OLDEST BREWERY IN AMERICA IS NEAR DRYDEN

Washington, June 20 (AP).—The oldest brewery in the country—a plant which apparently turned out a flood of powerful drink centuries before Columbus discovered America—has been found by Smithsonian Institute archeologist in the Big Bend country of West Texas.

Frank M. Setzler, Smithsonian official, came upon the plant 45 miles north of Dryden, Texas, recently while he was trying to trace the civilization of an old cave-dwelling branch of the Indian race.

Setzler had previously explored dwelling caves in the limestone cliffs of the area.

The new cave, however, turned out to be a highly specialized one. The accumulation of debris was many times thicker than in the caves used as homes. It indicated that this was a liquor factory.

The Indians of historic times have prepared a potent alcoholic drink from the desert sotol plant and it is reasonable to assume, Setzler said, that the formula of its preparation was handed down from the prehistoric races. It is made by heating the ground-up plants, pressing out the juice, and allowing it to ferment.

In the cave Setzler and his assistants found one large boulder, the top of which had been ground out to the depth of a foot, and a large roller pestle nearby. This huge pot was apparently the sotol cooking receptacle or the fermenting barrel.—El Paso Times.

Reduced Interest Rates on Land Bank Loans Are Extended

The reduced interest rates on Federal land bank and Commissioner loans have been extended by Federal legislation for a period of two years, according to word received today from the Federal Land Bank by Alfred E. Creigh, secretary-treasurer of the Sanderson National Farm Loan Association.

On Federal land bank loans through national farm loan associations the temporarily reduced rate of 3 1/2 per cent per annum will be continued for all interest installments payable prior to July 1, 1940.

The temporarily reduced rate of 4 per cent on Land Bank Commissioner loans is also continued until July 1, 1940, Creigh said.

"The temporary interest reduction does not change the contract interest rate, that is, the rate written in the mortgage at the time a loan was made," Creigh said. "At present the contract rates on new land bank loans are 4 per cent for loans through unimpaired associations. The contract rate on all Commissioner loans made through the land bank is 5 per cent. Under the law, as now amended, both land bank and Commissioner borrowers will resume interest payments at their respective contract rates on July 1, 1940."

"Farmers who now obtain new loans through an association at the 4 per cent contract rate," Creigh continued, "will get 3 1/2 per cent rate for all interest installments payable prior to July 1, 1940, and after that will not have to pay more than the 4 per cent contract rate for the balance of the term of the loan, which may be for as long as 20 to 30 odd years."

Sanderson Schools Granted Affiliation in Two More Subjects

District Deputy State Superintendent Recommends Changes

W. H. Savage, President of the Sanderson School Board, has recently received the annual report of the District Supervisor's visit to the local high school. The report was made through the State Department of Education in Austin.

Affiliation was granted in two additional subjects, World History and Physical Education. Affiliation was dropped in two subjects, which have been discontinued. These were Ancient History and Modern History. The Sanderson High School now has 26 1/2 credits of affiliation.

Miss Sue B. Mann, District Deputy State Superintendent, who visited the Sanderson High Schools this year, made the following report to the school board:

1. That standard classrooms and equipment for teaching health and physical education be provided for the Mexican elementary school. Commendations are expressed for the improvements made this year in that unit of instruction, namely, the doubling of the teaching staff in the employment of three new teachers.

2. That commendations be expressed for these improvements and achievements in the following departments: (a) more than \$500 worth added to the band; a girls' drum corps of 18 pieces has been provided and equipped to use in numerous programs; new band uniforms have been purchased for the senior band; a separate practice room for the band has been provided and equipped.

(b) Old typewriters have been replaced by 12 new machines in the commercial department.

(c) Health and physical education—the gymnasium floor has been refinished; more time and attention has been given to teaching physical education; teachers with certificates in this field have been employed; and at all times the buildings and grounds are kept in good condition.

(d) Reading—a testing program has been given in all the elementary grades and followed by remedial work.

All courtesies extended to the supervisor were greatly appreciated.

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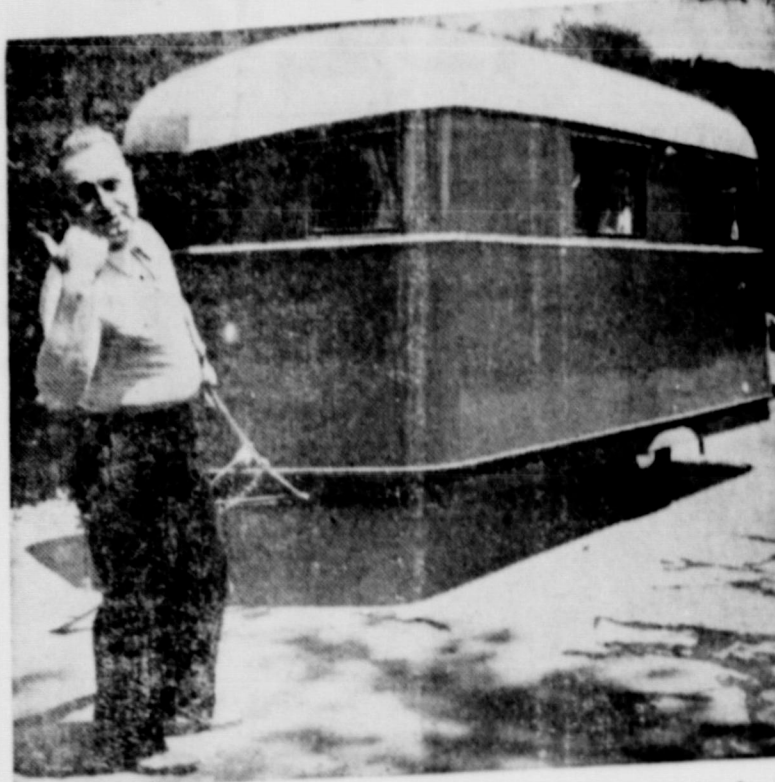
