YANKEE SEIGE GUNS THUNDER TO SECOND WIN

MATADORS PRACTICE PET PLAYS FOR USE IN FROG CONTEST

PIPGRASS HURLS STEADY BRAND OF BALL

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 6. (AP)—A tall, sturdy-limbed youth, twirling his first World's Series game with the coolness of an Alexander and the skill of a Matheson, tied the Pirates into a variety of how knots today and pitched the Yankees to their second straight victory.

Just as though he had been doing this sort of thing all his life, George Pipgrass of St. Louis, Minn., stepped into the spotlight glare of baseball's greatest classic held the slugging Buccaneers to seven hits scattered in six many innings, and led the National League champions to the decisive game of 102.

Steamroller Strikes Twice
Behind such brilliant mound work as this, the Yankee steamroller didn't need to do much exertion. There was no home run force to its drive but it struck twice, in the third and eighth inning with sufficient power to bring in three runs each time and move the Yankees into commanding lead as the battle scene shifted to the home field of the American League champions in New York.

Vic Aldridge attempted the task of checking the Yankees and putting the Pirates back in the fight but met the same fate as Ray Koenig. Outside of two had innings the Hoosier schoolmaster did a fairly good job but those two lapses were enough to convince him, as well as the pirate board of strategy that curve balls are not as much poison to the Yankees, as they had figured.

Curves Badly Battered
Vic's best-looking curves were shelled for three runs, enough to decide the game, in the third inning on four hits, two sacrifice flies and an error by Lloyd Waner. Aldridge was finally knocked out of the box in the eighth as he lost control completely, sending one run in with a wild pitch, and filling the bases with two successive passes, before yielding to Mike Cuyler.

The situation was anything but encouraging here to the little south-saw as he faced the top four of the Yankee batting order, but he escaped with only one hit and two runs being registered, the forcing the home-run, strike, bunt and Gehrig, to rap father-weakly to the infield for three outs.

Pipgrass Steady
While Aldridge was erratic in the box and the pirates were again displaying defensive weakness, Pipgrass struck steadily and effectively, by as well as a pitching job as the World's Series has witnessed in some time. Except for the ubiquitous Waner brothers and the sturdy center stander, Gehrig's double against the right field wall, Meusel's scratch single, and Luzzari's sacrifice fly to Paul Waner produced the third run.

Settling down, Aldridge permitted only two hits, both in the sixth and in the eighth, four straight innings, but he blew up with a loud report on the eighth. The Yankee batter completely around in this inning and the bases seemed to be full every time a Pirate twirler looked around.

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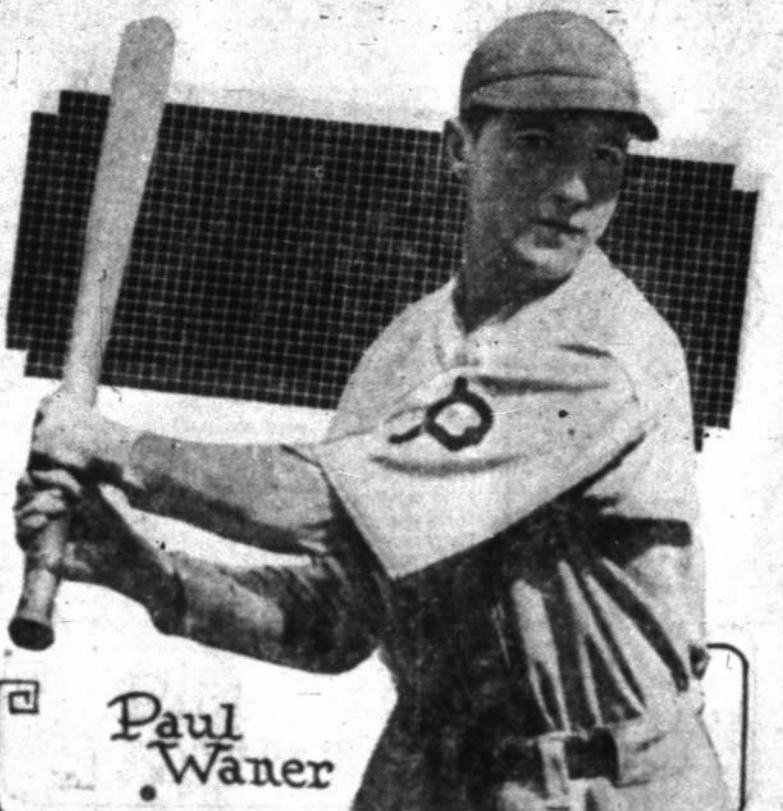
Crowd Wants KICK

They were sure in the field, summing up Pipgrass perfectly, good on the bases and powerful at bat when opportunities arose. The all-around snappy play of the New Yorkers was in special contrast with the lumpy work of their rivals.

Pirates Rattled
The Pirates do not appear to have regained their stride or recovered from the reactionary effects of their terrible National League pennant fight. Unless they steady down and recover their batting eyes they are not likely to extend the Yankees who now have visions of rattling off four straight and equalling the record of the Boston Braves in 1915.

The Yankees have had quiet a quantity hit since the series started but it hasn't effected their playing. Ray Koenig, who was a doubtful starter today because of a strained wrist was brilliant in the field as

PEACE IN EUROPE

All of Europe seems to be making rapid progress back to normal life. There is evidence of prosperity in all sections, and fewer people seem idle. Heretofore, armies of beggars besieged you, but this summer I have not seen as many as I see at home. Reconstruction following the awful war is very rapid. The most of this prosperity comes from what these nations get out of tourists and business they are doing with other nations. They have raised prices on everything and cheap travel over there is a thing of the past.

Taxes are high and the people burdened with the demands of their governments. All the governments seem to be improving and the future would be promising but for one great menace. That menace is war—the age-long deadly enemy of Europe. Not that the people, or even the rulers, really want war. They are straining all their resources to build up their armies, because they are afraid of their enemies and neighbors. The greatest blessing that could come to Europe would be for some organization to make these nations believe they are in no danger from enemy nations destroying them. They have suffered much and have not yet come to believe other nations can be trusted. The League of Nations has not created this confidence. Many think this distrust of the League is largely because we have not been in it. The opinion prevails that the League will work when peace is here, but when war clouds loom it will be powerless and ignored by nations making conflict.

Europe is restless, nervous and suspicious. She needs abiding peace—a peace that makes the poor people believe they are safe from attack. Unless something can bring this assurance Europe will not be done with war. We have seen before that armies trained and reviewed will after awhile be in conflict. Constant drilling and preparation for war cannot long continue without actual war. It doesn't take grave causes to produce war. In 1914 a pistol shot from an irresponsible youth killed a useless prince and hurried the world into war that mustered armies of beggars besieged you, but this summer organized effort is successful in creating confidence among the people such another incident may cause another conflict.

Europe is hungry for peace, if that peace could come. The people seem eager to build up their countries along all lines. They are improving along commercial, civic and moral lines. There is far less evidence of immorality. Drinking of liquor is decreasing and soft drinks are supplanting strong drink in social circles. The European women are not now as shocking in dress and manners as many American women. The one big thing Europe needs to insure her progress and stability is permanent peace. What a blessing it would be if the Prince of Peace could get in the hearts of these nations and cause them to love and trust one another.

OF TO THE FROG-POND

Before this paper is issued again the Matadors will be on their way to Fort Worth, where they will mix up with the Frogs of the Texas Christian University. Last year the Matadors suffered defeat at the hands of the Frogs but this year the Tech team is going to give them a fight for the game.

Cheered by a 13 to 6 victory over the feared St. Edward's team, the Texas Tech Matadors went to work with determination this week in anticipation of the grilling battle of the week-end with T. C. U. The Matadors, in wrestling victory from the Catholics for the second straight year, showed a remarkable comeback. In the opening moments of last Saturday's

game, a blocked Tech punt gave St. Edwards the ball on the Matadors' three-yard line. A series of line rushes carried the oval across and before the game had really started the Tech lads were trailing by 6 points.

With such a handicap, however, the Black and Red eleven battled back, putting across a score in the third quarter and one in the second to pinch victory. Furthermore, they flashed an offense in the second half that literally swept the plucky Catholics off their feet.

Though the Tech lads hardly have hopes of winning from T. C. U., in view of the surprising power displayed by the Frogs in battling Texas University to a standstill—they have well grounded visions of at least holding the Fort Worth team to a decent score, and they can see an outside chance for victory.

Coach Freeland was somewhat pleased with the form flashed by his men in Saturday's game, noting a decided improvement from the play in the first game of the season, which was a setup contest with the Panhandle Aggies.

There was more interference on the part of the backfield, smoother line play, and more co-ordination between the backfield and the line.

T. C. U. is not just certain that she will be able to down the Matadors, and with a chance of breaks in their favor the aggregation from the Texas Tech may bring back frog legs in abundance, and the people of this section are at least expecting that they show the Fort Worth folks a real game of football.

IMMIGRATION BAN

Renewal of the bitter fight waged last winter over the proposal to apply quota plan restrictions on immigration from Canada and the Latin-American countries is one of the certainties of the coming session of congress.

Representative Box (democrat, Texas), who first suggested extension of the quota system to countries of the western hemisphere in 1925, has announced that he will re-introduce his bill in the coming session, and Harry E. Hull, commissioner-general of immigration, is preparing to recommend legislation embracing features of the Box proposal.

Trade unions, farmers' organizations, women's organizations, social service agencies and citizens' associations—particularly in the southwest and middle west, where the effects of the Mexican influx have been most noticeable—asserting that ever-increasing immigration from Latin-America is defeating the purpose of the restrictive immigration laws, are vigorously supporting the move to raise the barriers.

Equally active in opposition to any further restriction are the railroads, which depend largely on Mexican labor for their construction and maintenance work, the lumber and mining industries and the operators of large ranches and farms in Texas, California, New Mexico, Arizona and Colorado.

The opponents of restriction minimize the social problems created by the Mexicans and contend that their labor is indispensable to agriculture and industry in the southwest. Limitation of Mexican entry would "create stagnation and be of incalculable injury to the industries of the west," according to a resolution adopted by the National Wool Growers' Association in 1925.

And drastic restriction on immigration from Canada and the enactment of legislation practically prohibiting immigration from Mexico, Central South America, would greatly enhance the temptation for aliens to enter the United States illegally. To prevent their entry absolutely would require constant watch of thousands of miles of northern and southern boundary—a physical impossibility, according to opponents of the plan, unless the personnel of the immigration service were very largely increased and expenditures correspondingly enlarged.

SURTAXES SHOULD BE MORE FAIRLY DISTRIBUTED

There are prospects of a considerable tax-cut, after all. In spite of the needs of flood-relief and possibly appropriations for agricultural financing, the estimates for tax-reductions range from 300 millions up. The important thing is that something more of the tax burdens is to be taken off. Substantial agreement seems to have been reached in both parties that the corporation tax, left stationary in the last tax-revision, shall be reduced. Also that changes shall be made in the surtax, but as to what the changes shall be there is divergent opinion. If the maximum rate can be lowered and a more equitable distribution of surtaxes made at the same time, well and good. But it is more important that changes in the distribution should be made if both can not be accomplished. As the rates now stand, the intermediate incomes are assessed out of proportion. This fact is acknowledged by everyone familiar with the schedule. When the rates on the higher incomes were reduced and the rates on the smaller incomes changed so as to exempt, or assess at a very low rate, the small incomes, little was done for those paying intermediate incomes. As this fact is manifest, there should be no partisan politics in making the adjustment. The apportionment of revenue is one thing and the fair distribution of the burden is another.

Since the visit of the Prince of Wales to this Canadian ranch a month or more ago, some of the good folk of the Dominion have begun to regret the passing of the custom of granting titles to Canadians, which ceased in 1917 at the request of the Ottawa Government. It appears that there are wealthy gentlemen with socially ambitious women in their families, to whom this would be comforting and useful. In fact before the "title" went into effect many applied for titles in a charmingly straightforward manner, even writing requests to the prime minister. However, it appears that for the present those who are urging the Government to restore the granting of titles are deemed to be disappointed. Since the Government has declined its intention of giving titles to honor Canadians with places on the next New Year's list, when elevations to the peerage and various "promotions" are announced. The only way a Canadian can stay on the side of the name and sound a little bit of a note is to petition a department in Washington, or at the Laborer point, and then persuade the Newfoundland Government that he is the one person in the world who ought to be rewarded with a title.

YOUR HEALTH

Since the feeding of human beings has become the new science of dietetics, all sorts of information is being offered to the public that has hardly yet begun to realize that some things are only theory, some are old wives tales and some are based on unscientific assumptions. I have never even studied the basic facts of chemistry, physiology and biology on which the science of dietetics rests. This one item recently published asserts that asparagus may be used as a test of the kidney function. It is said to control the heat of the heart, that it stimulates the kidneys and will help Bright's disease. This is on a part with the notion that fish and oysters are brain foods.

Science Refuted Idea

Actually there is not the slightest reason for believing that asparagus will do any of these things and the recognition of the odor of some of the by-products of asparagus in the excretions is not a test of kidney function any further than to show that the kidneys are there and that they do function.

Asparagus is of course an excellent vegetable for many purposes in the diet. It may be used as the basis of soups and fits well into salads. Twenty large stalks of asparagus eight inches long provide some hundred calories. They will weigh about 10 ounces. About 25 per cent of the amount of solid matter will be protein, 1 per cent will be fat and 60 per cent carbohydrate. Asparagus has been used as a food for at least two thousand years. More than twelve million bunches are sold every year in the United States.

STATE AID

Having a total of 5564 scholars, Tom Green county schools will receive \$23,468 from the state department of education, according to T. W. Paine, county superintendent of schools. The apportionment of \$15 per capita this year is the largest in the history of Texas.

The city schools of San Angelo, with a total of 2354 students will receive \$35,310 from the state department of education, five-eighths of the total amount that will be distributed to the schools within Tom Green county.

The common school districts, composed of all the county schools with the exception of the independent districts of Christoval and Water Valley, will receive \$28,208 for the 2024 children between the ages of seven and 14.

Christoval, with 146 scholars, will be allotted \$2,190 and Water Valley, with 146 scholars, will receive \$2,190 at the \$15 per capita rate.

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Factories

One of the vital needs of the South and Texas particularly is more industries, more factories. The South has its industries centralized and there is a few spots of comparatively small areas for the production of industries could be brought into the state and scattered throughout our strictly rural sections. It would not only help Texas as a whole, but Texas agriculture as well. Our development has been one-sided. We are in much need for our own industries. We need the balancing, evening up effect that the development of industry would give. It is not so important that we have more industries in Dallas, or Houston, or Fort Worth; we need them in San Saba, in Pecos, in Dickens, and other of our strictly rural counties.

Dr. H. A. Morgan, president of the University of Tennessee, has made a survey, the results of which show quite conclusively that wherever industry has been decentralized and distributed over the rural sections, the people have more public revenues available, lower tax rates, increased value of agricultural products and property, better educational advantages for children, life in every way richer, deeper, better worth the living.

Dr. Morgan has taken 45 of the richest counties in each state in the Union and compared them with 15 of the poorest counties in each state on a basis of assessed valuation of property, value added by manufacturing, city population, county tax rate, and native white literacy. On an average the 15 richest counties have an assessed value of 14 times as great as the poor counties, 29 times as much value added by manufacturing, and 60 times as many people living in towns and cities. Furthermore, the average county tax rate of these 15 richest counties is 18 cents as compared with a small area of the poorest counties, while the per cent of native white literacy in the rich counties is 71 per cent as compared with 44 percent in the poorest counties. In every case where the survey was made, it was found that people were better off where there is a fairly good balance between agriculture and industry.

This does not mean that we must neglect the welfare of agriculture and make a play for industrial development at the expense of agriculture. It does not mean that it is good policy for a county to displace its country agent or its assistant county agent and put money into an industrial bureau of its chamber of commerce. But it does mean that we must recognize the fact that our growth has been too strictly rural, and that industry should be encouraged to come into the section in order that we may even up and balance our development. But let manufacturing industries acquire local Texas should not allow undue favoritism to the manufacturing industry by tax exemption of various kinds.

Agriculture is the big thing in Texas and it will continue to be our fundamental industry for many years to come. But it would be better for all concerned, if manufacturing plants were scattered over the state as is the case in Ohio. For example, let's endeavor to help our countrymen in agriculture, but also work for more industrial development.—Progressive Farmer.

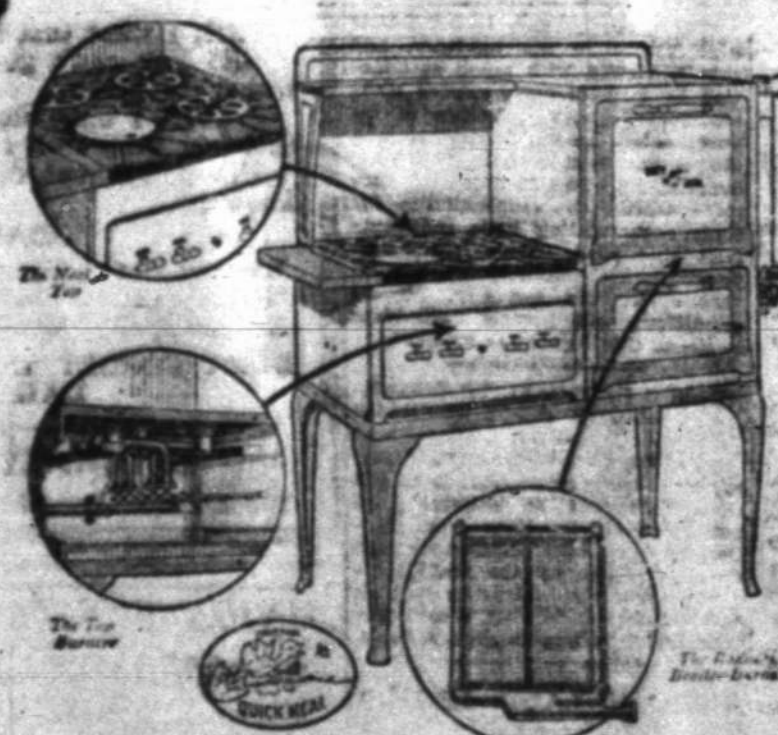

Alvin White, Slaton Farmer, Leaves Out Cotton And Reaps Neat Profit From Raising Of Sorghum And Poultry

SLATON, Oct. 6. — An average net profit of \$200.00 each month for three months of the year is the experience of Alvin White, farmer here, who excluded cotton from his farm program this year and devoted his efforts to grain sorghum and poultry.

On account of dry weather through the spring months, White did not plant until after June 10. At that time he planted 120 acres in milo maize and hogra. At the same time he acquired 4000 baby chicks and turned them loose on a small field of green pasture. The chicks were furnished by a local hatchery on a 25-50 basis for division of profits with White. The grain crops are producing abundantly. One hundred tons of milo has been harvested, having an estimated value of \$1,500.00. The hogra crop is valued at \$500.00. Out of the 4000 chickens, 2200 were reared and their sale netted White \$500.00 excluding expense items.

From the grain and chickens a total income of \$2500.00 is being received, while only \$75.00 is to be deducted from that amount as expense in cultivating the hogras. This leaves a net return of \$2425.00 which White expects to realize, and he only spent three weeks in the grain crops, having merely the chickens to require his attention.

STANDARD OIL IS LEAVING TAMPIOCO

ORDER REMOVAL OF ALL THE EQUIPMENT TO PLACE IT AT BEAMONT

(By Associated Press) BEAUMONT, Oct. 6. — Withdrawal of all producing and refining equipment now standing and in storage at Tampico, Mexico has been ordered out by the Standard Oil company of New York. It was learned at the offices of the Magnolia Petroleum company here, from E. W. Gross, purchasing agent.

Equipment to be removed is the property of the New England Fuel company and the Continental Mexican Petroleum company, both subsidiaries of the Standard Oil company. Both companies had practically suspended operation for some months, but today's order was the first indication that the Standard

was planning to leave the Mexican field permanently.

The move was credited generally to the burden placed on petroleum by the southern republic's export tax, which, when added to transportation costs, makes it difficult to deal profitably with the Tampico production. The present revolution had nothing to do with the order, it was said.

All equipment will be brought to Beaumont to be reconditioned. Its value is reported to be in excess of \$250,000. This, however, is no indication of the total value of Standard holdings, as much material has already been withdrawn and huge sums remain invested in oil lands.

An office force will be left at Tampico to handle matters relating to these holdings and other business that may arise with Mexican land laws, it was added.

U. S. TO SUPERVISE NICARAGUAN VOTE

REGISTRATION AS WELL AS BALLOTING WILL BE INSPECTED

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—Secretary Kellogg today assured Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee that the American government not only would supervise the next August presidential election in Nicaragua but also the registration of voters in advance.

"Supervising means not merely the preservation of order at the time of the election," Secretary Kellogg wrote, "but a sufficient count over the preliminary steps, including registration, to see that everybody entitled to vote has an opportunity to register."

"In other words, the registration is vital. We can not, of course, contemplate the holding of an election in Nicaragua on the basis of previous registration. So far as the department and general commissioner (President Coolidge's special commission to Nicaragua) are concerned, this matter seems as vital to us as it does to you. You may depend upon it that every effort will be made on our part to eliminate fraud and intimidation and to guarantee to every citizen of Nicaragua his rights in this matter."

Ordinance requiring payment of License Fee of \$36.00 per annum in advance as condition to right to do business of Master Plumber in City of Lubbock, Texas; Fixing penalty for violation, and declaring an emergency.

Section 1: That from and after the taking effect of this Ordinance a license fee of \$36.00 per annum shall be paid in advance by every Master Plumber before doing business as such in the City of Lubbock, Texas.

Section 2: That should any Master Plumber violate the foregoing provision, or do business of Master Plumbing in said city without payment of said license fee in advance, shall be fined not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00 for each and every day of such violation.

Section 3: That there is a public necessity and emergency that this ordinance take effect from and after its passage because of the necessity of preserving the public health, and it is so ordered.

KANSAN EMULATES J. FRANK NORFLEET

SPIVEY FARMER TAKES TRAIL
OF MEN WHO FLEECED HIM
OF HIS SAVINGS

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 6.—Emulating J. Frank Norfleet, doughty Texan, who followed a confidence-gang that reeled him of a fortune until he had placed them all behind bars, J. A. Taden of Spivey, Kas., came to police headquarters here on the trail of two men who had swindled him, May 1, in Kansas City, of \$6,000 on a fake stock market deal.

The story he told the police here is the old story of the country man coming to the city, meeting two "good fellows" who give him a chance to double his money on inside tips on the market—and disillusionment. In its details it almost exactly resembles Norfleet's experience. As related by Taden to the chief of police here, it is as follows:

Met Pleasant Stranger

"I had business in Kansas City last May, and while I was walking along one of the principal streets there, a stranger accosted me and struck up an acquaintance.

"We decided to take a walk and while we were walking along, we met a friend of the man I just met. They greeted each other like long lost brothers. Both were well dressed and I thought they were big business men. The man I first met later said he had been a banker in Seattle, Washington, and introduced the second man as Burke, a member of the stock market with offices in Wall Street.

"He gave his own name as Temple, and after walking awhile, we all went to my hotel. While there I was further impressed by the manners of the banker. He seemed to be at his ease everywhere. Any subject we discussed he could converse about fluently. He told several war stories and his jargon of the sea was perfect. We met on and off for several days. Our new friend, the stock market man, arranged an appointment the third day. He said he had something good on the market.

An Inside Tip

"The banker became excited at that and said Burke was in a position to make us a lot of money. The following day we went to the hotel where Burke lived and he gave us an inside tip on the market.

"I did not put up any money. Burke said it wasn't necessary. The following morning Temple came to my room and said we had won \$20,000 but that Burke demanded we show that much credit.

"Later Burke joined us and said he would post \$6,000 and Temple said he had \$5,000 handy which he would put in. I wired home for the remaining \$5,000 and put that in to make up the balance.

"All the money was then placed in a bundle. Another good thing was suggested for the next day and we put all we had in it. We won \$150,000 on that deal and then we decided to play the market once more and quit.

On Wrong Stock

"After the market closed that evening, Temple burst into our room and said we had been "wiped out". Instantly the money was placed on the wrong stock.

"A fight between the two ensued. After they had broken all the furniture in the room, Burke suggested we go out and meet later in Galveston, to recoup our losses. Then, while I was still dazed by the sudden change in my fortunes, they left. I haven't seen them since."

Taden told the police here that the men were about 35 to 45 years old and that the "banker" was more than 6 feet 4 inches tall. After viewing the pictures in the Bertillon room at police headquarters, Taden started out to make another city in his quest for the swindlers. He said he would not rest until he had them behind the bars.

The story of J. Frank Norfleet, Hale Center ranchman, who made himself nationally famous as a detective by his rounding up of confidence men who had fleeced him, will begin in the Sunday Avalanche-Journal and will appear there after in issues of the Morning Avalanche Watch for it.

Canyon Becomes Famous As City Of The Flowers

(Special To The Avalanche)

CANYON, Oct. 6.—Canyon is fast becoming notable as a city of flowers. In the spring, thousands of tall, trailing vines of Holly and give rich color to gardens and lawns before the first green has appeared on the brown earth.

Verbena, violet, carnation, chrysanthemum, peonies, both double and single, great orange, red, lavender and rose similar, roses, cosmos, snapdragons and dahlias are growing in a riot of color. They furnish a courageous ending for a season which has been unusually dry.

Dahlias are the premier fall flower in Canyon. Two great beds of them in front of Cassin hall, a dormitory of the West Texas State Teachers college, furnish hundreds of blooms fine enough to take high places in any flower show. The colors range from white and delicate to yellows, through reds and pinks to brilliant red to reds we deem they are almost black.

Every business house, every school room, every home in Canyon uses the fall flowers for decoration and on Sunday the churches are beautified by great masses of them. The clubs of Canyon, including the Chamber of Commerce, have been instrumental in making the city notable for its lawns and flowers.

The population of Canyon is increasing so fast that 12,000 additional houses are required each year.

The Wilcox & Anderson, Gage No. 1 at Lemoor, eastern Brewster county was closed down at 1010 feet, waiting for casing at the last report.

The test being put down by J. M. Hickey and associates on the Kimball ranch near Titley station on the Orient, some 15 miles north of Alpine is expected to spud in this week. Hickey is also placing a rig on the ground how to begin drilling on the Jackson & Harmon ranch just east of Alpine near Strobel station on the S. P. It was reported.

The McIntyre well, six miles south of town, is reported closed down with a fishing job. Other drilling activities are expected to begin in the near future, according to current reports. Other leases will be signed up on lands near Alpine within the next few days, it is understood.

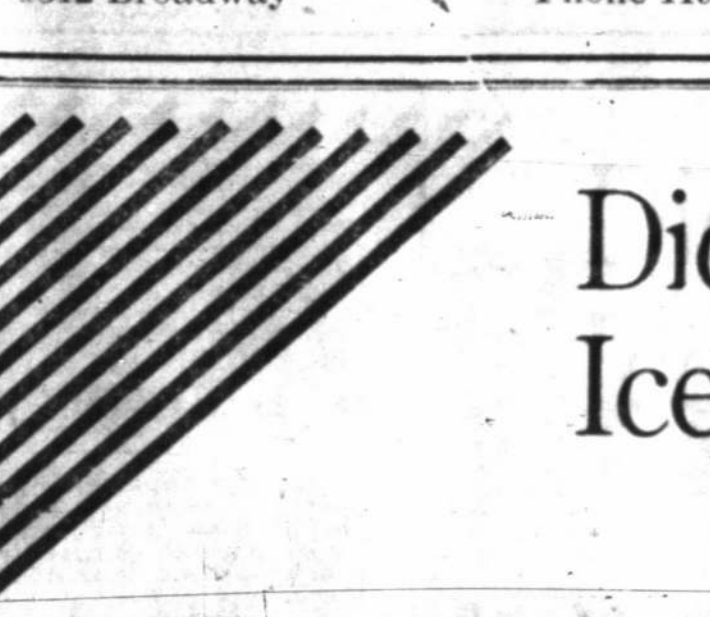

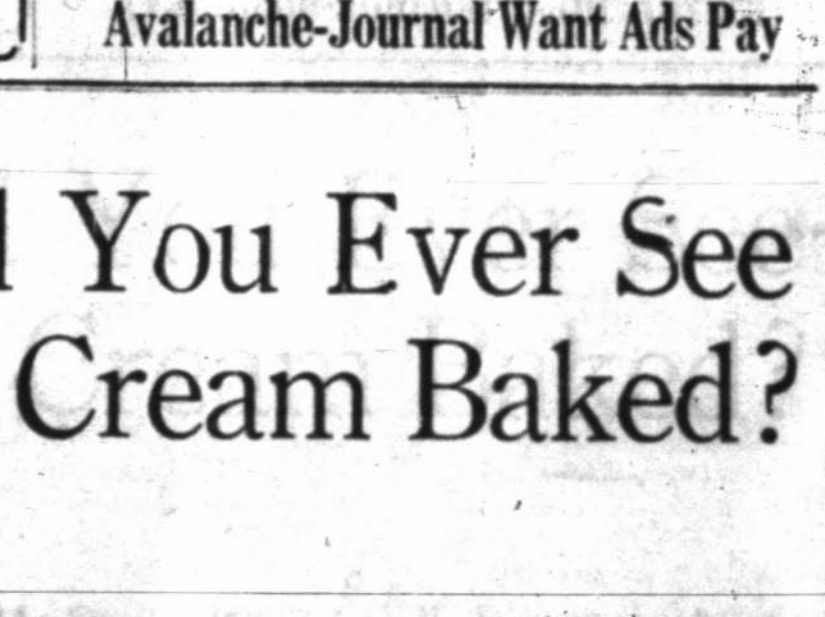

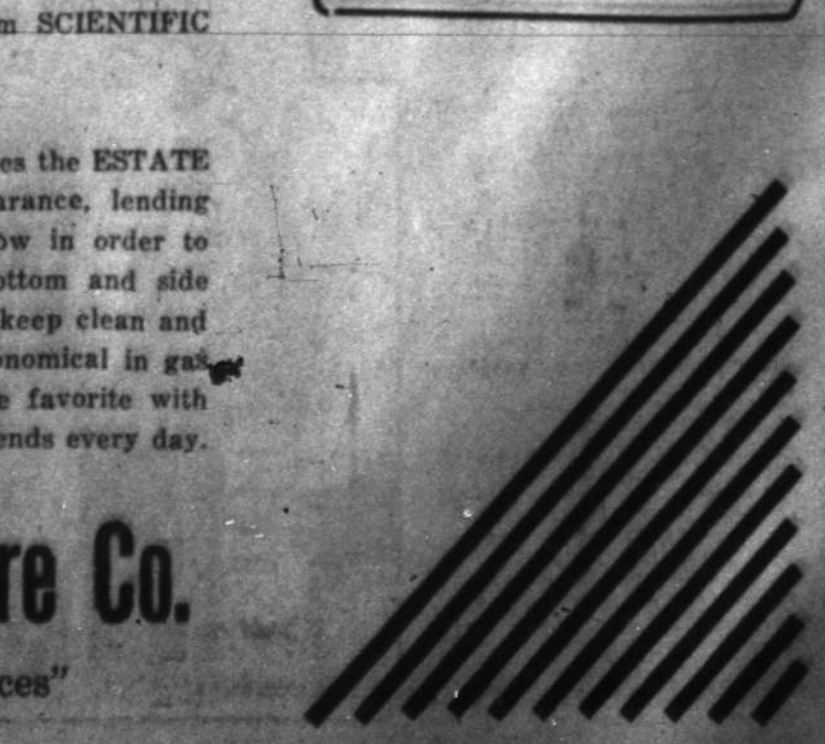
