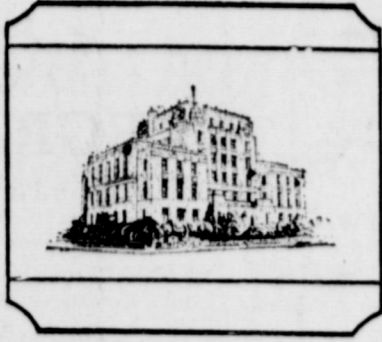

Library Week Is Proclaimed By Mayor For Observance In City

National Library Week, April 17-23, brings a special interest to Texas Libraries since it follows shortly after the Governor's Conference on Libraries which was held recently in Austin.

Governor John Connally is greatly concerned about conditions of libraries throughout the State and urges "all Texans to become better acquainted with the services and the needs of their libraries."

At a recent meeting of the Library Committee of the Thursday Afternoon Club, Frank F. Deaton, mayor of Eastland, signed the following Proclamation announcing National Library Week.

PROCLAMATION

Whereas, the Governor of Texas, the Hon. John Connally, urges all Texans to become better acquainted with the services and the needs of their libraries.

Whereas, Texas libraries today face their greatest challenge in history, because the demand for books, facilities and services is growing faster than it can be met, and

The Eastland Music Study Club will present Lewis Woodward, baritone, in the spring concert which will be held Sunday, May 1, at 4 p. m. in the Woman's Club House.

Mr. Woodward is presently a teaching assistant in voice at the University of Texas, where he is a candidate for the Doctor of Musical Arts degree. He was formerly on the faculty at Tarleton State College in Stephenville, where he taught for seven years.

A recent scholarship student to Austria, Woodward spent 14 months studying and concertizing in Europe. His teachers have included Erik Werba and Wolfgang Steinbruck at the Vienna Academy of Music and Max Lorenz at the Mozarteum in Salzburg. While in Europe he presented recitals in Vienna, Salzburg, Wiesbaden, Bad Godesberg and Bonn, receiving the acclaim of critics as a distinguished interpreter of Gorman Leder.

Young Childers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Childers of Abilene, drowned about 6 p.m. Wednesday in the swimming pool at the Westwood Apartments in Abilene. He was visiting his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Gilchrist, when the tragedy occurred.

Efforts to revive the youngster failed, and his death was ruled "accidental drowning" shortly after 7 p.m. First call for help was at 6:11 p.m.

Survivors include his parents and one brother; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Childers and Mr. and Mrs. Gilchrist, all of Abilene; one uncle; and two great-grandmothers, Mrs. Hamilton and Mrs. R. M. Gilchrist of Bakersfield Calif.

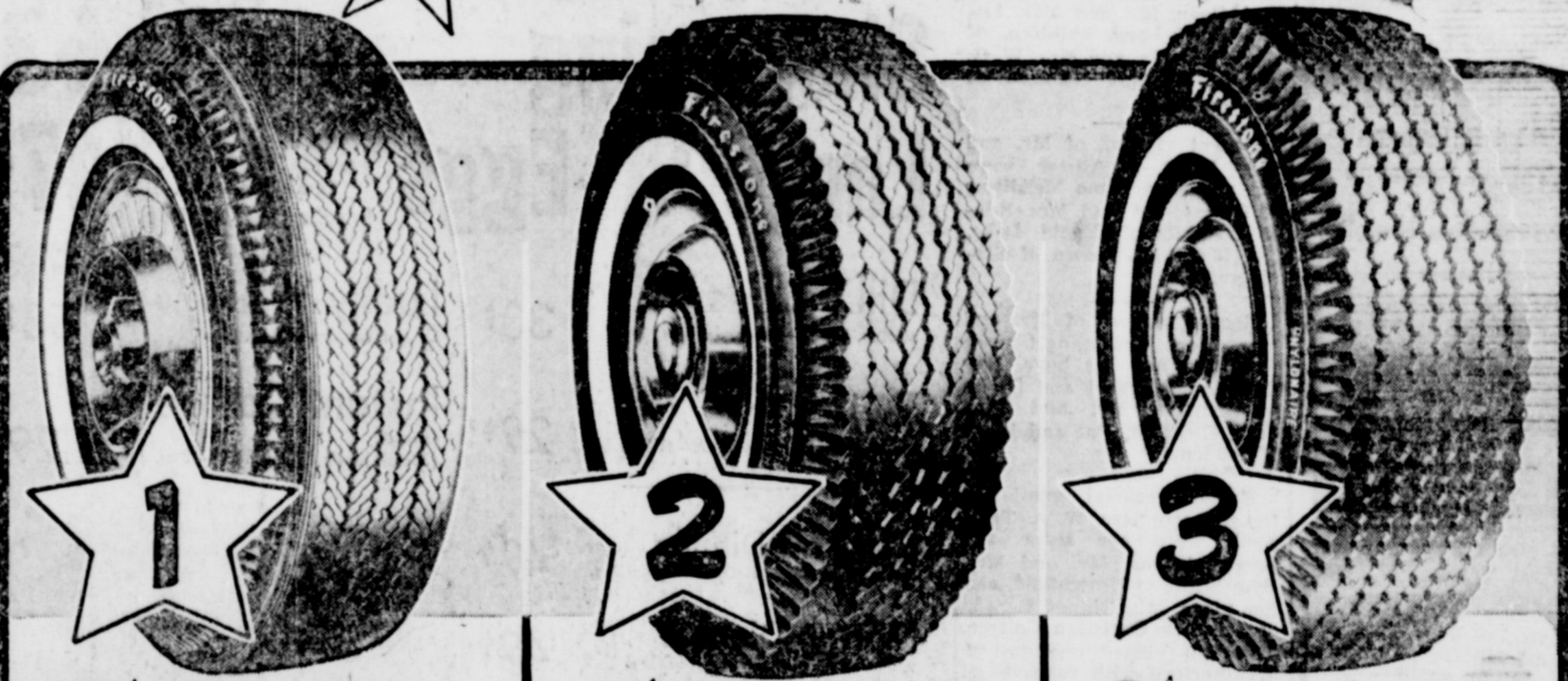
