to be disposed of before Easter. Materials for skirts come in patterns designed for street and for sports wear, and new patterns for skirts, in a great variety of designs, make it possible to dispose of this item of the wardrobe requirements. The same is true of blouses.

A one-piece frock of serge (good for all-round sports wear) like that shown in the picture, gives the home dress-maker no guesswork. It is the most livable of dresses and is developed in unbleached linen for everyday wear and in heavy cotton as well as woolsens. It is made with a loose blouse, having a sailor collar, and a plaited skirt with panel at the front. The sleeves are plain, with two rows of white braid at the wrist, in keeping with three rows on the collar. The

wear, gives the hat its character and signifies its purpose, so that the hat may be all black, all white, or black and white combined. The white facing is very becoming and is a feature of many crape hats. The hat pictured is entirely plain except for the ornament at the front. ## Macao

IN THESE years of war when Europe is closed to the tourist, thousands of American travelers are turning to the Orient, and most of those who reach the coast of Asia get a glimpse at least of the oldest foreign colony in China. This is the Portuguese colony of Macao, at the western entrance of the Canton river and only 40 miles from Hongkong, the great British base.

Macao is perched on a peninsula which is itself a part of the island of Hainan, separated from the mainland by a narrow arm of water. It was occupied by the Portuguese in 1557 and has been held ever since by that once great maritime nation. For nearly three hundred years the Portuguese paid ground rent to China for the colony, and in 1887 the sovereignty of Portugal was recognized by China. But the extent of the territory has never been settled, for China has always disputed the right of the Portuguese to the islands of Taipa and Coloan and to the coastal waters. Commissioners were named in 1900 for the delimitation of the boundaries, but they could not reach an agreement.

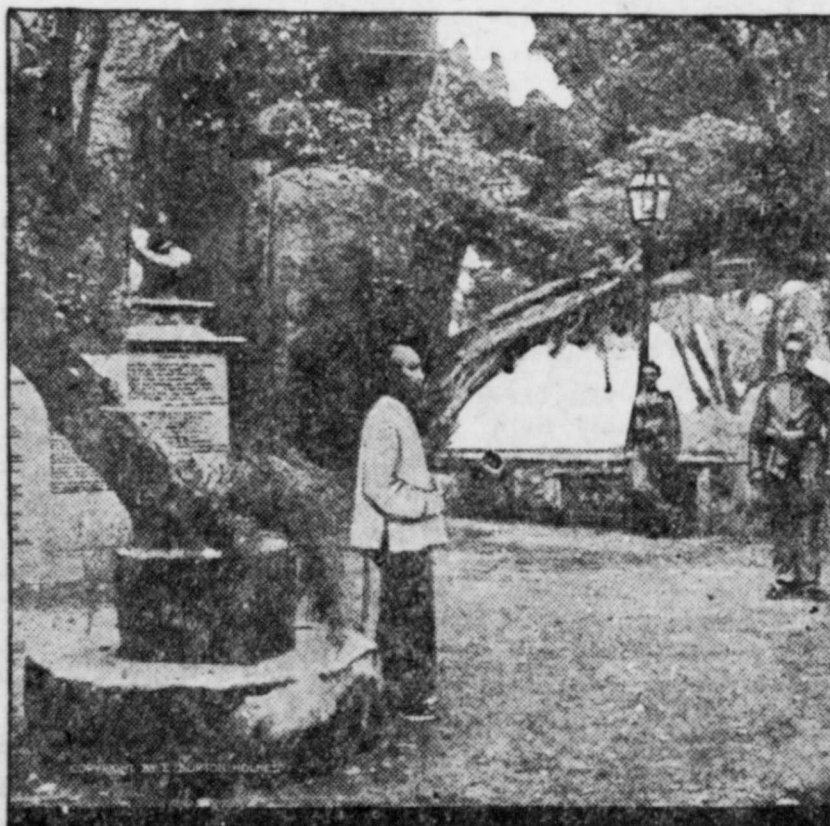
The city of Macao is interesting in various ways and, despite its age, much of it is well built and not unhandsome. Along its curving waterfront, known as the Praya Grande, is a long row of fine residences and other buildings. Among the most imposing of these is the three-story house of Ah Fong, the Chinese millionaire, who lived in Honolulu for so many years and, after marrying his beautiful

possed the latter part of his great epic, and in the same recess now stands a bust of the poet who did so much for the literature and language of his country.

### Its Gambling Houses.

If you say Macao to the ordinary globe trotter or the sailor whose voyages take him to the Orient, the name means chiefly a place where he can gamble, for the city is one of the few places where the goddess of chance may still be wooed with the sanction of the law. Gambling licenses and opium supply the greater part of the colony's revenues, and such a sign as "First-Class Gambling House" is frequent on the main street. Naturally, one result of this is that Macao swarms with lawless characters from all parts of the world and deeds of violence are rather frequent.

The gambling dens are conducted by Chinamen, and fan-tan is the game usually played. It is apparently the simplest of all games, and one at which it should be impossible to cheat. A sheet is spread on a table or on the floor, and the banker sits with a bowl full of copper coins in front of him. These he counts out by fours, and the gamblers stake their money on there being three, two, one or none remaining at the end in the bowl. Chinamen with a practiced eye can tell while there are still a great heap of the coins in the bowl how this final counting will result, and the banker has probably a keener eye than any of the Chinese gamblers, and has seen and, after marrying his beautiful

daughters to naval officers, departed with all his wealth to his mother country. Several miles inland is Ah Fong's birthplace, the village of Wong-mo-si, and there he has created a magnificent estate which is his favorite place of abode in his old age.

### San Paulo and Camoens' Grotto.

In the most ancient part of the city are the ruins of San Paulo church. This was the collegiate church of the Jesuits and dates from the sixteenth century. In 1835 it was destroyed by fire, but its great front wall still stands. There is also an old castle that is worth seeing, and several Portuguese forts that are garrisoned in ordinary times by 500 soldiers, and visitors of a commercial bent will wish to inspect the cotton, canning and oil factories and the brick and cement works that, aside from fishing, comprise the chief industries of the place.

To the literary tourist the place of most interest in Macao is the grotto of Camoens. The author of the Lusiad, the epic poem of Portugal, when he was banished from Lisbon in 1547 because of a love affair, first fought against the Moorish pirates on the Barbary coast and then, after being pardoned and again banished, betook himself to Macao and took up his residence in a house with a beautiful garden. There, in a rocky grotto, he com-

Some of the copper coins are really three coins joined together, and a blow from the stick with which the banker counts out the coins will turn one coin into two or three if required. To counteract the possibility of the banker not being too honest, Europeans who gamble in large sums put their notes into envelopes before they throw them down on the divisions of the sheet. A man can back all four numbers if he will, one envelope containing notes for hundreds of dollars, while the others may each contain a note for a small sum. The banker, however very often guesses in which envelope is the big sum of money, and the division on which it is laid is not very likely to be the one to win.

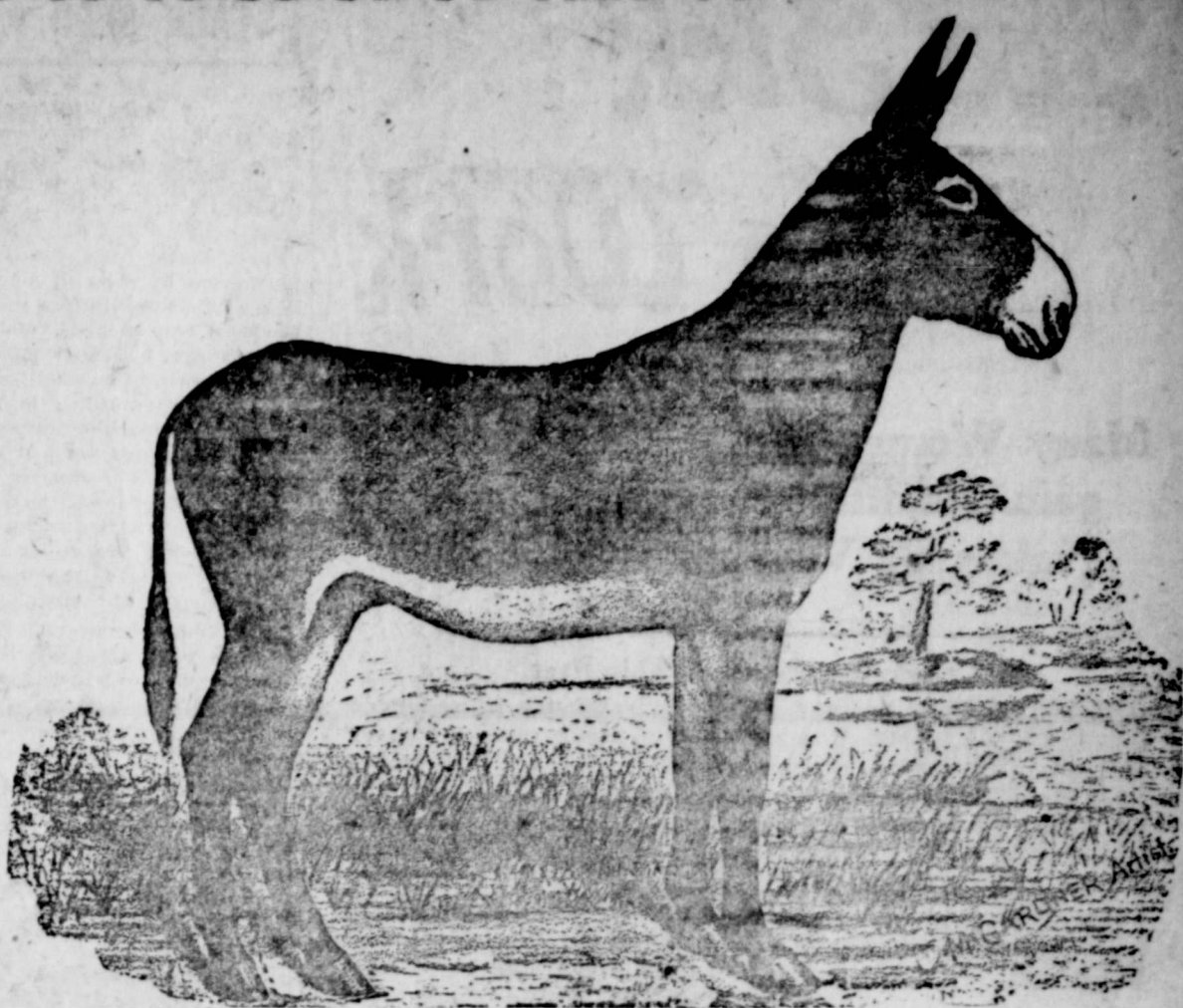

## STACK SEED ALFALFA BEFORE THRESHING

(By L. R. WALDRON, North Dakota Experiment Station.)

The alfalfa can be threshed either from the cock, or shock if it is cut with a binder, or it can be stacked and threshed from the stack. If the seed crop remains unstacked there is, of course, danger from storms. It is not an uncommon thing in September for heavy winds to interfere with securing the seed crop in good condition. Instances are not uncommon of high winds blowing the small cocks of alfalfa for comparatively long distances and wasting much of the seed. If the alfalfa is stacked, then of course this difficulty does not appear. If the alfalfa is stacked it will have to remain stacked two or three weeks in order to have it thoroughly seasoned, as it is necessary that the material be quite dry at time of threshing.

As presumably most of the seed alfalfa in North Dakota will be of the Grimm variety, which commands a comparatively high price, it would seem to be the part of wisdom to stack the seed alfalfa before threshing; for

if one does not do this too much risk is being assumed and the chances of money lost are too great.

An alfalfa huller is, of course, the best machine to obtain the seed from the alfalfa, but this machine is scarce in this state. The writer has secured very good results in threshing out seed alfalfa by means of an ordinary threshing machine. Instances are common where no change at all has been made in the machine and it was certain that comparatively little seed was lost. The writer has taken the precaution to put in corrugated teeth into the concaves, putting in nearly a full set. Much attempt was not made to deliver clean seed at the grain spout, as it was not desired to risk losing any of the seed either as tailing or in the straw. If the seed is well threshed the dirt can be quite easily eliminated by means of a good fanning mill. Generally speaking, it is not necessary to run the alfalfa straw through the machine a second time provided that the machine is properly adjusted and run properly.

## SWEET CLOVER GOOD ROUGH WINTER FEED

Cut at Right Time, Cattle Will Eat It Readily—Similar to Alfalfa in Value.

Many farmers believe sweet clover to be a rank impostor and a dangerous weed. Professor Keizer of the Colorado Agricultural college, answers the following questions in regard to sweet clover:

"With what success can sweet clover be grown and used as a rough winter feed for stock? Where alfalfa does well, it is not advisable to use it, because alfalfa will outyield it in three cuttings. Sweet clover will rarely ever make more than two cuttings in a season, and sometimes not over one. Consequently, if grown at all, it should be grown in regions too high for the successful production of alfalfa, or where for some other reason alfalfa cannot be successfully grown.

If cut at the right time, cattle will eat it readily, especially after they have become accustomed to its use. Its feeding value is very similar to alfalfa, although there is usually more waste.

## FURNISH PROTEIN TO POULTRY IN WINTER

Something Must Be Supplied to Take Place of Bugs, Insects, Grasshoppers, Etc.

(By P. G. HOLDEN, Former Dean of Iowa State College.)

Fifteen per cent of an egg is protein. Protein is the food that makes muscle. The lean part of ham and bacon is protein.

Hens get protein when they eat angle worms, bugs, insects, grasshoppers, etc.

To get eggs in the winter we must give the hens something to take the place of the worms and bugs.

When your father butchers a pig or a cow do you give the offals to the chickens?

Perhaps you can kill a rabbit or a squirrel for them. Skin it and hang it in the poultry-house just high enough that the hens will have to jump a little to reach it. Exercise is good for laying hens.

Or, perhaps you have some milk or buttermilk you can spare for the hens. Milk contains a great deal of protein.

Let it sour before feeding it, as sour milk keeps the hens healthy.

Ground bone or beef scraps are made from the waste and offals in the packing-houses. Some people buy these.

## ONE CLUTTERED FARM HURTS NEIGHBORHOOD

To the Farmer's Interest to Keep His Premises Neat and Orderly at All Times.

A general cleaning up of the farm premises is advisable when they have been neglected during the busy season, asserts W. E. Grimes, assistant professor of farm management in the Kansas State Agricultural college.

"It is to the farmer's interest to keep his premises clean and orderly at all times. The whole community suffers from an esthetic and business standpoint if one farmer neglects this important duty," said Mr. Grimes.

"A farm cluttered up with useless, worn-out implements or rubbish left from repairing fences and buildings, will spoil the appearance of an otherwise attractive home."

"If the farm and premises are put into good shape the fall, there is usually less for the farmer to do in the spring. The machinery should be put away in good repair, so that it will be ready for use when needed. Things that are not needed during the winter can be packed away in a convenient place."

Work of Architect and Builder Is Ended When Structure Is Completed.

There is always a question as to just where the dividing line comes between the architect and the home builder in planning a house. Surely the home builder desires a beautiful house which he can point to with pride; but the architect, although his feelings are not exactly those of the home builder, also desires that the house be beautiful. The home builder wants every possible item which will contribute to the convenience of the house included in the design; but the architect also strives toward this end, although he must temper his efforts with structural details and perhaps a limitation as to cost. In a word, the interests of the home builder must be the assumed interests of the architect. How far is it possible for the architect to carry out the design so that the house may be made into the home which the owner desires?

This fact is certain: Even the most beautiful house, decorated in the most skillful manner, is not truly a home until the occupants have established the evidence of their personalities both on the exterior and in the interior.

The exterior of this design is finished in typical bungalow style. The roof has a very flat pitch with eaves that extend out on all sides. The gable, extending toward the front of the house, has the right side slightly longer than the left, so as to cover the small front porch. The walls are covered with shingles. The steps to the front porch are rather wide and present a pleasant, inviting appearance.

The entrance to the house is into the living room, which is connected to the dining room by a wide opening. The dining room might serve also as a sun-parlor because of the many windows that are placed in the walls. Along the front there are four windows, with five along the side and one opening out on to the front porch. The dining room is of good size, and being connected to the living room makes an unusually large space across the front of the house. In the back part is a buffet which is built against the wall.

Directly back of the dining room is a pantry that is a most necessary adjunct of the kitchen. Under the window in the pantry is a table, and across from this a small cupboard. The sink in the kitchen is placed near the pantry so that dishes will not have to be carried far. Small details such as these are needed to make the kitchen a pleasant place to work in.

The house is set up high enough so that a good basement can be provided.

There are both outside and inside entrances to the basement. The outside entrance will make it unnecessary for everyone to tramp back and forth through the kitchen in getting to the basement.

## INOCULATION BENEFICIAL TO ALFALFA



HARVESTING ALFALFA ON MISSISSIPPI FARM.

(By P. G. HOLDEN, Former Dean of Iowa State College.)

Inoculation never hurts, is generally beneficial and often essential to the growing of alfalfa.

In regions where alfalfa has not been grown it is frequently found to be very beneficial to inoculate the ground by sowing three or four hundred pounds of soil secured from a field where alfalfa has been grown for a number of years; or where it is more convenient, artificial cultures such as nitrogen, farmogerm, etc., may be applied.

#### Well Prepared Seed Bed.

Alfalfa seed may be either drilled, or sowed broadcast and harrowed in. The seed can be more evenly distributed if one-half is sown in one direction and the other half sown at right angles. It is always a good plan to sow the seed a little thicker around the edges of the field, as this portion of the field is more subject to injury from insects, foxtail, etc.

While it is the custom in the humid regions to sow 20 pounds of seed to the acre, ten to twelve pounds is sufficient. If evenly distributed this will give from fifty to sixty seeds for every square foot, while one thrifty plant to the square foot is sufficient.

A well-prepared, firm, solid seedbed, plenty of good barnyard manure, and summer fallow to kill the weeds, are most important. Then comes lime. Inoculation and phosphorus are frequently beneficial. Ground too yet for corn is not suited to alfalfa.

#### Cut at Proper Time.

When possible to do so it is best to cut alfalfa in the late afternoon or evening. Dew or rain on the freshly-cut alfalfa will not injure it. In the morning the tedder should be started as soon as most of the dew is off and before there is any danger of knocking off the leaves. It is often advisable to go over it more than once. It should be cut before it is in full bloom or as soon as the young sprouts or shoots start to grow at the base of the plant. When alfalfa is left too long before

cutting, the stems become woody, and the yield of the next crop is greatly reduced, and in addition the leaves, which are the most valuable part of the plant, fall off.

#### Equal to Wheat Bran.

The alfalfa should be raked and either put in the barn, or if it is not sufficiently dry, put into haycocks. It is a matter of economy to have two or three hundred hay caps (made of six-cent muslin one yard square) to use in case of bad weather. You may think this is considerable bother, but there is no use in growing alfalfa and then allowing it to spoil.

When we remember that good alfalfa brings us in actual results nearly as great returns as wheat bran, we can better realize the importance of taking care of it. If any of us had 500 "haycocks of bran" in the field, we would take care of them, but with alfalfa we think of it as "just hay."

Alfalfa hay is rather hard to cure, but it is also true that it can be placed in the barn or in stacks much greener than any other kind of hay. Twenty pounds of salt sprinkled over each load of hay will help to prevent heating and add to the palatability of the hay.

Where alfalfa is used for pasture, care should be taken to avoid pasturing it too closely; it should not be pastured down closer than six inches and be sure to leave eight to twelve inches for winter protection. Don't turn stock on too early in the spring.

#### Alfalfa on Every Farm.

Remember that alfalfa can be grown on your farm. It is no more difficult to grow than clover and is more hardy when once established.

It adapts itself to all kinds and conditions of soil and climate. Alfalfa produces three and sometimes four crops per year in the corn belt.

Alfalfa is the cheapest source of protein. When wheat bran is worth \$22 per ton, good alfalfa hay is worth \$20 to \$22 per ton.

Alfalfa is the most enriching crop we have, and insures larger yields from the crops that follow.

## SUMMER FORAGE FOR SWINE

Sweet Sorghums Come at Time It Is Difficult to Have Other Green Feed.

(By W. R. DODSON, Director of Experiment Station, Louisiana State University.)

The sweet sorghums make a very acceptable forage for hogs in the early summer, coming at a time when it is sometimes difficult to have other green feed. Sorghums are most serviceable for grazing during May, June and early July.

The results of experiments at the Louisiana station have not indicated the high value of sorghums as a grazing or soiling crop for hogs they are reputed to have. In fact, we do not place a very high value on them, and commend their use only as a makeshift. The only strong points in their favor are that they give quick returns, and may be had about the time winter crops are not sufficiently matured for best service.

The Early Amber, Tarry Orange or Coleman are to be preferred. Any of these may be sown in drills as soon as danger of frost is passed, though growth will not be rapid until warm weather prevails. The middle of March to the first of April is ordinarily a good time to plant sorghum. However, the crop may be planted as late as the first of August. When sown in drills, with rows of three and a half feet apart, it takes about twelve pounds per acre to give a thick stand. It is best to plant the seed thick so the stalks will be small.

The crop should be well cultivated until it is about two feet high, if it is to be grazed, or as conditions may require, if it is to be soiled. Planted in early spring, the sorghums will mature in about 110 to 120 days.

## LIVE STOCK AIDS FERTILITY

European Countries Held Up as Examples of What Such Methods Would Do for Crops.

(By C. A. WILLSON, Kentucky Experiment Station.)

Beef cattle would conserve the fertility of our farms and increase our average crop production. Writers often point out to us the wonders that have been accomplished in increased crop production in the Old World countries through the utilization of crops and feeds by cattle and the return of manure to the farms, and have held up to us Denmark, Germany and other countries as marked examples of what such methods would do for our crop yields.

## HOGS ARE GOOD MONEY CROP

Many Factors Enter Into Cause for Increased Interest Being Taken in Swine Industry.

(By I. W. CARPENTER, Mississippi Experiment Station.)

Due to the recent boom in pork production, more people are going into the hog business than ever before. This is accounted for by several factors, the greatest doubtless being the splendid work of the county agents in securing a market for the small breeder through co-operative shipping. Since learning the prices to be expected on the central markets many men who started out by shipping five or ten hogs along with their neighbors' shipments are now preparing to ship in carload lots. Other factors in the growth of the hog industry are the pig club work, and the failure of the cotton crop causing the farmer to raise hogs as the next best cash crop.

To get the best results in hog raising a rotation of pasture and forage crops must be planted to furnish grazing the year round, and it is essential that a good supply of feed be assured before buying or breeding the hogs. The boar, too, should be the best available, this point often being the factor that determines success or failure in pork production. Pigs sired by a good boar will grow better in the feed lot and bring a premium on the market. And last, but not least, the most successful men carefully outline plans, getting the criticisms of experienced men and adhering to schedule after having secured the best available information on the subject.

## VELVET BEAN MEAL FOR COW

Florida Station Finds Feed Equal in Value to Cottonseed Meal—Cheaper to Raise.

The Florida station found that cows produced as much milk when fed a ration of 4.3 pounds of velvet beans in the pod, 10 pounds wheat bran and 24.5 pounds Japanese cane silage as when given a ration of 3 pounds cottonseed meal, 10 pounds bran, and 34 pounds cane silage. Hence 4.3 pounds of velvet beans in the pod were fully equal to 3 pounds of cottonseed meal. The station further states that the Florida farmer can produce about five tons of velvet beans for the cost of one ton of cottonseed meal.

The state market agent has received reports that velvet beans in the pod can be produced at \$14 per ton in Alabama and in Georgia.—Clemson College Bulletin.
