SCHOOL BOARD APPROVES 15 TEACHERS, KINDERGARTEN

The School Board of the Burk Burnett Independent School District met Monday night for their first regular meeting for the 1973-74 school year. In the presentation of the school financial report, it was reported that we closed out last year with a good balance. It left the District in real good shape to start the '73-'74 year. Ticket sales in the reserve section for the football season shows almost all seats taken. Very few seats are left from row 3 on up. Rows 1 and 2 seats are always harder to sell.

Some \$6,967.17 in delinquent taxes have been collected. The total of both current and delinquent taxes collected to date shows a figure of \$262,911.01. Over 10% of tax collections have been made thus far. This includes both current and delinquent. The following resignations were accepted: Mrs. Paula J. Of interest to many is the policy of the Kindergarten program. Classes are available at all three elementary schools on half-day class basis. Two hours and forty-five minutes of instruction are the requirements for two semesters. Some 170 children are enrolled this year. The attendance is strictly voluntary for children five years of age and under six years of age as of Sept. 1. To be eligible a child must be considered educationally handicapped. Two factors considered are (1) A child who cannot speak, read and comprehend the English language to the extent that he is not familiar with the common English language words necessary for normal progress and (2) A child from a family with a total income of \$3,000 or less.

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, except in matters where the jurisdiction is conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, except in matters where the jurisdiction is conferred on it by law.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property taxpayers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)

Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which: Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population, and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which: Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or non-profit water supply cooperative."

in the City of Burkburnett, and urge all our citizens to pay special attention during that week to our Federal Constitution and the advantages of American Citizenship.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the City of Burkburnett to be affixed on this 10th day of September in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred Seventy Three and the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred ninety-seventh.

Our Everlasting Constitution

MONDAY, the 17th of September, is the 186th anniversary of the signing of the Constitution of the United States.

THE UNITED STATES of America was not an instant nation upon the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown seven long, hard, bitter years after the State's bold Declaration.

SUFFERING did not end with the war, nor did unity begin. It was six years later that the 52 delegates to the Continental Convention met and argued their many differences to form, not a perfect union, but "a more perfect union." The Constitution they signed was a give and take, a compromise, complicated, but flexible and workable. It has been called a "system of checks and balances." And that is what it is in its fairest, most beneficial, most productive practice.

THE CONSTITUTION was designed for the people. The power of the government which it described was from the people, and it was not satisfactory until the first Congress passed ten amendments, the Bill of Rights, setting forth the rights of the individual man.

THE DELEGATES admitted of defects, but made it a more

perfect instrument and more lasting with the inclusion of a provision for amendment. But they made change more deliberate by making the process difficult and lengthy. It gave time for heads to cool and minds to think.

IT IS THIS PROVISION which has held this Nation whole. It is its flexibility which keeps the Constitution as new and workable today as 186 years ago. It is the guardian of the Constitution, which alone makes it possible for this Nation to change with the times and progress within the framework of the Constitution, and to hold this instrument inviolate for other generations, without distortion of the meaning of its words and within the clear intent of those who wrote the Constitution.

"I KNOW," wrote Jefferson in 1816, "that laws and institutions must go hand in hand with the progress of the human mind. As that becomes more developed, more enlightened, as new discoveries are made, new truths disclosed . . . institutions must advance also and keep pace with the times. Only lay down true principles and adhere to them."

Arrowhead could become one of the better bass lakes in this area. It already has the reputation of a fine catfish lake.

AUSTIN--Hunters under 17 years old who wish to hunt on one of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's wildlife management areas must be supervised by adults 21 years of age or older on a one-to-one basis, according to department officials.

Department policy allows hunters as young as 12 years old to participate in public hunts, but there must be one adult for every child under 17 years during both hunts for which drawings are held and for open hunts such as those for quail, dove, squirrel and waterfowl on certain management areas.

Department officials say there were several misunderstandings of this policy last year when applications to hunt arrived at department headquarters in Austin for one adult and two or three juveniles.

According to department officials, failure of the sponsors to supervise the minor during the hunt will be considered cause for forfeiting hunting rights for both the sponsor and minor.

MARKET REPORT

Fryer chicken prices dipped "considerably lower than prices two or three weeks ago," according to Mrs. Gwendolyn Cyatt.

The consumer marketing information specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, termed fried chicken "almost impossible to surpass for economy and versatility."

"Egg supplies are adequate and count as a bargain when compared to other high-protein foods -- grade A, large -- size eggs offer the most economy and quality for your egg money."

Shortages in the meat case and high prices will dictate restraint in meat buying, the specialist predicted.

"However, beef items to consider this week include chuck roasts, ground beef, stew meat and liver. Also be on the look-out for reasonably priced sirloin rib and round steaks."

She cited dairy features as "irregular" with most emphasis on lowfat milk, cottage cheese and medium - sharp cheddar cheese.

Also, tuna is featured in some stores along with several ready-to-serve canned meats.

Turning to fruits and vegetables in seasonal supply, Mrs. Cyatt noted there are many -- "however, a strong demand from commercial processors keeps them a little higher than usual for this time of year."

"Worthy of consideration price - and quality-wise are prunes, plums, peaches, nectarines, seedless grapes, bananas, watermelons and cantaloupes.

"Fresh vegetable items in best supply at the most economical prices include carrots, cabbage, celery, dry yellow onions, head lettuce, potatoes, squash, corn, radishes, green peppers and green onions."
