

Loan Plan Explained

From \$7,000,000 to \$15,000,000 will be loaned Texas farmers through the regional agricultural loan office of the \$2,000,000,000 Reconstruction Finance Corporation during the next sixty days. It is predicted by Owen W. Sherill, regional manager for Texas, New Mexico and Arizona, with headquarters in Dallas.

These millions, it is explained by Mr. Sherill, will be gradually spent within local trade territory for crop production purposes and will be widely circulated, proving a genuine stimulant to all lines of business. All applications for loans must be made through the County loan committees in which the land is located, or through their sub-committees. County committees have the privilege of designating sub-committees in trade centers throughout counties to serve farmers in distant points.

The following is a general presentation of the provisions of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation Act relating to the granting of crop production loans.

1. Security: Absolute first lien on entire 1932 crop.

2. Loan limit to individual farmer, \$400.00.

3. Limit to all tenants in single county of one landlord, \$600.

4. Loans will not be made to applicants planting cotton in excess of 65 per cent of their total acreage in 1931. This does not apply to applicants planting 10 acres or less of cotton.

5. Loans will not be made to minors, to persons who did not farm in 1931, nor to persons having a means of livelihood other than farming.

6. Loans will only be made to "farmers who are unable to obtain loans for crop production in 1932" from other sources.

7. Proceeds of loan may be used only for crop production purposes and shall not be used to purchase machinery, livestock, nor to pay taxes, debts, etc.

8. Loans will not be made for a total acreage of crops in excess of the average acreage planted in 1930 and 1931.

9. Maximum loan for field crops in counties where fertilizer is not essential, \$3 per acre. Of the \$3 maximum, \$1 may be used to purchase seed; \$1 to purchase feed for work stock or fuel and oil for tractors; and \$1 for repairs and miscellaneous expense. For truck crops, including potatoes and sweet potatoes, allowance is \$10 per acre.

10. In addition to allowance for seed, feed or fuel, and miscellaneous expense, in counties where fertilizer is essential, \$3 per acre may be added for the purchase of fertilizer for field crops. In case of truck crops, including potatoes and sweet potatoes, maximum allowance for seed, feed or fuel for tractors, miscellaneous expense and fertilizer is \$20 per acre.

11. In addition to seed, feed, or fuel, miscellaneous expenses, and fertilizer, an allowance of \$2 per acre may be allowed for purchase of spraying and dusting materials for cotton, however this allowance is available ONLY in counties in which spraying or dusting has been a regular practice. This allowance is \$4 per acre for truck crops in those sections in which spraying and dusting is absolutely necessary.

12. The allowance for fertilizer and spraying and dusting materials for bearing orchards and vineyards is \$25 per acre.

STOCK HAULING LAW IN EFFECT

Austin, March 6. — L. G. Phares, chief of the Texas Highway Patrol, announced Saturday that a campaign would be launched at once, with the assistance of the State Live Stock Sanitary Commission, to enforce the law requiring permits for transportation on the highways of livestock and poultry.

The legislature enacted a statute requiring those hauling live stock to obtain owner's permit certificates in an effort to prevent the removal of cattle from a quarantined district into areas not infested by ticks or cattle diseases.

Phares said that State highway patrolmen or other officers can, without a search warrant, require the driver of any vehicle moving live stock or poultry to produce a permit for the transportation signed by the owner.

Failure to possess such a permit subjects the driver of the vehicle to a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$200 for each head of live stock or poultry involved in the movement.

The law has a dual purpose, in that it will prohibit the transportation of stolen animals, or butchered portinos thereof over the highways, a practice that is very prevalent in many parts of the State. The law was originally sponsored by the Texas Cattle Raisers Association and the West Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and these two organizations will take an active part in its enforcement.

14. Applicant must agree to plant sufficient acreage of feed to take care of his livestock.

15. Applications for loans must be made before April 30, 1932.

16. All loans mature November 30th, 1932, but proceeds from all crops must be applied to payment as soon as crops are harvested and sold.

17. Rate of interest is 5 1-2 per cent per annum.

18. Advances may be made in installments which may be discontinued if money is not used for the purpose for which it was borrowed.

19. Application blanks for loans may be obtained from the county committees and other agencies designated by the county committees.

Sometimes we wonder what would be the effect if things should go on about as they are now indefinitely. How much worse off would we be as a people if the present standards of income should prove permanent?

It all depends, it seems to us, on where you stand when you look at the world. If you're standing on a dollar-mark things are pretty bad right now. But there are other points of view. Why do we want prosperity to return? So we can all have more money. But if we had more money, what would we do with it?

It seems to us that during those boom years when money, for a lot of people, was easy to get, it proved to be pretty hard to hold. And from what we saw and heard and read about what people did with their money, especially people who had never had any experience with money before, it didn't do many of them much good. On the contrary, it seems to us, it was a genuinely bad influence. And is there any reason to believe that people, speaking generally,

Of course, we want everybody to have a job. We not only hope that but we expect that conditions will change so that there will be no unemployment to the extent of wide-spread distress and privation. And we realize that there will always be some people who will have more money than they know what to do with, and who will continue to spend it foolishly. But it does seem to us that in the effort to make everybody rich our system has not succeeded in making anybody very happy; and we wonder whether we have not somehow, as a people, lost our grip on the more enduring things of life in the struggle for the mighty dollar.

There are spiritual values which are immensely more important than riches, which are not at all dependent upon wealth, which, in fact, are likely to be destroyed by the possession of more money than is needed to keep the body warm and fed. Perhaps these lean years may prove to have had a disciplinary value in turning people's thoughts away from mere pleasure to the soberer but more important things of life.

15,000,000 BALE CROP
MEANS DISASTER FOR
SOUTH SAYS KEMPNER

"I think Progressive Texans, Inc., would be performing a most useful service if it would urge upon farmers of the South to limit by at least one-third planting of cotton this year," says I. H. Kempner, Galveston, one of the best informed cotton men and industrialists in Texas in a communication to one of the directors of that organization.

"Even if the only answer that can be made to the farmer's obvious question, 'If I do not plant this land in cotton, what shall I plant it in?' will be to let this land lie absolutely idle, that condition is absolutely the cotton farmer's sole salvation.

"If the farmers plant an acreage that will yield a crop this coming year in the South of 15,000,000 bales of American cotton, they will fasten on themselves 5 and 6 cent cotton for a period of years. Not to radically decrease cotton acreage will bring about a '5-year plan' of depression to Southern agriculture that is more likely to succeed than any menace of the 5-year plan of Russia or any other country.

"With the consumption of American cotton at the rate of not exceeding 13,500,000 bales, we now have—even if not another lock of cotton was grown—enough American cotton to supply the world another twelve months. If Progressive Texans, Inc., joined by similar and other organizations throughout the South, can induce the Southern farmers voluntarily to reduce their acreage 30 per cent this coming year, it means a minimum of 50 per cent increase in price, if not 100 per cent increase, for the next three or four years. It is well worth the sacrifice, if any, of letting land lie fallow for a single year, though such resting of land is valuable in the interest of soil conservation.

"If a crop of 16,000,000 bales of American cotton is raised next year, I doubt if the farmer will get more than 4 cents for his cotton—that means penury and exhaustion for both him and his land. Fifteen million bales will probably not bring over 6 cents, and either crop will keep the price of cotton down to this level for years to come. But if only 10,000,000 bales are raised, I believe 16c a pound is a reasonable figure. Sixteen million bales at even 5 cents a pound will bring the American farmer a gross income of \$400,000,000 but an absolute loss between the cost of production and his gross income from cotton. Ten million bales at 15c will bring him \$750,000,000, a profit of at least \$250,000,000 between the cost of production and gross income from his cotton, which profit will be expended on needed improvements on farms, and starts the wheels of progress throughout the South.

"Two years with a crop as small as 10,000,000 bales at prices around 15c means a level of living will be restored to the farmer—especially when raising his own food supply,—that will be marked contrast to the level permitted by a 15,000,000 or a 16,000,000 bale crop to be sold at prices that mean economic dejection for at least four years to come.

"Progressive Texans, Inc., is sponsoring a cotton products laboratory to develop new major outlets for cotton, but it will require several years to bring into fruition its objective. In the meantime Southern cotton farmers who fail to observe in their own direct interest the admonition and advice of those vitally concerned in their prosperity—which means the prosperity of the whole South—will be contributing to lowering the social and economic status of themselves and the 70 per cent of the population of the Southern States directly concerned in some phase of the cotton industry. No one can blame the bear speculator from Wall Street for the rocky road of low prices if the Southern farmer fails to observe plainly legible economic traffic signals."

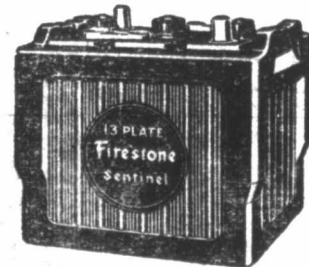

Mitchell County Farm Notes

C. N. Adams of Carr has received 350 grape cuttings from California and is planting them on his farm.

S. H. Hart is running additional terrace lines this week. Bill Dorn has killed but the pocket gophers that were damaging flowers and shrubs around his home by setting gopher traps in the tunnels. Anyone interested in controlling gophers should get in touch with county farm agent who will be glad to arrange a demonstration in gopher control.

Formwalt Brothers of Dorn community report that they are well pleased with the small trench silo they built last fall. The feed was put in the silo in bundles without cutting.

J. S. Barnes of Westbrook and I. Smallwood of Hyman report that cutworms are damaging crops. They may be controlled by use of poison bran mash.

Mitchell county can get a soil survey made of the entire county without cost to the county. If interested persons will petition the state Experiment Station. These surveys are valuable to farmers as it gives the extent of alkali, tells what crops are best adapted to certain kinds of soils, etc. Persons buying farms can know what kind of soil they are buying. Anyone interested in securing a soil survey should see the county farm agent who has the information and petitions.
