Rebels Take Scrimmage Victory Over Honey Grove

The Rebels 1-0 victory over Honey Grove in a scrimmage last Friday night looked just like that....a scrimmage. Both teams played a very liberal game plan trying plays that "look good on paper, but do they

really work?" For Rivercrest, the defense was the strong point. Most of the first squad are returning starters and are beginning to pick up where they left off last year. The offensive line is rebuilding and overall, played a good game with

flashes of brilliance. Although the offensive backfield has three veteran backs, only one of them played a full season last year and the four are still struggling to gain the confidence and cooperation of the others.

The first half of the scrimmage, run under normal game conditions, was uneventful other than a Rebel threat to the 10 yard line on their second possession. The second half proved more exciting as Honey Grove drove to

Rivercrest's 6 yard line on a 35 yard pass completion to Tyrone Jones. On the very next play, the Warriors fumbled and the Rebel defense recovered on the 13 yard line. A fired up offense took the field and drove 83 yards with Jerry Merchant

taking the ball across the goal line from 17 yards out for the game's only score. The rest of the game held no other threat by either team. Coach Milford Groves was excited with the way his squad showed more and more signs of teamwork.

Improvements still need to be made, and he believes they will come as the players become more familiar with their positions. Next week's game against Spring Hill will

match two almost evenly rated teams against each other and could possibly show what the season might look like for the mighty blue and gray Rivercrest Rebels.

PJC Defensive Driving Set

Defensive Driving, a four-week driver improvement course, will begin at Paris Junior College on Tuesday, Sept. 8, according to June Jones, director of continuing education at the college. Paul Daniels will teach the course on Sept. 8 and three Mondays, Sept. 14, 21 and 28, from 7 to 9 p.m. in Room 102 of the Grimes Natural Sciences Center.

Tuition for the course is \$15, which includes the workbook used in classes.

Reservations for the course should be made by paying the fee in advance.

Working Mother's Day Designated

Governor William P. Clements has signed a State of Texas Official Memorandum designating September 6, 1981, as Working Mothers' Day, in recognition of the immense contribution made to our society by working mothers.

Spearheading the large group of advocates who worked to bring official recognition to working mothers were Allen M. Seigal, Vice-President of Public Affairs of National Child Care Centers, Kathleen McNemar, President of the Texas Association for the Education of Young Children, Jean English of the Texas Department of Human Resources and

Jeanette Watson of Austin, newly elected national board member of the National Association for the Education of Young Children, plus many volunteers from these agencies and other child advocate groups.

"In four out of five households today, two wage-earners are needed to support a family," said Seigal. "Fifty-four percent of women with children under that age of 18 are employed outside the home. That's sixteen million American women. These women perform the almost superhuman task of serving as productive members of the work force as well as nurturing mothers and homemakers. Accepting this challenge and functioning

with strength, humor and grace under pressure reflects the very best quality of the American spirit. It's our privilege to be able to honor them by helping to declare September 6 as Working Mothers' Day."

The State of Texas Official Memorandum, signed on August 14, 1981, by the governor and affixed with the state seal of Texas, will be reproduced by National Child Care Centers in a form suitable for framing. As a memento of this special occasion, these documents will be available free to anyone who requests one by writing or dropping into any National Child Care Center, and leaving their name and address. The day care firm operates centers in the major metropolitan areas of the state.

First Quarter Sales Are High

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday reported that gross sales in Texas for the first quarter of 1981 totaled \$70.8 billion.

He said first quarter sales this year passed 1980 first quarter sales by \$9.9 billion.

Bullock said the sales tax analysis for January, February and March of this year shows 255,407 reporting outlets compared to 250,681 reporting outlets in the first

quarter of last year.

The Comptroller's office also released a computer analysis showing reported sales for each of the state's 25 Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas and reported sales for the state's 254 counties.

First quarter sales in 1981 for our area were: Lamar County-\$93,149,541; Red River County-\$19,600,101; and Titus County-\$81,140,789.

Shuman Sworn In As Administrator

Charles W. Shuman was sworn in as Administrator of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), the rural credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Shuman will direct the loan activities of 8,300 full-time employees from 348 State and District offices and 1,963 County offices in administering \$12.2 billion this year in loans and grants to rural families and communities for farming, housing, and community facilities.

Shuman, 46, has operated a cattle and grain farm with

two brothers in Sullivan, Illinois, and was a member of the investment brokerage firm of Blunt, Ellis & Loewi of Decatur, Illinois.

He served as Illinois State Director of Farmers Home from 1971 to 1977. During that period, he also served temporarily as director of the agency's national finance office in St. Louis.

Shuman is a graduate of the University of Illinois with a degree in agriculture, and was a delegate to the Illinois constitutional convention of 1970.

Shuman said as administrator he would emphasize supervision and servicing of the agency's loans to existing borrowers.

"We must follow through on our initial commitment to the borrower if we are to faithfully serve the needs of rural Americans," he said.

County Attorney's Investigator To Assume Duties In November

In September I will hire Judy McLendon Guilliams, age 36, as my investigator. She will attend a 2 month Law Enforcement School and will assume her duties in mid-November.

Ms. Guilliams has been a teacher and has previously worked for County Judge Connie Sullivan and the Commissioners Court. She has completed substantial work towards a masters degree in psychology.

My investigator will do only follow-up work and only on specific assignment from me after I have received a written offense report from the police. This will avoid (a) interfering with the policeman's work, (b) encouraging a policeman to let up in his work, and (c) duplicating the efforts of the 10-15 front line police officers in this county.

Ms. Guilliams will do such things as conduct detailed interviews with persons who were at or near a crime scene, gather documentary and other physical evidence, and present that material to me in an organized and clear manner. She will not make arrests or perform the traditional duties of a deputy sheriff. The job would rarely be dangerous, but if it is, she would do what the welfare workers and other peace officers do, which is to take a police officer with her.

I believe Ms. Guilliams' education, trustworthiness, and good judgment will be an asset to the County.
