## FERGUSON INJUNCTION CALLED FOR HEARING

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, Sept. 22.—An attack on the validity of the law permitting a private citizen to bring suit to contest an election, was launched by attorneys for Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, when the injunction suit, seeking to disqualify her as the Democratic nominee for Governor of Texas, was called for hearing here today.

Mrs. Ferguson was present when the injunction hearing was called. Mrs. Ferguson denies that there was any agreement between herself and her husband, James E. Ferguson, that he was to be governor in her name, declaring that this is but a conclusion of the plaintiff and a mere campaign assertion.

In answer to questions of the jurisdiction of the court over the subject matter of the parties contending, her attorneys say that Charles Dickson, who brought the suit, has no interest in the nomination and could neither be benefited nor damaged by Mrs. Ferguson's election, since he could not bring action.

Court recessed until two o'clock this afternoon without hearing any arguments of counsel, to permit plaintiff's attorneys to study the defendant's answer.

### REV. BANDY IS SLIGHTLY BETTER

J. R. Lusk returned Monday at noon from El Paso, where he had been to accompany his wife to the bedside of her father, Rev. H. M. Bandy, who was injured in an automobile accident last week. Mr. Lusk reports that Rev. Bandy is a little better but is still in a very dangerous condition, however the doctors say if no complications arise he will get well.

The Ledger carried a notice last week of the fact that Mr. and Mrs. Lusk had been called to El Paso, but no particulars were obtainable at that time. Rev. Bandy had been to El Paso and had just returned to his home at Fabens, and leaving his car he walked around the rear of the car and started to cross the street when an automobile coming from the opposite direction knocked him down and his head struck the pavement cracking the skull for about three inches on the back of his head and causing a slight concussion of the brain.

Rev. Bandy is 70 years old and is fighting remarkably well for his life and unless something unlooked for happens he will be able to return to his home in a few weeks.

Mrs. Lusk remained with her father and will be there until he is removed from the hospital to his home.

## WHEELER SAYS MEANS STORY IS STARTLING

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Sept. 22.—Gaston Means, instigator and star witness in the Harry Daugherty inquiry, whose repudiation of his own testimony was published in the Sunday newspapers, called Senator Wheeler, independent candidate for vice-president over the telephone last night, and gave the senator a startling version of that episode, Mr. Wheeler announced today.

Wheeler made this statement to newspaper correspondents traveling with him on his campaign tour of the Middle West states.

Sen. Wheeler was prosecutor in the case before the Senate against former Attorney General Daugherty, and Means was the chief witness.

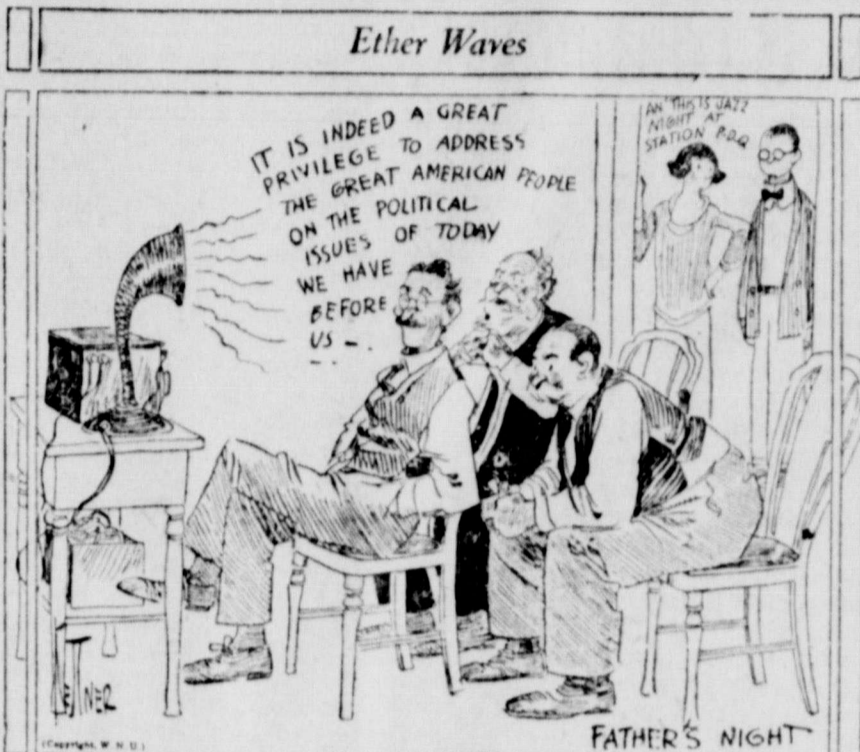

## Minister Confesses to Poisoning His Wife and Husband of Other Woman

(By Associated Press)  
MT. VERNON, Ill., Sept. 22.—Rev. Lawrence Hight confessed today to poisoning his wife and Wilfor Sweetin, his paramour's husband. In a sworn statement the minister declared that he murdered his wife to relieve her of her sufferings. According to his statement the preacher placed poison in her coffee on the morning of Sept. 16th.

Rev. Hight claimed that he was temporarily out of his mind at the time he killed his wife. He said that he put poison in water which he gave Sweetin to put him out of pain. He poisoned Sweetin at the latter's home on July 27th, when Sweetin lay ill.

The authorities found a quantity of arsenic at the home of Rev. Hight, following a clue that he had killed his wife, but the minister at first claimed that this was purchased to kill rats.

## FORMER SENATOR DIES AT HOME

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Sept. 22.—Robert Gamble, former United States senator from South Dakota, died at his home here today after a long illness.

BRECKENRIDGE, Tex., Sept. 22.—One man is known to be dead and two or three are missing as a result of the overflowing of Gonzales Creek near here yesterday, following a cloudburst.

E. Settles, age 41, an employe of an oil company, was drowned near his automobile when he ran into a washed out bridge.

BRECKENRIDGE, Tex., Sept. 22.—Conditions were returning to normal here today after great excitement last night as a result of flood caused by the overflow from Gonzales Creek.

Water from the creek spread over twelve city blocks to a depth of ten feet in some places, causing scores of citizens in the affected area to seek safety on the roofs of houses and in tree tops.

One unidentified man is reported to be missing, while all others are believed to have escaped in safety. Property damage estimated at \$250,000.00.

The high water was caused by a rainfall of five inches within two hours time.

HELPFUL SUGGESTIONS

A LARGE chicken is much more economical to buy than a small one, as the proportion of meat to bone is greater. After all the meat is removed, the bits too small to serve of the table may be used in a salad or a cream sauce on toast.

MURDER CASE IS CONTINUED

After granting a motion made by the defense in the Kuhn murder case, which was set for hearing Monday, district court began grinding on other criminal cases.

The special venire of 108 men summoned in the murder case was dismissed after Judge J. O. Woodward announced a continuance in the case, postponing the trial of the next term of court.

This is the case in which John Smith, negro, stands charged with the murder of F. J. Kuhn, near Rowena, last August a year ago. The defense asked for a continuance on the grounds of absence of eye witness, whose whereabouts are unknown at this time.

Other cases called and continued Monday afternoon included Neal Tucker and Bill Clark, charged with liquor law violations; Fred Millerion and Dock Hampan, charged with transporting intoxicating liquors.

The case against H. E. Wilson, charged with burglarizing the Ebb Cathey saddle shop, was tried, the defendant pleading guilty and the trial consisting only of statutory proceedings—introducing of testimony, charging of jury and returning of the verdict. The jury gave the defendant two years in the penitentiary, the lowest penalty. It only required about fifteen minutes to try the case.

The State of Texas vs. J. B. McGown, another liquor case, was before the court at three o'clock, and other cases docketed and which to be called include the Rowena bank robbery case, in which two young men from San Angelo by the names of Harding and Keys are charged with attempting to rob the First National Bank of Rowena. It is expected that motion for continuance will be filed in this case.

District Judge Woodward, who was unable to hold court last week, returned here Monday at noon and resumed his seat on the bench.

New Gas Well Insures Big Supply for Ballinger

A new gas well was brought in at the Russell field, fifteen miles Southeast of Ballinger Sunday, according to a reliable report received at Ballinger a short time after the big gas flow was struck and dirt, slush and water sent flying over the derrick. The new well is known as Giesecke No. 1.

H. Giesecke, one of the owners of the land upon which the well is located, declined to give out anything officially Monday morning, stating that he preferred that W. B. Cerf, of Fort Worth, who is drilling the well, do the talking. Mr. Cerf was notified Sunday of the big gas find, and was due to arrive here Monday.

This gives the Russell field three strong gas wells, any one of which, it is claimed, supply gas sufficient for a town several times larger than Ballinger. The new well was estimated to be making five million feet of gas, which is stronger than either of the other two wells. The older wells are known as Gulf Production No. 1, Russell Production No. 1, and the well just brought in is known as Giesecke No. 1.

All the wells are located on the ten thousand acre tract of land recently purchased from the Dick Russell estate by Giesecke Brothers, and a cousin, Albert Giesecke, of Denver, Colorado. The new well is about two miles South of Gulf Well No. 1, and proves that the gas field extends over an area of at least two miles, and the new well being stronger than the first one drilled indicates that the field is better in the vicinity of the new well.

The old Gulf well continues to make both gas and oil, but it was reported that the well brought in Sunday was only a gasser, making a strong flow of dry gas and no oil.

H. Giesecke stated that his company held a gas franchise and it was probable that the next step would be towards utilizing the

gas which the Russell field is now producing. The question of piping the gas to Ballinger involves big expense on account of the formation thru which the pipe line would come. The country between Ballinger and the gas field is rough, and it would be necessary to tunnel thru much rock.

However, with such a gas supply so near the city, the possibilities of solving the fuel problem are very promising. It is no longer a question of whether there is sufficient gas to supply the city, but a question of bringing it within reach of the consumers.

The fuel bill—coal, wood and oil—is one of the big items of expense both to domestic and commercial consumers. Natural gas will solve the fuel problem, provided some plan for bringing the gas within reach of the consumers is worked out.

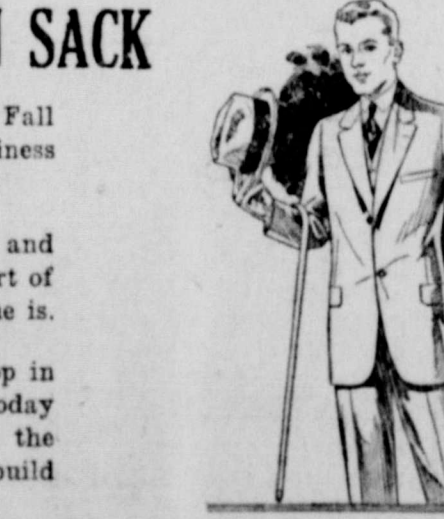

## Former Texas Girl Trains Ballet For "Tokyo" State Fair Feature

GLADYS HIGHT AS LITTLE GIRL LIVED IN HOUSTON AND DALLAS—HAS "MADE GOOD"

Gladys Hight, former Texas girl, and now the head of the Gladys Hight School of Dancing, Chicago, will be responsible for the beautiful ballet numbers to be given in connection with "Tokyo," the magnificent fireworks spectacle at the State Fair of Texas, Oct. 11-26 this year. Ten or fifteen years ago Gladys Hight was a little girl in Houston and Dallas. Her mother, Madame Virginia Lee Hight, was a well known and highly capable vocal instructor, who conducted big voice culture schools in both Texas cities. Miss Gladys received her first instructions in the art of dancing at the hands of Texas teachers, and continued her practice intensively, after her mother removed to Chicago. Now Miss Gladys, who has more than "made good," is the head of two big schools in the Windy City—one down in the loop district and the other out on Sheridan Road.

She was in Texas early in August, on her way to Mexico City, where she is to study the native dances, in connection with her work, just as she studied Japanese dances in the Sunflower Kingdom last year. During her stop in Dallas she told of the coming attraction at the State Fair.

"I was very glad to have opportunity for training a ballet that would appear before 'home folks' of my childhood days," she said, "and so when Mr. Charles Duffield, the producer of 'Tokyo' told me what he

wanted, I jumped at the chance. "There will be twenty-four beautiful girls in the ballet number, one of which will be a fan dance and the other a typically characteristic Japanese number called the 'fishing dance.' You know, 'Tokyo' is based on the great Japanese earthquake, and the ballets come as showing the peaceful villagers enjoying themselves, before the holocaust swallows up their little town. 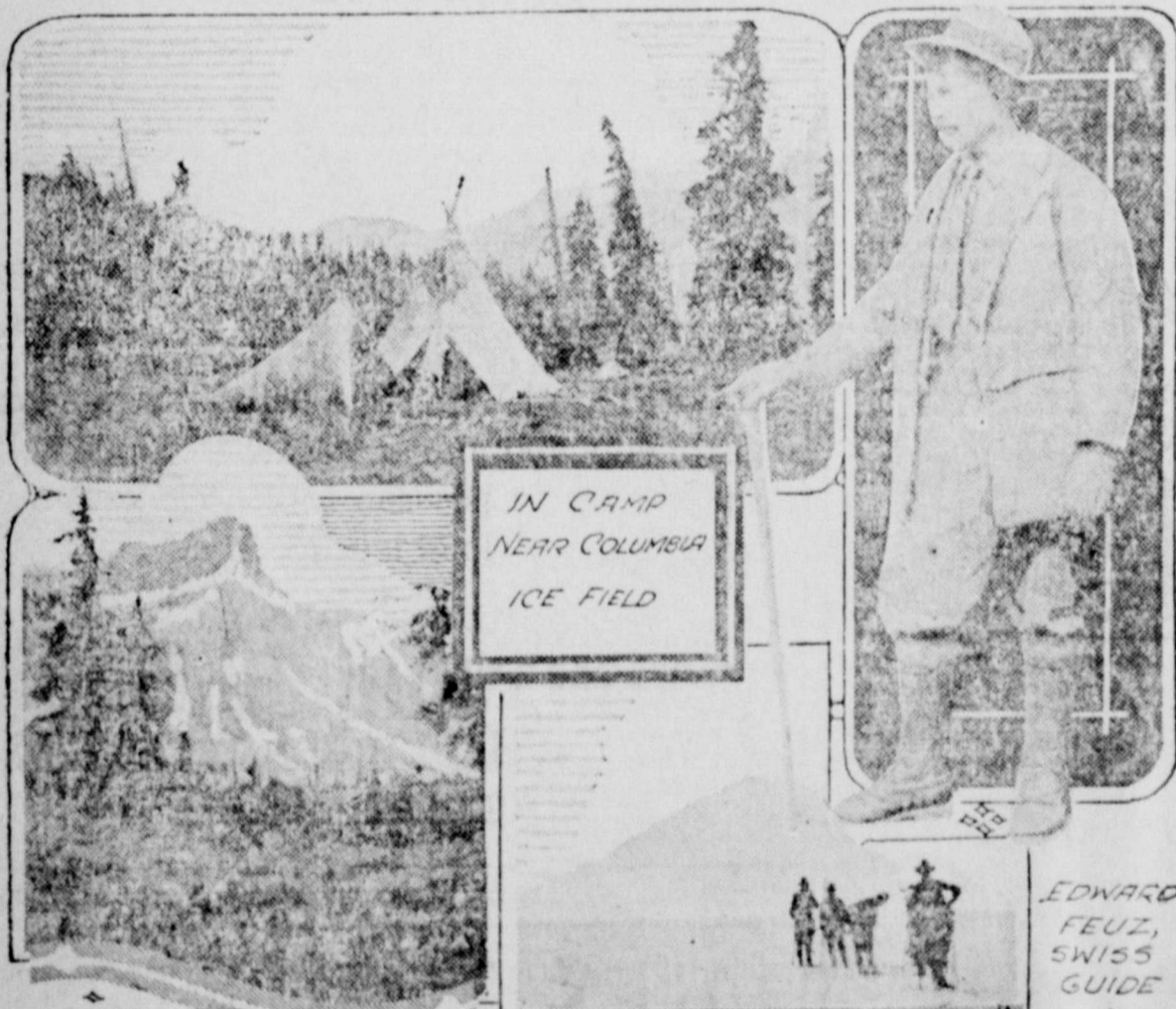

## Students Scale Lofly Peaks In The Canadian Rockies

EDWARD FEUZ, SWISS GUIDE

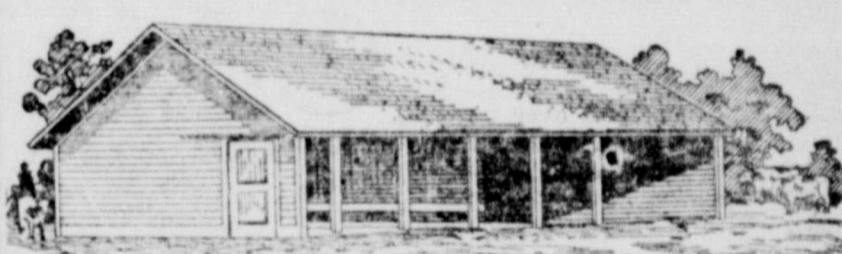
ONE OF THE PEAKS SCALED

NEARING THEIR OBJECTIVE

Five peaks in the Canadian Rockies have just been conquered for the first time by three Harvard and Hotchkiss students who were accompanied by their Swiss guides. The students who climbed and named the new peaks in the famous Columbia ice field are Leonard Harris of Boston, and Mount Hotchkiss after the two American universities. The party made five first ascents including the hitherto unconquered Mount Patterson, 10,400 feet, Mount Sir James Outram 10,700 feet, the South Twin, 10,600 feet and the unnamed peaks, Harvard

and Hotchkiss. Besides all this they discovered a new route to the top of the second highest peak in the Rockies, Mount Columbia, 12,000 feet, which was made in a return journey of twenty-three hours. The aim of the exploring party, to conquer the South Twin, was successfully attained. The Field-Harris party left Lake Louise accompanied by two guides, five packers and nineteen horses, and travelled 200 miles into the Columbia ice field. Their progress was halted several times by the terrific winds from the ice fields and once they were forced to halt a day at Mistayah lake in order to make rafts with which to get their horses across. Here, at the foot of Mount Patterson, they put up a bivouac camp and accompanied by the weird howling of the wild ice winds of this district spent most of their night thrumming a

ukelele and singing warm southern songs. Leonard Harris had his own Swiss guide with him, Joseph Biner, who has guided him for many years in the Swiss Alps. Edward Feuz who has been guiding in the Canadian Rockies since 1903 was the man who successfully maneuvered this valuable expedition. The greatest novelty of the trip, he stated on his return, was the meeting of fourteen American girls on the lonely forks of the North Saskatchewan River, who were travelling alone with their packers. The girls insisted that the party stop off for dinner with them that night, following which a note of civilization was added to their wild northern environment by the sound of the ukelele and the swish of dancing feet over pine needles dimly lighted by a blazing ice camp fire.

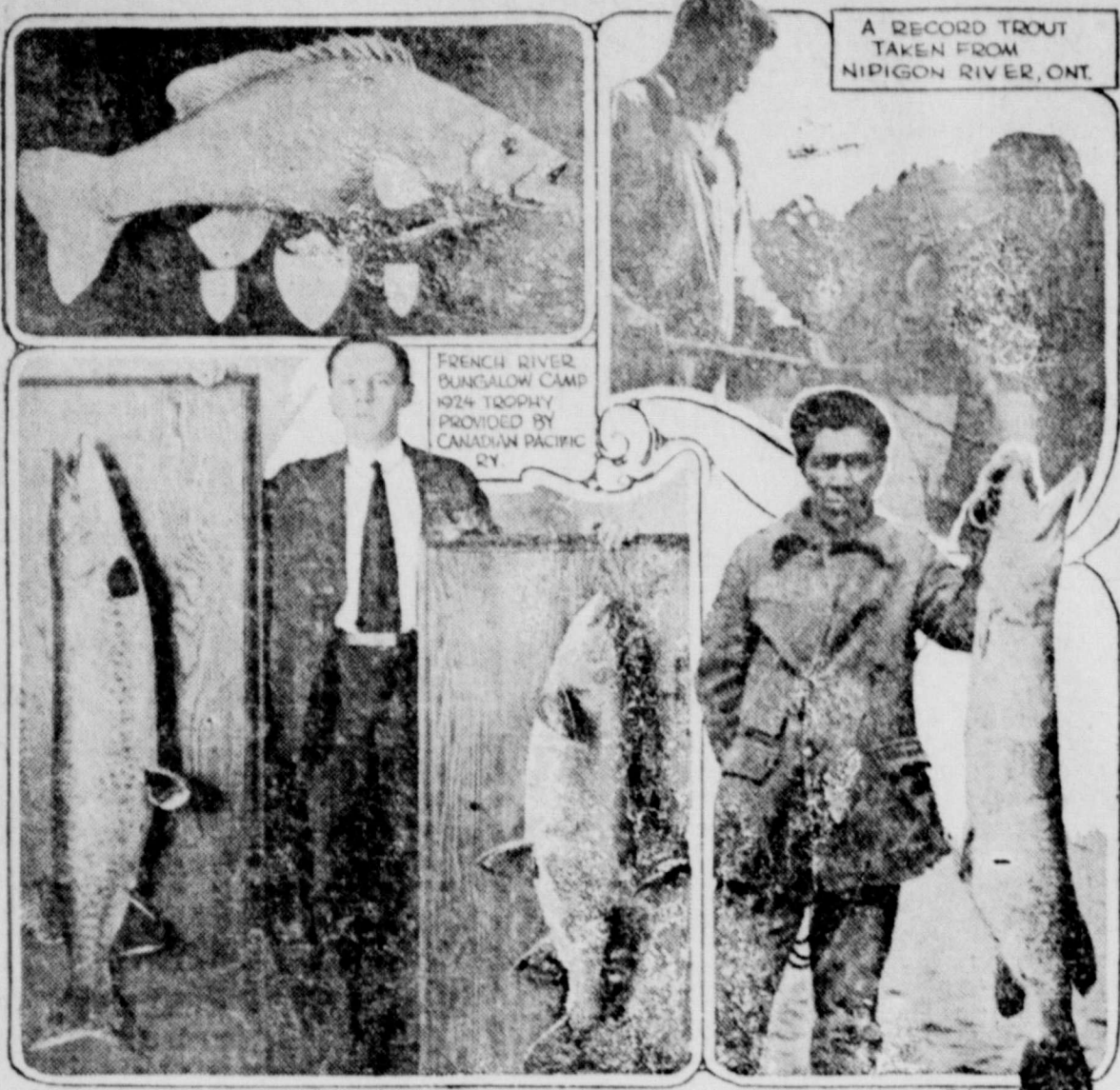

Canadian Waters Yield Many Record Catches in 1924

Tales and pictures of record catches from many resorts and waters in Canada warrant the belief that Canada's 1924 fishing record will outshine those of many good seasons in the past. Some of the stories coming across the border sound like fairy tales. Just picture a guest of Devil's Gap Bungalow Camp on Lake-of-the-Woods, at Kenora in western Ontario, setting out with a guide in a canoe armed with an 8-oz. split bamboo fishing rod fitted with a 15-lb. test Nac Japanese silk line and No. 5 Starr double-spinner as lure for a day's fishing and shortly hooking a 45-lb. fighting muskellunge that put up a fierce fight for 15 minutes, protesting all the rears and turns known to this species. As a final struggle to free himself Mr. Musky made a last effort, snapping the line and disappearing. Dark disappointment settled in the angler but the keen eyes of the

guide discerned the tired fish resting on the bottom under four feet of water. He cautioned quiet, knowing Musky's habits and in a few minutes Mr. Fish rose toward the surface and the guide's hand shot out, grabbed him through the gill and wanked him onto the canoe's bottom. This is the record for hand-caught fish. Earlier in the season a young Canadian caught two big ones in these same waters, a 35-lb. musky and 24 1/2 lb. lake trout. He was so proud of the water that he was photographed with them as pictured above. Reports from Nipigon reveal the fact that fishermen from all parts of U. S. and Canada are snapping its white waters and catching large trout, averaging 10 lbs. out late J. W. Doss's 11 lb. steelhead trout caught two years ago still holds first place. Val Marin, Quebec, an lake fisherman in the Laurentian Mts. has never lost a fish as big as a muskellunge, although in a

good fishing district, but came into the limelight this season when Jack Holton landed a 24 in. speckled trout weighing 5 lbs and 11 oz. Other big catches in Quebec waters are too numerous to mention. Two prominent Canadian Pacific officials meeting in the Canadian Rockies, made a friendly bet as to the fishing possibilities of a certain high up lake. It was won by the proponent who threw in a line and hauled out a fair-sized trout. Fishing for small-mouth black bass in French River has been uniformly good this season. A prominent New Yorker, out after bass there, surprised himself by hooking a big musky which was only landed by beaching the boat, the angler jumping overboard and towing his catch which the guide hit with a paddle. Quite possibly the Canadian Pacific's big trophies may have stimulated an ardor among sportsmen at its camps.

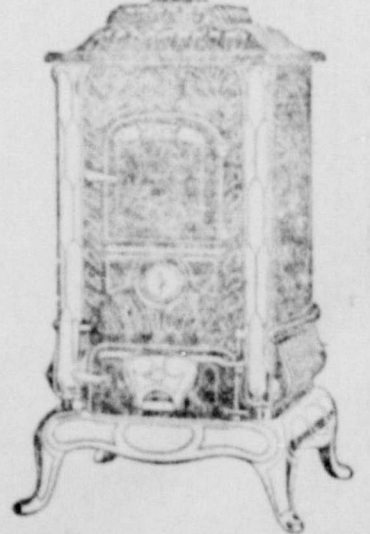

LONDON CATERING TO MODERATE AMERICANS

(By Associated Press) LONDON, Sept. 22.—With the American "invasion" of London in full swing, the manager of a big Oxford Street store has estimated that the visitors from over the Atlantic were spending somewhat more than \$500,000 a week in the English capital. London shopkeepers have awakened to the fact that by far the greater number of Americans who come to England these days are people of moderate means, who watch their shillings and pence as carefully as does the frugal Briton. ELECTRIC STORM CENTERS HERE

One of the most severe electric storms ever experienced in this city centered around Ballinger Sunday morning. The storm broke with the forming of a small rain cloud South of Ballinger, and as people gathered for Sunday schools at the various churches, the atmosphere became charged with electricity which caused a bombardment that continued for thirty minutes or longer. No serious damage resulted from the electric storm, but many people were excited, and many more declared that bolts of lightning struck near them. Quite a number of cases of minor damage were reported. It is believed that the electric storm was more severe in the residence district, and on Eighth and Ninth streets, centering around the 300, 400 and 500 blocks on these two streets. The lightning completely destroyed a radiophone aerial at the home of Joe Beck on Ninth Street, the current also damaging the telephone and shocking the occupants of the home. Slight damage was also reported at the home of John A. Weeks, two blocks further out on Eighth Street. The Mexican school house was also

struck and considerable damage done.

The West Texas Telephone Co. experienced some loss, a number of phones being burned out. The local light companies also reported minor damage.

The rain which accompanied the electric storm extended only a short distance West and North of Ballinger. The clouds swinging around to the South caused a heavy downpour South of Ballinger and East. The rain extended as far East as Talpa.
