Senate Considers Tariff Questions

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 1.—The Democratic-Independent Republican coalition still is master of the tariff situation today as the Senate devoted attention to the proposal that a duty be fixed on long staple cotton, now on the free list. The coalition has maintained numerical superiority through roll calls on lumber and oil tariff measures.

The proposal that crude oil be made dutiable at a dollar a barrel, and petroleum products at fifty per cent ad valorem, was defeated last night, and oil retained on the free list.

The Senate recessed today until Monday without taking up the Shortridge amendment for a tariff of seven cents a pound on long staple cotton.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—Blame for the delay in passage of the tariff bill was placed on the Democratic-Republican independent coalition by Senator Guy D. CofE, Republican, of West Virginia, who accused the group of obstructing the bill in order that during the coming elections blame for the business uncertainty might be saddled on the Republican party.

Boy Scout School To Start Monday

A school for Boy Scouts and Scout leaders will begin in Ballinger Monday night at 7:30 at the office of the chamber of commerce. This announcement was made Saturday by Scout leaders who are asking that a large number attend this school for the instruction and information it will give.

Ed Shumway, of Abilene, director of the Chisholm Trail Area, will be in active charge of the four-day school. Parents who are interested in the work and would like to know something of the instruction are especially urged to attend. The night session will not be long and will deal with matters of much importance to the local units.

One of the leaders stated Saturday morning that more men qualified to assist in Scout work here are sorely needed and it is hoped this school will be the means of getting some adult interested in scouting. Ballinger Scout troops are growing and if they continue to grow it will be compulsory that leaders be developed to take charge of additional units as they are organized.

The school is for advanced Scouts, Scoutmasters, parents and anyone who is interested in this phase of boys activities.

BLIND SOLON WOULD STOP STREET BEGGING

AUSTIN, March 1.—Blind beggars on the streets of Texas should be forced to cease their pleas for alms and be made to "go to work," Rep. Alin R. Van Zandt of Tioga, himself a blind man, told the house of representatives recently.

Van Zandt, in addition to being a member of the legislature has been a practicing attorney for many years.

His remarks were made during debate over a resolution which would have allowed two blind men to operate cold drink stands in the state capitol building and the land office, at Austin. These stands were removed by the legislature last spring.

"If people would stop patronizing blind beggars they would raise the standard of the blind in Texas immeasurably," Van Zandt declared. "Most of them are immigrants who have come from the North and East to take advantage of our mild winter climate."

"I would gladly join this house in passage of a bill which would force these beggars off our streets and make them engage in some useful occupation."

"In the name of the blind of this state, I resent the idea that those who have lost their eyesight should be made objects of charity."

The resolution as finally adopted, would require the state board of control to contract space for drink and lunch stands in state buildings here, after a survey has determined the needs of these buildings for such stands.

Taft is Improved; Fear it's Bad Sign

Mr. Dunn stated Saturday morning that all local football players of last season's team and candidates for the 1930 team would be admitted free to the concert.

Admission prices for the concert will be 25 cents for students and 50 cents for adults. All money taken in will go to the building fund of the hospital, it was announced.

Ex-Slave is Dead Of Heart Disease

DALLAS, Mar. 1.—Death has ended the servitude of an aged Dallas negro, who chose to remain in effect a slave for more than 60 years after President Lincoln set him free.

Bill was born a slave to the family of Mrs. Sarah H. Cockrell nearly a century ago, his exact age being unknown. He died a servant to Mrs. R. L. Kurth, Mrs. Cockrell's granddaughter. The aged negro left the premises of his "mistresses" only twice when the family moved at which time he took his only street car ride and again when an infected foot sent him to the hospital.

When the family attempted to give Bill money he passed it on to the children. He rebelled once—at milking a particularly unfriendly cow—and cut off his fingers. The coup did not work, however, as he amputated the fingers of his left hand rather than his right, the one with which he milked.

Bill died of heart failure. Members of the family attended the funeral which was conducted by Dr. Carl G. Gregory, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

NORTHINGTON BUILDING NEARING COMPLETION

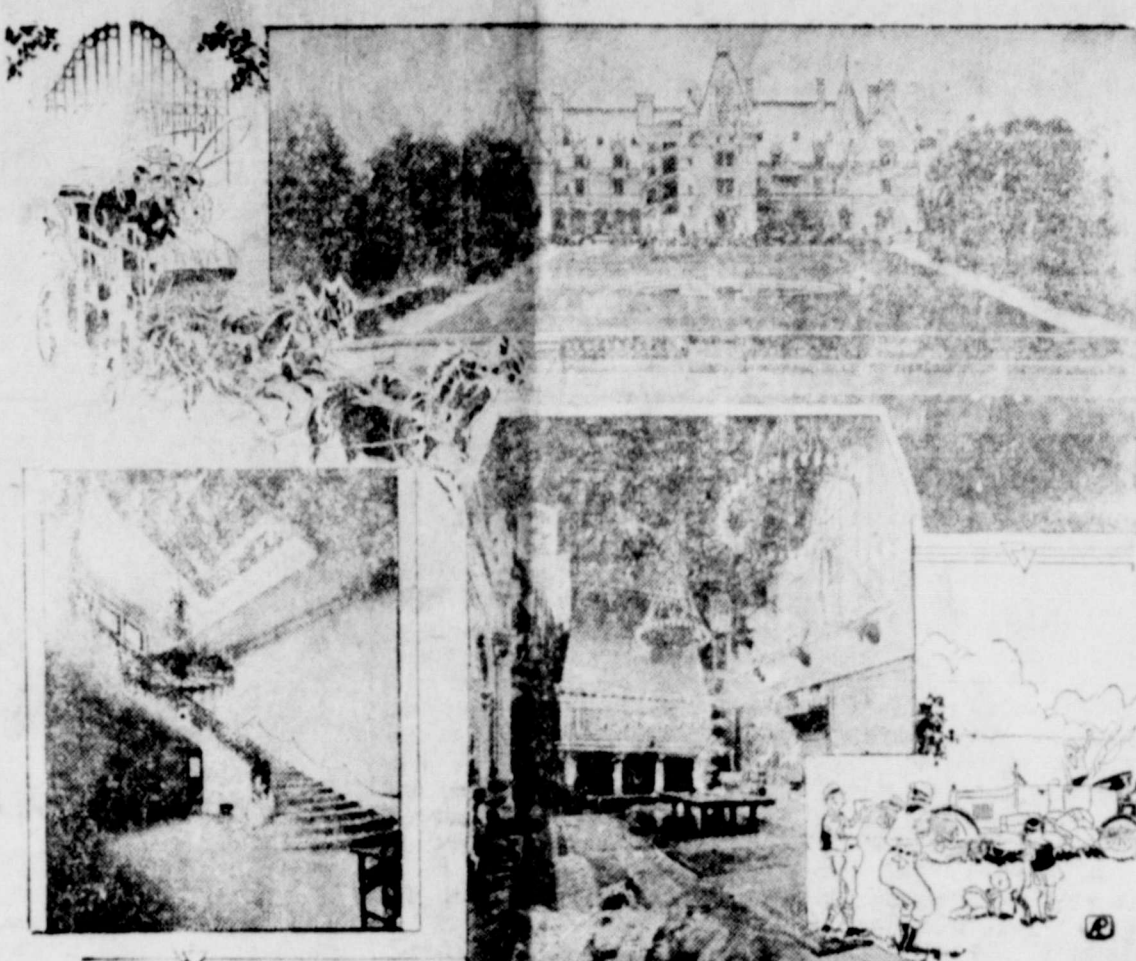

Vanderbilt's Daughter Asks Public To Share Finest Home in America

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Mar. 1.—The world famous mountain chateau of the late George W. Vanderbilt will be open to tourists for the first time this spring.

It is said to be the finest private residence and the most perfect example of French renaissance architecture in America. Its art treasures and furnishings are worth a king's ransom.

It now is the property of Mr. and Mrs. John Francis Cecil, the latter Vanderbilt's only child who are opening it to the public.

Three miles from Asheville, surrounded by virgin forest, Biltmore house stands on a mountain top

which was graded for the chateau. To build it took five years work by the most skillful artisans, artists, sculptors and decorators of America and Europe. It was finished in 1895.

Vanderbilt and his assistants roamed the world gathering treasures.

Paintings by Whistler, Sargent and Boldoni and matchless Flemish tapestries hang from the walls of the vast rooms. Two of Cardinal Richelieu's scarlet robes are there. A daintily carved chessboard that once helped Napoleon Bonaparte while away the hours at St. Helena is another treasure.

In the drawer of this chessboard, accounts have it, was

hidden Napoleon's heart, removed by a faithful surgeon-follower who feared he would never be taken back to his homeland.

Twenty thousand exquisitely bound volumes stand on carved shelves in the library. Its ceiling is a huge painting, purchased from an impoverished Italian nobleman, who insisted that the purchaser never reveal its origin.

The gardens are a monument to the skill of the late Frederick Law Olmsted, landscape artist who designed New York's Central Park.

The chateau, previously open only to house guests, will be opened to the public March 15.

WINNERS OF 4-H CLUB CONTEST ANNOUNCED

COLLEGE STATION, Mar. 1.—Winners of the three college scholarship awards in the annual Texas 4-H Club girls contest have been announced by Miss Bess Edwards, assistant state home demonstration agent of the Extension Service, A. & M. College of Texas, under the direction of which the contest is held.

They are: Hazel McShure of Wellington, Collingsworth county; and Mary Lee Black of Ferris, Ellis county; winners of scholarships awarded by the State Fair of Texas and Jewel Varley of Whitesboro, Grayson county, winner of the scholarship awarded by the state home demonstration association. Each scholarship is valued at \$300 and may be used at any state supported college or university. The scholarships will become available in September, 1930. The awards were made on the basis of the three highest records in third and four year 4-H Club work.

Texans to Make Tour of Cavern

WICHITA FALLS, Mar. 1.—Five native Texans, headed by Frank Ernest Nicholson, writer and explorer, are members of a party which will explore Carlsbad Caverns in New Mexico.

They will explore unknown recesses of the cavern. Many sections are open but several parts, including the "big room" never has been entered. The "big room" is believed to be as high as four or five ten-story buildings.

Howard Grubbs, football star with Texas Christian University last fall; Flody Ard, Jr., Geron Mandenhall and Miss Peggy Easterwood, the latter three of Wichita Falls, are in the exploring party. Nicholson is the son of Judge and Mrs. E. W. Nicholson of this city.

When actual exploration starts, one group of assistants will be with Nicholson at the lower base, about ten miles within the cavern. The outer base, on the outside of the cavern, will be their connection with civilization. Each person will carry his own food.

Search of the "big room" will occupy much of the party's time. A balloon will be inflated in it and by its use Nicholson hopes to reach the ceiling of the opening. Nicholson also has perfected an arrangement whereby he can lower his camera and flashlight take a picture, develop it and examine it before he enters the room.

A cave at Piestany, Czechoslovakia, will be the next goal of the explorers. The cave has attracted considerable attention because of a tradition that there are hidden jewels and gold within its depth, but has not been entered by natives because of a fear it is haunted.

Committee to Hear Dry Side Tuesday

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Drys said today they would wait until "the wet fling" is over before making public the witnesses they intend to marshal before the House judiciary committee in support of prohibition.

The wets end the presentation of the dark side of prohibition Tuesday, until when the drys' plans are expected to be kept secret. Reports have indicated that the drys will counter the wets' speakers—W. W. Atterbury and Pierre S. du Pont, financial leaders—with Henry Ford.

Cold Wave Sends Mercury Down

DALLAS, Mar. 1.—The traditional March lion arrived as scheduled for the greater part of Texas today on the heels of a strong north wind that sent temperatures tumbling in the northern section and parts of central and south Texas.

Cloudy skies prevailed in most sections of the state. South Texas reported rain. Near freezing temperatures are forecast for Port Arthur and vicinity today. Frost is predicted for the northern portion of the state.

MISS NEAL WILL BE CANDIDATE AGAIN

BALLINGER MAN EXPLAINS NEW COTTON AID PLAN

J. F. Hardin, whose headquarters are in Ballinger, was in San Angelo Wednesday in connection with a plan by which he expects to form a chain of bonded cotton warehouses through Texas. Mr. Hardin has not made application for his charter. He plans to set up one or more associations in every Texas cotton-growing county.

Under Mr. Hardin's plan, five or more farmers may organize and have their own board of directors and business agent, select their own bank and conduct their own affairs. The state executive would have an advisory council, one representative from each county cooperating. The general manager would be president and have exclusive management of the financial and sales agency for all locals in Texas.

The general management would give a copy of contract to all locals and agents, showing the process of operation on the 50-50 basis and every local would receive a share and divide according to the business done through the state office.

As a member of the organization each farmer would take his cotton tickets to the bonding agent and get \$75 a bale in cash and a certificate which guarantees him that his cotton will not be sold for less than the standard price fixed by the cotton council, based on the average cost throughout the cotton growing counties in the cotton belt. The members will receive all the net profit less one hundred dollars set aside every year to pay the revolving bonds at maturity. The revolving bond is intended to serve the farmer twice a year. At harvest time it will aid him to settle his debts promptly, at spring time it will supply the means to make more cotton and collect cost of production plus a reasonable profit according to Mr. Hardin.

BIG AND LITTLE TIGERS

It requires no extraordinary imagination to appreciate how a tiger might claw and bite a man and thereby injure or destroy him.

It is also fairly common knowledge that there are certain poisonous snakes whose venom, if injected into the human being, can severely injure and sometimes cause death.

It is, however, a great deal more difficult for the average person to appreciate how those infinitesimally small tigers and snakes, the pathogenic (disease-producing) bacteria, might do the same.

Their incredible smallness and the fact that the average person has never seen a germ, renders belief in their destructive powers difficult.

And yet, the fact that certain germs produce toxins which can severely injure the human body, and that there are germs which, though mouthless and toothless, may be as destructive as tigers, is daily demonstrated in clinics, hospitals and medical laboratories.

Germs cause diseases in a variety of ways. Their very presence in the human body can produce illness, and particularly so when, in addition they give off toxins, that is, poisonous substances.

The parallel drawn between the poisons (venoms) of snakes and the poisons (toxins) of germs, is a warranted one. Where science has a remedy for both these poisons, that is, an anti-venom or an anti-toxin, they are produced in similar if not identical manners.

In each instance, the poisonous substance is secured from the snake or germ culture, is injected in minute quantities into susceptible animals, and the anti-substance, that is, the substance which acts in a fashion to prevent the poison from completing its destruction in the animal's body, is withdrawn from the blood of the laboratory animal.

BALLINGER BOY PLAYING WITH T. C. U. BAND

Broadcasters Turn Theater Into Studio; Arranged by Aid of Six-ton Glass Curtain

NEW YORK, March 1.—Radio has gone on the stage.

In fact it has advanced a few steps further and has turned an entire theater into a broadcast studio.

To do that it had to overcome many obstacles, including the installation of a six-ton glass "curtain," which can be lowered and raised by one man, to make the stage sound-proof.

Listeners long have wanted to see as well as hear their favorites in action. Broadcast studios are not large enough to accommodate all of them. The result was the decision to change a theater into a studio where fans could sit comfortably watching a broadcast program go on the air from the stage just like it does from a station studio.

The stage studio is a realization of an ambition of officials of the National Broadcasting Company. They have taken over the theater, with accommodations for an audience of 600, on the roof of the New Amsterdam Theater building in the heart of New York's Times Square district.

To make the stage into a studio, innumerable alterations were necessary. The seating section was unchanged, except for the installation of loudspeakers at various points of vantage.

The audience had to be shut off from the stage, yet be able to see. To do that it was decided to use a glass "curtain." This "curtain" is really an overgrown window, with a steel framework to hold the glass. Soundproof floor covering was put on the stage. Heavy drapes like those in the regular studio take the place of scenery.

Numerous microphone outlets were installed about the stage, each one leading through a separate conduit to the control room in the rear of the balcony. There the operator can watch and hear the entertainers and gauge the output accordingly.

From the theater, the programs are fed to the local NBC stations and chains by special wires.

The audience at these broadcasts "shows" really watches with the curtain down. It does not actually hear the voices of the performers, as they address only the microphone. The music and other entertainment is conveyed to the immediate listeners by loudspeakers just like it is to those using radio receivers far away.

Another thing. Tickets for the shows will not cost a cent. Listeners will be admitted up to the limit of the seating capacity upon the presentation of "pasteboards" which are to be distributed free on request.

(By Associated Press) LANSING, Mich., Mar. 1.—After nine years of fighting, Michigan claims to be the first of major dairy states to conquer bovine tuberculosis.

Only 6,000 cattle out of 1,500,000 remain on Michigan's testing schedule. Five federal veterinarians who conducted the work have been transferred to other states where the tide of battle was not less favorable.

The total cost of the nine-year campaign, including indemnities paid to farmers whose cattle have been condemned, has been \$4,626,029. The value of dairy herds is estimated to have increased by \$15,000,000.

LETTER WRITTEN BY SAM HOUSTON GIVEN STATE

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, March 1.—The state has been presented with a letter written by Gen. Sam Houston to President James K. Polk in 1846 in which he recommended to the president the particular notice of a certain Colonel Eldridge. The letter, together with an English Bible and prayer book of quaint binding and design, was presented to the state by Mrs. John D. Howson of Austin.

The letter, written in Houston's characteristic and peculiar style, read:

"Washington, 20th April, 1846.
"General Houston salutes his excellency, the President, and recommends Colonel Eldridge to his particular notice. Col. Eldridge has a note from General Rusk and Houston to the honorable secretary of the Navy. His excellency will please to look at the note and by it will see the opinion entertained for Col. E."
The signature was the bold lettering of the famous Texas general and leader.

The Bible and the prayer book were printed in 1847 and 1848 respectively by "George E. Eyre and William Spotswood, printers to the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty."

Hand carved oak was used for binding the books, each of which had a figure of Christ on both the front and back.

They came into possession of the Howson family in 1850.

Oppose Livestock 'Beauty Doctor'

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—(AP)—Exhibitors of livestock have found one kind of beauty that is more than skin deep.

It is immediately under the skin and may be tallow, oils, lard or other substances injected into a beef animal to fill out depressions with a view to deceiving judges in the show ring. One breeder protesting to the federal bureau of animal industry, warned that exhibitors who believe in fair competition will withdraw from livestock shows unless the "beauty doctors" are curbed.

It is considered fair to polish horns and hoofs and even curl the animal's hair, but breeders insist that conformation of the body be natural, transmitted by breeding rather than artificial "plugging" of depressions.

Dr. John R. Mohler, chief of the bureau, says the deceptive practice deserves condemnation.

Will "Farmer Jim" Get On Ticket?

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Mar. 1.—Former Governor James E. Ferguson, husband of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Texas' first woman governor, is back in the fray. He is ambitious to be governor of Texas again and has announced his candidacy subject to the Democratic primaries next July.

There immediately pops up the question: Will he be able to get his name on the ballot?

It is recalled he was removed from office in 1917 and that under the constitution impeachment carried with it "disqualification from holding any office of honor trust or profit."

But the 39th legislature passed what is known as the "amnesty bill" directing that the inhibition with reference to holding office again be removed from those who have heretofore been impeached, and the sponsors of that piece of legislation had former Governor Ferguson in mind when they proposed it.

Then along came the 40th legislature and Governor Moody. The "amnesty law" was repealed. But friends of the former governor declared that once the legislative body had invoked its power of pardon in that respect another legislature could not undo it.

A pretty law question probably that will be threshed out by the appellate courts if there is any contention over the matter of giving "Farmer Jim," as he became known during his first term as chief executive, a place on the ballot.

That question came up in 1924 and to get around it Governor Ferguson filed both his name and Mrs. Ferguson's for a place on the ballot. They turned him down but put Mrs. Ferguson on. He took to the hustings and Mrs. Ferguson was elected. She served one term, or until Attorney General Dan Moody stepped out and defeated her for re-election.

But the "Ferguson of today, if his latest announcement is to be taken as an indication, is not the aggressive Ferguson of yesterday, as one may judge by the tenor of this extract from his formal announcement:

"If there be those who may find satisfaction in personal abuse and vicious criticism of me or my record let them be at once advised that they will have the field all to themselves without murmur or protest from me. I have long since made my peace with God and I shall not now permit the heat of politics to en-

not only from the meat standpoint but because of its adverse effect on livestock breeding. Of 453 show animals entered in competition at the International Livestock exposition at Chicago and subsequently slaughtered under federal inspection, six carcasses showed definite signs of "beauty doctoring."

The bureau recommends disqualification of such animals, together with such publicity, penalties and other deterrent action as will free livestock shows from the abuse.

Particular emphasis is laid on the fact that boys and girls are entering stock in the show ring with increasing success, and veteran showmen are stirred to sponsor even more rigid rules in the interest of youthful exhibitors.

Livestock breeding they say, is certain to be adversely affected if show ring prizes are awarded on "doctored" animals.

Entry of Governor Ferguson into the already crowded gubernatorial race, has revived speculation as to political plans of Governor Moody. Some believe Ferguson's candidacy will force him out for a third term. Many had predicted that regardless of who should be candidates, Moody would seek another term in an effort to carry out his penitentiary centralization idea and to propose shifting of the tax burden from the landowners and homeowners to a basis of "ability to pay," or changing the present system of exacting a tax from a citizen whether he is able to pay it or not rather than computing it according to the earnings of those levied against.

It was reported that Attorney General E. L. Bobbitt, appointed to his present office by Governor Moody when Attorney General Claude Pollard resigned, had definitely decided to announce for election to his office. It was known that he had considered becoming a candidate for governor. Public announcement by him that he would fill the attorney generalship would be taken to mean that Gov. Moody had definitely made up his mind to ask for a third term. Moody and Bobbitt are close political friends. Bobbitt should have first call on the governor's office when Moody vacates and the attorney general's friends believe that he will put in a bid for it the minute his governor friend decides to relinquish it.
