City voters Tuesday will get their second opportunity within a week to go to the polls and elect public officials. At stake in the Tuesday balloting will be three posts on the Big Spring City Commission, and ballots will list the names of eight candidates.

Heavy Drug Haul Smuggled From China Is Seized

WASHINGTON (U)—Narcotics Commissioner Harry J. Anslinger announced today the seizure in San Francisco of millions of dollars' worth of heroin which he said was smuggled in from Communist China.

Eight persons were arrested in the raid yesterday.

The commissioner said the illicit heroin seized was brought to the United States for the most part by merchant seamen who got it at a gambling emporium operated in Hong Kong by a man Anslinger names as Judah Isaac Bear, 62.

Anslinger said from his headquarters at the Treasury here that Bear was formerly "a large trafficker in narcotics on the West Coast," and that he had been sentenced in 1933 to 15 years in prison for a narcotics violation.

Anslinger said Bear was deported at the end of his prison term. He said it was expected Bear will be prosecuted in San Francisco.

Anslinger did not say whether Bear had been arrested yet. Treasury aides said an indictment against Bear would be sought at San Francisco and that it was expected he would be returned to this country through extradition proceedings.

Anslinger said federal narcotics agents had seized, or purchased as evidence, six pounds of pure heroin "worth millions of dollars in the illicit narcotics market."

He said "the source of the heroin was... Communist China."

Safety Meet Is Set For Students

Another meeting was scheduled this afternoon by school committees and representatives of the Citizens Traffic Commission concerning the forthcoming Youth For Traffic Safety Week.

The meeting was set for 4 p.m., with students from both the junior and senior high attending. A discussion of a "brake demonstration" to be held during the week was on the program.

George Oldham, CTC executive secretary, said that a Department of Public Safety car will be rigged up with a pavement shooting device to show how long it takes a driver to react before stopping.

The brake demonstrations will be held here on Thursday, April 23, and will be conducted by Clay Bedner, safety officer for the Texas Highway Patrol.

Events have been scheduled for every day of the week, which will be climaxed with a road-o-e at Webb Air Force Base on April 24.

Springish Weather Hangs On In State

Mild spring weather hung on in Texas Monday.

Pre-dawn temperatures ranged from 43 at Dalhart to 73 at Alice. Skies were partly cloudy in the east half of the state and clear in the west.

No rain was reported, but the Weather Bureau said damp Gulf winds might scatter a few showers near the coast.

More of the same kind of weather was forecast for Tuesday.

Senate To Debate Federal Road Help

WASHINGTON (U)—The Senate begins debate today on a two-year program to provide two billion dollars worth of federal aid for the nation's highways.

The Senate Public Works Committee has estimated that roads within the federal aid program need 35 billion dollars worth of immediate improvements, and several attempts to increase the two-billion-dollar program were planned. Already it is larger than President Eisenhower asked.

IT'S YOUR BUSINESS

(AN EDITORIAL)

Local government is far more important than voters apparently regarded it Saturday, when no more than 495 voters went to the polls in the local trustee election.

Tomorrow, the City Commission election takes place, and if the people are going to be concerned about the operation of their town, five times that many—or more—will cast a ballot.

The City of Big Spring is a million-dollar-a-year business, one of the biggest things in town. Its administration handles everybody's money, it affects everybody's welfare. A city can progress, or it can bog down, or it can over-extend itself financially, pretty much as the City Commission runs it.

The City Commission is important. It should have men of sound thinking and good judgment and business experience, men who are representative of the best interests of the community. It is the voters who must put such men in office.

Tomorrow, you have eight names from which to select three Commission members. These represent a majority on our City Commission. It is important that the selections be made wisely, and certainly by a majority of the voters, not just a handful.

By failing to vote, you are inviting special groups to take over your city government.

If you want that, don't vote. If you want representative government, then you will be at the ballot box Tuesday.

State Tax Plan On Senate Floor

AUSTIN (U)—The Senate's State Affairs Committee gave its approval to Gov. Allan Shivers' 25-million-dollar tax program today with two major changes from the House version.

The action sent the measure to the Senate floor where Sen. A. M. Alkin Jr. of Paris, its Senate sponsor, said he would seek final passage "as soon as I can—tomorrow if possible."

The bill is designed to raise the money necessary to finance pay raises for teachers and state employees, the major business for which the special session was called.

The major Senate committee changes included the striking out of a House-added tax on trading stamps and the adding of a graduated scale for the House-approved increase in gas production taxes.

On Alkin's proposal, the committee approved graduating the production tax from 9.06 per cent of market value the first year down to 8.06 the second year and 7.06 per cent the third year and thereafter. The House version had called for a flat 9.06 per cent, increasing the tax from its present 5.72 per cent.

Final committee approval came on voice vote at an early morning session preceding the Senate's morning session. The trading stamp tax had been slashed from the bill by the committee last Friday following a public hearing.

No changes were made in other sections of the House bill that would increase beer taxes from \$1.37 a barrel to \$2 and increase franchise taxes from \$1.25 to \$2 per \$1,000 in corporate assets.

Alkin said the graduated scale for gas production taxes would raise about the same amount of state revenue each year because of increasing production and rising prices.

He opposed an amendment that had been proposed by Sen. Wardlaw Lane of Center which would have struck out the production tax and substituted a flat two-fifths of one cent per 1,000 cubic feet of gas after liquid hydrocarbons have been removed.

Lane said the tax on liquids amounts to "double taxes" on a product that must compete with oil. He also said it would put the tax where three-quarters of it would have to be picked up by the pipelines.

Alkin contended the proposal would invite "another lawsuit" similar to the contest in which the U.S. Supreme Court recently invalidated the state's gas gathering tax.

Lane's amendment was defeated 16-3 but he said he would try another version of his proposal when the bill comes back.

Shivers and Rep. Charles Murphy, Houston, who has a rival plan, exchanged harsh words over the merits of the two proposals.

French squadrons roared over the masses of rebel troops throughout the night and early today, plastering them with 1,000-pound bombs and fresh barrages of fire.

There was no mention of any attacks by the Communist-led legions in other areas around the beleaguered plain.

The rebels last night pulled their forces a quarter of a mile back from the heavily assailed eastern and southeastern defenses of the French-held plain 175 miles west of Hanoi.

A French spokesman said then he doubted the Vietminh could mount another heavy assault within 12 hours but emphasized the attackers' pullback of 400 to 500 yards could in no way be called a retreat.

"It's merely a slackening of their line, probably for regrouping. The battle is far from over," the spokesman added.

Authoritative French sources estimated the Vietminh had lost 21,000 killed and wounded—about half their original attacking force—in three weeks. But the fortress' defenders—French, Vietnamese, North Africans, Foreign Legion—were still outnumbered.

The Vietminh commander, Gen. Vo Nguyen Giap, unleashed a big artillery barrage on the Dien Bien Phu airstrip, forcing the French to call off for the time being their plan to fly out wounded at noon today in transport planes blazoned with red crosses.

The French had broadcast their plans for the "mercy" flights to Giap and asked for a brief ceasefire.

Budget Hearing Is Scheduled Tuesday

A public hearing on the Big Spring budget for the 1954-55 fiscal year will be held Tuesday at 5 p.m. in the city commission meeting room at City Hall.

The budget expenditures have been tentatively pegged at \$1,196,436.25 by the commission. Estimated revenues for the year are \$1,311,566.

Public hearing has been slated to allow interested citizens an opportunity to express their views on the budget.

Several other matters are scheduled for the commission meeting Tuesday, including paving problems.

Norwegian Princess Dies From Hepatitis

OSLO, Norway (U)—Crown Princess Martha of Norway, 33, died today. She had suffered for three years from chronic hepatitis, a liver ailment.

The princess, wife of Crown Prince Olaf, was taken to the state hospital March 13 following severe hemorrhages. For a time she rallied but suffered a serious setback early yesterday and lapsed into a coma.

She had visited the United States several times and spent five war years at Bethesda, Md., in exile from the Nazis.

Pioneer Colorado Teacher, 98, Dies

PUEBLO, Colo. (U)—Mrs. Ellen Call Gallup, 98-year-old pioneer schoolteacher who made her first airplane flight at the age of 90, died Sunday in a Pueblo hospital.

A spinal injury suffered in a fall at her home had confined her to bed and wheelchair since last year. She made her only airplane flight in 1946 from Pueblo to Loveland, Tex.

Dulles Warns China Near Danger Point

French Kill Over 1,000 Vietminh In Fort Defense

HANOI, Indochina (U)—The French high command announced today the defenders of Dien Bien Phu had killed "more than 1,000" Vietminh troops trying anew to smash their way into the heart of the besieged fortress through its northwest corner.

Heavy fighting raged in that sector of the plain as the Communist-led rebels battled to widen the gap against a strong French Union counterattack supported by tanks, artillery and war planes.

The high command said the defenders plugged every breach made by the Vietminh in the northwestern defenses and the rebels left their dead dangling in the barbed wire barricades.

Thousands of the wildly screaming rebels drove into French positions in the northwest sector shortly after midnight.

After tank and artillery fire, the French Union infantry clashed in bitter hand-to-hand fighting with the Vietminh. Within two hours the counterattack had closed the breach and had driven the Vietminh back.

Every message that reached the French command in Hanoi from the fortress commander, Col. Christian de Castries, recounted that his men's morale was "sky high" and that hopes of an eventual victory were mounting.

Legislature Pays Tribute To O'Brien

AUSTIN—The Texas Legislature paused in its important work today to give resounding tribute to Big Spring's Congressional Medal of Honor winner Lt. George H. O'Brien Jr.

Members of the Senate and House in a special joint session stood and applauded warmly and at length as the slender young former Marine was presented by his legislator, Rep. Obie Bristow.

They cheered again when he accepted a copy of a special honor resolution from the hand of Gov. Allan Shivers, who voiced the "great pride of Texas" in this Korean War hero.

"Our pride in you cannot be measured in this resolution or mere words," said the governor. "But your state takes this token method of recognizing its thanks to heroes like you."

Young O'Brien, obviously moved by the tribute, stood erect before the House microphone and said simply "Thank you very much."

The resolution paying tribute to the Medal of Honor winner had been introduced in the House by Bristow and in the Senate by Sen. Harley Sadler.

Rep. Bristow made a brief but moving talk in presenting Lt. O'Brien to the legislature as "the kid down the street."

"Lt. O'Brien is a symbol of all the kids down the street all over Texas and the U. S. A.," said Bristow, "kids who had a flaming devotion to their state and their country and their God when duty called."

Asserts Indochina Moves Aggressive

WASHINGTON (U)—Secretary of State Dulles told Congress today that the Chinese Communists are "coming awful close" in Indochina to the direct aggression which he has said might produce massive retaliation.

Dulles made this statement before a House Foreign Affairs Committee after saying freshly verified information showed that New Communist radar-controlled 37 millimeter anti-aircraft guns, which are bringing down French planes over Dien Bien Phu are "operated by members of the Chinese military establishment."

Dulles, testifying on next year's foreign aid program, also said a Chinese general with "nearly a score of Chinese technical advisers," is stationed at staff headquarters of Vietminh forces attacking the French fortress.

He called direct participation by Chinese Communists in the flaming Southeast Asia war "rather ominous" and gave other examples.

He told the committee that Chinese Communist Gen. Ly Chen-hou is at staff headquarters of the Vietminh forces attacking the vital French Union stronghold, with "nearly a score of Chinese technical advisers."

Answering questions by Rep. Frances P. Bolton (R-Ohio), after he concluded formal testimony on next year's foreign aid bill, Dulles also said:

Numerous other Chinese Communist technical advisers are operating at division level with the Vietminh.

Dulles said this aid is in addition to the "artillery, ammunition and equipment generally which comes from Communist China."

He also said the Chinese Reds are maintaining communication lines for the Vietminh.

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Churchill Refuses Demands To Intervene On H-Blasts

LONDON (U)—Prime Minister Churchill declared today the Soviet Union is "very much closer on the heels of the United States" in the development of the H-bomb than they ever were with the A-bomb.

He made the statement in a House of Commons debate in which he again refused to intervene against American H-bomb tests in the Pacific. He said the tests "increased the chance of world peace rather than the chance of world war."

Addressing a tense, jam-packed House of Commons in a momentous declaration of government policy, the 79-year-old Churchill said:

"I also believe we have time, though not too much time, to consider the problems which now confront us and the whole world and talk them over in their new proportions."

Churchill mentioned only what he called public and private discussion "with our friends and allies."

Laborettes are demanding that Britain take the "immediate initiative" in seeking a meeting of President Eisenhower, Soviet Premier Malenkov and Churchill to ease world fears.

Former Labor Prime Minister Clement Attlee made the demand earlier in launching an H-bomb debate in the tense jam-packed House of Commons.

Both Churchill and his Laborite critics already are on record in favor of a face-to-face meeting of the big power government heads, talks which Sir Winston himself first proposed 11 months ago.

Recently, however, Churchill has appeared to be in some doubt that the present international atmosphere is right for such a meeting. He was expected to ask the House today to leave to the government's judgment the timing of any approach to Eisenhower and Malenkov.

To bolster Churchill's renewed defense of the American bomb tests, the U.S. President was reported to have sent him a personal message giving all information on the H-bomb permitted by American security laws.

Mississippi Moves Toward Slower School Equalization

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Mississippi's Legislature is groping today toward a watered-down program to equalize Negro and white schools, still fearful that the U. S. Supreme Court will abolish racial segregation.

The question in the 13-week-old legislative fight is how to maintain segregation, not whether to retain it. Hovering over the conflict is the Supreme Court and its decision on five school segregation cases.

If the court bans segregation, a special legislative session looms. Mississippi's answer probably would be to abolish public schools and furnish tuition for private, segregated schools, in line with plans in Georgia and South Carolina.

If the court upholds segregation under the "separate but equal" doctrine, Mississippi realizes it must lift its sub-par Negro schools to the level of white schools or face co-mingling of races "by federal force from federal courts," as Gov. Hugh White phrased it. A solid group in strategic House

committee posts blocked attempts to raise taxes to finance the sweeping equalization program, passed but still lacking money. The House finally approved a compromise program, scheduled to go into effect July 1 if passed by the Senate, where it faces action possibly today. Supporters predict a narrow victory in the Senate.

COLLEGE STATION (AP) — Two brothers who attend different schools won top all-around cowboy honors at the fifth annual Inter-collegiate Rodeo at Texas A&M over the weekend. Clyde Martin of Sam Houston State was named all-around cowboy. His brother, Tex Martin, of Sul Ross State was runner-up. Oklahoma A&M took top team honors from 20 other schools. Sul Ross was second, Hardin-Simmons third.

Top Authorities Deny Winchell Tale Of Danger In Salk Vaccine

NEW YORK (AP) — Three top authorities today gave their positive assurance of the safety of the Salk polio vaccine, after Walter Winchell had broadcast that it "may be a killer."

The safety statements came from the U. S. Public Health Service, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and Dr. Jonas E. Salk, who developed the vaccine. Two firms making the vaccine also declared no vaccine is used or will be used unless proved safe.

The vaccine is scheduled to be given soon to up to one million children to test its effectiveness, to learn whether it actually protects against polio this summer. The vaccine is made of dead polio virus. Dead virus cannot cause polio. Each batch of vaccine is given triple tests, including injections into monkeys, separately by the manufacturer, the Public Health Service and Dr. Salk's laboratory at the University of Pittsburgh. The safety program thus calls for nine tests in all of every batch to detect any live and dangerous virus.

Winchell said on his regular Sunday night ABC network program: "Attention all doctors and families in the United States . . . The Public Health Service tested 10

batches of this new polio vaccine. The government's health department, I am told, found that seven of the 10 contained live — not dead — polio virus. It killed several monkeys."

Immediately the Public Health Service said in a statement that difficulties had been anticipated in converting Salk's small-scale laboratory method to full-scale commercial production.

European Smuggling Ring Netted In Raid

HEIDELBERG, Germany (AP) — The U. S. Army says sweeping raids yesterday in France and West Germany have smashed a 24-million-dollar-a-year smuggling ring.

A spokesman said scores of persons — among them American civilians, Germans and stateless persons — were nabbed in the roundup by more than 800 American, German and French police in eight cities.

More than \$175,000 worth of contraband currency, jewels, gold, cigarettes and vehicles were confiscated. Army officials said it was one of the largest smuggling rings uncovered in Europe since the war. They said it had operated for several years in France, Switzerland, Germany and Belgium and had headquarters in Paris, Zurich, Munich and Frankfurt.

When live virus are found, that batch is discarded, it said.

"The Public Health Service is confident the foundation would not release for use in this mass immunization program any vaccine which was not considered safe according to the most exacting standards that can be established for such preparations."

"No vaccine will be used" which does not pass the triple tests. He said four batches had "failed to pass the required tests" because "they were not manufactured" according to Dr. Salk's specifications and "were therefore eliminated by the testing. This demonstrates the validity of these tests and the safety they assure to the public."

Dr. Salk declared, "There is absolutely nothing to be concerned about. Nothing that contains live virus is considered to be a satisfactory vaccine."

Dr. Salk has inoculated his own children among about 5,000 given the vaccine prepared in his own laboratory. Dr. Van Riper said Dr. Salk also has inoculated about 3,000 children with vaccine made commercially.

Winchell also said that the "Michigan State Medical Society has refused approval, the first state to do so. The polio foundation is trying to kill the story — but the U. S. Public Health Service will confirm this in about 10 days. Why wait 10 days?"

The Michigan Medical Society has not made any public announcement.

Weeks Sure Business To Show Gain

Hitting at "gloom prophets" and "professional pessimists," Secretary of Commerce Sinclair Weeks said in a Texas radio speech Sunday night he thinks business will improve.

Weeks said first quarter business in 1954 was off about 10 per cent. But he declared it was better than the same period of 1953—the last year of the Truman administration—"and we can expect improvements as the year progresses."

The secretary spoke on the Texas Republican Committee's weekly transcribed network broadcast. "The business recession which gloom prophets have talked up can be measured in terms of reduced expenses resulting from peace in Korea," Weeks said.

"I feel confident that the Ameri-

can people would rather have a temporary drop in business than more death in Korea."

Weeks said that "unless the professional pessimists, irresponsible union leaders and socialist planners convince the public they cannot afford to buy, there is every reason to view the year with confidence."

The Eisenhower Cabinet member also said one side of administration policy is to help cash registers jingle by encouraging business growth.

"When you help business, you help the entire population," he said. "If the bough on which we

all hang is well nourished, we will all grow and flourish. If that bough is sick, we all suffer."

Weeks called a plan to raise personal income tax exemptions to \$1,000 "politically inspired."

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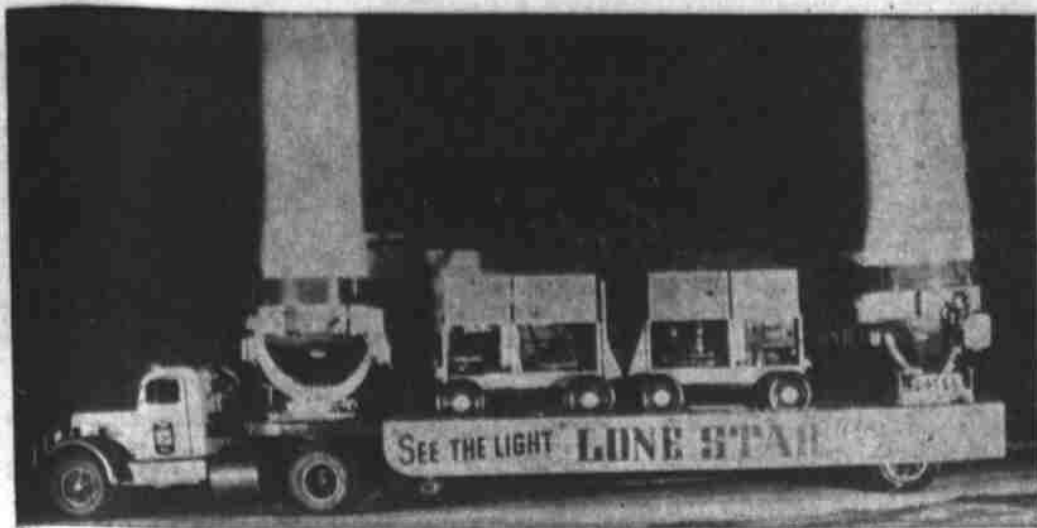

Heavy Weekend Violent Death Toll Counts 33 Dead In State

At least 33 persons were killed in a grim upsurge of weekend violence in Texas.

Traffic wrecks, air crashes, shootings, fires, stabbings and drownings shot the toll to the highest point in months.

Unless it's a holiday period, the state's violent death count from 6 p.m. each Friday to Sunday midnight usually ranges from 10 to 20.

Traffic was the biggest killer, claiming 13 lives. Five victims died in airplane crashes. Four drowned, three were shot, three were stabbed, three died in a fire, there was at least one suicide and a man was crushed to death when his jacked-up car fell on him.

Five members of a family—a Houston couple, their two small children and the husband's mother—were killed in a collision in fog 20 miles west of Houston Saturday.

Their car smashed head-on into a cattle van.

The dead:

Harvey Lee Blum, 29; Mrs. Marie Klingens Blum, 28, his wife; Linda Gayle Blum, 2; Judy Diane, 2 months; Mrs. Ed Blum, about 55, of Brenham.

Three women were injured fatally Saturday night in a head-on

collision of two cars on a bridge three miles north of Bonham.

Mrs. Joe Fulton Cunningham, about 50, of the Bartley Woods community southeast of Bonham, died instantly. Mrs. Dorothy Lybarger, 35, of Bonham died en route to a hospital.

Mrs. Jim E. Cunningham of Bartley Woods—Mrs. Joe Cunningham's daughter-in-law—died early Sunday in a Bonham hospital.

Three persons were killed Sunday when two light planes smashed together in flight and crashed near Irving. R. W. Bacon, 46, of Irving was flying one plane. His son, Lt. R. N. Bacon, 24, of Fort Sill, Okla., was a passenger in the other, flown by Howard Lloyd Whitman, 43, a crop-duster pilot.

A Navy pilot, Harold Kenneth Farr, 30, and a hitchhiking Air Force enlistee man were killed when their propeller-driven trainer crashed and burned on a ranch near Kerrville Saturday. The Air Force man had not been identified.

John P. Scruggs, 45, died in a Houston hospital Saturday an hour after he was found critically wounded in a tourist court. Police said Scruggs had been shot in the right temple and that a rifle lay beside him.

Faye M. Atkins, 52-year-old San

Antonio life operator was shot to death in her car Saturday. Police held the 34-year-old wife of an Air Force major.

Audrey Mae Kelly, 26, was fatally stabbed in a Dallas tavern early Sunday.

Justice E. H. Talbert returned a verdict of suicide Sunday at San Antonio in the death of Charles D. McGehee, 68, a guard at Fort Sam Houston. He was found in his car in the garage of his home. Hose ran from the exhaust pipe into the car.

Jack Collins, 54, was accidentally killed in San Antonio Saturday when the car under which he was working fell on him.

One person was killed and six injured when two cars sideswiped some 20 miles east of San Antonio Friday night. Dead was Mrs. Elizabeth Cross, 33, of Pasadena, Tex.

An elderly woman and her two infant granddaughters burned to death Saturday night when fire cracked through their Breckenridge home. They were Susie Cole, about 78; Linda Diane Price and Deborah Artella Price.

Anton Joseph Walla, 61, was fatally injured Saturday night when struck by an automobile as he crossed a Houston street.

J. M. Hinkle, 51, was shot to death in Houston Saturday night. Police held a suspect.

Wayne Loftis, 24, and Jimmy Humbert, 16, both of Corsicana, were drowned when their boat capsized in Lake Travis Sunday.

Charles Thomas Barrett, 51, chief trainmaster for the Texas and Pacific Railroad at Mineola, drowned Saturday night in the Sabine River south of Mineola. He slipped while fishing from the bank.

Jose Reyes, 27, of San Antonio was fatally stabbed at San Antonio Saturday night. Police held a suspect.

Robert Frank Manning, 7, drowned Sunday in Dallas Turtle Creek. His father, R. E. Manning, said Robert and an 8-year-old brother walked to the nearby creek after supper without telling their parents and that Robert slipped from the bank.

French Officials Targets Of Crowd's Rage On EDC

PARIS (AP) — Premier Joseph Laniel nursed sore shins today and Defense Minister Rene Pleven a slapped face after a yelling mob set on them in protest to the proposed European Defense Community.

The 100 or so rioters — identified as supporters of Gen. Charles de Gaulle, Monarchists and possibly some Communists — broke up a solemn ceremony yesterday at the Arc de Triomphe honoring the defenders of Dien Bien Phu, the Communist-besieged fortress in Indochina.

With only a thin line of police and a handful of troops on hand, the demonstrators rushed the official party as it started to leave the ceremony.

Somebody kicked Laniel in the shins. A police flying wedge got him to a police car which the rioters then tried to overturn. The straining policemen counterbalanced the pushing throng and the chauffeur finally rammed the car through the crowd.

Pleven was stranded under the arch alongside France's national shrine, the tomb of the unknown soldier and its perpetual flame honoring the nation's war dead.

Screaming "Resign!" the crowd hurled stones which missed him. Two or three knocked off his hat and glasses. Someone slapped him twice. Another grabbed a handful of his hair.

Pale and seething, Pleven stood with the police in the center of the crowd until reinforcements finally arrived — almost half an hour later.

The rest of the crowd of about 1,000 watched the attacks with detachment and made no move to intervene. They dispersed after Pleven departed for his home.

Later they released all but one. French official circles and most newspapers expressed deep concern over the unprecedented incident. It was the first time on record that a crowd molested a French premier and a member of his Cabinet.

The rioters tossed anti-EDC leaflets and shouted anti-EDC slogans and yelled "Vive (long live) Juin." This referred to Mar-

shal Alphonse Pierre Juin, who was dismissed from his French military posts last week for failing to meet with Laniel and Pleven to explain an anti-EDC speech.

Famed Toscanini Retires At NBC

NEW YORK (AP) — Arturo Toscanini, whose name means the finest in music to millions, has retired as conductor of the NBC Symphony Orchestra.

The 57-year-old maestro left his post quietly and without making a special occasion of his last concert, an all-Wagner program in Carnegie Hall yesterday.

NBC said he planned to leave the United States in May or June for a visit to his native Italy. It was understood he has at present made no commitments for any future concert appearances.

Official word of his retirement was withheld until after the final concert. NBC said this was done at the veteran conductor's request to avoid a sentimental demonstration by the audience or orchestra, formed 17 years ago especially for his use.

Without turning to the audience or a nod to anyone, Toscanini left the podium as soon as the last note of the concert's final number died.

He shut himself in his green room in Carnegie Hall and refused to return to the stage despite lengthy cheering and applause by the audience.

NBC said he did not come out because he was too moved and had even cancelled a dinner party because of the emotional strain of the occasion.

David Sarnoff, chairman of the board of RCA and NBC, released the letter in which Toscanini told him "the sad time has come when I must reluctantly lay aside my baton and say goodbye to my orchestra."

The NBC orchestra will continue playing under other conductors through the spring. Plans after that are still to be announced.

License Plate Sales Help Out County Funds

Revenue from automobile registrations just about offset expenditures for road right-of-way from the county's road and bridge fund during March, monthly report of Auditor Lee Porter shows.

Balance in the fund made a small gain during the month, climbing from \$103,418.32 to \$112,057.18.

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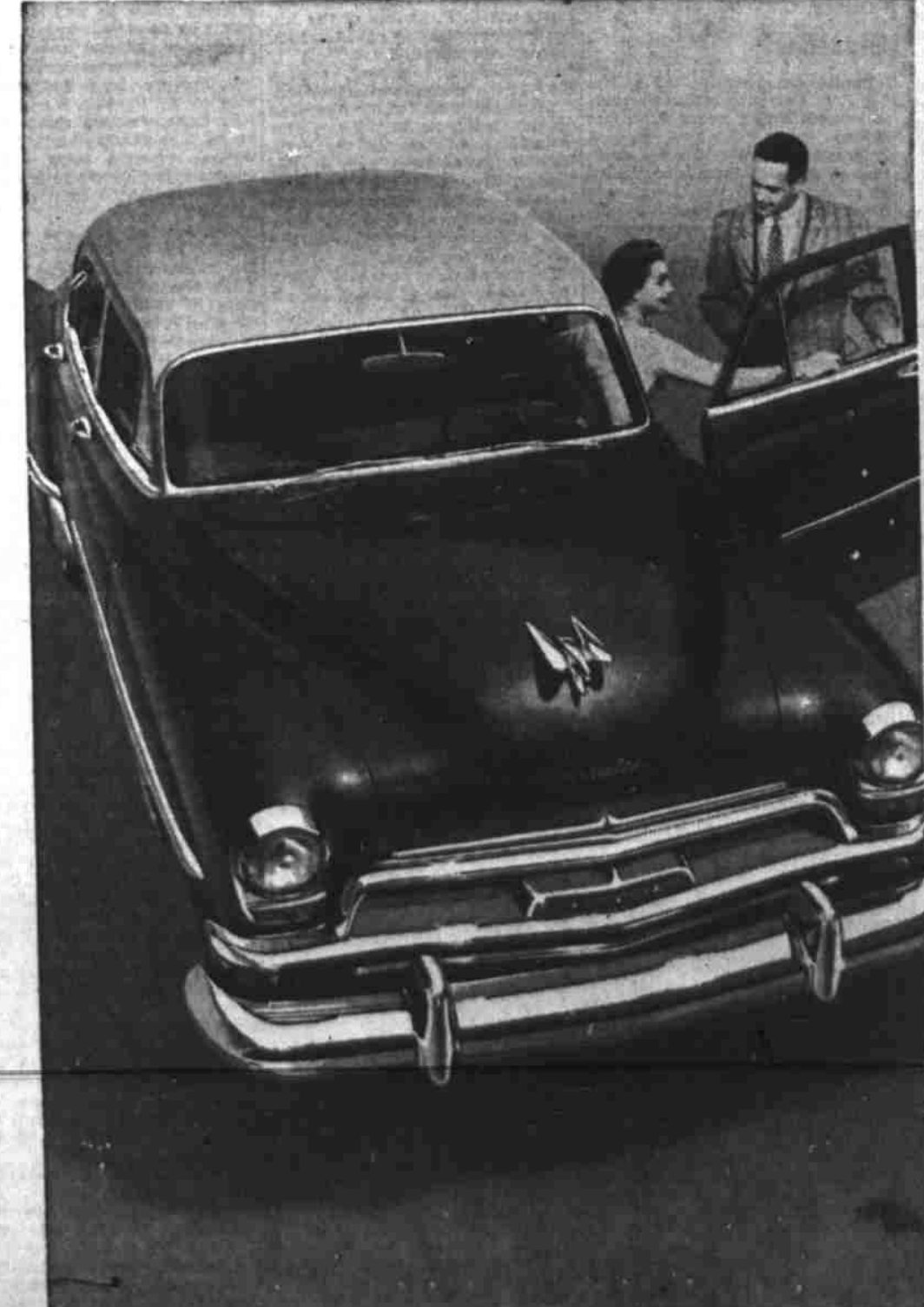

Special Probe Counsel Sears Faces Quizzing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Samuel P. Sears goes to work today as counsel for the investigation of the McCarthy-Army row — and the first order of business is a discussion whether he should keep the job.

(Showdown has been deferred until tomorrow, late reports say.)

Sen. Mundt (R-S.D.), who temporarily has replaced Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) as chairman of the Senate investigations subcommittee, said last night the subcommittee will not keep Sears, a Boston lawyer, as its probe counsel if the Army objects.

The investigation, ordered March 16 and tentatively scheduled to begin next week, presumably would again be delayed if the subcommittee had to search for another counsel.

Mundt earlier had arranged to call the subcommittee members together today to seek "reassurance" from Sears that he would be completely impartial in the investigation. Sears has said he can and will be objective.

Meanwhile, Sears announced yesterday as he left Boston he had named to assist him an attorney who represented two Harvard law students when they declined to answer questions of a congressional committee.

The lawyer is Lawrence R. Cohen, also of Boston. Another assistant named is Russel J. Coffin, a Harvard Law School graduate. Both must be approved by the subcommittee.

Cohen represented Jonathan and David Lubell, twins, by request of the Harvard law faculty when the students had trouble obtaining a lawyer for their appearance before the Senate internal security subcommittee.

Mundt spoke last night on an NBC television show and in an interview afterwards.

He said the Army, by naming a special counsel of its own for the probe, had upset his efforts to work out an agreement on a

troublesome problem of subcommittee procedure — whether McCarthy should be allowed to cross-question witnesses.

McCarthy temporarily relinquished his chairmanship of the group and said he would not vote on any issues connected with the inquiry, but he has insisted on examining witnesses. He also proposed that Army counsel be allowed to cross-examine him.

Mundt said last night he had almost persuaded the Wisconsin senator to give up his right to cross-examine, but that the near-understanding was upset by the appointment of Joseph N. Welch of Boston to handle the Army's case.

Sears is to be questioned about Boston news stories quoting him in 1952 as praising McCarthy for "a great job" in driving Communists out of government and halting his re-election.

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Civil War Veteran's Funeral Set Today

BURKBURNETT (AP) — Confederate veteran Thomas Evans Riddle was to be buried today at 3 p.m. in this North Texas town near the Red River.

Riddle died Friday night at the State Confederate Home in Austin after a three-month fight against pneumonia, a failing heart and the infirmities of old age. He would have been 108 in two weeks.

His death thins the ranks of Civil War veterans to four—one Union and three Confederate.

Riddle was a private in the Army of Tennessee. He fought at Gettysburg under Gen. Robert E. Lee. Now the only Confederate veteran in Texas is 111-year-old Walter W. Williams of Franklin.

Ziffren indicated he agreed with Mitchell in the Roosevelt case. He said, "No individual has a right to use the Democratic party for personal vindication nor to divert the energy and prestige of the Democratic party to solving personal problems."

The state committee offered no opinion on Condon.

Mitchell in his letter emphasized he was not expressing an opinion of the charges against either candidate, but indicated he objected to the idea that "our primary may be used for personal vindication."

Roosevelt's wife Romelle is suing him for separate maintenance. She charged him with adultery in three instances and introduced in the court proceedings a letter in which he admitted adultery with nine women. He has repudiated the letter, saying he signed it to keep a family dispute secret at a critical time during the war, when he was going overseas.

Roosevelt at one point said he was releasing friends and supporters, but he has remained actively in the race.

In this connection, Mitchell wrote that the courts, not elections, are the proper forum for deciding "private litigation relating to a man's domestic affairs."

"I believe most Democrats would feel that the candidate would serve his party best by standing aside from election contests until personal problems are disposed of in the proper place," he added.

Southeast Dawson Test Looms As Mississippian Discovery

Joe A. Humphrey No. 1 J. L. Billingsley, wildcat in Southeast Dawson County which was reported ready for abandonment last Saturday, has since flowed oil on two drillstem tests of the Mississippian lime.

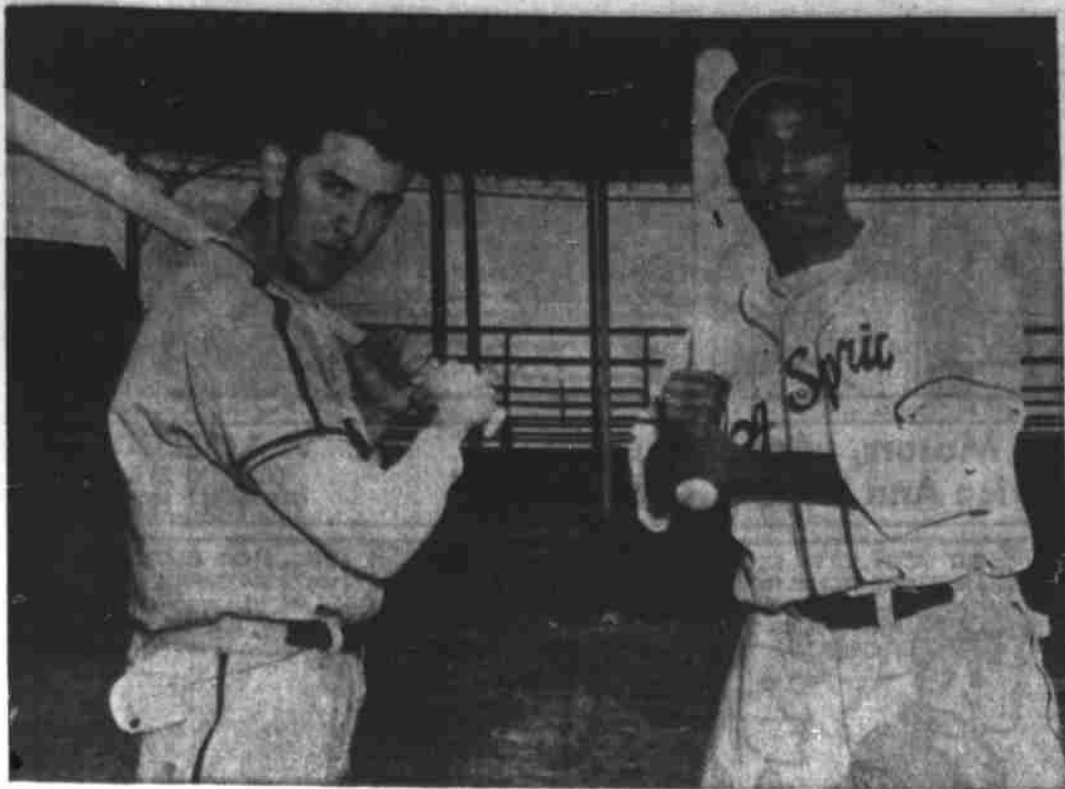

The Potts say he's home to stay.

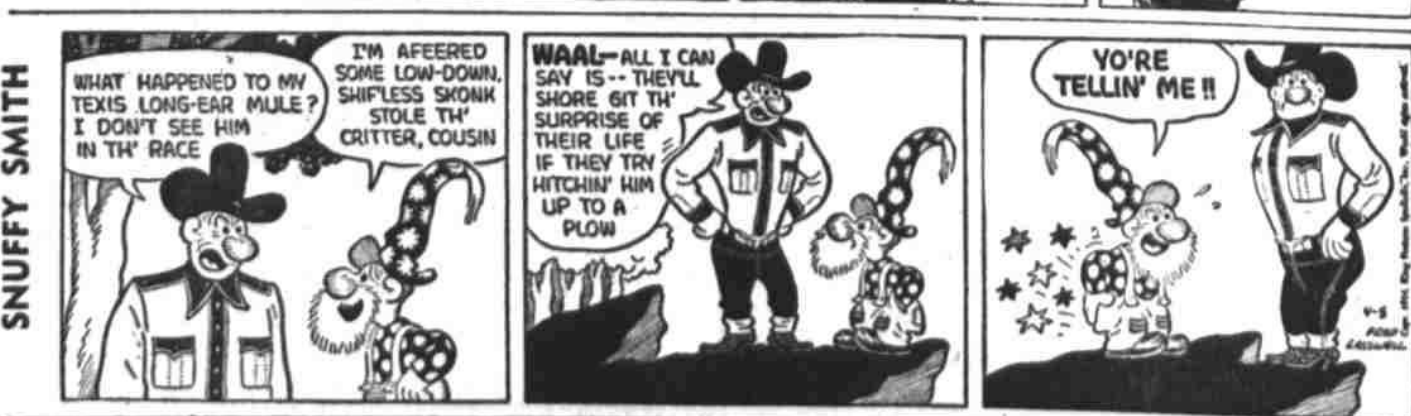
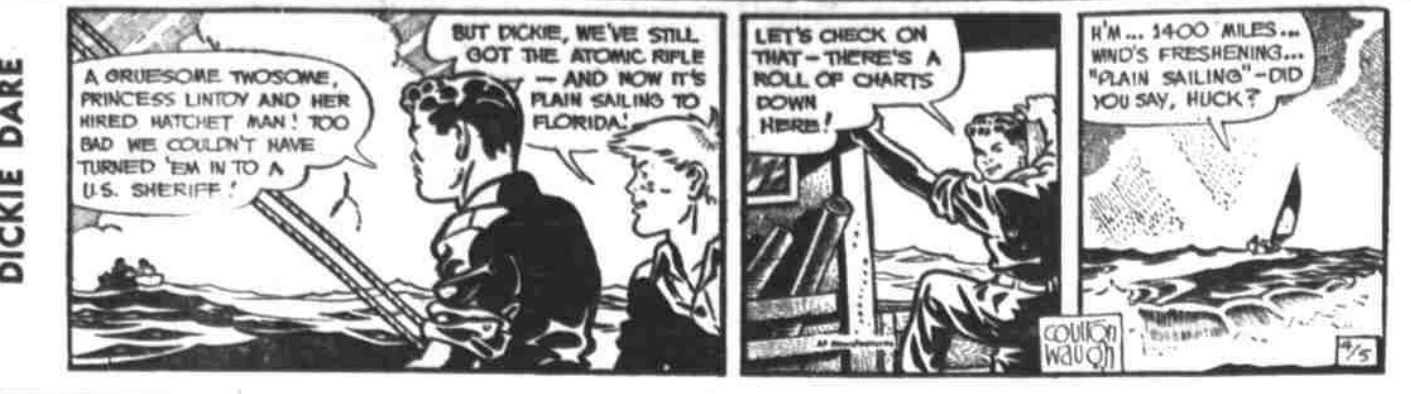

UNCLE RAY'S CORNER

Sometimes, the word "million" is used without enough care. A person may say "millions" of this or that, when he should say "thousands" or "hundreds." If you ever have written a sentence 100 times, you know that it takes a long time!

This thought comes to my mind when I start to write about the eggs of fish. We may see a large batch of eggs floating on the water, and may suppose that it contains millions of eggs. Sometimes this is an error. They way to find the truth is to count the eggs. The task would be very long if we counted them one by one. Who would want to count even half a million eggs that way?

Scientists have found much more simple methods of counting. The main idea is to count only a small portion of the objects, and then to multiply the count by the proper number.

If we applied that system to eggs, we could find the number of cubic centimeters in the batch. Then we could count the eggs in one cubic centimeter, and do our multiplying.

Using various methods, scientists have learned fairly closely the average number of eggs laid by many kinds of fish.

A catfish which lives in the ocean, and which is known as the "gaff-topail," produces large eggs which are small in number. The eggs are about one inch in diameter, and an average batch contains two dozen. In a few cases one of these fish has been known to lay from 40 to 55 eggs.

Our old friend, the salmon, has smaller eggs but lays more of them. A red salmon usually lays more than three thousand eggs, and a king salmon may produce more than five thousand.

Herrings are small ocean fish which average hardly a foot in length when full grown. It has been estimated that a female herring lays between 20 and 35 thousand eggs in a spawning season.

In the carp family, the egg-laying goes on at a much higher rate. A 20-pound female carp is likely to lay two million eggs in one year!

The crews of two fishing boats were captured by Soviet patrol ships March 23 off Russian-occupied Kunashiri Island. Their boats were given back to them when they were freed.

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Highest Honors Set For Gen. Vandenberg

WASHINGTON (AP) — There is a grave in Arlington National Cemetery today for Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg and tribute from a nation for the man who came to symbolize atomic age air power.

President Eisenhower arranged to go to Washington Cathedral, where the body of the former chief of staff of the United States Air Force had lain in state since Saturday.

Funeral services will be held there at 2 p.m. EST.

The President recalled the tall, youthful-looking general as the "gallant commander" of the Tactical Air Force which fought the European campaign under Eisenhower's overall command, and as the "unsurpassed advocate" of the Air Force cause.

From the cathedral the route lay to the memorial entrance of Arlington. At the cemetery, the Air Force had provided for highest honors for the general, patterned to a service so new and different that old military custom no longer fitted.

For the dead airman, there was no caparisoned and riderless horse. Instead, the Air Force called for a flight of jet warplanes to pass above the cemetery cortege. If weather permitted, the first of the formation, a "V" of six B-47 medium bombers, was ordered to fly with the second plane position on the right left empty, denoting the loss of a comrade. The formation plan provided for a flight of 32 jet fighters to follow the bombers.

For the escort on the ground, there were about 2,000 troops, drawn from each of the armed forces—recognition of the fact that Vandenberg had been a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Johnson and C. M. Johnson, both of Lindale, and A. B. Johnson of Midland; three sisters, Mrs. Ruth Kennedy and Mrs. Doris Watkins, both of Big Spring, and Mrs. Ann Galitsch of Houston.

Seven grandchildren also survive. Funeral services were set for 3 p.m. today at the North Side Baptist Church. The Rev. Carlos McLeod was to officiate, and burial was to be in Trinity Memorial Park under direction of Eberly-River Funeral Home.

Palbearers were to be C. R. Smith, C. R. Shank, L. T. Hargrove Jr., W. B. Mitchell, H. M. Smith and Otis Wilson.

Rival Dock Forces Work Together In New York Harbor

NEW YORK (AP)—Longshoremen from rival unions worked side by side today to move huge piles of cargo piled up on Port of New York piers during a 29-day strike of dock workers.

It was the first day of full-scale operations since the old Independent International Longshoremen's Assn. called off its strike Friday.

Police said at least 11,000 dock workers were busy, about double the best single day turnout during the strike.

At one Hudson River pier four gangs totaling 125 men went to work on the Argentine freighter Evita. A line spokesman said some of the men were members of the old IILA, and others belonged to the rival AFL union. The battle between the two for dominance sparked the tieup, longest in the port's history.

Hungarian Refugee Honored For Muscle Research Work

CHICAGO (AP)—A major American scientific honor has been awarded a scientist who fled here in 1947 from Hungary to do research that might be "no damn good at all."

He is Dr. Albert Szent-Gyorgi, 60, who late yesterday was presented the Albert Lasker Award of the American Heart Assn.—including a \$1,000 prize—for "distinguished achievement" in the field of research concerned with heart and blood-vessel diseases.

Specifically, he was honored for pioneering studies leading to a better understanding of the action of muscles—a contribution which the AHA declared had provided new clues to the mechanism of heart failure and "removed . . . many barriers to the study of normal and diseased hearts."

The gentle, friendly, gray-haired

researcher had won the Nobel Prize in medicine in 1937 for his isolation of vitamin C.

And he had won other honors for other achievements.

But, all that was behind him when he came to this country in 1947 from Hungary to continue work on muscle research that had been interrupted by World War II.

"When settling in this country," he said in accepting the Lasker award, "I had the greatest difficulty in finding adequate financial support for my research, because wherever I asked for help I was asked for a project of what I was going to do."

"My answer had to be, 'I don't know, that's why it is research.'"

"And when I was asked what it (might be) good for—that is, the research I was doing—I had to answer:

"No damn good at all!"

But he declared that eventually a Chicago meat packing and research firm, Armour & Co., proved to be "the only one who was willing to give me money and turn me loose."

And it was that firm's "far-sighted generosity that enabled me to do the work" that led to the heart association's award, he said.

The scientist, now director of the Institute for Muscle Research at Woods Hole, Mass., told reporters that studies under way by himself and his colleagues might eventually lead to an "approach" to a better understanding of such elusive ailments as muscular dystrophy.

Family Aerial Crash Kills 3

DALLAS (AP)—Two light planes crunched together at 2,000 feet yesterday, killing a father, his son and a cropduster pilot.

The planes crashed in a field some 100 feet apart near suburban Irving.

The victims were R. W. Bacon, 46, of Irving; his son, Army Lt. R. N. Bacon, 23, and Lloyd Whitman, 43, a cropdusting pilot whose address wasn't known.

The duster plane was a miniature biplane, the other ship a 2-place monoplane. Both belonged to the elder Bacon. He was alone in the duster, and Whitman was flying with the younger Bacon as a passenger.

Witnesses gave conflicting accounts of how the collision happened.

Arthur Brown, off-duty control tower officer at Carter Field who lives some four miles from the crash scene, said Bacon flew the open-cockpit duster plane up and into the belly of the cabin craft. Brown estimated their altitude at 2,000 feet.

"They had been circling around like they were dogfighting," Brown said.

Carl Shipp, who also lives nearby, was roofing his garage. He said the smaller plane was flying north and made an east turn, and the two collided when the other plane, flying south, turned west.

Both planes crashed in the same field just south of Jap Lee Field, a private airport.

Visits In Formosa

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP)—Lt. Gen. Samuel E. Anderson, commander of the U.S. 5th Air Force in Korea, arrived today for a three-day visit.

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
