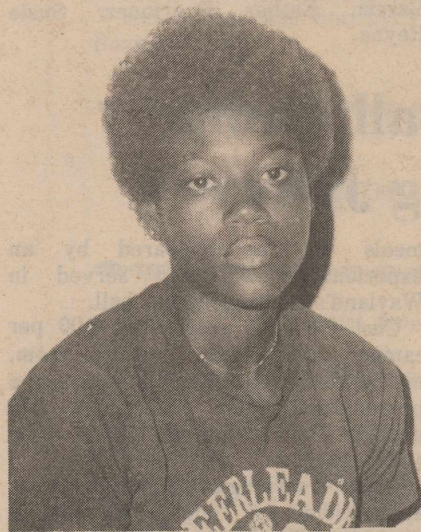

Linda Washington qualified for regional competition in two events as the result of first and second place wins in last weekend's district track meet.

Competing Saturday in Farwell, Linda won first place in shot put with 32'5". It was her second consecutive district win. Her 27.6 time in the 220 was good enough for second place.

Linda missed qualifying in a third event, coming in fourth in the 100 an event she also qualified for last year.

Longhorn Tracksters Capture Team Victory Last Weekend

Longhorn thinclads captured a team victory last weekend in the Springlake-Earth Relays. Over-all points for the first place finish totaled 130. Host S-E scored 126 with Olton collecting 120. Abernathy finished fourth with 56.

First place wins were turned in by the 440 relay team - Robert Martinez, Chad Black, Daniel Guzman and Dale Scott - and individually by Black, Martinez and Kevin Belt.

The 440 relay runners turned in a 46.05 performance. In the 100 meter high hurdles, Black's first place time was 16.34; Belt was second with 16.62 and Derek Rich, third, 19.17.

Black topped the high jump with 6'2". Belt and Rich finished fifth and sixth, respectively, with 5'2" leaps. Black was second in the long jump with 19'8 3/4".

Belt's 40.19 was good enough for first in the 330 yard intermediate hurdles. Rich was fifth with 45.97.

Running the 200 meter, Martinez took first with 24.62. Dale Scott was fourth with 25.05. In the 100 meter

Water And Energy Management Seminar To Be Held Tuesday

A water and energy management seminar will be held Tuesday, Apr. 14 in Swisher Memorial Building, 127 SW 2nd St., Tulia from 9 a.m. until 12 noon, according to announcement made by Mike Heimer, county agent of Swisher County and Mike Ferguson, member service advisor of Swisher Electric Cooperative.

The program has been organized and is sponsored by Swisher County Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service and Swisher Electric Cooperative.

Registration will begin at 8 a.m. with coffee and donuts. The program which starts at 9 a.m. will conclude before noon when a free barbecue lunch will be hosted by Swisher Electric Cooperative to those in attendance.

Some of the featured speakers will be Quinton Colwell, Consulting Electrical Engineer, Lubbock, on projected electric rates and increasing growth of irrigation load on electrical cooperatives and utilities.

Terry McEachern, an irrigator who has ample water supply, and John Herring, an irrigator who has limited water resources, will speak on water management practices that have worked for them.

Joe Denny, a research specialist with Valley Grain Products in Muleshoe will discuss water application according to the needs of the crops and the use of tensionmeters.

Leon New, Ag Engineer with the Area Extension Service, will speak on improving the performance of irrigation pumps and demonstrating that improved performance may pay the cost of repairs.

Jerry Walker, Ag Engineer with the U.S. Soil Conservation Service in Amarillo will discuss services available to irrigators to determine the performance of their irrigation pumps.

The program will conclude with Swisher Electric discussing pump performance tests available to members of the cooperative.

Area irrigators are cordially invited and urged to be present.

Turn-out was light in Saturday's election to name two members to the board of education of Hart schools, a mayor and one city commissioner.

Some 178 voters marked ballots in the trustee election which returned Neoma Wall and Harold Bob Bennett to office.

Bill Ritter, candidate for the mayor's post, won his sought-for office with 123 votes. Jerri Horton and Benny Martinez Jr. were asking election to the seat on the city commission previously held by Ritter. Mrs. Horton received 93 votes; Martinez, 37.

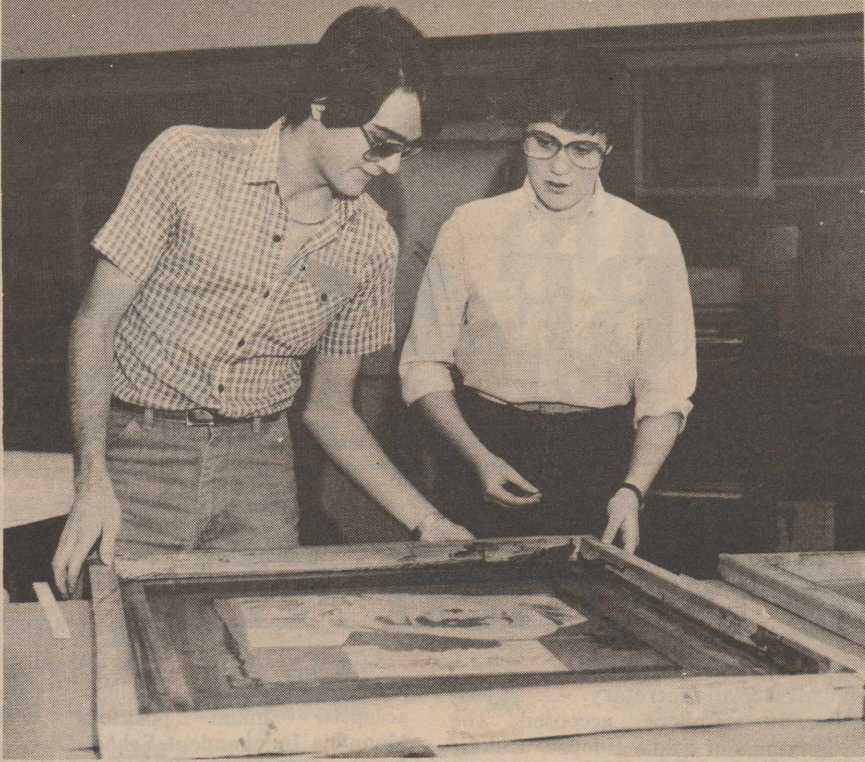
The second film is titled, "Shaping the Will Without Breaking the Spirit," and deals with the inappropriate use of anger to motivate.

Summer Basketball Camp Scheduled During June

Applications for the 1981 Flying Queens Summer Basketball Camp at Wayland Baptist College are now being accepted, according to Cathy Wilson, camp director.

Three week-long camps are scheduled: June 7-13, June 14-20, and June 21-27. Enrollment is limited to 135 youngsters each week.

"We still have a few vacancies all three weeks, but each session fills up by April every year," noted Wilson, who is head coach of Wayland's Flying Queens basketball team.

Girls between the fifth grade through high school are eligible to attend any of the sessions. However, Texas UIL rules prohibit high school girls who compete on any varsity athletic teams from participating in summer camps.

In addition to Wilson, this year's camp staff will include Rachelle Wilcox, assistant women's coach at WBC, several outstanding area coaches and members of the Flying Queens team.

Campers will be housed in modern residence halls on the Wayland campus. Members of the Flying Queens will serve as dorm counselors, and

meals will be prepared by an experienced staff and served in Wayland's modern dining hall.

Cost for each session is \$100 per camper and covers tuition, room, meals, insurance, entertainment, and a personalized camp T-shirt. A \$40 deposit is required with the application.

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Former Youth Director Granted Scholar Award

Wayland Baptist College senior Jerry Travis, former youth director of First Baptist Church, has been granted a Rice-Judson Scholar Award for the 1981-82 school year by The Southern Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky.

The award is made annually to incoming students on the basis of scholarship, leadership and commitment to ministry. Dr. David Jester, Wayland president and a graduate of the Seminary, recommended Travis for the award.

SPICY SAUCE FOR SPAGHETTI

1/2 c chopped onions
1 lb. ground beef
4 (8 oz. cans) tomato sauce
1 (6 oz. can) tomato paste
1 small can whole tomatoes
1/2 T parsley
1 tsp. salt
Pepper to taste
Garlic powder to taste
Saute chopped onions. Add to browned beef. Add sauce and paste. When blended thoroughly; add tomatoes. Cook for about 10 minutes. Then add rest of ingredients. Simmer for 30 minutes. Serve with spaghetti noodles.

ALMOND-CREAM CAKE

3/4 c heavy cream
2 T almond flavoring
1 Sara Lee pound cake (cut lengthwise in 3 layers)
2 med-size ripe bananas, peeled and sliced
2 T sliced unblanched almonds or chopped nuts

In medium bowl beat cream and almond flavoring until soft peak form. Place bottom layer of pound cake on serving platter. Spread one third of cream mixture on layer; top with half the banana slices. Repeat with remaining layers, ending with whipped cream. Sprinkle with almonds.

BLACK-EYED PEA CASSEROLE

1 lb. pork sausage
1 med. onion, (chopped)
1 clove garlic, minced
2 (16 oz.) cans black-eyed peas (frozen can also be used)
1 (16 oz. can) tomatoes
1/4 c water
1 tsp. chili powder
1/4 tsp. pepper

Crumble sausage in skillet. Cook until done. Drain well. Stir in onion and garlic. Saute 3-5 minutes. Stir in remaining ingredients and simmer 1 hour.

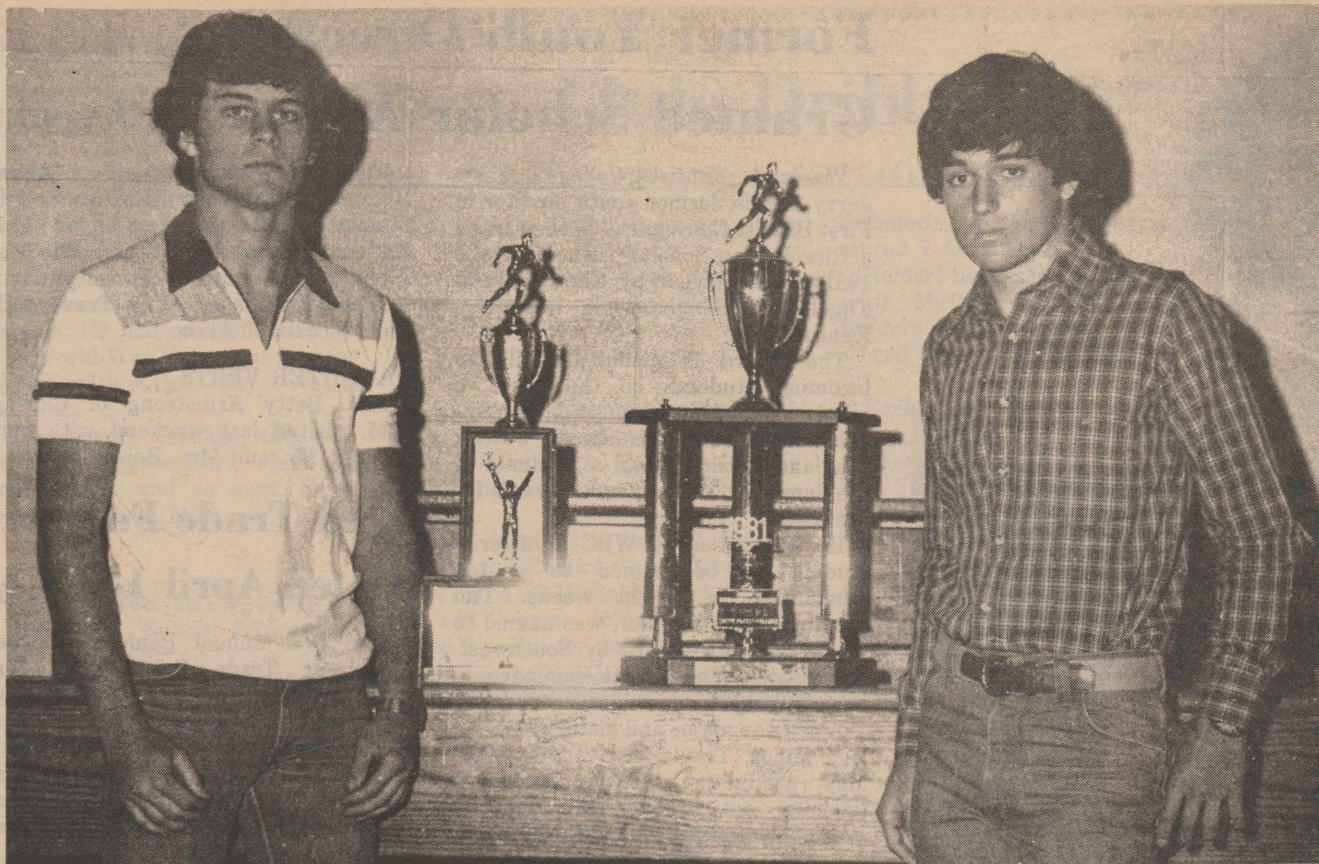

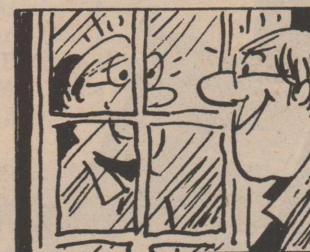
The great Duomo Cathedral of Milan, begun in 1386, contains the world's largest stained glass windows.

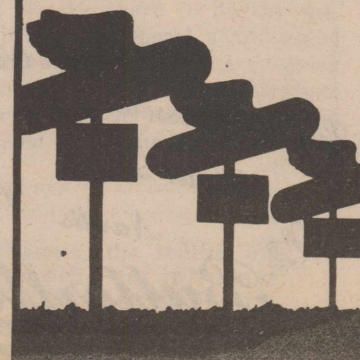

REC Financing Defended

By the Management of Swisher Electric Cooperative, Inc.

The present REA loan program was established in May, 1973. It represented a dramatic change from the previous REA direct loan program involving annual appropriations at an established two percent interest rate. The new ERA program is of two types: insured loans and guaranteed loans.

All INSURED loans which provide all REA financing for distribution facilities (such as Swisher Electric) are made from a special Revolving Fund - most at five percent interest. Some two percent money is still borrowed by cooperatives meeting rigid standards set by Congress.

Repayments of all interest and principal on outstanding REA loans flow into the Revolving Fund and represent the source of advances on new insured loans. Any interest differential created by management of incoming and outgoing funds is paid from the Revolving Fund.

The GUARANTEED loans account for 85 percent of total REA financing.

To obtain a loan guarantee to finance a power project, a Generation and Transmission Cooperative (there are none in the Texas Panhandle) submits to REA the extensive documents required in support of the project. After review, REA agrees to guarantee the project, which is the equivalent to their co-signing the loan.

The funding of the REA loan guarantees is beneficially provided by the Federal Financing Bank (established in 1973 to coordinate the various government agency and agency-backed financing activities.)

The Federal Financing Bank (FFB) actually obtains its funds from the U.S. Treasury and pays the full costs the Treasury incurs on its borrowings. The FFB then adds one-eighth of one percent above the Treasury costs; thus, the Generating and Transmission borrower pays the full cost-plus on the REA loan guarantees.

It should be noted that repayments of loans plus interest are all current - there has been no defaults. In fact, in the history of the REA program only some \$40,000 has been charged off.

Public Notice

The Hart Independent School District tax office is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions. The deadline for filing is April 30, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the homeowner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in this school district on January 1 of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of the homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older or who is disabled can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary.

"Disabled," in this case, refers to the definition found in the Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance Act under the Social Security Administration. Disability is defined as inability to engage in any substantial gainful employment which exists in the national economy, or, in the case of someone who is 55 and blind, inability by reason of such blindness to engage in the employment in which he was previously engaged. THE PERSON CLAIMING DISABILITY DOES NOT NECESSARILY HAVE TO BE DRAWING BENEFITS FROM SOCIAL SECURITY.

Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all homeowners who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did not receive an application, or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the school tax office at 938-2143.

Application forms may also be picked up at the tax office at Hart High School, Box 487, Hart, Texas 79043.

TLC FOR SHRUBS

There are some symptoms on some of our evergreen shrubs around town that one should not confuse. On junipers, cedars, and cypress shrubs there is some freeze damage showing up which appears as a growing of the extremities all over the bush except near something warm like a house. On the other hand, several of the same type plants have needle cast infections. The difference will be that the needle cast growing of tips will slowly spread over a bush while freeze damage should uniform over the bushes at one time. The treatments are somewhat different also, freeze damage just needs water, a little fertilizer and TLC, while needle cast requires three applications of a copper based fungicide.

BLOAT PROBLEMS!

Producers have run out of feed and leaving these cattle on wheat these extra couple of weeks has gotten some in trouble. Bloat has become a real problem and if we don't get some poloxalena in these cattle soon, it is just going to get worse. Some producers have lost two or three while others have come out in the morning to find more than a dozen dead. There are several ways to get the poloxalena into the animals with the major problems getting enough there to do the job. Either in a loose mineral, a cottonseed meal, milo, salt mix, or in a molasses block are all methods of administration. Which ever gets the needed amount in every head is the one suited for your needs.

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TORNADOS

If one struck, would you
know what to do?

Tornados respect no geographic boundaries. Over the last five years 4,245 tornados have touched down in 46 different states. While they can occur anytime, March through August are considered the "danger" months. State Farm Fire and Casualty, a major home insurer, offers the following suggestions to help you get ready for the coming tornado season:

GETTING PREPARED

■ Know how to get emergency weather information in your community and know what it means.

- A National Weather Service "tornado watch" means conditions are right for tornados to form.
- A "tornado warning" means a tornado has been sighted, take cover.
- Most communities use sirens or horns to warn of a tornado sighting; know what your system is and what it means.

■ Plan and practice what your family will do in case of a tornado.

- Have a prearranged place in your home (basement if you have one or in interior room or under stairway if you don't) to go for shelter.
- If you're in a mobile home, get out. If a shelter is available, go to it. If not, lie in a ditch or other depression.
- If you're in a car, get out. Lie in a ditch or other low area.

■ Be sure you have the right kind of insurance and enough of it to cover all damage a tornado could do.

- Make an inventory of everything in your house and keep it in a safe place away from home (like a safe deposit box). It will be a great help in speeding payment for your losses.

IF IT HAPPENS

■ Cooperate fully with law enforcement and disaster service officials. Check your local news media for instructions and information on emergency services available.

■ Notify your insurance agent of your loss as soon as possible. He can advise you what to do next.

■ Stay with your property to guard against vandalism or looting until law enforcement agencies organize protection.

- Protect against additional damage, board up broken windows or holes in the walls or roof; cover or otherwise protect furnishings from further damage by rain or wind. If necessary, have utilities turned off to prevent damage from explosion or fire.

■ Don't be rushed into signing repair contracts. Fly-by-night repairmen often prey on tornado victims. Be sure you know with whom you're dealing. Your insurance agent or adjuster should be able to help; or ask your Better Business Bureau or friends or relatives to recommend someone.

■ Keep receipts for all repairs and additional living expenses. Most homeowners insurance contracts will reimburse these costs; casualty losses exceeding \$100 that aren't reimbursed are generally tax deductible.

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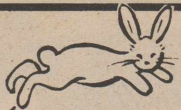
