OUTSTANDING NEW CHAPTER IN TEXAS

Local Young Homemakers Win State Award At Austin

The Abernathy Chapter of Young Homemakers, organized here early last year, brought home one of the highest awards given during the State Convention for Young Farmers and Young Homemakers in Austin last weekend. The Abernathy Chapter was named the Outstanding New Chapter in Texas, and received as an award for this accomplishment a sterling silver tray with the engraving: "Outstanding New Chapter, First Place, 1963."

Accepting the award for the chapter was Mrs. Delton Stone, 1st vice president. Making the presentation was James R. Cobb, manager of the Texas Electric Co-operative, Inc.

Other representatives of the Abernathy Young Homemakers Chapter attending the State Meet were Mrs. Harold Williams, Mrs. Jerry as, dairy farmer, who received a \$1,000 savings bond, a gold watch and a plaque. Harp was Oswald, Mrs. Elbert Harp and Mrs. Edith Almond, who is home economics teacher in the Abernathy schools and serves as advisor to the local Young Homemakers Chapter. President of the local chapter is Mrs. Don Presley, who was unable to attend.

Harp Is Candidate
Elbert Harp, local farmer and member of the Abernathy Young Farmers Chapter, was a candidate for the Outstanding Young Farmer of Texas, after having been named the Outstanding Young Farmer of Area I last fall. However, the State Award went to Bobby Trawick, a Dublin, Texas, awarded a plaque as Area I's Outstanding Young Farmer.

The local Young Farmers did

not come home empty-handed, however, as Delton Stone was the winner of a door prize . . . two bags of TPSA cotton planting seed, courtesy of the Texas Planting Seed Association, Bryan, Texas.

Within the ten areas in Texas, there are 175 Young Farmer chapters and 82 Young Homemaker Chapters.

Private electric companies donated the cash awards to the chapters and Texas Electric Co-operatives gave the silver trays. In addition to Harp and Stone, others from the local chapter attending the State Convention were Jerry Oswald, chapter president; Harold Williams, A. C. Harris Jr., Johnny Skipper, and local vocational agriculture instructor and FFA and Young Farmer advisor, Jerry Adams.

Law enforcement officers in our community will be special guests. Persons who work with juvenile problems are especially invited.

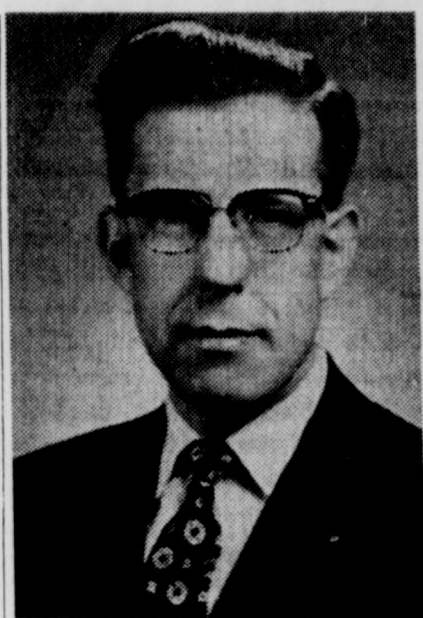
PEEL SELKE REUNION HELD JANUARY 5

Robertson formerly lived in Lamb and Bailey Counties for around 20 years before moving to Hale County 14 years ago. He has engaged in farming and ranching all his adult life.

All of his four daughters are graduates of Hale Center high school.

The son of a former long-time commissioner in Love County, Oklahoma, Mr. Robertson is well acquainted with the duties and responsibilities of the office of commissioner, both from the standpoint of highway maintenance and county government.

Since his father was a commissioner for many years while he was a boy, he gained a high respect and appreciation for the office of commissioner.

In making his announcement, Robertson said he does not have a lot of promises to make. "I will do my very best to exercise common sense in executing the duties of commissioner and will strive to serve fairly, honestly and efficiently the entire precinct, which includes Abernathy, Mayfield, Cotton Center and Hale Center," he said. ABERNATHY'S FIRST BARBER DIES

Emil Fuchs of Johnson City died December 25, 1963, at the age of 87. Many of the older timers of Abernathy will remember Mr. Fuchs as Abernathy's first barber. He came to Abernathy some time in 1909, according to information given to The Review, and left here in late 1910 or early 1911.

A Mr. Vanderslice bought out Emil Fuchs shop and Rudolph Struve says his first barber shop haircut was by Mr. Griffith, who succeeded Mr. Vanderslice, who was in turn succeeded by Dutch Crow who barbered for a number of years before entering the automobile business.

Mr. Waghorne was a graduate of Texas Tech with a degree in electrical engineering, receiving his degree in 1933. After working as a chemist in a testing laboratory in Denver, Colo., he returned to Lubbock in 1937 and entered the service of the Southwestern Public Service Company. He then moved to Tuco where he served as plant chemist. He later moved to the Denver City plant as assistant to the chief engineer.

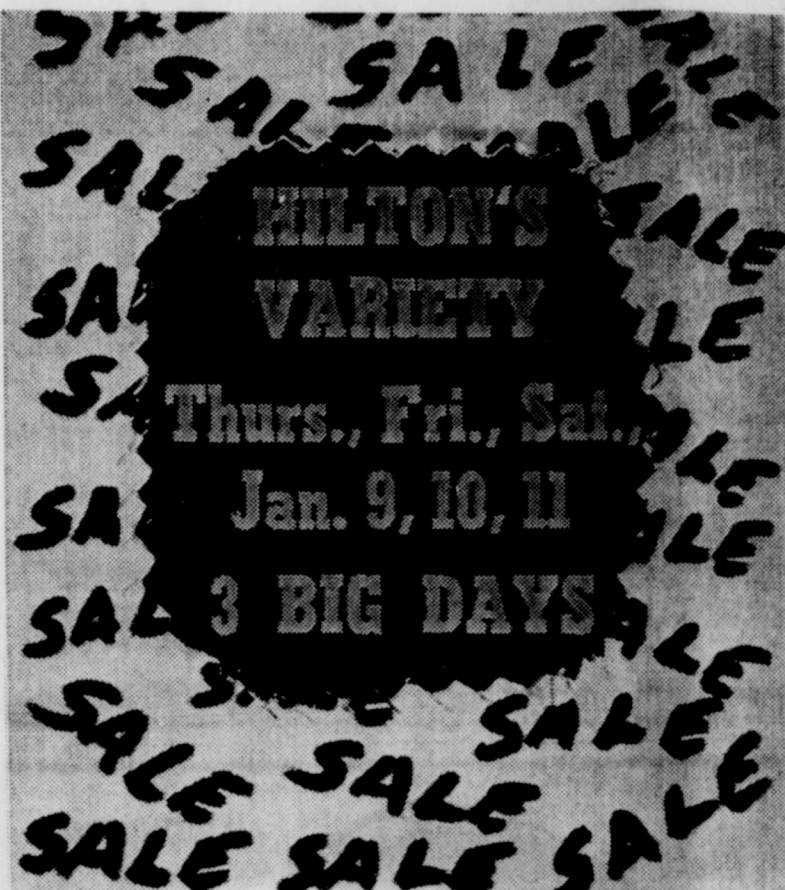
