THE MEXICAN SITUATION.

The revolution is still on in Mexico and will continue until October, when the general election will be held, at which time the people of that country will elect a president of the republic. The demand of the blood-stained president of that nation that he be recognized by this government, in order that he might negotiate a large loan to aid him in carrying on his side of the revolution has been withdrawn and he is now content to accept the good offices of this government in bringing about peace in that country. The visit of Hon. John Lind, who went there to look into conditions and to represent President Wilson in attempting to settle the difficulties over there is claimed to have been very successful in that the demand for recognition has been withdrawn, but of course there is little to that phase, as no recognition could have been forced by the Mexican people. The constitution of Mexico forbids that the president ad interim shall become a candidate for the office, hence the demand that the assassin shall not submit his name to the voters for the position of president is without effect.

The warning of President Wilson to the American people to leave Mexico was very appropriate, as was his announcement that no more arms or ammunition should be carried over the border into that country for either side.

The United States has as yet taken no part in the internal trouble in Mexico and the announcement that no interference will be attempted is encouraging and heartily endorsed

ANOTHER FREAK.

Driving a dog team from Nome, Alaska, all over the United States and return on a \$10,000 bet, Mr. Bill Brown passed through Brownwood today, en route to Austin, where the signature of the governor will be secured and the journey continued.

Brown left Nome on May 5, 1912, driving two wolves and a Newfoundland dog to a light runabout buggy. He made a bet with Alaskan miners that he could drive the outfit through the capital of every state in the Union and return to Nome within six years from the time he started, and bring back with him one of the dogs with which he began the trip. After a little more than a year he has passed through the capitals of thirty-eight states and has lost but one dog. The team has been increased to six, including two wolves, which work like mules in the harness. Brown began his trip by going down the Peace river and through Maine, and then came down the coast. He has covered the eastern and central states and is now on his way back to Nome, with none but the western states to visit. He travels about fifteen miles per day during the hot weather, but in winter sometimes makes fifty miles. He estimates that the trip will be completed within a year. As part of the conditions of the bet, he must make all his traveling expenses by the sale of picture postcards of himself and his team.—Brownwood Bulletin.

A special from San Antonio dated Thursday says: "To strengthen the border patrol and to better police the frontier, a troop of the third cavalry and a battery of the third field artillery was rushed from Fort Sam Houston last night upon orders from the war department. Two special trains were made up on about two hours' notice. The artillerymen were sent to Laredo and the cavalrymen dispatched to Brownsville. Attention was called to the fact that opposite Laredo there is a federal garrison and in front of Brownsville the constitutionalists hold forth. Officers at the army post would say nothing and the movement of the soldiers was not admitted until they were on their way to the depots. In addition about a thousand men are in readiness to leave Fort Sam Houston on three hours' notice. Railroads are co-operating with the army and have promised to have equipment on hand to accommodate 500 men and horses in thirty six hours."

A few nights ago Frank Battle, a merchant at Gatesville, was assassinated at his place of business and the grand jury is investigating the crime. Thursday morning his father-in-law, W. W. Hammack, former county clerk of Coryell county, suicided in Waco by taking strychnine. He left a note saying: "I am a persecuted man. I can't stand the publicity and strain any longer. My brain is on fire." The full meaning of Hammack's note is not yet understood.

A Fort Worth special says that Judge Marvin Brown of the sixty-seventh district court has ordered William P. McLean, Jr., Albert Baskin and Assistant County Attorney Ben S. Baldwin cited for contempt of court. The contempt charges grew out of McLean's accusation in the Ratliff habeas corpus hearing that a conspiracy on the part of at least nine grand jurors existed to indict innocent persons to clear another person of the burning of the First Baptist church and parsonage in that city.

A young man about 20 years of age was literally blown into atoms Thursday afternoon when he fired into a quantity of dynamite which had been left by Federal army officers during the Spanish-American war, in the magazine of historic Fort Dowling, near Sabine. Parts of his body were scattered over a radius of one-fourth of a mile from the fort, and only two parts, a leg and an arm, were found together.

Last Saturday afternoon Mrs. Bert Sneed was burned to death and her husband seriously scorched around the face and his hands almost burned off when an oil can exploded at their home near Wingate, Runnels county. Mr. and Mrs. Sneed were disinfecting their chicken house when the oil can in the hands of Mr. Sneed exploded, throwing oil over Mrs. Sneed, who was standing at his side, and covering her with flames

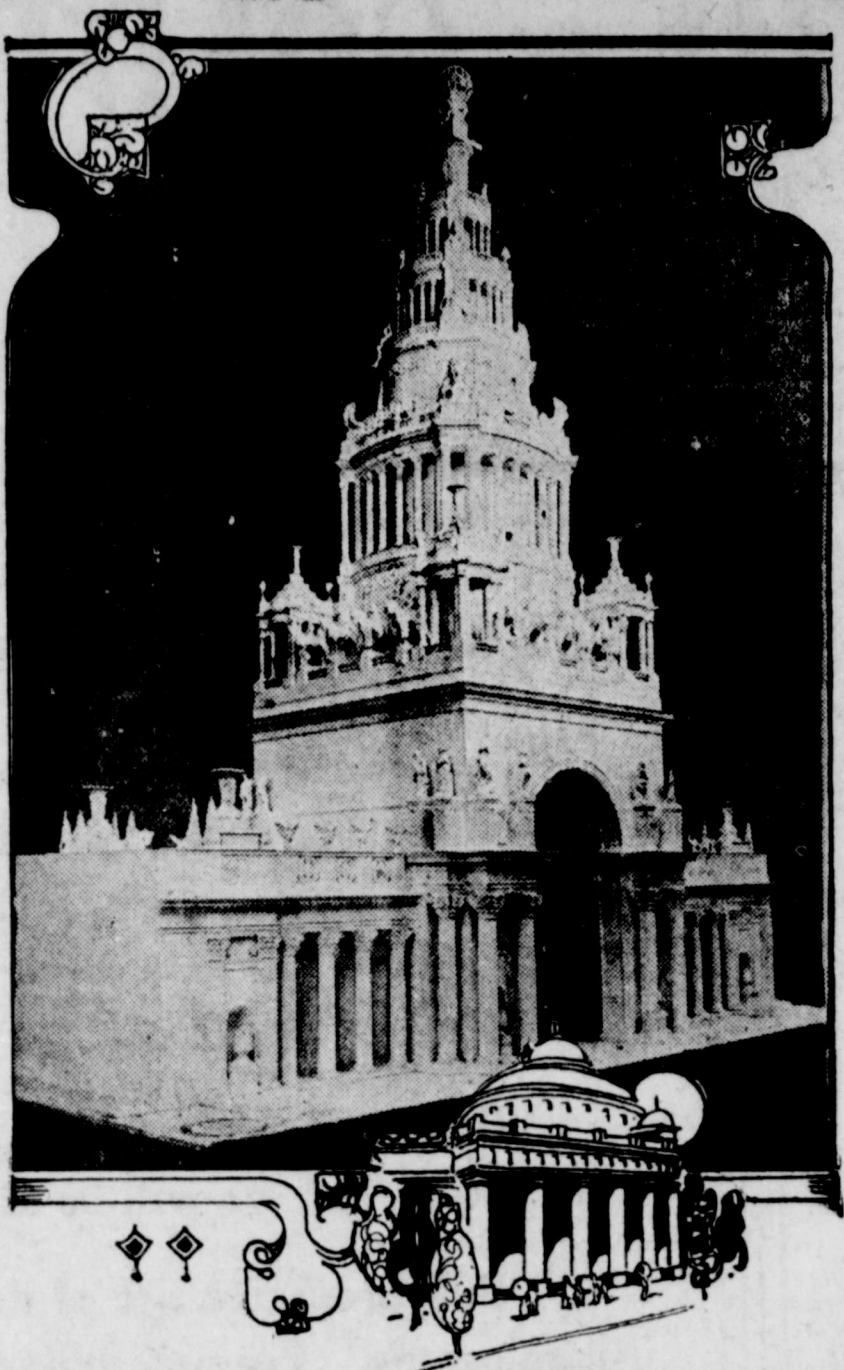

A lad 12-years-old refuses to testify against his mother in the court at Plainview, notwithstanding he has been placed in jail for contempt of court. His mother is charged with killing his father, but he avers that he did the killing and refuses to answer questions incriminating his mother.

Will H. Mayes, lieutenant governor and editor of the Brownwood Bulletin, is serving the great state of Texas as governor during the absence of Governor Colquitt who is attending the conference of governors in Colorado.

The mother of the young boy who was killed by a live electric wire in Waco a few weeks ago has entered suit against the electric company for \$30,000.

The killing of two men within an hour at Beaumont Monday is a record that will equal Houston or Dallas. One of the dead men was an Italian, and the other a negro.

A young man who had been drinking jumped from the Brooklyn bridge at the highest point Monday and escaped with but a few scratches. No reason was assigned for his fool-hardy act.

A Socialist speaker in Lima, Ohio, was robbed of her purse containing \$90. She claims to know who stole the purse, but refuses to prosecute the thief for the reason that she says it would only make him a confirmed thief.

The difference in crop reports from all parts of the state and from other states, is somewhat remarkable. One man will report a total failure and another, coming from the identical section, reports good crops. The best way to judge the crop is by the total receipts.

In a prize fight in Los Angeles, Cal., Saturday John Young, cowboy heavy-weight pugilist, was killed by a blow from his antagonist, Jess Willard. There is now a demand for anti-prize fight legislation in that state and it is likely the prize ring will be abolished.

The operator of a pool hall in Vernon is preparing to test the new pool hall law. He continued his business after the election on the operation of pool halls had resulted adversely to the business and was arrested and placed under bond to await a decision.

Secretary Bryan has notified both factions in Mexico that this government will hold them responsible for maltreatment of Americans. It appears that this notice is rather late, as the greasers have been committing all manner of crime against the Americans since the beginning of the trouble in that country.

The church burning scandal at Fort Worth continues to receive attention from the courts and the public. After the cases against Dr. Norris were dismissed three parties were indicted for the burning of the Baptist church and parsonage and now indictments have been reported against others for conspiracy.

The state tax rate was fixed at 45 cents on the \$100 valuation—an increase of 18 1-3 cents over the previous year. This tax is divided as follows: Ad valorem 23c, state school 17c, Confederate pension 5c. Last year the state rate was 10, the state school 16 2-3, while the 5c for Confederate pensions was levied for the first time this year. It is said that next year the rate will have to be raised some more, owing to the fact that the \$500,000 penalty recovered from the Standard Oil Co. is to be used to augment the taxes of this year and next year that much will have to be raised by taxation in addition to the present tax rate.

Saturday night as westbound Santa Fe passenger train No. 5 was pulling out of the station Willie Hendricks, while trying to "hang" the train to the Frisco crossing, was knocked from the steps, when his head hit a stationary box car, and he has been in a precarious condition since that time.

Officers have made two arrests in connection with the finding of an infant boy in a North Brownwood well Friday. One was J. W. Hart, 58 years old, and the other his daughter, Bettie Hart, 25 years old. Both are held in jail pending a preliminary hearing which has not yet been arranged.

We will stay here until some time in October. When the weather begins to cool off we will again return to old Mills to winter.

SAVE FLOOD WATER.

On a large proportion of the farms of this state there are creeks, ravines, or gullies that could be dammed at comparatively small expense, thus forming lakes or pools to catch and hold in the aggregate a vast amount of flood water. The lakes already built could and should be greatly enlarged, insuring an abundance of water for man and beast, in many cases enough to irrigate on a moderate scale, and also furnish power to run the ordinary farm machinery. Useful shade or fruit trees could be easily, cheaply and profitably grown on the banks of these lakes and the evaporation from these waters would, to some extent, cool the atmosphere and presently, when we have a great number of such pools, might possibly increase our rainfall. With just a little care and attention the fish from these lakes would be an appetizing addition to the food supply. If the people generally will become enthusiastically interested in this subject and show their faith by their works, our lawmakers will soon catch the spirit of the enterprise and give county and state support to water conservation on a larger scale by creating water bonding districts on the order of our road, levee and drainage districts, and many great reservoirs will be built that will catch and hold, in the aggregate, billions of tons of water. The combined efforts of the state, counties, cities, towns and country neighborhoods would save billions of barrels of flood water which now goes wastefully to the Gulf, carrying with it millions of tons of fertilizing matter washed from the soil, which should be conserved, greatly adding to the comfort, happiness and prosperity of all the people. In fact, if we will cultivate more intelligently and carefully, conserve the fertility of the earth as a priceless inheritance and catch and hold the storm waters, we will make Texas a veritable agricultural Eden, capable of supporting in prosperity and happiness, millions and millions of people for an indefinite time. Let us form a Flood-Water Lake Club in every precinct in the state, and by concerted action and neighborhood co-operation we will work wonders and dam Texas for the good of all the people.—Henry Exall.

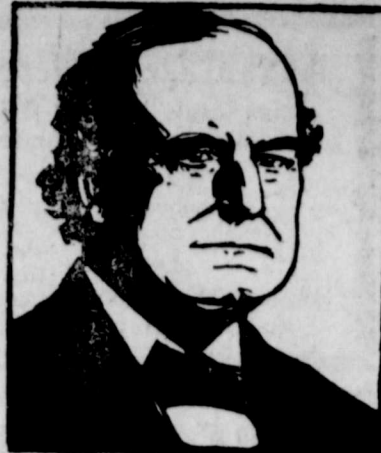

Many Stock and Large Purchases—A Number of Buyers.

It is proposed to have more buyers here on the next occasion, as the stock brought to this market will justify a greater number of buyers than have been here on the former occasions.

Those in charge of the sales are well pleased with the result of this and the former trades day.

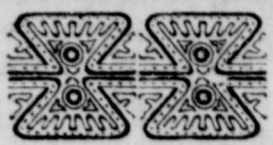
