Over 300 Have Filled Out Old Age Pension Blanks Here

Persons applying for the pension benefit must execute the adopted form of application, attested by a notary public or other authority. No charge is made for this work, and blanks may be secured from the county judge's office.

Former Resident Dies In Merkel

Deputy State Supt. Visits County Schools

Mr. G. D. Holbrook, Deputy State Superintendent of District No. 2, was in Dawson county from Monday thru Friday of last week visiting the rural schools of the county for the purpose of granting aid to those districts that needed aid to carry on an eight months' term of school.

"Rural aid is granted on a basis of need shown by the district," Mr. Holbrook said. "Districts receiving the greatest amount of aid are districts that are having the greatest difficulty maintaining an eight months' term as required by the Rural Aid Law."

Mr. Holbrook reported that he found the schools in good condition the county over. He was pleased to find that a great many improvements had been made at a relatively small cost to the districts, much of the labor used in making these improvements having been offered as payment or part payment of delinquent taxes.

Mr. Holbrook especially commended the trustees and teachers on their efforts to comply with rural aid regulations.

The interest that is being shown in the Centennial music program throughout the county impressed him. Mr. Holbrook stated. He hopes to see a good representation of the school children of Dawson county at the district and state meets later in the year.

Mr. Holbrook's itinerary included twenty-two of the twenty-eight schools in the county.

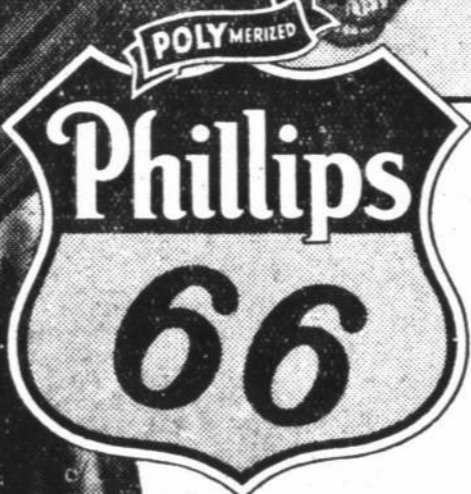

BETTER BUYING CLASS

At a first meeting of "Better Buying" class, held Tuesday afternoon, from 1-2:30 o'clock, under the direction of Eranor Ragie, several Lamesa housewives at the high school building were given helpful hints on the desirable qualities and characteristics to be looked for in the purchase of a blanket, sheet, pillow case and quilt.

The desirable qualities for blankets were portrayed by a playlet given by three home economics girls. The fundamental qualities of a blanket are warmth and durability, the discussion revealed and both of these items are greatly controlled by the closeness of the weave and the fiber used.

A blanket containing 98 percent wool according to trade regulations may be labeled all wool; a blanket with less than 5 per cent is to be labeled cotton; and percentages between 5 and 98 per cent are considered part wool.

It was pointed out during the discussion that the principle features to be considered in determining the quality of a sheet are: the thread count which should be about 72 thread to the inch each way; the tensile strength which should be about 70 pounds and the weight per square yard about 4.5 ounces for a medium weight sheet.

The lesson for Thursday of this week is on table linens and towels. Other topics will be, how to recognize different fibers and types of qualities of materials. It is not too late to enroll.

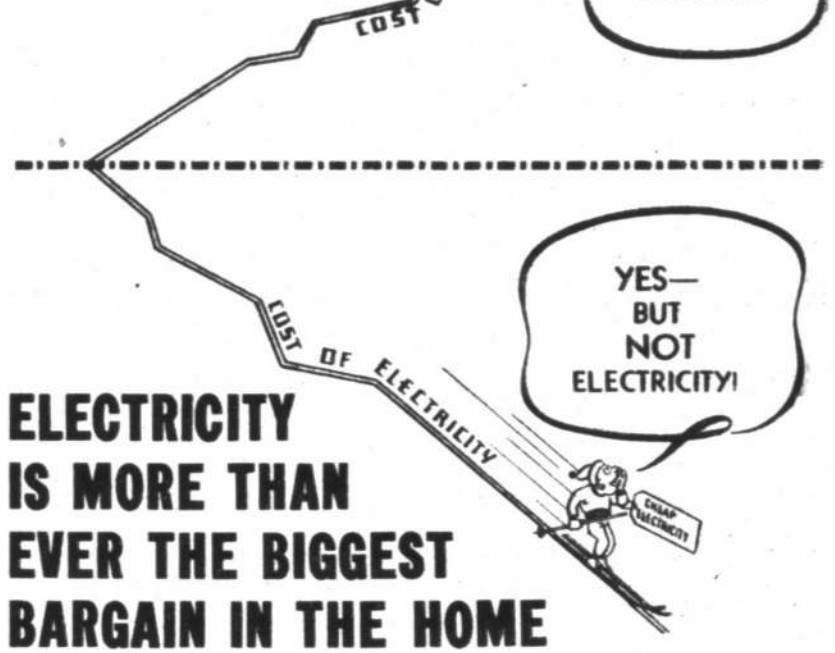
