## Station Hours Curtailed

# Government Forces Gulf Cut-Back

J&J Gulf on Interstate 20, owned and operated by Jessie Wiggins and Jimmy Williams, is being forced by the fuel shortage and government regulations into closing at noon each day.

Just a short time ago, the Gulf station was a full-time station, open seven days a week, closing for the night about 10 on week-nights and about 12 on the week-ends. Gasoline shortages had already curtailed the hours of operation, so that the station was closing on Sundays and earlier in the afternoons, about dark.

Now, according to Wiggins, the station will remain open

from 7 a.m. until noon, Monday through Saturday, as the station will have only 300 gallons per day until after March 1. Since the station normally sells 2,000 gallons or more per day, the 300 gallon limit will severely hurt the owners.

Wiggins had a telegram from Gulf Oil president, Z. D. Bonner, explaining the cutback in gasoline.

Bonner put the blame squarely on government control, stating, "Gulf is being forced to sell to other refiners 15 per cent of its crude supply. The government has determined that the average refinery in the U. S. have available 76 per cent of the crude oil necessary to run at capacity."

Bonner further explained that Gulf has crude oil available to enable it to run at 91 percent of capacity but "the government has decreed that Gulf must sell off enough crude to bring its operation down to 76 percent."

He added that the theory behind the allocation program suggests that all refineries are equally efficient at refining a barrel of crude oil. "This is not the case," said Bonner.

"Gulf's refineries can produce more gasoline from a barrel of crude than the industry average. Despite this fact, the allocation program will force us to sell 131,000 barrels per day of crude oil to other refiners for their use. We do not quarrel with the objective of maintaining independent refiners and marketers with crude supplies as viable competition; but when a refiner is

a large company—such as Texaco, Sun, ARCO, Sohio and Getty, or where antiquated, obsolete and inefficient plants are subsidized—we object."

Bonner pointed out that the resale and relocation of crude is bound to increase the total cost of refined products when they

are finally sold.

The telegram ended with Bonner's urging Wiggins and Williams to make their views known to their Senators and congressman and included the address of the Federal Energy Office, New Executive Office Bldg., Room 4125, Washington, D. C. 20461.

## Office Closing Will Affect Westbrook

Westbrook School board will discuss the question of whether or not to become an independent school district in their regular meeting Monday night.

The question has arisen as a result of Olson Sweet's announced candidacy for the office of County School Superintendent, with the intention of closing the office when he wins the election.

Superintendent of Westbrook school L. M. Dawson explained that Sweet would have to put the question of closing the county office to the people of Mitchell County in a special election, once he wins the election, as county school superintendent.

Dawson had talked with attorney Chester Ollison with the Texas Education Agency and Ollison explained that if the elec-

tion of county voters approves the abolition of the office, then the county judge must act as county school superintendent and according to state law, must receive \$2,600 from the state as his pay for the trouble of carrying out his duties.

In addition to the \$2,600 paid to the county judge, the law also requires that the state pay the expense of his staff in fulfilling the county superintendent's job.

Another method of closing the office, other than by a special election of Mitchell County voters, would be for the Texas Legislature to pass a law abolishing the office, which may or may not be constitutional according to the present constitution, as the attorney general has not voiced an opinion on the issue.

Dawson also pointed out that since Westbrook is a budget-balance school it gets no aid from the state of Texas and would have to meet the added expense of hiring a tax assessor-collector as well as a bookkeeper for the school system. Dawson estimated that these expenses would cost the Westbrook school system about \$15,000 about the same amount that the county superintendents' office costs the state now.

Dawson emphasized the point that the county superintendent's office does not cost the county, county school districts or coun-

ty school children one penny, part of his salary being paid by the Westbrook school district, and the rest by the state.

Dawson said he thought some people did not realize this important point and wanted it brought to the attention of residents of Mitchell County before anything else is done concerning the issue.

The present office of County School Superintendent is held by Roy Davis Coles, who will not seek re-election.

## Fund Drive Meeting Planning Committee To Meet

A second meeting of the financial planning committee for the Industrial Team fund drive will be held at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 12 in the Community Room of City National Bank.

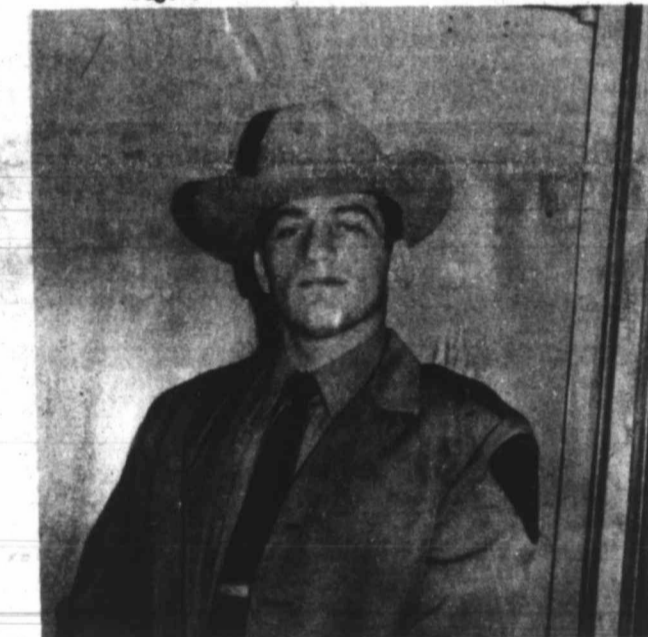

Bob Reilly, chairman of the finance committee, explained that two drives have been held previously, each about three years apart.

## I-27 Hearings To Be Held

A hearing will be held sometime in March in Abilene concerning the possible routing of an extension of Interstate 27 from Lubbock southward.

Chamber of Commerce president Bobby Lemons said that the Chamber will do all it possibly can to get the highway routed through Colorado City, as that is the most logical extension of the route from Amarillo through San Angelo to intersect with both Interstate 20 and Interstate 10.

The hearings are to be held by an official of the Texas State Highway Department in accordance with instructions con-

tained in the last federal aid highway act passed by Congress.

Interstate 27 now connects Amarillo and Lubbock. The Congressional highway act required the U. S. Department of Transportation and the Texas Highway Department to study routing of an extension and report recommendations back to Congress next January.

The act proposes the extension of Interstate 27 in a southerly direction to intersect with both I-20 and I-10, which traverses Texas from Beaumont to El Paso through Houston and San Antonio.

### Prizes To Be Given

Six saddle blankets and four belt buckles will be the prizes to be won by the best cowboys and cowgirls competing in the Playday at the arena west of the city today (Sunday).

Competition will get underway at 1:30 p.m. with registration to begin at 12:30.

Ribbons will be awarded to six places in six age groups, but attention will be focused on the big blanket and buckle prizes.

Belt buckles will go to the best time in each event: barrel racing, goat tying, pole bending and the flag race.

The high point individual in each of the six age groups will be awarded a brand-new saddle blanket. ## Funds Needed For Boy

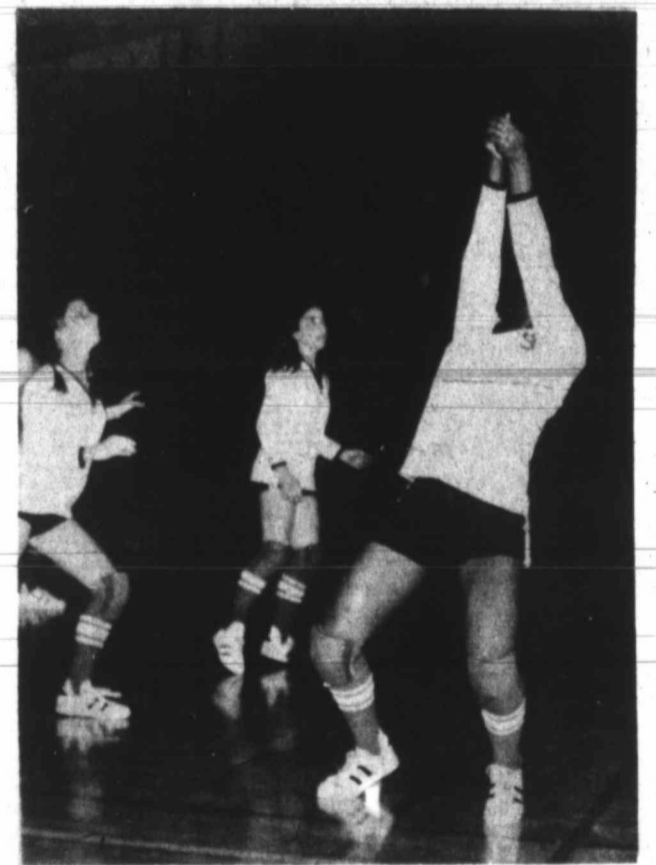
Lanny Walraven, 3 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Walraven is suffering from a congenital heart ailment.

## Womack To Head Easter Seal Appeal Paintings To Be Presented At WTC

George Womack will head the 1974 Easter Seal Appeal in Mitchell County, it was announced by Thomas N. Jenness, Jr., Fort Worth, President of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

Residents of Mitchell County will receive the annual Easter Seal Appeal letters in the mail beginning March 1. The Easter Seal Appeal, conducted yearly to provide treatment and services to disabled persons and their families, will continue through Easter Sunday, April 14.

Womack is one of 223 men and women throughout Texas who are serving in this capacity. The cost of the statewide Easter Seal program is over one million dollars, financed mainly by the Easter Seal Appeal. Almost 90 percent of all funds raised by the Texas Easter Seal Appeal remain in Texas to support the growing needs of the disabled in the State.

Special emphasis is being given in the 1974 Easter Seal Appeal to the disabled citizen in the County who may need assistance and not know where to obtain it. Any disabled person can contact Womack at City National Bank to receive the request form for a determination of the extent and type of assistance needed and the most efficient means of obtaining that assistance. Arrangements for qualified treatment or services will be made by the Texas Easter Seal Society.

The materials, equipment and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 square miles include a 3 cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.
