Mrs. L.C. McLain Attends Meeting

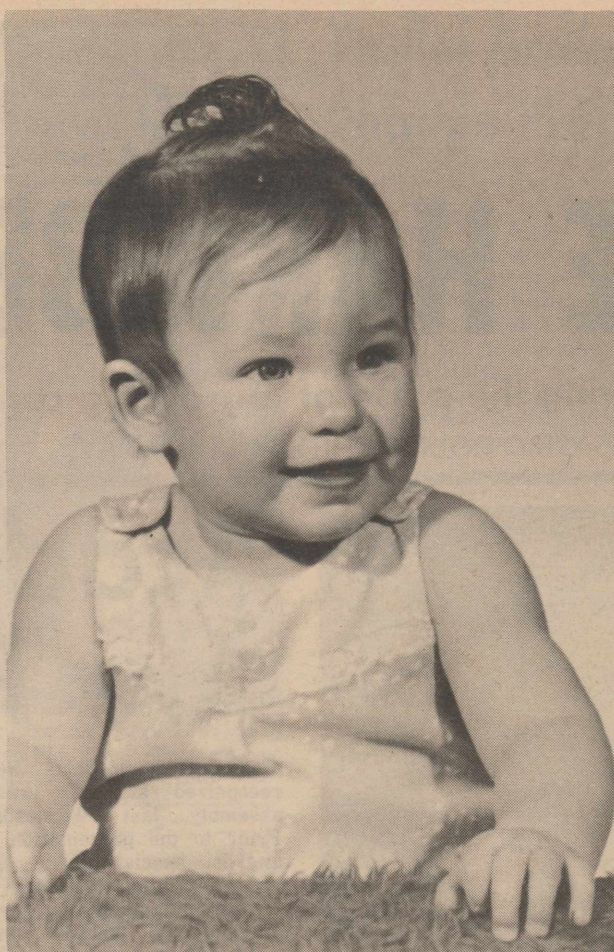

7/8 cup (2 bars - regular size) coarsely chopped
Peter Paul Power House bars
2 teaspoons milk
1 can (3 oz.) chow mein noodles
Ice Cream

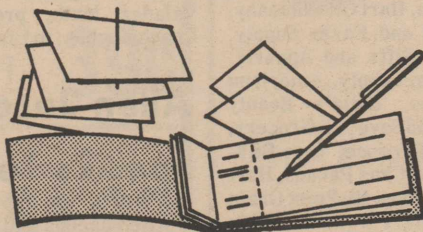
Combine candy bars and milk in glass measuring cup or small saucepan. Heat in pan of hot water until candy is completely melted. Stir frequently. Combine melted candy with chow mein noodles. Mix until noodles are evenly coated.

Spoon noodle mixture into 6 (6 oz.) buttered custard cups. Keeping the fingers well buttered, press the noodles into the bottom and about half way up the sides of the cups to form a basket.

Let stand at room temperature 1-2 hours until hardened. Remove from custard cups by running a knife around the edge. Fill centers with ice cream. Serve immediately.

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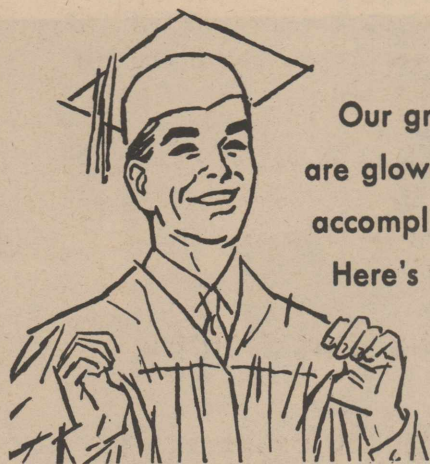

REUBEN SANDWICH

Spread one slice bread with mustard, top with slice of cheese, flaked tuna and sauerkraut, in that order. Place under broiler until cheese melts and bread is toasted on edges.

GREEN GODESS DELIGHT

1 small can green peas, drained
1 large can green beans, drained
4 stalks celery, finely chopped
1 large onion, finely chopped

10-12 olives, sliced
1 green pepper, diced
3/4 c. sugar or 6 packets weight watcher's sugar
1/4 c. water
1/2 c. vinegar
1/2 c. salad oil

Mix first six ingredients. Combine remaining ingredients in order given and add. Let set 3 to 4 hours or overnight. Drain and serve. (Liquid may be reserved and used again.)

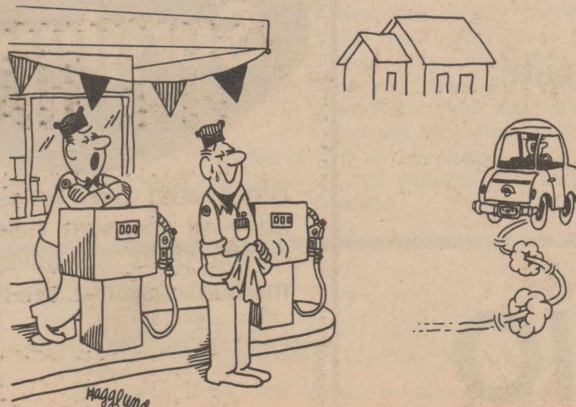

Humus is the element that opens the door for the plants to get the foods they need -- to help build more substantial root systems and get better results from fertilization and insect and disease control. But composting takes years -- even decades -- to

decompose sufficiently. And compost or mulch has been bulky and difficult to handle.

Now however, industry has evolved a method of "mining" humus and concentrating it in a liquid form which can be diluted with water. As a highly concentrated liquid, it is easy to handle and goes right to work when added to the soil.

Realizing that plants get relatively little benefit from fertilizer without humus, farmers, ranchers and homeowners can now easily apply liquid humus -- and reduce substantially the amount of fertilizer needed for more productive plants that grow more rapidly and are more disease and insect resistant.

The scientific term for the work humus does is "stimulate ion exchange." A Technical

Bulletin from the South Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station at Clemson, S. C., includes the concept that "humic acids also mobilize the phosphate anion. In the presence of humates, plants use phosphate fertilizers much more fully than otherwise."

William M. Castellini, grower-shipper, Opelousas, La., says, "Another advantage in using liquid humus is the financial saving. I used a product named 'Energizer' (Concentrated liquid humus), and my normal seed requirement was cut by 66 percent. Depending on the size of one's operation, the savings at \$2. per bushel can run into hundreds of thousands of dollars."

Liquid humus is proving out, in effect, as a growth catalyst -- not only for marketable crops but also for homeowners. It not only gives fruits and vegetables a richer flavor, longer shelf life and more attractive color but also helps to improve lawns,

shrubs, flowers and trees. In short, everything that grows needs humus.

ELECTRICAL CIRCUITS

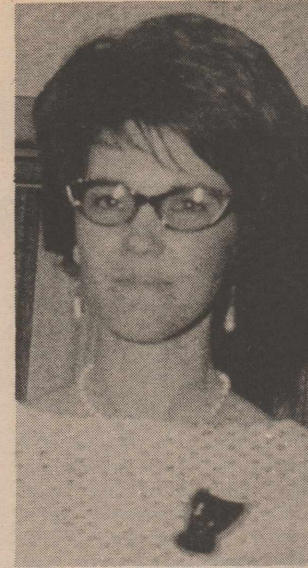

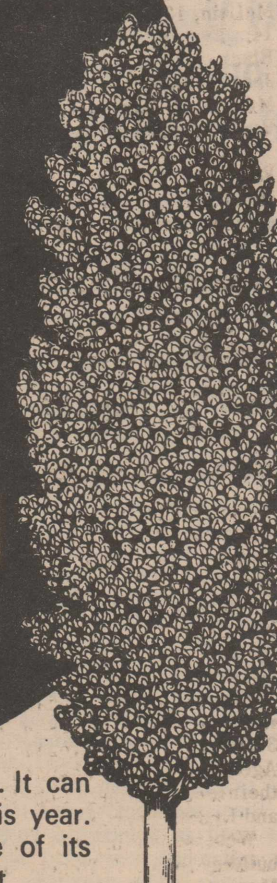

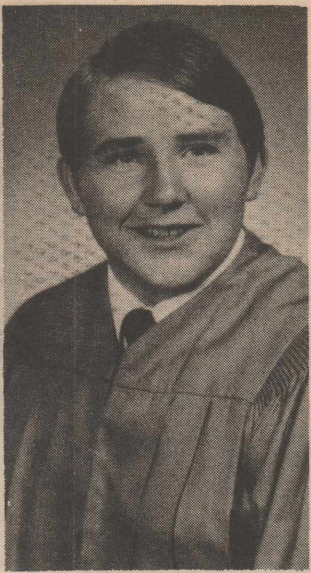

"Ye are our epistle...known and read of all men." (II Corinthians 3:2)

"Shame-facedly let me say that I have openly sneered at her faith and laughed at her fidelity to God. Yet when my little girl was taken away, it was this woman who caused me to look beyond the grave and shed my first tear of hope. The sweet

magnetism of her life has led me to Christ! I covet the thing that has made her life so beautiful."

At the request of the minister, the little woman was led forward, her eyes streaming with glad tears, and with such a shining face as one seldom sees on this earth.

"Let me introduce you," he said, "to the real preacher of the evening!"

With one accord the audience arose in silent, though not tearless, respect.

Just consider all the old ways of thinking and acting dead, and look at the living Jesus. He'll change your mind. Listen to other people's helpful insights, and get together to sing about the God and the way of life you love.

And, whatever you do, put Jesus' name on it. Make your life a "thank-you" to God for your new life.

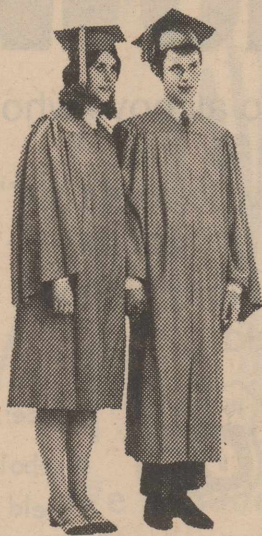
the members of the Town and Country Club who nominated her.

Trailer Brake Provisions Change Proposed By Price

Texas House Speaker Rayford Price yesterday moved to relieve operators of most small trailers from controversial "trailer brake" provisions of the Texas Rules of the Road Act (Senate Bill No. 183) passed during the last regular session of the Legislature.

Price announced appointment of a special interim committee to draft amendments to the Act for submission at the forthcoming special session of the Legislature. Among changes which he personally favors, Price said, are those which would exempt trailers having a gross weight of 10,000 pounds or less from the "brakes on all wheels" requirements, and specifically authorize self-activating "surge brakes" for this same class of trailers. He further recommends enactment of a "grandfather" clause exempting trailers manufactured prior to effective date of the act.

Rep. Mike Moncrief of Fort Worth was appointed chairman of the 10-man committee, and other House members named to serve with him will be Reps. Bill Clayton of Springlake, vice-chairman, and Steve Burgess of Nacogdoches.

Citizen members will be Clark Jarnagin of Euless, representing the Texas Horse Council; Don King of Fort Worth, Texas and South-western Cattle Raisers Association; Tony Price, Dallas, Texas Cotton Ginners Association; Cecil Reid, Dallas, Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas; Bruno Schroeder, Austin, Texas Agricultural Council; Bill Sims, San Angelo, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, and J. T. (Red) Woodson, Texas Farm Bureau.

The Rules of the Road act was passed to bring Texas into compliance with Federal standards, thereby assuring the

state of continued eligibility for Federal road-building funds, Price said.

As presently written, the new law requires brakes acting on all wheels of trailers weighing more than 3,000 pounds and those weighing less than that figure when the gross weight of the trailer and load exceed forty per cent of the gross weight of the towing vehicle. It also requires for the first time that trailer brakes must be activated by the same device that operates the brakes on the towing vehicle.

"Unfortunately, the bill was one of many which were rushed through the Legislature and failed to receive the consideration it warranted. As a result, inadvertently omitted was a 'grandfather clause' exempting trailers manufactured prior to effective date of the act. Such a clause appears in several other portions of the act," he said.

"The stringent braking specifications set forth under the act as now written would be virtually impossible for most operators of small trailers to meet. I think this matter is of such urgency that I have requested Gov. Smith to include its consideration in his call for the next special session of the Legislature, and he has agreed to do so. I have asked the House committee to have its recommendations ready at that time," Price said.

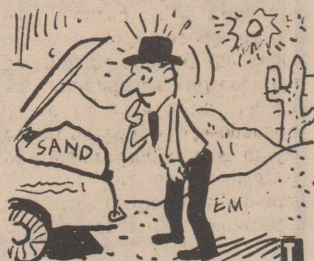
