A BOLD HOLDUP

Probably the first holdup recorded in the history of Hansford county (excepting those negotiated with the hole card) occurred on last Saturday evening at about 8:00 o'clock, one mile west of Spearman, on the D.C.D. Highway. Grady Smith, agent for the Raleigh remedies was returning from a tour of Hutchinson and Moore counties, and on reaching Horse creek, near the Kern farm, he noticed two men and a car beside the road. The men motioned for Grady to stop, which he did and was immediately covered with a large revolver and told to hand over his money. Grady handed over about \$35. to the hold-up men and was told to "beat it." He came to town and reported the holdup to the sheriff's force, but they have been unable to find trace of the robbers.—Spearman Reporter.

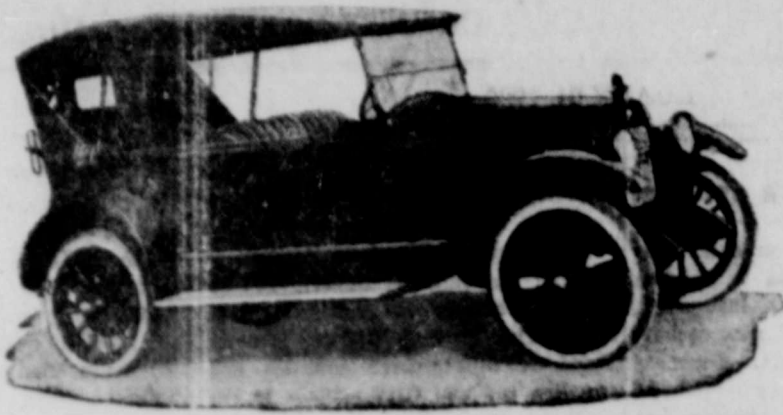

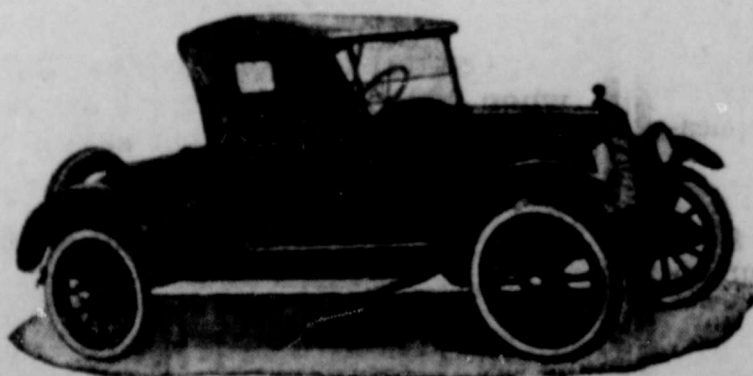

BREED DAIRY COWS NOW FOR FALL FRESHENING

Progressive dairymen are always interested in any plans or methods of herd management which will result in greater profits. They realize that they must not only have good cows in order to have good profitable producers, but that these cows must also be properly fed and well managed. Breeding the cows so they will freshen in the fall months is one of the surest ways of increasing the production and net profit from the average herd. This can be done without a penny's cost, too, as it costs no more to breed cows in January, or February, than at any other time of year. The principle advantages of fall freshening may be summed up as follows:

1. The greatest yield is obtained dairy products are highest and in greatest demand.
2. The cows are dry during the hot late summer season when flies are bad and dairy products cheap.
3. More time is available for caring for the cows and calves during the winter months than in the spring and summer.
4. Calves born in the fall thrive better than spring calves, as they are large enough to take care of themselves when turned into the pasture.
5. Heifers should freshen at 24 to 27 months of age, and those dropped in the fall are of the right age for freshening the second fall thereafter.
6. Cow-testing association records of 13,148 cows in various parts of the United States show that the cows which freshened in September, October and November produced 14 per cent more milk and butterfat and 7.7 per cent more net profit over feed cost than those that freshened in the spring.

The average gestation period for cows is 282 days. Cows bred in January and February will freshen in October and November, respectively.—Extension News Service, University of Tennessee.

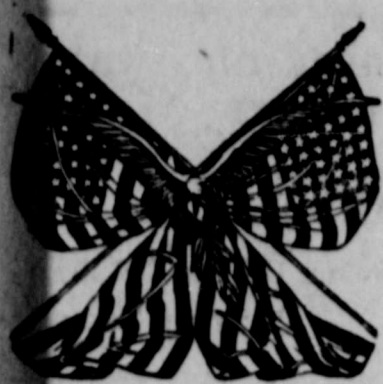

EVERY FARMER SHOULD KEEP 125 HENS

By M. Bruce Oates, Agricultural Agent, Fort Worth & Denver Railway.

That is about 25 for each member of the family. That number on the farm will provide poultry and fresh eggs for home use and some to sell. Fewer hens will supply home needs but, since a little shelter and attention are required for a small flock, why not keep more hens and take in some money on the side? A good hen is a paying hen; and the more good ones you have, the more money you will make. Many people do not realize that hens are profitable because money comes in in small amounts, once a week, yet it counts up to \$200 and \$300 in a year and provides the family with all bought groceries—and sometimes a part of the clothing.

A constant source of income. This is one of the advantages of keeping poultry; and another advantage is that a hen is not affected much by poor crop years. When crops fail on account of wet weather or dry weather either, the farm flock of hens continues to scratch and lay and advertise and pay.

Another advantage in keeping some chicken is the fact that a chicken is an economical meat producer. Listen to this. In West Texas it takes about 10 acres of grass to keep a steer and three years to grow him to a 1000 pound weight. That's equal to 30 acres for one year to grow 1,000 pounds of beef. All right, now 30 acres will grow and maintain 500 hens in one year and they will weigh 4 pounds each. That is 2,000 pounds of poultry. That's just twice what the steer weighs. Then the next year

they will lay 60 eggs a piece (Texas average per hen) or a total of 30,000 eggs. That is 2,500 dozen. The eggs produced in one year will weigh 3,750 pounds. (Eggs weigh 24 ounces per dozen). The eggs produced weigh nearly four times as much as the steer. Of course you can't believe it, but think about it; then go to the produce house and ask the dealer to show you 2,500 dozen eggs in one stack. The difference between the hen and the steer is that in one case you do some work and in the other practically none.

If you "haven't had much luck" with chickens, don't give up—remember—a hen doesn't quit scratching because the worms are scarce. Had you noticed that poultry and egg prices have stayed up almost to war period prices? The price of all other live stock has slumped terribly. So hat the price of all feed stuff, wheat and cotton. But eggs and all kinds of poultry have remained high. Have you been getting the advantage of good prices on the one remaining profitable source of income—poultry?

Northwest Texas is especially adapted to poultry raising, says Mr. Kaameier, Poultry Specialist, to the A. & M. College. He says this section has the advantages over other sections because of its drier climate and because of its abundance of suitable poultry feed. Heavy dewes are less common here than in other sections and poultry pests are not so common as in some other places.

Texas now ranks fifth as a poultry state, but that is partly because our state is so large, rather than because of large farm flocks or because of quality of chickens. Where we rank on quality is not known, but it is a lamentable fact that the average egg production of Texas hens is only 60 eggs per year—and they are not all good (thanks to the rooster running with the flock in the summer time).

Did you know that the poultry business in Texas is bigger than the dairy business by \$10,000,000? It is a fact that poultry and poultry products bring more in one year than all dairy products and wool and mohair combined. Poultry products bring \$43,440,899 while the other three products mentioned bring only \$43,422,250, or \$18,649 less.

Are you getting a good part of the money that is being paid out at your town for poultry and poultry products?

Good farm hens well cared for produce 150 to 200 eggs per year. And it's possible for exceptional hens carefully cared for to lay a little over 300 eggs per year. It has been done by individual hens of all regular standard breeds. It requires about 100 eggs to pay for keeping and feeding a hen a year when all feed is bought. How many eggs do you suppose your flock will average per year. And why is the production where it is?

Have you learned how to cull out the poor layers in the summer? The amount of money farmers were saved on feed this year by getting rid of non-layers which the County Agent or the Home Demonstration Agent culled out would in some counties pay the salary of the agent for a year. The culls did not lay, nor did egg production fall off after 30 to 40 per cent of the hens were sold. That proves that culling is practical. The question is, do you keep hens for profit or for company?

After the culls are sold, you have the laying strains of the breed left on your place. What next? House them properly and feed meat or milk and something green as often as possible. Then you should get winter eggs. Proper housing means keeping them dry both from above and below—keeping them warm on cold or windy days or when there is snow on the ground and keeping them busy. A dry floor, a tight roof, a south front that is open and three other walls without an open crack or knot-hole provides a comfortable place without draughts. Put straw a foot deep on the floor and feed the grain on the straw early in the morning. They will exercise digging for the grain.

Put the roosts on the level to keep the hens from crowding on the "top limb." If roosts are suspended from the roof with wire, insects will not come from the cracks of the house and get on the hens at night. One of our County Agents recommended old worn out buggy wheels suspended by wire as an ideal roost. The spokes

are just the right size for the hens to grasp. Who said a County Agent is a theoretical book farmer. Many people can convert an old lean-to-house or shed into a comfortable, first class chicken house with out \$5 actual cash outlay.

Now about feeding: feed dried beef scraps or rabbits, or get fresh meat scraps from the butcher. If meat cannot be obtained, feed milk of any kind at hand. Not a quart a day to a hundred hens, but three gallons a day. A quart would be wasted but three gallons is effective. They will clean it up. Meat or milk must be fed in winter to take the place of bugs and insects which make hens lay in the spring. A hen cannot make the white of an egg from corn or maize. It takes animal feed such as milk or some form of meat. The best hens

will not lay in winter unless they get these forms of feed. This is essential. Don't get mad and change to another breed—change the feed. No breed of chickens has ever been "invented" that will make eggs out of corn and water in the winter time. What about maize? Oh, the same is true of maize and kaffir.

When the hatching season starts, just be real mean to those baby chicks and let them starve for about two days. They are not hungry and the old hen knows it. Watch her gobble up every thing you try to feed them. She has chicken sense.

The body of the chick has absorbed the yolk of the egg for its nourishment. If you drop the chick to the ground yellow runs from it—the same yellow as the yolk of the egg. That's its food and a plenty for 48 hours.

Be careful not to feed them to death. Wait two days, then follow the poultry specialists' advice and feed dried bread crumbs or rolled oats and latter a little chick feed cracked fine. Then keep the old hen confined so she won't run the little fellows to death showing them the whole farm.

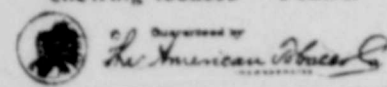

CHEMIST'S ANALYSIS SHOWS WHISKY RARE IN HOOTCH SAMPLES

WASHINGTON, February 18.—(Special)—The drink of prohibition hootch is oblivion followed by funeral music, or at least it would so appear, according to the statement of A. A. Spear, Chief Chemist of the Internal Revenue Bureau, in charge of all samples of intoxicating beverages turned in by agents for analysis.

Approximately 1500 samples have been turned in during the last five months, Spear said, and of this number less than 1 per cent were real whisky. The remainder, according to analysis made, contained everything from a comparatively harmless quantity of mildly denatured alcohol to wood alcohol.

Many of the formulae recited in cases heard recently in the Police Court sound so deadly, according to the statements of the analytical chemist, that the question is often asked how the drinking public imbibe and still manages to keep interested in things mundane.

One of the chief ingredients used in the manufacture of prohibition beverages masquerading as whisky is completely denatured alcohol, which is a deadly poison. The denaturing process consists in taking grain alcohol and adding a wood alcohol and kerosene and in some cases mercury bichloride.

In a few instances the drinks handed in for analysis have not contained enough poison to kill the drinker, should he imbibe the whole quart, but from the effects as noted in the case of one sufferer who drank not wisely but too well are powerful enough to make the drinker sick for several days.

ETHER ANOTHER INGREDIENT

Ether is another ingredient used by those peddlers of prohibition hootch. It is less harmful than other elements sometimes found in the concoctions that reach the hands of the prohibition chemists.

Sweet spirits of nitre can also be found in the whisky. This fluid, it is said, is a slow poison.

One man according to Spear, brought in a bottle of Christmas whisky which was merely wood alcohol with a small amount of car-

mel coloring to give the necessary color to the milky base.

In another instance, a reddish colored fluid guaranteed by the man who sold it to have come from Canada and a superior brand of English rye, was found to have been made from alcohol denatured with kerosene, wood alcohol and of bichloride of mercury. A quantity of peppermint candy had been dissolved in the liquid, the red stripes imparting color and the flavoring taking away the taste of the wood alcohol that gave the drink its kick.

Even corn whisky, which is known to be pure by the fact that it is without color, the chemist asserts is hardly safe, as lye is often added in small quantities to clear the fluid in order that it may be sold as triple distilled liquor.

One way that is apt to show the purchaser of liquor whether or not he is buying a passport to the happy lands above in the guise of a quart of whisky is to add a small amount of water to an equal amount of whisky or what is alleged whisky.

While not infallible, Spear says that if the beverage is based on Wood alcohol or denatured alcohol in which the deadly poison is contained the liquor will lose its color and turn milky and cloudy.

TEST BY FLAME

Another test which will in many cases show whether liquor has denatured alcohol in it is to burn a quantity of the liquor and hold a porcelain dish on the flame. If soot collects on the plate it is safe to break the bottle in the back yard.

The samples from which the test have been made are the result of about as many raids by prohibition officers as their are samples and in this number but few persons have been cheated out of a good drink by the officer who seized the contraband.

Many cases have been reported to the police where men have purchased denatured alcohol for beverages use and drunk it to their hearts content without apparently feeling ill effects. One man who was recently sent to jail on a charge of intoxication when arraigned had two pints of completely denatured alcohol in his possession and stated that he

had drunk about a gill from one bottle when he remembered no more.

A mode of drinking perhaps somewhat fragrant is that of perfume and hair tonic. Either of the last-named beverages or rather boudoir accessories will in time kill the most hardened drinker as they, too, have certain ingredients that are not good for the lining of the stomach.

Spear, when asked if the gin sold on the alley curbs was safe to buy for beverages purposes, remarked that from tests made in the laboratories it has been shown that a small amount of juniper when added to denatured and wood alcohol effectively disguises the undesirable taste and passes as a substitute for the genuine article.

The moral pointed out is if you must drink make the bootlegger drink the first half-pint. Watch the effect and if the bootlegger goes blind leave the booze alone.

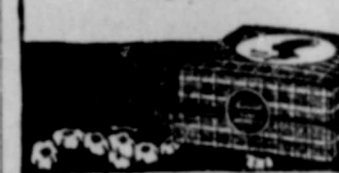
