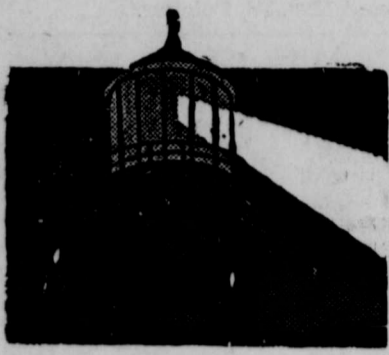

Union Chapel Cemetery Cleaned

In behalf of the Mitchell Co. Historical Survey Committee, families and former friends of persons buried in Union Chapel Cemetery, we hereby express our sincere appreciation to Moody Richardson, County Commissioner of Prec. 4, for doing a good job of cleaning the Union Chapel Cemetery. All dry underbrush was burned. Mesquite bushes were grubbed up and hauled away, along with a truck load of old wire. Again we say thanks to Mr. Richardson and his road crew for doing this long neglected job.

Union Chapel Cemetery is located three miles north of Loraine on the nearest farm road leading to Lone Wolf Mountain. The name was derived from the Presbyterian Church, Union Chapel, built on land donated, and with funds collected by grandparents and mother of Dr. B. H. Johnson. They were the J. M. Baker family, who moved to that section of land in 1901. The chapel was used for a public school for a number of years, before consolidation with Lone Star.

"Aunt Jo" Smith, a beloved former resident of Loraine, is buried in Union Chapel Cemetery, beside her husband and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Oscar Cook. Mr. Cook was a Civil War veteran.

The Mitchell County Historical Survey Committee is interested in receiving reports of other semi-abandoned cemeteries being cleaned up.

Parisian Theme For Banquet

Baptist WMU hosted their annual Senior Banquet Thursday night, March 16, in the church fellowship hall, using the theme "Paris In The Springtime."

Guests met in the air terminal (junior dept.) to wait for a flight to France. The terminal held travel posters such as To Paris via TWA Jets, signs and scenes of Spain, Egypt, London, Rome, Switzerland, Germany, etc.

When the plane arrived, they heard French music and toured France via a recording, after which they entered the Eiffel Cafe La Terrasse for dinner. On the left, entering, was the name of the cafe. On the south wall could be seen the Eiffel Tower, flanked by French flags. At the front of the cafe was a large pastel drawing of the bridge across the Genissiat Canal Spillway, which was also flanked with criss-cross French flags.

Across from the cafe west could be seen French shops: Mademoiselle (ladies); Monsieur (mens); and in between a Fleurs (flower) Shoppe.

At one end of the cafe was a land table, laid in white linen with an arrangement of red-buds and rose red candles in crystal bowl with holders. All tables were square, set angling across the hall and covered with red-checked cloths. Each table held a Coke bottle candle holder, containing white candles.

The food was served from carts, by both boys and girls, as in the custom in France.

The menu, written in French, consisted of: Potage (pineapple juice cocktail); Entrees (ham); Les Petits Pois au Beurree (buttered peas); Les Pommes Noyettes (creamed potatoes); Salade La Salade de Saison (congealed lime gelatin); Le Gateau Mocha (cake); Un Choix de Fruits (strawberries and cream); Cafe American (coffee) and The Orange Pekoe (tea).

Hot rolls, fresh from the oven, beets, cranberry sauce, and stuffed celery were served from trays on the cart, along with the dinner course. Also pickles, cheese sticks and olives were served from Tid-Bit trays.

At right, facing east, could be seen the program for the evening. Flight to France (how); Paris in the Spring (when); French capers, master of ceremonies (what) Rev. James McKee; An American Tourist in France (who) Dh. John Hamblen.

Dr. Hamblen spoke to the group on Finding Your Goal in Life and Staying With It until that Goal is Accomplished. He also played the guitar and sang.

Place cards were miniature Eiffel Towers, with names written in French, and favors were French boy and girl Doll Heads.

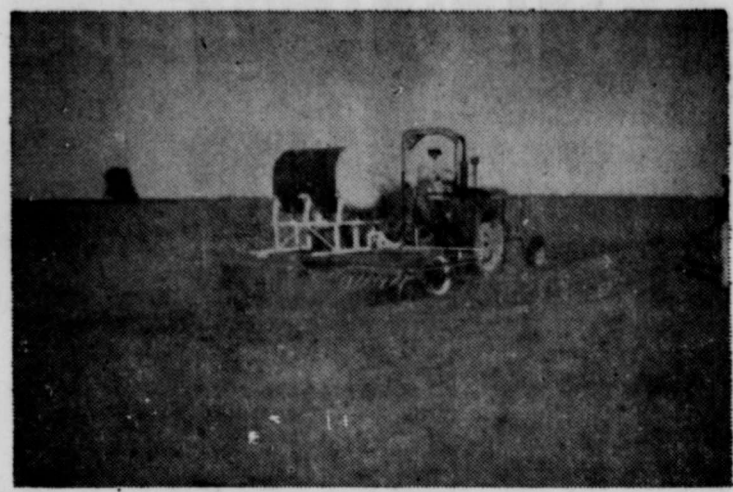

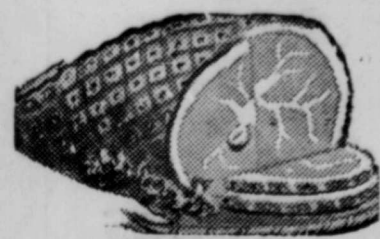

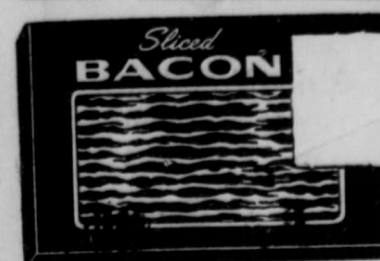
