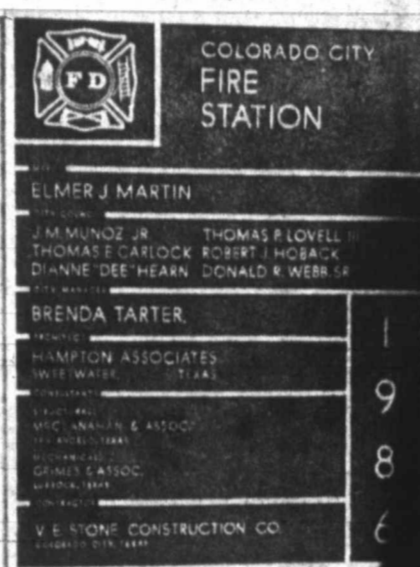
Sparks said the Crime Prevention Program has proved successful and plans are being made for an active Neighborhood Watch Program. He said during 1986, there were 1,400 security checks and close patrols as a service to residents out of town. He also mentioned that McGruff's, a teen center for area youth, is sponsored by the Crime Prevention Unit of the police department.

## Ailments keep kids out of school

Flu, colds, virus - or a combination of the three - have taken their toll on attendance in Colorado City schools this past week.

Some principals report that twice as many students as normal are out because of illness.

Bobby Lemons, Kelley Elementary School principal, said that he had 31 students absent Thursday mainly due, he said, to "the stomach virus and flu going around." He said he's had some

## Headhunters prompt chamber inquiries

## School board amends policy

The Colorado Independent School District board of trustees, meeting in special session Thursday, rescinded action it took Monday night concerning its discipline management policy and adopted a new policy regarding students caught with drugs or alcohol on school property.

At Monday night's meeting, the board agreed to suspend any student for the remainder of the semester caught with drugs or alcohol the first time.

However, board members had a chance of heart and agreed that punishment for first-time offenders should be 20 days in In-School Suspension.

Board president Dr. Billy Bridgford said several factors prompted him to change his mind. He said the suspension from school will "kick" the students "out on the street" for part of a semester and will reduce their chances of graduating with their class.

He said first time offenders should be given a chance to be rehabilitated and to continue their education.

He said House Bill 13 prohibits students from being expelled for alcohol offenses on first offense, anyway.

Board members Thursday readily agreed to ISS for first-time offenders but had differing opinions on how long the in-school

suspension should be.

Dwayne Harris made a motion, seconded by Floyd Ritchey, that students be sent to ISS for 15 days. However, that motion died when it failed to gain the support of board members Kathy Bassham, Eddie Gregory and Brenda Aguilon. J. C. Britton was not present.

Mrs. Bassham's motion for a 20-day ISS suspension, was seconded by Gregory and drew unanimous support from the board.

Bridgford said the board needs to put some sort of time limit between first and second offenses with the board members deciding that offenses will be judged on student tenure on each campus. If a student's first offense and second offense both come while he is a student at middle school, for example, he will be expelled for the second offense. However, if a student has one offense in middle school, when he goes on to high school, his slate will be wiped clean and he will have another chance before being expelled.

Supt. Charlie Uselton said he will check to make sure the local ruling is in compliance with state regulations.

The board also decided that if a senior is in ISS for drug or alcohol violations at the time of

## Charter bus tour set

## Turnaround is indicated

AUSTIN—Land Commissioner Garry Mauro announced a 26 percent upswing in the number of lease nominations received for the April 1987 Oil and Gas Lease Sale, an increase that may indicate a turnaround in drilling activity.

"The oil and gas industry has shown increased interest in leasing state tracts for exploration, nominating 220 tracts for the upcoming April sale, compared with 175 tracts nominated for the last lease sale in October," Mauro said. "But, more importantly, this increase may be the first indicator of a future increase in drilling activity, which would ultimately mean more jobs for Texans."

The Land Office is responsible for managing 16 million acres of state land dedicated to education and depositing that income into the Permanent School Fund. The money generated by this endowment fund, which now

stands at about \$5 billion, is then distributed to primary and secondary schools throughout the state on a per pupil basis.

In order to lease a tract of state land for oil and gas exploration, a potential bidder must first "nominate" a tract for leasing. A non-refundable \$100 nomination fee is collected by the Land Office for each tract a potential lessee wishes to bid on.

The nomination fee practice was implemented by Mauro in 1984 at the suggestion of oil and gas industry experts. This practice, along with additional recommendations, has resulted in the steadily rising per acre bonus the state is receiving on the acreage it leases for oil and gas production.

"In the October 1985 sale, for example, the per acre bonus was \$178," Mauro said. "But it had increased to \$202.18 in the April 1986 sale and to \$249.52 in the last sale," Mauro said.

"The 26 percent increase in nominations over the October 1986 lease sale is a hopeful sign that the oil and gas economy is stabilizing," Mauro said.

baccalaureate and commencement, the student will not be able to participate in either event and will be awarded a diploma later.

Mark Merrell, in charge of the ISS program, explained that any student in ISS cannot participate or attend any extra curricular

activities and cannot be on school property after 4 p.m. on school days.

High school principal Jerry Reynolds said the new policy is designed to eliminate drugs and alcohol on school property but said "we're not going to try to persecute a kid who's been set up. We'll use good common sense and be sure we've got hard facts and evidence" before sending a student to ISS or suspending them from school.

A recent list compiled by the editors of "Consumer Reports" magazine named fifty items it felt "revolutionized our lives."

Included were air conditioners, the '65 Ford Mustang, credit cards and "Dr. Spock's Baby and Child Care."

Even if you missed the report, you can probably guess a few more of the honorees, items like black and white television, the G.I. Bill of Rights and the 1966 Oldsmobile Toronado.

Unmentioned in this report were items that have been less than successful.

Take the rope with the wooden handle on the end. The one that was tied in a square not around the handle of your old power mower. The one you wrapped around the little round thing that, when urged on by the pull of the rope, was supposed to start the engine.

This was progress. A mower that would cut grass with the authority of three horses. Not the old push mower that required intense physical labor and long hours of back and forth motion. With this power mower you just walked across your lawn for an hour or so.

All of this, unfortunately, was contingent on the mower starting when the rope was jerked off the top. If it didn't start, the whole process had to be repeated. If the thing wasn't running exactly right and most of those mowers usually weren't - you had to rewrap the whole thing all over again. It always took longer to wrap than to pull. If the mower didn't start, a great deal of time was wasted, and it took a substantial amount of time to repeat the process.

Twenty negative pulls produced a mad man. You kept pulling a little harder each time until you eventually pulled the entire machine over on its top.

This was called a temper tantrum.

In the end, somebody had the compassion to invent a pull-starting mower that recoiled after the engine failed to take the hint. Today, a person can get 60 negative pulls with his recoil before reaching hysteria.

There have been other 20th century inventions that didn't work, but sold well, nonetheless. Take soap detergents. Even when you hold the sheets up in front of the sun you can't really tell one is whiter or brighter than the other. Not unless one is newer, or one is a different color of white, you can't.

Don't try to say you've had any luck distinguishing different brands of aspirin, either. It's all in your head. Regardless of what four out of five doctors do or don't do, you get the same results with St. Josephs, you get with Bayer or Anacin.

Food substitutes, on the whole, haven't worked, either. Fat people eat most of this stuff - and they're still fat. Has Lite beer made John Madden svelte?

Dishwashers are nothing more than sterilizing machines. They don't really knock particles of food loose, as TV commercials claim. Those crystal clear cups look like that because they've never been used. Leave food particles on the dish and the dishwasher will bake the stuff into the pattern.

You used to be able to pull a car up to a shade tree and fix it with bailing wire. Today's cars don't need mechanics. They need computer experts. And chances are good, when one thing stops working, everything under the hood and dash will quit at the same time. Who's going to re-program a car in the middle of a desert.

The name self-service implies there is an opportunity to save money. Remember when gasoline was a quarter a gallon, and this included a man to do the pumping, check the oil and tires and the radiator? Now you do all of this yourself, and even with OPEC cutting the price of oil you shell out three times that much.

Whose creative mind figured out that allowing people to get their own groceries from the shelves would save time. What is saves is the wage cost of the guy who runs the grocery store. Any time that might be saved collecting your groceries, is given back by while standing in the long line at the check stand. The only one of the 22 cash registers that has a checker behind it.

TV dinners are destined for a place in the history books, but you wonder why. Frozen vegetables have almost as much taste as the frost on the refrigerator freezer.

Do they still have the gall to sell hamburger patty makers? Why would anybody go to the trouble to put hamburger into a mold? It's much faster and it tastes better to smash the ground beef in your hands. A certain artistic flair is required.

Progress has always been one step forward and two steps back. We should have come to expect the patty molders, and frosted vegetables, rope starters and Edsels. But it's frustrating.

Fortunately, there are the successes. The '57 Chevy, the hot tub, and air conditioners that don't have to be attached to car windows, or filled with water every 30 miles.

The century would have been lost without them.

## IRA's are still an option for 1986

Although the new tax reform law will affect individual retirement accounts (IRA), they're still a useful financial option. Until April 15, 1987, you can open an individual retirement account for the 1986 tax year without losing any of the tax benefits that have made IRAs such an attractive investment over the past several years. For example, if you are in the 42 percent tax bracket for 1986, a \$2,000 investment will cost only \$1,160. The other \$840 comes from money you won't have to pay in taxes. Interest that accrues on your IRA account will also be tax-free. The only taxes you pay begin when you take money out of the account, usually after the age of 59½. Starting with 1987, IRA deduc-

tions for IRA contributions will be cut back or eliminated for many taxpayers. People without employer-provided pension plans can claim a full IRA deduction. But taxpayers who have employer-provided pensions and an adjusted gross income of over \$35,000 for singles or \$50,000 for married couples filing jointly, will not be allowed to claim any IRA deduction. IRA contributions will still continue to accrue tax-free interest until the funds are withdrawn, usually during retirement. So whether you qualify to claim a deduction for an IRA contribution or not, it may still be a good retirement savings option for you. To maximize the power of an IRA to accrue interest tax-free, deposit your funds at the first of each year.

## Diabetes screening set at local pharmacy


As a public service to local residents, The Medicine Place, 2135 Hickory, will be sponsoring a free health care screening for diabetes on Wednesday, Jan. 21 from 1:30-5:30 p.m. Statistics released by national and medical departments estimate over 5 million Americans today have undiagnosed diabetes. In Texas, the incidence of diabetes is possibly five times greater in the Mexican-American population. The large number of complications because of diabetes in this group call for increased public awareness and individual treatment. Symptoms of diabetes almost always include abnormal hun-

ger, abnormal thirst and frequent urination. Symptoms sometimes will include weakness, weight loss and slow-healing infections. Diabetes cannot be cured, but once diagnosed it can be controlled. However, left untreated, diabetes can cause blindness, heart disease, stroke, gangrene and kidney failure.

## Accounting course to be offered

Registration is now underway at the Wallace Community Center for a fundamentals of accounting course to be taught by Margaret Trulock. This course is taught through Western Texas College and students completing the course will receive a continuing education certificate. The eight week course will cover accounting cycles, journals, posting and payrolls. The registration fee is \$30 plus a book fee of \$18.50. This includes textbook and workbooks. The class will meet each Monday evening, 7-9 p.m., beginning February 16, and completing April 6. For further information call 728-2392. Registration should be made by February 3.

A new corporate identity, "TU Electric," as well as a new logo, is being adopted company-wide by Texas Utilities Electric Company.

Texas Utilities Electric Company was formed in 1984 by the merger of Dallas Power & Light, Texas Electric Service, Texas

Power & Light and Texas Utilities Generating Companies.

The four companies became divisions of the new electric company, retaining their historic names.

A number of functions performed by the four divisions

have been consolidated, and organizational changes are continuing in order to eliminate duplication and improve efficiency. Use of a single name for all of Texas Utilities Electric Company will help bring about further cost savings and efficiencies in serving customers.

The transition to company-wide use of the new identity and logo and the phasing out of the division names will be gradual. In many instances, the new name and logo will be applied only when existing material and equipment is replaced. 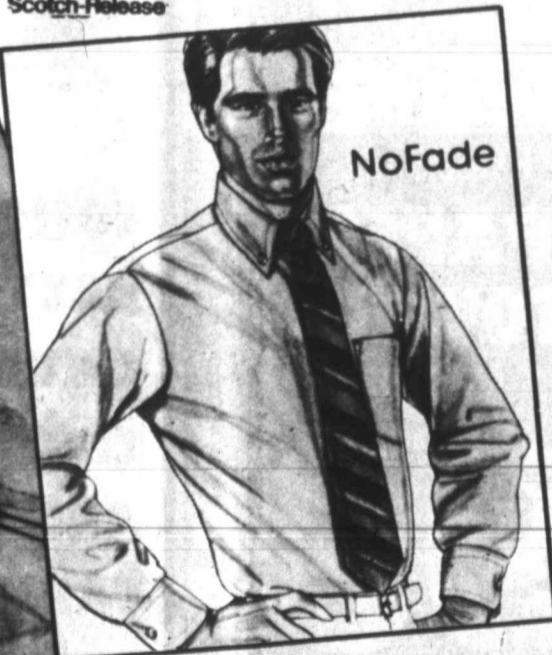

# Local News

## Age 26 is turning point for men

The Selective Service System has announced that men who will reach their 26th birthday in 1987 are reaching an important milestone.

Beginning on Jan. 1, 1987, men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1981 will be turning 26. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept registrations after age 26. By failing to register before turning 26, a young man will have permanently forfeited his right to certain benefits including federal student aid, job training and federal employment. In addition to these federal benefits, some states require registration for state student

aid, entrance to a state supported college or university, state employment and permission to practice law.

Many of the 25-year-olds who have still not registered may be unaware of the requirement or do not understand the importance of the obligation to register. Some may even have served in the military but failed to register either before entering the armed forces or after leaving active duty. Others may have been institutionalized or incarcerated at the time of their 18th birthday and not realized that they were required to register if released prior to age 26.

For those men born in 1961 who have registered, 1987 also

marks the year that ends their eligibility for selection for induction under present law should there be a return to the draft. Over 17 million men, age 18 through 25 have registered with Selective Service since registration was reinstated in 1980. These men comprise over 97 percent of those required to register.

Men age 18 to 25 who have not yet registered still have a chance to avoid risk of prosecution and loss of benefits by registering promptly at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to 5 years in jail, or both.

## County Oil News

At a location six miles southwest of Westbrook, Tom Rasmussen has finalized a new oil producer in Mitchell County's East Iatan-Howard Field.

The well is designated as the No. 9 Schattel, pumping 72 barrels of oil per day.

Location is in a 160-acre lease in the T&P Survey. Bottomed at 3,390 feet, the well will produce

from perforations in the Clear Fork Formation, 3,157 to 3,273 feet into the wellbore.

Mobil Producing of Midland has revealed plans to drill four 3,600-ft. developmental wells in the East Iatan-Howard Field. The operator has 3,840 acres leased, with drillsites in Mitchell

County's T&P Survey. The wells have been designated as the Nos. 203, 204, 205 and 206 Mary Foster. Drillsites are nine miles southwest of Westbrook.

W. Dale Morris of Abilene is planning to conduct a re-entry operation at the No. 1 Halbert, a wildcat well in Mitchell County. The well is located seven miles northwest of Westbrook in a 320-acre lease in the T&P Survey.

Echo Production originally completed the well as a dry hole June 10, 1984, at 8,294 feet. Morris plans to seek production at approximately 8,250 feet.

D. L. Ray Inc. has suspended operations at ten developmental wells in Mitchell County's East Iatan-Howard Field. The wells are designated as the No. 4 McKenney "C", the No. 7 T. L. McKenney, the Nos. 7, 8, 9 and 11 T. L. McKenney "A", the No. 7 T. L. McKenney "B", the Nos. 27 and 29 T. L. McKenney "D" and the No. 4 T. L. McKenney "E". Drillsites are six to eight miles southwest of Westbrook in the T&P Survey. The ten wells had been spudded in the early part of 1986. They have been bottomed at depths ranging from 3,400 to 3,450 feet.

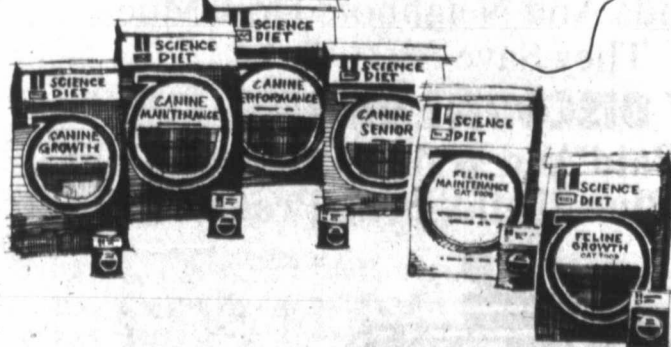

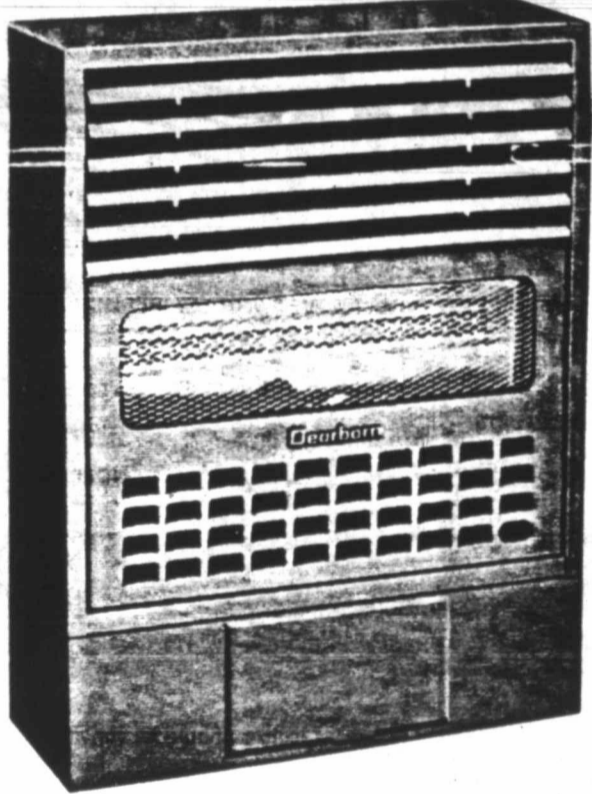

Fuentes, who also displayed a shooting touch from afar, got scoring help from Ramiro Fuen-

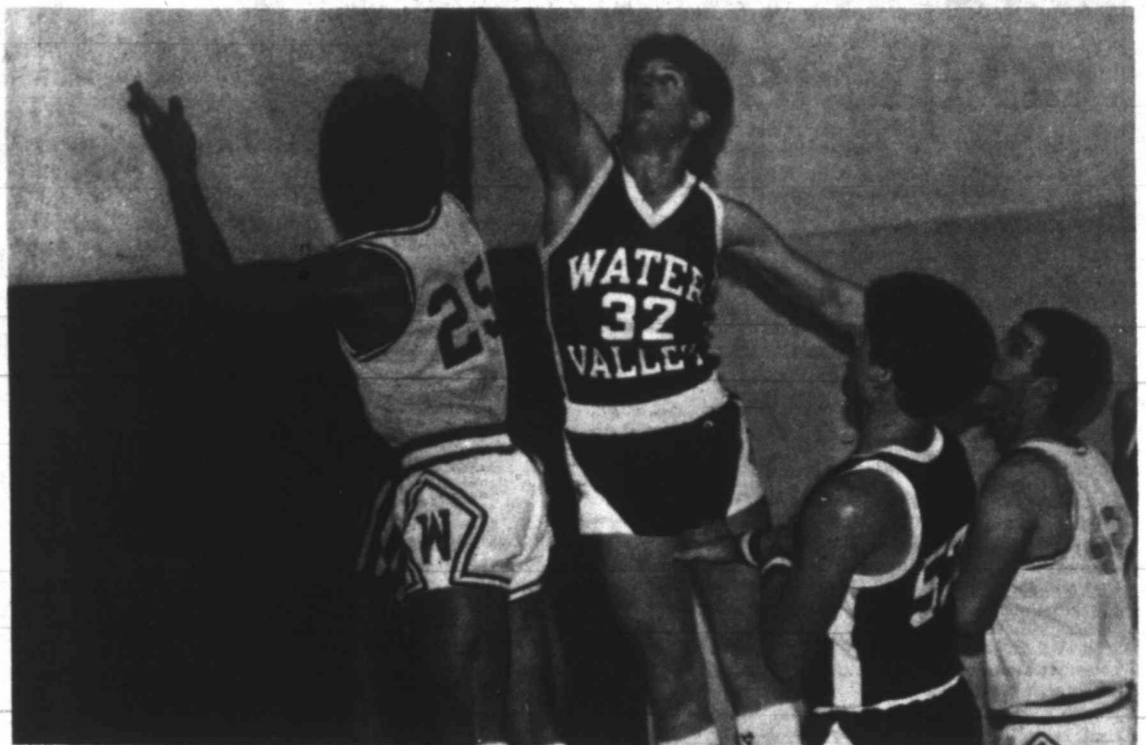
tes with 10 points, Clayton Cannon, 5, Scooter Hines 4 and David Blauvelt 3.

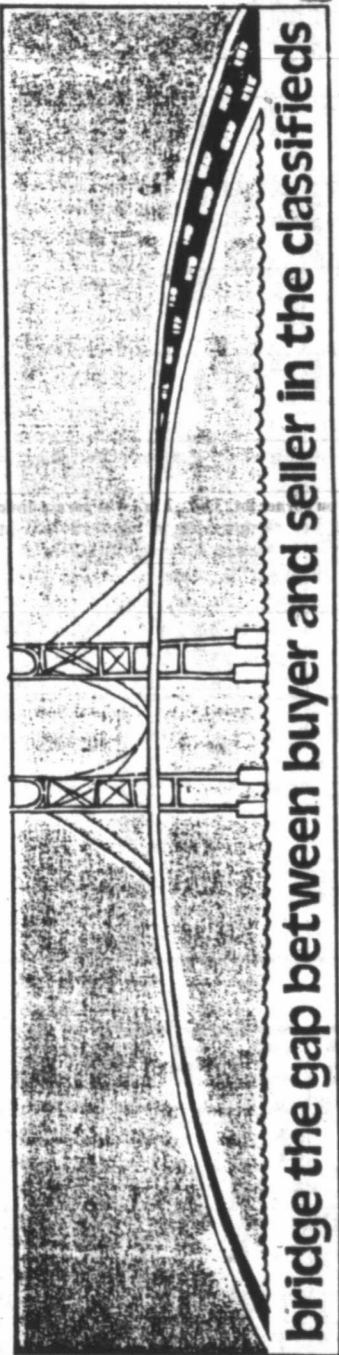

**Equipment ban urged by Gramm**

WASHINGTON—U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has urged the Administration to drop a ban on the sale of drilling equipment to the Soviet Union, saying the ban

harms only the U.S. oil industry. Oilfield equipment is readily available to the Soviets from competitors, particularly manufacturers in Japan and Italy,

Gramm noted. As a result, the ban on export of American-made oilfield equipment is "damaging to U.S. interests," Gramm told Baldrige in a letter. "It has no impact on our national security nor any influence on Soviet behavior."

"I firmly support a strong national security and foreign policy attitude in our relations with the Soviet Union," the senator said. "I fail to see, however, how these goals are promoted by blocking U.S. exports to the Soviet Union of oil and gas equipment that the

Soviets can obtain from other sources."

The Administration may remove the export controls and, at the same time, avoid foreign policy complications by noting that outside competitors already supply the Soviets with equipment, he said.

"I strongly recommend that these controls on oil and gas equipment and technology be discontinued," Gramm told the Commerce secretary.

Prior to 1980, U.S. suppliers — many of them located in Texas — sold most of the drilling equipment purchased by the Soviets.
