COMPLETE HIGHWAY NO. 83 SOON

HIGHWAY COMMISSION PROMISES TO COMPLETE NO. 83 FOR IMMEDIATE TRAVEL USE

W. B. LaMaster, chairman of the highway committee of the Perryton Chamber of Commerce; J. H. Neufeld, president of the Perryton Chamber of Commerce; and W. G. Yesary, Ochiltree county commissioner from Precinct No. 2; appeared before the Texas State Highway Commission at Austin last Friday, and received assurance that all grading and filling would be completed at once on Highway No. 83 so that it could be opened for travel, thus saving many miles.

They were also told that the regular markers would be placed on the new route and that the old route, south down through Old Ochiltree and on south and east to the extreme part of the county, would be marked as a detour route. This will enable the County Commissioners to proceed with the placing of caliche on the highway from the Ochiltree cemetery to the point five miles south of town where the new highway turns to the southeast. While the old road was marked and designated as a regular state and federal highway, no WPA funds could be expended on it.

No definite time has been set for the hardsurfacing of the new highway, but it is thought that it will be included in the 1936-37 program.

LOCAL OPTION ELECTION SOON

WILL VOTE ON JANUARY 3RD ON LEGALIZING LIQUOR SALES IN OCHILTREE COUNTY

Voters of Ochiltree county will go to the polls on Friday, January 3rd, 1936 to vote on the legalization of the sale of hard liquors under the recent new liquor control laws passed by the state legislature.

If this election carries, then liquor in original packages can be sold by authorized dealers, said liquor not to be consumed on premises where purchased. No liquors can be sold by the drink. Licenses can be obtained for the sale of wines and vinous drinks by the drink when same does not contain over 14 per cent alcoholic content.

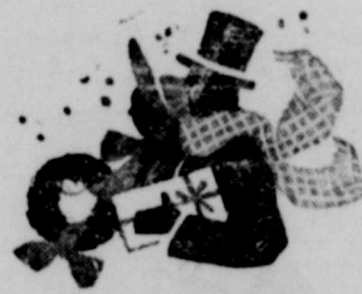

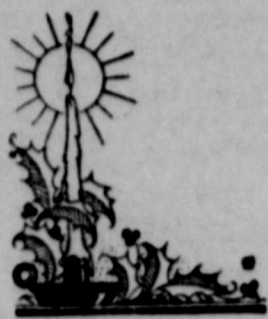

The speed mania and reckless driving, and all that they imply, in the lack of self control, disregard for laws and for the rights and lives of others, are responsible for a large part of the tragic deaths and unnecessary suffering. In the face of the hazards involved, absent mindedness on the part of the driver or pedestrian, also becomes

a vice with notorious record destructive consequences. Transportation has become an inherent part of our daily lives and for others the least we can do is to admit our obligation as drivers and to accept our responsibility as drivers and as pedestrians.

One would not wish all people to be in a state of constant dread to the extent that every accident; but we can be sensible, intelligent and since we are creatures of habit we can teach ourselves and our young people to recognize certain situations which represent hazards and to act in a way as to prevent them.

RELIEF SET-UP CHANGES JAN. 1

MARILLOAN HEADS ENLARGED DISTRICT; PRESENT SET-UP DISCONTINUED ON JANUARY 1, 1935

Swiftly changing relief administration plans will come to a climax January 1, when a new set-up will take form in an enlarged district headed by Mrs. Cornelia Patton of Marillo as administrator. Mrs. W. D. Davis of Pampa, will be assistant administrator, with as yet unannounced residence.

The present district relief administration headed by S. H. Halle will be discontinued January 15 and the personnel released or transferred. These changes are part of a state-wide economy move in which 100 workers will be relieved of their jobs in the relief staffs. It is estimated by the fact that names are being taken from relief rolls as rapidly as the men and women are given WPA jobs.

As of December 12, there were 199 employables not assigned to WPA jobs in this relief district and 234 unemployables. There were 102 men and 62 women unable to work, distributed as follows: Collinsworth 26 men, 20 women; Donley 11 men, 2 women; Gray 26 men, 11 women; Hansford 10 men, 2 women; Hemphill 17 men, 7 women; Hutchinson 22 men, 10 women; Lipscomb 16 men, 5 women; Ochiltree 8 men, 4 women; Roberts 2 men, 3 women; Wheeler 24 men, 1 woman.

The unassigned employables, all of whom will have jobs by the end of December, were distributed as follows: Collinsworth 300, Donley 19, Gray 146, Hansford 58, Hemphill 12, Hutchinson 88, Lipscomb 97, Ochiltree 89, Roberts 14, Wheeler 12.—Pampa Daily News.

OCHILTREE NEWSPAPER STARTED 35 YEARS AGO

From the "Twenty Years ago" file of the Canadian Record, we note that the Ochiltree News had made its debut in the Panhandle newspaper field as successor to the Ochiltree Eagle-Investigator. The Record states that the Eagle-Investigator had completed its 10th year of service to Ochiltree county before its demise. According to these figures, the Ochiltree Eagle was established thirty years ago in 1905. These figures are about right. When the Herald editor first came to Ochiltree county in 1908, the Eagle was a hand set tabloid size paper printed on a job press. During the latter part of 1908, Harry Pursell moved the Investigator into Ochiltree from Hansford and consolidated it with the Eagle. Pursell operated the Eagle-Investigator for many years, disposing of same shortly before Perryton was founded in 1919. All files of Ochiltree county newspapers, previous to 1921, were destroyed when the Herald plant was destroyed by fire in 1920. Double files of the Herald have been maintained by the present Herald editor since he became connected with the paper in April of 1921. One copy of the file is stored in the county clerk's vault at the courthouse, the other remains in our office.

CAR PRESENTED DURING JAN.

OWNER OF OLDEST CHEVROLET WILL RECEIVE NEW MODEL AS REWARD FOR CARE, MAINTENANCE

Chevrolet's one millionth car of 1935 production is to be presented to the owner of the oldest Chevrolet licensed and in regular use in the United States, and the cooperation of America's leading newspapers and every one of the 10,000 Chevrolet dealers has been enlisted to discover this car and its owner.

To enter a Chevrolet for consideration, the owner need only drive it to any Chevrolet dealer's salesroom and submit it for examination, receiving a blank on which he will report the engine and chassis numbers of the car to the Chevrolet Motor Company at Detroit, where the company's records will determine which is the very oldest in service.

W. E. Holler, vice president and general sales manager, in notifying dealers of the search for the oldest car, said that the presentation is intended as a New Year's gift as a reward for the driver whose good care and maintenance has enabled the very oldest Chevrolet to survive after many years of operation.

"Chevrolet is happy to present this 1936 model," said Mr. Holler, "because it feels that some recognition is due the owners of Chevrolets. Our achievement of a production totalling well over a million cars during the current year is to be credited largely to motorists who began purchasing Chevrolets years ago and have placed many repeat orders since then."

"I wish I could have the thrill that is in store for the owner whose early Chevrolet—a car maybe 15 or 18 years old—will be supplanted by a 1936 model."

Although the presentation will be made as a New Year's gift, the time for submitting cars for consideration has been extended, to include January 15, because of the short period between December 12, the birthday of the millionth car of the year, and the first of the year. "PENSIONS CHIEF"

Orville S. "Dick" Carpenter, Dallas businessman and State Auditor, was named executive director of old-age assistance commission by the new three-member board November 26. As State Auditor, Carpenter made a survey in September and reported to the Legislature on the "Old and General Plan for Old Age Pensions." The pension law reflects his report in many ways.

Carpenter came to Austin when Alford appointed him August 1 to reorganize the Office of the State Auditor. Surveys on pensions, liquor, and fees were presented to the Legislature. Other reports have been on taxation, bank deposit insurance, and a number of minor subjects.

At present the State Auditor is conducting audits of the Banking Department and State Treasury.

Mr. Carpenter will resign as State Auditor and take the pension directorship when the new law goes into effect next February.

PENSION CHIEF IS APPOINTED

PROVISIONS OF TEXAS OLD AGE PENSION LAW GIVEN BY EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF COMMISSION

Austin—"Many provisions of the Texas Old Age Assistance Law were taken directly from laws previously existing in other states or from the Social Security Act, which President Roosevelt sponsored," State Auditor Orville S. Carpenter, appointed pension chief, said this week.

"Major provisions are the following:

1. A qualified applicant must be 65 years of age and a citizen of the United States.
2. He must have lived in Texas five out of the last nine years, and have lived in the state continuously one year preceding application.
3. He must not at time of receiving aid be an inmate of a public or private institution.
4. He must not have made a voluntary transfer or assignment of property to qualify for aid.
5. He must not be a habitual criminal or habitual drunkard.
6. He or she is not eligible if he or she has a husband or wife able to furnish him or her adequate support.

"The property restrictions," Mr. Carpenter continued, "as well as that of cash or security ownership, must be clearly understood."

"A qualified old-age pension applicant—

"Does not own property, real, personal, or mixed, the fair value of which, taking into consideration assessed valuations for State and county tax purposes less all incumbrances and liens, exceeds, if the applicant is single, \$5,000, or if married, \$7,500.

"Does not have or own cash or marketable securities, the fair value of which exceeds \$500 if the applicant is single, or if married \$1,000." Mr. Carter stated.

"An important restriction concerns incomes of qualified applicants. Incomes of applicants must not exceed, from any and all sources, \$360 yearly, if single, and the combined incomes of both spouses, from any and all sources, must not exceed \$730 yearly, if applicant is married," Mr. Carpenter explained.

"A sworn statement of all income during the preceding two years must accompany application."

"All applications will be handled through local agents after the law goes into effect February 14," he added.

"Many inquiries regarding our policy towards negroes and mexicans have been received. Inquirers have asked whether or not members of these races would receive the same amount of pension as members of other races. We want it clearly understood that there will be no discrimination against anyone because of race or color," Mr. Carpenter declared.

"No attorneys, unofficial agents, or firms will be needed to help old people obtain pensions. Applications will be handled through local agents. These have not been named.

"Old people will be able to get their pensions July 1, 1936, if funds are available. Application forms will be prepared February 14, 1936, and will be given the local agents. All applications will be handled through local men; however, the law provides that an applicant can appeal to the Commission if he or she is turned down. Pensions will be given those who are entitled to them if and when funds have been provided."

Mr. Carpenter will visit Washington and have the Texas pension law approved by the Social Security Board. From Washington he will travel to New York and study the state pension system there, which is the largest and one of the oldest systems in the United States.
