

Teachers Improve Training Despite No Pay Increase

Despite the fact that Texas teachers have not had an increase in their base salaries since 1949, they have continued to improve their professional training. They now rank among the five top states in the nation in teacher preparation, according to Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association.

Tennyson said that figures available from the Texas Education Agency show that more than 95 percent of the state's 58,513 public school teachers now hold degrees from accredited institutions of higher learning.

During the school term just closed, only 2,299 or 4.5 percent of the white teachers in the state did not have degrees. Only 146 or 1.84 percent of the Negro teachers in Texas do not have degrees.

The school year 1951-52 also marked progress in another di-

rection, Tennyson added. It was the first year in the history of the state that the schools did not have some people teaching who had less than a high school education. The previous year 34 such people were employed as teachers.

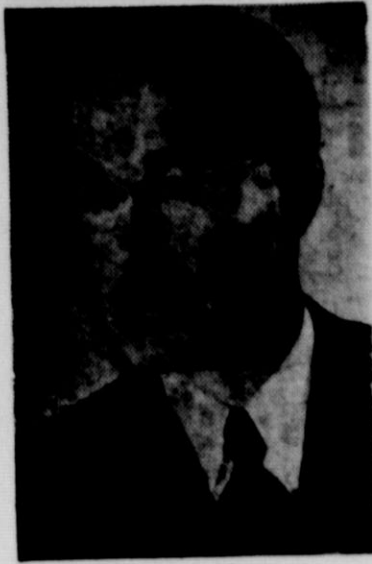

Dr. E. N. Jones

New Tech Leader Has 27 Years As Educator in State

LUBBOCK, June 23 (Spl.).—A man who has been an educator for 27 years is the new president of Texas Technological College at Lubbock.

Dr. Edward Newlon Jones, who was named to the post Saturday, will go into his new job with a background as a college professor, dean, and president.

Vice president of Tech since 1948, he succeeds Dr. D. M. Wiggins, who resigned after heading the state school for four years to enter the banking business in Lubbock. Dr. Jones is the sixth president of the college.

When he came to Tech as vice president, Dr. Jones resigned his position as president of Texas College of Arts and Industries at Kingsville, a post he had held since 1942.

Dean At Baylor

A member of the faculty of Baylor University from 1925 to 1942, Dr. Jones became dean of the university in 1939 and remained in that capacity until he accepted the presidency of Texas A&I.

He was dean of the college of arts and sciences at Baylor from 1935 to 1939 and was head of the biology department before that.

The 53-year-old educator holds a B.S. from Ottawa University at Ottawa, Kan.; a Ph.D. from the University of Iowa and an honorary L.I.D. from Ottawa University. He is a native of Downs, Kansas.

Matador School Lunch Room Served Over Seventeen Hundred Free Meals Last Year

The Matador School lunch room ended the 1951-52 school term with a record of having fed 37,631 meals to students of the school. 1,703 of these meals were fed free of charge to pupils whose parents were unable to pay for their children's meals. The average daily participation was 216.

Total expenditures for the year totaled \$10,793.48 and the total income was \$10,981.00, less approximately \$419.77 due from the State for reimbursement on meals served to children during the months of April and May and on which the State will not be able to pay any reimbursement due to the fact the state appropriation from the Federal Government was curtailed by about \$800,000 for this school year. Efforts are being made to get a new appropriation bill through Congress to take care of this shortage, but its passage is doubtful. The school has received \$1,711.29 from the Government for the school lunch room up to date.

Many surplus agricultural commodities were received during the school year and put to good

use. In fact, the price of school lunches would have to be increased if the school did not receive the surplus agricultural products. Some items received by the school during the past year were: Green beans, prunes, cheese, honey, peaches, apples, dried eggs, dried milk, cherries, and orange juice.

Present plans call for the same price for meals for the 1952-53 school year, according to school officials. The lunch room is under the supervision of Mrs. Arthur Fair, and employees are, Mesdames W. M. Clifton, J. C. McBride and Henry Thompson, and Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Allen.

MANY THOUSAND MILES COVERED BY SCHOOL BUSES

The school buses of Matador Public schools traveled over fifty thousand miles in transporting children to and from school during the 1951-52 term, according to records of school officials.

If this figure is multiplied by the number of children riding each day, the figure for the number of bus miles traveled reaches astronomical proportions. The average number of

children riding the buses each day was 130.

Total cost of insurance, gasoline, oil and repairs for the buses for the school year was \$4,664.00. This figure also includes payments on buses. Salaries of bus drivers amounted to \$2,880, making the total cost of the transportation system, \$7,544.00.

The district operates four buses with the oldest being three years old. Two of the buses are two years old and one has been used one year. The entire cost of the transportation system is paid by the State transportation division of the Texas Education Agency. Total receipts from the agency this year will amount to approximately \$8,500, and the local school board plans to apply the amount above actual expenses for the year to the reduction of the notes through which the buses were purchased and financed.

Judges' Statements of Law Binding Upon Jurors

Judges get the law by which they decide the legal questions arising in a lawsuit from three sources: federal and state constitutions; federal and state statutes; and from previous judicial decisions and legal writings. Previous decisions state the public standards of rights and duties

in matters not covered by constitutions and statutes.

Lawyers say that if judges and juries were not bound by law and precedents—if in each lawsuit, the judge or juror could set up a private standard of rights and duties as a basis for deciding that case—no one would know in advance of the decision how he should have acted in a particular situation. Cases arising out of similar circumstances would not be decided on settled principles but on the personal ideas of the trial judge or juror.

Because cases must be tried and determined on established recognized public standards of right and wrong, we call ours a government of law and not a government of men.

Judges have access to state-ments of the law and know which apply to the situation involved in any lawsuit. So that justice may be done according to the law, it is imperative that the jurors in each case accept the law as the judge gives it to them. They are therefore required to base their verdict on his instructions as to the law, rather than on their own notions of what the law is, or ought to be.

For somewhat similar reasons there are rules governing the way a case is to be tried in court. These rules prescribe what must be stated in the pleadings, in what order evidence must be presented, what questions must be asked, in what order lawyers are permitted to argue, what is permissible and what is not permissible argument.

If it were not for these rules no one could foresee what would happen during a lawsuit. It would be impossible to prepare properly for the trial. No one would know, until the judge had ruled, what he would be permitted to say or do, or in what order. Such a situation would inevitably result in confusion and injustice.

The whole purpose of laws and rules is to insure equal jus-

justice by providing a single standard of rights and duties, applicable to all persons similarly situated.

A kitchen in your car trunk is easy to assemble, makes it possible to have truly sumptuous picnic fare and eliminates "homework."

You can cook simply over a collapsible comb-sized stove with a heat pellet, or elaborately over a two-burner affair that stores its own liquid fuel in a compact metal case.

Perishables can be kept cold with inexpensive plastic covered chemical "pillows" which are refrigerated beforehand, or food can be kept hot with fiberglass containers. For traveling families there are portable ice-chests large enough to keep a day's food supply plus all baby's bottles. (Incidentally, to protect bottles from breakage, insert them in old wool socks.)

There's a set of six-in-one aluminum pots and pans all nested together, including four plates and cups. Boy Scout stores carry hinged knife-fork-and-spoon sets that are the most compact utensils I've seen. Add collapsible seats and tray-tables and you'll dine out-free.

Place your staples in a wicker basket, include your favorite spices, and in no time at all—"soup's on!"

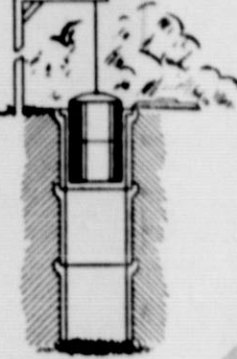

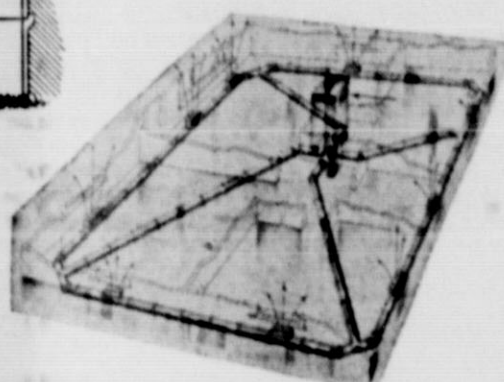

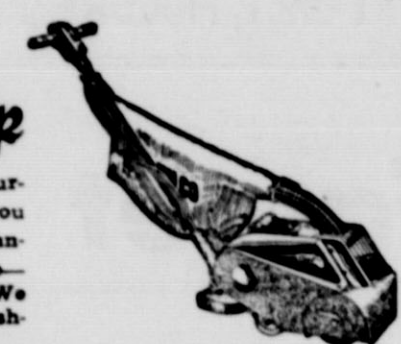
