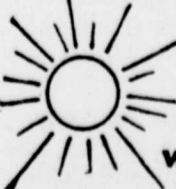

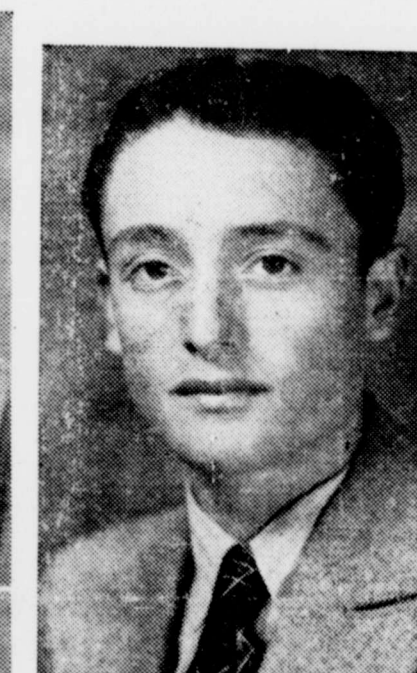
FOOD STAMP UNIT DUE FRIDAY
